

PARK AND RISE SUCCESS

Our park-and-ride scheme got off to a good start at the home match against Tottenham when more than 200 supporters made use of the shuttle service to the match.

It will not be operating today but will be back in action for next Saturday's home clash with Chelsea, kick-off 3pm. The car park is at the IBC car park on the junction of Kimpton Road and Airport Way.

CROWDS UP AGAIN

Attendances for Barclays League matches are continuing to rise and were up by more than half a million on last season by the end of the first week in December.

It is the fourth consecutive season that gates have continued to rise and shows that there is a trend of growing interest in league football in England.

In the First Division, the average has risen from 20,574 in 1988-89 to 20,852 this season—a rise of 1.35 per cent. The overall rise for all four divisions is from an average 8,694 to 9,583.

CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

Why we sold Roy Wegerle

A very happy Christmas and peaceful and prosperous New Year to all our supporters here this morning. I sincerely hope we enjoy as much excitement in 1990 as we have in 1989 when once again our players succeeded in earning the club a place in a Wembley cup final.

As everyone will know, we have sold Roy Wegerle to Queen's Park Rangers in a £1 million transfer deal which establishes new records for both clubs. It is clearly a move which has provoked some reaction on both sides among our supporters and I feel that it is probably right that I take this opportunity to put the record straight and explain why we accepted QPR's offer.

Roy was a very popular player here both on and off the pitch and I am sure we shall all miss him around the club. But we have a very large squad this year and are lucky to have several very fine forwards all competing for the same positions.

As a result of that, it has been obvious in the last few weeks that sometimes a proven player like Roy or our Danish international striker Lars Elstrup will have to accept a place on the substitutes' bench for certain matches. And this with our England international Mick Harford now well on the way back to full fitness after his long layoff through injury.

Given this situation on the playing side, it was prudent for us to consider the offer from QPR seriously. As a club with very limited income from gate receipts, we have to accept that it is always going to be necessary for us to 'manage our stock' carefully. It was with this in mind in recent years, that the club accepted very good offers for such men as Mal Donaghy and David Oldfield when the time was right. The offer for Roy was a good commercial offer and it was right to accept.

The transfer was good business for Luton Town. It helped to balance the squad, gives our team manager Ray Harford an opportunity to look more adventurously at the transfer market and opens up chances for such talented young players as Paul Gray, Kurt Nogan and Sean Farrell of whom we have such high



hopes for the future.

If we do not accept offers like the one from QPR for Roy Wegerle, we are not going to be in a position to trade effectively on the transfer market and to sign such men as Mick Kennedy or Lars Elstrup who have joined the club and done so well this season.


On the financial side, it is always going to be necessary for us to trade. We have a First Division wages bill and a very large squad this year. The wages bill comes to around £1.4 million. Income from spectators through the gate receipts each year only comes to about £600,000. The shortfall is obvious and has to be met by effective running commercial and administrative back-up operation to the playing side of the club and by, as I said earlier, managing our stock carefully.

For those who may feel this sounds rather negative it should also be borne in mind that we operate the best bonus schemes for players in the First Division and have re-signed both Mick Harford and Danny Wilson this season on new contracts, Mick while he was injured.

This proves the ambition at the club and, I think, helps show why the offer for Roy Wegerle was accepted. The deal was done not to balance the books – the club does not have a trading overdraft – but to balance the squad and give Luton Town a chance of greater successes in the future.







Welcome to Nottingham Forest and a very merry Christmas and a happy New Year to all our supporters this morning. Congratulations are in order for our former player Garry Parker who recently earned his first call-up to the England 'B' team.

It is a strange coincidence today, as we hold one minute's silence and remember our former president Tom Hodgson, that Forest are the opposition. It was one of the proudest moments of Tom's long and unsurpassed association with the club when he led Luton Town out at Wembley for the 1959 F.A. Cup final.

Tom was the stand-in manager at the time and during the course of his career he gained enormous experience of football with Luton Town as a player, captain, director and chairman.

It was always an absorbing experience to meet him and talk about the game as he could draw upon so much from his footballing life at all levels with the club. He was a very interesting man and a great servant to Luton Town.

Tom's death was sadly accompanied by the passing of another great Town supporter, Ken Ball, in mid-December and everyone at the club passes on their sympathies to their families at this time. Ken was for many years the chairman of our Century Club and a well-known

figure at Kenilworth Road and in Luton and Dunstable.

I cannot let this column go by without a word about Roy Wegerle who conducted himself very professionally throughout the transaction of his transfer to Queen's Park Rangers before Christmas. Roy had only come from Chelsea 18 months ago and he had fitted in very well at Kenilworth Road.

I am sure Roy, like nearly all former Town players, will miss the special family atmosphere of our club and will call back and be very welcome. We all send best wishes with him to his new club where I expect he will continue to be a credit to himself.

Finally, a word about Mal Donaghy's testimonal match. This has been provisionally booked for January 15, with Manchester United as the visitors, but, with Ricky Hill's Le Havre also on tour at that time and keen to play, the final arrangements await confirmation.


A tactical alteration in the Town team in the second half saw Danny Wilson replaced by David Preece with the captaincy being transferred to Tim Breacker.



"Today's clash with Forest stirs up old memories especially as it is our first meeting with them since last season's Littlewoods Cup final at Wembley," said Tim Breacker as he looked forward to this morning's Boxing Day meeting here. We all felt very-upset that day, of course, especially as we were the holders.

"During that match, I can remember thinking it all seemed to be going alright for quite a while in the first half. It was like the previous year's final against Arsenal. We had scored first and we felt comfortable.

"But then in the second half it was like a blitz and they just seemed to be running all over us. Sometimes you feel you can fight and hang on but that did not happen and we just seemed to cruble away.

"It took a long time for that to sink in. It is just the same when you win too. I remember the feelings we had the year before and the celebrations. It is different when you lose of course, but it still seems to take a long time to take it all in properly. It is always a case of 'if only' then of course."

Tim will be extra keen to do well today because not only does he want some revenge over Forest for last season's Littlewoods Cup final defeat, but he also wants to enjoy a triumph against his former Kenilworth Road contemporary Garry Parker.

"He has done very well since he left the club, but I remember very well when we were in the same youth and reserve teams together and came through as apprentices. At Forest, he has done well playing in a team which plays good football.

"But Forest have not always had a lot of luck in the league. They are like us. Sometimes, I cannot believe that we have not beaten the teams we have played and, even worse, I cannot understand how our teams from a few years ago struggled as well. It does make you wonder about the allround standards in the game"

Tim said he thought both Forest and Norwich had earned reputations in recent seasons for the quality of their football because of the method of their play as much as for the individual skills of the players. "You look round their teams and they have a lot of good honest professionals who are just working well together in a style that suits them."

Unexpectedly, Tim did not pick our last season's Wembley defeat as his worst memory during his Luton Town career. Instead, he said the toughest defeats to stomach were the two F.A. Cup semi-final losses against Everton and Wimbledon respectively. "The Everton match was the worst of all – and I bet Garry can still remember how bad it felt," he said.

TOM HODGSON

A UNIQUE SERVANT TO LUTON TOWN

A former player, captain, director acting-manager, chairman and president of Luton Town, Tom Hodgson, who died on December 4, will always be remembered as the man who first led a Luton Town team out at Wembley for the 1959 F.A. 

The Football Trust has installed Closed Circuit Television systems at more than 110 British grounds. The cameras have a range of 150 metres and immediate close-up prints can be produced. Within minutes of an incident offenders can be identified and arrested with film made available as evidence in court. CCTV is the most effective anti-hooligan measure inside football grounds and the programme has been extended to include portable systems.

OFF THE RECORD

REVIEW OF THE DECADE

After the traumas of David Pleat's first full season in charge, when the Town were nearly relegated to Division Three, it was obvious that the squad needed further strengthening with an emphasis on midfield and defence.

With this in mind Tony Grealish came from Orient, after one of the first ever transfer tribunal decisions, and Mike Saxby, a towering centre-half arrived from Mansfield Town.

After a slow start, which included a first round League Cup defeat over two legs by Gillingham, the Town suddenly clicked into gear and the 5-0 home win over strongly-fancied Swansea saw the team head the division for the first time since 1971.

The away form during the first half of the season was quite superb with wins at Leicester, Fulham, West Ham, Cambridge, Shrewsbury and the never to be forgotten Boxing Day victory at Watford. Dropped home points proved a problem, however, with the result that the Town were always bobbing around in a promotion place but never taking the division "by the scruff of the neck".

The 80's dawned with away form beginning to match that at Kenilworth Road and when the Town turned round 2-0 down at half-time at QPR in late March we thought our chances had gone. A fighting second-half display, resulting in the Town snatching a point, gave fresh heart and set up a rally over Easter which saw wins over Charlton and Watford before an injury time equaliser by Chelsea at Stamford Bridge caused a further set-back.

The "crunch"-match came on April 19th with the Town needing to win at Brimingham to stand a realistic chance of promotion but try as they might, with the woodwork saving the Blues on at least half-a-dozen occasions, a 1-0 defeat meant Second Division football for another season.

26th December 1979

An injury time header from Kirk Stephens gave the Town a 1-0 win at Watford in the first local derby since 1972. The attendance at Vicarage Road was 20,227.

IT HAPPENED 5 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK ...

26th December 1984

Goals from Ray Daniel and Brian Stein gave the Town their first home victory over Coventry City for 32 years.

The win pushed the Hatters out of the bottom three for the first time in six weeks.

David Moss was the goalscoring hero with 24 goals but the partnership of Bob Hatton and a young Brian Stein weighed in with 26 goals between them.

One remarkable aspect was the settled look of the side due to the absence of any serious injuries. Eleven players made 39 or more appearances!

The Town started off the 1980-81 season with a virtually unchanged side, the only departure of note being Bob Hatton replaced by Yugoslav Raddy Antic.

The opening day saw a 2-1 win at F.A. Cup Winners West Ham followed by a 1-0 home win over arch-rivals Watford. Unfortunately a string of lack-lustre displays and odd-goal defeats meant that by the middle of October the Town were struggling just above the relegation places.

The turning point came when a 10 man team - goalkeeper Jake Findlay being injured - won 3-1 at Cambridge.

The following year, however, it was third time lucky and promotion was won in style with only four defeats, a record 88 points and many wonderful memories.



NOTINGHAM FOREST

• This morning we welcome Nottingham Forest to Kenilworth Road for our first meeting since the Littlewoods Cup final at Wembley last season. Their triumph that day was their third in the competition, having previously won it in 1978 and 1979.

• Forest were also our opponents at Wembley in the 1959 FA Cup final, of course, when they won 2-1. That was their second FA Cup win, their first having been in 1898. They have also won the Football League


championship once - in 1978.

That League title win led to Forest's entry to the European Cup under their present manager Brian Clough and they produced a jackpot return at the first attempt., winning the trophy in 1979 with a goal from Trevor Francis against Malmo of Sweden in Munich.

Remarkably, Forest retained the trophy a year later when they beat Hamburg, including Kevin Keegan, 1-0 in Madrid with a coolly-struck penalty winner from Scottish international winger John Robertson.

Forest's successes under Clough have erned him a widespread reputation as one of the most astute and successful club managers of his generation and he is also the longest-serving boss now operating in the First

- Clough took over at Forest in 1975 and, after more than 14 years in charge, is the seventh manager of the Reds since the war, but not the longest serving. That honour goes to Billy Walker who was in charge of the club from 1939-60.
- Forest's post-war managers have been: Walker, Andy Beattie (1960-63), John Carey (1963-68), Matt Gillies (1969-72), Dave Mackay (1972), Allan Brown (1973-75).
- Forest are one of the oldest clubs in the world. The club was formed in 1865 at a meeting at the Clinton Arms. Known originally as the Forest Football Club, the founders of the club were first drawn together by a game of "Shinney" which is a sort of hockey. In 1865, they switched to football and bought a set of red caps.
- There have been many connections between the two clubs over the years and the recent Forest line-up has regularly included our former midfield player Garry Parker. In the 1970's Barry Butlin also played for both
- Forest's form this season has been on the inconsistent side but they are still in the Littlewoods Cup and aiming to make it to a second successive Wembley final with manager's son Nigel Clough leading the attack.
