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LUTON TOWN ended a run of
22 matches without an away
League victory before the
smallest crowd to watch a First
Division game since the war.
Iain Dowie headed home the
89th minute winner, to give
Jim Ryan his first success as
manager and Luton their first
win for 13 games.
But, while Luton celebrated
climbing above Millwall to
third from bottom in the table,
Wimbledon were left assessing
the viability of top-grade football at Plough Lane.
Only 3,496 supporters turned
up on a wet evening, beating by
530 the previous-lowest crowd,
for Norwich's visit to the same
ground two years ago.
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Those who were there had little to cheer in a first half almost devoid of attacking interest, littered with misplaced passes and misguided

runs.

One run by Wise was indica-tive. Counter-attacking prom-isingly through the middle, he put the pass to his left, behind Gayle and into touch.

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Nogan showed his inexperience on the half hour, when shooting prematurely and wastefully wide. But he atoned for that seven minutes into the second half with his second goal in three senior appearances, although it lacked the alamour of his first, scored in
