'BEAM-BACK' WILL EASE

KEEP ON



• Lars Elstrup rattled in his 15th goal of the season last Saturday at Leeds, keep it up. Lars!

This afternoon we welcome West Ham their followers here today and their many supporters at the Boleyn Ground. who will be watching the match via a closed circuit television relay on a giant diamond screen, to the FA Cup fourth round tie at Kenilworth Road.

I am sure the special atmosphere which is always generated by this tournament will be experienced here in Luton and I hope it can be shared and enjoyed also in East London.

It was as a result of our concern at only being able to accommodate 2,000 West Ham supporters here today that we have worked hand-in-hand with the Hammers in providing the 'beam-back' to Upton Park this afternoon.

It is an idea which has been used successfully by other clubs elsewhere this season and, indeed, our league clash with Chelsea at the end of December was transmitted back to Stamford Bridge in a similar way

We felt it was right on this occasion to work together with West Ham and to share the risk of such a venture this time, particularly bearing in mind their away following. They took 7,000 fans with them to Watford only two weeks ago, for example.

One of the chief reasons for taking this step is, of course, the safety factor here at Kenilworth Road. I am sure it is the right thing to do. The clubs are sharing in the financial risk of the venture which

in both clubs' judgement will eventually prove worthwhile.

West Ham do not only have impressive away support. They also have 10.000 season ticket holders and great support at home matches. Indeed, the 2,000 allocation we supplied them with was sold in less than four hours earlier this week when they went on sale.

For us, it is the first time we have been involved financially in a "beam back'. The Chelsea fixture involved us on December 29, of course, but it was the London club which took all the financial risk that time. We have a quite different sort of relationship with West

On the subject of ticket allocations, it is interesting to note that if we are required to visit West Ham for a replay of this tie, their allocation to us will be very little different from that reserved for them today and that at Leeds, where we played last weekend, the visitors are offered room for only 1,700 followers at all FA Cup and League

These figures show the allocations we make here at Luton are not out of step with those at some other much bigger clubs where the capacity is not such a limiting factor as it is at Kenilworth

INTERNATIONAL BOARD **MANDATORY INSTRUCTION – TULY 1990**

"If, in the opinion of the referee, a player who is moving towards his opponents' goal with an obvious opportunity to score a goal is intentionally and physically impeded by unlawful means, i.e. an offence punishable by a free kick (or a penalty kick), thus denying the attacking player's team the aforesaid goal-scoring opportunity, the offending player shall be sent off the field of play for serious foul play in accordance with Law XII (n)."

Having fully discussed this mandatory instruction issued to all referees and in order to help players, coaches, managers and spectators, the referee agreed that they should consider the following guidelines for any incident likely to come under this heading:

a) decide whether it is a foul or not b) if it is not a foul, play will continue c) if it is a foul - i.e. any physical offence, however minor. punishable by a free-kick or penalty - then consider d) if the unfair, intentional impeding of the attacker denied an obvious goal-scoring opportunity.

Since the promotion of Billy Bonds to first team manager, a re-vitalised West Ham side has climbed the Second Division this season in a spell which has seen them break the club's unbeaten run of 19 league matches. They now head the division with 57 points from 26 games, five clear of nearest rivals Oldham Athletic, and are enjoying crowds not seen at Upton Park since their First Division heydays, writes Luke Nicoli.

Comparisons can already be made with the triumphant Leeds United team of last season-heading the Second Division table for so long, playing good football and, with an abundance of talent. But you can be sure that manager Bonds will have no talk of promotion with only half the season completed.

The Hammers' success this term has been built on the three man central defence of Colin Foster, Republic of Ireland international Chris Hughton and West Ham stalwart Alvin Martin. This partnership, along with the inventiveness and hard working displays of Ian Bishop, plus the goalscoring exploits of Trevor Morley has meant that West Ham have

leaked just 12 league goals and scored a total of 32.

This FA Cup fourth round tie gives the Hammers an incentive to win following their 5-1 defeat at the hands of the Town in the Zenith Data Systems cup last December. They have a good cup pedigree and one's mind goes back to their 4-1 demolition of Liverpool in the League Cup two years ago. Only twice in the last six years have the Hammer's been eliminated from the FA Cup before the fifth round. The memories of their giant-killing act are still fresh in many fans' memories when they won the Cup, as a Second Division side, beating Arsenal 1-0 in the 1980 final.

West Ham's 1980 Cup victory was their third success, after previously winning in 1964 and 1975. They have also won the Division Two Championship in 1958 and 1981 and became European Cup Winners Cup winners in 1965. Mr Bonds, only the club's sixth post-war manager, will be aiming to pust West Ham on a successful Cup run, although Division One status must be their main priority whatever the result today.

OFF THE RECORD

FEATURING A LOOK BACK AT OUR PREVIOUS CUP CLASHES WITH THE HAMMERS

We welcome "The Hammers" to Kenilworth Road this afternoon for only the third time in an F.A. Cup tie but if the game provides a similar result to the previous two clashes then we could be in for a treat, writes club statistician Roger Wash.

The first Cup meeting between the sides took place at Upton Park on 11th January 1936 in a Third Round tie. Luton were sitting pretty at the top of Division Three South at the time not having lost since the end of September while West Ham stood at seventh place in Division Two.

It was reckoned that over 9,000 Luton supporters made the trip to East London swelling the crowd to a near record 42,000. Many supporters travelled by train paying 3/- (15p) return for the privilegel

The match itself was a typical cup-tie with end to end football producing an eventual stalemate at 2-2 with Jack Ball and Fred Roberts scoring for the Town while Dave Mangnall and Jimmy Ruffell netted for the Hammers

The replay took place at Kenilworth Road four days later but despite an afternoon kick-off a healthy (for the time) crowd of 17,527 gathered to watch as the Town immediately took the game to West Ham.

How the "Hammers" goal survived in the first half only keeper Herman Conway would know as wave after wave of relentless pressure bore down on the West Ham rearguard. The break-through eventually came in the 51st minute when Jack Ball scored from a seemingly offside position to open the floodgates.

Winger George Stephenson then took over, laying on goals for Roberts and Wilf Crompton before scoring the fourth himself to send the crowd into a frenzy. Unfortunately, the euphoria soon died down as the Town were knocked out at Manchester City in the next round.

The next meeting took place at Kenilworth Road on 8th January 1949 in another Third Round tie with this time both sides in Division Two. A crowd of 22, 229 saw Charlie Watkins open the scoring just before half-time with Billy Arnison and Tom Kiernan adding further goals just after. Ken wade pulled one back for West Ham with fifteen minutes to got but by then it was too late

This time the Town went a little further along the Wembley trail in beating Walsall 4-0 at Kenilworth Road in the next round before going out to Leicester after two epic games in Round Five.

IT HAPPENED.....

FIVE YEARS AGO (25/1/86) A fairly easy 4-0 victory over Bristol Rovers at Kenilworth Road in a Fourth Round F.A. Cup tie watched by a crowd of 12.463.

TEN YEARS AGO (24/1/81) The Town narrowly went out of the F.A. cup at Newcastle, losing 2-1 but coming extremely close to forcing a replay. A crowd of 29,202 saw Godfrey Ingram score the Luton goal.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO (24/1/76) Boosted by winning their last seven league games the Town travelled to Norwich for an F.A. Cup Fourth Round tie but put in a poor display losing 2-0 to the Division One side before a crowd of 24,328. The many Luton supporters had to endure a blizzard on the way home to boot!!

TWENTY YEARS AGO (23/1/71) With the Town out of the F.A. Cup a friendly game was arranged at Kenilworth Road against First Division Coventry. A crowd of 7, 154 turned out to see Malcolm MacDonald score the solitary Luton goal in a 2-1 defeat.

Our final Cup clash came with yet another Third Round meeting on 15th January 1972 with this time West Ham in Division One while the Town remained in Division Two. The Hammers took an early two goal lead courtesy of Clyde Best and Geoff Hurst, and despite losing Bobby Moore through injury appeared to be cruising to victory.

Don Givens had other ideas however, and scored mid-way through the second half to set up a frantic final during which time Luton goalkeeper Tony Read saved a Hurst penalty and the ball pinged around the West Ham goalmouth rather too often for the liking of the Upton Park faithful who were urging the referee to blow his whistle with fully ten minutes left

West Ham did manage to hold on but after beating Hereford after a replay went out at Huddersfield in Round Five.

Continuing our 'football diary' to keep you up to date with the domestic and global game:

Jan 1: The Town lose 2-0 against Wimbledon in front of just 4,521 fans at Plough Lane.

Sheffield United make it three wins out of four over the Christmas period with a 1-0 victory against OPR.

Liverpool stay top of Division One following a 3-0 over Leeds United.

Jan 2: Ceri Hughes is ruled out for the rest of the season, following a knee operation for the injury sustained against Sheffield United.

Swansea's Tommy Hutchinson retires at the age of 43.

Jan 5: The Town beat Sheffield United 3-1 at Bramall Lane in the FA Cup third round. There are two major cup shocks: Vauxhall League side Woking beat Second Division West Brom 4-2 at The Hawthorns and Oxford United defeat Chelsea 3-1 at Stamford Bridge. Liverpool earn a replay when Blackburn's Mark Atkins scores an own goal in injury time.

Jan 6: Johan Cruyff signs a new contract as coach of Barcelona, worth £1.9 million next season, rising to £2.16 million the following year.

The Town are drawn at home to the winners of the West Ham/ Aldershot tie in the FA Cup fourth round.

Jan 8: Brian Talbot is sacked as manager of West Bromwich Albion. Peter Withe is appointed first team coach at Aston Villa.

Liverpool sign Millwall winger Jimmy Carter for £800,000.

Jan 9: Manchester United's Viv Anderson signs for Sheffield Wednesday on a free transfer. Jim Leighton joins Hull City on loan.

Jan 11: Billy McEwan resigns as manager of Third Division side Rotherham United.

FOCUS ON WEST HAM UNITED

Ludek Miklosko (goalkeeper): Czechoslovakian international, Ludek joined West Ham last season as a replacement for Allen McKnight. A member of the Czech squad in Italia 90.

Tim Breacker (defender): Bicester born, Tim made his debut for Luton in a 3-0 defeat at Ipswich in 1984. He quickly established himself as a first team regular at Kenilworth.Road and can look back on over 200 League appearances for the Town. West Ham signed him for £600,000 earlier this season.

George Parris (defender): An attacking defender, George joined West Ham as an apprentice and made his league debut in a 3-0 defeat v Liverpool in 1985. George has since become a regular in the Hammer's line-up.

Colin Foster (defender): Colin began his career at Leyton Orient where he made over 170 league appearances before signing for Nottingham Forest in 1986. After three full seasons at the City Ground, he signed for West Ham.

Tony Gale (defender): Tony rose through the junior ranks at Fulham, making his league debut v Charlton in 1977. He was an instant success, and later played for the England Under-21s, before moving

to Upton Park in 1984 in a £200,000 deal. **Chris Hughton (defender):** West Ham born, Chris was a regular member of the Spurs side which was so successful during the early eighties. He joined Tottenham as a trainee and made his debut v Man City in 1979. After the signings of Pat Van Den Hauwe, Chris made only occasional appearances for Spurs but has since flourished in the colours of West Ham.

Alvin Martin (defender): Alvin has been with the Hammers since a youth and first appeared in their league eleven during 1977/78. A former England youth international, he later played for England B and the Under 21 side. He has played for the full side on 17 occasions.

Ian Bishop (midfield): Club captain, Ian has emerged as one of West Ham's outstanding players so far this season. He turned professional with Everton and first played league soccer on loan to Crewe in 1984. His career took off at Bournemouth after a spell at Carlisle. Man City signed Ian for £750,000 in 1988, but after only a season at Maine Road he signed for West Ham.

Stewart Robson (midfield): Stewart rose through the ranks with Arsenal, making his league debut in 1981-against West Ham. In his early days he played at both full back and in midfield. He was capped on six occasions by the England Under 21's before signing for West Ham in a £700,000 deal in 1987.

Kevin Keen (midfield): Kevin made his league debut in 1986 v Liverpool, quickly impressing as an attacking midfield player. He became a first team regular the following season.

Steve Potts (midfield/defender): Steve progressed via the junior teams at Upton Park before making his debut in a 3-1 defeat against QPR in 1985. A fringe player for much of his career at West Ham, Steve has recently been drafted into the side in midfield.

Stuart Slater (forward): A first team regular in the West Ham side this season, Stuart made his league debut in 1987, as an eighteen year old in the Hammer's 1-1 draw at Derby County.

Trevor Morley (forward): Trevor began his career at Corby Town, then became a reserve team player at Derby County before returning to the non-league scene with Nuneaton. He finally made his league debut in the colours of Northampton in 1985, becoming a prolific scorer for the Cobblers, before signing for Man City in 1987. Trevor signed for the Hammer's for £750,000 in 1989.

Jimmy Quinn (forward): Much travelled, Jimmy made his league debut for Swindon Town in 1982 and has since played for Blackburn Rovers, Leicester, Bradford and a second spell at Swindon.
