Greater fear of failure

"This season the First Division will have three down and three up, so three of the 22 who have voted for the change will be out."


He anticipates that the Premier League will settle down at 22 teams, and the Town's vote will be against any suggestion that qualification should be only about ground size, club finances or stadium

"It should be down to what happens in 90 minutes on Saturday afternoons," he said.

Mr. Pleat believes the prospect — some think the threat — of the Premier League will colour a lot of the thinking by First Division managers this season.

"There will be a greater fear of failure this time," he said. "About half the First Division clubs will be
