

♦ We are now on the countdown to the annual transfer deadline.

Twelve days to go, and who knows what will happen as clubs try to improve their chances of winning something or of avoiding relegation?

What I am sure of is that by the time the market re-opens for serious business in the summer, there will be a different outlook.

We are coming to the point where the Taylor Report starts to bite. Clubs have two years in which to implement the all-seater requirement and it should be obvious that only a handful will be able to put money into new stands AND new players.

This must make an impact somewhere on transfer fees. Perhaps not so much at the top end because already there are very few clubs who can go in for the best players. Only these clubs will be able to compete if someone becomes available for, say, three or four million pounds.

But I would envisage changes in other areas. It's quite likely that prices will fall in the middle market.

Personally I wouldn't be surprised if the £500,000 fees of the last year dropped by half. I can also see exchange deals coming more into fashion.

Straight swaps would seem to be an ideal solution for clubs who have little or no money available. Managers can't afford to stand still and sometimes you can benefit by sacrificing one player in order to get another who will improve the balance of your squad.

Players who can fill a couple of positions are particularly valuable now that most clubs run with a first-team pool of 20, or fewer in some cases.

Here at Everton, we are no different in this respect. You only have to walk around the corridors in the Main Stand to see how things have altered. Team photographs from every year are displayed on the walls and if you look at those from the 1960s and earlier, you can count 40-odd professionals.

Clubs cannot afford to carry anywhere near that number of players nowadays. The difference probably shows up

most in the make-up of reserve teams. At one time, they would be filled entirely by senior players but now they are often based on young pros and YTS lads.

◆ Last week's home game with Oldham Athletic was every bit as competitive as we anticipated. As Joe Royle said beforehand, there was no need to motivate himself or his side for a visit to Goodison Park.

That was done for him, first because he was returning to his old club, and also because four of his players were ex-Evertonians. They all wanted to go out and do their best on a stage they know so well.

It's a natural reaction to try and do that little bit better, especially for someone like Graeme Sharp. He was well received by the crowd and no-one would have expected anything less for player who served this club so well for so many years.

The game began well for us with the early goal. Mark Ward put in a good cross and Mo Johnston's run to the near post left the hole for Peter Beardsley. His finish was probably better than it looked from the sidelines.

Oldham pressured us after that and made it difficult for us to play flowing football, although we still created one or two chances. Johnston missed one, but when people said he wasted another, I felt that was a situation where credit was due to lan Marshall for a good challenge at a crucial moment.

The main threat from Oldham tended to come from their winger, Rick Holden. He's one of those players with the rare knack of getting in good crosses without having to go round the full back to create a better angle.

Sure enough, it was his free kick that produced an equaliser - a disappointing goal, given how well we have been defending in recent weeks. Possibly we were concentrating on the big men - Jobson, Sharp and Marshall - and this allowed Craig Fleming to go in virtually unchallenged.

When Martin Keown went off with a thigh strain, Gary Ablett showed his versatility by moving into the middle for the second time since he joined us in January. As we already had Andy Hinchcliffe on the field, there was no real

disruption when he went to left back and Peter Beagrie slotted in on the left wing.

The winning goal from Beardsley was a good example of what can be achieved by taking on people in the penalty area.

Mike Milligan held back, no doubt thinking that he might bring him down if he made a challenge, and then Peter slipped the ball through the defender's legs and into the far corner.By all accounts, he did that deliberately, and when you are talking someone of his quality, you tend to believe that.


◆ Finally, I'd like to put the record straight on all the reports you may have read about my being ready to go back to Spain.

◆ Matthew Jackson can reflect this afternoon on the first 150 days since the Luton Town manager, David Pleat, took him on one side and broke the news that terms had been agreed for his transfer to Everton.

The teenage defender - he's just coming up to his 20th birthday - headed north later that day and quickly agreed terms for a move that has already trebled his First Division experience.

Today he welcomes his old club to Goodison Park, although it's not the first meeting since he left the Hatters. In November. he returned to Kenilworth Road and played in a 1-0 win for Everton but, ironically, wearing a Luton shirt. That was the day we had to borrow their change strip because of unexpected clash

He is grateful to Luton for all that they did for his football education and, in particular, he lists the benefit of starting with a club which offers early opportunities for young players.

"I think everybody knows they have had to sell to survive." he says. "Fortunately, they have continued the good youth policy and they have a lot of good youngsters coming through.

"They always try and pass the ball around and play attractive football. That's coached into the youngsters from the time they go into the School of Excellence.

"At a smaller club like Luton, there are a lot of young players in the reserves so you tend to grow up quickly, football-wise, with outings in senior football, even if it is only in the reserves."

By the time Matthew got into the first team early this season, Luton were back on grass after several years with an artificial

"That was a big help," he says. "There were times when Luton would crucify teams, especially in the early years. No side liked coming to play on the plastic.


Matthew was only just getting to know David Pleat when the transfer to Everton came along. "The manager joined in the summer and I left about three months later," he explained.

"He told me that the Board had decided Everton's offer was acceptable - and that was fair enough.

"He did say that I could come up here and turn everything down, but obviously for me, being ambitious, there was no way I could do that.

◆ Today, the Luton supporters will be joined on the motorway by the Jackson family - father, mother and brother who are now committed to following the Blues. They travel to every game, and it's often easier for them when we are away because so many fixtures are in the South or the Midlands.

Matthew expects nothing less than a very hard game. "Luton have been struggling away from home," he says, "but in their position, they'll be coming up here to battle for a result."



PRIDE OF THE NATION

◆ These are good times for English sports followers. A World Cup Final and a back-to-back Grand Slam double for the rugby team. At the very least, we dare to anticipate a World Cup Final for our cricketers.

For the likes of Graham Gooch and Ian Botham, an appearance at the Melbourne Cricket Ground in 11 days' time would be fulfilment of a cause for two outstanding players who, in darker days, appeared to be carrying their side single-handed.

Only a legend - and that is one of Botham's nicknames - could have prepared for what he would call a spot of Aussie-bashing by playing a panto king in Bournemouth and appearing for half the winter as a team captain in BBC's Question of Sport.

There were those who muttered about favouritism when the selectors gave the 36-year-old veteran dispensation to stay with Jack and the Beanstalk while his team-mates began their tour in New Zealand. Others even questioned his selection ahead of younger candidates.

Who was right, who was wrong? The answer was surely written into the scorebook in Sydney last week: four wickets in seven balls and then a half-century with the bat. Goodnight, Australia, "Beefy" is back!

With only half of the qualifying round-robin completed, England were virtually assured of a semi-final place, and travel agents opened their doors the next morning to deal with latecomers asking about package holidays to Australia for the last fortnight of the

Not guite a tale of all roads leading to Heathrow but there were supporters flying off this week with tickets for only two England games - the semi-final and final. When was such confidence last placed in a team from these shores?

◆ Perhaps the rugby team would command such a following if only they could be given a re-run with Australia after their narrow defeat in the World Cup Final. For now, Will Carling's boys can claim to be the best in the northern hemisphere and an exceptionally successful side by any yardstick.

For those of us geared to soccer achievements, a parallel was drawn by Donald Saunders in The Daily Telegraph on Monday. He wrote: "Two consecutive Five Nations Grand Slams are a sporting rarity to be cherished, rather like soccer's League Championship-FA Cup double. Indeed, only two successive Grand Slams have been achieved this century, compared with three soccer doubles in that time.

"That is a measure of the difficulty of the task completed by England at Twickenham on Saturday. It provides a more than adequate response to complaints that Will Carling and his men are lucky to have come together when the other four nations are offering feeble opposition - a contention that, in any case, is likely to receive short shrift in Scotland.

"Perhaps one could argue that England looked, at least on Saturday, more like the efficient 1971 team that earned Arsenal the double than the exciting 'Super Spurs' of 10 years earlier or the smoothly skilled Liverpool of 1986.

"Even so, they deserve the highest praise for helping to re-establish international rugby as a 15-man game, requiring nimble thought, sharp eyes, safe hands, speed, agility and courage as well as power, tenacity, stamina and accurate kicking."

If England possess all these qualities, indeed they must be a team of rare ability. It is often said that the English have a peculiar habit of putting down our achievements. As Mr Saunders is a Welshman, he cannot be accused of that, but in the later stages of his article, there is a hint that he may lean towards the doubters' camp.

To pigeon-hole teams according to popular opinion is sometimes to overlook that you can only be the best at a particular time - and times do change. When Arsenal won the double, they scored more goals than all but one First Division team and, likewise, their defensive record was bettered by only one side.

The impression that they were a functional team is probably linked with their goals breakdown of 71 "for" and 29 "against", as compared with Spurs' figures of 115-55 a decade earlier. The danger of this argument is that statisitics are taken out of context. Two other clubs scored 100 goals in Spurs' golden year. Thus the type of football played by all sides must have very different to that when Arsenal took both trophies.

The only indisputable claim is that BOTH were outstanding in a given season. That's what England's rugby team are, and what we all hope the cricketers will be very shortly.

LEAP YEAR LIFT FOR THE BLUES...

It was the first time we had won a game on a Saturday dated 29th February, though maybe we should point out that because of the quirks of Leap Years in the calendar, it was only our fourth attempt!

In 1896, we lost 4-0 at Sheffield Wednesday in the FA Cup; in 1908 we were beaten 5-2 at Noittingham Forest; in 1936 we drew 2-2 at home to Manchester City. Torry Gillick scoring both goals.






RING REQUEST

FORM GUIDE

◆ Luton Town left Goodison Park last May knowing that for the second year in a row they had to win their last game in the First Division survival stakes.

Beaten by a goal from Tony Cottee, they set for off home watching the TV on the team coach as their closest rivals, Sunderland, drew level on 34 points - and goal-difference - with a 0-0 draw in a teatime game with champions-elect Arsenal.

In a sudden-death situation a week later, the Hatters beat Derby County, Sunderland lost at Manchester City, and so First Division football was retained at Kenilworth Road for a 10th consecutive season.

The present campaign has been equally difficult, mainly because they have still not won an away game since in the 44 weeks since that last visit to Goodison. In fact, the barren run stretches to 21 games in a year since their last victory, at Aston Villa on 9th March 1990.

In that time there were five draws, 16 defeats and 54 goals conceded, but be warned . . . these statistics hardly represent a fair reflection of muchimproved travelling performances in recent times.

Hatters fans must have been close to despair when a potential eight points were lost in the space of 17 minutes' football after their side had been in front in the first three games of the New Year.

Nottingham Forest equalised in injury-time, Liverpool scored twice in the last five minutes and then Sheffield Wenesday overturned a 2-1 deficit with two goals in the last 11 minutes. Even a 4-0 defeat at Manchester City was widely regarded as an injustice, with most newspapers naming City 'keeper Tony Coton as man of the match.

Luton then took a point at Crystal Palace and gave a good account of themselves at Elland Road before Leeds scored twice in the last half-an-hour.

Leading up to Christmas, the
Bedfordshire club went 14 games without
a win in all competitions, but the position
eased considerably after they had
introduced the experience of Leeds
midfielder Chris Kamara and Forest
goalkeeper Steve Sutton.

In three months on loan, Sutton conceded only 18 goals in 14 League games and Luton pulled themselves off the bottom of the table thanks to a

... Continued from overleaf good run at Kenilworth Road. They won five home games out of seven, beginning with clean sheets against Coventry City, Arsenal and Chelsea in a nine-day period.

They climbed another place last Saturday with a 1-1 draw against Crystal Palace, but only three points covered the bottom four prior to another home game against Tottenham in mid-week.

TRANSFERS

♦ With home attendances averaging below 10,000, it has been necessary to top up the turnstile income with the sale of leading players.

Since last season, Luton raised more than £2m in this way (See Diary Highlights) and released around £1m for team-building. A third of the available resources was used to bring Mick Harford back to the club in a £325,000 deal with Derby County.

The 33-year-old striker enjoyed some of his most successful times in a previous spell at Kenilworth Road. He won a Littlewoods Cup medal in 1988 - and now he is re-united with Brian Stein, a two-goal matchwinner on that Wembley occasion against Arsenal.

South African-born Stein left Luton at the end of that season to try his luck in French football. He was with Caen and Annecy for three years before returning last summer.

Unfortunately, Luton have only seen a glimpse of the potential of striker Philip Gray. A £275,000 signing from Spurs in the summer, the Ulsterman scored six goals in 13 outings but picked up a knee injury which eventually required surgery.

Skipper Trevor Peake had an eventful start to this season. One week, he helped Coventry to a 5-0 win against Luton, and the next, he made his debut for the Hatters after a £100,000 transfer.

Another early-season newcomer was at the club for a matter of weeks. Steve Thompson arrived from Bolton for

◆ MAL DONAGHY, npw with Manchester United, is the most capped player in Luton's history. He made 58 of his 74 appearances for Northern Ireland in 12 years with the Hatters.

£180,000 and then joined Leicester in exchange for two young players - full back Des Linton and forward Scott Oakes.

Midfielder Chris Kamara is lapping up his first extended run in the First Division at the age of 34. After making more than 500 appearances in the lower sections, he had a taste of the top level with Leeds before leaving Yorkshire for £150,000 in November.

INTERNATIONALS

◆ Mark Pembridge inflicted the Republic of Ireland's first home defeat in six years - thanks to a helping boot from Neville Southall!

Playing in only his second international for Wales, the 21-year-old midfielder latched on to a long clearance from the Everton 'keeper and fired home the winning goal in Dublin last month.

Pembridge was selected for the Welsh 'B' side last season after only four First Division appearances, but that quickfire promotion to international football was beaten by a clubmate. Darren Salton, 20 next week, had still to start a League game at the time he made his Scottish Under-21 debut against Denmark in February.

Another Luton youngster, Paul Telfer, was also named in the Scottish squad, but unfortunately, the call came when he was struggling to shake off a foot injury which interrupted a 20-match run in the club side.

Pembridge is the only current full international on the Hatters' books. Mick Harford (two caps in 1988) and Brian

Stein, who made one appearance in France in 1984, represented England in their first spells at Kenilworth Road.

MANAGEMENT

◆ After a five-year break with Tottenham and Leicester, David Pleat resumed the job he first took on when Luton were in the Second Division.

He described it as "like calling or a mission in life" after re-signing for the club which he took to promotion and then into the top half of the First Division in his first spell as manager.

Moving on to Tottenham in 1986, he guided Spurs to the FA Cup Final and a Littlewoods Cup semi-final in his one full season at White Hart Lane. They were fourth in the League when he left in October 1987. Two months later, he returned to his native East Midlands as manager of Leicester City. A three-year term at Filbert Street ended last January.

In June, he was back at Kenilworth Road as successor to Jim Ryan, who was one of three managers Mr Pleat's time away from the club. John Moore led the Hatters to a best-ever seventh place and Ray Harford's side won the Littlewoods Cup on one of three visits to Wembley.

Mr Pleat began his playing career with his hometown club, Nottingham Forest, and then spent three years with Luton before going on to Shrewsbury, Exeter and Peterborough. After going into management with non-League Nuneaton Borough, he arrived at Luton as a member of Harry Haslam's coaching staff. He became manager for the first time in January 1978.

RECORD SPOT

◆ JOE PAYNE netted 10 goals against Bristol Rovers in April 1936 but that wasn't his best scoring season. In the following year, he hit 55 - more than half of a club record total of 103 goals in Division Three (South).



BRIAN HARRIS

♦ In a long career at Goodison Park Brian Harris won League championship and FA Cup medals, yet but for a typing error might well have been playing for his first love -

Liverpool.

He was born in Port Sunlight and was playing for his home-town club in the West Cheshire League as a 15-year-old when he was spotted by an Anfield scout and invited to Melwood for training.

"That was a great day for me," Brian told us. "I was Liverpool daft and remember crying when they were beaten by Arsenal in the 1950 FA Cup Final. I can still reel off the Reds' team that played at Wembley.

"I trained at Melwood a couple of nights a week then after about a fortnight received a letter asking me to report one Saturday afternoon at 3.30 to play in a match.

"I told my father, who had played Rugby League for Warrington, that I wouldn't go, explaining that it was clear Liverpool wanted me to play the second half only.

"So I turned out for Port Sunlight instead and that day an Everton scout saw me and asked if I would be interested in a trial.

"Everton were playing a friendly at Chester on the Monday, I played on the wing and scored two in a 5-1 win. The following day I signed for Everton and that was the first time I had ever been to Goodison Park."

Now comes the sting in the bizarre start to Brian Harris' career as a professional footballer.

He revealed, "I found out some time later that Liverpool had wanted me for the whole of their trial match and that due to a typing mistake I was to have reported to Melwood at 2.30 and not 3.30."

Despite his Liverpool leanings Brian settled down quickly and recalls, "People like Cyril Lello, Peter Farrell, Tommy Eglingtpn and Dave Hickson made me feel at home at Goodison.

"Dave, who came from near me at Ellesmere Port, was a tremendously popular player on the pitch and a terrific bloke off it. He eventually played for Liverpool but was always an Evertonian at heart.

"And I never thought that one day an Everton captain - Brian Labone - would be best man at my wedding."

The young Harris was still a teenager when he made his debut in August 1955 on the same day as his namesake Jimmy. An added coincidence was that they both came from "over the water" with the result that many people thought, wrongly, they were related.

Yet their friendship remains to this day with their love of golf being a factor. Both are single figure players - Brian has been as low as 2 - and only recently he travelled from his Chepstow home to play with Jimmy on the Wirral.

Brian went on to play 358 League and Cup games for the club, establishing himself as a left-half many thought good enough to play for England.

Among them was Ray Wilson, the World Cup-winning left back who played behind Brian, and he said, "I often felt he was unlucky not to be capped by his country."

And Brian Labone says, "Brian was a much under-rated player although his team mates appreciated the terrific job he could do in any position."

Before settling down in the no. 6 shirt Brian played in every position except centre-half and centre-forward. He reminded us, "I even played in goal for part of a match when somebody was hurt at Blackburn."

His conversion from winger also came about through injury. Said Brian, "We were playing in a reserve match with Jimmy Tansey at left-back, John Bramwell at left-half and me at outside-left. When Jimmy had to go off we all dropped back a position and suddenly I was a left-half."

Having to do two years National

Service interrupted Brian's career although he managed a few games in the reserves when he was on leave.

In 1963 he collected a League championship medal and three years later was in the side that lifted the FA Cup. "That was a brilliant day," he says. "Even better than winning the League because I only played about half the matches that season as Everton had signed Tony Kay from Sheffield Wednesday."

◆ Shortly after the Wembley triumph Brian moved to Cardiff City where he became captain and led them to the semi-finals of the European Cup-winners Cup.

They were beaten 4-3 on aggregate by Hamburg and one of Brian's colleagues was a certain John Toshack who went on to enjoy a great career with Liverpool.

"Tosh was always destined to do something in the game," says Brian, "as he was an intelligent chap on and off the pitch.

"He used his strengths to form a great partnership with Kevin Keegan. Then when he went to manage in Portugal he learned their language and did it all again in Spain. He deserves everything he has got."


After leaving Cardiff Brian spent three years at nearby Newport where he became player-manager before hanging up his boots at the age of 40 having notched up a career record of 544 League appearances.


He ran a pub in Chepstow for four years before returning to Cardiff's coaching staff for a short spell before going into his current partnership with an insurance brokers.

Yet Brian still keeps in touch with Merseyside, where he has family, and still follows Everton.

"I attended a Graeme Sharp testimonial dinner at Southport not so long back," he says, "and all the 1966 Cup-winning team were there bar Mike Trebilcock who lives in Australia.

"I really enjoyed that because it brought back a lot of memories."





"Smashing bloke that Howard Kendall, smashing bloke." My mum was speaking after Howard had given me a lift from Bellefield to my home in Kirkby (which was out of his way) after having treatment for our respective injuries, one wet and miserable Sunday morning.

It was 1971. He was at his peak as a player in the Everton Championship-winning team and I was an apprentice who had been given the dreaded news a few days earlier, by Harry Catterick, that I hadn't made it to the full professional ranks.

Huddled in the corner of the training ground car park that Sunday morning, waiting for Norman Borrowdale, the club physio, to arrive, I watched as Howard's blue Jaguar turned up. The driver's window was wound down and an invitation to jump in out of the weather accepted gratefully. The next 10 minutes were about to have an influence on the rest of my life.

Howard had asked what I was going to do at the end of the season when my contract expired. Thanks to Everton's policy of allowing apprentices to attend day-release college, I had secured enough exam passes to gain an interview at Teacher Training College.

"Right," said Howard, "Monday morning after training, I'll fix you-up with a chat to Dai Davies. He's a qualified teacher so he'll be able to give you some advice about college interviews."

He did and with Dai's help, I got to college and I'm a deputy head in the Midlands now. That kind of personal touch has been the hallmark of Howard's career both as a player and as a manager, bringing with it the success it deserves. If we Evertonians are patient, the success and the trophies will return to Goodison because Howard Kendall is a great manager and, as my mum said, "He's a smashing bloke."

BUILDING FROM THE BACK







◆ The back four in Howard Kendall's first match as manager in August 1981 lined up as follows: Billy Wright, Mike Walsh, Mike Lyons and John

Four years later Everton were crowned League Champions with this back line: Gary Stevens, Derek Mountfield, Kevin Ratcliffe and Pat Van den Hauwe.

Of course the re-building covered more than the defence. A whole new side was assembled in that time and the title was won by a blend of quality from Neville Southall to Graeme Sharp.

Yet it is true that most of the top managers have made the defence the foundation for ultimate success. When Brian Clough bought Peter Shilton in 1977, he said the goalkeeper's saves would match the points value of goals from his strikers. Nottingham Forest duly won the Championship in their first season back in the First Division.

In many ways, this formula was repeated at Everton - though not guite so guickly - when Southall came out of the Third Division and developed into a worldclass goalkeeper behind a completely new back four.

The thinking is simplicity itself: if you don't concede a goal, you win a point; if you score once, you take all three.

Today Evertonians are looking for signs that history will repeat itself in Mr Kendall's second term of office. Again, priority has been given to the defence.

In his first match in November 1990, the re-appointed manager fielded this back four: Raymond Atteveld, Dave Watson, Kevin Ratcliffe and Martin Keown.

Watson and Keown remain but now they are partners in the middle, with the newcomers, Matthew Jackson and Gary Ablett, filling the full back positions.

In their first seven matches together i.e. from the signing of Ablett in January only four goals were conceded, and two of these came from unfortunate deflections. So far, so good.

One man who witnessed the development of the 1985 side can now see similarities in the present-day set-up. And Alan Harper has no doubts that Mr Kendall is on the right lines, even though the changes - as they did in the early 1980s - may have lessened his own chances of a first-team place.


