Saints dash Pleat hopes

LUTON'S dispirited manager David Pleat admitted last night: "We only have seven matches left and it's going to be tough now for us to avoid relegation."

Six players were booked - not an unusual occurrence at a match involving Southampton — but five of them were from Luton as two struggling sides at the foot of the table slugged out a grim battle for survival.

Southampton manager Ian Branfoot sprang a major surprise before the kick-off by leaving out England squad player Matthew Le Tissier, sent off at Norwich in an FA Cup quarter-final replay last week.

"He was fit and available," said Branfoot. "I took a gamble by leaving him out and it

paid off."

Luton, without an away victory for more than a year, made a dream start with a goal after 43 seconds when Mark Pembridge bent a freekick past the bewildered Tim Flowers from 25 yards.

James broke his cheekbone. Luton moved Chris Kamara to replace him. And after the reshuffle Southampton steam-rollered Pleat's frail midfield into submission.

Saints did not even win a corner until the 68th minute but when substitute Lee Powell took it, England's Alan Shearer rose above Luton's on-loan goalkeeper Mervyn Day — who said he had been fouled — to head his 19th goal of the season.

Then, with Luton in disarray, the Hatters' former striker Iain Dowie stroked home an 81st-minute winner with Luton protesting this time that Shearer was offside.
