

elcome to all supporters of both clubs for today's game. No-one at Luton can underestimate the significance of trying to gain a win today. It was with great disappointment that we were unable to bring home anything from Southampton. It seems remarkable, like some perverse agony, that we have continually lost leads away from home. Usually the disappointment has been accompanied by some controversy. Mervyn Day, who has joined us from Leeds, had been required very little prior to Southampton's first goal which resulted from a free-kick given against him for carrying the ball outside the box. The Dowie goal appeared to be the result of a dangerous kick by the highly rated Shearer. Whatever the outcome. we have to accept our away form has been too poor to support points gathered at home. With three remaining away games, that elusive victory must be gained or else, sadly, we will miss the traumatic initial season of the Premier League.

To maximise the advantages, if any, and fully organise the new league takes considerable time and much thought. We are not just talking about next season, but the future of football. There will be no going back. What we do have is what experience suspected, but what was hidden by a smokescreen, that of being advantageous to the England team. A 16-team league team does not guarantee national team success. The root of the ambition for the new league was all tied up in how much could be attracted in a television deal. We

now have three television companies vying for the privilege. The economic escalation in the search for success has left many clubs in dire financial straits. I am not talking about the clubs at the base of the pyramid. Make no mistake, the Doncasters, Northamptons, Gillinghams and, so sadly, Aldershots, were basically good book-keepers, but were caught by the fact that football at that level is no longer well-supported through the gate. It is at the top end where clubs have failed to meet their expenses and salaries with income from other sources. The players have been well looked after at the top level. This has encouraged the major clubs to panic and push forward the Premier League plan. We are now poised to see a confrontation between the players and the clubs.

I have never understood why the hierarchy of football administration in this country have not invited the responsible people in football to work alongside them. Of course, the PFA should be represented on the steering committee for the Premier League, but so should the secretaries and the managers - the people who have day-to-day handling of the working of professional clubs. I hope for football's sake that the result is not confrontation and we shall see some sense

So much has happened at our club since my last notes. The transfer deadline has been and gone and Andy Petterson is now spending a month at Ipswich Town and we are delighted to welcome Imre Varadi, from Leeds United, who will

give me an extra option in the final seven games. Darron McDonough has been sold to Newcastle United and we wish him well. We have now trimmed our staff into a position where I can now see the wood from the trees for season 1992-93.

The AGM has been and gone and nothing has changed, but we have all been made aware of the difficult economic situation. Mark Pembridge had an opportunity to leave the club to join ambitious Derby County in the Second Division. The money would have kept the wolves from the door, but Mark made a disciplined decision. When all this speculation and discussion is attached to the club both publicly and privately, it is more important than ever that we are seen to keep our heads, and keep battling away to ensure our survival.

On the field, we know that four wins and two draws should get us out of our dilemma. It is a tough task. But every player will be fighting for his pride and to maintain his status for next season. We are now a very young club except for the five stalwarts - Brian Stein, David Preece and the three transfer signings Mick Harford, Chris Kamara and Trevor Peake. I am in a good position to begin next season with young talent. Two of these players have been on an end of season break to Tenerife with the group that has taken the strain in the last few weeks. Scott Oakes is making good progress after his cartilage operation and I am hopeful that he will be available again from the week beginning April 18 when we face a fixture pile-up of four games in seven days. That is also the target for Philip Gray. It is a sad fact of life

that the player we signed from Tottenham to support Michael Harford has not been fit to take his position. Should he return for the 18th, there will still be five games to restore pride. Could there be a fairy tale ending?

Meanwhile, to all the good supporters who back our club through thick and thin, I thank you for your encouragement for the team. Never have our needs been so great. Hopefully we will respond to it. Enjoy the game.

Comment

I have been asked by many supporters to explain the current financial position at our football club. Our accounts for the year ending 31st May, 1992, show a trading deficit of almost £1.6 million. This compares with a similar figure last year and a figure of £1.25 million in 1989.

The trading loss arises because income at the turnstiles is insufficient to cover running costs at the club.

It is obvious that a business which loses approximately £1.6 million each year cannot carry on in this manner. Historically, the club has always made up this amount with compensation received for by-pass improvements, the sale of the stadium or, more commonly, the transfer of players.

There are many factors to take into account when running a football club and most of these are emotional. We are a business, however, like any other, and we

. In my short time at the club, I have had to make decisions on a business footing which to many people seem at odds with what is logical. Since its establishment in 1885, this club has been in all the divisions and has had many ups, but more downs. It is more important, in these times of hardship and recession, that the club survives and it is my job to ensure this.

I have told many people we are in a downward spiral by selling players, which effects results, which reduces gates, which effects the financial situation, which, in turn results in selling more players etc.

This downward spiral can only be resolved in one of two ways. Either 'Mr Big' arrives, as happened at Blackburn Rovers, and is prepared to pump limitless amounts of cash into the club or we are able to relocate to a new stadium which, because of the way it is developed, could produce the money to invest in players.

It is important, in these times, that we all pull together as one club even though the actions of the board may not seem, on the face of it, logical. Accept, please, that all decisions taken are for the long-term benefit of our club.



Boundary Park is directly next to the Royal Oldham Hospital. The club scheme


- 1. A secure car park fence around its perimeter which can hold 200 cars/minibuses.

ood afternoon and welcome to Wimbledon for a fixture which, thankfully, has not been subject to rearranged dates or the possibility of industrial action – both of which have commanded much attention in my office

The threat of a strike by members of the Professional Footballers Association (PFA) has been widely reported in the media in the last few weeks and, of course, has direct implications at our club. The intricacies of our fixture list may not have received quite the same public attention, but have been, I can assure you, just as difficult to resolve.

At the time of writing, the position in regard to the PFA's threatened industrial action looked closer to being resolved and I certainly hope sense has prevailed before the result of the players' ballot is announced.

In my own view, there is no doubt that any form of strike action should, if possible, be avoided. But, having said that, I can understand why the players, through their union, expressed so much concern over the transfer of their pensions from the

Fixture problems solved by couble date with Forest

Football League to the Premier League and the satisfactory conclusion to negotiations relating to their percentage of the new league's television contract.

Hopefully, both matters will have been completely resolved this week following last Thursday's meeting between the Chief Executive of the Premier League and the PFA's Gordon Taylor. It already looked as if the problem over the pensions had been sorted out earlier in the week.

Whatever the outcome, however, I am certain that both sides are anxious to settle this dispute without any serious or damaging disruption to the game and I am equally sure that the players would never consider any kind of irresponsible strike action which might affect crowd safety or security at matches.

Having said all that, you would think it much easier to resolve the problems of re-arranging our outstanding Barclays Football League fixture against Nottingham Forest... without the need for an in-depth study of calculators and calendars.



It has been that difficult, however, and after talks with Forest and the Football League – who are anxious to play all matches affecting the championship and relegation issues before the end of the season – the fixture has now been

scheduled for April 22... or April 14.

The difficulties, which I can recall us enjoying in the past, have been caused by Forest's success in cup competitions this season and the fixture congestion this has caused. It was, of course, Forest's success in reaching and winning the Zenith Data Systems Cup final against Southampton last weekend which resulted on our fixture against them being postponed in the first place.

With so many forthcoming midweek dates already allocated for international or European games, it has been difficult for Forest to fit in their outstanding games and Wednesday, April 22, was only decided upon after careful consideration.

This date, however, is subject to change if Liverpool draw with Portsmouth in their FA Cup semi-final tie on Sunday, April 5 and require the midweek date on Monday April 13 for their replay. This would, in turn, force them to postpone again their re-arranged league meeting with Forest which has been arranged for that week.

In that case, Forest would then have a blank date in their programme for that midweek and have agreed with us to provisionally reschedule our meeting with them for April 14, two days after their Rumbelows League Cup final meeting with Manchester United at Wembley. This could, curiously, mean we meet both of the Rumbelows finalists here within a week of the final!

Finally, congratulations again to Mark Pembridge for scoring the fastest goal of the week for the second time this season when we played Southampton at The Dell. Mark is to be presented with a magnum of champagne this afternoon by Trevor Askew, manager of the Barclays Business Centre in Luton. Two more first minute goals today, please, Mark....

They come to Kenilworth Road still in need of a couple of wins to stay clear of the relegation dogfight, and with a powerful forward line containing John Fashanu and Andy Clarke, I'm sure John Dreyer and myself will have our work cut out.

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome Imre Varadi to the club. Imre, who joined us on loan from Leeds United, is an experienced campaigner and could provide us with that extra firepower we need in attack. His experience will no doubt help the younger players at the club, and with Brian Stein, Jamie Campbell and a nearly fit Phil Gray all pushing for places, it gives us plenty of options for a partner for Mick Harford.

It was great to see so many of you at Southampton two weeks ago. Cheering the lads on sure gives you a lift away from home, especially when the home crowd are kept quiet. We need your vocal support more than ever now, so keep cheering and enjoy the game!



An all-seater opponent

There is a rumour that the Kenilworth Road terrace is going to be all-seater next season; one year earlier than required.

This would be a bad move. There is still time for a reprieve on the ludicrous all-seater law if all the revelant bodies pull together.

It would not do to alienate Luton Town supporters any earlier than those of other clubs. This goes for any proposed price increase too, although I am glad to see that the club has not opted for an unworkable 'bond scheme' though

I am afraid that in losing the ardent standing supporter, you lose the majority of a club's away support as well (apologies to fans who sit and travel). This has been illustrated in the current season by Everton F.C. who went all-seater for home fans and most away fans at the start of this campaign. Their average home gate is ten thousand down on previous years, there is little atmosphere and the travelling support is pitiful.

I have heard a lot of chairmen making the 'we've got no choice' excuse lately, where all-seaters are concerned. I find the lack of fight and vision hard to take. What the chairmen should be doing is collecting themselves and their opinions, and telling the Football Licensing Authority that the 92 league clubs WILL NOT go all-seater

The government could not and would not refuse to license the stadiums (and hence destroy football) because of the loss of pools and other betting revenue. Also, there would be thousands of bored and frustrated people on the streets and in pubs on a Saturday afternoon, which the authorities just could not cope with.

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





Under former Town coach Ray Harford, and residing as tenants at Selhurst Park, they started the season sprightly enough. Despite crowds barely reaching 4,000 on occasions, the Dons won four of their opening six league matches – including a 3-0 victory against the Town – and found themselves in the relative comfort of midway in the First Division. With leading scorer and club captain John Fashanu regularly on the scoresheet, it looked as if Wimbledon would once again prove their critics wrong.

But, as we all know in football, events can change around quite dramatically. Ray Harford left to join Kenny Dalglish at Blackburn Rovers, and former Aston Villa forward Peter Withe was appointed for his first-managerial post...The Dons looked a shadow of their former selves.

The side lost their way under Withe's guidance, crashing out of both the Rumbelows Cup at Peterborough and the FA Cup against Bristol City. To make matters worse, the Dons had plummeted to 18th in the First Division table. Many supporters believed that the 'Crazy Gang' spirit had died when Harford left, but in true Wimbledon spririt they again lifted themselves after the dismissal of Withe, with reserve team boss Joe Kinnear taking over at the helm.

The appointment of Kinnear seems to have given the whole club a lift and, although the Dons are placed 17th in the league, they are 14 points ahead of bottom club West Ham United after impressive victories against high-flying Manchester City (2-0), Notts County (2-0), Oldham (1-0) and more recently drawing 0-0 with Manchester United at Old Trafford

The 'crazy gang' spirit has once again returned and the players are totally behind

Kinnear. John Fashanu, speaking after a recent victory, said: "Joe would be manager of the month, the trouble is he's manager of Wimbledon."

Hounded by many for their direct style of play, the Dons therefore seem all the more determined to succeed, particularly after such a turbulent season. They are proving once again that the small clubs can succeed alongside the giants of the game, and are gearing themselves up for a place in the Premier League next term.

Old boys from the Central School formed Wimbledon F.C. under the name of Wimbledon Old Centrals in 1889. Their earliest successes were in the Clapham League, before switching to the Southern Suburban League in 1902.

They finally gained Football League status 76 years later, drawing their opening match 3-3 with Halifax Town. From then on the stature of the club has snowballed, culminating in promotion to Division One in 1986 under boss Dave Bassett, and winning the FA Cup 1-0 against Liverpool two years later

Dons on Parade

HANS SEGERS (goalkeeper) – Hans, who had previously played for Nottingham Forest, vied for Steve Sutton's jersey during his time at the City Ground. His career was rejuvinated after a £125,000 move to Wimbledon in 1988, and he has missed only one game in the last two seasons. In 1989-90 he was voted Player of the Year by Dons' fans.

NEAL ARDLEY (defender) – 19-year-old Neil is one of five first-year professionals who made his first team debut at Aston Villa last season. A very neat, compact player, he has established himself as a regular in the Dons side in recent weeks.

TERRY PHELAN (defender) – Terry, the Republic of Ireland youth, under-21 and now full international started his career at Leeds United. After only 14 appearances for the Peacoks, he moved to Swansea City in 1986. After one full season in Division Four, he was snapped up by Wimbledon for just £90,000 and is now rated as a £1 million full-back.

JOHN SCALES (defender) – Another former Leeds apprentice, John joined Wimbledon from Bristol Rovers for £75,000 and quickly emerged as a favourite with the Plough Lane faithful. His natural position is centre-back, but can also operate effectively when needed in midfield. This versatility has made him a target for the big clubs this season.

SCOTT FITZGERALD (defender) – Scott is a highly promising youngster who has broken through to the first team this season following the sale of Keith Curle to Manchester City. A product of Wimbledon's youth team policy, he has already gained Irish under-21 caps.

WARREN BARTON (midfield) – Warren started his league career with newcomers Maidstone United in 1989. He quickly established himself at Watting Street and within a year he was playing in the First Division after a £300,000 move to Plough Lane. His conversion to top-flight football was complete when last season he was named Wimbledon Player of the Year.

PAUL MILLER (midfield) – Paul is a former Wimbledon trainee who made his debut for the Dons as a 19-year-old in 1987. After a spell on loan at Newport County, he has established himself in the first team on a regular basis.


LAURIE SANCHEZ (midfield) – Laurie, who joined Wimbledon from Reading in 1984, was introduced to the Northern Ireland side four seasons ago. He has since made over 250 appearances for the Dons and his most important goal for the club was the 1988 FA Cup winner against Liverpool at Wembley.

VAUGHAN RYAN (midfield) – A former captain of England Schools under-15's, 23-year-old Vaughan made his debut against Tottenham Hotspur in April 1987. Although he has been unable to gain a regular place in the first team, he has made some valuable contributions from the subs' bench this season.

PAUL McGEE (forward) – Paul started his league career with Colchester United in 1989 after joining the club from Bohemians in Ireland. A few weeks later he was signed by Wimbledon for an initial payment of £75,000 and scored on his league debut in a 2-2 draw with Arsenal at Highbury.

AIDAN NEWHOUSE (forward) – Aidan joined Chester City as a trainee and made his league debut in May 1988. After some impressive performances leading the City front line, he was snapped up by Wimbledon for £100,000 in February 1990, making his debut v Charlton in April of that year.

JOHN FASHANU (forward) – John has emerged in recent years as one of the most prolific and powerful front runners in the First Division. An England international, he has scored over 100 goals for the club and, quashing any doubts about his future at Selhurst Park, has signed a new lucrative contract. He started his career alongside brother Justin at Norwich. He then had two year spells with Lincoln and Millwall before joining Wimbledon in 1986.



£775,000. He made a name for himself after guiding Vale from Division Four to Division Two and scoring over 70 goals for the club. This season he has netted nine league goals.

ANDY CLARKE (forward) – Andy, a prolific scorer for non-league Barnet, made the step-up to league footbalast season when he joined the Dons for £350,000. He

Meet the Boss



JOE KINNEAR

Joe is the Dons' seventh manager since the club came into the Football League in 1977. The first four took the club into the 1990's, but Mr Kinnear's appointment was the third in 13 months.

A 44-year-old Dubliner, he joined Tottenham from St. Albans City in 1965 and in ten years at White Hart Lane, he won four major medals – FA Cup (1967), League Cup (1971 and 1973) and UEFA Cup (1972).

Capped 26 times by the Republic of Ireland, he closed his career through injury at Brighton but always planned to stay in the game after taking his full coaching badge under Dave Sexton with the Football Association.

For a number of years, he coached with great success in the Middle East and Malaysia, and then returned to English football in South Yorkshire. He joined Dave MacKay at Doncaster Rovers, and his two years at Belle Vue involved three months as manager, before Billy Bremner took charge in 1989.

He then joined Wimbledon and spent two years as reserve team coach and Assistant Manager to Ray Harford. He had hopes of the manager's job when Harford left last October. His chance eventually arrived in January and at the same time, coach Terry Burton was promoted to assistant boss.

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Player profile

Mick O'Brien

Two years ago, Mick O'Brien was one of Luton Town's hottest prospects, playing alongside Mark Pembridge and Ceri Hughes in the heart of the Town's reserve side. Known for his strong running and ball-winning skills, Mick was tipped to go all the way and make the first team, that was until disaster struck...

A reserve game at Norwich on October 20, 1989 threatened to end his career before it had even started. He broke both the fibia and tibula bones in his left leg which required many months of operations and heartache.

"As anyone who has broken their leg will know, the injury was absolutely agonising. When I got to the hospital, I had the leg x-rayed and found that because both bones were broken in the leg, I needed an operation to help it mend correctly.

"I had five pins put in initially, but after giving the leg the necessary time to heal, it was discovered that I would need to have another operation to help the leg mend fully, which this time required seven pins. In total, I had four operations before the doctors were happy that my leg would heal properly."

With his career looking doubtful and in plaster for a total of twelve months, the club sent Mick home to his native Ireland to recouperate and concentrate on making a full recovery.


"It helped going back to Ireland as I had family around who helped me around the home. Although I knew the injury was a bad one, there was never a time when I thought that I would not step back on the football pitch in Luton's colours. Having a lot of time to think about my future made me all the more determined to succeed."

When Mick finally returned to Luton, his long, hard road to regain full fitness began in earnest.

"When I was in plaster back home, I couldn't do any proper excercise, so I just made sure I ate all the right food. When I did get back I started off


"The major problem for me when I returned was actually going in for tackles and worrying if my leg would give way again. Fitness was also a problem – I felt absolutely shattered after my first training session, but also felt relieved to have come through successfully without any problems."

The real test for Mick was his first competitive game back. After being an un-used sub in a Combination fixture against Crystal Palace, Mick was drafted into the reserve side for the derby match against Watford on March 10, fully 29 months after he last turned out for the Hatters.



"In the remaining games of the season I aim to play to the best of my ability and win the manager over. The road to redovery has been a very difficult one, but would be complete with a new contract at Luton."





Since the end of the 1990 World Cup in Italy, where standards suffered as the result of defensive play, debate has revolved around the necessity for alterations to the laws of the game. FIFA has looked at the matter from a variety of angles and has formed a Technical Committee to look into the matter further.

BOLD CHANGES FOR THE SAKE

The statistics produced after the 1990 World Cup speak for themselves. In Italia '90 there were on average only eight attempts per match to shoot at the opponents' goal. Out of 249 free-kicks at goal only seven hit the back of the net, usually because the distance from wall to ball was abused. The corner statistics were even more astounding: the attacking teams notchedup only nine goals from a total of 457 kicks. Action-packed goal mouth action was outnumbered by no fewer than 1,586 back passes to the goalkeeper.

Here are its recommendations....

The ultra-defensive attitude behind these statistics was one of the reasons for the wide-spread disappointment felt by many fans after the World Cup.

The Committee, lead by former Sweden manager Lars Arnesson, believe that present laws in the game and the league system force teams to become defensive instead of setting out to score goals which is the 'name of the game'. They state that players' and coaches' attitudes could be easily changed with only minor adjustments, which would provide more exitement.

One of the first laws which the committee believe should be taken away are those which they describe as 'annoying'. For instance, the goalkeeper should be able to clear the ball either from the right or from the left of goal, regardless of where the ball left the field of play. They state that the ball should be kicked as well as thrown from the touchline into the field of play to increase goalmouth action.

Considering that corners seldom lead to a goal, the committee would like to see a 'short corner' introduced from the point where the penalty area and goaline meet. They recommend that free-kicks should only be direct ones so that teams who are in fact being deprived of their attacking advantage should not have additional obstacles strewn in their patch en route to goal.

A law which Arnesson would like to see introduced is that concerning the backpass. Unofficial tests in his homeland during the FIFA under-17 World Championships cut back this type of timewasting by 30 per-cent which can only improve the game.

They also believe that the habits of some players who drag out the formation of a wall for as long as possible during a free kick are sabotage. A cure would be stricter refereeing and extending the distance prescribed to 11 metres.

The committee point out that the offside rule in its present state incorporate all the drawbacks already mentioned. It encourages teams to play defensively and many decisions tend to be very controversial, particularly when deciding if a player is interfering with play or not. They believe that if the offside rule was restricted to the final third of the pitch, then teams would not play so defensively, i.e. forming an offside trap on the half-way line.


FIFA has also sent a circular to all the associations in the world pointing out that international referees will, in future, be required to show a basic knowledge of English. They have stated that they can no longer tolerate communication difficuties between referee and linesmen, which in some cases, can have a bearing on the outcome of results. All international referees who cannot speak English have now been instructed to take intensive courses.

Even though some of the new laws recommended are seen to be radical, the formation of such a committee prove that FIFA are taking the subject of defensive play seriously. Will such rules as kick-ins and short corners be implemented? We will just have to wait and see.



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

Scottish signings fail to light up a dreary season

eason 1950/51 had not got off to a particularly good start with only three wins from the first twenty games, attendances were down by 5,000 and the club were positioned at the bottom of the Division,Two table as Christmas approached.

Although the general pattern of play was attractive and the defence fairly solid, it was the lack of goalscoring punch that was letting the side down with George Stobbart ploughing a lone furrow down the middle as a variety of partners were tried out, found wanting, then dropped.

Something obviously needed to be done and manager, Dally Duncan, using his knowledge of Scotland, set his eyes on a free-scoring St Mirren forward Willie Davie and Celtic utility player Pat McAuley.

On Wednesday, December 13, Duncan left Luton on the night train for Glasgow and the following morning signed Davie and opened negotiations for McAuley. The talks broke down, so back came Duncan on the night train to Luton from where he went straight to Reading with the youth team.

While he was there, he learnt that Celtic were prepared to re-open negotations, so off to Glasgow he went again, signed McAuley on the Saturday morning and came back that evening, hearing on the way that the Town had lost 1-0 at Brentford.

These two signings immediately turned things around with two wins and two draws recorded from the next four games, leading up to the plum FA Cup third round draw at home against the then current league champions Portsmouth.

Portsmouth were expected to beat the Town easily, but such was the surge of optimism in the short space of one month that Luton supporters had a sneaking feeling that the opposition would be over-confident.

As it turned out, over confidence did not come into it as Pompey were completely outplayed in a 2-0 defeat which to all, apart from the Luton faithful, was the shock of the day. With rain falling on an already heavy pitch, the 21,631 crowd went into raptures as the Town tore into the Portsmouth defence, but had only one goal to show for it at half-time, when Davie hit home a superb through ball from the Stobbart in the 25th minute. It would have been no injustice had the Town been three up at half-time, but a more realistic scoreline came about three minutes into the second period when South African Willie Havenga smacked in a cross from Alec Glover.

Portsmouth came more into the game after that, but with Syd Owen controlling Duggie Reid, and Bernard Stretton in the Luton goal pulling off a couple of good saves, the Town comfortably held on for a place in round four, again at home, against Bristol Rovers.

This time, the Town were favourites, and a near record crowd of 26,586 rolled up at Kenilworth Road to witness the slaughter of the third division side.

The boot was on the other foot, however, as Rovers played the kind of football that the Town had displayed in the previous round and although Charlie Watkins gave Luton the lead in the 13th minute against the run of play, there was only going to be one winner.

Shots from all angles rained down on Streten, who was eventually beaten in the 30th minute when he could only punch out a fierce shot straight to the feet of Vic Lambden, who was left with an empty net.

The inevitable Rovers' winner came early in the second half when George Patherbridge dribbled past two Luton defenders and beat Streten as he advanced.

The euphoria built up since the double signing before Christmas subsided as quickly as it had started, and was reflected in the Town's league form which dipped considerably and it was only the eight goals in 22 games scored by Davie that eventually saved Luton from relegation.

It happened ten years ago



Is there a future for the serious British soccer weekly?

While cricket is well served with publications covering its past, soccer has comparatively few. Michael Heatley, editor of The Footballer, wonders why...

here won't be many here today who can recall Easter Monday of 1936, when one of Mick Harford's most illustrious predecessors in Luton's number nine shirt, Joe Payne, cracked ten goals past Bristol Rovers keeper Ellis in a 12-0 thrashing in front of a 13,000 crowd.

It is still the only ten-goal haul in league history, and is commemorated in pictures, prose and press cuttings in the current edition of The Footballer. Joe himself died in 1975 at the age of 61, but his record has outlived him: it is the aim of The Footballer, as Britain's Journal of Soccer History and Statistics, to keep such darling deeds of football history alive for future generations to marvel at.

But is there a future for such a publication? Come to that, is there a future for serious soccer writing at all? Charles Buchan's Football Monthly, which continued until late last year (though without the famous ex-player's name) now seems to have finally ceased publication. 90 Minutes, a promising newcomer, has now gone for the youth market to mix it with Shoot, Match and the like – probably due to the recession and consequent lack of 'lifestyle' advertisements. World Soccer continues to flourish, but league action obviously features only partially in its coverage. With English football at an historic juncture, I believe that now, more than ever, there is a place for The Footballer to keep the past alive.

Which brings us back to Joe Payne. The bare facts of his achievement can at least be discovered by anyone picking up a copy of the current season's Rothmans. It is the lesser-known but equally fascinating aspects of the game's past that are destined to be consigned to oblivion unless someone makes the effort to keep them alive. Cricket has a wide variety of publications dedicated to its history; why not our own beautiful game?


