This stage of the season sees Luton Town in the familiar position of Division 1 relegation

strugglers. In recent years the Hatters have made some miraculous escapes from the trap door to the Second Division, avoiding the drop on the last day of the season in the previous campaigns.

In the summer David Pleat was re-appointed as manager having served the club in a similar position from 1978-86 before moving on to Spurs and Leicester. Pleat steered Luton to the Division 2 championship in 1982. The Hatters hoped that the well-respected managerial abilities of Pleat would bring about an improvement in their fortunes, however this has not occurred.

The departures of two young starlets, Kingsley Black to Nottingham Forest and Matthew Jackson to Everton have been major blows to the club. Also Luton have this season missed the goals of Danish International Lars Elstrup. Since last season David Pleat has made several experienced signings to complement his array of

promising youngsters. Recently two more 'veterans' have been acquired on loan namely keeper Mervyn Day and striker Imre Varadi.

The goalkeeping position has been something of a problem for the Hatters this term. Alec Chamberlain began the season in goal. He played over 200 times for Colchester United in the football league before a short spell at Everton ended with his transfer to Luton in July 1988. Chamberlain, however, was displaced by loan signing Steve Sutton for three months before Sutton moved on to Derby County. Mervyn Day was then loaned by Leeds United to take over the keeper's spot. 36 year old Day has a wealth of experience behind him with West Ham, Leyton Orient and Aston Villa. A recent injury to Day saw Chamberlain return to the side.

Experience is also the key to Luton's back line. 35 year old Trevor Peake arrived from Coventry after making over 300 senior appearances for the Sky Blues. Previously he was with Lincoln City. 28 year old John Dreyer came from Oxford United and has been operating alongside Peake in the centre

of the defence. Dreyer has also been the club's regular penalty-taker demonstrating his own highly individual style.

Julian James and Richard Harvey are two promising youngsters who have been occupying the full-back positions of late. James is an England Under-21 international and has taken over from Matthew Jackson since his departure to Everton. Letchworth - born Harvey is a former England youth team player.

Mark Pembrige has been a revelation in Luton's midfield this season. The talented young Welshman has been watched by a host of scouts of late and has recently forced his way into the full Welsh squad. David Preece has been at Kenilworth Road

Stein is also in his second spell at Luton. He played over 450 games for the club in his first spell scoring 150 times. However, since returning to the Hatters this season from France he has found goals harder to come by. Imre Varadi was acquired recently on loan from Leeds and scored on his debut against Wimbledon. The nomadic striker has returned to the club who rejected him as a youngster 15 years ago.

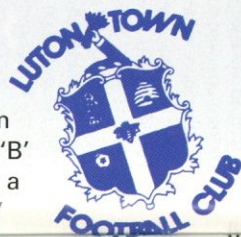
Jamie Campbell and Welshman Ceri Hughes, two highly promising youngsters will also be challenging for a place in the side although David Pleat may decide to err more towards experience in the final push to avoid relegation.

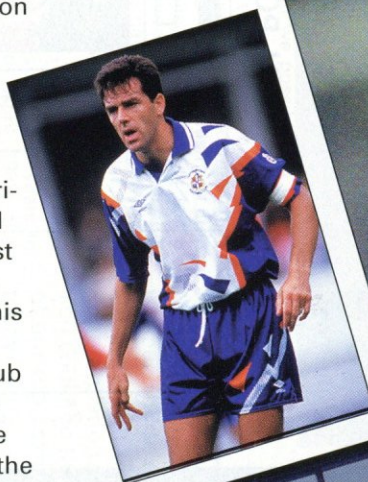

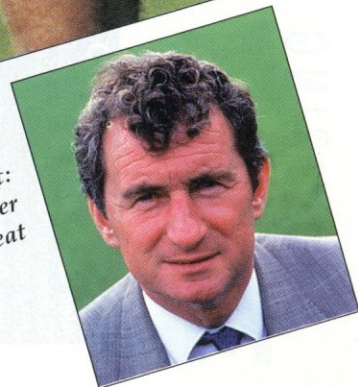
medal for Luton in 1988 and usually operates on the left-side of midfield. Chris Kamara brings a wealth of experience to the middle of the park. He arrived from Leeds this season having previously had two spells at both Portsmouth and Swindon as well as turning out for Brentford and Stoke.

Luton certainly have experience in their current forward line. Mick Harford will almost certainly be leading it. The much-travelled striker is in his second spell at Kenilworth Road having rejoined the club from Derby County this season. In his first spell with the Hatters Harford was part of the club's 1988 League Cup winning side and gained two England caps.

THE SQUAD IN BRIEF

Alec Chamberlain, began at Ipswich before moving to Colchester, was signed from Everton, for £150,000 in July 1988.

John Dreyer, club captain last season has now made over 100 league appearances since his £140,000 move from Oxford in 1988.

Mick Harford, in his second spell at Kenilworth Road having previously played for Lincoln, Newcastle, Bristol C, Birmingham and Derby, scored Town's last away goal at Oldham.

Richard Harvey, former England Youth International who made his debut in 1986 since when he has been a fairly regular member of the first team.

Ceri Hughes has represented Wales at Youth, under 21 and full levels. Ceri scored Luton's consolation goal in the 6-1 defeat here last season.

Julian James, a product of the youth policy at Kenilworth Road, Julian has now established himself in the Luton first team squad.

Chris Kamara very experienced member of the Hatters' midfield with over 500 leagues appearances with his various teams since 1975.

Trevor Peake was signed from Coventry City in August for £100,000. Trevor started out at Lincoln and has played over 450 league games.

Mark Pembridge having made his debut on New Year's day 1991, Mark remained an ever present in the first team to the end of last season.

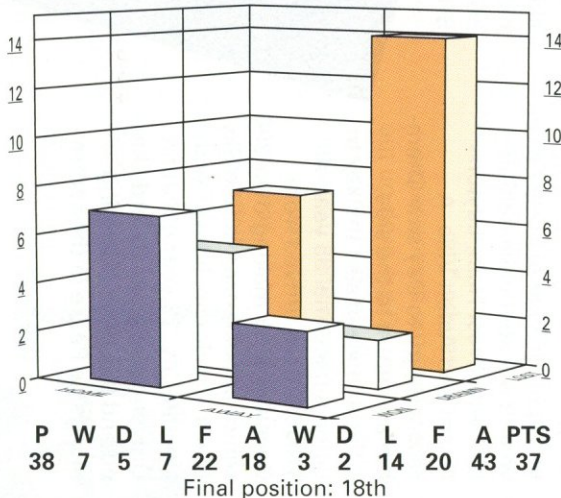
David Preece made his league debut for Walsall in 1981 from where he was signed in 1984 for £150,000 since when he has turned out over 200 times.

Jason Rees, a Welsh under 21 international midfielder, Jason made his debut at Old Trafford in March 1990

Brian Stein returned to Luton last Summer following 3 years in France playing for Caen and Annecy, his last game for the Hatters before he left was the 1988 Littlewoods Cup Final.

Imre Varadi, much travelled forward who has played for nine clubs before Luton without moving any further South than West Bromwich Albion.

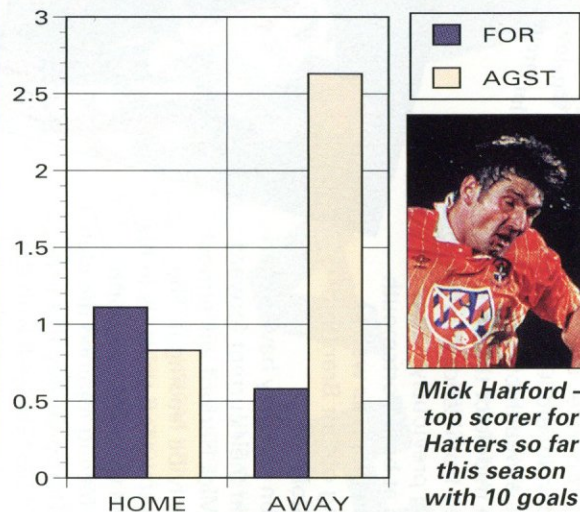

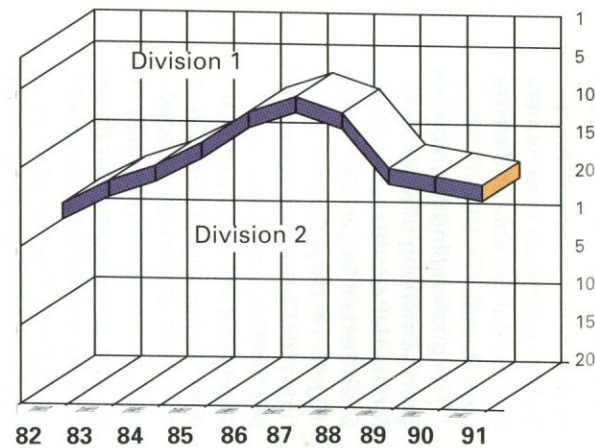

- Good afternoon and a happy Easter to you all. Did you know that Easter comes from the Pagan goddess Eastre, and that a festival called Hye Tide took place at this time of the year. Not a lot of people want to know that - it's probably more boring than football statistics.
- April 20th (Adolph Hitler's 103rd birthday) is an excellent one for us to be playing at home. Take a look at our previous home results played on this date.

- How can we possibly fail to win today!!
- Certainly our recent form against Luton on this ground must give grounds for optimism. Luton have failed to win in their last 8 visits here although 5 of the matches have ended in draws.
- Of course we have met Luton once or twice in the past, in fact since 1899 we have already played them 116 times in all competitions. It is almost 4 years to the day (19th April 1988) that Luton last beat us, home or away - of the 7 matches played since then, we have won 3 and drawn 4.
- In case George Best reads this article - I should tell you that Luton have never beaten us at home in April. They've met us at home on 6 previous occasions and we have won 4 and drawn twice. I can also tell you that we have lost all 4 matches at Kenilworth Road in April.
- Don't expect the ground to be packed to capacity today. Recent home games have only averaged out at around 10,500 - a far cry from the average home gates against Luton of around 17,000 in the late 1940s and early 1950s.
- On 29th April 1964 - a gate of 5,025 attended. Gate receipts were £734.
- A look back a long way into the past revealed that a QPR player called Jimmy Biron, must have loved playing against Luton.
- Between 1910 and 1922 he scored 12 times for us against them.

Eric Cantona is fast becoming a cult figure at Elland Road. Despite the fact that he played only the last six minutes of Leeds' game against Chelsea at Elland Road, his illumination of a poor game was pyrotechnical. Anyone who has not witnessed his spectacular individual goal with two minutes left, should get a copy on video. He made his fellow strikers look positively pedestrian, but Wallace, whom he replaced, opened the scoring after 55 minutes, and Chapman scored the second just before the Frenchman's offering. The 3-0 victory put Leeds on top, one point ahead of Manchester United, who have two games in hand.

United were, of course, involved in a rather disappointing Rumbelows League Cup final at Wembley. The only goal of the game came from Brian McClair, giving United their first ever victory in the competition.

The F.A. Cup Final will, after all have a first division team in it. Liverpool never took the lead in four hours of play against second division Portsmouth, but the game was decided by the highly unsatisfactory and controversial penalty shoot-out, Liverpool winning 3-1.

Third place in the first division takes on added significance with Manchester United having won the Rumbelows League Cup. The team finishing behind the leading two will be rewarded with a UEFA Cup place. Realistically, only Sheffield Wednesday and Arsenal can hope to finish there.

Wednesday boss Trevor Francis must be a little concerned, Arsenal are showing championship form at the moment. Although Palace had the audacity to take the lead at Highbury ten days ago, they were made to pay - particularly by Paul Merson, who grabbed a hat-trick in the home

side's 4-1 victory that makes Arsenal the division's top scorer's.

Wednesday kept their noses in front with a 2-0 home win over Manchester City, whose own hopes of a top three spot have evaporated with a run of eight games without a win.

At the foot of the table there was a twitch from the corpse. West Ham, seemingly dead and buried, pulled off a 4-0 victory at home to Norwich, that kept their slender hopes alive. However, a 1-0 defeat at home to Southampton on Tuesday night left them deep in trouble, especially as Luton managed a home victory over Forest on the same night.

Alan McDonald's sending off against Spurs was one of eight that weekend taking the total for the season to 246 in all competitions, a record, passing the previous record of 242 in 1982-83.

TEAM TALK



“Last week's game against Spurs contained, I believe, some of the best football we've played since I returned to the club. The woodwork denied us on three occasions, a bit like the start of the season, and instead of being two or three up at half-time we went in only 1-0 ahead. Obviously we were bitterly disappointed at the end of the game as on the balance of play I feel we should have won.

Recent events in a number of games this season just reinforce a view I have held for 20 years that we need professional officials. It must surely come at some stage in the near future.

Let me say first of all that refereeing is a very difficult job indeed and officials should be paid accordingly, and the person who has not made a mistake has not been born yet. However, an official's decisions can govern whether some managers or players stay in a job and their performances should have the same consequences for them. They should be held accountable for their performance, good or bad.

I do not feel that the current assessor system with regard to officials is satisfactory at all. Drinking tea and socialising before the game just cannot be correct procedure as far as I am concerned. Officials should be marked by both sides, as is the case now, and given marks out of 10. There should also be, totally unknown to the officials, an independent assessor, not someone who is associated with the referee, to give another mark. Marks would be added up over the season and officials should be subject to promotion and relegation just like teams. The best officials would then be operating in the top division and so on down the scale with new officials coming in at the lower level

and working their way up exactly like players. If we were to introduce professional pay at a level that they deserve in doing after all what is a very difficult job, there would be a lot more people, perhaps including ex-players, wanting to take up the job, so increasing competition. I am 100% certain that this would lead to improvement in standards which can only be good for the game.

I was talking just recently with Sir Colin Cowdrey who was talking to me about cricket umpires and he felt, as do most people, that the English umpires are the best in the world. The majority of these umpires have been former players and Colin was of the opinion that their knowledge of actually playing the game helped them greatly in becoming umpires. I am not saying that ex-players would necessarily make good officials, but if you raise the quality by the number of people that would want to enter this role I am sure, as I stated earlier, that it must raise the standards. I also feel having professional referees would allow them time to visit clubs and improve communication with players. It is easy to ref by the book but a lot of refereeing is the application of common sense, and by spending time with players I am sure referees would understand their point of view better, and vice versa, and so improve communication.

We have a superb disciplinary record this season yet against Spurs, in a game that didn't have a really bad tackle, there were six bookings and a sending off. It is easy for an official to go home and not concern himself about his performance or the decisions he may have made. He can go back to his job on Monday and not lose any money or sleep over the situation, but our livelihood depends upon the consequences of his decisions.

The setting up of the Premier League is a perfect opportunity to look at this situation and many other important questions. A lot of people, quite rightly, point to the Italian Serie A as the best league in the world. I think the Italians also have it right when it comes to the points system of two for a win and one for a draw. With our system a team might lose 6-0 one week, win 1-0 the next and end up with more points than a side involved in two exciting 2-2 draws. Our system of three points for a win and one for a draw sometimes has put teams in false positions. The sys-

tem was introduced to try and combat negative football. A number of years ago the Italian league could not have been more negative but without changing the points system the Italian league and the football being played there has been outstanding over a number of years.

Whilst on the subject of reconsidering rules, I think UEFA should look again at the ruling that sees players sent off for an intentional foul inside the box. As I understood it, it was intended to combat the professional foul outside the box, and rightly so. But inside the box the penalty is punishment enough.

I went to several meetings last year regarding this ruling and everybody connected with the game, managers, players, officials and spectators were of the opinion that a penalty was punishment enough. Who wants to see goalkeepers and players sent off for just mis-timing a challenge inside the box. I don't and an even worse situation at present is where week in week out officials show inconsistency by sending someone off one week and another week not even booking a player.

We have these stupid rules forced upon us sometimes and I wish there was a bit more thought and discussion beforehand. There ought to be consul-

tations with managers, coaches, spectators, players and officials about such situations. After all we're the people the game is all about.

Now that I've got all that off my chest, back to today's game. To be fair I couldn't fault the players for their performance against Spurs but it's important that we keep the impetus going right to the end of the season. I shall be very disappointed if we don't finish in the top half of the table. We deserve it with the football we've played. There was a tremendous crowd

against Spurs and I think that was recognition of the side's performances. I now want us to end the season with some good results which will set us up well for next term.

Finally, just a reminder that on Wednesday night we are staging a Benefit Match for the late Mick Leach's family. I hope to see many of you here supporting this very worthy cause.

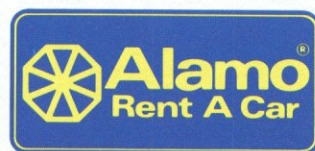

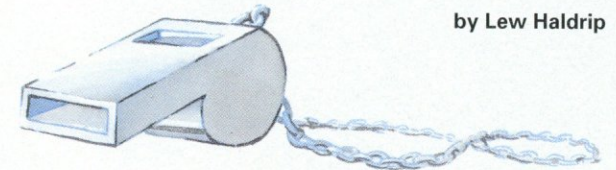

RANGERS • COMMENT BLOW THE WHISTLE

Isn't it remarkable how we take it for granted that there should be three points for a win and one for a draw in league competition. Yet it's only been the case for the last ten seasons. Prior to that the Football League managed with two points for a win and one for a draw - the accepted differential in most sports leagues - for 92 years. As Gerry Francis points out today the Italians, who most people accept have the best league in the world, use the 2/1 system.

Sour grapes - I can hear it now, as people other than Rangers fans read this article - just because you'd be higher up the table with the old system. Fair point - and I have to hold up my hand and admit a modicum of bias, but let us analyse the various merits of the two systems, and some other alternatives.

The three points system was introduced, ostensibly to promote

positive play, presumably on the premise that teams, knowing that a draw is two points lost, would go all out for victories in every game. A fair assumption. So the three point system must be rewarding teams for enterprise musn't it - WRONG.

The fact is that if the first division were recalculated on a 2 points for a win basis, not one of the top eight positions or the bottom seven would be any different! The only difference would be a minor change to the mid-table placings, one of which would be to move us from 14th to 10th - just reward for the consistency that saw us lose only once in 19 games and have a better goal difference than the 4 sides immediately above us. (All figures calculated on last week-end's tables).

So, what is the point in the system if it makes no appreciable difference to the league table? Surely its introduction must have been to put right the injustice of adventurous attacking sides - who won or lost, but rarely drew - not winning titles. Not so.

The fact is that in the ten seasons prior to the introduction of the 3 point system not one championship title would have gone to different winners if the 3 point rule had been in place. Similarly, in the ten years since

its introduction there would have been no different winners if the 2 point rule had applied. Incidentally the nearest to a change came in 1975/76 when we missed the title by one point. If the three point rule had been in use we'd have been

level with Liverpool on points but missed out on a goal difference of just one.

It seems that the points system was changed without much analysis of the implications. It was assumed that it would penalise negative teams, but it's made little or no difference. It was the wrong cure for the illness - like giving a man with indigestion cough medicine.

For the points system to really reward attacking football, then it would need to be linked not only to winning matches, but to scoring goals. But such a system would be complex and unwieldy and an anathema to football which doesn't let the statistics get in the way of the sport as with, say, baseball.

Other suggestions have been made for making the game more exciting, open and attacking. From the tinkering with the off-side rule that we had at the start of this season, to FIFA's ludicrous suggestion of making the goals bigger.

Most people believe the game has survived as long as it has, and remained popular, purely because the laws have not been greatly altered and are basically simple.

So what could be more simple than two points for a win and one for a draw - as the rest of Europe does. (The fact is that the 3 point system does not penalise negative sides - only consistent ones.)

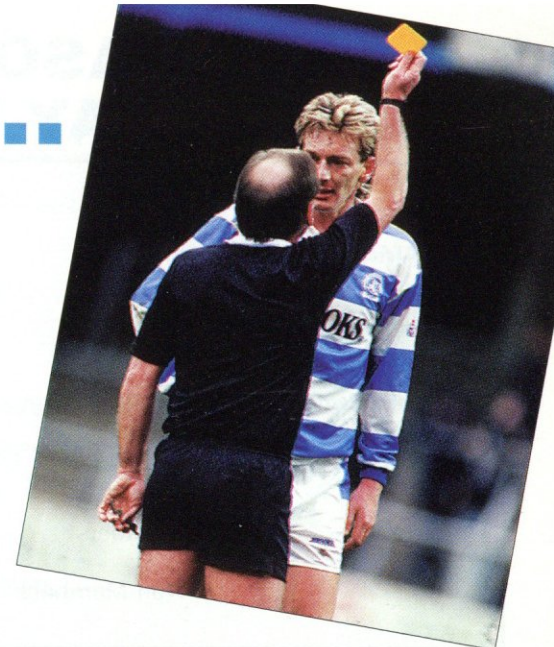

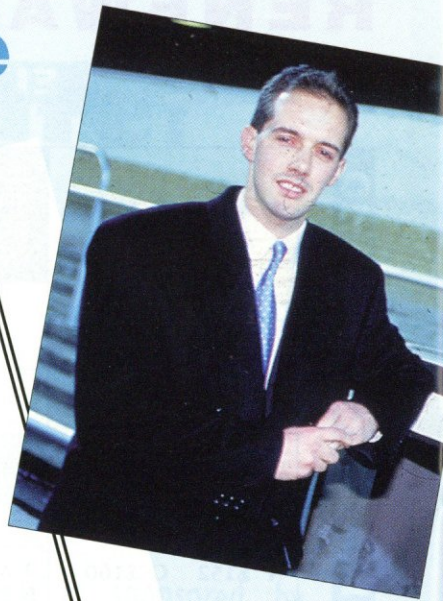

BOYS FROM THE BUSH

A lot of things have changed, both at Rangers, and in football in general, since a young Frank Sibley first came to Loftus Road. But one thing has remained constant; the friendly atmosphere at the club.

"That was the thing that persuaded me to come here," explains Frank, "I'd had a lot of offers when I was a schoolboy, Villa, Wolves, Spurs and Chelsea, but I'd enjoyed myself so much when I was here as a schoolboy, that I decided to join Rangers. I also thought that I'd have more chance of making it into the first team quickly at a third division club."

That proved to be a shrewd decision and Frank made a very early breakthrough into the first team, becoming Rangers' youngest ever player at the age of 15 years 247 days. How much have things changed since those days back in the 60's?



"Football is a lot more professional these days. Players are far more fit and a lot more thought goes into the game. When I started you just played the match and trained in the week, there wasn't the analysis there is now."

"And, of course, as far as Rangers are concerned, the stadium's changed enormously, it's marvellous now. Jim Gregory must take a lot of credit for what has been achieved, he turned us from an ordinary third division side into a first division club. It takes a long time for a side to be recognised as a first division club - that's an

achievement in itself, and a lot of people have put in a lot of hard work over the years to make that happen.

Since being forced to retire prematurely with a knee injury, Frank has experienced managerial posts both at Rangers and Walsall, but now he has returned to his original club as coach and is finding working with Gerry Francis an enjoyable experience.

"Different managers



"Different managers have different styles," Frank says. "Some of them just pop down to the odd training session and take charge of selecting the team. Gerry is different, he takes most of the training sessions himself while I assist him. He's a very good coach, and of course I know him very well. I've known him since he was a youngster here at Rangers, and it helps that we have the same ideas on how the game should be played."

"Gerry was part of the Dave Sexton era and he believes in passing the ball. Q.P.R. fans have been brought up on that style of football and that's what they expect, they may be critical of us at times, and they need to be to keep us on our toes, but I'm sure they appreciate our efforts to play entertaining football. I'm not saying that that's the way to success, as a more direct approach has proved successful for some sides, but in the long term, if you play entertaining football you will retain

your crowds even without success.

"That's not to say that we don't want success," Frank hastily points out. "We want to win the league and every cup competition we enter. But you have to be realistic. Gerry has made changes since he came here, and I'm sure he'll make more, but he'll get it right by doing things the right way, but it will take time."

Being realistic then, isn't it impossible for a club of Rangers' size to be able to compete with the sides in the first division who have much more money available?

"Any club can only spend the money it brings in through the turnstiles, that's common sense, so obviously we can't compete with the likes of Manchester United. But, although we can't pay the sort of fees they can, there's no reason why, even if a player costs less, he can't be just as good as one costing, say, £5 million."

"Gerry has brought some players here for small fees who have done great things, and to be honest they've surprised even us. What you need is a good squad of first division players to be able to cope with injuries and to keep up competition for places."

"There's another reason for having a squad, you need experienced players in your reserve side so that the youngsters who are

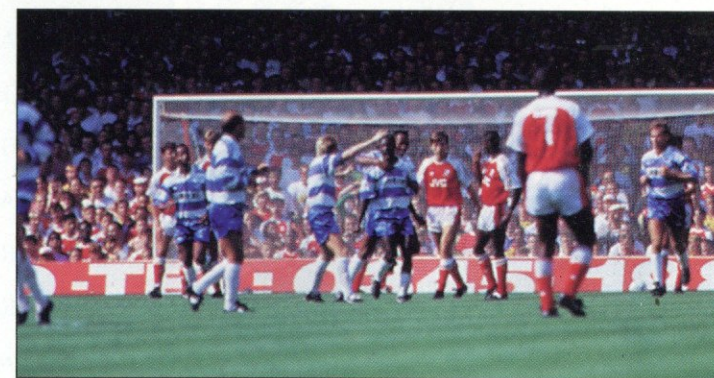
coming through can learn from them," says Frank.

As a player who had to give up his career through injury, does he think that enough is done to look after players forced out of the game?

"Over the years the P.F.A. have done wonders for players. That's why I was fully in support of their stand on the deal with the Premier League. I've been helped by them, as have many players who've received financial support or help with operations or medical treatment. Because of the strains of the professional game more and more players are finishing early and the P.F.A.'s work in this area will increase."

"It's very important, especially with younger players, that they are not forced to play if they're not right. I'm not saying that I was put under pressure, but time is the best cure, so I will never ask a player to come back unless he's had enough time to recover."

1991-92 has been a transitional season for Queens Park Rangers, how does Frank assess it as he looks back over the past eight months?



"It's been a season of mixed emotions. Back at the start against Arsenal, a game most people thought should have been a home win, we were disappointed not to come away with all

three points. And that's how it's been, highs and lows. Some of the lows have contained some very good performances without giving us the right result and I don't think our league position really reflects how well we've played. The old two points for a win, one for a draw, would have put us higher up the table, and a healthier position would have helped players to retain more confidence and perhaps play even better."

"We've shown with our victories over Manchester United, Manchester City and Leeds, just what we're capable of, and the performance against Spurs last week, when we could easily have been four up at half time and certainly didn't deserve to lose, demonstrated how we can play well and not come away with the result our performance warranted."

"Although I think we deserve to be higher up the table, the league is the only monitor of your performance. In some games we may have been unlucky, in others we've not concentrated for the whole ninety minutes and paid the price."

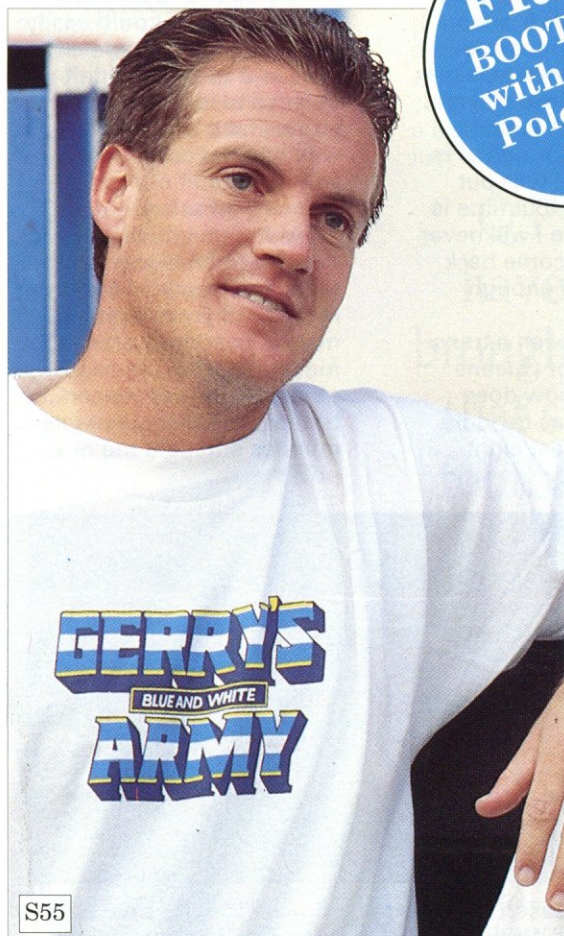

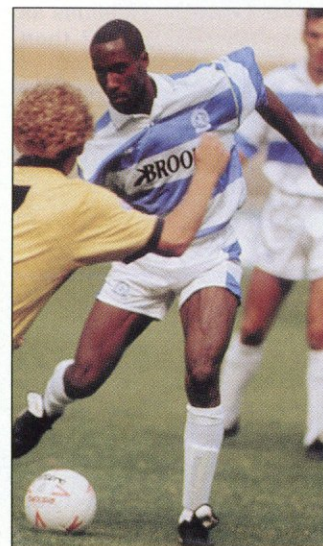

Plans are continuing to put together a QPR video showing action highlights from great matches of the 1970's.

Manager Gerry Francis told Clubcall: "I will be one of the first in the queue to buy a copy! When I was a player, video equipment and machines were not widely available so I haven't got too many things to look back on.

"Nowadays, players can record the games from television and there's also the 'Rangers Review'. But in my day, you weren't able to keep the games on tape. It'll be nice to have a look back, because when you get to my age all you have are memories!

One of the most popular songs at Loftus Road is "We love you Rangers, we do . . .". Cries of "Come on Rangers" are heard all around the ground.

Indeed, QPR are the only football league club with the word 'Rangers' in their title. In Glasgow of course, there's Glasgow Rangers and Berwick Rangers.

But did you know that fans at some 15 non-league clubs can also shout "Come on Rangers"? The best known team are Stafford Rangers of the GM Vauxhall Conference. The closest to London are Concord Rangers, who play in the Essex Senior League and are based at Canvey Island, and Risborough Rangers of the South Midlands League (from Princes Risborough).

In the north of England you will find Bradley Rangers, Hall Road Rangers and Winterton Rangers (all in the Northern Counties East league). Other clubs - mainly in the Midlands - are Badsey Rangers, Highfield Rangers, Soham Town Rangers, Walden Rangers, Paget Rangers, Moxley Rangers, Park Rangers (from Tividale, W. Mids), Kintbury Rangers and Houghton Rangers.

LONE RANGER



The Loftus Road career of full back Ian Gillard, one of our finest ever club servants, spanned 16 of the most eventful years in the history of QPR. Joining us as a 16 year old apprentice in 1966, he watched from the sidelines as we won the League Cup and Division Three in 1966-67 then gained promotion to the first division 12 months later.

He was just five weeks past his 18th birthday when he made his first team debut in November 1968, when we were already sliding back to Division Two, and it was not until the 1972-73 second division promotion season that he established himself in the first team.

He was a regular member of the fine side that finished runners-up in Division One in 1975-76 and went on to compete in the

EUFA Cup in the following season.

Having suffered relegation as a young professional in 1969, he was one of the club's senior players when we unfortunately went down again in 1979. But Ian was there to enjoy the re-juvenation of the club under the management of Terry Venables, turning out for the last time in a Rangers shirt in the FA Cup final replay against Tottenham Hotspur in May 1982.

It was a long and distinguished QPR career - there were also several England caps on the way - but as Ian recalls it almost ended before it had properly begun. He says: "It took me a long time to get established in the first team and at one stage I asked Gordon Jago for a transfer.

"I'd made my debut under Tommy Docherty, but when he got sacked Les Allen came in and went for more experienced players. I just had to bide my time, but it became very frustrating when I still couldn't get a regular place after Gordon had taken over.

"When I went to see him I told him I couldn't see any future for me at Rangers, and he told me Oxford and Reading were both interested in signing me.

"That seemed the beginning of the end of my time at Loftus Road, but within two weeks I was in the first team - and three or four weeks later I was in the England Under 23s!

"When Gordon told me I'd been selected I couldn't believe it, but it was a great occasion for me. Just to pull that white shirt on was very special, and to top it all off we beat Scotland 2-0.

"It also came as a surprise when I got into the full England team in 1975. Don Revie was in charge and the main reason I got in was probably injuries to other players who might have been picked ahead of me.

"I only won three caps but it was the icing on the cake as far as my football career was concerned, especially my debut when we played West Germany at Wembley when they were the world champions.

"On a personal level playing for England has to go down as my biggest achievement, but in the team sense the best times I had were at QPR in the mid-seventies. The Rangers side that finished second in the League in 75-76 was the best team I ever played in without a shadow of a doubt.

"Liverpool pipped us to the title but I don't care what anybody says, we should have won it. We had everything in that team - great individual players, loads of variation, a fantastic team spirit and the ability to consistently produce superb football.

"It was never the same after that team broke up,

although when Terry Venables arrived things picked up. Terry brought good players in and got a nice blend going. He built an exciting team and as one of the older pro's it was good to see the club being revived.

"And I couldn't have had a much better way to end my time at Rangers than playing in the Cup Final. It would have been perfection to have ended on the winning side, but I felt we did well over the two games and with a bit more luck we would have won the replay."

After a total of 484 appearances - the third highest recorded by a Rangers player - Ian moved to Aldershot as player coach in June 1982.

He carried on playing until 1986 then,

in his first season concentrating fully on the coaching side, he helped inspire the Shots to promotion from Division Four.

It was the last moment of glory for the club, who were relegated back to the fourth division two seasons later and sadly went out of existence earlier this year. Ian had left in 1990 but sadly for him too, he is now on the dole after spending 13 months working in a factory.

He says: "I've had a couple of culture shocks since I left Rangers. The first was joining Aldershot - what a change the fourth division was to playing in the top two divisions. To be fair to Aldershot they did try to play football, but most of the sides down there just whacked the ball from one end of the pitch to the other.

"I also found it difficult combining coaching with playing. Because you're looking after all the other pro's at the club you tend to neglect yourself a bit and that makes it harder to perform week in, week out. I never really adjusted to combining the two jobs, but I thoroughly enjoyed coaching when I was able to give it my full concentration.

"Unfortunately things went sour at Aldershot and after I left I spent the hardest 13 months of my life, working shifts at the Mars factory in Slough. But that was only a temporary job and since I finished there I've been on the dole.

"I'm doing a little bit of coaching for Reading at their School at Excellence, but I would love to get back into the game on a full time basis and just hope that a job might come up in the not too distant future."

Continuing his match diary, A Kick Up The R's editor Dave Thomas bites his tongue . . .

I forget what it is that says more about you than something else ever could, but the sight of Rangers fans streaming out of Loftus Road - angry, bitter and frustrated to a man - spoke volumes compared to anything I could subsequently reflect on here. A picture of their faces in place of these eccentric ramblings would not only paint the proverbial thousand words, but would successfully exemplify my own feelings on events during the game, which in the absence of any such picture have to remain guarded, for obvious reasons.

I don't need to spell out why we were angry and frustrated. It certainly wasn't directed at our own side for losing a game that could and should have won comfortably. Defeat we can take, even if it is to abysmal sides like Tottenham. And anyway Rangers had, when allowed to, played the sort of football that meant it wasn't only the black cat comfortably ensconced in the Directors Box who spent the afternoon purring.

If I were to name the guilty parties responsible for provoking the most enraged and longest sustained bout of anger I can ever recall from a

Rangers crowd, I would, (should the editor decide to print it - and contrary to my beliefs, I am neither told what to write or subjected to censorship when I do so) - lay the club open to a charge of bringing the game into disrepute. Incompetence, intimidation and downright cheating were witnessed in abundance during a stormy second half - and I'll leave you to decide on whose head each hat fits, as it were - all of which are far worse for the image of the game than any options I might express here, just shows how football's officialdom so often seems to have its priorities mixed up. As I've no wish to compound matters, which may or may not have further ramifications anyway, I will clench my tongue very firmly between my teeth. Besides, you know only too well what I'm saying. Say no more, as the man said, say no more!

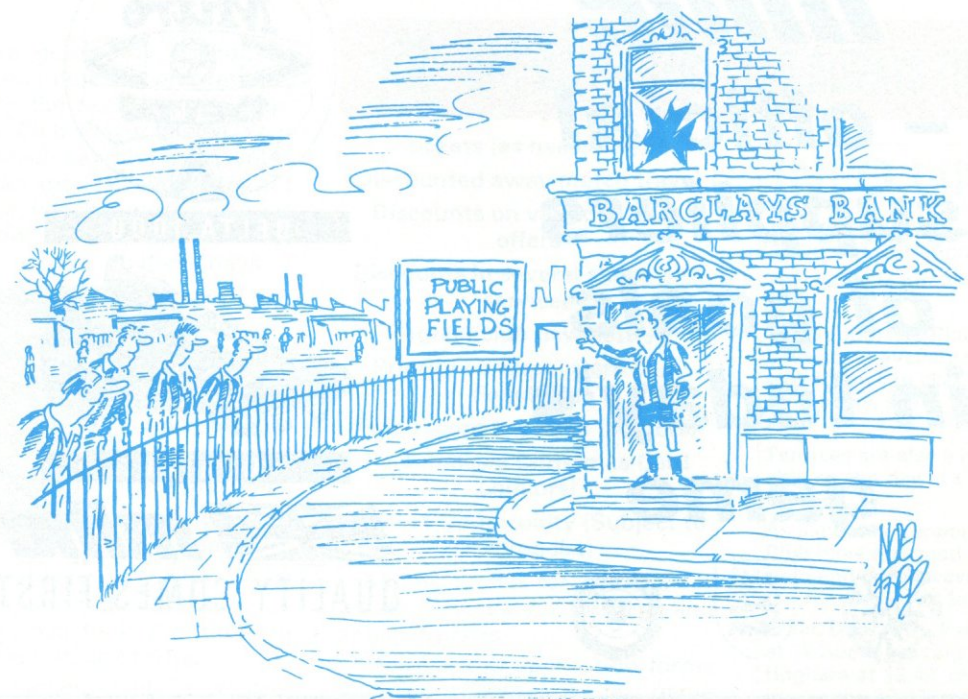

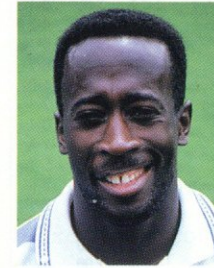

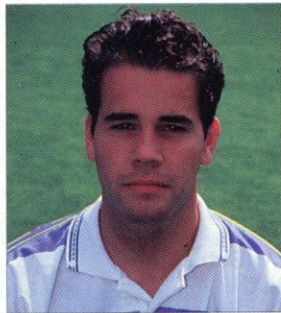

the line so well". Alan confesses he would like to play abroad at some point, though he stresses this is in the future. He also believes the experience of regular league football through a loan spell at a lower division club would be good for his career.

Born in Tooting on January 11th 1972, Alan McCarthy first showed soccer promise at his junior school and blossomed with Sunday side Forest United before coming to R's at the age of 13. Indeed, he made his first reserve appearance at the age of 15. However he does have one skeleton in his cupboard - as a lad he was a Chelsea fan and used to stand in The Shed with his father. He still has a soft spot for the Blues, "but I always love to beat them when I play against them" he stresses. Alan is single and has recently bought a flat in Willesden, which he is busy decorating. His best pals at the club are Andrew Impey and Michael Meaker, although he gets on well with all the young players whom he has known for years. He hopes to be involved with either the senior summer tour to Australia or the under 20's trip to France during the close season but if not he will aim to get in a few rounds of golf, his favourite other sport.

For today's feature we spoke to reserve defender Alan McCarthy who told of the fierce competition that there now is for places at all levels at QPR. "As I'm 20 I sometimes feel I could be progressing a bit quicker" he admitted "but as we've got 8 centre-halves at the club it can be quite difficult even to get into the reserve team." Alan did in fact break into the first eleven starting line-up at the end of November and said he was pleased with his performances in the 3 full games he played.
