



Murray progressed to professional status) that the side gained a top four place in the South East Counties League and had good cup runs. He has been assisted by Paul Lowe who has worked particularly hard at general youth development and the setting up of the Luton Town Soccer Schools.

The groundsman David Chapman and his staff have handled the transition from plastic to grass with care; Jan Bavister has been a smiling face providing the tea and rolls and Rene McNamara has done her duties in the washroom. Lita Nunn has been a first-class first line of approach for anyone calling the club by telephone and all our administration staff have worked superbly. These employees are just

some of the many reasons that make working at Luton both worthwhile and rewarding even when the ball does not run kindly.

But we have a battle on and we need the support of the town at the gate. I ask all our supporters who join us today, whatever the outcome of our First Division effort since 1982, to stick with us and bring a friend next season and help us with a positive contribution to our commercial operation. A good football club is a vital wing of any community's projection and we must not loose sight of that

Progressive thoughts

Dear Sir.

In February 1987 I wrote to Jimmy Hill with my comments regarding the rules used in football. I should like to reiterate those comments again to you now as I believe they remain relevant.

- 1) Control the duration of play by an ice hockey-type clock to prevent time wasting.
- 2) Players to have their names on the back of their shirts.
- 3) The ball must not be passed back to the goalkeeper from outside the penalty area. Should this happen, then a free kick should be awarded to the opposing side from one corner of the penalty area.
- 4) Three adjudicators with access to instant video replay of all goals to determine if cheating had taken place. Ref: Maradona/Hand of God. Or is cheating a part of the game? The same adjudicators should be responsible for control of the clock (see item 1). Also, the clock should be stopped when needless passing back of the ball takes place from the halfwayline towards the end of the game.

Generally speaking, individual cleverness by British players is abysmal compared to 90 per cent of continental players (whichever the continent). I think now, as I did then, that this could possibly be improved by ALL clubs having an artificial pitch of good quality. We have played on mud heaps for far too long as seen again very recently on television. Sadly, we are never going to win the World Cup again with football played as it is today.

If minds remain closed, it will be impossible for progress to be made. The old attitude of "what was good enough for my father is good enough for me" is not good enough in today's world.





Welcome to Aston Villa

Since his controversial arrival at Villa Park, after successfully re-establishing Sheffield Wednesday as a Division One outfit, manager Ron Atkinson has spent over £4.5 million on buying pretty well a completely new team.

Obviously, such a re-building programme takes time, so manager Atkinson, alongside his assistant Andy Gray, can look back on his first season in charge with comfort, knowing that Villa are to finish the season in the top ten of Division One, with a real push for the championship to come next season.

Atkinson's last 'big money' signing was that of former Hatter Garry Parker. Garry was signed from Nottingham Forest for £650,000 and has formed an experienced and solid midfield partnership with Kevin Richardson, who was himself signed by the club last summer from Spanish outfit Real Sociedad for £750,000

Villa did make a fine start to the season and, up until Christmas, the side were looking for a European place next season. Their new-look forward line of Tony Daley, Dwight Yorke and rejuvenated signing Cyrille Regis,

was definitely a major contributor to their position of third in Division One.

Amazingly, the turn of the year saw Villa's goal tally dry up completely and until last month's 5-2 demolition of Tottenham Hotspur at White Hart Lane, Villa had managed to score only one league goal. Matters have not been helped by forward recruit Dalian Atkinson's constant struggle to regain full fitness after long-term injury.

The side did have a good run in the FA Cup, disposing of last season's winners Tottenham along the way, but were eventually knocked out at Anfield, 1-0 against Liverpool, in a match many soccer pundits believed Villa shaded.

Mr Atkinson, however, can gain heart from the solid centre-back partnership which has developed this season. Alongside the ever-reliable Paul McGrath, Shaun Teale has been signed from Bournemouth and, after an initial settling-in period, the Villa defence is rated as one of the strongest in the First Division.

At the time of writing, Villa are currently ninth in Division One with 57 points from forty

games after winning their Bank Holiday fixture with Chelsea 3-1.

Aston Villa F.C. were formed by cricketing enthusiasts of Villa Cross Wesleyan Chapel, Aston, Birmingham. They decided to form a football club during the winter of 1873-74. Football clubs were few and far between in the Birmingham area at the time and their first game against Aston Brook was played one half rugby and the other half soccer.

In 1876 they were joined by a Scottish football enthusiast George Ramsay who was immediately appointed captain and went on to lead Aston Villa from obscurity to one of the country's top clubs in a period of less than ten years.

The club won the First Division championship in 1894, 1896, 1897,1899, 1900, 1910 and 1981; the Division Two title in 1938 and 1960; the Third Division crown in 1972; the FA Cup in 1887, 1895, 1897, 1905, 1913, 1920 and 1957; the League Cup in 1961, 1975 and 1977, and the European Cup in 1982.

Ron Atkinson is the 15th post-war manager at Aston Villa, which includes such famous footballing names as Graham Taylor, Joe Mercer and Tommy Docherty.

Villa on Parade

NIGEL SPINK (goalkeeper) – Nigel is a one-man club who made his league debut v Nottingham Forest in 1979. After an impressive performance in the 1982 European Cup final, Nigel became first choice keeper for the next nine years. Understudy to former Town keeper Les Sealey for much of this season, Nigel has re-claimed his place, while Les has joined Coventry City on loan.

DARIUSZ KUBICKI (defender) – Dariusz joined Aston Villa from Legia Warsaw for £250,000 at the turn of the year. A Polish international, he has settled well in the English game and operates at right-back for both club and country.

BRYAN SMALL (defender) – Brian has been a regular feature in the Villa side of late after making his league debut at the turn of the year. Locally born, Bryan has progressed through the junior ranks at Villa Park and signed professional forms last year.

EARL BARRETT (defender) – Earl signed for Villa for a new club record fee of £1.7 million in February. He captained Oldham to their Second Division title win last term and gained his first full England cap against New Zealand last summer.

PAUL McGRATH (defender) – Paul, a regular midfielder for the Republic of Ireland, operates at centre-back for Villa. He started his career with Irish side St Patricks, before joining Manchester United in 1982. He went on to play in two FA Cup finals for United, establishing himself as one of the most competant defenders in the First Division. He signed for Villa in 1989 for £400.000.

SHAUN TEALE (defender) – Shaun, who joined Villa for £300,000 from Bournemouth last summer, was once a trainee with Everton. After failing to make the grade at Goodison Park, he dropped into non-league football, playing for Burscough, Southport, Northwich and Weymouth. A semi-professional England international, he joined Bournemouth for £50,000 in 1989.

STEVE STAUNTON (defender) – Steve took the difficult decision of leaving Liverpool last summer when Villa put in a £1.1 million bid for him. A regular in the Republic of Ireland side, Liverpool signed Steve from Dundalk in 1988 and he spent a period on loan at Bradford before establishing himself at Anfield.

UGO EHIOGU (defender) - Ugo was signed from neighbours West Bromwich Albion for £40,000 last summer. Though he played only twice in Albion's league side, he is tipped as having a bright future in the game, and has already featured in the Villa side on occasions this season.

KEVIN RICHARDSON (midfield) – Kevin started his career at Everton, making his debut v Sunderland in 1981. He went on to win championship and FA Cup honours at Goodison Park before joining Watford in 1986. A year later he joined Arsenal for £150,000 and was instrumental in Arsenal's championship season of 1988-89. He joined Real Sociedad in 1990 before returning home with Villa for £450,000 last summer.

MARK BLAKE (midfield) – Mark, a former Villa trainee, won a place in the England under-21 side shortly after making his debut for Villa two seasons ago. He has found it difficult to find a regular place in the side this season, but is still a regular under-21 international.

GARRY PARKER (midfield) – Garry, who joined Villa from Nottingham Forest for £550,000 last November, started his career here at Kenilworth Road. 42 appearances later, he joined Hull City and became an England under-21 international. Forest signed him for £250,000 in 1988.

TONY DALEY (midfield) – Tony, a former Villa trainee, made his debut v Southampton in 1985. He quickly earned England under-21 and B honours, before making his full debut v Poland last November. Tony has now made over 200 senior appearances for Aston Villa.

CYRILLE REGIS (forward) – Cyrille joined Villa from Coventry after he was given a free transfer from Highfield Road last summer. He started his league career with West Bromwich Albion in 1977 and also won the first of his five England appearances while with the Throstles. After joining Coventry for £300,000 in 1984, he was twice top-scorer and was a member of the Sky Blues' FA Cup winning side of 1987.

DWIGHT YORKE (forward) – Dwight, who has played for Trinidad and Tobago on more than 20 occasions, was signed from Trinidadian side Signal Hill for £120,000 in December 1989. The club's leading scorer at present, he has had a fine first season in the First Division.

DALIAN ATKINSON (forward) – Dalian re-joined manager Ron Atkinson last summer when he was transferred from Real Sociedad for £1.6 million. As Sheffield Wednesday's manager, it was Mr Atkinson who had sold Dalian to Real a year earlier. He started his career with Ipswich in 1986 before joining Wednesday for £450,000 in 1988.

IAN OLNEY (forward) – Ian is a Villa discovery who made his debut v Charlton in 1988. A player who has failed to gain a regular first team place in recent seasons, he is an England under-21 international.

STEPHEN FROGGATT (forward) – 18-year-old Stephen has been given his first team chance by Mr Atkinson this season and has made the most of this opportunity. He caught the nations eye with a spectacular goal against Swindon Town in this season's FA Cup.

Meet the Boss



RON ATKINSON

Born in Liverpool on March 18, 1939, Ron Atkinson started his footballing career as a teenager, playing non-league with BSA Tools.

Although the young wing-half was signed by Aston Villa in 1956, he never broke into the first team and was transferred to Oxford United in 1962. Ron enjoyed nine full seasons at the Manor Ground where he made 382 appearances and scored 12 goals.

After his playing career had ended, Ron joined Kettering as player/manager before taking the full managerial role at Cambridge United in November 1974. He led United to the Fourth Division title before joining West Bromwich Albion in January 1978.

He instilled style at West Brom, built around the likes of Laurie Cunningham, Tony Brown and Cyrille Regis. He restored this style to Manchester United after taking over from Dave Sexton in 1981.

While at Old Trafford, he established himself as one of the leading managers in world football, leading United to the FA Cup in 1983 and 1985, and the Charity Shield in 1983.

It was his failure to take the League Championship away from Merseyside that final led to his dismissal from Old Trafford, and in 1987 he returned to The Hawthorns to try and halt the downward spiral that was taking them into the basement of the Second Division.

Mr Atkinson gave up his struggle and moved to Spain with Atletico Madrid in 1988, but 94 days later he became a victim of bizarre chairman Jesus Gil's unpredictability and was sacked. He joined Sheffield Wednesday almost immediately and led the club to the Second Division title and the RumbelowsCup last season.

Last summer, he left Hillsborough in controversial circumstances and joined Aston Villa where he has gone on to create a new, exciting team, ready to push for honours next season...

Andy Petterson

With Alec Chamberlain, Steve Sutton and Mervyn Day all filling the Luton number one shirt this term, Andy Petterson felt that his chance of First Division football would also come this season. Events, however, have not gone as well as he would have liked, but nevertheless he remains optimistic and is more determined to make the break come August.

"With all the changes made in the goalkeeping position this year, I felt that I would be given the chance of playing first team football at some stage. The trouble was, that with the club struggling at the foot of the table, the manager opted for more experienced goalkeepers than myself, so I will just have to wait until next year.

"I feel that I have had a good season in the reserves and although I had to share my place with Alec while he was out of the team, I have made the spot my own. It is now up to me to continue the way I have played, through the pre-season games, and hopefully impress the manager come August."

Andy, who started his goalkeeping career in the minor leagues of Perth, Australia, has come a long way to persue his dream of becoming a professional footballer in England. After applying for a trial at Kenilworth Road in 1988, he was granted his wish and took the next available flight to England.

"I was playing football at the Australian Institute of Sport at the time. I had always wanted to become a goalkeeper and was, Australia's under-18's goalkeeper. 

VENUES NOW CHOSEN FOR WORLD CUP '94

We take our final look this season at the build-up to USA '94. now that the final nine stadia have been chosen to host the World Cup finals...

The 1994 World Cup finals competition in the United States will not be played in twelve stadia, as in Mexico in 1986 and Italy in 1990, but only in nine. Thus, two seeded teams will appear in each venue and the number of matches played in each venue will be raised to four instead of three as in the last two final

The FIFA Organising Committee came to this decision after lengthy discussions with the local organising committee for USA '94 (LOC). FIFA and LOC announced the following towns as the chosen venues in New York last month:

Boston: Foxboro Stadium, capacity - 61,000.

Chicago: Soldier Field, capacity - 66,814.

Dallas: Cotton Bowl, capacity - 72,000.

Detroit: Pontiac Silverdome (indoor arena), capacity - 82,000.

Los Angeles: Rose Bowl, capacity - 102,083.

New York/New Jersey: Giants Stadium. capacity - 76,891.

Orlando: Citrus Bowl, capacity - 70,188.

San Francisco: Stanford Stadium. capacity - 86,019.

Washington: R.F.Kennedy Stadium. 56,500

The actual fixtures of the competition will be determined by the FIFA Organising Committee on June 30 and, as a result of the new stadium configuration, the general public will benefit from a number of innovations. Not only will matches in one whole group be played in each venue, but at least one from another group as well. Consequently, every team will be made to play 'away' once.

Less travel, better quality

After analysing the two previous final competitions in Mexico and Italy, LOC and FIFA were of the opinion that the quality of matches at the individual venues would be heightened by a reduction in the number of stadia - teams would not have to travel as often therefore conserve energy. Not only that, the foreign fans and media representatives would also save not only time, but an awful lot of money as well.

LOC will, however, have to undertake various commitments. Natural turf will have to be tried out in the Silverdome in Detroit, while the Stanford Stadium in San Francisco will be subjected to extensive refurbishment. Also. three additional stadia must be determined as reserve alternatives in case one of the selected venues does not meet the requirements.

A first ever indoors

After a number of scientific reports and clarification of the medical situation, FIFA gave the go-ahead to have some group matches played in an indoor stadium. The one chosen is the Pontiac Silverdome in Detroit, with a capacity of 73,000 and with a canopy roof held aloft by slight internal atmospheric pressure.


In Detroit, and in the Giants Stadium in New York, the synthetic surfaces which are present must be covered with natural turf for the duration of the World Cup finals. FIFA will be keeping an eye on the experiment in the indoor arena in Detroit when the natural grass



When chosing the venues, FIFA declined to consider stadia which would have been available only partially and shared with baseball games. The Joe Robbie Stadium in Fort Lauderdale and Candlestick Park in San Francisco were disregarded for this very reason. Some of the stadia (Foxboro, Stanford, Dallas and the Rose Bowl) need to be refurbished and their amenities improved in order to comply with FIFA standards.

The rivalry amongst the prospective towns was intense right up to the moment the venues were announced. The following criteria tipped the scales for FIFA and LOC: the quality of presentation during FIFA's inspection, the strength of the local committee, the state and capacity of the stadium, the geographical location, the commitment of the local community to football and the future prospects for football

So far, neither the fixtures nor the location of the opening and final matches have been decided. The FIFA Organising Committee will be dealing with these matters in Zurich on June 30, and we will bring you further information on all the latest World Cup news




The venues for the 1994 World Cup finals in the United States.



The Last Time We Met...



With Mick Harford and David Preece out through injury and illness, the Town fielded six players aged 21 or under against a Villa side that had spent £4 million close season.

Despite the scoreline, Luton played attractive football, but lacked the punch in the box to convert a string of chances.

Alec Chamberlain did not have a shot to stop apart from the four goalscoring efforts, whilst at the other end Phil Gray hammered a penalty against the bar and Nigel Spink made two excellent saves.

Rennie rates among the Luton Town greats

uton Town have had some superb goalscorers over the years with Joe Payne, Gordon Turner, Malcolm Macdonald and Mick Harford to name but four, but many older supporters go misty-eyed over the mention of the talents of Andy Rennie who graced Kenilworth Road 60 years ago.

Rennie was born in Ballieston, Glasgow, in November 1903 and was initially a goalkeeper in his junior days reverting to centre-forward at which oosition he made his name with Paisley Waverley. His next club, Kilwinning Rangers, moved him back to centre-half and he was invited by Luton trainer Billy Barr to attend a month's trial at Kenilworth Road in 1925.

He played his first game in Town's colours against Millwall reserves at Kenilworth Road in the same month and put up such a good display at centre-half that he was signed immediately long before his trial period was up.

It was not long before he made his full league debut which came in a home game against Swindon on February 13, 1926 and he retained the number five shirt, remaining ever-present until the end of the season.

In 1926/27 he made 35 appearances, all at centre-half, and scored a solitary goal in the final home game of that season, in a 4-0 win against Bournemouth.

The following season saw him start at centre-half, then play a few games at centre-forward, then revert back to pivot whilst scoring eight goals in the process.

Due to the need to find a decent striking partner for Jimmy Yardley, it was decided to give Rennie a long run at centre-forward due to his obvious thirst for goals, and from that point on he never looked back. He hit the back of the net 20 times that season while wearing the number nine shirt.

Yardley was reduced to playing a 'bitpart' in 1928/29 as Rennie finished as the leading scorer in the Football League with a tremendous 43 goals from 41 starts, including five in an 8-0 thrashing of Gillingham at Kenilworth Road on April 13, 1929.

Rennie started off the following season in the same vein but an injury

suffered at Torquay – following a bad foul – kept him out of action for three months. On his return he took some time re-establishing himself in the scoring department, although he still finished as leading goalscorer for the third successive year.

Obviously, a marked man and fouled at every opportunity, he rarely resorted to retaliation himself, although he carried the nickname 'Ratty' with the Luton crowd because of his apparent surliness with his team mates, although nothing was further from the truth.

He was sent off only once, and when asked in later life what happened replied: "He thought I was scared of him and dared me to pull his nose. So I did". It must have been a fair old thump as it was extremely rare to get sent off in those days and such events were always headline news.

Because he was finding goals slightly harder to come by, Rennie was eventually moved to the inside-left position, but he still weighed in with his fair quota, most of which he scored with his left foot from outside the box with great power.

Andy Rennie made his final league appearance in a 1-0 defeat at Reading on December 1, 1934. He was invited to turn out for several clubs after his registration was not retained by Luton, but decided to hang up his boots and take a job at JW Greens brewery, thus ending a career that saw him score 147 goals in 307 league appearances. A remarkable figure when it is realised that his first 50 appearances only produced one goal.

Sadly, Rennie did not live long after retiring from football, for in September 1938, he developed pneumonia following a routine hernia operation and died, leaving a widow and two young daughters.

Although the tales get embellished with the re-telling – certainly my late grandfather used to talk of Rennie "swinging his left leg from the hip" – there does remain a famous photograph taken from behind the Kenilworth Road goal during a game against Coventry in 1928, showing Rennie scoring the equaliser in a 1-1 draw. He is on the edge of the area running in, with the ball already in the back of the net!

Did you know?

The first time we met Aston Villa in the league followed our promotion to Division Two in 1937/38. In the home game, the first of the season at Kenilworth Road, we won a thrilling game 3-2, but were brought back to earth with a bump in losing 4-1 at Villa Park the following week in the return.

It happened five years ago:-

25/4/87 – In drawing 0-0 at home to Sheffield Wednesday, the Town dropped down to fifth position in Division One.

It happened ten years ago:-


24/4/82 – In a game that Rotherham needed to win to stand any chance of promotion, the score was finely poised at 2-2 when the home side were awarded a last minute penalty which was saved by Luton keeper Alan Judge.

It happened 15 years ago:-

23/4/77 – After five games without a victory, it was back to winning ways with Notts County going down 4-2 at Kenilworth Road. Ron Futcher with two, Ricky Hill and on-loan striker David Geddis were on target, watched by a crowd of 9,585.

It happened 20 years ago:-

22/4/72 – The Town were involved in a 0-0 bore draw at home to Bristol City in front of a crowd of 8 329



What a marvellous, memorable decade

ere we are again, finger nails chewed, nerves twitching and transfixed by tension as we go into the last 90 minutes of home action. Can you remember any season at Kenilworth Road when it was not this way?

It has never been easy street supporting Luton Town and it would certainly be dull if it was At least we all have something to think and talk about in the closing stages of each campaign.

Personally, I am not one for too many permutations – though I could not resist the opportunity last weekend to spend nearly two hours calculating and re-calculating our chances of escaping again If, but, maybe, perhaps . . . and what about the other team's results?

Sometimes, it is a good idea just to stop and consider a few broader views. Take, for example, the fact that this match this afternoon against Aston Villa completes a wonderful, fabulous and wholly unprecedented spell of 10 magnificent years in the First Division.

That is some achievement. It has been the most consistently successful era in the club's history. I still remember vividly that night in 1982 when we danced on the pitch like true Mad Hatters to celebrate promotion, when Nobby grinned and sprayed champagne and the players waved from the balcony in the main stand.

I still recall the day nine years ago when all eyes and ears were on Maine Road where David Pleat jigged that famous hop-skip-hop at the end of the most draining, emotional week of all. Endure that and you can handle anything.

And then there was Villa Park and the FA Cup semi-final against Everton in 1985, the stunning disappointment of extra-time; the efficient highly-positioned league seasons that followed; and the magic of three trips to Wembley finals including that last-gasp 1988 Littlewoods win over Arsenal.

Okay, things may have changed a bit since then, but the excitement has continued. There is no doubt about that. Now, we are at the other end of

the table and scrapping for survival – I do not need to recall the Baseball Ground two years ago in detail today – it is just as satisfying to succeed as it was

when honours were there within reach.

My only concern over the years has been that we have all become so accustomed to the First Division and regular visits from the big clubs that we now take it for granted. Complacency is always an enemy and can creep on anyone, even unexpectedly.

There are young fans here today who, almost certainly, will not remember anything but home programmes against Aston Villa, Manchester United, Tottenham Hotspur and Arsenal. That, in itself, is a fantastic achievement for Luton Town.

So, as we look forward to our final 90 minutes of action in the old-style First Division, let us celebrate this achievement – and look forward to another decade of life at the top.

Keeping track – your day-by-day football diary

Apr 8 – Out-of-favour striker Alan Smith turns down a new contract with Arsenal....Brentford manager Phil Holder signs a new two-year at Griffin Park.....In Division One, Coventry and Sheffield Wednesday draw 0-0, Liverpool lose at home to Wimbledon 3-2 while Arsenal beat Norwich 3-1 at Carrow Road.

Apr 9 – Chelsea chairman Ken Bates is instated as major shareholder of Cabra Estates, therefore securing Chelsea's future at Stamford Bridge.....Dundee sign midfielder Max Christie from Meadowbank Thistle for £60,000.

Apr 11 – The Town go down 5-1 away to Oldham, but fellow strugglers Coventry also lose at Notts County...Leeds United keep the pressure on Manchester United at the top of Division One with a 3-0 win against Chelsea at Elland Road...Liverpool lose their fifth league game in eight, after they are defeated 1-0 at Aston Villa....Paul Merson scores a hat-trick to help Arsenal extend their unbeaten run to 13 after beating Crystal Palace 4-1 at Highbury....In Scotland, Rangers take a step closer to the Premier League title a 2-1 win at Dundee United.

Apr 12 – Manchester United win the Rumbelows Cup at Wembley, beating Nottingham Forest, thanks to a solitary Brian McClair strike in the first half.....UEFA confirm that the ClS and Yugoslavia will definitely take part in the European Championship Finals....Darko Pancev netted a hat-trick for Red Star Belgrade against Sarajevo to make him Yugoslavia's joint all-time second highest goalscorer with 167 goals.

A 4-1 defeat at Brentford resigns them to Fourth Division football next season....Rangers are the champions in Scotland after beating St Mirren 4-0. It is their fifth title in six years.

Apr 19 – 84,000 fans see AC Milan beat rivals Internazionale 1-0 thanks to a 89th minute Daniele Massaro goal. Milan are now six points clear at the top of Serie A after Juventus could only draw 1-1 at Roma....In France, Marseille virtually confirm their fourth successive title after beating their closest rivals Monaco 3-0.


