# 'THIS **FIRST** LOCAL **DERBY**



THAVE played in a lot of local derbies, as you can imagine, but as manager of Watford, this is my first experience of the traditional rivalry between ourselves and Luton Town.

Being realistic, tonight's game does not see the resumption of the twice-yearly League encounters, but nevertheless does give us a chance to test ourselves against one of the sides who came down from what was Division One last season.

Arguably for different reasons to ourselves, but Luton appear to be going through a rebuilding phase that we have also had to pursue in recent seasons - a phase which still continues.

It was for that reason that I was not at our game last Saturday, as you will probably have read in Sunday's papers. With Joe McLaughlin going and Andy Kennedy possibly on the move, there is leeway to

strengthen the squad - and I went to take the last look I could at a potential new purchase. That doesn't mean I'll definitely go into the market, but the timing was such that this player had to be watched on a Saturday - as opposed to a midweek match.

As I'm sure David Pleat would agree, the competition for players to strengthen your squad is extremely keen, so you have to be prepared to move quickly. Luton themselves have seen some experienced players move on, and have sold a couple, so they are in the recruiting market - if not from outside, then by bringing youngsters through, much as we do.

Turning to tonight, it's clear that we must win - and score goals. Quite what happens if we win 1-0 tonight and then Luton beat Bristol City 1-0 I don't know. Has any

got a three-sided coin?

The incentive from tonight is very alluring - the chance to play against very good quality Italian sides. Anyone who's been watching Italian football on TV this season will have seen the kind of skills on show. There's no reason to think Italian Second Division football is far behind those levels and the later stages of tonight's competition will throw up some very attractive ties - and

Let's hope, and work towards, playing our part in those stages.

## COMPETITION

#### AN OLD IDEA BUT A NEW **FORMAT AS THE ANGLO-**ITALIAN CUP RETURNS— WITH ALL 24 FIRST **DIVISION SIDES STILL IN** WITH A CHANCE OF **CATCHING A 'PLANE TO ITALY FOR PHASE TWO**

11 24 Barclays League First Division sides are still in contention for the eight qualifying places after the first round of matches in the newly-formed Anglo-Italian Cup.

Only one club from each of the eight groups progresses to the international stage of the competition, where all qualifiers will face four different sides from the Italian League - two matches at home and two in Italy.

Although the usual formula of three points for a win applies in the Preliminary Round, if clubs finish level on points, the qualifying criteria is goals scored rather than goal difference. That's in line with the format that applies in the Barclays League this season.

So the accent is on getting forward and getting goals. But the real attraction of tonight's competition is the chance to take on Italian opposition and make at least two trips to Italy.

The Italian club have already held their qualifying stage and the eight sides awaiting the eight English qualifiers are all shown on the map opposite.

They are: Bari, Cremonese, Ascoli, Pisa, Cesena, Reggiana, Cosenza and Lucchese.

Once the eight English qualifiers are known, they will be split in half, with four English sides playing four Italian sides in two Leagues. The top English side in one table will play the top English side in the



other table, with the top Italian sides also playing each other - both matches being two-legged. This will ensure an Anglo-Italian Final, which is to be a once-off game at a neutral venue in England on Sunday March 28 1993.

The progress of the Anglo-Italian Cup will be monitored closely both here and in Italy. Here because it will give us all a chance to see how our sides fare against Italian sides, and in Italy because the Italian League is considering introducing three-points-for-awin—this competition will allow the idea to be studied in action.

Of the eight Italian sides awaiting British opposition, Ascoli, Pisa and Cesena have all played Italian First Division football in the last two years, while Bari's San Nicola Stadium hosted the England v. Italy World Cup third-place play-off in 1990.

Bari was David Platt's former club before he signed for Juventus, while Arsenal's Anders Limpar made his name in Italy with Cremonese.

# OLIVER PHILLIPS TRACKS BACK THROUGH PREVIOUS CUP CLASHES BETWEEN THE HORNETS AND HATTERS

I WAS a little surprised when statistician Trefor Jones unearthed the names of **Billy Flint, William Wheeler** and **Fred Palmer**.

I had never heard of them before but those old, long-dead Watford players shared a distinction in the history of Watford-Luton cup clashes. They share it even now, along with the better-known names of Charlie White, Tommy Barnett, George James, Arthur Wooliscroft, John Barnes, Nigel Callaghan, George Reilly and Mo' Johnston.

The fact is, that in 17 cup ties between the rivals, Watford have only won four of them and those 11 players scored in those rare Watford victories.

The Hatters have afforded us some considerable cup discomfort down the years. We drew our first FA Cup meeting at Luton back in 1898, lost the replay and then the Bedfordshire men dispatched us from the competition three more times by 1903.

In 1909, we gained our first revenge although, truth to tell, this was not an FA Cup tie but rather the Southern Charity Cup, the Southern League Cup competition. Still, they all count, particularly after four cup exits!

So Palmer and White gave Watford their first cup success over Luton in this competition back in 1909 and then the two Billy's, Flint and Wheeler ousted the Hatters from the competition again a year later.

Luton's revenge was swift and repeated, showing us the FA Cup door in 1911, 1913 and 1914.

Our first-ever FA Cup success over the Hatters was achieved in 1930 at Vicarage Road with **Barnett, James** and **Wooliscroft** giving us a 3-1 success.

From then on our cup and League paths parted to such a degree that a friendly competition was arranged between the two teams and played sporadically for the Rigby Taylor Cup, but this did not really count as a serious cup competition.

So our proper Cup meetings were adjourned for 38 years until 1968 when the Hornets went down 3-0 at Kenilworth Road in the League Cup. At the end of the season we gained the consolation of pipping the Hatters to promotion to Division 2.

And so to the most memorable Cup tie saga of recent times came in 1984. The first tie saw the Hornets attacking down the slope at Kenilworth Road and playing well but, after 26 minutes they were two goals down. **David Bardsley** deflected a Nwajoiba shot into his own net and then Brian Stein's shot looped off **Steve Sims** and into the net

Watford hit back with Barnes' free kick taking a deflecting off Horton and a rash tackle by Stephens on Barnes gave **Mo Johnston**, who Mr Graham Taylor insisted upon referring to as Maurice, the chance to equalise from the spot.

A total of 20,586 for the replay at Vicarage Road witnessed a real thriller. "At times Luton played the best football they have ever produced against us," said the manager.

Callaghan with a sweet shot over Seeley gave the Hornets a 4th-minute lead; Reilly flicked a Callaghan corner over the keeper after 28 minutes and Luton bounced back with a fine strike from Mal Donaghy just before the interval.

In the 50th minute, **Barnes** sent a blistering shot into the Luton net to make it 3-1. But again Luton came back with Paul Walsh reducing the arrears from close in after Stein had intercepted a **Paul Franklin** back-pass and Walsh soon struck again to equalise with a fine solo goal to crown Luton's purple patch.

At 3-3 and extra time underway, fitness told with Watford taking control. In the 108th minute, Callaghan's corner was flicked on at the near post by Barnes and **Johnston** was there to score the winner.

Watford went on to the FA Cup Final that year, but the matches against Luton and later against Birmingham were the classics of the season.

The following year, Luton reversed the defeat in a three-match saga which saw Watford draw the opening tie at Kenilworth Road and again lose a two-goal lead in the replay. Les Taylor and SteveTerry put them ahead but David Pleat's side came back to equalise in the last 14 minutes. The second replay was a tense affair and Luton won it with Turner's goal.

Whatever the result tonight, I think fans on both sides would settle for the style and thrills of that 4-3 classic from 1984.

noted for brotherly love, and it'll be interesting to see how much is in evidence if Watford's Lee Nogan and his younger brother Kurt line up on opposite sides tonight.

"It may not happen, as Kurt hasn't played in Luton's first team this season. But he has been in the senior squad for recent matches," says 23-year-old Lee. "At present he's on a week-toweek contract.

"I'm 16 months older than Kurt and we're both strikers. But we've only played against each other once. That was in a reserve game a few seasons ago, when I was at Oxford. We won 2-1 as I recall and I scored.

"There's a friendly rivalry between us and we're similar types of player, although Kurt is a bit taller than me.

"Our biggest moment together was playing for the Wales' under-21 side two seasons ago against England at Tranmere Rovers, a game that ended goalless. That was my only under-21 cap, but Kurt won a few more and has played in the 'B' side."

So what brought two young lads from Cardiff to Oxford United and Luton respectively as youth trainees?

"Our local sides, Swansea, Newport and Cardiff, didn't really have strong youth teams when we were coming through, so scouts from English-based clubs spotted us. We were asked for trials at Luton—Kurt was taken on as a 14-year-old schoolboy but I wasn't. However, when I was 16, Oxford United offered me a traineeship and of course I jumped at the chance.

Wales then - I'm sure there still is. From my time there, players like Mark Pembridge (now with Derby County) and Jason Rees, who could play tonight, came to Luton—and Andrew Melville played for Cardiff before joining Oxford."

Lee's M40 move from Oxford to Watford came last season—in time to play his part in the Hornets climb up the table in the second half of the campaian.

"The previous season, I had been in the Oxford side that also leapt up the table after Christmas," Lee recalls. "Watford fans won't need reminding that the first game we lost in a long unbeaten run was at home to the Hornets in May—a win that ensured Watford stayed in Division Two, as it was then.

"Now at Watford, we've had a fairly solid start and if we can be there or thereabouts at Christmas, we'll have a good base with which to push into the new year. I'm happy to be playing my part in the team at present, but I would like to get on the scoresheet more often.

"Right now however, we need to win tonight's game to stand any chance of playing against Italian clubs. That's a real incentive, but all we can do tonight is win and hope the right result happens for us when Luton play Bristol City. I felt we deserved a draw out of our game against 'City, but a goal ten minutes from time means we've still go it all to do."

WE FACE . . .

UTON, who have made a bitterly disappointing start in the First division, come to Vicarage Road seeking some Cup relief this evening.

Relegated from the old First Division in May, the Hatters could be facing a major rebuilding programme. Like many other clubs, the Hatters have been forced to sell players in order to survive. So, though many supporters were disappointed at the recent departure of Mark Pembridge to Derby and Mick Harford to Chelsea, the £1.5-million banked from those sales was needed to balance the budget.

A small amount was re-invested in the signing of striker Steve Claridge from Cambridge. The tribunal set a fee

of £160,000 which could turn out to be a bargain if Claridge continued to score at the

rate of about a dozen goals per season as he did for Cambridge.

Claridge has been lining up with Phil Gray and Jason Rees in attack but Jamie Campbell is another contender here. Scott Oakes, Darren Salton and David Preece have been holding midfield positions but Chris Kamara and Ceri Hughes are also in line for selection.

The defence was unchanged for early games with Trevor Peake partnering John Dreyer in the centre whilst Des Linton and Julian James have filled the full-back spots. Marvin Johnson has been included as substitute. Andy Petterson has taken over in



# **RARE**

Treats... Collectable programmes between today's opponents



In the 1950's Watford met Luton Town on an annual basis for the Rigby Taylor Cup, named after the then Chairman at Vicarage Road.

For the game in January 1957 Watford produced a full 12-page programme priced at 6d., welcoming the First Division visitors to Vicarage Road in the editorial column.

A report on the previous week's 5-0 demolition of Newport County was followed by a vehement attack on football journalists, some of whom, according to the writer "had very little football experience and are doing their best to ruin the game by their sensational articles".

Less controversially, Pen Pictures of the Hatters and

Watford Manager Neil McBain's column preceded the team line-ups in the centre pages. One advert on this page announced "bee-oot-i-ful" Sunny Spread Honey at 10<sup>1</sup>/2d a jar (less than 5p) while another offered a trip to Brighton or Hove from Watford Junction at 12/3 (just over 60p).

Although Watford were 2—1 up at the break through Tommy Anderson and Peter Walker Luton eventually won 4-3. McCleod equalised and then put the visitors in the lead after Pearce's opener before Turner notched the Hatters' fourth with a penalty. Watford's third was also a spot kick from Johnny Meadows on 89 minutes.



#### **ONLY A GOOD** WIN WILL DO

OUR 1-0 defeat at Bristol City in tonight's competition a fortnight ago means we must win tonight-and then hope Luton beat 'City when the two sides meet in two weeks' time at Kenilworth Road.

#### 'LIVE' ON TV?




