





ast Saturday's 1-1 draw with Millwall was very encouraging and a result to build on, as we welcome our close friends and rivals from Watford this afternoon.



Wolves move back into the promotion picture



NEWS ON ONE

Tolverhampton Wanderers moved into the top six in Division One last Sunday with a 2-1 victory against a Charlton Athletic side who have now lost an alarming seven of their last ten matches.

23-year-old signing Darren Roberts grabbed the headlines for Wolves as he scored the winning goal to cap a fine individual performance, following his £20,000 move from non-league Burton Albion. Deputising for the injured Andy Mutch, Roberts drilled in a close-range shot in the 47th minute to help Wolves to their seventh league victory of the season. "It is now up to Darren to continue his form and keep his place in the team," said team mate Paul Birch. "He took his goal very well today and it is pleasing to know we have quality strikers to lift us into the Premier League."

Also pushing for a place in the top flight are West Ham United. Following an indifferent spell of late, the Hammers won a thrilling encounter with Oxford United 5-3 in a game which had both managers smiling at the end. "That sort of game could give you a heart attack," said Hammers boss Billy Bonds. "It was a great match, but no good for the nerves." Oxford manager Brian Horton followed those sentiments. He said: "It was a great game. I enjoyed every moment of it - except for when the ball went in our net."

Another high-scoring encounter saw Portsmouth put four goals past struggling Bristol Rovers. Pompey fielded on-loan midfielder Steve Agnew from Blackburn Rovers and manager Jim Smith has obviously been delighted with what he has

seen so far. "There is a very serious chance of me buying him," he said. "Everything he did was spot on. With his very first touch he got into the box and showed great composure - everything." Whittingham netted his 21st goal of the season for Pompey. Former Hatters Paul Walsh and Ray Daniel scored along with Alan Mcloughlin, in a victory which moved the south coast club up to ninth in the table.

Two more former Town players on the scoresheet at the weekend were Steve Claridge and Steve Thompson. Both hit the target in the same match as Leicester drew 2-2 at home with Cambridge United in front of 12.175 fans at Filbert Street.

Grimsby Town's 3-1 victory at Brentford marked the end of Dave Beasant's six-match loan spell with the Humberside club. In his

month at Blundell Park, Beasant has regained the confidence that was so evidently lacking earlier in the season at Chelsea, although he admits the future remains clouded. He said: "I have thoroughly enjoyed myself at Grimsby and have helped the club put together a nice little run. Now it is time for me to go back to Chelsea and see what happens back there."

While the Mariners moved into seventh place in the division with their third successive away victory, Newcastle extended their lead to 11 points with a 2-0 win over today's visitors Watford, who had Gerard Lavin sent-off. Gavin Peacock, Newcastle captain, said that tactics have played a major part in the team's success this season. "We keep changing things around tactically to keep other teams thinking," he said. "This way we try to keep one step ahead."







Hornets looking to reverse score on old rivals



WATFORD F.C. 1992-93

- Watford visit Kenilworth Road for their first league encounter with the Town since May 2, 1988 when the Hatters won a closely-fought encounter 2-1 thanks to goals from David Oldfield and a Danny Wilson penalty.
- Much has changed at both clubs since that First Division encounter, with both suffering the fate of relegation and an overhaul of playing staff and management. Today, former Tottenham Hotspur stalwart Steve Perryman is in control of a Vicarage Road side that has consolidated its position as a leading First Division club. Last season Mr Perryman's first full term in charge the Hornets finished a very respectable 10th after an end of season flourish which saw the side lose only one of their final 12 matches, which included eight victories.
- Hoping to build on that success, events have not gone as well as the Hornets would have liked this season and at the time of writing, the club are 14th in the First Division table with six wins and seven defeats. Victories have come at home against

Millwall (3-1), Bristol Rovers (4-2), Tranmere (3-2) and Sunderland (2-1) and at Notts County (2-1) and Barnsley (1-0).

- Despite their position, Watford's 25 league goals make them one of the division's leading goalscorers this season. Paul Furlong and Lee Nogan can take much of the credit for this as they have been scoring consistently all season. It is clear that Mr Perryman has made attacking a major priority this season and has also acquired the signatures of forwards Ken Charlery from Peterborough and Roger Willis from Barnet to keep his front pairing on their toes.
- Watford F.C. were formed as Watford Rovers in 1891. They started in the Southern League before joining the Football League in 1920. Success for the Hertfordshire club has been limited, winning the Division Three championship in 1969 and the Fourth Division title in 1978. The club's best season came in 1982/83 when, under Graham Taylor, they finished runners-up to Liverpool in their initial season in the top flight.

PERRY SUCKLING (goalkeeper) – A contractual agreement with his former club Crystal Palace meant that Watford were able to obtain the services of Perry on a free transfer in July. An England under-21 international, he has also served Manchester City.

BARRY ASHBY (defender) – A product of Watford's youth team, Barry was a member of the side which won the FA Youth Cup in 1988. Since then he has been elevated to professional status and although only 21, he has played over 50 first team games.

JASON DRYSDALE (defender) – Jason has made the number three shirt his own since breaking into the first team two years ago. A graduate of the FA School of Excellence, he has also been used as a winger on occasions. Jason is a former England youth international.

KEITH DUBLIN (defender) – Keith has played in every position across the backline since his arrival at Vicarage Road from Brighton in 1990. A former England youth international, he started his career with Chelsea but had, ironically, trained with Watford as a schoolboy.

DAVID HOLDSWORTH (defender) – Another former England youth player who has progressed through the junior ranks at Watford, David signed as a professional with his twin brother Dean, who is now at Wimbledon. He is approaching his 150th appearance for the Hornets.

TREVOR PUTNEY (defender/midfield) – Currently wearing the number two shirt for Watford, Trevor has proved a useful acquisition since joining the club from Middlesbrough for £100,000 last season. He started his career at Ipswich Town and has also represented Norwich City.

ANDY HESSENTHALER (midfield) – Ándy has made a smooth transition into the professional game since signing for Watford from non-league

Redbridge Forest for £65,000 in 1991. He capped his first season at Vicarage Road with the runner-up spot in the Player-of-the-Year awards.

spot in the Player-of-the-Year awards.

GERARD LAVIN (midfield) – A first-year professional, Gerard made his debut as a youth trainee last season, coming on as substitute in the 1-0 home win over FA Cup finalists Sunderland in March. He is used on the right side of midfield and is also employed as a winger

employed as a winger.

GARY PORTER (midfield) – Regular appearances this season will take Gary past the 300 appearance mark for Watford. A former England youth and under-21 international, he was signed as a schoolboy, making his debut for the Hornets in 1985.

LEE NOGAN (forward) – Lee joined Watford from Oxford midway through last season for £250,000. He was injured on his debut, but returned to the side to play a part in the side's climb up the table to tenth place. This season he has formed a useful partnership with Paul Furlong.

ROGER WILLIS (forward) – Roger joined Watford from neighbours Barnet for £175,000 in early October in the first-ever transfer between Hertfordshire's only professional clubs. Roger was signed by Barnet from Grimsby in 1989 and can play anywhere across the front line.

KEN CHARLERY (forward) – Watford's most recent recruit, Ken came to Vicarage Road from Peterborough for £350,000 last month. He started his career with non-league Becton, before joining Basildon and Fisher en route to Maidstone United. He joined Posh in 1991 for £20,000.

PAUL FURLONG (forward) – Currently Watford's leading goalscorer, Paul was a pre-season signing from Coventry City for £250,000. He previously played for non-league Enfield Town when Watford assistant boss Peter Taylor was manager and joined the Sky Blues for £130,000.

BACK TRACKING BY ROGER WASH

lthough in recent times both David Pleat and Graham Taylor have made attempts to defuse any nasty side to the healthy rivalry that exists between Luton and Watford, this was certainly not the case when four meetings in 1968/69 culminated in a game that will remain in the memory for all the wrong reasons.

The Town and Watford had not met for four seasons. but it seemed like a lifetime. The Hornets were a strong side, but we were on the crest of a wave fresh from the Fourth Division championship and an early season 'flexing of the muscles' in a League Cup tie which was seen as a solid test.

A Kenilworth Road crowd of 20.167 saw a fast, furious and bruising clash which the Town won 3-0. New signings Brian Lewis and Mike

Harrison were heavily involved in proceedings, scoring all the goals but rather ominously, as can be seen later. Lewis obtained a penalty via one of his famous 'collapses' in the area, much to the annovance of the Watford defence.

Watford manager Ken Furphy commented afterwards. "It is impossible to play football on a ground as small as this." Allan Brown meanwhile was not happy with the Watford tackling.

The first League meeting took place in early October with the Town sitting pretty at the top of the table. A crowd of 22,176 at Vicarage Road witnessed a game that was over before it had really started, with Roy Low scoring for Watford in the second minute. Despite a lot of second half pressure, the Town did not really look like equal-

The return was due to be played on Boxing Day, but a frozen pitch meant that the fixture was re-scheduled for February. This time a crowd of 21,143 turned up on a freezing cold night to witness 21 players slipping and sliding around. The 22nd, Keith Allen, as he had proved before, was somehow able to keep his balance and turned in a tremendous performance which unluckily did not produce a goal.

Goals were scored, however, with Barry Endean netting for Watford after 32 minutes and Fred Jardine hitting the equaliser just before half-time. Snow, which had started to fall before kick-off, developed into a blizzard and with the referee unable to keep his lines clear, abandoned the match after an hour.

The final act in the saga took place at Kenilworth Road at the end of April. By this time. Watford were already assured of promotion and needed one point for the championship while the Town needed to win to keep alive the faint hope of overhauling Swindon Town for the other promotion place.

A crowd of 25,523, the best for nine years, gathered, but long before the start of the the pitch and soon after ment!

The tension filtered through to the pitch and another bonejarring encounter was the result. The coolest man on the pitch was Ian Buxton, making his final appearance for the Town, who opened the scoring after 30 minutes.

The start of the second-half was delayed while fighting supporters were cleared from

Endean and Alan Slough were sent off for wrestling. Luton's second, scored by Keith Allen, was the signal for a pitch invasion with more of the same when Stewart Scullion netted a late consolation. In amongst all this. Tom Walley was sent off for kicking Lewis - fully iustified retaliation said the Watford press recalling past encounters.

"A brutal, bloody and belligerent night," said Luton manager Alec Stock.

A HATTER AND **A HORNET**

Peter Nicholas joined Crystal Palace from school in Newport, making his debut on the opening day of the 1977/78 season when only 17.

The following season saw Palace win the Second Division championship with Nicholas virtually ever-present, but just as they were finding their feet they were unfortunately dubbed "Team of the Eighties" and relegation soon followed.

Nicholas escaped the relegation, however, as he was transferred to Arsenal for £400,000 in March 1981 but a series of injuries meant his stay there was not a happy one.

In order to preserve his Welsh International place and retain the captaincy Nicholas, needing regular football, rejoined Palace and then came to Luton in January 1985 to form part of the Town's mid-season shake up which saw relegation fears become a bad memory.

After two superb seasons a shock bid from Aberdeen for his signature was accepted, but due to family illness he returned to London with Chelsea before finishing his playing days at Vicarage Road.

Peter is now back at Stamford Bridge as youth team coach.

Ian Buxton made his final appearance for the Town against the Hornets in 1969.




