MANAGER'S VIEWPOINT BY DAVID PLEAT

Welcome to our friends from Derby County for this attractive F.A. Cup fourth round game. Although the two postponements of the Bristol City tie have meant very little time for preparation, I am hopeful our supporters will have responded and we can achieve a crowd approaching 10,000.

Our game on Tuesday night was a tough one, but I feel that we fully deserved to progress. Being one of only two major fixtures on the evening, there were a host of club representatives present. In fact, one of our many blue jacketed stewards was heard to say: "that we have half the ex-England team here tonight". Present were Glenn Hoddle from Swindon, Kevin Keegan from Newcastle, Peter Shilton from Plymouth and Gerry Francis from Q.P.R.

I am sure the half-time conversations would have intrigued many football supporters. Also watching were the experienced and outstanding older managers, now assistants, Ron Suart of Wimbledon and Jimmy Sirrell of Derby, who are both marvellous football people.

Last Sunday, I was fortunate enough to be a guest at a dinner to mark the finest post-war manager, Brian Clough. It was a lovely evening and it is highly merited that one of the press's greatest antagonists should receive their accolade. Brian Clough, of course, has achieved what no other man will ever do in

soccer, winning two Football League Championships with separate middle-of-the-road clubs. Of course, many years ago Herbert Chapman also achieved this feat. Now with the media money being attracted to the

biggest clubs in the Premier League, the future championship winners can only realistically come from one of half a dozen clubs.

We are hoping that we are all fit for this afternoon's game. Our new and welcome physiotherapist, Andy McDade, worked overtime this week to enable Julian James and Phil Gray to get fit for the Bristol game. We kept Gray's knock a guarded secret, but did not attempt to hide the fact that Julian would not make the game. It is to the player's credit that he battled through after being carried off against Notts County. On Tuesday, we

had further knocks and once again, the treatment room has been busy.

It is only right and proper to record our sincere thanks to Barry Fry, the Barnet manager, for allowing Andy to join us without compensation and with immediate effect. Barry is one of those larger-than-life characters who just wants people that have worked with him to progress.

Last Tuesday, we played a further reserve match at Leighton Town F.C. and a very young group were defeated 3-0. Arsenal included the likes of Paul Davis, Andy Linighan and Jimmy Carter, but these experiences can only give the younger element an insight into the standard required.

Soon we will be hosts to the England and San Marino under-21's sides and I shall be speaking to Lawrie McMenemy in the next few days to recommend one of our players for consideration in the squad. Looking

around our first team, most of the younger element have qualified elsewhere; Telfer has been in the Scotland under-21 squad, as has Darren Salton, whilst Phil Gray is Irish. Jason Rees and Ceri Hughes will today be renewing their friendship and competing with 'our' other Welshman, Mark Pembroke. All have Welsh under-21 caps.

Enjoy the game.

No talk of promotion yet on Tyneside

NEWS ON ONE

Newcastle United are currently 14 points clear of their nearest rivals Tranmere Rovers in the race for the First Division championship. However, nobody within the walls of St James' Park is taking promotion as a foregone conclusion.

Last Saturday, two goals from Robert Lee and one from David Kelly secured all three points as the Magpies defeated Peterborough United 3-0 on Tyneside. A crowd of 29,155 was the biggest in Britain and showed Newcastle are geared towards Premier League football next season.

Everybody expects Newcastle to be in the top-flight next term, although the players are not taking anything for granted. "Manchester United are the perfect examples of what can go wrong," said Kelly. "They looked to have the title wrapped up last season, but blew it. Everyone is saying we are so far ahead and are certainties to go up, but the players don't talk about it. We are happy to leave that to the manager."

Magpies' manager Kevin Keegan took a similar line, saying: "It's crazy to look ahead. Our only target is to take three points from our next league game."

Despite their 2-0 defeat at West Ham United last week, Portsmouth have pushed their way back into contention thanks to the goalscoring exploits of striker Guy Whittingham. The former army P.E. instructor has scored 30 league and cup goals this season. In contrast, his Pompey team mate Paul Walsh, who went to Fratton Park in the summer as part of the deal which took Darren Anderton to Spurs, has had a frustrating time with illness and injuries. Walsh, however, is the first to acknowledge the talents of Whittingham: "Guy has done tremendously well. I'd only wish

he'd let me have a few of his goals. I've struggled this season for goals and there have been many times when I've wished he could hand me one or two. Guy is a class striker and one of the best players I have worked with."

Charlton Athletic continued their sequence of games drawn with a creditable 2-2 draw at Swindon. No doubt lifted by their return to The Valley, Addicks co-boss Alan Curbishley believes that his side will net a bag full soon. "There is a lot of character in my side," he stated. "I sometimes don't know where they get the energy from. My players just keep coming back right to the whistle. There have been games when we let it slip, but sooner or later we're going to get in the lead and go on to give some team a good thumping."

Notts County have parted company with their manager Neil Warnock following a poor start to

the season which has left County at the foot of the table. Warnock arrived from Scarborough in January 1989 after leading them into the Football League. Warnock's arrival resulted in three years of success for County which included promotion from the Third to the First Division and two Wembley finals. Warnock responded to an approach by Chelsea last season by stating his loyalty to the club, but following relegation in May, the County board have felt unable to show the same loyalty.

Attendances in the First Division have increased to an average of 10,180 but still remain down on last season's average of 10,502. This is consistent with the rest of the League, including the Premier League with only the Second Division showing an increase in gates.

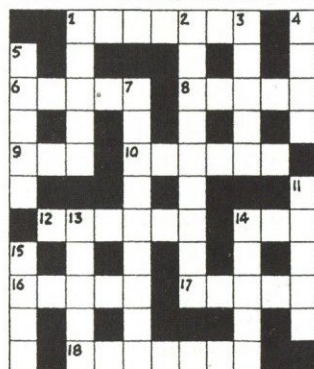

Cup run needed to revive Rams' inconsistent season



DERBY COUNTY F.C. 1992-93

■ Despite the fact that over £10 million has been spent on improving the side, Derby County have failed to live up to the expectations placed on them this season. With sound financial backing from majority shareholder Lionel Pickering, the Rams have assembled a side strong enough to challenge for the game's top honours.

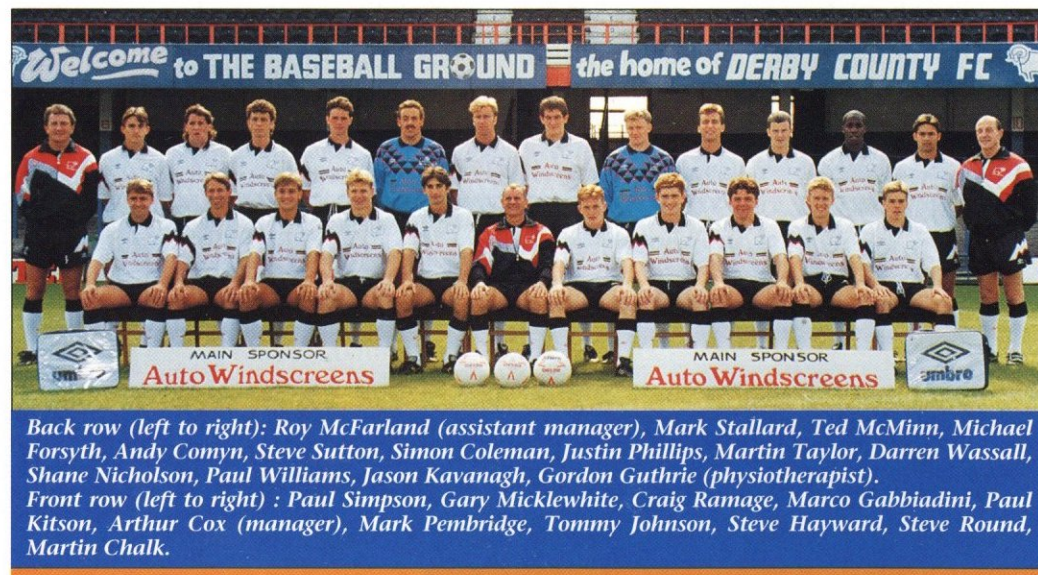
■ With the likes of Mark Pembridge, Marco Gabbiadini, Craig Short, Tommy Johnson and Paul Kitson all displaying their talents at the Baseball Ground this season, the tag of 'favourites' appeared to be more than justified. However, events have not gone according to plan. Defeat on the first day of the season was the beginning of a seven game run without a win, including defeats against Newcastle (1-2), Leicester (2-3) and Bristol City (3-4).

■ Despite a slight upturn in fortunes throughout the month of October (including a 3-1 victory here at Kenilworth Road), the club's current mid-table position has much to do with their poor home form. At the time of writing, the

Rams have won only three league games at the Baseball Ground against Southend (2-0), Charlton (4-3) and Birmingham (3-1) and have lost against (Peterborough) 0-1, Leicester (2-3), Bristol City (3-4), Oxford (0-1), Millwall (2-1), Sunderland (0-1), Tranmere (2-1), Portsmouth (2-4) and West Ham United (2-0).

■ However, with such a strong squad and with strength-in-depth, a change in fortune can never be counted against Arthur Cox's men. A good run in the Cup would inevitably breed confidence and put the club in good stead for the final third of the season. In the last round, the club disposed of Stockport County 2-1, with the winning goal coming courtesy of a Miller own goal in the final minute. It is that kind of luck which is needed on the road to Wembley, a venue the club have not reached in this competition since 1946.

■ Derby's list of honours apart from their Cup triumph in 1946, include the Division One title in 1971-2 and 1974-5; the Second Division crown in 1911-12, 1914-15, 1968-69 and 1986-87.

RAMS ON PARADE

STEVE SUTTON (goalkeeper) - Signed from Nottingham Forest for £300,000 in March 1992, Steve had more than a decade of success at the City Ground. He spent a loan spell at County in 1985 and also served the Town for three months last season.

ANDY COMYN (defender) - Andy started his Football League career at Aston Villa in 1989. He had previously played non-league football for Alvechurch whilst studying physics at Birmingham University. He joined Derby for £200,000 - the club's first signing for 20 months.

MICHAEL FORSYTH (defender) - Michael has been a regular in the County defence for the past four seasons. A former England youth international, he started his career at West Bromwich Albion before joining the Rams for £20,000 in 1986.

CRAIG SHORT (defender) - Four years ago Craig was working in a bank and playing for Scarborough reserves - now he is Britain's most expensive defender. He followed Scarborough manager Neil Warnock to Notts County for £100,000 in 1988 and helped County into Division One. He joined Derby last month for £2.5 million.

DARREN WASSALL (defender) - Tipped as Des Walker's natural successor at Nottingham Forest, Darren decided to leave the City Ground at the end of last season. Out of contract, he joined County for £600,000 in June.

JASON KAVANAGH (defender) - A former FA School of Excellence pupil at Lilleshall, Jason joined Derby from Birmingham City for £25,000 in 1990. An England under-21 international, he made 24 appearances for the Rams last season.

MARK PEMBRIDGE (midfield) - Former Town favourite, Mark joined Derby for £1,250,000 in June. An ever-present in the Luton Town side last season, Mark has represented Wales at youth, under-21 and full levels.

MARTIN KUHL (midfield) - Martin started his career with Birmingham City, making his debut in 1983. He spent four full seasons at St Andrews before joining Sheffield United and later Watford. In 1988 he signed for Portsmouth, leading the club to an FA Cup semi-final appearance last season. He joined Derby for £700,000 last month.

PAUL SIMPSON (midfield) - Paul was signed from Oxford United for £500,000 in February 1992. He made his league debut for Manchester City in 1984 at the age of 16 and went on to enjoy four more seasons at Maine Road. Paul is an England under-21 international.

CRAIG RAMAGE (midfield) - Local boy Craig made his debut for Derby in 1989 as a striker and made 15 appearances in his first

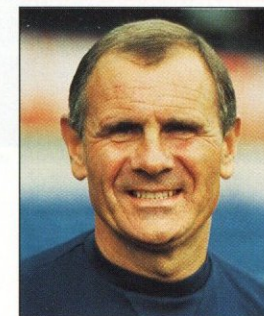
season with the club. The following year he was reverted to midfield and became an England under-21 international.

MARCO GABBIADINI (forward) - Marco started his career with York City, but rose to prominence with Sunderland where he was top-scorer for four consecutive seasons. He joined Crystal Palace for £1.8 million in 1991 but failed to establish himself at Selhurst Park and joined Derby for £1 million in February.

TOMMY JOHNSON (forward) - Former England under-21 international, Tommy started his career with Notts County and made over 100 league appearances for the club, scoring almost 50 league goals. He signed for Derby in March 1992 for £1.3 million.

PAUL KITSON (forward) - A goal provider as well as a goal scorer, Paul was signed from Leicester City in a deal worth £1.3 million which also saw Ian Ormondroyd and Phil Gee move to Filbert Street. An England under-21 international, he made 50 appearances for Leicester, scoring six goals.

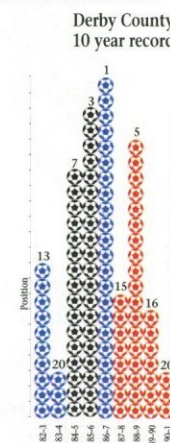
Arthur Cox started his footballing career as a full-back at Coventry City, but his career was tragically cut short by a severely broken leg aged only 18.

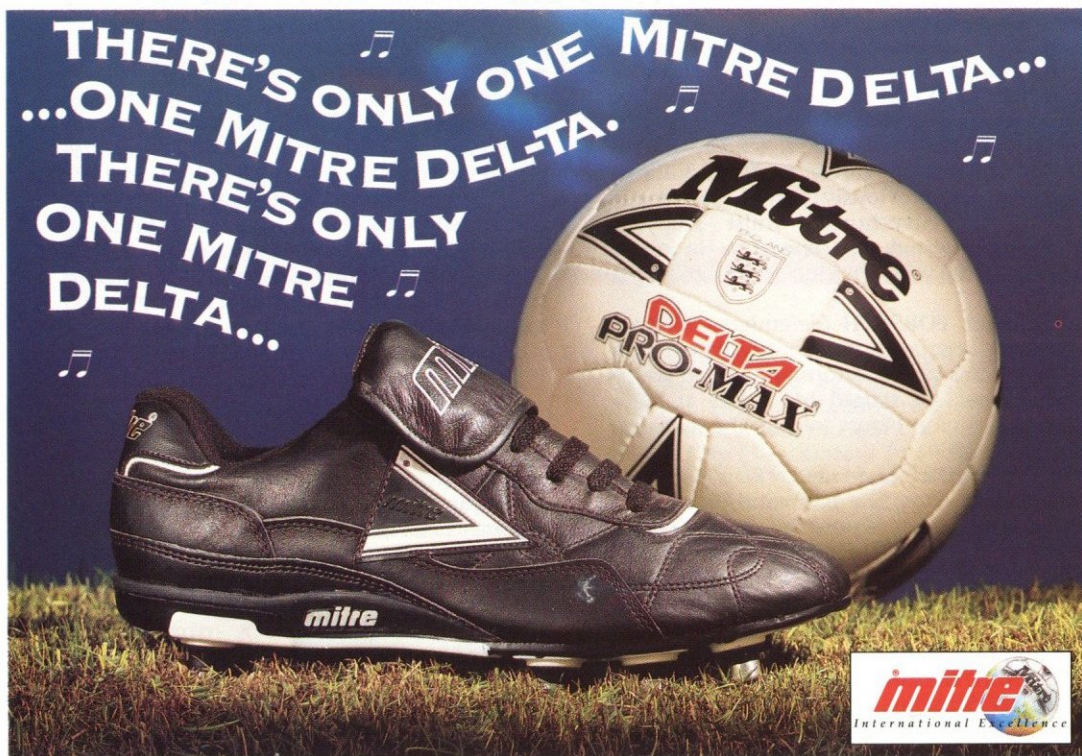
He moved into management when he was appointed

as Bob Stokoe's assistant at Sunderland and was alongside Stokoe on the bench when the Wearsiders won the FA Cup in 1973.

His own management skills really came to light in 1984 when he helped re-establish Newcastle United as a First Division club, honing the talents of Chris Waddle, Peter Beardsley and a young Paul Gascoigne.

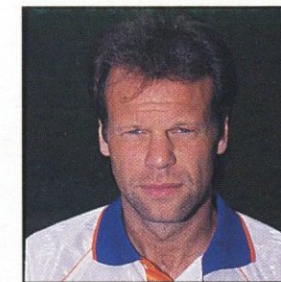
Mr Cox then opted to leave the north-east for Third Division Derby County and promptly revitalised the Rams as well. Within three years of his arrival, the club were in the First Division. He is now in his ninth season at Derby and has recently signed another long-term contract.

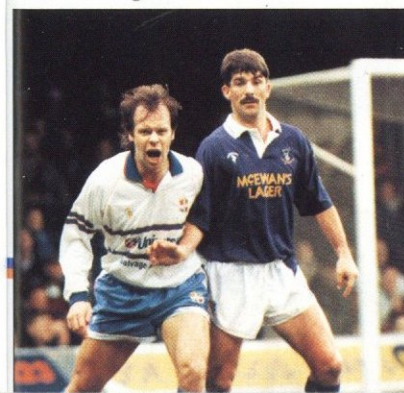

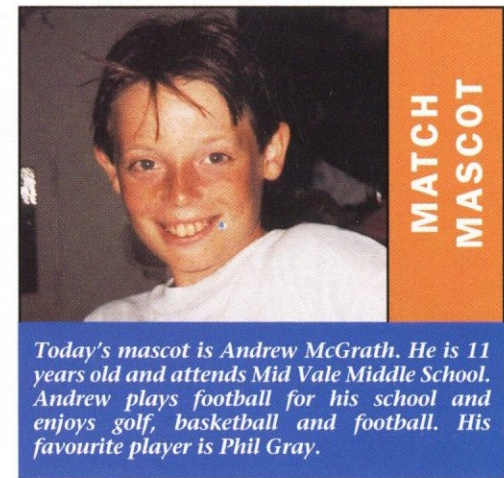

A 'French connection' at Kenilworth Road



BACK TRACKING BY ROGER WASH

Back in the summer of 1939, the 'Beds and Herts Evening Telegraph' carried a series of extended player interviews and one of the most fascinating was that told by Bert Lutterloch.

London-born Bert started off his playing career with Eton Manor as a centre-half and was soon spotted by Tottenham who offered him a job on their ground staff whilst allowing him to turn out for the A team and Northfleet, who were Tottenham's nursery side.

Spurs, having a number of centre-halves on their books at the time, decided against offering Bert professional terms and so he found a job as a collector for a Gas, Light and Coke Company, whilst turning out as an amateur

for Tufnell Park as an inside-forward.

Soon after, one of the Tufnell Park players went to play in France and after he had been there a few weeks, he asked Bert if he would like to join him. After a trial, Bert signed a one-year contract with Lille Olympique who had just turned professional along with most of the other major sides in France.

With Bert playing as an inside-forward, Lille won the French Championship and he was further honoured by

being chosen to turn out for the North of France on three occasions against Portugal, Diables Rouges and the South of France.

Against Portugal, Bert scored two goals and in the second against Diables Rouges, he had a strange experience when 'artificial light' was used which was, of course, unheard of in this country for competitive matches at the time. As a prize for winning the League, Lille embarked on a tour of North Africa in which 16 matches were played in four weeks, shortly before the start of the French season.

This was too much for Bert and he decided to return to England where Major Frank Buckley was waiting to take him to Wolves.

Despite a dislocated knee sustained in a reserve game, Bert soon made his First Division debut, but as soon as Bryn Jones (eventually sold to Arsenal for a record fee) arrived on the scene, Bert lost his place and was allowed to join Aldershot on loan.



Barry Butlin spent six years at the Baseball Ground before becoming a favourite at Kenilworth Road.

After a season-and-a-half on loan, Wolves wanted to make the transfer permanent and so he signed for a small fee in the summer of 1936, only to be sold to Luton a fortnight later!

Bert made his Town debut on the opening day of the 1936/37 season at home to Southend, was injured, and then after recovery spent the rest of the season playing in a variety of positions for the reserves. He did have one other first team outing, at home to Q.P.R., which was unfortunately the only time the Town lost at Kenilworth Road on their way to the Third Division South Championship.

Bert made eight appearances in the Town's Second

Division team the following season, all at full-back, but then had to spend the whole of 1938/39 in the reserves as he was unable to displace Tom Dunsmore.

As with so many other

players, the war finished Bert's career but he at least holds the unique distinction of appearing for both a French and an English Championship winning side.

A HATTER AND A RAM

Rosliston-born Barry Butlin spent almost six years with his first club Derby County, but made only seven League appearances for them in that time although he enjoyed a good run on-loan to Notts County in 1969.

After playing for Derby in a testimonial match for Ian Buxton at Luton in November 1972, Butlin was tempted to Kenilworth Road by Harry Haslam - the Rams receiving £50,000 in exchange.

Scoring on his debut in a home draw with Q.P.R., Butlin soon became a crowd favourite but after 11 games he was badly injured, and missed the rest of the season.

Back to full fitness, Butlin finished top-scorer as the Town won promotion in 1973/74 but early in the following season he was surprisingly transferred to Second Division Nottingham Forest, albeit for a large fee.

Butlin moved to Peterborough in 1977 after loan spells at Brighton and Reading, before finishing his career with Sheffield United.

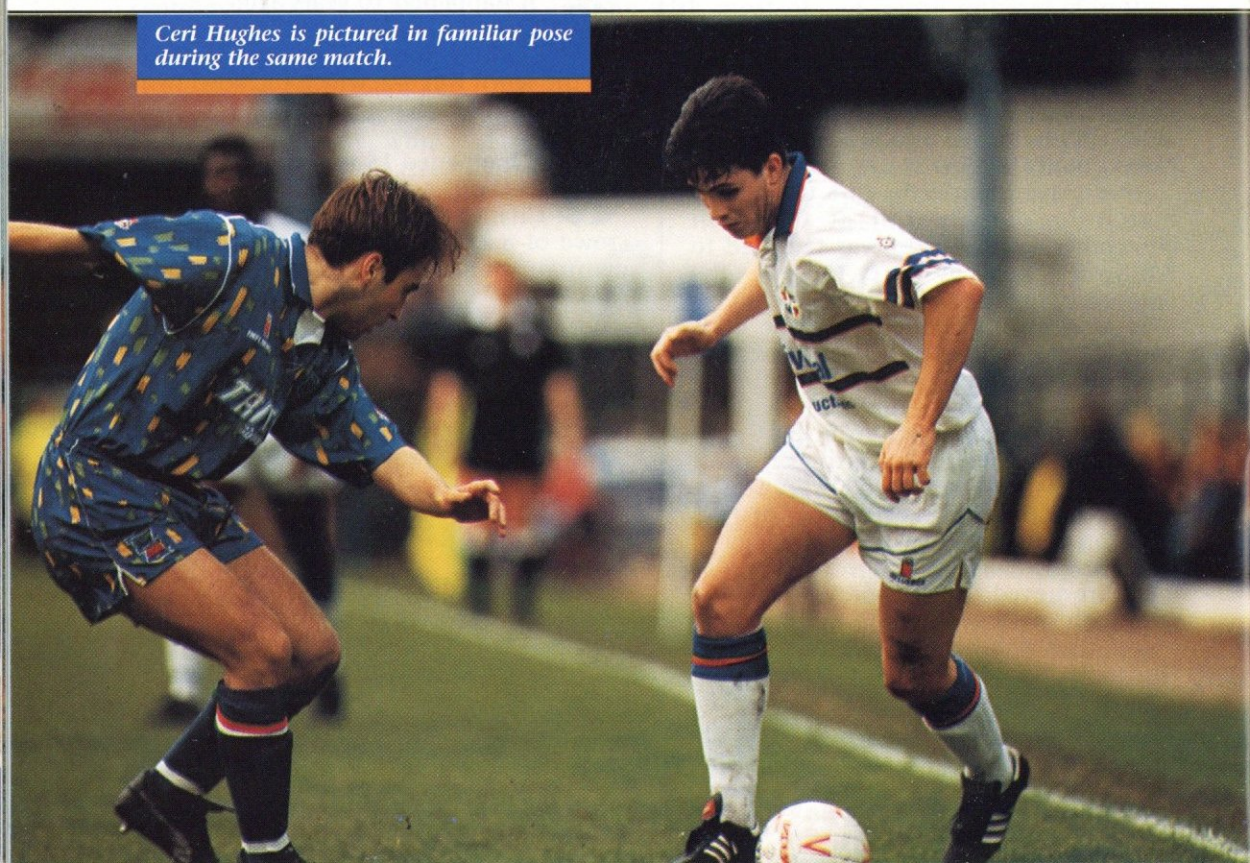

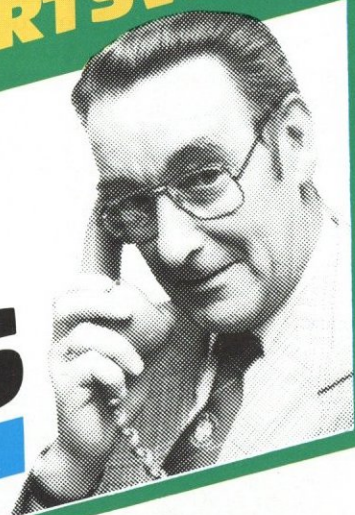

Milan favourites to rule Europe



SCENE AROUND EUROPE

With the next round of the European cup competitions just over a month away, we take a look at the clubs who are in contention for Europe's major honours.

One club, above all others dominates the scene around Europe at present: A.C. Milan. The current Italian champions are setting a host of records in Italy this season and are in a dominant position in the Champions League (semi-final stage of the European Cup), where they lead the table after two successive victories.

On the domestic scene, Milan have gone 50 league games unbeaten, which makes the club the first Italian side to complete a full calendar year without defeat in championship action. Their latest victory, 1-0 at Brescia, was the club's eighth consecutive away victory, which is also a record in Italy.

However, despite the club's success at home, the trophy most 'Rossoneri' fans want to see Milan win is the European Cup. They are the only team in both groups of the Champions League to have won both their matches. European Player of the Year, Marco Van Basten was the hero of the club's opening group B match against IFK Gothenburg of Sweden. He scored all four goals which put the club in good stead for the visit to PSV Eindhoven.

All three Dutchmen - Van Basten, Ruud Gullit and Frank Rijkaard - rose to the occasion on home soil to help Milan to an impressive, hard fought 2-1 victory.

At present, Milan hold a two-point lead over IFK, with PSV and F.C. Porto almost out of contention with one point each from their two matches.

Group A is a more open affair. Marseille and Glasgow Rangers lead the way with three points each, following their 2-2 draw at Ibrox. It was a game Marseille should have won after taking a 2-0 lead through Alen Boksic and Rudi Voller. However, late strikes by Gary McSwegan and Mark Hateley kept the Glasgow giants' dream of

European glory very much alive.

Club Brugge follow with two points, having beaten CSKA Moscow but losing 3-0 to Marseille. Once again Bosis was on the scoresheet with two goals, to prove that there is life after Jean Pierre Papin.

The UEFA Cup sees some intriguing clashes when the competition reaches the quarter-final stage at the beginning of March. Six of the eight survivors hold real European pedigree: Real Madrid, Benfica, Juventus and Ajax are all former European champions; Roma have triumphed in the Fairs Cup, while Borussia Dortmund have won the Cup Winners' Cup. The two 'outsiders' are both French: Paris St-Germain and Auxerre.

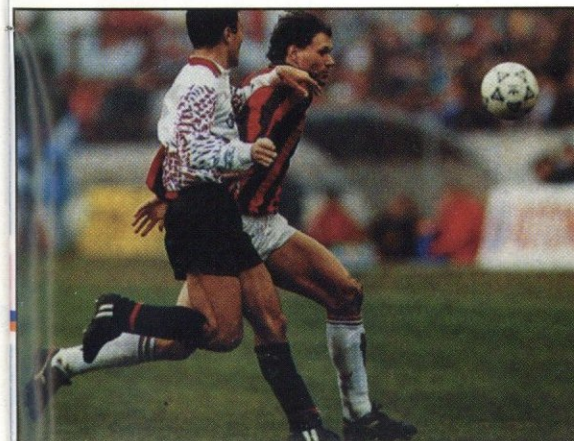
However, the strength of both the French clubs will not be underestimated. Paris include Napoli and Anderlecht among their victims this season, while Auxerre disposed of a resurgent Standard Liege in the last round. Ajax stand between Auxerre and a place in the semi-finals, while Paris St Germain travel to Real Madrid.

As expected, the Cup Winners' Cup provides the weakest field. Atletico Madrid appear to have taken permanent residence in the competition they won in 1962 as consolation for being Real Madrid and Barcelona's 'poor relation'. They face an uncomfortable visit to Greece to face Olympiakos at the quarter-final stage.

Former European champions Steaua Bucharest are still showing their ambition, despite the fact that they are a shadow of the side which defeated Barcelona in the final of the 1986 Champions' Cup. They face Antwerp on March 4. Feyenoord, Holland's first European champions, entertain Spartak Moscow, who were very nearly disqualified for fielding an ineligible player in the second round against Liverpool. Midfielder Mikhail Rusyayev was given the benefit of the doubt and Spartak progressed, whereas Liverpool remained knocked out of the competition.

We wish Glasgow Rangers the best of luck as the only British team left in any European competition. A sad reflection on the game in Britain at present.
