
Only the thickness of the crossbar and the most important save of Keith Welch's City career denied David Pleat's team a rare victory.

Gerry Harrison's

energy and enthusiasm are too often misdirected, while cover for Shelton lies in inexperienced players lacking consistency.

Up front Andrew Cole has lost the yard of pace that comes with confidence and sharp thinking. Leroy Rosenior is rendered ineffective if the team fail to feed his aerial strength.

And what of Jacki

Dziekanowski? Even on a quiet day, he was arguably City's most creative player.

But the Pole still has an infuriating tendency to spectate when the opposition are in possession. That increases the workload for less gifted teammates and creates gaps in midfield.

It was Dziekanowski's pass that sent Scott through to fire wide from one of only two clear chances created by City's first half dominance.

The other saw Aizlewood's firm downward header from a Dziekanowski corner smothered and well held

on his line by Alec Chamberlain.

Scott went close with a thunderous 25-yard vollev. but too many attacks ended with poor final passes or players straying offside.

Osman bravely withdrew himself and sent on Wayne Allison for the last 20 minutes a substitution that almost paid immediate dividends.

The wholehearted striker burst clear on the right and crossed early for Cole, whose low shot at the near post was palmed away by Chamberlain.

Cole also had two shots blocked in a goalmouth scramble.

## Nice to keep a clean sheet

RUSSELL Osman's decision to take himself off for the final 20 minutes had nothing to do with injury.

"I felt we had to sacrifice a defender to go for the three points and going off myself caused the least disruption," he said.

"While we needed to win, it was satisfying to keep a clean sheet and again I thought the effort put in by the players couldn't be faulted.

"We are just not turning pressure into goals. There was some good goalkeeping and some poor finishing, but at times the ball didn't run for us.

"Keith Welch made a vital save, but hardly had anything else to do. That suggests we are getting more solid and have a base on which to build."
