JOHN Taylor admits the goal that keeps alive Rovers' faint hopes of First Division survival will probably be his last for the club.

He hopes to complete his much-delayed £300,000 move to Portsmouth this week.

And the striker's 10th goal of the season — scored after coming off the bench - is likely to heighten Pompey boss Jim Smith's interest.

"It was my first League

goal of the year so I really enjoyed it," he said.

"It will probably be my last for Rovers — let's hope it could turn out to be an important one at the end of the season. The move to Portsmouth is on ice - but I'm fairly confident it will happen.

Flashed

David Preece crashed Kerry Dixon's flick-on against the bar with 15 minutes left as Luton looked for the winner.

But Rovers could have pinched all three points in the closing moments. Saunders wasn't far away when David Mehew's cross ran across the face of goal, and seconds later the striker flashed a shot from the edge of the box narrowly wide.
