TOM Walley is hoping that Millwall fans will turn out in force for the second leg of the Lions' FA Youth Cup semi-final with Manchester United at The Den on April 13.

Walley's youngsters stormed through to the semi-finals with a thrilling 3-2 victory over Nottingham Forest, and now they're confident that they can dump the favourites and holders out of this season's competition.

"We'll get at them up there in the first-leg, and then hopefully we'll finish them off at The Den in front of our own supporters," said Walley.

"When it comes to attracting young players a club like Manchester United has got everything in their favour. With their history and resources it would be criminal if they didn't have some excellent youngsters.

"But we've got a pretty handy side ourselves and they showed tremendous character when they fought back from 2-0 down to beat Forest in the quarter finals."

The Lions have already signed teenagers Jermaine Wright, Ben Thatcher, Geoff Pitcher, Matthew Middleton, Mark Beard and Mark Kennedy on professional contracts, and Walley is

THEY'RE ALL TOUGH GAMES FROM NOW ON

There's no doubt that having to play with ten men at Southend on Sunday ultimately cost us two points. Sometimes it can work for you being a man short funnily enough, with everyone else feeling aggrieved and trying that little bit harder. But we gave away a couple of bad goals in the second-half and had to settle for a draw. I'm convinced that if Colin Cooper had been on the field in the second-half we'd have won comfortably, but if my auntie had a beard she'd be my uncle, there's no point carrying on about what might have happened.

As far as Colin's sending off goes, I'm told it was for kicking Tilson, who ran 30 yards to push him, rather than for the reckless challenge on Colleymore.

He didn't make contact with Colleymore, and although his attempted tackle looked rash, I'm sure Colin was trying to play the ball and no doubt make physical contact with the player at the same time as all defenders try to do. The fact that he didn't do either, as I see it, means that he couldn't have been sent off for the challenge. If I think about robbing

your house but don't actually do it I can't be locked up for it. Anyway, the referee said the sending off was for violent conduct after that incident, involving Tilson. Although I've had a look at the tape supplied to me by the T.V. people, it doesn't show the fracas, and unless I can see evidence that suggests that Colin was guilty I won't be taking any further action against him.

Looking on the positive side, we played hopelessly for much of the game and still came away with a point having scored three goals. I was pleased with the two we got from set pieces which we had been practising on Saturday, although I'm sure Colin Murphy will look at them very differently and feel they were bad goals to concede. Whilst I'm disappointed and a little angry at the goals we let them score, we're now unbeaten in five games, and if we stay unbeaten for the rest of the season we'll be promoted.

Looking ahead, we're going to be without Colin and possibly Rhino for key games during our run in to the end of the season and that's something I'm still keen to find a solution to, although I thought Tony McCarthy did very well when he came on against Southend. People mentioning what a tough run of games we've got coming up against most of the top teams, but you can't tell me that Southend

"He damaged the same leg again during the Derby game after a nasty challenge by one of their midfield

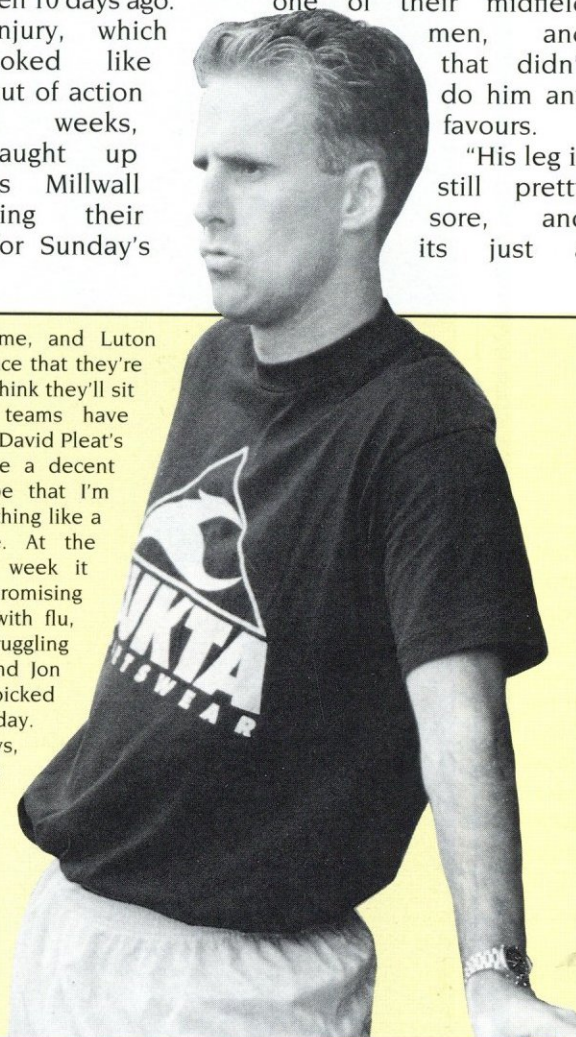
men, and that didn't do him any favours.

LIONS DIARY

THE Lions bruising scrap with Southend at Roots Hall on Sunday left Mick McCarthy's men reflecting that late goals, like luck, tend to balance themselves out.

Malcolm Allen's 93rd minute penalty against Derby must be one of the latest goals the Lions have ever scored.

But last weekend, the boot, if you'll pardon the pun, was on the other foot when Southend grabbed an equaliser three minutes from time.

Despite the disappointment of seeing two points slip from their grasp after Colin Cooper's red card challenge on Stan Collymore, the Lions can still feel pleased with their efforts over the last few weeks.

After a decidedly dodgy February, we are now unbeaten in five and The Lions go into tonight's clash with Luton knowing that three or four more wins would virtually guarantee them a play-off place.

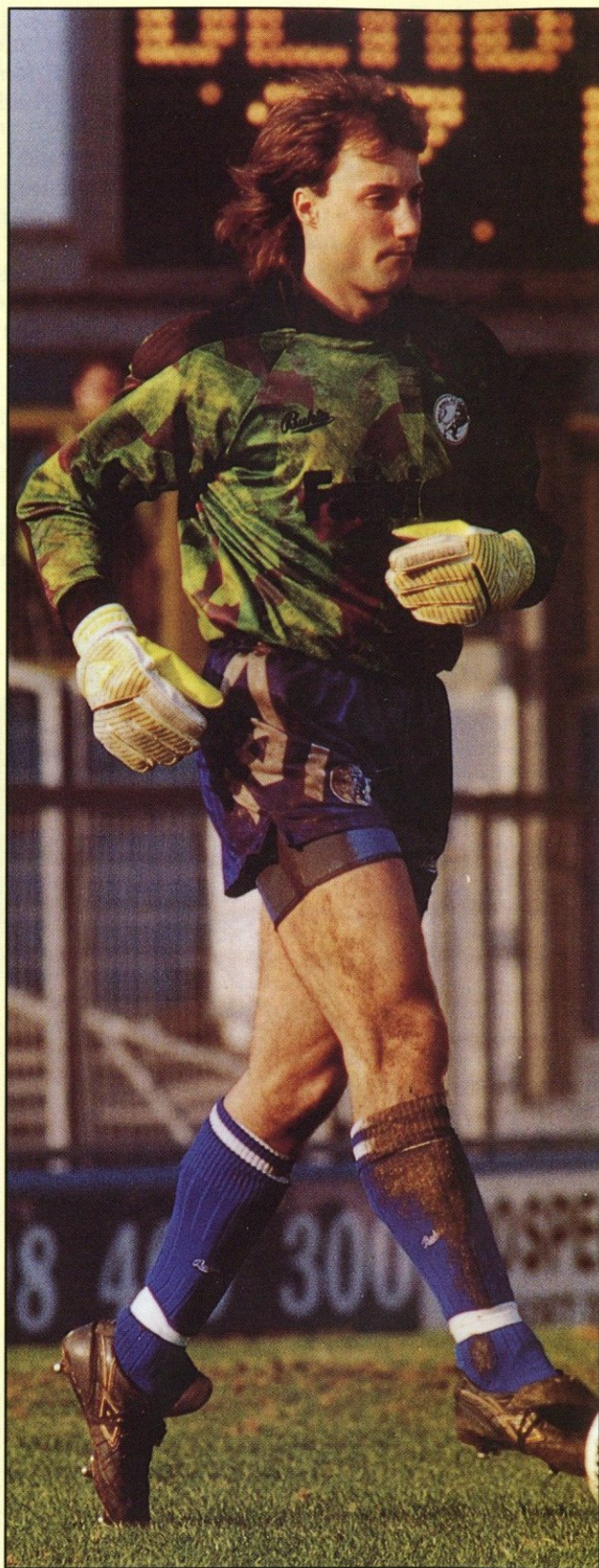
Since recharging their batteries during that four-day break in Portugal, Millwall have won two and drawn three to stay heavily involved in the promotion race.

"Winning at home and drawing away always used to be classic promotion form, and if we can keep our current little run going we won't be far away come May," stressed the Lions boss.

"Our home draw against Sunderland was disappointing, but we made up for that by going and winning at Bristol City.

"We've got 10 games left and seven of them are against clubs who are still nursing promotion hopes, so our future is in our own hands.

"After the sticky patch we went through I've been pleased with the determination the players have shown. We've just got to keep it going."



SKILL GAP HAS GOT TO BE BRIDGED

ENGLAND'S youngsters are entitled to feel reasonably pleased with their showing in the World Youth championships.

Despite being hampered by the fact that manager Dave Burnside was only able to select one youngster from any given club, they reached the semi-final and but for a couple of dodgy refereeing decisions might have gone all the way.

But anyone who watched England's semi-final clash with Ghana on Sky Sports, can't fail to have noticed the glaring difference in technique and skill.

The Ghana teenagers looked so comfortable on the ball. They controlled it quickly, even when they were under pressure, and

showed a tremendous range of passing skills.

In contrast the England youngsters' technique looked

decidedly second rate – and that's worrying.

Brought up in the frantic, hurly burly of the Premier Division, many of them looked uncomfortable on the ball, and at times their passing left a lot to be desired.

More and more youth team coaches in this country – including our own Tom Walley – now put the accent firmly on developing technique and basic skills, because they believe that's vital if we are ever going to compete with the best of the rest.

MALCOLM AND KASEY ARE SPOT ON!

PUT yourself in Malcolm Allen's boots.

It's three minutes into injury time, you've hammered away at a rock solid defence all afternoon without a sniff of a chance and your side's promotion prospects look like suffering another setback.

Just when you've given up hope, a defender handles, the referee points to the penalty spot and suddenly the stomach-churning responsibility is on your shoulders.

That's exactly the situation Allen found himself in during our last home game against Derby, and who knows just how valuable his ice-cool last gasp penalty could turn out to be.

"The fact that it was so late in the game did put me under a bit of extra pressure," he admitted afterwards. "I could see the clock on the scoreboard, and I knew just how important it was

that I scored.

"But as soon as the referee pointed to the spot I made up my mind which way I was going to put the penalty and I stuck to it.

"I concentrated on making as good a strike as I could and putting it far enough to one side of him, but not so far that there was any danger of me pushing it wide.

"The keeper guessed the right way, but it squeezed in and the place went beserk."

Four days earlier The Lions had been on the receiving end of a penalty when Andy Roberts handled during our hard-fought clash with Bristol City at Ashton Gate.

That put keeper Kasey Keller on the spot, but the American ace saved Andrew Cole's penalty, and gave Millwall's promotion prospects another important boost.

"We'd fought real hard and

taken the lead," explained Keller, "then the referee penalises Andy and all of a sudden it looks as though they're going to get back into the game.

"I saved a penalty up at Barnsley earlier in the season and I stopped one in the Coca Cola Cup shoot-out against Arsenal so I haven't got a bad record.

"A few minutes earlier I'd been in a one on one with Cole which I'd managed to win and one that taught me that he likes to hit shots across his body. It's something he's comfortable with.

"I thought he might try the same thing with the penalty and I could tell from the way he was leaning as he ran up that he was going to put it to my right.

"I went that way and actually stopped it one handed, but luckily it didn't rebound too far from me and I was able to grab it again comfortably enough."

MALCOLM Allen's dramatic injury-time penalty winner predictably dominated the reports of our 1-0 victory over Derby at the Den 10 days ago.

"McCarthy slammed the negative tactics of Derby boss Arthur Cox and his FA

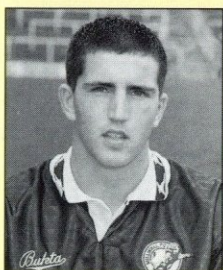
Cup quarter finalists saying, 'Twelve million pounds worth of talent and they sit back.

STAGE SET FOR 'SIX POINT' SHOWDOWN

PROMOTION chasing rivals Portsmouth are the next visitors to The Den, as the battle for one of those three Premier Division places intensifies.

Like the Lions, Jim Smith's side have struggled to produce their best form away from home, but then form won't count for much during Saturday week's six pointer.

Guy Whittingham's remarkable 37 goal haul, has established him as one of the country's most wanted strikers, and kept Pompey firmly on course for the

play-offs.

Despite intense transfer speculation, at the time of writing, it looks as though Whittingham will stay at Fratton Park, at least until the end of the season and that could be bad news for the Lions.

Portsmouth went into Saturday's home game against Charlton with their confidence sky high after three straight wins over Cambridge, Watford and Luton.

Can Lions strike a Hammer blow?

AWAY DAY

MAKE no mistake, if Mick McCarthy's Lions are going to grab one of the First Division's automatic promotion places they need to win Sunday's showdown with West Ham United.

That all-ticket clash with Billy Bonds side starts a run of 'six pointers' which could make or break the Lions promotion prospects.

Newcastle and West Ham are firm favourites to grab the two automatic places, but there are 10 clubs who still fancy their chances of one of the four play-off slots.

The ferocious battle for Premier Division status is complicated by the fact that a lot of the leading contenders are playing each other over the next few weeks.

And McCarthy's men know that victory at Upton Park on Sunday would keep their automatic promotion hopes very much alive.

"It's exactly the sort of game that you want to be involved with at this stage of the season," stressed the Lions boss. "We've only lost to two of the current top 10, so we've done pretty well against the leading sides.

"Sunday's game is a real six pointer, and we'll go over there in very determined mood."

The Hammers went into Saturday's home game against fellow promotion hopefuls Tranmere, determined to bounce back from their first defeat in 16 League games.

That came at Meadow Lane 10 days ago, when Notts County grabbed a 1-0 win which

gave hope to the pack of clubs who still reckon they can grab that second automatic promotion slot.

Millwall's hopes of winning at Upton Park have been boosted by the fact that Hammers 'hard men' Julian Dicks and Martin Allen will both be ruled out because of suspension.

The Lions will also draw strength from their 2-1 victory over West Ham at The Den in November, when Malcolm Allen and Phil Barber earned us what could turn out to be a vital victory.

Millwall fans are reminded that Sunday's game is all-ticket and our allocation of 4000 is selling fast.

If you want to sit down at Upton Park you must be either a seat season ticket holder, or a Lions Card member. If you're neither you'll only be able to buy a terrace ticket priced at £8.

The Den box office will be open until 12 noon on Saturday, subject to availability.

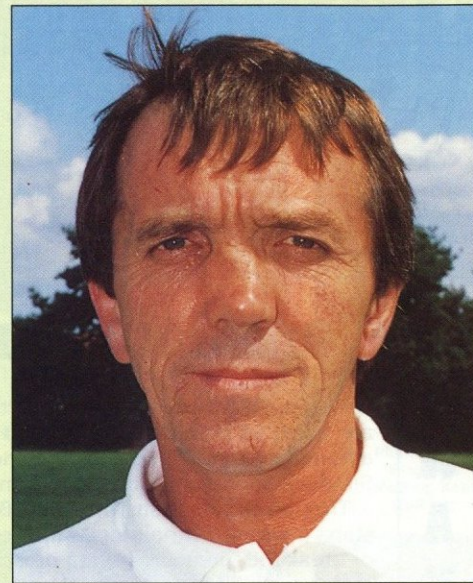
Best Game seen: The 1966 World Cup Final was the ultimate for every English fan. It still brings a lump to my throat every time I see it. In my time at Millwall, the 4-2 win over Sheffield Wednesday back in October 1990 after we'd been 2-0 down at half-time will always stick in my memory. My job means that I tend to see home games in bits and pieces rather than being able to watch them from start to finish.

Best Goals seen: Les Briley's at Charlton and his disallowed effort at Arsenal in the old First Division days were both crackers, as was Alex's screamer at Derby last season. I've seen so many great goals in my time, it's very hard to pick just one.

Best Player seen: Undoubtedly George Best. I saw him play for Manchester United at Fulham and I was spellbound. As soon as his name was on the team sheet you got excited because you never knew what to expect from him. As far as I'm concerned he was better than Pele and Eusebio, the only player to touch him was possibly Stanley Matthews.

At Millwall, Joe Broadfoot, who was at school with me was a great player. Keith Weller and Derek Possee also spring to mind. Whilst I've been working with the Club, Teddy Sheringham has to be the best striker I've seen and Colin Cooper has been a revelation at the back this season hasn't he?

Best Millwall Moment: As a supporter, in common with everyone else no doubt, it was promotion to the First Division in 1988. The best moment on a personal level was being given the opportunity by John Docherty and Mr Burr to work for the Club full-time. Initially I did the kit and continued my scouting, but by the time Bruce Rioch arrived Allen Batsford had come in as Chief Scout and I just



concentrated on being Kit Manager because I couldn't really cope with both jobs.

Best Coach/Manager: I admire Brian Clough because of his outspokenness. I know he's having a hard time of it at the moment, but all teams go through that phase. He speaks his mind and sticks to his principles.

For me Mick is brilliant. I'm not saying this just because he's the current manager because I speak as I find, but he's undoubtedly got the best out of the players here. Personally, I admired Bruce, for whom things didn't really work out, but since Mick has taken over the whole atmosphere at the club has changed and that is reflected on the field.

Best idea to improve the game: Stop betting on individual players to score the first goal. You get players betting on themselves to score first and inevitably it's going to affect the way they play because they're bound to be trying that bit harder to get on the scoresheet rather than concentrating on the needs of the team. That may sound strange, but it's my opinion anyway.

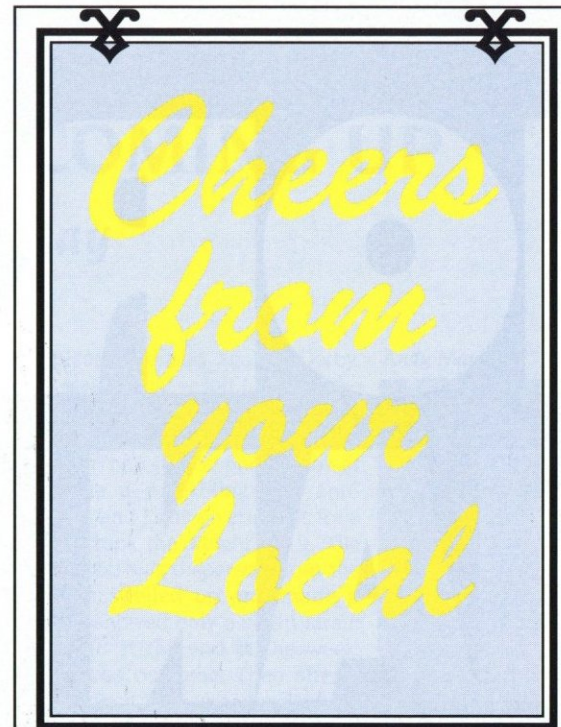

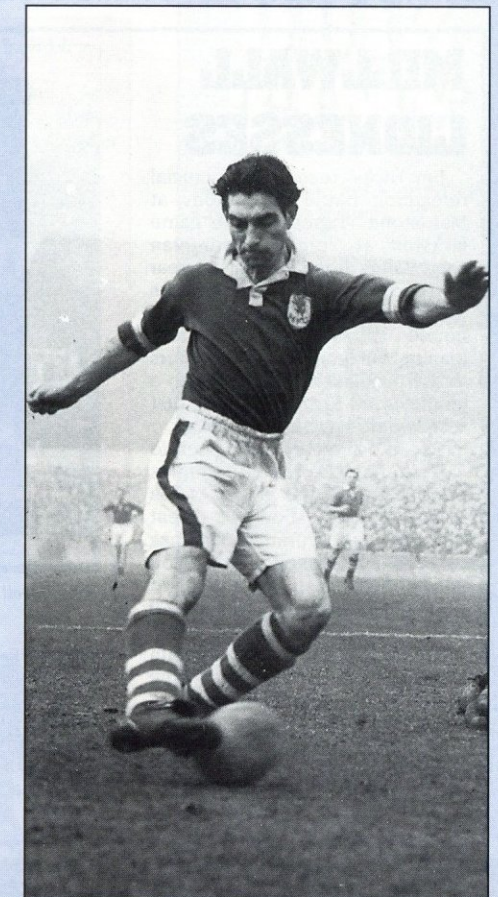
Gerry Bowler was born in Londonderry, Northern Ireland on the 8th June, 1919. He started his playing career with local side Derry and was transferred to Distillery for £1,000, which at the time was the highest fee paid between two Irish League clubs. Gerry then joined First Division Portsmouth for £5,000 before moving to Hull City where he became friends with Raich Carter and the late Don Revie.

In 1949 Gerry made the first of his three International appearances for Northern Ireland against a very strong Scotland side including Young, Woodburn, Steel, Reilly and Waddell in Belfast. His other caps were against England and Wales in the same Home Championship Series. Gerry was transferred to Millwall for £12,000 in June 1950. He recalls that they were an ambitious club in the fifties with loyal supporters and attendances of between twenty and thirty thousand. He made his debut for the Lions at Exeter City on the 19th August, 1950 in a 1-0 victory.

Gerry was an outstanding centre-half and was made captain of the Club and had a steady influence on the rest of the defence. Over the next five years he made 184 first team appearances and it was during his time at The Den that he represented London twice, firstly against Berlin at Highbury and then against Belgium in the Heysel Stadium, Brussels. He was also selected for the Irish International tour of the United States and Canada in 1953.

One particular match that Gerry recalls very vividly was on the 10th January, 1953 in the Third Round of the F.A. Cup at home to Manchester United in front of 35,652 spectators. Millwall had beaten Aldershot and Barrow in the previous two rounds and finally lost to United by a disputed goal which had crossed the goal line near the corner flag by at least two feet only for Berry to cross for Pearson who scored in fading light.

In 1955 Gerry retired from the professional game and settled in the Crawley area but he continued his links with sport, managing Horsham Football Club in the Corinthian League from 1958 to 1962 and writing a football column for a local newspaper. Gerry is now 73 years young and works at Gatwick Airport for Fortes Restaurants in the South Terminal Departure Lounge



which he thoroughly enjoys. He is married to Helen and they have two children Tom and Geraldine and three grandchildren Kelly, Neil and Simone.

He has great memories of a very distinguished career, his three International caps, his time at Millwall, a match in which Ireland beat an England XI 1-0 and Gerry blotted out the great Tommy Lawton, and playing for the Combined Services side in Belfast which included such stars as Frank Swift, Joe Mercer, Neil Franklin, Stanley Matthews and Tommy Lawton.

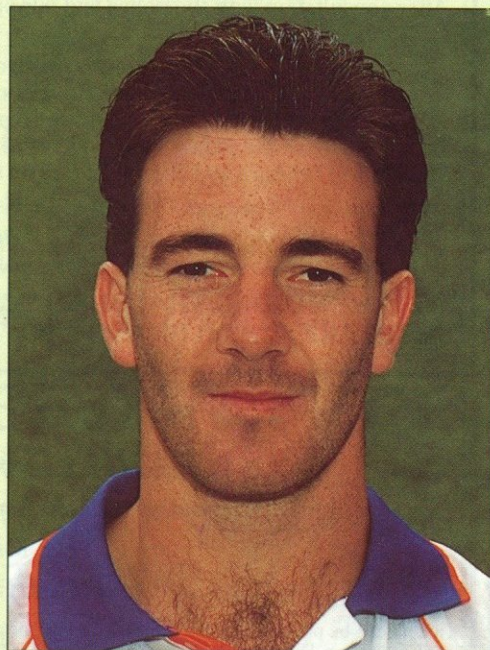

Millwall are amongst the front runners in the First Division handicap race says David Pleat

When Millwall came to Kenilworth Road back in November they had been the side in this Division that had impressed me most. The conditions on the day were very heavy and not suited to Millwall's passing style, and I thought we coped with them very well in the first-half and held the balance of the game. But I was very impressed by the way they came back into it and particularly the way they kept their composure when they were one down and continually spread the ball about to get Dawes involved. They're one of the few teams prepared to play across the width of the field and back again as opposed to hitting it forward early.

For ourselves, we've improved very slowly. We've lost less games than the other clubs in the lower half, but we've drawn fifteen and that's been our problem to a degree. But we're looking for stability and perhaps we have to get draws before we get wins. If we can survive this season, we'll look to take things on from there.

Mick McCarthy has certainly done very

well in his first season in charge at Millwall, and I've been very impressed at the manner in which he's got his team playing. I remember trying to buy Mick from Barnsley many years ago so I've admired him both as a player and now as a manager, and I hope his side can hold their nerve and claim a play-off place.

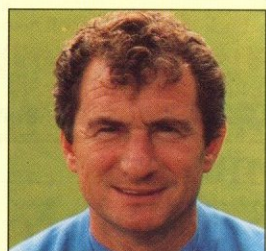
I think there has been less frenetic, frantic play in the First Division this year than there has in the Premier where the fear of losing that status, plus the natural inclinations of the likes of Palace and Wimbledon have created a fast and furious game. Newcastle, Swindon, West Ham and Millwall have all played with great composure and fluidity in

contrast, but I have to say that there is a handicap system in this Division. Keegan at Newcastle has spent a lot of money, and wisely, but that has been a significant factor in their success. West Ham are still a big Club who have retained Premier League class players and with good crowds have similar advantages. Of the Clubs in the handicap race as I call it, Millwall, Swindon and Grimsby have done very well indeed. These clubs have all belied their circumstances and I think it's fascinating to look at the book-makers who do the pre-season handicap odds and see where teams would have finished under such a system.

DAVID Pleat is one of the Football League's most experienced managers.

He kicked off his Football League management career at Luton, before moving on to Spurs whom he led to the 1986-87 FA Cup final where they were eventually beaten 3-2 by Coventry.

From White Hart Lane he moved on to Leicester, but after failing to haul them out of the then Second Division he rejoined Luton in July 1991.

During a long and distinguished playing career he had spells with Nottingham Forest, Luton, Shrewsbury, Exeter and Peterborough.

LUTON SET TO WIN SURVIVAL STRUGGLE?

DAVID Pleat's Luton will be out to put some daylight between themselves and the First Division relegation battle at The Den tonight.

The Hatters went into Saturday's clash with bottom-of-the-table Bristol Rovers knowing that three wins from their last 11 games would just about ensure that they beat the drop.

That didn't look too likely a couple of months ago when Luton found themselves propping up the rest of the table after a disappointing run which saw them pick up eight points out of 24.

That left Pleat's side facing an uphill relegation battle, but they've shown tremendous character and clawed their way up the table with only two defeats in their last nine outings.

There's no doubt that, at their best, Pleat's youngsters are formidable opposition - just ask promotion chasing Swindon who were held to a 0-0 draw at Kenilworth Road a week ago.

Pleat was less happy after their last away trip ended in a 3-1 defeat at Grimsby, who still haven't given up hope of grabbing one of the promotion play-off places.

"We looked like we'd come up here for a day at the seaside," stormed the Luton boss. "The players would have been better off staying on the beach and watching Punch and Judy, they certainly played like them."

Generally though Pleat, who's had no money available to strengthen his side, must be pleased with the way they've scrapped their way out of trouble.

Most Luton fans feared the worst during the summer when the club's financial position forced them to sell highly rated midfielder Mark Pemble to Derby for £1,250,000 while top scorer Mick Harford joined Chelsea for £300,000.

The fans fears looked like being confirmed when Luton won only one of their first 11 games and just to increase their frustration The Hatters then developed an infuriating habit of throwing away match winning situations.

Against Southend they were 2-0 up at half time but had to settle for a draw, four days later they were 3-0 up at Cambridge but still ended up with just a point to show for their efforts.

Pleat put that down to inexperience

Millwall will certainly have to watch out for him tonight, because prior to that 0-0 draw with Swindon he'd scored in each of Luton's previous six games to take his total for the season to 14.

That sort of strike rate from midfield has attracted plenty of Premier League attention and recently there was intense speculation that he would become new Chelsea manager Dave Webb's first signing.

While Gray's got most of the goals a lot of his ammunition has been provided by the diminutive David Preece who has now made over 300 League and Cup appearances for the club since joining them from Walsall for £150,000 in June 1984.

His experience has complimented the raw promise of youngsters like Paul Telfer, Ceri Hughes and David Greene who have all had to learn on the job.

At the back John Dreyer, who joined the Hatters from Oxford in 1988, and Julian James a product of Luton's youth development system have been turning in some consistent performances, while Marvin Johnson's pace has also played a key role.

MILLWALL v LUTON TOWN

by Ted Wilding

It was way back in 1888 that MILLWALL first crossed paths with LUTON TOWN. The game was played at LUTON on December 1st, and the hosts claimed the first victory by three to nothing.

The following January a return fixture was played at MILLWALL'S enclosure, which was behind the LORD NELSON public house, situated on the corner of the East Ferry and Manchester Roads on the ISLE of DOGS. MILLWALL won this time by four goals to two, a surprising result, for the home team were represented by only nine men.

When the Southern League was formed in 1894, both Clubs were elected into the Division. MILLWALL won the Championship the first two Seasons, followed by LUTON twice as Runners-Up.

The Clubs met on 32 occasions during their Southern League days (1894-1920). The complete record reads

LUTON set off at a lively pace, and tested the home custodian CARMICHAEL who saved well from a SMITH shot. The Lions responded with a swift attack, only to see a fine opening wasted by VINCENT. Next VOISEY came close to beating NAISBY in the LUTON goal. Play then reverted to the other end, a shot from MOODY, Town's inside left bought a save out of the LIONS 'keeper who fell in his attempt to clear, leaving SMITH to tap into an empty net to put LUTON one up. The LIONS did most of the attacking after

this, but the forwards were guilty of missing several good chances.

LUTON went two up when QUINN converted a STANSFIELD centre.

Soon after the restart NAISBY partially cleared a shot from MARTIN but fortunately BROWN was at hand to finish it off.

A third goal was scored by LUTON, the best of the afternoon.

A combined effort by their front line saw MOODY put the finishing touch to a fine piece of football.

The MILLWALL half-back line of FROST, WILSON and BLYTHE put in a tremendous amount of work in their efforts to feed their front men, but the inability of the forwards meant that all the good work was wasted. The referee Mr. W.E. GRANT was the object of lot of "barracking" from the crowd, as were the linesmen

who failed to keep up with the play. One of the linesmen resorted to arguing with some of the crowd in front of the Grandstand.

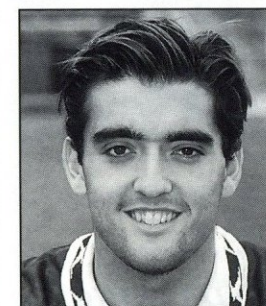

Below: Jon Goodman - scoring return to the side at Roots Hall.

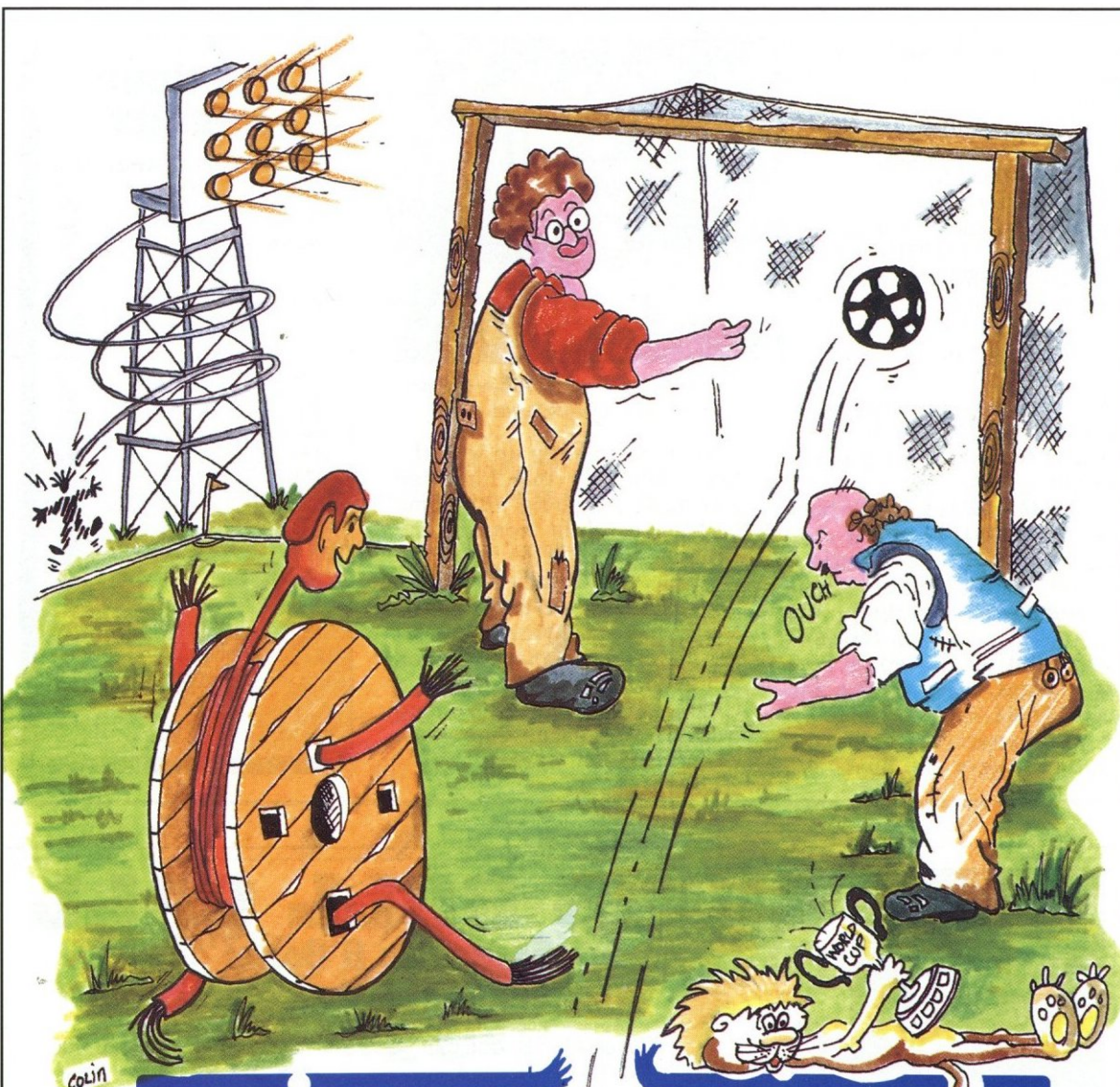

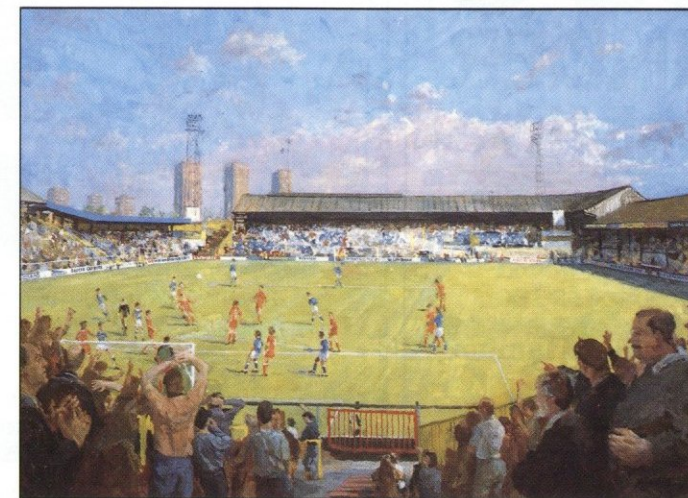

LIONS MAINTAIN PRESSURE AT THE TOP

Having surrendered the leadership of the Football Combination to Chelsea following a spell of two defeats and a draw, Millwall got back to winning ways in emphatic style against a Bristol City side featuring Lions old boy Dave Thompson.

Millwall suffered an early setback after just 3 minutes when Jason Fowler turned in Edwards' cross to give City the lead. The Lions were level 30 minutes later though, a fine move saw Jamie Moralee releasing John Kerr down the right and his cross was a pinpoint one for Tony Dolby to finish from close range.

After half-time the greater experience in the Millwall side began to tell as they swamped their opponents. Alan McLeary had a goal disallowed just after the break, but on 57 minutes The Lions went ahead. Tony Dolby found Andy Roberts overlapping from full-back on the right, and his cross was cleverly flicked in by triallist Nana Boachie, on as a substitute for Jamie Moralee.

Roberts was also the instigator of the third goal with a through ball which split the City defence for John Kerr to run on and slide the ball under the keeper's body. With five minutes left, Dolby scored his second and Millwall's fourth with a sweet volley from Kerr's right wing cross.

Two days later, Ian MacDonald's men made the long trek to East Anglia to take on Norwich City. John Byrne gave The Lions the lead in the first-half and Millwall were comfortably in control for much of the game. They failed to add to their tally though and were made to pay when Norwich equalised twenty minutes from time. This game provided further experience at this level for juniors like Dean Francis, Ben Thatcher, Danny Chapman and Matthew Middleton and gave Jon Goodman his first run out since he aggravated his groin injury against Barnsley a month ago.

Wright himself wrapped things up, netting the fourth after reacting quickest having seen his original shot rebound from a post to seal a comprehensive victory for Tom Walley's youngsters.

It's building into an exciting climax to the season now for the Millwall Juniors. In a fortnight's time they visit Old Trafford to take on Manchester United in the first leg of the F.A. Youth Cup Semi-Final, with the return at The Den on April 13th. United are the holders and hot favourites in this competition but on current form Millwall will fancy their chances of causing an upset. We hope to have details of the Floodlit Cup Final in our Portsmouth programme, but away from Cup football the Juniors continue to lead the South East Counties League Division One table and still have a rearranged fixture against closest rivals Spurs to come.
