TOM Walley is hoping that Millwall fans will turn out in force for the second leg of the Lions' FA Youth Cup semifinal with Manchester United at The Den on April 13.

Walley's youngsters stormed through to the semi-finals with a thrilling 3-2 victory over Nottingham Forest, and now they're confident that they can dump the favourites and holders out of this season's competition.

"We'll get at them up there in the first-leg, and then hopefully we'll finish them off at The Den in front of our own supporters," said Walley.

"When it comes attracting young players a club like Manchester United has got everything in their favour. With their history and resources it would be criminal if they didn't have some excellent youngsters.

"But we've got a pretty handy side ourselves and they showed tremendous character when they fought back from 2-0 down to beat Forest in the quarter finals."

The Lions have already signed teenagers lermaine Wright, Ben Thatcher, Geoff Pitcher, Matthew Middleton, Mark Beard and Mark Kennedy on professional contracts, and Walley is confident that they'll be challenging for first team places sooner rather than later.

THEY'RE ALL TOUGH **GAMES FROM NOW ON**

There's no doubt that having to play with ten men at Southend on Sunday ultimately cost us two points. Sometimes it can work for you being a man short funnily enough, with everyone else feeling aggrieved and trying that little bit harder. But we gave away a couple of bad goals in the second-half and had to settle for a draw. I'm convinced that if Colin Cooper had been on the field in the secondhalf we'd have won comfortably, but if my auntie had a beard she'd be my uncle, there's no point carrying on about what might have happened.

As far as Colin's sending off goes, I'm told it was for kicking Tilson, who ran 30 yards to push him, rather than for the reckless challenge on Colleymore.

He didn't make contact with Colleymore, and although his attempted tackle looked rash. I'm sure Colin was trying to play the ball and no doubt make physical contact with the player at the same time as all defenders try to do. The fact that he didn't do either, as I see it, means that he couldn't have been sent off for the challenge. If I think about robbing

your house but don't actually do it I can't be locked up for it. Anyway, the referee said the sending off was for violent conduct after that incident, involving Tilson. Although I've had a look at the tape supplied to me by the T.V. people, it doesn't show the fracas, and unless I can see evidence that suggests that Colin was guilty I won't be taking any further action against him.

Looking on the positive side, we played hopelessley for much of the game and still came away with a point having scored three goals. I was pleased with the two we got from set pieces which we had been practising on Saturday, although I'm sure Colin Murphy will look at them very differently and feel they were bad goals to concede. Whilst I'm disappointed and a little angry at the goals we let them score, we're now unbeaten in five games, and if we stay unbeaten for the rest of the season we'll be promoted.

Looking ahead, we're going to be without Colin and possibly Rhino for key games during our run in to the end of the season and that's something I'm still keen to find a solution to, although I thought Tony McCarthy did very well when he came on against Southend. THE Lions bruising scrap with Southend at Roots Hall on Sunday left Mick McCarthy's men reflecting that late goals, like luck, tend to balance themselves out.

Malcolm Allen's 93rd minute penalty against Derby must be one of the latest goals the Lions have ever scored.

But last weekend, the boot, if you'll pardon the pun, was on the other foot when Southend grabbed an equaliser three minutes from time.

Despite the disappointment of seeing two points slip from their grasp after Colin Cooper's red card challenge on Stan Collymore, the Lions can still feel pleased with their efforts over the last few weeks.

After a decidedly dodgy February, we are now unbeaten in five and The Lions go into tonight's clash with Luton knowing that three or four more wins would virtually guarantee them a playoff place.


Since recharging their batteries during that four-day break in Portugal, Millwall have won two and drawn three to stay heavily involved in the promotion race.

"Winning at home and drawing away always used to be classic promotion form, and if we can keep our current little run going we won't be far away come May," stressed the Lions boss.

"Our home draw against Sunderland was disappointing, but we made up for that by going and winning at Bristol City.

"We've got 10 games left and seven of them are against clubs who are still nursing promotion hopes, so our future is in our own hands.

"After the sticky patch we went through I've been pleased with the determination the players have shown. We've just got to keep it going."

PUT yourself in Malcolm Allen's boots.

It's three minutes into injury time, you've hammered away at a rock solid defence all afternoon without a sniff of a chance and your side's promotion prospects look like suffering another setback.

Just when you've given up hope, a defender handles, the referee points to the penalty spot and suddenly the stomachchurning responsibility is on your shoulders.

That's exactly the situation Allen found himself in during our last home game against Derby, and who knows just how valuable his ice-cool last gasp penalty could turn out to be.

"The fact that it was so late in the game did put me under a bit of extra pressure," he admitted afterwards. "I could see the clock on the scoreboard, and I knew just how important it was

that I scored.

"But as soon as the referee pointed to the spot I made up my mind which way I was going to put the penalty and I stuck to it.

"I concentrated on making as good a strike as I could and putting it far enough to one side of him, but not so far that there was any danger of me pushing it

"The keeper guessed the right way, but it squeezed in and the place went beserk."

STAGE SET FOR 'SIX POINT' SHOWDOWN

PROMOTION chasing rivals Portsmouth are the next visitors to The Den, as the battle for one of those three Premier Division places intensifies.

Like the Lions, Jim Smith's side have struggled to produce their best form away from home, but then form won't count for much during Saturday week's six pointer.

Guy Whittingham's remarkable 37 goal haul, has established him as one of the country's most wanted strikers, and kept Pompey firmly on course for the

play-offs.

Despite intense transfer speculation, at the time of writing, it looks as though Whittingham will stay at Fratton Park, at least until the end of the season and that could be bad news for the Lions.

Portsmouth went into Saturday's home game against Charlton with their confidence sky high after three straight wins over Cambridge, Watford and Luton.

Can Lions strike a Hammer blow?

MAKE no mistake, if Mick McCarthy's Lions are going to grab one of the First Division's automatic promotion places they need to win Sunday's showdown with West Ham United.

That all-ticket clash with Billy Bonds side starts a run of 'six pointers' which could make or break the Lions promotion prospects.

Newcastle and West Ham are firm favourites to grab the two automatic places, but there are 10 clubs who still fancy their chances of one of the four play-off slots.

The ferocious battle for Premier Division status is complicated by the fact that a lot of the leading contenders are playing each other over the next few weeks.

And McCarthy's men know that victory at Upton Park on Sunday would keep their automatic promotion hopes very much alive.

"It's exactly the sort of game that you want to be involved with at this stage of the season," stressed the Lions boss. "We've only lost to two of the current top 10, so we've done pretty well against the leading sides.

"Sunday's game is a real six pointer, and we'll go over there in very determined mood."

The Hammers went into Saturday's home game against fellow promotion hopefuls Tranmere, determined to bounce back from their first defeat in 16 League games.

That came at Meadow Lane 10 days ago, when Notts County grabbed a 1-0 win which

gave hope to the pack of clubs who still reckon they can grab that second automatic promotion slot.

Millwall's hopes of winning at Upton Park have been boosted by the fact that Hammers 'hard men' Julian Dicks and Martin Allen will both be ruled out because of suspension.

The Lions will also draw strength from their 2-1 victory over West Ham at The Den in November, when Malcolm Allen and Phil Barber earned us what could turn out to be a vital victory.

Milwall fans are reminded that Sunday's game is all-ticket and our allocation of 4000 is selling fast.

If you want to sit down at Upton Park you must be either a seat season ticket holder, or a Lions Card member. If you're neither you'll only be able to buy a terrace ticket priced at £8.

The Den box office will be open until 12 noon on Saturday, subject to availability.

He had already been scouting for the Club on a part-time basis and was responsible for bringing the likes of Andy Roberts, Paul Manning, Mark Foran, Danny Chapman and Matthew Middleton to Millwall

Best Game seen: The 1966 World Cup Final was the ultimate for every English fan. It still brings a lump to my throat every time I see it. In my time at Millwall, the 4-2 win over Sheffield Wednesday back in October 1990 after we'd been 2-0 down at halftime will always stick in my memory. My job means that I tend to see home games in bits and pieces rather than being able to watch them from start to finish

Best Goals seen: Les Briley's at Charlton and his disallowed effort at Arsenal in the old First Division days were both crackers, as was Alex's screamer at Derby last season. I've seen so many great goals in my time, it's very hard to pick just one.

Best Player seen: Undoubtedly George Best. I saw him play for Manchester United at Fulham and I was spellbound. As soon as his name was on the team sheet you got excited because you never knew what to expect from him. As far as I'm concerned he was better than Pele and Eusebio, the only player to touch him was possibly Stanley Matthews.

At Millwall, Joe Broadfoot, who was at school with me was a great player. Keith Weller and Derek Possee also spring to mind. Whilst I've been working with the Club, Teddy Sheringham has to be the best striker I've seen and Colin Cooper has been a revelation at the back this season hasn't he?

Best Millwall Moment: As a supporter, in common with everyone else no doubt, it was promotion to the First Division in 1988. The best moment on a personal level was being given the opportunity by John Docherty and Mr Burr to work for the Club fulltime. Initially I did the kit and continued my scouting, but by the time Bruce Rioch arrived Allen Batsford had come in as Chief Scout and I just



concentrated on being Kit Manager because I couldn't really cope with both jobs.

Best Coach/Manager: I admire Brian Clough because of his outspokenness. I know he's having a hard time of it at the moment, but all teams go through that phase. He speaks his mind and sticks to his principles.

For me Mick is brilliant. I'm not saying this just because he's the current manager because I speak as I find, but he's undoubtedly got the best out of the players here. Personally, I admired Bruce, for whom things didn't really work out, but since Mick has taken over the whole atmosphere at the club has changed and that is reflected on the field.

Best idea to improve the game: Stop betting on individual players to score the first goal. You get players betting on themselves to score first and inevitably it's going to affect the way they play because they're bound to be trying that bit harder to get on the scoresheet rather than concentrating on the needs of the team. That may sound strange, but it's my opinion anyway.



THERE ARE SOME GREAT GAMES COMING UP

I was particularly pleased to play against Derby. Andu Mau not only because it was a great result for us in the end, but because I was in a lot of pain after the Sunderland match and I thought I might be out of action for some time. The physios had a look at the calf and gave me a painkilling and antiinflammatory injection and I was on crutches for a couple of days which took the weight off it. The result was that the blood was dispersed from the calf to my foot which swelled up and made it easier. The X-ray then showed only a slight strain and I was able to train at the end of the week. which was a tremendous outcome. Then after a minute against Derby Paul Williams whacked me right on the point where it had been sore, and for the next five or ten minutes I thought I was in trouble again, but fortunately I ran it off.

This evening Alan Kirk features GERRY BOWLER

Gerry Bowler was born in Londonderry, Northern Ireland on the 8th June, 1919. He started his playing career with local side Derry and was transferred to Distillery for £1,000, which at the time was the highest fee paid between two Irish League clubs. Gerry then joined First Division Portsmouth for £5,000 before moving to Hull City where he became friends with Raich Carter and the late Don Revie.

In 1949 Gerry made the first of his three International appearances for Northern Ireland against a very strong Scotland side including Young, Woodburn, Steel, Reilly and Waddell in Belfast. His other caps were against England and Wales in the same Home Championship Series. Gerry was transferred to Millwall for £12,000 in June 1950. He recalls that they were an ambitious club in the fifties with loyal supporters and attendances of between twenty and thirty thousand. He made his debut for the Lions at Exeter City on the 19th August, 1950 in a 1-0 victory.

Gerry was an outstanding centre-half and was made captain of the Club and had a steadying influence on the rest of the defence. Over the next five years he made 184 first team appearances and it was during his time at The Den that he represented London twice, firstly against Berlin at Highbury and then against Belgium in the Heysel Stadium, Brussels. He was also selected for the Irish International tour of the United States and Canada in 1953.

One particular match that Gerry recalls very vividly was on the 10th January, 1953 in the Third Round of the F.A. Cup at home to Manchester United in front of 35,652 spectators. Millwall had beaten Aldershot and Barrow in the previous two rounds and finally lost to United by a disputed goal which had crossed the goal line near the corner flag by at least two feet only for Berry to cross for Pearson who scored in fading light.

In 1955 Gerry retired from the professional game and settled in the Crawley area but he continued his links with sport, managing Horsham Football Club in the Corinthian League from 1958 to 1962 and writing a football column for a local newspaper. Gerry is now 73 years young and works at Gatwick Airport for Fortes Restaurants in the South Terminal Departure Lounge



which he thoroughly enjoys. He is married to Helen and they have two children Tom and Geraldine and three grandchildren Kelly, Neil and Simone.

He has great memories of a very distinguished career, his three International caps, his time at Millwall, a match in which Ireland beat an England XI I-0 and Gerry blotted out the great Tommy Lawton, and playing for the Combined Services side in Belfast which included such stars as Frank Swift, Joe Mercer, Neil Franklin, Stanley Matthews and Tommy Lawton.



SYDNEY SWEETMAN Right-back Born: Willesden, 2 March 1903

Died: North Kent Summer 1980

Sydney Charles Sweetman played all his football with clubs. starting London Stonebridge Park School. He played local football Hampstead Town at centreforward, but after joining Queens Park Rangers in February 1925 he furned centre-half. He played for Rangers for four seasons, before joining Millwall in May 1929, for a record £3.975 as a full-back. Although now playing right-back he played centre-half for seven games when Millwall signed Frank Hancock and scored his only goal in a two-nil win over Bristol City. At 5ft 111/2ins weighing 12 stone 6lbs, he was a robust and fearless tackler who played long, accurate balls to the front players. Over five seasons he played 131 games. He received his fair share of injuries which eventually ended his career. He hung up his boots after making only 24 appearances in 18 months up to the end of 1934.

He was champion class at table tennis, and also a bit of boxer. An engineer by trade, he became a licensee in Reading after his career

disposing of London neighbours Chelsea in the Fourth Round, players and fans alike had their prayers answered when Millwall's name came first out of the black bag. Their hopes must have dropped when Derby County followed. The Rams were in sixth place in the First Division, Millwall a place lower in the Third South. Added to this, Derby boasted six full internationals and were a physical side. From the kick-off Millwall were subjected to blatant niggling tackles. The play makers soon learned to move the ball quicker while the defenders matched the County tackle for tackle and kept to their normal

game. Derby took the lead in most unusual fashion, Keen taking a free-kick out near the touchline saw his hopeful punt sail over everyone and settle in the goal. The Lions fought back with tremendous verve not allowing Derby to consolidate their lead. From the restart Millwall moved the ball about with renewed effort. Finally a through ball from Tom Brolly was taken in his stride by Dave Mangnall who equalised with a cracking low first time drive. Mangnall like Jim McCartney had an uncanny instinct for finding that yard of free space and losing his marker. Chances were coming

to both teams. McCartney's rising shot just skimmed the bar before Jack Thorogood shaved a post with Scattergood beaten. The keeper had to save three in quick succession before Derby relieved the pressure when Duncan's cross was headed against Millwall's bar by Dan Astley. As Millwall pushed forward they had to be wary of Derby's counter attacks, Napier hit a post with a hard shot. John Burke then had to be alert to dive on a loose ball with the opposition forwards in close attention. Derby seemed to think they had stifled Millwall and were settling for a draw. This gave Millwall the momentum they needed. Iim Daniells nutmegged the County centre-half but his pass to Ken Burditt was cleared by a timely tackle. Ted Smith nearly punished one of Derby's many fouls, his free-kick goal being disallowed by the referee. In the dying minutes with Derby booting the ball anywhere and hanging on grimly for a draw Daniells beat Howe with a neat turn out on the right wing. His cross was headed out to McCartney who volleyed a tremendous match winner into the roof of the net. This game brought in Millwall's record official attendance of 48,672 amid scenes of fainting fans and pitch invasions, as the crowd were within

inches of the touchline for most of the match. Millwall estimated that there were around 50,000 fans in the ground after the gates had collapsed due to the pressure of people surging for admittance.

NEW DEN UPDATE

The most important feature of Millwall's New Den has to be the playing surface. Groundsman John Plummer has gained wide recognition for the quality of the pitch here, and naturally his and Mick McCarthy's concern is that the one at the new stadium is of an equally high standard. John has monitored the progress at The New Den right from the start and is confident that he will inherit an excellent playing surface in July.

"We have had certain advantages compared with other Clubs who

new pitches recently. Sheffield Wednesday and Arsenal for only example had two or three months tween the time pitches their were laid and the first game being played on them. We have had the best part of a year which really gives the grass ample time to

have put down


take root properly. We also have fully three feet of new soil under the playing surface compared with just six inches in some instances, which further enhances the prospects of producing a hard wearing pitch.

You can see in the picture (left) evidence of the under soil heating facility at The New Den, which of course we don't have here. There are 242 heating pipes laid 12 inches apart and 12 inches below the surface, through which hot water is pumped giving the effect of a giant radiator system. The pipes are surrounded by sand and shingle which transmits the heat to the surface quicker, and should ensure that we do not have a game postponed due to frost next season.

The irrigation system, including an 8,000 gallon water tank is currently being installed. It is known as a 'pop up system' with sprinklers around the edge of the pitch which pop up from the ground when we want to use them. There are no sprinklers under the pitch itself because in the event of a problem we would have to dig the pitch up to sort it out. For the middle of the pitch we will continue to use mobile sprinklers connected to junctions round the edge.

I'm looking forward to working on the new pitch. But I'm not under any illusions, it will still involve a lot of hard work to look after it."

Millwall are amongst the front runners in the First **Division handicap race says David Pleat**

When Millwall came to Kenilworth Road back in November they had been the side in this Division that had impressed me most. The conditions on the day were very heavy and not suited to Millwall's passing style, and I thought we coped with them very well in the first-half and held the balance of the game. But I was very impressed by the way they came back into it and particularly the way they kept their composure when they were one down and continually spread the ball about to get Dawes involved. They're one of the few teams prepared to play across the width of the field and back again as opposed to hitting it forward early.

For ourselves, we've improved very slowly. We've lost less games than the other clubs in the lower half, but we've drawn fifteen and that's been our problem to a degree. But we're looking for stability and perhaps we have to get draws before we get wins. If we can survive this season, we'll look to take things on from there

Mick McCarthy has certainly done very

well in his first season in charge at Millwall, and I've been very impressed at the manner in which he's got his team playing I remember trying to buy Mick from Barnsley many years ago so I've admired him both as a player and now as a manager, and I hope his side can hold their nerve and claim a play-off place.

I think there has been less frenetic, frantic play in the First Division this year than there has in the Premier where the fear of losing that status, plus the natural inclinations of the likes of Palace and Wimbledon have created a fast and furious game. Newcastle, Swindon, West Ham and Millwall have all played with great composure and fluidity in

contrast, but I have to say that there is a handicap system in this Division. Keegan at Newcastle has spent a lot of money, and wisely, but that has been a significant factor in their success. West Ham are still a big Club who have retained Premier League class players and with good crowds have similar advantages. Of the Clubs in the handicap race as I call it. Millwall, Swindon and Grimsby have done very well indeed. These clubs have all belied their circumstances and I think it's fascinating to look at the bookmakers who do the pre-season handicap odds and see where teams would have finished under such a system.

During a long and distinguished playing career he had spells with Nottingham Forest, Luton, Shrewsbury, Exeter and Peterborough.

LUTON SET TO WIN SURVIVAL STRUGGLE?

DAVID Pleat's Luton will be out to put some daylight between themselves and the First Division relegation battle at The Den tonight.

The Hatters went into Saturday's clash with bottom-of-the-table Bristol Rovers knowing that three wins from their last 11 games would just about ensure that they beat the drop.

That didn't look too likely a couple of months ago when Luton found themselves propping up the rest of the table after a disappointing run which saw them pick up eight points out of 24.

That left Pleat's side facing an uphill relegation battle, but they've shown tremendous character and clawed their way up the table with only two defeats in their last nine outings.

There's no doubt that, at their best, Pleat's youngsters are formidable opposition - just ask promotion chasing Swindon who were held to a 0-0 draw at Kenilworth Road a week ago

Pleat was less happy after their last away trip ended in a 3-1 defeat at Grimsby, who still haven't given up hope of grabbing one of the promotion

"We looked like we'd come up here for a day at the seaside," stormed the Luton boss. "The players would have been better off staving on the beach and watching Punch and Judy, they certainly played like them '

Generally though Pleat, who's had no money available to strengthen his side. must be pleased with the way they've scrapped their way out of trouble.

Most Luton fans feared the worst during the summer when the club's financial position forced them to sell highly rated midfielder Mark Pembridge to Derby for £1,250,000 while top scorer Mick Harford joined Chelsea for £300,000

The fans fears looked like being confirmed when Luton won only one of their first 11 games and just to increase their frustration The Hatters then developed an infuriating habit of throwing away match winning situations.

Against Southend they were 2-0 up at half time but had to settle for a draw, four days later they were 3-0 up at Cambridge but still ended up with just a point to show for their efforts.

Pleat put that down to inexperience

The Luton boss did take out something of an insurance policy when he signed former Chelsea star Kerry Dixon on-loan from Southampton, and

although, at the time of writing, he'd only scored once, his experience has been important.

In recent weeks Dixon has been partnered upfront by Scott Oakes, a former Leicester youngster, who opened his Football League account during Luton's 3-1 victory over Oxford at the beginning of March.

Goal scoring has been Luton's main problem all season, with only midfielder Phil Gray on target with any

Millwall will certainly have to watch out for him tonight, because prior to that 0-0 draw with Swindon he'd scored in each of Luton's previous six games to take his total for the season to 14

That sort of strike rate from midfield has attracted plenty of Premier League attention and recently there was intense speculation that he would become new Chelsea manager Dave Webb's first signing.

While Gray's got most of the goals a lot of his ammunition has been provided by the diminutive David Preece who has now made over 300 League and Cup appearances for the club since joining them from Walsall for £150,000 in June 1984.

His experience has complimented the raw promise of youngsters like Paul Telfer, Ceri Hughes and David Greene who have all had to learn on the job.

At the back John Drever, who joined the Hatters from Oxford in 1988, and Julian James a product of Luton's youth development system have been turning in some consistent performances, while Marvin Johnson's pace has also played a key role.

MILLWALL v LUTON TOWN

It was way back in 1888 that MILLWALL first crossed paths with LUTON TOWN. The game was played at LUTON on December 1st, and the hosts claimed the first victory by three to

The following January a return fixture was played at MILLWALL'S enclosure, which was behind the LORD NELSON public house, situated on the corner of the East Ferry and Manchester Roads on the ISLE of DOGS. MILLWALL won this time by four goals to two, a surprising result, for the home team were represented by only nine

When the Southern League was formed in 1894, both Clubs were elected into the Division, MILLWALL won the Championship the first two Seasons, followed by LUTON twice as Runners-Up.

The Clubs met on 32 occasions during their Southern League days (1894-1920). The complete record reads

LUTON went two up when QUINN converted STANSFIELD centre.

Soon after the restart NAISBY partially cleared a shot from MARTIN but fortunately BROWN was at hand to finish it off.

A third goal was scored by LUTON, the best of the afternoon.

A combined effort by their front line saw MOODY put the finishing touch to a fine piece of football.

The MILLWALL half-back line of FROST, WILSON and BLYTHE put in a tremendous amount of work in their efforts to feed their front men, but the inability of the forwards meant that all the good work was wasted. The referee Mr. W.E. GRANT was the object of lot of "barracking" from the crowd, as were the linesmen

who failed to keep up with the play. One of the linesmen resorted to arguing with some of the crowd in front of the Grandstand.



FIRST REVIEW by Dennis Turner

A new name has pushed its way into the play-off places in the last week Leicester City, beaten by Blackburn in last season's play-off final at Wembley, are now showing the sort of form that could book a return journey. Victories at Tranmere and at home to Sunderland and Grimsby have lifted Brian Little's men up to sixth place. Man of the moment a Filbert Street is defender Steve Walsh who is doing 'a Paul Warhurst' with four goals in the last three games.

For any of the chasing pack to clinch one of the two automatic promotion places means they must win at least three more games than West Ham and with only ten games to go, this is a tall order. Newcastle, strengthened by the £1.75m signing of Andrew Cole from Bristol City, buried Notts County at St James' last Saturday after a rare slip-up at Swindon the previous week. Cole was on the mark but it was the much maligned David Kelly, with his 22nd and 23rd goals of the season, who was the Magpies hero. The 'Hammers had Julian Dicks to thank for their win over Tranmere. He struck two second-half penalties before starting his latest suspension. Like Newcastle, West Ham had been beaten the previous week, at Notts County

It has been a miserable few weeks for Tranmere. Despite paying £400,000 to Celtic for Tommy Coyne to replace the injured John Aldridge and signing Mark Proctor from Middlesbrough, they have managed just one point from a possible nine in their last three outings. Despite leading at home to Leicester, Rovers lost 2-3, and also went down 0-2 at Upton Park Sandwiched in between was a less than memorable goalless draw at Grimsby, and Tranmere have now made way for Leicester in the top six Swindon's recent good run came to grief at Derby on Sunday. A very impressive home victory over Newcastle lifted them into third place but then a draw at Luton and defeat at the Baseball Ground has allowed Portsmouth to overtake them. Pompey owed their latest three points to the prolific Guy Whittingham. He notched his 37th goal of the season against Charlton, the only score of the match. It is hard to believe that

Whittingham will not be playing in the Premier League next season.

At the bottom, life is just as fluid, Watford, in 14th place, probably head the relegation pack. Although the Hornets are five points clear of the last relegation spot, their recent form must be worrying manager Steve Perryman. Defeats at home to Barnsley and at Bristol City made it four losses on the trot and with Newcastle the next visitors to Vicarage Road, there is every prospect of this run being extended. Perryman's former club, Brentford, are having an even harder time. Back at this level after a 40 year interval, the Bees have lost their last eight games and are in 22nd place, one of the three condemned spots. Last Saturday's home defeat by Birmingham, showing signs of a revival under their new management, was especially damaging as the Bees and the Blues

swapped League positions.
