

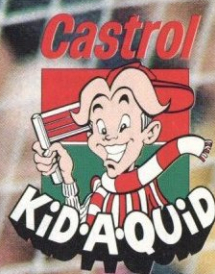

AIRMEN from RAF Lyneham are today preparing to airlift stranded Swindon Town football players out of Spain in time for Saturday's match.

Glenn Hoddle and his team were scheduled to return today from a five-day break in La Manga on the Costa Blanca.

Promotion-chasing Swindon face Peterborough United at home this weekend.

The match was under threat until airmen stationed at the RAF base near Swindon devised a rescue plan.

Swindon's soccer stars will be bused to Gibraltar, a Crown colony, so the Hercules can land without entering Spanish air space.

The team will then be flown back to RAF Lyneham in time for the big game.

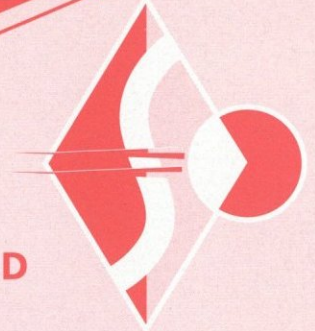
Flt Lt Ted Querzani, community relations officer at RAF Lyneham, said; "We are just happy to help as Swindon Town aim for the top flight."

This Monday afternoon we travel to St Andrews when we take on Birmingham City in the Barclays League kicking off at 3.00pm.

Our next home League fixture is the **all ticket** clash with Leicester City next Saturday kicking off at 3.00pm. Tickets for this game are available now from the Advance Ticket Office.

Tickets are also available for the last home League game of this season at The County Ground against West Ham United on Sunday 2 May which kicks off at 3.00pm. Terrace tickets are at the turnstiles this afternoon and after the game from the Matchday Ticket Office while seat tickets are on sale at the Advance Ticket Office. The game is being transmitted live by Central, Anglia, LWT, Meridian and HTV West regions.

RETAIN VOUCHERS

On entry at the terrace turnstiles this afternoon supporters will have been given a voucher number 5. This should be retained along with

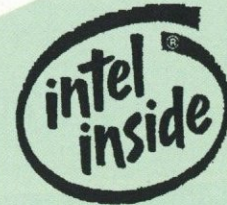

When I first arrived at Swindon, the team were just above the relegation pack and in those eight final games that season, I learnt more than in the past two years.

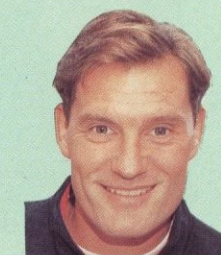
Just a note on our trip to Spain which was absolutely terrific. I think it was more a mental break than anything although we trained extremely well and had a couple of sharp sessions. We

for him having been involved in that superb Welsh victory over Belgium in mid week, when he contributed significantly to their second goal.

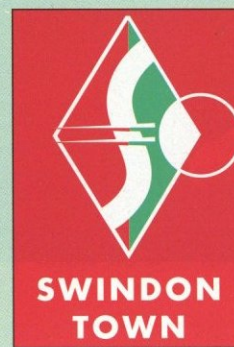

What we need now is a little bit of luck to swing our way. I'm confident we have the ability ... have a happy Easter.



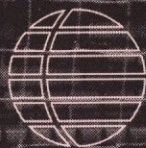
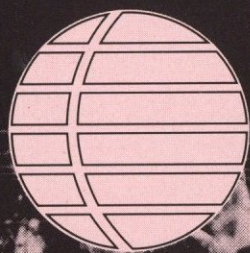

NEWS ON *one*

Newcastle United kept on course for the First Division title last Saturday with a convincing 3-0 win at lowly Cambridge with Steve Howey, top scorer David Kelly and new striker Andy Cole finding the net. Despite this latest setback Cambridge boss Ian Atkins remains optimistic that his side can avoid the drop. "The dividing line between success and failure this season is a very thin one as, bar the top two sides, it is a very even league. We ourselves have proved this as we have had good results against the promotion chasers. A couple of wins can send you right up the table."

West Ham needed two goals in the last couple of minutes at St. Andrews to gain an important win against a Birmingham side who had taken the lead through recent signing Andy Saville. Blues boss Terry Cooper has almost rebuilt his side in the past couple of weeks following the change of Chairman but believes he has a future International on his hands in the form of left back Graham Potter "Players like Graham come along once in a while. I could not believe he was just 17 when he made his debut in the first team as he looked so confident. He's just got natural ability. Last season I watched him play in the Youth Team and knew he was an outstanding

prospect. He's already part of the England set up at Youth level and will soon be playing for the Under 21's. There isn't a better young left back in the country at the moment."

Watched by Everton boss Howard Kendall, Stan Collymore notched his 14th goal of the season for Southend United at Sunderland since his transfer last November. New Southend manager Barry Fry, who saw his team leave Roker Park with three valuable points in their battle against relegation following their 4-2 victory said that if anybody wants Collymore they would not get him for only £2m. A deadline day transfer with Nottingham Forest fell through. Fry said "Stan is a bit special. He'll go on to play International football. I need him at the moment but if we go down we could not afford to keep him." After their drubbing Sunderland manager Terry Butcher confessed that the game was the worst The Rokerites had played all season.

David Lowe wrecked Leicester City's hope of eight wins on the trot by directing a torrent of verbal abuse at referee David Frampton during their 0-0 draw with Bristol Rovers at Twerton Park last weekend. He lost his cool when what appeared to be a clear cut penalty was turned down. Lowe will miss next Saturday's clash here at The County Ground.

The vagabond of football secured a point for Millwall in their battle with Portsmouth at The Den. Goal hero John Kerr has had thirteen clubs in five different countries during his career. Football has taken him on a round the world trip playing for teams in America, Canada, England (twice), Northern Ireland and France. He even commuted to play for Wycombe Wanderers when he moved to Scotland following a family bereavement.

Barnsley only had two shots on target in their 0-0 draw with Charlton Athletic at The Valley and this did not please the travelling Oakwell fans who barracked Tykes boss Mel Machin. "Those supporters just do not realise how hard it is to run a club like ours. I think that we contained Charlton well." Alan Curbishley would not blame his sides injury crisis for their display. He said "We have not only got thirteen fit men but we just have not given the fans real value for money since our return to The Valley."

Luton Town

Luton Town's climb from the relegation zone continued with a convincing 2-0 win over Cambridge United, a victory achieved with spectacular goals.

Kerry Dixon was on target for the second time since arriving on loan from Southampton with a vintage strike that had the hallmark of class written all over it. The former England striker has intimated he would like to sign for his home-town club. The stumbling block is Southampton's £200,000 price tag, which though reasonable for a player of his quality, is still beyond the financial scope of David Pleat.

The win over Cambridge was also a success for Chris Kamara, the no-nonsense ball winner who clocked up 234 League appearances with Town during his two spells with us. Recalled from a loan spell with Middlesbrough he arrived as Mr Unpopular and left with the Man of the Match award.

It was Chris' first game for the Hatters in four and a half months after loan spells with Sheffield United and Middlesbrough and he was more than a little apprehensive as he thought the fans felt let down because they knew he was unsettled.

The former Town midfielder admits he was pleasantly surprised at the improvement in the Hatters side since his last appearance with them in early November when Luton were on the wrong side of a 4-1 thrashing from Grimsby at Kenilworth Road.

He cautioned: "I don't want to get carried away but the improvement from them is phenomenal."

Even in mid-October when Luton fans only had one win - over Brentford - to applaud in 15 starts there was no denying David Pleat's team still tried to play football. They lacked experience however and were not helped in this respect by the state of their heavily

sanded pitch which sucked the skill factor out of their game.

Dixon, who has played under some big name managers in his time, is full of enthusiasm. He claims: "David Pleat is a different class. I love the way he wants the game played. He gets people knocking the ball around."

The former Chelsea hit-man made his reputation as a goalscorer but it is his ability to bring other players into the game that is proving so influential with Luton. The experience of Dixon and Kamara has transformed the team and brought the best out of the promising youngsters who at one time looked destined for Division Two.

It is only a couple of months ago that Luton were at rock bottom of Division One. They clawed their way up the ladder with a run that has seen them beaten just three times in 12 games.

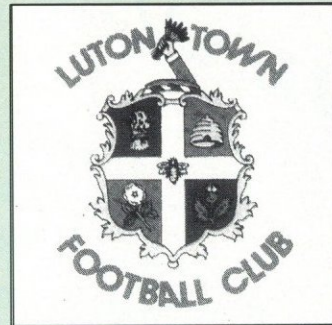
A goalless draw with us highlighted the fact that they are no pushovers these days and the Hatters come to the County Ground knowing that just one more win should ensure their place in Division One next season.

Mr Pleat will probably not get the credit he deserves. Last summer finances forced the sale of top scorer Mick Harford to Chelsea for £300,000 and midfielder Mark Pembroke to Derby for £1.25 million. He was left with an enthusiastic yet inexperienced squad.

Scoring has been the Hatters biggest concern, yet in midfielder Phil Gray they have a player whose consistency in this department is second to none.

Gray has ruffled in no less than 18 goals this season, many of them spectacular efforts from outside the box. His form has attracted the scouts from many Premier League clubs and there was wide speculation that he was destined for Chelsea prior to the deadline.

None the less with relegation threatening Mr Pleat took the precaution of signing the experienced Kerry Dixon on loan from Southampton. In recent weeks the former England striker has formed a partnership with Scott Oakes.



Dreyer, Johnson, Peake and James have been the regular backline, with Hughes, Telfer, Rees and Preece in midfield. Gray and Oakes up front. The introduction of Kamara and Dixon has given Mr Pleat more variations.

Des Linton, Aaron Skelton, an 18-year-old midfielder who made his debut after just two reserve games, and Martin Williams, 20, who made his debut at Southampton in March 1992, have also contributed to the Hatters cause.

Alec Chamberlain - Goalkeeper. Alec was signed from Everton for £150,000 in July 1988 and took over in the Luton goal towards the end of the following season. He was a reserve player at Ipswich, but soon stepped into League soccer with Colchester United after his transfer in 1982. Everton signed him for £75,000 in 1987 as cover, but after a loan spell with Tranmere. He moved to Kenilworth Road. He spent the early part of this season on loan at Chelsea. Born: March 20-6-64.

Kerry Dixon - Striker. The perfect gentleman off the field, a ruthless destroyer on it. Spotted with Chesham United as a youngster he played as a part-timer for Spurs in the South East Counties League in

1978-79. Didn't make an impression and joined Dunstable. Reading introduced Kerry to League football v Walsall in 1980 and he scored his first League goal at Brentford 23-8-80. Chelsea paid £175,000 for him in '83 and he responded with 34 goals in his first season - Chelsea's best for 21 years. Became a legend at The Bridge scoring 147 goals in 355 League games for the Blues. Joined Southampton this season but 2 goals in 11 games did not establish his place and he has joined Luton on loan. Capped by England at Under-21 and full levels he was a member of the World Cup squad in Mexico. Born: Luton 24-7-61.

John Dreyer - Defender. John was an apprentice with Oxford but played League soccer for both

Torquay and Fulham on loan during 1985-86, before getting his chance. in the Oxford side the following season. He joined Luton in 1988 for £140,000 and he has been an ever-present member of the side for the past three seasons. Born: Alnwick 11-6-63.

Phillip Gray - Forward. Phil developed in the junior ranks at Tottenham, making his debut in 1987. However, he found first team openings limited and spent a loan spell at Barnsley. He joined Luton for £275,000 in August 1991, but missed most of the season through injury. He has since hit a goalscoring purple patch, prompting a recall to the Northern Ireland side to face Denmark in November 1992. Born: Belfast 2-10-68.

LUTON TOWN

Richard Harvey - Defender. Richard is a former England youth international who made his Luton debut as a 17-year-old in 1986. He made the left-back spot his own last season and has been a regular first-team squad member for the past three seasons. Unable to gain a place in the starting line-up this term, Richard spent a loan spell at Blackpool in November. Born: Letchworth 17-4-69.

Ceri Hughes - Midfield. Another young Luton Town Welshman, Ceri is tipped as having a very bright future in the game. He made his Town debut v Aston Villa in 1990 and is a Wales youth, Under-21 and full international. Last season, and the early part of this, has been wrecked for Ceri after a series of long injuries. Born: Rhonda Valley 26-2-71.

Marvin Johnson - Defender. Marvin made his Football League debut against Wimbledon in 1988 and quickly established himself as a regular in the Town defence. A player who can play anywhere along the back line, he missed all of the last season with a ruptured achilles tendon, but is now back in the squad. Born: Wembley 29-10-68.

Chris Kamara - Midfield. Much travelled Chris joined Luton Town from Leeds in October 1991 for his first extended spell in Division One. He started his career at Portsmouth in 1975 before joining Swindon Town two years later. In 1981, he returned to Pompey for a season before joining Brentford. In 1985 he returned for a second spell at Swindon and spent a further three seasons at the County Ground before spells at Stoke and Leeds. Born: Middlesbrough 25-12-57.

Scott Oakes - Midfield/Forward. 20-year-old Scott joined Luton in October 1991 from Leicester City, along with Des Linton, and made his debut for the Hatters later that month. He developed in the junior teams at Filbert Street and made his League debut in 1990. Scott made an impressive impact on the right wing last season until injury ruled him out of the final stages. Born: Leicester 5-8-72.

Trevor Peake - Defender. Club captain, Trevor started his career at Lincoln in 1979 before moving on to Coventry City in 1983. He enjoyed eight full seasons at Highfield Road

winning an FA Cup Winners' Medal in 1987. He joined Luton for £100,000 in August 1991. Born: Nuneaton 6-7-57.

David Preece - Midfield. David made his League debut for Walsall in 1981, winning a regular place two years later. Luton invested £150,000 in his signature in 1984 and he later played in two League Cup finals for the Hatters. David has been capped three times by England 'B'. Born: Bridgnorth 28-5-63.

Jason Rees - Midfield. Jason is an ex-trainee who made his League debut on new Year's Day 1990, as a substitute against Everton. He made his debut for the Wales Under-21 the same season against England and has gone on to establish himself as a first team regular this season at Kenilworth Road. Born: Aberdare 22-12-69.

Paul Telfer - Midfield. Paul is a former Luton trainee who had made his debut at Everton, as substitute, towards the end of season 1990-91. Last season he established himself on the right side of the Hatters midfield before the Luton injury jinx ruled him out for the last four months of the season. Edinburgh 21-10-71

THE MAN IN CHARGE



DAVID PLEAT made a name for himself, both as a player and a manager with Luton Town. Began his playing days at Nottingham Forest but played only half a dozen games before joining Luton Town in 1964. In 1967 he was transferred to Shrewsbury Town and later played for Exeter City and Peterborough United before retiring in 1971.

In 1974 he returned to Luton as reserve team coach and was promoted to first team coaching three years later. David was finally appointed manager in 1978 and guided Luton into Division One four years later.

In 1986 he joined Tottenham Hotspur, leading them to an FA Cup Final appearance before moving on to manage Leicester City in December 1987. He remained at Filbert Street until January 1991 before returning for his third spell in June 1991.

Those were the days...



... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

Luton have been regular visitors to Swindon since those far off days before the Town even moved to the County Ground, in fact, they were one of the last clubs to be entertained at The Croft, 98 years ago this week.

They were also the first to oppose Swindon in a Football League fixture, a game more commonly referred to as the one by which the Town recorded their highest ever victory in competition.

It came on August 28 1920, when over 12,000 - a figure never previously seen at Swindon for other than an F.A. Cup tie - turned up to welcome Swindon Town into the new Third Division. On the previous Saturday, a crowd of eight thousand had attended the annual public practice match, when the 'Whites' or reserves, defeated the 'Reds' or first eleven, 3-2!

Swindon had four new players on view, including a completely new half-back line in Tommy 'Jumbo' Langford from Stalybridge Celtic, Fred Hawley from Birmingham and Billy Wareing from Everton. The fourth was also an ex-Evertonian, full-back Jock Maconnachie, who had been at Goodison for 13 years.

There was also a change to the laws of the game, in as much as a player could now no longer be deemed offside when receiving the ball directly from a throw-in.

Kick off was at 3.30 and at 3.36 Billy Batty - who had scored both the Reds' goals the week before - netted the first League goal at the Town End, or Hotel End as it was then known. Bertie Davies soon hit a second before Swindon's England International Harold Fleming added a brace, twice outwitting the visitors' defence.

Luton managed to pull a goal back when Hawley was penalised for hands and Simms scored from the free-kick, but within three minutes Fleming had registered a fifth to complete the first-half scoring.

Batty again opened the Town's account after the interval, converting a Bob Jefferson centre, before the veteran winger grabbed the seventh goal himself. On this occasion, Batty was the provider. Keeper Watson could only parry his shot and 'Jeff' knocked on the rebound.

Still the goals came! Fleming took his personal tally to four and his side's to eight when he enticed the keeper from his line

before nonchalantly tapping the ball past him. The only forward not to get his name on the score sheet was Dave Roberts, but he had the honour of at least two 'assists'.

The final goal came when Luton's Mathieson decided to get in on the act, lobbing a 30-yard back-pass over Watson's head to make the scoreline 9-1! In the seventy-three years that have passed since that day, Swindon have never equalled that score in a League game, although they hit ten in the F.A. Cup against the amateurs of Farnham United Breweries just five years later.

Steve White

PLAYER PROFILE

Even the Spanish sunshine was unable to burn out the sense of injustice that swelled within Steve White following his sending off at Brentford a fortnight ago.

After that fateful game a disconsolate Steve stood up against a wall and told the waiting media men: "My conscience is perfectly clear. This is only the second time in my career that I have been sent-off. The other was 12 years ago and was a case of mistaken identity.

There are few top-line strikers who can boast a disciplinary record as good as this. It must be second only to Alan Smith, the Arsenal number nine, who has never ever been booked!

Says Steve: "The rules seem very complex. We sent an appeal in because there was no way I deliberately tried to injure the other player. When you jump for a high ball you take off from one leg and naturally use your arms to help the elevation. All players do this.

"A video of the incident was sent to the referee to give him the chance to change his mind about his decision but to be honest it didn't look very good. He hasn't altered his mind which means I am not even entitled to a personal hearing which seems unjust."

It is this sense of injustice that has riled the normally quiet Steve White so much. He pleads: "If I'd elbowed the fellow intentionally I would stand up to be counted. Apologies to the manager. Apologies to the

players and to the fans. But I never ever swing my elbow intentionally and this has been backed up by Keith Millen the Brentford player involved.

"I didn't solicit his support. It was made publicly of his own free will. I know and he knows there was no malice involved. The referee has not even had cause to speak to me before the incident.

"My disciplinary record over 16-years is impeccable. I really am angry about what happened at Brentford.

"The suspension couldn't have come at a worse time for the club or for me. With the possibility of Wembley looming this is not the time to lose your place in the team."

The three match ban incurred by the red card incident comes into force today. A most inopportune time as far as Steve is concerned as he would dearly have loved to play against his former club.

He sighs: "I joined Luton Town in December 1979 from Bristol Rovers and spent two and a half glorious years with the club.

"Pleaty was the manager then as well and was marvellous to work with. We played some excellent football and went on to win the Second Division Championship.

"There were some fine players in the side. Mal Donaghy, Brian Horton who is now the manager of Oxford. Lil Fuccillo, who was in

charge of last week's opponents Peterborough United. David Moss, who must have been one of the best crossers of a ball in the business; with myself and Brian Stein up front.

"Mossy was a most underrated player. He possessed two fantastic feet and the string of crosses he would put over in the course of 90 minutes was phenomenal.

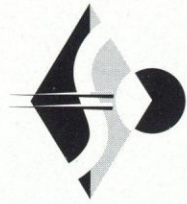
"We played a passing game as in fact they do now. David Pleat is a good manager. He can not only motivate you but I don't think there is a manager in the game who is as good as him when it comes to changing things at half-time. His appreciation of why things are happening is first class as is his ability to change it. That is hard to do I can assure you."

Today these qualities will be put to the test against a Town side without Steve and indeed David Mitchell to spearhead our attack. "I'm really sorry not to be playing," says Steve. "I'll see you in the stand.

"You know I never allow myself to get in a position on the pitch where I lose my temper. You might say I have a long fuse. But I have rarely felt as angry as I do right now. I understand that a referee's job is a very difficult one and that they have to make impulsive decisions under pressure. I just believe there should be some machinery in the works to allow them to retract their deliberations after revue. It could be done without losing face."



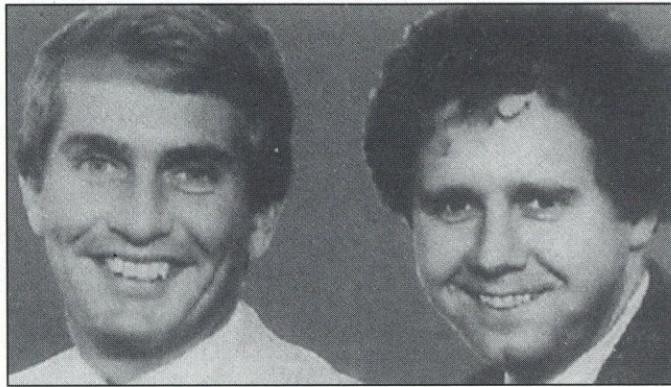

Easter is one of the most critical periods of the season. It can be literally make or break time for many of the clubs contesting the issues at both ends of the tables.

True it is not quite as hectic as it used to be when clubs were called upon to play three times over the long weekend with games on Friday, Saturday and Monday. But the fact that the fatigue factor has been eased somewhat by playing the Good Friday games in midweek does not detract from the significance of these seven days.

For us the picture is clear. Victory over Luton Town and Birmingham City, on Monday, is essential if we are to make inroads on West Ham United's position just behind the leaders.

All very exciting as the chase for the Premier League gathers momentum. After Birmingham we have just four games left. Two at home to Leicester City and West Ham United - two six pointers if ever there was. Away to Notts County and Barnsley - a tricky one this for the last game of the League programme.

The situation last weekend - before this week's fixtures - was this: West Ham can gain a maximum 94 points; Portsmouth 91; Leicester City and ourselves 89; Millwall 87 and Tranmere 85.

Now no side is going to win every game and if Tranmere slip up early it will relieve the pressure on the other four contenders for the play-offs.

Rovers are at Millwall today so something has to give in this one. They also have to travel to Wolves, Birmingham and Peterborough. They have home fixtures with Barnsley, Watford and Sunderland.

Newcastle's programme sees them at Wolves today. They then face a tricky trip to Millwall and go to Grimsby. At home they take on Oxford, Sunderland and Leicester City on the final day.

The Hammers, who entertain Leicester tomorrow, have further home fixtures with Brentford, Bristol Rovers and Cambridge - with just two away games left. At Luton - come on the Hatters - and here on May 2nd.

Bristol Rovers can do us a favour this afternoon if they dent Pompey's run. The Hampshire side are also away to Notts County and Sunderland. Their home games pit them against Derby, Wolves and Grimsby.

The Lions will certainly have a big say in who qualifies. Home to Tranmere this afternoon they also await Newcastle, Charlton and Bristol Rovers to the Den where they have lost but once this season. Just two away days for Millwall, at Leicester and Wolves.

Leicester City could hold the key. As mentioned previously they take on the Hammers at Upton Park tomorrow. They come here and visit Peterborough and Newcastle. Millwall, Southend and Bristol City wrap up their home schedule.

Before our trip to Prenton Park on Tuesday I reckoned we required ten points from the 21 available to clinch a place in the play-offs. This is definitely within the scope of the team despite the injuries and suspensions that have deprived Glenn of some of his first choice selections.

Paul Vanes the referee this afternoon was in charge of the Millwall v Portsmouth showdown at the Den last Saturday and had a very good game.

The official from the West Midlands is certainly getting a close look at the promotion contenders but there is no worry that he might not last the course. You see Paul, who has been on the League panel of referees since 1984, is a keen marathon runner and boasts a best time of 2 hours 50 minutes.

That seems about how long the second FA Cup semi-final between Arsenal and Tottenham Hotspur took last Sunday. Because of all the stoppages the referee added some ten-minutes or so to the game overall.

I don't know what you made of it but I felt there was a lot of play-acting going on. One particular challenge, which was more clumsy than brutal, from Gary Mabbutt on Ian Wright, had the Arsenal striker seeking attention. How he was so badly

injured on the leg by a contact of bodies, with Mabbutt making no challenge with his boot, is quite beyond my comprehension.

Was he trying to get his opponent booked? Or am I just getting old and cynical?

Congratulations are in order again for Glenn who has been named the UHLSPORT Matchman of the Month for February. Glenn evidently polled three star ratings in five games including a maximum 10 in the 2-0 win over Tranmere.

Indeed it is a double celebration for Town with Martin Ling coming second to Glenn who will receive a scroll from Match Magazine the co-sponsors. David Preece of Luton Town was seventh in the listings.

Before I sign off Colin Calderwood has asked me to thank, on behalf of the players, all those of you who supported the team so magnificently at Brentford.

It really was a stirring experience. At one stage I thought all the Brentford supporters had gone home.

A wag sitting not far from me yelled: "Can't you send two more of them off to give us a chance ref." That was with 25 minutes still to go! By half past four he'd gone. Unable to take the humiliation of seeing his side out manoeuvred by nine men.

"It went well," agrees Phil. "It has been traditional on the 'Advertiser' to run a Fool's Day early and we contacted the RAF who were very helpful setting up the dummy picture which we took on the Tuesday.

"Jon Pollard played his part down at the ground to give the story credibility and it went well.

"Ironically the lads in Spain knew nothing of this spoof yet John Gorman tried a similar joke when he told them there were flight problems and they might not get back for the game."

A graduate of Keele University, where he read History and Classics, Phil arrived on the Swindon Advertiser in January 1990.

He admits that when he went to University he had no clear plans as to his future. He claims: "I have always had an interest in writing and am mad on sport. While I was there I started covering Stoke City and Port Vale games for the Poteries Post and after graduating decided to go for journalism.

"I did a year at Highbury College, Portsmouth, then wrote to just about every provincial paper in the country. In the end I had several options and was fortunate to select Swindon. I chose the Advertiser

because it meant I could go straight into sport, which is what I wanted.

"It worked out well for me because Clive King had to give up because of ill health and I was elevated to cover Town much sooner than expected."

A young journalist couldn't have asked for a better start either. Phil played his part against a background of excitement and intrigue as Ossie Ardiles led us to promotion to the old First Division through a Wembley victory in the play-off final. It was a case of promotion one minute demotion the next as the League punished the Town for irregularities behind the scenes.

Phil describes it as "a baptism of fire." I would describe it as heaven sent for the local scribe.

Even though Phil's soccer education was achieved on the terraces of Molineux he has quickly come to appreciate the finer points of the game as displayed by Glenn Hoddle's team.

Says Phil: "When people find out I come from Wolverhampton it invokes bitter memories for them of the 1980 semi-final. They always ask me why Bradshaw wasn't sent off for his challenge on Alan Mayes ... Good question.

"I believe it is a big advantage in my job not to be from the area. It is hard not to be biased if you are a lifetime fan. Obviously I have to write from Swindon's angle but if they are no good I have to say so.

"Thankfully this is not the case right now but I still try to be objective and as detailed as possible. You have to remember that my report is only my view. If you ask three people here today about the game afterwards you will get three different games. I'm just lucky that people read my report.

"They say we are all frustrated players and I think this is true. I played for Wolverhampton schools but never got any further. I played leftback and that is exactly what happened to me. Everybody would love to be a professional footballer and I suppose after that they would like to write about it.

"It is great to get up on a Monday morning and want to go to work. I have friends who were at University with me who are in jobs that pay much better but they are not happy. They don't get the job satisfaction."

The relationship between Phil and the club is of the utmost importance to both bodies. The key to the liaison of course is trust. He says: "It is my business to get to know people well but not so well you can't criticise them if the situation justifies such comment."

The media is as much a business as anything else and scoops are the lifeblood of any journalist. Phil was on the ball over the David Kerslake transfer to Leeds United. He explains: "We got a lucky tip from within football - but not Swindon - and we ran the story six days before it broke in the other papers.

"It is nice when you get it right like that. There is quite a bit of speculation involved in this game and though you obviously try to get it right you are not always on the button."

The one story Phil is anxious to write is of Town's promotion to the Premier League. He confides: "We are already starting preparations for a special celebration supplement - that's the confidence we have in the team.

"I'm looking forward to that one. I also think it would be really nice to win promotion at Wembley. Financially it would be rewarding and sentimentally it would be nice after what happened last time."

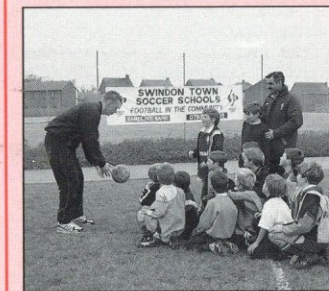

The long ball plus their power at set pieces did cause us a few problems, but they had no answer to our football and we created several good chances.

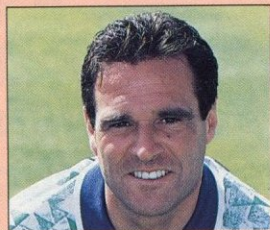

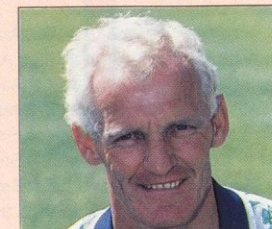
