Town boss David Pleat got a ticking off for going onto the pitch while Dicks was being booked. He wanted to tell skipper Trevor Peake to check with Phil Gray that he was in the right frame of mind to take the penalty, having missed a couple of chances earlier.

The delay while Dicks was booked did Gray no harm: he composed himself and hammered the shot into the roof of the net.

The Hammers, who had looked as capable as the Town of taking all three points until then, had litle more to offer, and with two minutes to go Martin Williams, one of two subs sent on to inject more pace in place of Paul Telfer and Ceri Hughes, made it a night to remember for him.

He swapped passes with Gray, cut inside Dicks, and fired in the first league goal of his career.
