

Hammers hoping for repeat promotion performance



WEST HAM UNITED F.C. 1992-93

■ West Ham United visit Kenilworth Road this evening, looking to consolidate their second-place position in the First Division table. They have shown grit and determination this season -alongside the flair which the Hammers are known for - which has seen the side remain a constant threat to Newcastle United's grip on the championship.

This season has been another chapter in the recent turbulent history of West Ham. They have flirted with the old First and Second Divisions on a number of occasions during the last ten years and will be hoping that history repeats itself like 1991. That was the last time the Hammers were pushing for promotion to the top-flight and despite a nail-biting finish, were promoted in second place behind Oldham Athletic. Many of the players who were prominent in that campaign are still regulars in the Hammers' squad and manager Mr Bonds will be hoping that the side's experiences on that occasion will help the side through the testing, final phases of this season.

This was highlighted in the recent match at Birmingham City, where two goals in the final three minutes secured a 2-1 victory. ■ West Ham United were originally formed as Thames Ironworks F.C. in 1895 by employees of this shipbuilding yard. Short of funds, the club was wound up in June 1900 and relaunched a month later as West Ham United. In 1920 the Hammers were finally elected to the Football League and drew their first match, in Division Two, 1-1 with Lincoln City. West Ham have won the F.A. Cup on three occasions, in 1964, 1975 and 1980; the European Cup Winners' Cup in 1965 and the Division Two title in 1958 and 1981.

HAMMERS ON PARADE

LUDEK MIKLOSKO (goalkeeper) - Czechoslovakian international goalkeeper, Ludek joined West Ham from Banik Ostrava for £300,000 in December 1989. 'Ludo' was voted Hammers' Player of the Year last season.

KENNY BROWN (défender) - The son of former Hatter Ken Brown, Kenny signed a full contract with West Ham for £175,000 in 1991. He started his career with Norwich City in 1986, before establishing himself in the right-back position at Plymouth Argyle.

JULIAN DICKS (defender) - Julian joined the Hammers from Birmingham City for £300,000 in 1988. A tenacious tackler, he has represented England at 'B' level against Czechoslovakia and the CIS last March and April.

STÈVE POTTS (defender) - Steve made his Hammers debut in 1985 and has since gone on to make over 200 appearances for the east London club. A versatile player, he can perform at centre-back, rightback or in midfield.

TONY GALE (defender) - Tony rose through the junior ranks at Fulham, making his debut v Charlton in 1977. He became an England under-21 international before joining West Ham for £200,000 in 1984. Tony's Football League appearance record is well beyond the 500 mark.

COLIN FOSTER (defender) - Colin began his career at Leyton Orient, where he made over 170 appearances, before joining Nottingham Forest. After three full seasons at the City Ground, he joined the Hammers for £750,000 in September 1989.

MARTIN ALLEN (midfield) - Now in his fourth season at Upton Park after his £600,000 move from QPR, Martin started his career at Loftus Road in 1980. He made his league debut against the Hatters in 1985 and went on to make 135 appearances for Rangers before his transfer. Martin is a former England schoolboy international.

IAN BISHOP (midfield) - Ian started his career at Everton, but made his league debut on loan at Crewe in 1984. His career took off at Bournemouth, before Manchester City signed him for £750,000 in 1988. He joined the Hammers the following season as part of the deal which took Mark Ward to City.

PETER BUTLER (midfield) - Peter joined West Ham United from Southend United for £170,000 in August 1992. He began his career with Huddersfield Town and had limited opportunities with Cambridge United (loan) and Bury before establishing himself back at Cambridge. He joined Southend in 1988.

DAVID SPEEDIE (forward) - Southampton striker David is currently enjoying a loan period at Upton Park. A much-travelled striker, he has seen service with a variety of clubs, including Chelsea, Liverpool and Blackburn. David is a Scottish international.

TREVOR MORLEY (forward) - Trevor has made impressive strides at Upton Park this season and is currently the club's leading goalscorer. He started his career as a prolific striker at Northampton, before moving on to Manchester City in 1988. Two years later he was on his way to West Ham as part of the Ward/Bishop deal.

KEVIN KEEN (forward) - A former England schoolboy international, Kevin is now in his seventh season at Upton Park. He made his debut against Liverpool in 1986 but took a couple of seasons before he became a regular in the Hammers' line-up. Some fans may remember that his father, Mike, used to play for the Town.

MARK ROBSON (forward) - Mark started his career at Exeter City, where he made his debut in 1986. After only one season in Division Four he was snapped up by Tottenham Hotspur, where he only made a limited number of appearances. He joined the Hammers last year.





Billy Bonds started his footballing career with Charlton Athletic in 1964. He made an immediate impact in the Valiants defence and three years later joined the Hammers for £50,000.

At Upton Park he became a folkhero, collecting FA Cup winners' medals in 1975 and 1980 after succeeding the late Bobby Moore as Hammers' captain in 1973.

Over 500 appearances after making his West Ham debut, Billy decided to hang up his boots at Upton Park at the age of 41. He was rewarded with two testimonials, but remained at Upton Park by becoming first-team manager. He took over from Lou Macari in 1990 and gained promotion in his first season in charge. After relegation from the old First Division last season, it looks like 'Bonzo' will be returning to the top-flight ably assisted by Harry Redknapp - again in August.

Recent switch highlights Paul's versatility



PLAYER INTERVIEW WITH PAUL TELFER

Paul Telfer has established himself this season as a regular in the Town's midfield. However, in recent weeks he has been filling in at right-back and is more than happy to operate from there.

An illness to Julian James during our match with Bristol Rovers gave Paul his first taste of life as a defender. He slotted in to the position well and used his impressive passing

ability to good use. Although Paul sees himself as a midfielder, he is happy with his form at right-back.

"I don't mind playing there at all, as long as it helps the team out," stated Paul. "I had no qualms about switching back in that game against Bristol Rovers and settled down pretty quickly. With John and Trevor at the

back, they gave me the confidence and encouragement I needed."

Following the Town's defeat at Millwall, and with Julian out through suspension, Paul reclaimed his place at right-back during the Town's 2-0 victory at Cambridge. That result emphasised the grit and determination in the side at present and Paul turned in a competent performance.

"The advantage of playing in defence over playing in midfield is that you can see everything ahead of you. You can see everything that is happening. The only trouble I have is that I am over-eager to join up in attack, but Trevor and John put the reins on me to make sure I don't do it too often!"

Paul's defensive duties continued at

Vicarage Road in the 0-0 derby clash against Watford earlier this month. He again turned in a stable performance and now appears to have established himself in defence as the season enters a critical stage.

"We face a tricky run to the end of the season, with some difficult away games

and, like I said earlier, I'm happy to remain in defence if it will help the team out.

"I have confidence in my ability in the position and it has also given the manager the option of playing Chris Kamara in the midfield ahead of me. If selected I am sure he will give the side the experience, encouragement and determination which will be needed.

"Our most difficult games appear to be away from home, but we have shown that our away form is pretty good and we have gone to difficult places and have won. We are confident and we will stay up."







Hatters versus Hammers clashes down the years

lthough matches between the two sides go back to the turn of the century in the Southern League, it was not until 1937 that we first met for Football League points.

Three, the Town entertained West Ham on 23rd October 1937 when a downpour turned the game into a farce although the crowd of 17.757 saw both sides score twice. Albert Dawes and Ted Vinall, with his first goal for the club, scored for the Town.

The return fixture was a poignant occasion marking the final game in Luton colours of Joe Payne. He failed to bow out in a blaze of glory as the clash finished scoreless.

Fresh up from Division Hugh Billington, made his debut for the Town in the game at Kenilworth Road the following season, which was lost 2-1. Bill Redfern scored the only goal in the return although West Ham were down to ten men for the second-half in the days before substitutes.

After the war and leading up to our eventual promotion in 1955 the matches were fairly even with neither side gaining the upper hand but two major milestones were recorded along the way. Bob Morton, who was to ance record holder, made his debut at Upton Park in 1948-1949 while Gordon Turner our record goalscorer recorded his first goals for the club in the home fixture in 1951-1952.

The latter game was remarkable in as much that the Town beat West Ham 6-1 on Boxing Day 1952, having lost 3-0 at Upton Park the previous day. The Hammers team was the same on both occasions.

Although West Ham followed us into Division One in 1958, the meetings were short-lived as we were relegated two years later. The Hammers actually took the dubious distinction of being our final visitors in 1959-1960 as we "signed off".

The next meetings were instantly forgettable clashes during our brief stay in Division One in 1974-1975 and it was not until the latter end of that decade that regular fixtures became the norm. In 1978-79 West Ham achieved the "double" at our expense

although the 4-1 home reversal still rankles with those who were there as the scoreline certainly bore no resemblance to the pattern of play.

Revenge was ours two years later as West Ham stormed to promotion losing only four games along the way. Two of those defeats were against ourselves with the first coming on the opening day of the season at Upton Park as David Moss scored two late penalties to take the shine off the occasion. It will be remembered 17,031 home happy.

that the Hammers paraded the FA Cup around the pitch before the start of the game and then proceeded to give the Town the runaround for an hour.

The return, three months later, saw the Town take an early 2-0 lead through goals from Brian Stein only for the visitors to storm back and level the score shortly after half-time. The winner came five minutes from the end via the trusty boot of David Moss to send the crowd of


