elcome to all supporters for what could prove to be a very attractive home match with our friends from Leicester. Knowing their support, we will expect all the Oak Road seats to be filled and hopefully this will add to the atmosphere.

Coming prior to a difficult looking away fixture at Crystal Palace, today's game should give us a fair picture of whether we have progressed a little since the start of the season.

Brian Little has done a splendid job at Leicester and his ambition is matched by the board's decision to invest in a new, superb stand, whilst being determined to improve the playing standards by using the transfer market.

Several weeks ago, I spoke to the London Weekend Television producer who is involved in the pre-decision making for television games. I felt that this afternoon would have been a good occasion for the cameras, as does our game with Charlton Athletic on November 7, which will be shown live on The Sunday Match.

I could not help an isolated smile when I read of Bobby Gould's dilemma at Coventry

last weekend. It has been suggested that his leaving is because the chairman has requested him to sell a player. Every manager dreads having to sacrifice players, which lessens the chances for success and decreases the club's credibility in the eye of their supporters. This routine has placed us in a position where probably only four of today's players were bought into the club: Trevor Peake, John

Dreyer and Leicester boys Des Linton and Scott Oakes, who were exchanged for Steve Thompson (whom we signed from Bolton), and has done well at Leicester.

Compare this with an interesting statistic from our more wealthy clubs: On a recent Saturday, only 35 players playing in the Premier League division had been developed through the ranks of their club.

Our reserve side have been scoring goals for fun and I am delighted with that. We will


need to find goalscorers who can cope with more difficult league standards.

Paul's Town experience stands him in good stead



PLAYER INTERVIEW WITH PAUL DICKOV

rsenal striker Paul Dickov is coming towards the end of his onemonth loan spell at Kenilworth Road. Whether he stays for longer, he does not know yet, but he has enjoyed his stay here and is grateful for his extended run in league football.

Glaswegian-born Dickov is hoping to follow in the footsteps of Michael Thomas, Kevin Campbell and Paul Merson, players who have gone on to become big stars at Arsenal after starting their careers with loan spells at other clubs. Thomas enjoyed a spell at Portsmouth, and Merson at Brentford, while Campbell gained valuable experience under David Pleat at Leicester. Once he heard that Luton were interested in tak-

ing him on loan, Paul had no hesitation in coming to Kenilworth Road.

"I had wanted to go out on loan at a club last season," admitted Paul, "so when I heard Luton wanted me I said 'yes' immediately. Kevin Campbell told me what to expect from Mr Pleat and that it would be a good move for me. So far it has worked out great."

Paul, who has played in the same Scottish under-21 side as Paul Telfer and Darren Salton, is staying in Luton with Salton. He has settled in with ease, both on and off the pitch, and that has helped his Town performances.

"Knowing Darren and Paul has definitely helped me, but I also knew some of the other lads by playing against them at reserve team level," he added. "Everyone

here is so friendly and the fans have been great their support in the last home game against Notts County was tremendous.

"That game has been my best for Luton to date. I felt I put their defenders under pressure and was delighted with my goal. I must admit, I don't score that many with my head, so I was doubly-pleased. "Other players, on their arrival at Luton, have been surprised by the numbers of youngsters in the team. Paul, who falls into this category, does not worry about such inexperience when he enters the field.

"You only get experience by playing games," he states. "I know John Hartson and myself only have a handful of games between us, but we have done O.K. We have formed a good partnership and he has done well in holding the ball up for me. I have had some good battles over the last month, particularly with Craig Short and Darren Wassall when we played Derby.

"Although they are both good defenders they

don't come close to Neil Ruddock, who I faced last year for Arsenal. He really is a tough customer!"


So what lies ahead for Paul? After signing a new two-and-a-half year contract with Arsenal, his career evidently lies at Highbury. He has a tough battle on his hands to gain a first-team spot, but he has full confidence in his own ability.

"I have Ian Wright, Kevin Campbell and Alan Smith ahead of me at the moment, but I am confident that I can make the breakthrough this season," he says. "George Graham handed me a new contract in the summer and said my time will come, and his words, along with my appearances at the end of last season, have given me hope.

"Playing for Luton has given me regular league football, so when I return to Highbury, be it at the end of this month or in two months, I will be a better player for it. I must then knuckle down and concentrate on a place in the Arsenal team. But why stop there? I have played for Scotland at under-21 level and I want to make it into the full side.


"It is a transitional period for the national side, and I want to be a part of their future as well as Arsenal's."

■ Due to a waterlogged pitch at Cambridge City's ground, our Eastern Junior Cup match which was due to have been played on Thusday 14th October, had to be postponed. The new date arranged is Thursday 4th November at Cambridge, kick-off 7.30 pm.

■ Assuming that a result was obtained in our F.A. Youth Cup game with Derby County on Tuesday last, the next round of the Southern Junior Floodlight Cup competition against Arsenal will be played at Highbury on Monday 8th November, kick-off 7.00 pm. The draw did give us the 'home' leg, however, it was decided by the football staff that it would be a wonderful opportunity for the young lads to have the experience of playing in the prestigeous Highbury Stadium, hence the forfeiting of the home advantage. In the event of this game being drawn, the replay will remain scheduled at Highbury. The date will be Tuesday 16th November, kick-off 7.00 pm.

■ The Endsleigh League Division One away fixture with Watford, for Saturday scheduled December, is being pencilled in as a possible 'live' televised game. However, it will be a few weeks before we know if it has been selected. In the event of it not going live and following a request from the Hertfordshire Police to Watford, permission will be sought from the League to still play the game on the Sunday, with a kickoff time of 12 noon. We have agreed to Watford's request to switch to 12 noon if that situation does arise. The Saturday prior to Christmas is traditionally one when huge traffic problems arise due to the number of vehicles driving into and out of shopping areas. This, together with the additional number of vehicles transporting football supporters, causes concern to the police authorities and therefore they took the decision to seek from Watford a change of date.

■ The heavy rain of the past weeks has not made life easy for our groundsmen Richard Bird and Robert Scott. I am sure supporters will agree that they have done a tremendous job under difficult weather conditions and will join with me in congratulating them on their acheivements. Let's hope that the next couple of months bring a spell of much drier weather to make their task a little easier.

■ Negotiations have been completed with the Luton Rugby Club which provides us with a new pitch upon which we will play our South East Counties Youth teams matches. These were previously being played at the club's training ground (Electrolux Sports Ground) which we still retain for daily training and U-14 and U-16 games. Our agreement with the Rugby Club offers not only the pitch but also the advantage of additional training facilities both indoors and outside.

■ Every good wish for a speedy recovery goes to Sarah Pearson wife of club president Ed Pearson, who has recently undergone major heart surgery. Also to former player Chris Turner, now Chairman of Peterborough United F.C. who at the time of writing these notes was still detained in hospital but hopefully by now he has been released and is back home.

Apart from a couple of efforts in the first-half, County did not trouble us, and Juergen Sommer had a pretty comfortable afternoon.



Smith on the move again?

xford manager Denis Smith looks likely to become the latest member of the First Division managerial merry-go-round, in light of Lou Macari's imminent departure from Stoke City to Celtic, writes Leonard Spall.

Smith only took the reins at the Manor Ground when Brian Horton took-off for Manchester City, but he is only on a week-to-week contract and would, therefore, be ready to step into Macari's shoes.

Smith's credentials, though, have hardly set the football world alight and since going to Oxford, they have hardly set the Division alight, becoming relegation favourites - rarely climbing out of the bottom three. You might argue that Smith inherited a difficult situation at the Manor Ground but Stoke's choice, surely, is not informed by past record.

If you find this bewildering, you might not be too surprised at West Brom's predicament. Albion, third from bottom after their defeat at Sunderland, have only won three times all season. But Baggies striker Andy Hunt is confused. "I am stumped," he said. "We are playing some good football but it is just not getting us the points. I am sure we need just a bit of luck and things will change. Whatever we do, we have got to remain confident."

Nottingham Forest are also known for free-flowing football but their confidence must be wearing, not least because of their prolonged spell in the bottom half of the table. Forest's 1-0 defeat at Leicester was their fourth on their travels this season and it leaves Frank Clark's team looking a shadow of their 'pre-season promotion favourites' tag.

Forest claims for a rapid return to the top-flight are in stark contrast to another of the midlands' promotion-pushing posse - Derby County. The Rams are flying high near the top of the league, as Lionel Pickering's multi-million pound investment is finally showing signs of maturing. Derby beat promotion rivals Crystal Palace 3-1 at the Baseball Ground with goals from three of their most expensive signings: John Harkes, Mark Pembridge and Paul Kitson.

Palace manager Alan Smith labelled his team 'gunslingers' as the south Londoners became the sixth victim of Derby's 100 per cent home record. "They have got to learn that we cannot just ride into town and expect the opposition to fall over and die," he explained. "Teams like Derby send out a whole posse to shoot us down -- there is always going to be somebody fancying his chance of proving he is quicker on the draw."

Portsmouth drew first blood at Notts County, but still failed to break their away game duck. Pompey have drawn five of seven games on their travels this term, but have yet to come away with maximum points. County manager, Mick Walker admitted: "Portsmouth are one of the best sides we have had here this season." But Jim Smith's men could do nothing to prevent Richard Walker's 88th minute equaliser.

A 1-1 scoreline was also the result at the New Den when Millwall entertained Middlesbrough. In addition to sharing the spoils, the two sides also shared in a strange statistic. Both goalkeepers succeeded in thwarting their opponent's efforts, but fell foul of their own team mates. Phil Barber and Derek Whyte both scored at their respective wrong ends in a game which also saw the Middlesbrough captain Whyte sent-off as 'Boro slipped to fourth.

A less bizarre, but more spectacular game was witnessed at Vicarage Road. Watford, now in the upperhalf of the table after a poor start, beat Bolton in a seven-goal thriller that Hornets' manager Glenn Roeder claimed was a whole new experience for him.

"I have been involved in football for over 20 years and I have never been involved in a game like that," he said. "When we went 3-0 behind I thought it was not our day. So I put Ken Charlery on and he made a great difference."

Charlery scored Watford's equaliser at 3-3, but it was Gary Porter who stole the show with his first-ever hat-trick, which included a last-minute winner.





Spotlight on today's visitors



LEICESTER CITY F.C. 1993-94

■ Leicester City visit Kenilworth Road this afternoon aiming to consolidate their now-customary position in the higher reaches of the First Division table. Manager Brian Little will be hoping to make it 'third time lucky' as the Foxes bid for a Premier League place.

■ For the past two seasons, Leicester have suffered the heartache of losing a Wembley play-off final in controversial circumstances. In 1992 Blackburn Rovers, who have since gone on to shine in the top-flight, won 1-0 thanks to a disputed penalty after Blackburn's David Speedie was 'fouled' by Steve Walsh. A year later, the Foxes were again halted, this time by Glenn Hoddle's Swindon Town 4-3, in one of the all-time great Wembley matches. The winning goal, scored by Town's Paul Bodin came courtesy of another penalty.

Lesser teams would have crumbled after such devastating blows, but results so far this season indicate that City have no intention of giving up the dream of playing Premier League football. At the time of writing, the club lie fourth in the league table with 19 points from ten matches. The Foxes have also scored 17 goals so far this term,

with summer signing Speedie leading their scoring charts. Remarkably, the man the Filbert Street faithful loved to hate, is now fully behind a Filbert Street assault on the top-flight.

■ In the absence of injured skipper Gary Mills, Steve Agnew has taken charge in recent weeks. He believes City are capable of sustaining their challenge, but admits it is going to be a long, hard season. "The way results have gone so far this season, it looks like no club will run away with the title," he said. "The teams at the top are taking points off of each other and it looks very interesting. I am sure we can sustain our challenge this season if we keep playing the same way we have done in recent weeks. These are exciting times for our players and fans alike."

VISITORS ON PARADE

GAVIN WARD (goalkeeper) - Signed from Cardiff City for £175,000 during the summer, Gavin has made the number one jersey his own since his arrival from Ninian Park. He started his career with West Brom and also had a spell at Shrewsbury, before making the break in league football with Cardiff.

SIMON GRAYSON (defender) - Simon began his career with Leeds United and was bought by Brian Little for £50,000 in March 1992. He operates at full-back, but failed to command a regular place on his arrival. A versatile player, Simon can also be employed in midfield.

MIKE WHITLOW (defender) - Another former Leeds United player, Mike made over 70 league appearances for the Elland Road club before joining Leicester in March 1992 for £250,000. He won promotion to the top-flight with Leeds and will be looking for a similar achievement with City.

COLÍN HILL (defender) - Colin started his career with Arsenal in the early eighties before moving to Portugal. He resumed his league career with Colchester, before joining Sheffield United in 1990. Colin signed for City in the summer of 1992 after impressing on loan and was last season's Player-of-the-Year.

JIMMY WILLIS (defender) - Jimmy started his career at Halifax Town and had a spell with Stockport County before establishing himself, under Brian Little's management, at Darlington. He failed to command a regular place following his arrival at Filbert Street, but has featured more regularly this term.

STEVE THOMPSON (midfield) - A player who made over 400 appearances for Bolton, Steve moved from Blundell Park to Luton Town in August 1991. However, five appearances later he found himself at Filbert Street as part of an exchange deal involving Scott Oakes and Des Linton. He has since flourished in the heart of the Foxes' midfield.

DAVID OLDFIELD (midfield) - Perth-born, David is

another face familiar to Town fans. He spent three seasons in our first-team squad before joining Manchester City for £600,00 in 1989. A year later he moved to Leicester for £150,000. A former England youth international, David has been successfully converted to midfield from attack.

LEE PHILPOTT (midfield) - Lee started his career with Peterborough United, but his career took off with Cambridge United where he played in two promotion-winning teams. He joined Leicester for £300,000 in November 1992.

STEVE AGNEW (midfield) - Steve spent five years at Barnsley before joining Blackburn for £700,000 in 1991. He had a loan spell at Portsmouth before joining City for £250,000. He has returned to the side this season after injury hampered much of 1992-93 for him.

JULIAN JOACHIM (forward) - Julian burst onto the professional scene last season at 18 years of age. Four goals in his opening six first-team games prompted a call-up to the England under-19 squad and he also represented England in the World Cup youth tournament in Australia.

DAVID SPEEDIE (forward) - David joined Leicester on a free transfer from Southampton during the summer. Filbert Street is David's eleventh league club, having featured in big money transfers to the likes of Chelsea, Coventry, Liverpool, Blackburn and Southampton.

IAN ORMONDROYD (forward) - Ian started his career with Bradford City, where he came to prominence with his prolific goalscoring. Spells with Aston Villa and Derby followed, before he joined City in March 1992 as part of the exchange deal which took Paul Kitson to the Baseball Ground.

PHIL GEE (forward) - Phil started his career with Derby County in 1985 and made 106 league appearances for the Rams, scoring 26 goals. After helping the side into the First Division, he joined Leicester in 1992 as part of an exchange deal.


or the second season in succession, Brian Little came within 90 minutes of taking Leicester City into the Premier League.

Little, having arrived in May 1990, steered City to fourth place in his first season, only to lose to Blackburn Rovers in the play-off final at Wembley. History repeated itself last season, this time Swindon Town were the victors 4-3 in one of the Wembley classics.

Mr Little's playing career was brought to a premature end at the age of 27 by a bad knee injury, but he turned his attentions to management with Wolves, before moving to Middlesbrough as coach under Bruce Rioch.

He was appointed manager at Filbert Street after a spell at Darlington, a club he led out of the GM Vauxhall Conference at the first attempt, and then led to the Fourth Division championship.







Tales of past encounters with The Foxes



BACK TRACKING BY ROGER WASH

ur visitors today hold a special place in our history as they were the Town's first opponents in the Football League, almost a century ago.

On September 4, 1897 we travelled to Leicester, where a large crowd gathered in wet weather, to see George Ekins score our first league goal to give us a half-time lead. Unfortunately, the lead was short lived as the Fosse, as they were called in their pre-City days, equalised in a second-half that was reportedly a real thriller.

Although we lost the return fixture, the home game the following season proved a real disaster. Although we took an early lead through William Ford, Ekins had to go off with a wrenched knee and Leicester went on to score six without reply.

After our withdrawal from the Football League in 1900, we had to go nearly half-acentury before meeting again, in 1946/47, but the wait was not worthwhile as we lost at home 2-1 on October 5. The Town's goal came from local lad Horace Gager, in front of a crowd of 18,073.

Our first win eventually arrived the following season when Ted Duggan bagged both Luton goals in a 2-1 home win to follow the pair he scored at Filbert Street the previous week in a 3-2 defeat. Leading up to Leicester's promotion in 1954, the games between the two sides were always tight but were not without their moments.

Peter Walsh scored on his debut in the 1-0 home win in 1949-50, Tom Kiernan made his last Luton appearances in the corresponding game the following season and Jack Taylor bagged a hat-trick in the 3-3 draw at Filbert Street in 1951-52.

We passed each other when our turn came from promotion and it was not until 1957-58 that meetings resumed with Tony Gregory scoring three goals in our two clashes over Easter 1958. An injury-weakened side went to Filbert Street in October 1958 and received a 3-1 beating - unremarkable, apart from the fact that the Town were top of the Division One table before the game and were unbeaten after ten games!

Following our relegation in 1960, and our trip to the football basement and back, it was ten years before meetings resumed with an

unlucky defeat at Filbert Street in September 1970. A true thumping was then received in the return over the following Easter by a promotion-chasing, and Rodney Fern inspired, City side.

The boot was on the other foot four season later when the Town re-joined Leicester in Division One with Steve Buckley making his debut at Filbert Street and Peter Shilton saving City single handed as the Luton forwards laid siege on his goal throughout the game. Revenge was on the minds of the players in the return, but they were helped by as sweet an own-goal as you would wish to see when Keith Weller curled a 35-yard back-pass round Mark Wallington in the Leicester goal. Adrian Alston and Jim Husband were the other scorers in a comprehensive victory.

In more modern times the results have, in the main, favoured the Town with the highlight's being three consecutive victories at Filbert Street in 1979-80, 1981-82 and 1983-84, a goal from Mick Harford on his debut at the same ground the following season and his hat-trick in the 3-1 home win in 1985-86.

As a warning to Brian Little, it must be pointed out that our dugout roof is solid, as proved by one of his predecessors Jock Wallace, who knocked himself out when Leicester scored the only goal here in 1978-79.

15 It happened five years ago 29/10/88 - A boring 0-0 home draw with Q.P.R. left the Town in 16th position in Division One. The game marked the last full appearance of Ian Allinson.



From buses to P.R., with a little football for good measure!

WHERE ARE THEY NOW? - BY ROGER WASH

lthough only appearing for Luton Town over a short period, Alan Birchenall was the experienced head brought in by David Pleat to help a young Hatters' side avoid relegation to the old Division Three back in 1979.

Born in East Ham, Alan was raised in Nottingham where he first met David Pleat, when they both turned out for Nottingham Schoolboys and the County side.

"Our respective parents knew each other well as they used to stand on windy touchlines, watching us play from the age of 11 onwards," he said. "David was always the star, who went on to play for England schoolboys, while I used to give him the ball and let him get on with it!"

After turning down approaches from Forest,

Alan worked in a Nottingham bus garage before joining Sheffield United and its strong youth policy. Players like Alan Woodward, Mick Jones and Len Badger were coming up through the ranks and their youth team of the period seemed to stay together all the way through to Division One football.

Big money transfers took him to Chelsea in 1967, Crystal Palace in 1970 and Leicester a year later. It was with the Filbert Street club that he first played against the Town.

"I remember coming to Kenilworth Road in 1974 for an F.A. Cup tie. Luton had a good side at the time

and won promotion at the end of the season, but Leicester put on a brilliant performance to win 4-0.

"Malcolm Allison came into our changing room after the game to say it was the best display of attacking football he had ever seen."

After a spell with Notts County, Alan had a successful period in the U.S.A. with San Jose and Memphis in the then-embryonic North American Soccer League. He came back to England in 1978, when the only manager to offer him a job was Jim Iley of Blackburn. Iley was sacked two days later and, after 18 appearances, new manager John Pickering told him of an approach from Luton.

"I met David Pleat at Leicester Forest East service station and as it was only one hour to Luton from my Leicester home, compared to more than double that to Blackburn, I agreed to sign. Bob Hatton was living in Birmingham at the time and he only travelled to Luton two days a week, so I had the same agreement."

David Pleat was in his first full season as Luton manager and the team was struggling. Experience was needed to help the young talent

and Alan fitted the bill.

"Luton had some good youngsters such as Ricky Hill and Brian Stein and it was my job to stabilise the team from midfield. Although I did not do myself full justice, I always gave 100 per cent and was immediately accepted by the supporters."

Relegation was avoided and early in 1979/80 Alan was on his way, for the last time, to join Mike Bailey and Bobby Gould at Hereford.

"I was disappointed at the time as I still felt I had something to offer Luton, but now I am in busi-

ness. I realise that David was being very shrewd.

"I found out afterwards that I was brought in to help dressing room morale and increase the camaraderie, and there was me with over 400 appearances under my belt thinking I could play a bit!"

Alan is now U.K. agent for Bata (France) Footwear as well as part-time Public Relations Officer for today's visitors Leicester City, although his wife thinks it is the other way round. He is still fit enough to have recently completed 60-odd laps of Filbert Street in oneand-a-half hours to raise money for a local hospice, as well as regularly turning out for a veterans football team.






