We will be without Ceri Hughes, who dis-

appointingly misses his third game, but he should be in contention for a place at Leicester City. He was under consideration for the Wales 'B' game against a Scotland B which included Paul Telfer.

We need all our players available for the fascinating weeks ahead in which we are determined to sustain our improvement in the league. The Cup is a bonus, a lovely


#### MCLAREN INJURY BLOW

Members can purchase one ticket upon production of their membership card from 10 am on Tuesday, February 15 until 7.00 pm on Friday, February 18. There will be no sale on Saturday 19 or Sunday 20 February. All dates and ticket sales are subject to availability.

■ The 1996 European Championship Finals are being held in members from the Ticket from Monday, February 21.

England for the very first time. The qualifying draw was made in Manchester two weeks ago, and competing for the trophy, in the final stages, will be 16 nations. To enable you to spread the financial costs, all tickets may be purchased through direct debit and are refundable right through to June 1995. How do you apply? Ticket application forms are available to season ticket holders and members from the Ticket Office from Monday, February 21.

# The task ahead is just as difficult tonight




CAPTAIN'S COLUMN BY TREVOR PEAKE





## Bolton look to London for their next scalp

ith one team through, four draws and three casualties, the First Division could not complain about their luck in last weekend's FA Cup fourth round. Midweek replays will help determine a clearer fifth round draw as Leonard Spall reviews the 'ifs', 'buts' and 'maybes'...'

Will Cup holders Arsenal be their next victims.

Bolton Wanderers proved last Monday against Arsenal that they can battle with the best. Last season they eliminated Liverpool from the FA Cup at Anfield and in this year's competition they have already knocked out Everton at Goodison Park. After drawing 2-2 with the Gunners at Burnden Park, the scene is set for the 'Trotters' to take their giant-killing act to Highbury.

Scottish striker John McGinlay, who scored against both the Merseyside giants in Bolton's

exploits, declared defiantly. "This battle is far from over," regarding the draw against the Cup "For holders. moment we were shattered when they sneaked into the lead. But we showed strength and character to fight back. We are very confident about the replay in London."

Even Arsenal boss George Graham conceded that: "Bolton

deserved a replay. They were dead and buried at Everton before coming back. I have seen them do it again and it was all because their attackers just would not give in."

Bolton were one of four First Division sides to hold Premiership opponents and Steve Gritt, Charlton's co-manager, summed-up the sentiments replaying away to a team like Blackburn entails: "I am delighted we have got them back for a second time. The revenue will come in handy. But I am disappointed we did not nick it. We were the better team."


If revenue gained is the practical reality, Oxford United will be ecstatic with a replay at Elland Road. However, Cup dreams were

promised and dashed as Denis Smith's side squandered a 2-0 lead. Howard Wilkinson, the Leeds manager, admitted that: "At 3.30 it looked like 'Goodnight Vienna'" - at 4.45 odds of 500-1 were not mean for Oxford to win the

Mick Walker, the Notts County manager, viewed his team from a long-term perspective. "They are a young side," he said. "It is like when you were 18 with three girlfriends. The more you play, the more you learn." After drawing 1-

1 with West Ham, he will be hoping his side can educate the 'academy' in the replay at Upton Park.

Draws, it seems, have characterised the fourth round. Stoke drew 0-0 at Oldham and Barnsley held Plymouth 2-2 at Home Park. Wolves, so far, are the only First Division team through to the fifth round - the first time they have reached



Port Vale, Grimsby and Sunderland were the only casualties. Aston Villa knocked out Grimsby at Blundell Park with goals from Ray Houghton and Dwight Yorke. Both teams had a player sent off in the first-half, although Mariners boss Alan Buckley blames the defeat on one particular performance. "I think we were value for the draw," he said. "We might have done better but for Paul McGrath, who was superb. There is little wonder they let him go walkabout if he can perform like that."

# Spotlight on tonight's visitors



#### **NEWCASTLE UNITED F.C. 1993-94**

■ Events, both on and off the pitch, have progressed rapidly for Newcastle United since they last visited Kenilworth Road over a year ago. Despite a 0-0 draw here, the Magpies dominated the second-half of last season's First Division campaign and romped to the title with an amazing tally of 96 points.

■ The summer months saw the arrival of former Magpies' favourite Peter Beardsley for £1.5 million from Everton, and Malcolm Allen and Nicos Papavasiliou were also brought in to strengthen the squad. Changes were also made off the field. The reconstruction of St James' Park's Leazes End and, as we witnessed last week, the Gallowgate end will finally leave Newcastle with one of the finest stadiums in Britain.

■ As the 1993-94 Premiership campaign approached, everything was in place for a season of consolidation amongst the country's elite. However, things have gone much better than expected for Kevin Keegan's side. Beardsley and the ever-flourishing Andy Cole sparked a potent strike partnership from day one and have since caused defences up and down the country major headaches. Aided by a

creative midfield and solid defence, Keegan's 'Toon Army' have rarely been out of the top six in the Premiership this season. The Geordies are here to stay.

■ Newcastle's rapid strides can be put down to the financial backing of the board, and the fervent following of the club's supporters. However, manager Keegan must take most of the credit, as Town manager David Pleat is quick to point out. "Kevin is one of the most imaginative and refreshing managers in the game," he said. "Their one touch play is a joy to watch and I am always telling my players 'If you want to improve as a team, watch Newcastle United".

■ The foundation of Newcastle United FC stemmed from a newly-formed club called Stanley in 1881. A year later they changed their name to Newcastle East End and merged with Rosewood. In 1889 the club moved to St James' Park and four years later they changed their name to Newcastle United. In the early years, the club won the First Division championship four times. They also won the FA Cup in 1910, 1924, 1932, 1951, 1952 and 1955 and the European Fairs Cup in 1969.

selected for the England under-21's.

BARRY VENISON (defender) - Introduced to league soccer by Sunderland in 1981, Barry became an England under-21 regular in his Roker Park days. He joined Liverpool for £200,000 in 1986 and was a member of two championship winning sides and collected an FA Cup winners' medal in 1989 before moving to Newcastle for £250,000 in the summer of 1992

STEPHEN HOWEY (defender) - A former Magpies trainee, Stephen made his debut in 1989. He made further occasional appearances until winning a regular place last season when he missed only one game in

Newcastle's First Division Championship success.

JOHN BERESFORD (defender) - John remained in
the reserve teams at Manchester City before his league chance came after moving to Barnsley in 1986. Portsmouth signed him for £300,000 in 1989, then collected £650,000 when he moved on to Newcastle United in 1992

ROBERT LEE (midfield) -Robert scored 13 times last season after joining Newcastle from Charlton for £700,000 in September 1992. He made his debut for the Addicks in 1984 and won England under-21 hon-

ours with the south London club.

LEE CLARK (midfield) - Lee developed in the Newcastle youth squad and has made rapid progress

since his full debut in 1990. In little more than a year, the 'new Gazza' was in the England under-21 side and he has now collected 11 caps at that level.

PAUL BRACEWELL (midfield) - Paul became an England under-21 international while with his first club Stoke. Sunderland signed him for £250,000 in 1983 and Everton paid a similar fee a year later. While at Goodison Park, Paul won a place in the full England side until suffering a career threatening ankle injury He made a recovery and joined Sunderland again in 1989, before joining Newcastle for £250,000 in 1992.

SCOTT SELLARS (midfield) - A £700,000 in 1992.

SCOTT SELLARS (midfield) - A £700,000 signing from Leeds last March, Scott started his career at Elland Road, but left for Blackburn Rovers in 1986. He returned to Leeds six years later. Scott is an England

under-21 international.

MALCOLM ALLEN (forward) - Signed as cover for the Beardsley/Cole partnership, Malcolm was signed from Millwall for £300,000 at the start of the season. The holder of 13 Welsh caps, he started his career with Watford before iniping Manual City for £400,000 in Watford before joining Norwich City for £400,000 in 1988. Two years later he returned to the south east with a £400,000 move to Millwall.

ANDY COLE (forward) - The Premiership's leading goalscorer with 30 goals, Andy started his career with Arsenal. Crowded out by those in front of him, he joined Bristol City for £500,000 in 1992. His form for the Robins, 16 goals last season, was rewarded with a £1.75 million move to Tyneside where his phenome-

nal scoring rate has continued.

PETER BEARDSLEY (forward) - England interna-tional Peter returned for his second spell at St James' Park following his £1.5 million transfer from Everton last summer. He began his career with Carlisle and had two spells with Vancouver before joining Manchester United in 1982. One appearance later he joined the Magpies, before moving on to Liverpool in 1987. Countless honours and four years later, he joined Merseyside rivals Everton.

ALÉX MATHIE (forward) - Alex's performances for Morton in Scotland attracted attention from many of England's top clubs, but it was Kevin Keegan who gained his signature, for £285,000 in August. He had previously been with Celtic, where he made 14 appear-

evin Keegan started his footballing career with Scunthorpe United and, after three seasons as a firstteamer, moved on to Liverpool for £20,000 in 1971. In six seasons at Anfield he won just about everything - a European Cup winners' medal, two UEFA Cup medals, three League Championships and the FA Cup. And, of course, he won a place in the England team.

Capped 63 times, Mr Keegan skippered his country on many occasions.


In 1977, he felt he needed another challenge, and joined

SV Hamburg for £500,000. His career continued on a high plain, where he became European Footballer of the Year twice and won a Bundesliga winners' medal.

He spent three years in Germany before signing for Southampton. He spent two seasons with The Saints before joining Newcastle for £100,000 in 1982. He helped United to the Division Two title before announcing his retirement.

He then spent eight years out of the game before Newcastle approached him in February 1992. His task was to stop the side from being relegated to Division Three. He managed that and the rest, as they say, is history...

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
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

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

## Tony Thorpe: Stunned beyond belief!



PLAYER INTERVIEW

o make your full debut in front of a packed St James' Park is a dream come true for most professional footballers. To score is absolutely amazing! Well, that was the case for 18-year-old Tony Thorpe, whose 25-yard strike will stay with him, and most Hatters fans, for a long, long time.

Tony Thorpe has been earmarked for success by David Pleat for a long time now. The Town boss nurtured a young Thorpe through the ranks at Leicester City and gave him his break in the professional game. However, Thorpe's road to glory is not as straightforward as his dream debut was.

"I signed my first professional contract when David Pleat was boss at Leicester," he stated. "I had been at the club since a schoolboy and had come through the youth and reserve teams with Des Linton, Scott Oakes and Martin Williams. I was doing fine, but then things started to go wrong."

Mr Pleat parted company with the Filbert Street club and Tony suffered a bad ankle injury. His recovery took a long time and when he was fit again, the new boss at Leicester, Brian Little, had already decided that Tony was not going to figure in his plans.

"It took me a while to get back to full match fitness and by that time, Brian had settled in and already had in mind the squad he wanted," added Tony. "David was, by now, at Luton and I contacted John Moore at the club for a trial. He couldn't promise me anything and I just came down to try my luck. I think I made a good impression and stayed on a month-to-month basis."

Tony settled immediately, and was helped by the fact that his old pals at Leicester, namely Des, Scott and Martin were now at Kenilworth Road. He made an immediate impact during his first season in the reserves, hitting the net from midfield on a regular basis. His form earned a call-up to the first-team's preseason trip to Scotland, although injury has since halted his progress.

"I was hoping to make the breakthrough sooner," he added. "Unfortunately, I pulled a thigh muscle and missed the early part of the season. Luckily when I returned, I was able to carry on in the same manner and was included on the bench a couple of times, making a very brief debut against Stoke City."

He has since been a regular squad member. David Pleat had hinted during the build up to the Newcastle game last Saturday that he was going to spring a surprise. However, Tony had no idea the surprise was going to be his own inclusion!

"I was included in set-pieces in training so I knew that I was going to be involved in the squad, possibly even a substitute. On the day of the match I honestly thought I was justgoing to be on the bench after I had taken part in the warm up on the pitch.

"It was just as I was coming back up the tunnel that David Pleat said to me 'Well Tony, are you ready'. I couldn't believe it, I was playing! I think it helped that I only knew so late on because I didn't really have time to get nervous."

He states that the roar as both teams came onto the pitch will live with him for the rest of his life. The game itself reached the same levels of excitement for Tony, who states that it was a hard introduction to professional football

"There can't be many harder places to go and make your full debut," he added. "I had trouble at the start coping with the speed of the game. It really was 100 miles-an-hour stuff. But having the experience of David Preece and Alan Harper alongside me was a great help. They did not stop encouraging and guiding for the whole time I was on the pitch."

It was a little guidance from Preece which led to Thorpe's wonder goal. He threaded the ball through to Tony who hit the target from fully 25-yards. "When I got the ball I just remember Preecie shouting 'hit it, hit it', so I did. I got a nice bobble and the ball just flew in. I couldn't believe it. I was shocked. I didn't know how to react. It still hasn't sunk in really."

The media attention has since thrown Tony into the spotlight, but he is determined not to let it affect him. He has a mature head on young shoulders, and knows that the job is not even half done. "I did OK in the game, but I can do a lot better. I just want to keep improving and improving. I have a long way to go before I can say I am a regular, but I want to make the breakthrough sometime this season."

So, not even assured of his place tonight, Tony believes that the Hatters can make it into round five against Cardiff, now that the team are back at Kenilworth Road. "I really do believe we can do it," he stated. "Back on home turf, with home support, they won't fancy coming down here. We have a good record at home in recent months. Long may it continue!"

hatever happens tonight there will be an overall leader in FA Cup clashes between ourselves and the Magpies as, with one victory each and one draw in previous games - all, coincidentally, in the fourth round - the clubs currently stand even.

The 1972/73 FA Cup campaign had started off with a relatively easy home draw against Crewe. The crowd of 9,411 saw Jim Ryan and Barry Butlin score second-half goals to secure a fourth round spot against Newcastle at St James' Park.

The Magpies were riding high near the top of Division One at the time while the Town were in Division Two. We did not have a chance if you believed the press corps. The match had extra spice as Malcolm Macdonald, who had moved from Luton to Tyneside in the summer of 1971, was the darling of the terraces and, never backward in coming forward in talking to the media, had turned the match into a personal crusade to put one over his old team mates.

A crowd of 42,170 which was capacity in a three-sided St James' Park, greeted the Town players who turned out in an orange, black and white strip for the first time. We had to endure the expected, fierce onslaught in the opening minutes with Macdonald, captain for the day, missing an early sitter.

Gradually the Luton players increased in confidence and, out of the blue, took the lead in the 28th minute when the wily John Aston, advanced on Newcastle goalkeeper Iam McFaul and calmly hit a left foot shot into the net.

Again Newcastle pressed, but it was the Town who increased their lead just before half time when Alan Slough broke down the right before cutting the ball back to Aston who hit it into the top corner for a picture goal.

Not surprisingly it was 'backs to the wall' stuff in the second-half and current Town coach John Moore recalls that it was one of his finest ever defensive performances even though the ball was sometimes blocked with unorthodox parts of his anatomy! The Town eventually went out of the competition in the sixth round at Sunderland in front of a crowd of 53,151 which meant that a large percentage of the population of the North

East had seen the new Luton strip before the regulars at Kenilworth Road.

A chance to avenge their defeat came Newcastle's way eight years later when the Town were drawn to play at St James' Park, again in the fourth round. We had edged past Orient in the previous round.

A best of season crowd of 29,202 was present to see this all Second Division clash but this time it was the turn of Newcastle to seize the initiative by taking the lead in the sixth minute. Ray Clarke was in acres of space to guide a header past Jake Findlay.

An inevitable second goal came on the hour when Chris Waddle skipped down the left and sent over a cross that was gratefully accepted by Mick Martin.

The Magpies then appeared to sit back and Godfrey Ingram reduced the defect five minutes later with a lovely 20-yard shot. Newcastle did not extend their run much further, however, going out at Exeter at the next stage after a replay.

# Failed medical leads to eight successful years with the Town!

WHERE ARE THEY NOW? - BY ROGER WASH

ormer Luton skipper Alan West enjoyed more than 300 first-team appearances for the Town. Yet if he had heeded medical advice, his playing career would have been cut short 20 years ago.....

Born in Hyde, Alan was playing for his local school team when he was spotted by a Burnley scout and invited along for trials at the age of 14. He signed apprentice professional forms, joining one of the best youth set-ups in the country at the time, and starred alongside the likes of Dave Thomas, Steve Kindon and Mick Docherty in a team that won the F.A. Youth Cup in 1968.

"I made my first team debut in the 1969/70 season at home to Stoke City in the same side as Ralph

Coates and Willy Morgan," he said. "And in all I appeared in over 50 games for Burnley, mostly in Division One, as well as winning under-23 international caps whilst I was there."

As is often the case with smaller, provincial clubs the better players are eventually sold and Burnley suffered relegation in 1971 after selling one player too many. It was Alan's turn to move on in 1973 when Sunderland stepped in with a £100,000 bid, but after three days of medical checks at Roker Park came some devastating news.

"I was told by the Sunderland medical people that I had a vertebrae in my back out of place and

that if I continued playing I would be in a wheelchair within two years. I was sure that there was nothing wrong and when Luton manager Harry Haslam came in for me soon after I jumped at the chance as I was anxious to prove my fitness."

Alan joined Luton for £100,000 and made his debut in October 1973 in a 2-0 defeat at Orient. But by the end of the season, promotion to Division One had been secured, leaving Sunderland behind on the way!

"The enduring quality of the Luton side at that time was the team spirit. We had no big stars in the side but played for each other with a good blend of defence, midfield and attack bringing out the best in each other.

"I still feel a bit aggrieved that we were relegated

from Division One in 1975 as in the second-half of that season, especially at home, we steam-rollered sides and I have not experienced an atmosphere like it before or since. Although I played in three really good sides at Kenilworth Road finishing up in the David Moss, Brian Stein era, it was a shame that I did not play longer in Division One."

Alan reminded me that for four consecutive summers during his time at Luton he played in the United States for Minnesota Kicks, pitting his wits

against the likes of Eusebio, Pele, Beckenbaur, Cruyff, Best and Muller, which must go some way in compensation for not turning out regularly in the top-flight.

"After we failed to get promotion after two near misses, I thought that, at 30, I was past my best and felt that the youngsters coming through meant that perhaps a move was in my best interests. I was under no pressure to leave the club and David Pleat was very good about it, but I decided to join Millwall where my old team-mate Peter Anderson was manager. As it turned out, Peter was sacked and, when George Graham came into the club, I

didn't fit into his plans and joined Hitchin Town where I had four happy years as player-manager. I obviously have some regrets at leaving Luton when I did just as the club was about to win promotion to Division One!"

Alan now looks on Luton as his home and is happily settled in the town and is minister at the Luton Christian Fellowship. Unlike his son, who is a regular at Kenilworth Road, he does not have time to watch the Town too often as he still plays football on a Saturday for the local 'Christians in Sport' team. At the time of speaking to him, he proudly confirmed that he had scored the winner in the previous weekend's game against A.C. Cadoza.

Not bad for someone who, 20 years ago, was told he would be crippled within two years!


