CITY'S F.A. CUP GUESTS... Luton Town

Despite the fact that LUTON TOWN occupy seventeenth position in Division One, twelve points off a play-off place, they are very much an improving side, and that narrow defeat at Leicester eight days ago was their first reverse since December 11th.

They only missed relegation by a couple of points last season, but in what is now their second year out of top-level football, Manager David Pleat seems to have stabilised the situation, and the current F.A. Cup run is proving a boost with the impressive victory over Newcastle United in the last round attracting nationwide attention and emphasising that there are a number of talented players at Kenilworth Road.

FORWARDS...

 Swansea-born 18 year-old JOHN HARTSON, a current Wales Under-21 Cap who was on the substitute's bench in the recent Wales/Scotland B International. has been in the starting line-up for the past three games, and has played in most of this season's matches after making his debut in late August. A former youth and reserve team forward, he became a full professional in December 1992 and scored in the replay win over Newcastle eleven days ago. He's been taking the place recently of the injured KERRY DIXON, the former England International who's missed the last three games with ankle trouble and will again be absent this afternoon. Luton-born Dixon, top scorer this season with eight League and Cup goals, was originally a Tottenham apprentice and joined Reading from Dunstable in 1980. A prolific scorer during his career, he went to Chelsea in 1983 for £175,000 and moved to Southampton for £575,000 in July 1992. He had several months on loan with Luton last season, and after

starting the season on loan again, was signed permanently in October 1992. Leicester-born England Under-21 Cap SCOTT OAKES made a few League appearances for his hometown club before Luton signed him in October 1991, and he's played in most of this season's games either in a left-side attacking role or up front, and he scored in the Cup win over Newcastle. Also with the Club is Canadian International **GEOFF AUNGER** who started his career in Canadian football and once had a spell with Ipswich. He arrived in October, signing a two-year contract, and he scored on his debut in the early November defeat at Crystal Palace. But after a three-game run in the side, he hasn't since appeared.

MIDFIELD...

Scottish Under-21 and B International PAUL TELFER has been a regular in a right-sided position and he's an Edinburgh-born former YTS player who made his debut in 1990-91. He can also play at right-back, while returning

eight days ago after a threematch suspension was Pontypridd-born midfielder CERI HUGHES who played against Telfer in the recent B International in Wrexham. An Under-21 and Full Welsh Cap, Hughes is almost everpresent this season and is a former YTS player who made his debut in 1989-90. Former Walsall player DAVID PREECE was signed for £130,000 in 1984, and he's an England B International. He had a regular spot to mid-October before injury cost him his place, and he's been back since mid-December. One of the most influential members of the side is Liverpool-born ALAN HARPER signed on a free transfer from Everton in mid-September since when he's been a regular in the line-up. Originally with Liverpool. he moved to Everton in 1983 and later had spells with Sheffield Wednesday and Manchester City before returning to Everton in 1991. Substitutes in the recent defeat at Leicester were Hitchinborn SCOTT HOUGHTON and Birmingham-born JAMIE CAMP-BELL, both of whom have made a

THEIR MANAGER ...

 Nottingham-born DAVID PLEAT is in his second spell in charge at Kenilworth Road. He was a winger with Nottingham Forest where he began his League career, and he joined Luton in 1964. Three years later he was transferred to Shrewsbury, and was then with Exeter and Peterborough. He returned to Luton as reserve-team coach in 1974 after being in charge at Nuneaton, and in 1977 became first-team coach. He succeeded Harry Haslam as Manager in 1978, taking the Club into Division One in 1982. Four years later, he moved to Tottenham, and in December 1987 joined Leicester City. He was there until January 1991, and returned to take charge at Luton again in June 1991.

number of appearances this season. Houghton was previously with Tottenham whom he joined as a YTS player, and he was signed at the start of the season. Campbell, a former YTS player with the Club, made his debut in 1991-92 and though he's generally a leftsided player, he's appeared on a few occasions in defence this season as well as up front. Midfielder JASON REES from Pontypridd, a Welsh Youth B. Under-21 and Full Cap, has made several appearances this season and he's been on loan at Mansfield since the end of December, while England B and Under-21 Cap MITCHELL THOMAS has just gone back to West Ham after a three-month loan-spell but Luton are hoping to sign him in a £50,000 deal. One of Luton's most exciting talents is attacking midfielder TONY THORPE signed from his hometown club Leicester City at the start of last season, 19 year-old Thorpe made his debut as substitute in the 6-2 home win over Stoke in late November, and his next game was in the Fourth Round tie at Newcastle when he scored in the 1-1 draw. He followed up with another goal in the 3-0 home win over Oxford as substitute, and he also came on in the replay against Newcastle. Another midfielder is locally-born MARTIN WILLIAMS who was a regular in the squad in the first few months of this season. He's a former Leicester City YTS player who joined Luton in 1991.

Skipper TREVOR PEAKE is

DEFENDERS ...

ever-present in the middle of defence. Signed in August 1991 for £100,000 from Coventry with whom he won an F.A. Cup Winners' medal, he began his League career with Lincoln City in 1979-80 after joining them from Nuneaton. Alongside him at the back is former Oxford United player JOHN DREYER signed for £140,000 in 1988 and he's missed just three games this season because of suspension. Birmingham-born DES LINTON has been a regular at right-back since early October, and he was signed in October 1991 from Leicester City together with Scott Oakes, while JULIAN JAMES has regained the left-back position since early January. He had a regular place to early October in either full-back position, and was then out for a few months, partly through injury. A former YTS player, he's an England Under-21 Cap who made his Luton debut in 1987-88. Wembley-born full-back MARVIN JOHNSON, a former YTS player, was ever-present to early November before an ankle injury put him out. He's now fit but has yet to return to first-team action.



I think I remember my first Ninian Park game though. Middlesbrough it was. They had a centre forward called Hickton and a number ten called McMordie. Probably the start of the 1972-73 season. But don't press me on the He'd just put £20 on result.

Since then I've seen Stockport



hundreds of City games, but what I recall of them seems to have little to do with the matches themselves. It's more the terrace sideshows

A meaningless evening game against Darlington for example, enlivened by the 15-or-so away fans doing the conga across the Grange End in drenching rain.

Or that man on the Bob Bank who used to say, "Larmour — you're as much use as a chocolate teapot!"

Or that other Bob Bank stalwart who showed au one Saturday afternoon and announced he'd developed a penchant for placing bizarre bets. that day's game against it. County

ending up a 3-3 draw.

We laughed. City were three up in 20 minutes, and rampant. Then Stockport scored 3 in the second half, and we sang Stockport County songs all the way back to the betting shop.

Incidentally, mv favourite Bob Bank song remains:

Jingle bells, iingle bells. Jingle all the way Oh what fun it is to see Cardiff win ... at 'ome.

And Dannie Abse a City fan too!

But as I say, all these memories are hazv. I may even have made some of them up.

Much clearer are my childhood, pre-Cardiff, football memories all of which have to do with a team whose identity I needn't bother you with.

But I will say this. The team in question met Luton Town in a classic Wembley Cup Final in the late 'Fifties. And Luton lost. At least that's how I remember

I hope it's an omen.

BOLTON ON THE MARCH...

 The President of Bolton Wanderers, who play Aston Villa at Burden Park in the Fifth Round this afternoon (3.05), has a special affinity with the F.A. Cup. The legendary Nat Lofthouse, the former England International who spent his whole career with Bolton as player, manager, fundraiser etc., played in two F.A. Cup Finals for them - against Blackpool in 1953 when they lost 4-3 in one of the most memorable Wembley Finals, and against Manchester United in 1958 when he scored both goals in Wanderers' 2-0 victory. Bolton reached the Fifth Round last season as a lower division side coming from Round One, and along the way they beat Liverpool 2-0 at Anfield after a 2-2 draw at Burnden Park. This time it was Everton's turn after a 3rd round replay, and following Wanderers' 3-2 victory at Goodison Park, they again did their usual, beating Premiership opposition in a replay, Arsenal going down 3-1 at Highbury eleven days ago. Scottish forward John McGinlay, a former Shrewsbury and Bury player signed from Millwall early last

season, is one of the men Villa will have to watch this afternoon. He makes a habit of scoring in these type of matches, and he's netted 21 times in League and Cup this season. And it's not that long since Bolton were last at Wembley - they won the Sherpa Van Trophy in 1989, though it's 1958 since they were last there for an F.A. Cup Final. As for Aston Villa, they've really picked up since New Year's Day after a difficult spell in the Premiership. Their 5-0 home win over Swindon Town last Saturday was their seventh League and Cup game without defeat (six wins and a draw) and they've scored fifteen goals in that time. They're aiming for Wembley on two fronts, having played Tranmere Rovers at Prenton Park on Wednesday in the first leg of their Coca Cola Cup Semi-final. Welsh International Dean Saunders' hat-trick last Saturday (two of them penalties) gave him 12 League and Cup goals this season, and they're looking for a Wembley F.A. Cup Final place for the first time since 1957, although they've been there since then in the League Cup.

DON'S UPSET?...

 Wimbledon v. Manchester United at 5.00 p.m. is the other Cup match today, and there should be a full house at Selhurst Park which they share with Crystal Palace. The last time that the Premiership leaders and current champions visited Selhurst, was in the final match of last season when a crowd of 30,115 packed the ground. Wimbledon only had 13,358 for last Saturday's 4-2 home win over Newcastle United, and most of those were Northern fans. But while most of today's crowd will be Manchester United supporters, that won't worry Wimbledon who are quite capable of upsetting anyone, especially with Vinnie Jones back in the side after his brief absence recently. If they do beat Manchester United, it will follow this season's pattern of the major clubs collapsing in the competition, though on current form, United must be favourites this afternoon. They've won their last six League and Cup games, and they've only lost twice all season! Chelsea beat them 1-0 at Stamford Bridge on September 11th, Stoke City beat them 2-1 eleven days later at the Victoria Ground in the first leg of the Coca-Cola Cup Second Round. Since then, it's 31 games unbeaten (22 wins, 9 draws).

COHEN GRIFFITH: CUP FEELINGS

● Cohen Griffith — so long one of Cardiff City's unsung heroes has a simple philosophy games about like todav's.

"I'm trying to make it a day to remember," he says.

"I think the best way to give yourself a chance of having a good game is to aim to go out and enjoy it. That's what I'm aiming to do - if selected."

The 31 vear-old forward Guyana-born moved to Ninian Park for £70,000 from non-league Kettering Town — having tasted F.A. Cup Fourth Round adventure with them.

"We lost 2-1 to Charlton, and I didn't enjoy that game. Well, we're already past that hurdle, and I'm looking forward to the new challenge."

Ninian, the striker/wideman has something of veteran status about front-running him.

"Yes, that's right." he says. "I think that of the current team only Jason Perry has played more games than me.

was a big jump coming from non-league foot-



ball. But the Conference was a high-standard competition, with a lot of ex-League plavers competing. So the move wasn't that big."

He was first seen as an out-and-out striker, but has since played many of his 200-plus games on the flanks.

"I enjoy that when I get the ball — you rely on service from others in that position. REPLAY-CITY

● The 1974 World Cup Finals in Germany produced some memorable performances, and one member of the Australian team who did well in that tournament was so highly rated by the West German Manager that the great Helmut Schoen commented "He could play for any side in the Bundeslig."

In fact Hertha Berlin, Eintracht Frankfurt and SV Hamburg all tried to sign him but Preston-born ADRIAN ALSTON chose today's opponents Luton Town, a move which resulted in him joining Cardiff City after a fourteen-month stay at Kenilworth Road, and helping The Bluebirds to regain a place in the old Division Two at the first attempt following relegation.

ATTENTION ...

Alston had left his native Preston as an 18 year-old in May 1968 to emigrate to Australia, and he was playing for Safeways of Sydney when Australia reached the '74 Finals. They didn't get beyond the first phase, but Alston's ability attracted a great deal of attention, and it was First Division Luton who signed him in August 1974 shortly after the Tournament.

He made 23 League and Cup appearances for them, scoring nine goals, and was in fact top scorer in a Luton side that made a gallant

attempt to avoid relegation. But they went down by a point despite three wins and a draw from their final four games in which Alston scored three goals.

But the big forward did not have a good start to the 1975-76 season — one goal in his opening eight games cost him his place. Meanwhile, Cardiff City manager Jimmy Andrews needed a proven goalscorer to boost a side which was in the lower half of Division Three after being relegated from the Second while Luton were going down from the First, By late October 1975. The Bluebirds had scored just 15 goals in 13 League games and showed little sign of a major revival.

CAREFUL BUILDING...

In retrospect, it was a City that was being carefully built-up. Former Wales and Tottenham skipper Mike England had signed in mid-August to boost the defence, a few days later the midfielder Doug Livermore had come from Norwich for £25,000. Free transfer signing Tony Evans from Black-pool was starting to score regularly, few wingers got past full-back Phil Dwyer, while Albert Larmour was forming a solid central-defensive partnership with England.

It was on Wednesday, October 29th, 1975 that City signed Alston for £25,000. Two days later he arrived at Ninian Park for his debut that Friday night against Chesterfield. The game was played that night because of the Rugby International between Wales and Australia at the Arms Park the next day. And because Alston had been such a big name Down

Under, those members of the Australian rugby squad who weren't involved in the following day's game were at Ninian Park to see their fellow-countryman, who held dual British/Australian citizenship, make a tremendous opening appearance for City.

GREAT GOAL...

It took Alston just six minutes and twenty-five seconds to set the crowd alight with a great goal, and he later added a second in a match which City won 4-3, having to hang on at the end as Chesterfield made desperate efforts to save the game.

From that point on, City hardly looked back. Alston scored 20 goals in 41 League and Cup appearances, forming a great partnership with Tony Evans (29 League and Cup goals). Attendances were regularly above the five-figure mark, and when

City played the eventual champions Hereford United at Ninian Park on April 14th 1976, there was a 35,549 crowd! Four days before that, Alston had scored the winner in a 1-0 victory at fellow promotion-challengers Crystal Palace whose manager Malcolm Allison had said afterwards - "They (Cardiff) aren't in the same League as us for support. They won't get 25,000 there to see them play Hereford."

CHAMPAGNE...

Much was made of Allison's comments, and after City beat Hereford 2-0 in front of that 35,000 crowd, they sent him six bottles of his favourite drink — champagne. And as City headed towards promotion, Palace missed out! Alston's most vital goal was in the last League game at Bury on May 4th. City won 1-0 to go up in

second place, and went on to complete a League and Cup double.

But Alston's stay at Ninian Park was to be comparatively brief. In mid-December 1976, he was transferred to American club Tampa Bay Rowdies for £18,000. His star had shone briefly at Ninian Park, but it was great while it lasted, and the Alston/Evans combination is still fondly remembered by Bluebirds fans of the mid-1970s.
