Bob Taylor gave Albion the perfect start at Kenilworth Road, but Luton refused to surrender in an enterprising contest.

Taylor, last season's top scorer with 18 goals, opened his account with a tremendous finish from 12 yards in the fifth minute, and Albion should have been fur-ther in front by the interval.

But Luton hit back four minutes after the break with a thunder-ous header from Scott Oakes, to set up an enthralling finish.

Albion paraded two debutants in this First Division curtain raiser

— new skipper Mike
Phelan and young centre back Craig Herbert.

Keith Burkinshaw preferred 18 year-old Herbert to fit-again Paul Raven, who was one of the substitutes alongside Kevin Donovan and Tony Lange.

Albion survived a scare in the third min-

following a l long throw from Oakes on the right. The ball fell loose inside the sixloose inside the six-yard box and Naylor was forced to make a brave save.

But it was Albion who took the lead just two minutes later through the irrepressible TAY-

He scampered on to an astute Edwards' through ball and shook off the challenge of Greene, before rifling a low left-foot drive underneath the advancing Sommer from 12 yards

It was just the start Burkinshaw's men needed to steady any

early nerves.

But Luton threatened hit back immedi-

ately.

Oakes proved a threat, but Herbert was superbly positioned to cut out a ball hit to-wards the unmarked Houghton just inside the penalty area.

Luton were still put-ting Albion under heavy pressure, and around 2,000 travelling supporters were re-lieved to see Dixon head a Telfer cross over the top from point blank range. blank range.

But Albion always looked dangerous on the break, and never more so than in the 16th minute when McNally inspired a fierce spell


of pressure.

He stormed clear after running on to Tay-lor's great lay-off, but his shot from inside the area was blocked by

Sommer.

Heggs picked up the rebound and crossed to the far post where James seemed to push Hamilton, but the mid-fielder retained possession to feed Edwards, with Taylor heading his fine left wing centre straight at 'keeper Sommer

In a swift and enter-



taining contest, Luton responded two minutes later with a dipping James drive that Naylor tipped away at the far post.

Luton right back James was the game's first victim of the new FIFA crackdown on time wasting, when he was shown the yellow card for holding on to the ball for too long for an Albion throw in.

Albion were now enjoying far more possession in midfield and forced a succession of corners around the 36th minute, but 'ke Sommer held firm. 'keeper

Naylor preserved Al-bion's lead with a specone-handed tacular tacular one-handed stop from Houghton in the 40th minute — an early contender for save of the season.

Albion were creating plenty of opportunities and Luton looked ripe for the taking, but Tay-lor flashed an 18-yard drive fractionally wide in injury time.

Taylor was then involved in an angry exchange with team-mate Ashcroft. Within seconds, the flery winger was substituted and re-

placed by Donovan. Herbert was booked for time wasting in the 55th minute as Albion came under heavy pressure.

Albion were starting to settle down and show signs of fight, and Hamilton strode forward in the 65th minute to power a left foot effort narrowly over Somnarrowly mer's crossbar from 20

Donovan had a great chance to restore Albi-on's lead when Taylor picked him out in space in the penalty area. The midfielder took his time, but 'keeper Som-mer spread himself to block his shot from ten yards.

Luton sent on Linton for Skelton and, shortly Dixon within a whisker of giv-ing his side the lead with a header that skimmed the crossbar.
