



ITALIAN defender
Pasquale Bruno has been

The 33-year-old is one of Italy's most highly regarded defenders, having played over 300 games in Serie A.

His clubs include Torino, Juventus and Fiorentina, and he now wants to finish his career with a spell in England.

Bruno came on as a second half substitute in Monday's friendly with Tottenham, playing through the pain barrier after suffering cracked ribs in the pre-season match at Leighton Town last week.

A decision on his future at Luton Town is expected shortly.

Tribunal sets Davis transfer at £750,000

LUTON will have to pay Burnley £750,000 for central defender Steve Davis, a Football League transfer tribunal ruled on Wednesday.

The fee is the second highest ever paid by the Hatters, and is a record transfer for Burnley.

Davis, 26, was Burnley's skipper last season when the Lancashire side were relegated, and out-of-contract he wanted to stay in Division One.

Luton Town chairman David Kohler, who attended the tribunal along with manager Terry Westley and secretary Cherry Newbery, said: "We have got a very good player in Steve Davis because £750,000, with the exception of Lars Elstrup, is far in excess of anything this club has ever paid.

"We are delighted that a player of this calibre has come to Luton Town, and a good player means a good fee."

The tribunal also ordered Coventry City to pay Luton £1.15 million for midfielder Paul Telfer.

The Scotland Under-21 international made his Hatters debut in 1991, and was a regular in the Town side for the past three seasons, playing in every game in the 1994/95 campaign, scoring nine goals.







COUNCIL APPROVE PLANS FOR 'KOHLERDOME'



THE plans to build the 'Kohlerdome' (above) moved a step closer with July's Luton Borough Council approval for the scheme.

LUTON Town's plans to relocate to a revolutionary new indoor stadium, with moveable grass pitch, have moved a step closer.

On Tuesday, July 18, Luton Borough Council voted unanimously to recommend the scheme to the Environment Secretary John Gummer.

Hatters' chairman David Kohler plans to build the 20,000 seat multi-purpose indoor stadium on land by junction 10 of the M1 motorway, and Mr Kohler pointed out: "This is great news not just for Luton Town, but for the town of Luton.

"The Kohlerdome is a unique facility which will serve the whole community and can stage a variety of sports, leisure and business events, as well as being a new home for the football club.

"We will hopefully look back on July 18, 1995, in years to come and say that was a significant date in the history of Luton Town.

"From a planning point of view the unanimous vote gave us much credibility, so that when the Secretary of State examines the case he can see that the elected representatives of the people of Luton are united on this issue.

"It shows the strength of feeling behind it, and I would like to thank all those supporters, who attended the meeting, and who signed our letters to both the Council, and to Sir Graham Bright, for their backing.

"If the Secretary of State decides in our favour we have to then deal with the detailed planning, land acquistion and funding, which could probably take another 12 to 18 months.

"Dont expect to see workmen digging on the site for quite some time," added Mr Kohler. "There is still a lot of work to do.

"We have overcome a first but very important hurdle, and although I am delighted with our progress, in terms of a cup run we are just through the first round.

"We have council backing, the majority of support in the town, and my job is to make sure we get the land and get the funding, and I feel they will be easier tasks than getting the planning.

"In the meantime we continue to work with the various planning and traffic authorities to make sure all the council's conditions are met."

The Chairman, Directors and Staff of Luton Town Football Club would like to thank the thousands of fans who have supported the club's plans to relocate from Kenilworth Road.

Gunn has been City's first choice keeper since November 1986, clocking up nearly 400 first team appearances for the club. Has won five caps for Scotland, and is ninth in the Canaries all-time appearance listings.

ANDY MARSHALL - Young goalkeeper who clocked up 25 senior appearances after Gunn's injury last season. Was a colleague of Luton's Kelvin Davis in the England Under-21 squad for this summer's Toulon Tournament.

MARK BOWEN - Experienced left back with 32 caps for Wales. Joined Norwich in July 1987 from Tottenham for £90,000, and has since scored 25 goals in 361 appearances.

CARL BRADSHAW - Full back signed from Sheffield United for £450,000 in July 1994, who bagged the winning goal in last September's 'derby' win at Ipswich. Former England youth international who has also played for Sheffield Wednesday, Barnsley and Manchester City. ROB NEWMAN - Central defender who was also present into envision the state of t

ROB NEWMAN - Central defender who was also pressed into service up front and in midfield last season. Has made 159 appearances for Norwich since arriving from Bristol City for £600,000 in July 1991.

JÓN NEWSOME - Became Norwich's first million pound signing in June 1994 when he arrived from Leeds, and was immediately appointed club captain. Central defender who began his career at Sheffield Wednesday, and was voted Norwich's Player of the Year last season.

JÖHN POLSTON - Joined Norwich from

JÓHN POLSTON - Joined Norwich from Tottenham in July 1990 for £300,000, and captained the Canaries in their first ever UEFA Cup match, against Vitesse Arnhem, in September 1993.

SPENCER PRIOR - Joined the Canaries in a complicated instalment transfer, and to date Southend have received £300,000 for his services.

NEIL ADAMS - Midfielder formerly with Stoke, Everton and Oldham. Won a championship medal at Goodison Park, and won promotion to the top flight with the Latics. Also represented England U21s.

IAN CROOK - Now in his tenth season at Carrow Road, and a well-deserved testimonial. Former Tottenham trainee who found himself battling for a midfield berth with the likes of Hoddle, Ardiles, Hazard and Villa. Has now played 346 games for Norwich, scoring 19 goals. (continued on page 14).





NORWICH CITY 1995/96

JEREMY GOSS - Welsh international, born in Cyprus, who starred in Norwich's UEFA Cup run in 1993/94, when his goals in each leg helped defeat Bayern Munich. Has made 221 senior appearances for Norwich, plus 200 reserve appearances.

ANDY JOHNSON - Promising midfield player whose progress at senior level has been hampered by a succession of injuries. Former England youth international, who was the unfortunate victim of a 'mistaken identity' sending off at West Ham last season.

MIKE MILLIGAN - Competitive central midfielder who began his career as an associate schoolboy with Manchester City, before moving to Oldham. Moved to Everton for £1 million, but stayed for just 11 months before rejoining the Latics. Signed for Norwich for £850,000 in June 1994

KEITH O'NEILL - Midfielder who made his first team debut at Southampton last season. But hopes of an extended run in the senior side were dashed by a broken ankle in a reserve match soon after. Republic of Ireland youth international, and product of Dublin's famous Home Farm club.

DARYL SUTCH - Played in 30 of City's 42 Premiership matches last season, having won England Under 21 caps at the end of the 92/93 campaign. Has played up front, but slotted in at right back last term during Carl Bradshaw's absence

ROBERT ULLATHORNE - Former England youth international who has now made 79 senior appearances for the Canaries.

ADE AKINBIYI - Striker who made his Norwich debut against Bayern Munich in the UEFA Cup in 1993. Enjoyed loan spells at Hereford and Brighton scoring six goals in 11 games in the lower divisions, but has yet to score for Norwich in a senior match despite 32 goals in 80 reserve appearances.

JAMIE CURETON - Former England youth international who has scored 82 goals in 90 youth games, 40 in 71 reserve games, and 4 in 20 senior matches for the club. Scored his first senior goal, against Chelsea, just 13 seconds after coming on as a substitute.

DARREN EADIE - Since graduating into the Canaries first team at the outset of the 1993/94 UEFA Cup campaign, Darren Eadie's pace has earned him a regular place in the England Under-21 set-up. Has scored seven times in 56 senior appearances.

MIKE SHERON - A product of Manchester City's successful youth policy he was a contemporary of David White, Michael Hughes and Paul Lake, although he actually made his league debut on loan at Bury. Collected 11 England Under 21 caps, and signed for Norwich from Manchester City for £800,000 in August

ASHLEY WARD - Two goals on his City debut against Chelsea made Ashley Ward an instant favourite with City fans, and he ended the campaign with eight goals making him the Canaries' top scorer. Began his career at Manchester City, also playing at Leicester, Wrexham, Blackpool and Crewe, signed for Norwich from the latter for £350,000 in December 1994.

A former Norwich player, O'Neill was also a major influence in Brian Clough's championship and European Cup winning sides at Nottingham Forest, before moving into management with Wycombe Wanderers.

Now has the task of guiding Norwich back into the Premiership.



A Hatter and ...a Canary


Born in Kent, JOHN RYAN started his career with Tonbridge before future Luton manager Harry Haslam arranged for him to have trials at Arsenal where he eventually reached the reserve side.

After receiving a free transfer, Haslam stepped in again and sorted out a move to Fulham where this time Ryan made the Division One side before becoming surplus to requirements once again.

Just as he was about to join Bobby Robson at Ipswich, Haslam turned up for the third time and brought him to Luton where he settled down to become one of the most popular players in recent years, enjoying 286 league games, mostly at fullback, although he could do a job in the forward line if required.

He won two promotions with the Town, in 1970 and 1974, before being transferred to Norwich in 1976 for a much needed fee of £60,000.

Operating mainly in midfield at Carrow Road he scored his share of goals and became a crowd favourite for a second time before linking up with Haslam once again in




1980 at the age of 33.

In the twilight of his career he turned out for Seattle Sounders in the NASL, enjoyed 19 games in Division One for Manchester City as 'cover', had spells at Stockport and Chester, before finishing up at Cambridge where he had a short, unsuccessful period as manager.

John was tempted out of football retirement recently to take charge at Sittingbourne, where he has discovered a few highly regarded youngsters, including Neil Emblen, now at Wolves. - Roger Wash.







Town trio sign new contracts


THREE Town players signed new contracts over the summer months.

SAFETY MATTERS

with LTFC Safety Manager Geoff Lovell

WITH the new season about to get underway, it is an appropriate time to look at the measures that have been taken in the close season, and will be continued on through the coming season, to ensure we maintain our commitment to the safety of everyone in the stadium.

The maintenance staff have worked extremely hard in tidying up the stadium, as well as carrying out essential safety work as required by the Safety Committee.

We are required as one of the conditions of the Safety Certificate to produce a set of emergency plans to deal with various types of incidents that could occur when the stadium is in use.

These plans are for your safety, and have been prepared with the help of the three emergency services and other agencies.

Having produced the plans it is essential that throughout the season we test parts of

These tests will be designed to test steward responses and will not involve spectators as a general rule.

There will however be a number of games where at the end we shall close an exit from the ground.

In an emergency it may be that one or more exits may not be available for use and we need to know what effect this will have on the other exits. You will be advised beforehand, and inconvenience will be kept to a minimum.

Those of you who were at the friendly against Southampton at the start of last season may recall that we had to close the main exit stairs from the main stand due to a problem with those stairs.

This meant people who normally used that route out had to go another way. Everyone co-operated and there were no problems.

At regular intervals



throughout the season there will be an article in the programme outlining the procedure for evacuating the stadium.

All these measures are for your safety and I ask for your co-operation. If you have any comments on safety issues I would welcome a letter or a telephone call from you.

I must also remind everyone of the ban on smoking in or under the main stand, issued by the County Council.

Last season a policy of ejecting anyone who broke this ban resulted in a number of ejections from the ground. This policy will continue this season but I hope we don't have to use it.

Have an enjoyable and safe season.







WELSH international Ceri Hughes has been sidelined with a serious knee injury since November 1994, when he limped off during the home defeat by Grimsby.

His first competitive match since then came in the July trip to Diss Town.......

Q: Forty-five minutes at Diss Town, with all due respect to the non-league side, may not sound a lot to many people, but to you it was probably quite a landmark.

A: It seemed like a whole season to me, and was my first competitive game of football since November 1 last year.

Q: How important was it just to be a part of a game situation once again?

A: It's definitely a physcological thing to actually gain confidence from just kicking the ball with whichever leg has been damaged.

Then once you have overcome that you can start to work on getting your touch back and getting a feel for the game.

Q: It was obviously a very serious injury. Do you still feel the occasional twinge from it?

A: There are good days and bad days at the moment. The scar tissue has built up around the knee and I can sometimes feel that breaking up and it can get a bit sore, so I have to take a break and rest.

Q: It has been a long haul of operation and then physiotherapy, and I know you aren't the greatest watcher of football.



Great Dane sees off Canaries

BY winning at Derby in an amazing last game of 1989/90 the Town players had won for themselves the right to play at the top level for the ninth season in succession, albeit with a 'Houdini' tag.

In view of the club's financial position it was, perhaps, not surprising that no new players were taken on in the 1990 close season and with youngsters coming through the ranks we could afford to be sellers and Danny Wilson was allowed to go to relegated Sheffield Wednesday, while Mick Kennedy departed to Stoke.

The first few games of the new campaign could not reliably be regarded as a pointer to the months ahead apart from the fact that the players were consistently inconsistent!

Crystal Palace came away from Kenilworth Road with a point following a dull 1-1 draw in the first game, and when we went down to glorious defeat at Arsenal another season of struggle was envisaged.

Just as we were resigning ourselves to another year of torment the players bounced back, earning a 2-1 win at Southampton with Lars Elstrup, the Town's record signing the previous season, getting both Luton goals and proving that his injury problems were firmly in the past.

The topsy-turvy season continued with an unfortunate home defeat at the hands of Manchester United followed by a lucky win over Leeds at Kenilworth Road. We were then thrashed 6-1 at QPR, before an Iain Dowie goal sealed a well deserved home victory over Coventry to send us up to the heady heights of eighth position in the table.

Despite all this only a few Luton supporters made their way to Carrow Road, Norwich, to see the Town take on a team who had won two and lost four of their games at that point.

The Luton following was surprised to see the

return of Steve Williams to the side for the first time since the previous Boxing Day, and he struggled the same as the rest of the team as the players were on the receiving end of a pasting in the first half. The Canaries by-passed midfield and were extremely unfortunate to go in at half-time only one goal ahead, scored by Dale Gordon after four minutes.

It was expected that the Town forwards would attack on the break but, with the defence under so much pressure, only one shot on target was recorded, a tame effort from Elstrup, in the first period.

It is not recorded what was said at the interval but the Luton players certainly started the second half with much more purpose and immediately laid seige on the Norwich goal. Even so it came as a surprise, after what had gone on before, when Elstrup fired home an equaliser after 48 minutes.

Dowie, anonymous in the first half, swept a superb pass out to the right wing to the feet of the onrushing Elstrup who cut inside and fired past Bryan Gunn.

It was now time for the Norwich defence to come under pressure and the game was as good as over just after the hour following two identical headers from Elstrup which earned him a well deserved hat-trick. Kingsley Black was fouled by Paul Blades and Williams sent over a perfect free-kick from the left wing to the grateful Elstrup who headed home past a static Canaries defence.

When Elstrup was fouled in the same place by lan Crook shortly afterwards, a similar free kick from Williams produced a similar end result to complete an amazing transformation to a game that Norwich appeared to have sewn up.

Norwich boss Dave Stringer was not impressed with his defence, while Luton manager Jim Ryan saw his side move up to sixth position in Division One - which has not been bettered since!

16/8/75: The Town got off to a winning start to the season, seeing off Hull City 2-0 at Kenilworth Road. Ron Futcher and Andy King, with his first for the club, were the Luton scorers in front of another sunbaked crowd of 10,389.

HATTERS WELCOME WESTLEY'S NEW SIGNINGS

AFTER succeeding David Pleat as manager of Luton Town, Terry Westley was soon busy in the transfer market with five additions to the Hatters' squad.....

David Oldfield signed from Leicester City for £150,000, six years after he left Kenilworth Road.

The 27-year-old midfielder/striker started his career at Luton, progressing through the junior ranks to a two-goal senior debut in a 2-1 Simod Cup win at Everton in February 1988.

He also scored on his full league debut in a 2-1 home win over Watford in May 1988, and went to make 29 league appearances for the Hatters, scoring four goals.

Australian-born Oldfield, who played for England Under-21s, joined Manchester City for £600,000 in March 1989, and made 26 league appearances for the Maine Road side scoring six goals. These included two in a 5-1 win for City over neighbours United.

Oldfield then joined Leicester City, and made nearly 200 league appearances for them. He was on loan at Millwall last season, playing in the 1-1 draw against Luton at Kenilworth Road in March.

Luton Town manager Terry Westley said: "We know he can play in this league, and he also has experience at the highest level.

"David has had an up and down last few seasons with various changes of manager at his respective clubs, but his career can be given a real boost by coming back to us.

"We were delighted that he was made available

by Mark McGhee, and we believe this is a quality signing for Luton Town."

As far as Oldfield himself was concerned it was a case of 'welcome home' rather than 'welcome to Kenilworth Road'.

"But a lot has changed since then both for myself and for the club," he admitted. "The return has geographical benefits as it's closer to home, but that was not a major factor.

"I have travelled before, and in fact I quite enjoyed it."

He made quite an impact when he first broke into the Luton team, prompting a bid from Norwich City which was rejected, before the offer from Manchester City proved to good to refuse.

He has returned here a number of times since with both City teams, and also last season while on loan at Millwall.

"There are new faces and ambitious players coming to Luton to join the good players already here who are Luton through and through," said Oldfield.

"I have experienced this division before, getting to three play-off finals with Leicester, and it's hard. We have to get a good start and maintain good home form, but there's no reason why we can't achieve good things."

Bulgarian international **Bontcho Guentchev** signed for the Hatters after being released by lpswich Town.

The 31-year-old striker, who played in the 1994 World Cup Finals in the USA when Bulgaria reached the semi-finals, has been at Ipswich for

the past two seasons playing 58 games in the Premier League.

He arrives on a free transfer, after being released by the Portman Road club, but his wife's employment at the Bulgarian embassy now means he is free to continue playing inthe UK.

"Bontcho is a top quality player, and an international with one of the leading teams in world football," said Luton manager Terry Westley. "It's a real feather in Luton Town's cap to attract that sort of player to Kenilworth Road.

"We have brought him to the club as a goalscorer, and we believe he is capable of scoring heavily in Division One."

The Bulgarian's arrival has increased Luton's profile in Eastern Europe, with the Bulgarian media set to follow the Hatters fortunes throughout the season, and interviews with club staff being featured on BBC World Service for Bulgaria.

Guentchev figured prominently in Luton's pre-season campaign, with a hat-trick in the 4-1 win at Torquay.

Burnley skipper **Steve Davis** has arrived at Kenilworth Road, with the fee due to be decided this week at a Football League tribunal

Terry Westley said the 26-year-old was "one of the best and most competitive centre-halves in the division".

Davis made seven league appearances for Southampton, plus nine on loan to Burnley, and two on loan to Notts County, before signing for Burnley for £60,000 in August 1991.

He has since made 162 league appearances for the Turf Moor side, scoring 22 goals, but was out of contract and wanted to remain in Division One.

"We are absolutely delighted to have secured his services," said Mr Westley. "We have been watching him for some time, and negoiations went on for several weeks.

"He is a good footballer, and he has a tremendous desire to succeed. This is a marvellous opportunity for him."

Midfielder **Gavin Johnson**, like Guentchev, joins on a free transfer from Ipswich.

The 24-year-old, who had been at Portman Road since leaving school, played in 20 Premier League games in 1994/95, taking his total appearances for the club to 160.

He scored 16 goals for Ipswich, including the one which sealed the DivisionTwo championship in May 1992, and then the club's first goal in the new Premier League in

August of that year.

Speaking on Luton Town ClubCall, Johnson said he was looking forward to the new challenge.

"I enjoyed my football at Ipswich in the Premier League, and I want to play there again,"he said.

"Luton like to play good football, and this is a great opportunity for me to show what I can do."

Graham Alexander was Terry Westley's first signing after being confirmed as Luton's new manager.

The Town coaching staff had been watching him for two seasons before deciding to make their move, with the fee in the region of £100,000.

The 23-year-old said the move had come as a complete shock, but with the prospect of moving up two divisions he "couldn't get here fast enough".

At the end of last season, Luton Town gave free transfers to four players - Tony Adcock, Jamie Campbell, Martin Williams and Greg Rioch.


Striker Tony Adcock joined the Hatters last summer from Peterborough, but his season was disrupted by a series of injuries which restricted him to just three substitute appearances for the first team. He has since joined Colchester - his first club.

Jamie Campbell spent much of last season on loan at Mansfield and Cambridge, and has now joined third division Barnet, while winger Martin Williams has joined our first division rivals Reading.

Defender Greg Rioch, son of ex-Hatter and new Arsenal boss Bruce Rioch, didn't make a first-team appearance for Luton, and was linked with a move to Leyton Orient after being released from Kenilworth Road. He has since joined Peterborough.

Best wishes to all these players as they continue their careers elsewhere.

Life-saving course launched with footballers' support

USING money generously donated by the Hillsborough Charitable Trust, the charity St John Ambulance has developed a new first aid course called Lifesaver First Aid.

Alan Hansen, Pat Nevin (representing the Professional Footballers' Association), and the Football Supporters Association have also given their full support to this course.

The launch of St John Ambulance's Lifesaver First Aid is timed to coincide with the start of the football season to link in with the course's strong connections with football. The course gives trainees the skills and the ability to handle a crisis situation but has been specifically developed to give trainees the confidence to cope in an emergency. The course concentrates on practise and uses realistically staged accidents on video to bring trainees face-to-face with emergency situations.

Mike Reddington, the Trust Fund Manager of the Hillsborough Disaster Appeal is very enthusiastic about the project, and is encouraging all 48,000 registered football teams to have at least one First Aider. So far the scheme has helped train 15,000 footballers.

St John Ambulance provide first aid cover at over 90 per cent of the Premier Division and Endsleigh League matches, and games could not take place without the support of their volunteer members.

"To team up with a company of Pony's stature in the world of sport, can only benefit us, and we are the first Division One side to be supplied by them.


"They have designed both a home and an away kit for us, and we have been very impressed by their professional approach and enthusiasm."

"We are rapidly expanding our business in football in the UK, and the addition of Luton to the Pony stable is a very welcome one."




