WE KNOW it takes time for a rebuilt team to bed in after new players have been introduced, but Luton Town tried the patience of even their best friends on Saturday when Derby mugged them.

The second home defeat out of three attempts so far was self-inflicted by a team that had a marvellous start, should have been two up in the first five minutes, then deteriorated into a bit of a shambles.

I still think Terry Westley's team and tactics are not far away from what we all want, but against Derby there seemed to be a collective nervousness holding back the team.

The difference was Derby's Dean Sturridge, an attacker with pace and an eye for goal that was far sharper than anything the Town could muster.

In the end, the margin of defeat could have been far greater, because Derby hit the woodwork twice, and Sturridge wasted open-

ings that could have yielded a hat-trick.

Long-suffering supporters have been waiting since last April for another home win, and will have to suffer for a lot longer yet if the Town remain so toothless in opponents' penalty areas. Because of that the defence is being asked to perform heroics, and well though Steve Davis is playing you have to wonder if too much emphasis is being placed on the negative, and not enough on the positive.

Derby should have been there for the goal after an excellent opening goal in only 31 seconds. The visitors kicked off and immediately went forward, with David Preece trying his luck from distance with a low shot.

Kevin Davis saved, with a little difficulty, then punted a clearance upfield. It was routine one football, but performed with great style. Taylor flicked the ball on, Bontcho Guentchev took control, and his clever reverse pass put in Dwight Marshall for his first league goal of the season.

Within five minutes the Marshall returned the compliment, and his clever reverse pass, getting to the by-line, and then leaving goalkeeper Russell Hoult for dead.

Derby were the team looking ragged and despondent. Sturridge's goal, in the 15th minute, might have been taken after a by some referees.

The Town were put under pressure by a long throw, and claimed that as Simon Webster jumped for a header, he impeded goalkeeper Davis, who was trying to punch clear. Neither made clean contact, and Sturridge was able to net from close range.

It was just about all Derby got from then on. When the Town did get forward there was little conviction about their place, and the shooting was awful. Not until the 62nd minute did we see a drive on target, with Gavin Johnson's effort from 25 yards well saved by Hoult.

Then we had to wait for the last five minutes to see Hoult called into action, with a blocking save from sub Jamie Woodsford, and two easy stops from Steve Davis efforts.

Between times, Derby had helped themselves to a winner, and wasted several other opportunities.

In the first half the quicksilver Sturridge went on a solo run and forced Davis to make a top quality tip-over save from a rising drive. Then he set John Harkes free down Derby's left, but the American international's angled drive hit a post.

Another home failure

Hatters to a shambles

No excuses for the poor showing

MANAGER Terry Westley made no excuses for the Town before jetting out to Denmark to watch a man who might be the midfield playmaker he wants to replace David Preece. But perhaps Preece made a valid point when he talked about the team he still hopes does well without him. "I don't know about Luton needing a playmaker," he said. "I feel that since Phil Gray left a couple of years ago Luton haven't had a natural goalscorer. John Taylor is always going to cause problems for opposing defences, but Luton haven't got a player who can score 20 goals a season. Like Dean Sturridge, for instance."

Westley had dropped Des Linton to give Graham Alexander the job of marking Preece, but admitted one effect was that he reduced the passing ability of his team.

Before the game he reminded his players that Derby would be edgy after their poor start to the season, so the game plan was to hit them hard as early as possible. That worked, with the opening goal in less than a minute, but then the team seemed to lose its way.

"That's the worst we have played," said Westley. "We have got what we deserved."

"But we are better than that. We can be a top six team."

He thought the result would have been better if Bontcho Guentchev had taken the open goal presented to him by Dwight Marshall in the fifth minute.

The Bulgarian international accepted that. "I should have scored," he said. "The defender was two yards away but I tried to score with my left foot, when I like to score with the right. I thought I played well, but I know football is about goals."

Preece was welcomed by his old pals, but not by Town chairman David Kohler, who is threatening to take him to court over his free transfer. The 32-year-old midfielder is still on week by week contracts with Derby, waiting for the dispute to be resolved. His fear is that he could end up wearing a price-tag of £200,000 or so.

He felt that on Saturday's evidence, the Town and Derby would both be clear of relegation worries this season.

Derby manager Jim Smith was delighted with the result, but annoyed that his team did not chalk up a bigger win. "We had four situations in the second half where we should have scored," he said.

"It was pleasing to see the number of chances we created, but we didn't put enough of them away. Sturridge could have had four goals. We showed tremendous endeavour, but not a lot of brain. We could have made it a lot easier for ourselves."

THE POOR performance and result against Derby on Saturday was all the more disappointing for manager Terry Westley after a gritty Town display in midweek.

Satisfaction with a job well done was the reaction of manager and players alike after a point was chiselled out at Blundell Park.

With defence the priority, the match was short of entertainment, but Westley said, "Last year we were notorious for being a soft touch. But we are different now."

The defence, with Kelvin Davis back in goal, had one or two dodgy moments, with Paul Groves shooting wide when he was through and clear in the second half.

But not much else got past Julian James, Steve Davis and Marvin Johnson.

"I am pleased to grind out a 0-0 draw," said the manager. "Now

we have to build on that by getting good results at home."

The point was to be rammed home with a vengeance a few days later when Derby all but destroyed his team at Kenilworth Road, on a day when Watford were also grinding out a 0-0 draw at Grimsby.
