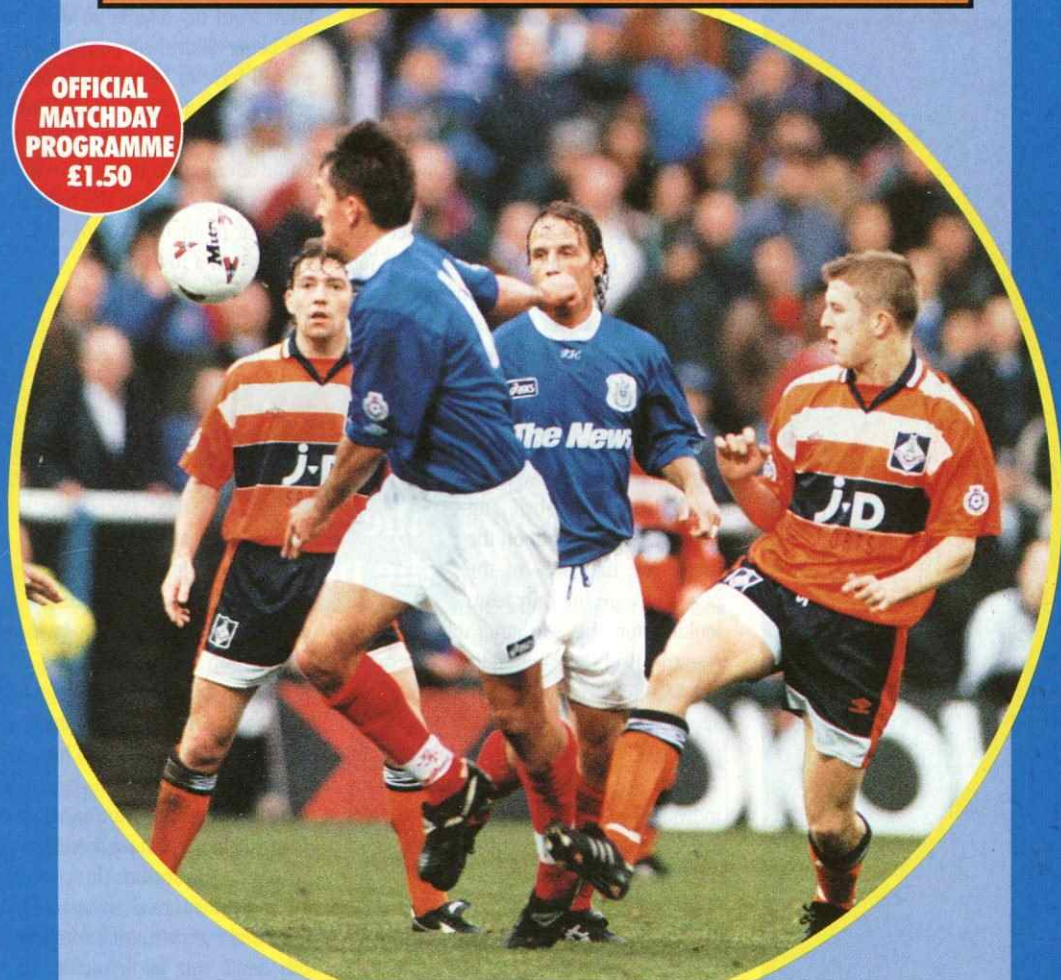

FEN IN FRONT....

The last two fixtures in our Endsleigh League Division campaign against Oldham and Tranmere have shown what a tremendous attitude, professional dedication and application the players here at Fratton Park have.

With all the speculation surrounding a proposed takeover of the club, the club has become the focus of media attention and it would be futile of me to say that these events off of the pitch do not affect the players - they do. Westley, their players and officials. The game is of vital importance to both clubs as we are at the wrong end of the Division table. Although Luton are in bottom spot, I know from my reports on them that they are better than their position reflects and we will have to be on top of our game to achieve a result. Against teams in the same position as yourselves you have to make home advantage count and we will have to go into the game with the right attitude to keep our momentum going and string our third win in a row together.

One lift we all had last week was the F.A.Cup draw which paired us with our near neighbours and South Coast rivals

from the Premier Division - Southampton. I don't need to tell everyone of the excitement and cup fever which has swept the city, but although this tie is very important for all sorts of reasons we have to put this

game out of our minds today and get on with the job in hand.

SCENE ONE....

The talking point in the Endsleigh League Division One this week has been the events surrounding Leicester City and their manager - Mark McGee - or is he their manager.

His actions have been, to say the least unprofessional, especially as it almost a year since he did the same to Reading and loyalty seems to be a word that is rapidly disappearing. The contract that he has at Filbert Street should be honoured - he would have expected it to have been should Leicester have given him the sack. The events have left Leicester in complete limbo land especially as Mark McGee has taken all of his back room staff with him. The rumour or should we say certainty is that he is going to Wolves to replace the now departed Graham Taylor.

The events have certainly had an adverse effect on the players and the 'Foxes' have not won for four games and have fallen to eighth position in the League table.

Millwall who were the leaders have lost their last four matches culminating with their 6-0 thrashing at the hands of new leaders - Sunderland. Craig Russell netted four times in an astonishing result. The 'Lions' have at present lost their roar and Mick McCarthy will have to move swiftly to stop the decline and keep their promotion drive on course.

Derby County have seen a remarkable transformation in their fortunes since a 5-0 drubbing at Tranmere in October and are currently the Divisions in-form team. Jim Smiths team started very slowly, but the blend he now has at the Baseball Ground has aroused the supporters expectations and the 'Rams' have crept up the table almost unnoticed.

Their attacking style of play has seen them scoring lots of goals recently without letting many in at the back. Although they hold

second spot there are another five teams on the same number of points - 34 - Norwich, Birmingham, Stoke, Grimsby and Millwall with another two - Leicester and Charlton on 33. Such is the closeness and competitiveness in the Division.

West Brom have moved to within reach of the relegation zone after their eighth consecutive defeat 1-0 by Stoke - it seems only weeks ago that they were in the top three.

At the bottom the teams there have also been winning with Portsmouth and Port Vale recording back-to-back victories. Portsmouths win at Tranmere 2-1 was the shock result of the day and maybe Terry Fenwick has at last got Pompey moving in the right direction. In the battle of two of the bottom three Luton and Wolves - the managerless Wolves came out on top 3-2, but the game was a lot closer than the score reflected and a look at the league table shows that only 19 points cover all the divisions teams.

Today's fixtures look once again to be very evenly matched, with home wins looking extremely hard to find.

Let's hope we have put all our bad games behind us now and that we can build on our two excellent wins. Every one of us has gone through bad spells already this season, but the team spirit has been brilliant and we want to get a run of results together now.

Our midfield has looked really strong recently and this has helped us out at the back enormously. Against Oldham and Tranmere, Knightsie had relatively quiet games and I felt we controlled both games.

Oldham had a negative approach, looking to hold on and nick a goal. They would have been happy with a point, but other than a bit of panic when they equalised, I felt that we were quite comfortable.

At Tranmere our defensive approach was to "try and keep them in front of us" and we were able to achieve this and hit them quickly on the break with Hallie's pace. In the first-half we were brilliant and even though they came back at us second-half I always felt we could win.

The opening goal was a great strike by John Durnin who, after playing in a number of positions, is really showing his class on the right side of midfield. What a great strike by Paul Hall for the winner, although I still say that he meant it as a cross. Before the game we had all been geeing him up and offering him money to score, so all that paid off.

Jimmy Carter who was moved to centre-midfield, had a great game and it clearly suited him there. He's not one of the best tacklers in the world, but got really stuck in to good effect. Jimmy has by his own admission not shown his best form until the last couple of weeks. To his credit he's got his head down, worked hard and is now proving the knockers wrong. In training he looks easily our best player, different class. You just can't get the ball off him or get near him.

Luton are struggling, but that is when teams are dangerous, particularly away from home where there is no pressure on them. I thought they were unlucky against Wolves on TV last Sunday and inevitably they are suffering from a lack of confidence.

The First Division is proving to be a funny old league and teams are sliding up and down the table on the basis of a handful of results. Millwall have proved that by dropping from the very top to seventh or eighth in just a couple of weeks. We have five or six games over Christmas and New year and with the right results they could give us a significant move up the table.

The takeover talks at the club have not affected us, we don't really think about it too much. We're all under contract, have a big job to do for the club presently and our own problems football-wise to sort out. All our efforts and energies are centred around the training ground and the games coming up.

What a great draw against Saints in the F.A. Cup. We can't wait to get to the Dell and take them on. I'll be talking about our prospects and attitude to this important game on this page a little nearer the time.

On a terrible night for football with a very strong wind and driving rain we welcomed Crystal Palace to Fratton Park for our Avon Insurance Combination League Division One fixture.

We played against the elements in the first half and defended very well, keeping a good back line and looking very solid in every department. In fact we had a couple of good chances during this period with Sammy Igoe, Deon Burton and the hard working Lee Bradbury causing Palace plenty of problems. At half-time the score was 0-0 and I was satisfied with our overall performance. The only thing missing was our inability to turn our superiority into goals.

With the rain easing, we started the second half looking for a positive start, but instead Palace took the lead five minutes after the re-start with a bizzare incident being our undoing. Tony Dobson took a throw-in which slipped out of his hands. The referee gave a foul throw which left all of our players standing there totally amazed at his decision. 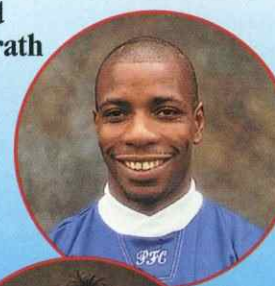

Peter Jeffs talks to KEVIN BRAYBROOK

How did you come to join Pompey?

I played for Basingstoke Schools and after I went for a trial with Leeds United, Dave Hurst made contact with me and I trained with Pompey as a schoolboy. I didn't actually sign schoolboy forms as I was anxious to keep my options open.

I was subsequently offered terms at Brighton and Norwich, but decided to take up an apprenticeship here. Pompey was closer to home and I liked the people here.

I came here at age 17, went into digs, and had two years as an apprentice before signing professional terms at the beginning of this season. There's nothing else that I wanted to do in life. My dad has his own roofing business and I suppose I would have worked for him if I had not been given a chance in football.

Who have been the biggest influences on your career?

My family are very interested in sport and my brother was at Exeter as a schoolboy. My dad comes to a lot of the games and is not slow to criticise me when necessary.

Martin Hinshelwood has been the biggest influence otherwise, firstly as Youth Team Manager and now running the Reserves. Mike Bailey really did believe in me and although he's left the club I still keep in contact.

In my younger days I watched Ray Wilkins and Jan Molby in particular as models for me in my position in centre midfield. Nowadays at Fratton Park, Alan McLoughlin and Mark Stimson are good examples for me on how to use the ball and pass it. Both are good to me, talking to me like a fellow professional.

What would you say are your strengths and weaknesses?

I've worked hard on my passing and on my control and touch. These have improved with

practice and I feel able to support and help other people during a game, as a consequence.

My tackling has to improve and I need to continue to build up my strength. On the latter I do my own running and work with weights, and I do feel I'm physically getting bigger. I'm putting on muscle and I'm a good height now. Other than that I'm not the quickest player in the world and I have to continue to work to get a couple of yards faster.

What do you most enjoy about being in football?

I like the lifestyle and enjoy training, being able to play football every day and get paid for it. I enjoy the day-to-day involvement with the squad and the banter. I do realise how lucky I am, and that thousands would change places with me if they could.

What do you dislike about football?

I don't like the running, particularly at weekends, whether it's short or long-distance work. It's boring, but I realise it's got to be done. You always want to get a ball out and play 5-a-side rather than have to do the hard fitness work.

Do you feel under any pressure to perform all the time?

There is pressure, but you learn to live with it, after all, the rewards are higher than a normal job. I'm not too conscious of the future. Last year I wanted to get a contract which I've achieved, and now I aim to progress to the first team. My target is to get a contract which will keep me here for a long time. Pompey is a club that I want to be at.

I'm pleased with my progress, but don't feel that I have fulfilled my potential by a long way. I feel that I have a lot more in me to come playing-wise. It goes without saying that I aim

to get to the top, but I know I have to be single-minded and dedicated. I want to do it for myself and my family who've always supported me. It all starts here with Pompey and I aim to give it my best shot. I don't want to sit down in ten years time with regrets and say I wish I had worked harder or done better at this or that.

How do you like being away from home?

I'm in digs in North End, Portsmouth with Paul and Karen. They look after me and Paul

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SKIRTING THE ISSUE

It's a well-known fact that there aren't many famous Belgians, King Leopold and Hercule Poirot come to mind, but apart from the illustrious Stella Artois (sorry...), Belgium hasn't produced many world changers. Until the unassuming Jean-Marc Bosman took centre stage, that is, and threw the European transfer system into chaos.

In the next few days, all the signs point to the advice of the European Court of Justice's advocate, Carl Otto Lenz being rubber-stamped by the full court, leaving the world of football facing up to a New Year of extreme change.

When, in the words of a prevaricating UEFA the "opinion rather than judgement", was delivered on Bosmans personal crusade against RFC Liege and the Belgian FA earlier this season, effectively outlawing end-of-contract transfer fees, it threw English Football into panicked turmoil. The dust has not settled and I (like you, I'm sure) am supremely confident that Graham Kelly and the gentlemen at Lancaster Gate have been beaver away increasingly to prevent the demise of the English game.

We can, but hope, as under the Treaty of Rome, the ruling will be law in the very near future unless we leave the EU - extremely unlikely even with the best efforts of Teresa Gorman, there's nothing we can do about it.

It seems to me (well qualified as I am to speak on legal matters, having lovingly watched every episode of LA Law and Kavanagh QC after being nurtured on Crown Court at my mothers knee), that poor old Jean-Marc was unfairly treated and deserves his compensation. Out of contract and out of favour with Liege and with a chance to play for Dunkirk, he had his move blocked with a prohibitive half a million pound price tag and his wages cut by 75% to boot.

Here he'd have been given a free and sent off to the French ferry-port. However, his seem-

ingly justified action has huge ramifications for English Football. Clubs will want long term contracts on players to get their money's worth, as a fee is payable mid-contract. Players will want shorter contracts initially, longer ones when they reach their thirties. Only agents will be happy - Eric Hall is 'monster pleased'.

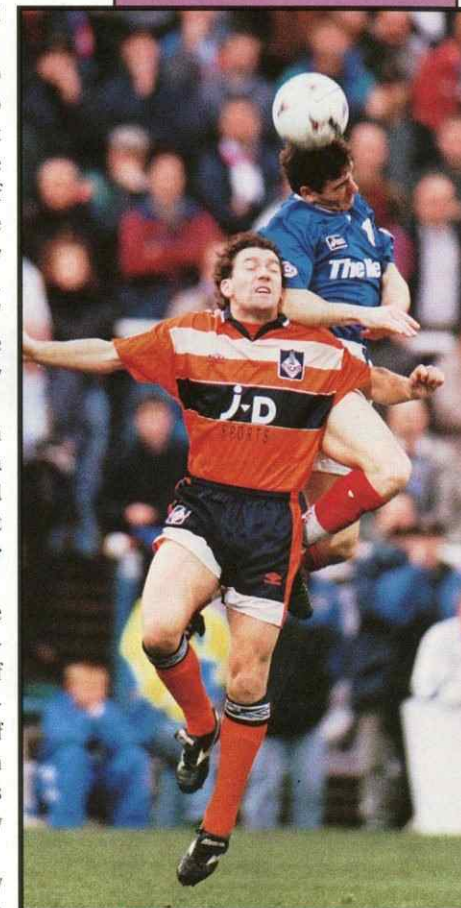
Smaller clubs will not be able to cash in assets by selling players to the Premier League and First Division and may, overnight, lose their most lucrative source of income. If they have to rely on gate receipts and marketing alone, they may not be able to survive at all. Would larger clubs support 'nursery' sides as they do in Spain? Would the fans countenance this? Could they really do anything about it?

Sam Hamman of Wimbledon is in favour of this system and forecasts a future in which smaller clubs would merge. Great if you support Manchester United, not so great for the Hartlepoons of the League.

Youth development could go to the wall. Who's going to bother ploughing money into a youth scheme if someone else will reap all the benefits? Given the dropout rates of apprentices, the need to give sixteen year olds eight year contracts seems at best risky, at worst the surest way to bankruptcy.

Part-time football, welcomed by Terry Venables earlier this year is another somewhat daunting possibility, especially to the League's 4000 FIFPRO - represented platers.

All scary stuff. Time will tell if the fears are justified, but we won't have to wait too long to find out. The judgement is almost upon us.

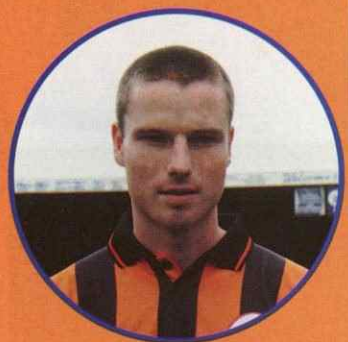

KELVIN DAVIES (Goalkeeper). England Youth and U21 International who has come up through the ranks at Kenilworth Road. Made his debut on the last day of the 1993/94 season and has progressed to become the club's No 1 goalie.

FRED BARBER (Goalkeeper). Vastly experienced keeper who has seen service at Darlington, Everton, Walsall, Chester, Blackpool, Colchester, Chesterfield and Peterborough. Signed from the Posh for a nominal fee of £15,000 in July 1994.

RICHARD HARVEY (Defender). England Youth International who has made a remarkable recovery from a cruciate liga-

ment injury. Out for nearly three years he made his first appearance against Watford in March 1995 and held the left-back spot for the rest of the campaign.

MARVIN JOHNSON (Defender). A very versatile defender who can play anywhere. Played in every first team game of the 1994/95 season and his commanding displays earned him the Players - Player of the Year Trophy.

TREVOR PEAKE (Defender). Veteran defender who is now 38 years old. He started his career at Lincoln before 8 happy seasons with Coventry where he won a FA Cup winners medal. Signed

from the Sky Blues for £100,000 in Aug 1991. For the first time in his career he never missed a match in the 1994/95 season and was voted the Supporters Club - Player of the Year.

MITCHELL THOMAS (Defender). Former England U21 International who is now in his second spell with the Hatters. Moved to Spurs for a large fee and then joined West Ham before rejoining the club on a free transfer in 1994. Can play at either full-back or in central defence.

PAUL McLAREN (Defender). Yet another player to come through from the club's youth policy. An England Youth International he started as a centre-half, but has been used this season as a defensive midfielder after making his debut against Tranmere in Oct 1995.

DARREN PATTERSON (Defender). A Northern Ireland International who began his career with Wigan before joining Crystal Palace in a £250,000 transfer in 1992. Loves to get forward from the right-back position he was signed from the Eagles in Aug 1995 for £150,000, but injury meant that he did not make his debut until Nov 1995.

CERI HUGHES (Midfield). A Welsh International who is much coveted by Premier League clubs. His ability and pace in the centre of midfield and his eye

for goal make him difficult for opponents to mark. Suffered a serious knee injury last season, but is now back to his best.

GARY WADDOCK (Midfield). Now at the veteran stage of his career, Gary has known the ups and downs of football. Had a great career at QPR before a serious injury forced him out of the game. Fought to regain his fitness and co-founded the medical profession by making a comeback in League football with Millwall. Had a second spell at QPR, then Swindon and Bristol Rovers before a free to the Hatters in Dec 1994.

TONY THORPE (Midfield). Another product of the Youth policy, he made his debut against Newcastle in the FA Cup in Jan 1994. A classy passer of the ball he has a great shot, but has yet to find the consistency expected of him at this level.

SCOTT OAKES (Forward). An England U21 International who joined the staff in Oct 1991 from Leicester. Has made great strides since and Premier League clubs have been tracking him after his goalscoring exploits in the Hatters cup runs. Can also play wide in midfield.

DWIGHT MARSHALL (Forward). A lightning quick forward who has an eye for goal. Started his career in non-league with Grays before joining Plymouth from where he was signed for a fee of £150,000. Was the club's leading scorer last season with 13 goals.

JOHN TAYLOR (Forward). Goalscoring centre-forward who began in the non-league. Got his first taste of League football with Colchester before joining Cambridge, then Bristol Rovers and Bradford. Signed from Bradford for £200,000 on transfer deadline day in March 1995. Has struggled with a back injury this season, but returned to first team action against Wolves last weekend.

MANAGER Terry Westley



Terry Westley was appointed manager of Luton Town in July 1995, following the departure of David Pleat to Sheffield Wednesday.

Terry stepped up from his role of youth team coach, a position he held at Kenilworth Road since 1991, to become the club's 20th manager. On Ipswich Town's books as a youth team player, Terry Westley played non-league football at Bury St Edmunds and Diss Town, and was player-manager at the latter. He returned to Ipswich in 1988 to take over their School of Excellence, before David Pleat brought him to Luton in 1991. Since then he has been responsible for the Luton Town youth side, in a period which has seen the likes of John Hartson since sold to Arsenal for £2 million and Kelvin Davis progress into the first team.

Today we welcome Luton Town to Fratton Park for what would seem to be a six pointer, even at this stage of the season. Luton have of course already beaten us once this season picking up the three points in a 3-1 win at Kenilworth Road back in September.

Today should also be a milestone day for Alan Knight, who should this afternoon play in his 700th career game for Pompey; only Jimmy Dickinson has played in more games, he made 829 appearances (war appearances excluded). All things being OK Alan will play his 600th league game on January 1st 1996 against Crystal Palace.

Back to today's game and Pompey will of course be hoping to avenge the earlier defeat at Kenilworth Road, although looking at the records it is far from a good hunting ground for us, with just two wins in all games played there. Pompey's two wins at Kenilworth Road came 70 years apart, with a 2-0 win in 1922/23 and a 4-1 win in 1992/93. That 4-1 win was played on a surface which was bordering on being waterlogged, but it appeared to work against the "Hatters" as a hat-trick from Guy Whittingham ended a 15 game streak with-

out a win at Kenilworth Road. Pompey have even found draws hard to come by with just four along with those two wins.

At Fratton Park Pompey have the upper hand, but only just with nine wins to Luton's four; seven of the games have ended in draws. Pompey have won the last four encounters here with Luton last winning the encounter before that; although it took place way back in the 1975/76 season.

In the FA Cup Luton also have the upper hand, as they are one of the few teams who Pompey have never beaten. The sides have met each other four times with Luton winning three and one game ending in a draw. In 1922/23 a 1-1 draw at Fratton Park was followed up by a 2-1 win for Luton in the replay. The sides next met in 1950/51, but Pompey as defending League Division One Champions were unable to overcome their Second Division opponents in the third round, again at Kenilworth Road. The last time the teams met in the cup was in 1987/88 when Luton won a quarter-final tie on the plastic pitch 3-1, although Pompey did have Mick Quinn sent off.

FROM THE ROVERS RETURN

The long haul to the North-West of England last Saturday brought Pompey their second successive win so far this season and an away performance which had the 500 odd travelling supporters dancing in the seat aisles in Birkenhead.

Not many clubs come away with all three points at Tranmere Rovers and the style in which the points were won was all the more enjoyable. This was by far the most impressive performance on the road this season with a disciplined defence, a mean midfield and hard-grafting attack. The whole team played well and thoroughly deserved the victory; the scoreline quite easily could have been a 4-1 win. Paul Hall's super first-half strike was Pompey's 30th league goal so far this season, which is 9 more than this stage last season after 21 games. Encouraging thoughts.

HATTERS ARE NO PUSH-OVER

Today's visitors are currently propping up the First Division table and the main reason for that is their goalscoring tally of only 17 goals.

As seen on local television last Sunday, Luton do not play like a side fighting for survival; their squad contains some very useful players. Pompey must therefore be on guard against complacency today and avenge the 3-1 defeat sustained in September at Kenilworth Road.

A look at the topsy-turvy Division One table shows there is a great deal of work to be done by Pompey and a confidence-boosting winning run as Christmas approaches would be ideal, given the fixtures ahead. The form book continues to be upturned each week which gives every possible chance of Pompey climbing up the table quite steadily, given the continued run of good results.

POMPEY'S PENALTY-PATTERN

Alan McLoughlin's penalty strike in our last home game made me think of the extraordi-

nary amount of successful penalties Pompey have converted so far this season. Research into the last 25 years shows Pompey are being awarded more penalty-kicks than ever before, bearing in mind we are only approaching the half-way mark*(v Norwich City) this season.

As the table shows below, Macca, Simpson, Griffiths and Creaney's spot-kicks have already equalled the final totals of the Fourth Division 79-80 season, 81-82 and 88-89; and 82-83 and possibly the 90-91 season could yet be overtaken.

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INTO TOUCH....

The 'Singing Section'

Earlier on this season we reported on this page the pressure being put on several clubs by their fans to create special 'singing sections' in an attempt to improve the atmosphere at home games.

Now Arsenal have listened and acted. Early in the New Year there will be tickets available for a 'singing section' to be set aside in the North Bank lower tier. In advance of this the club is building a nucleus of people willing to get the chants and songs going. Fans are being invited to apply for the posts of 'song leaders'.

Already a mass of fans who feel strongly about getting behind the team and want to be in the company of like-minded people are queueing up to apply. We await to see whether this initiative will turn Highbury into a place that throbs with noise and whether it will be a forerunner for similar areas at other football grounds.

Who's to say we don't have our own 'singing section' already in Fratton Park centred around the leader with bell and trumpet, Mr John Westwood.

"Name please....."

There are no statistics yet available, but there's little doubt that referees have been handing out cards like confetti this season. Referees have been described as 'the macho gunslingers of the game, but the fact is that they fear demotion if cards are not handed out on a regular basis.

It's now rare for a game to go without a caution and the feeling is that the FIFA law changes and directives have made it very difficult for referees not to caution players.

One of the reasons is that the word 'Intent' has been removed from the wordings of the laws on fouls and misconduct. As a result referees no longer have discretion in the matter of judging mistimed tackles and defenders

find their first clumsy challenge punished by that fatal card.

In defence of FIFA the policy on tackling became necessary because of the growth of cynical and 'professional' fouls and the perceived lack of protection for forwards. Now forwards can turn and play without worrying about being kicked. Defenders have been denied getting in a good whack and making their presence felt in the opening minutes.

In fairness to the F.A. the 31 point limit to the last Sunday in March has been increased to 33, and the 41 point limit to the end of the season to 45. What still upsets managers and players alike however is the 21 point barrier up to the last Sunday in November which was not increased and is widely considered to be far too low by many in the game.

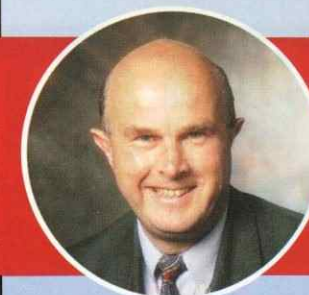
Now there's a desperate need for some common sense to be introduced. Whilst the change in the balance will be welcomed, imposed directives from the bureaucrats of the game must not be allowed to change the game.

At the very least 'nothing' challenges must not count for penalty points, so that fans are left with the spectacle of the best players sitting on the touchline.

"The Talking Bench"

"Four Four Two", that fine football magazine, reported on the results of a survey by a sports psychologist recently. Players were asked 'What most disturbs your concentration during a game?'

One third claimed it was comments from the bench which was the biggest distraction. Not the abuse from the crowd, not the inconsistent referee, not that bell or that bugle in the ground, but the loudmouths on their own bench.

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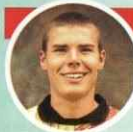
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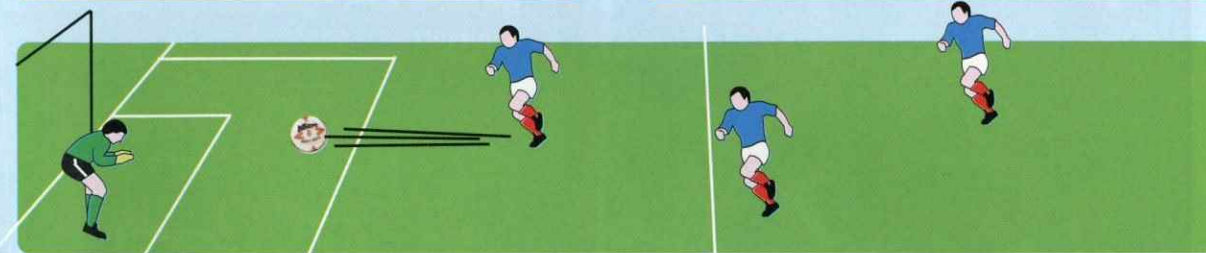
