# Manager thinks he is the right peg in the right hole

Anyone who remembers his days at Charlton will know just how true that is. There, with a high profile chairman, he looked after a club that in many ways mirrors the Town - small crowds, shortage of money, low cash resources but high ambitions, with some

glory days still well remembered. His playing experience was confined to non-league teams Croydon, Carshalton and left, in 1994, he had been squeezed out to Sutton Utd. He moved into management as an enable Boro to recruit Bryan Robson. assistant at Plymouth, where he also became

caretaker manager, and at Lincoln City. He was reserve team coach at Charlton

before being promoted to the manager's chair in 1982. Four years later he took them into the old First Division, now the Premiership, thanks to a play-off win over Leeds.

Against all the odds Lawrence kept Charlton in the top flight for four years, despite the need to sell top players to balance

Middlesbrough, and took them into the Premiership in his first season, in 1992. But they were relegated after only a year, and it was an open secret in football that when he

Lawrence moved on to Bradford in May 1994, leaving last month. He had been out of

His duties rarely brought him to Luton - the last time he saw the Town play before Saturday's home game with Huddersfield was at Bath last January, when Dwight Marshall's goal earned the Town an FA Cup replay victory over Bristol Rovers.

Marshall is one of only two players Lawrence knew personally when he came into his new job - the striker spent some time on Lawrence's spell on Teesside.

The other who has played under Lawrence previously is John Taylor: Lawrence bought him from Bristol Rovers for Bradford for £300,000, then sold him to the Town in work since then, but doing a little scouting for March, just over a year later, for £200,000
