

The support against Stoke was terrific even in defeat, and I hope that today's support can be equally passionate and vociferous.

It would reflect very well on both sets of supporters if all their energies were channelled into supporting their team.

It would be nice to play this vitally important game in an emotional, passionate, highly-charged atmosphere, but one which is lacking in hatred and malice.

Finally, congratulations to Darren Patterson and Bontcho Guentchev on their international selections, and indeed it looks as though Darren will get a starting place for Northern Ireland on Wednesday.

We will lose them both for the trip to Port Vale, but wish them well, and there is some comfort in the knowledge that Vale will also be without Jon McCarthy who has also been called into the Irish squad.









NIGEL GIBBS - Club captain who has served Watford from the youth team through to the senior side. Former England youth and Under-21 international who has suffered with severe knee injuries in recent seasons.

DAVID HOLDSWORTH - Centre-half who has suffered with injury in recent weeks. Twin brother of Wimbledon striker Dean, who also started his career at Vicarage Road.

DOMINIC LUDDEN - Signed for the Hornets in



ROBERT PAGE - Promising central defender who captained the Welsh under-18 side, and is in the current Under-21 squad. Suspended today. (Continued on page 14).




ABOVE: Craig Ramage challenged by Steve Davis during November's I-I draw at Vicarage Road

ROBERT CALDERHEAD - Graduated from the Hornets' trainee ranks and signed professional in

ANDY HESSENTHALER - Team captain who joined Watford from GM/Vauxhall Conference side Redbridge Forest in September 1991. Gained England semi-professional honours while in the non-league game.

non-league game. RICHARD JOHNSON - Australian-born midfielder, who made his Watford debut in 1991. Has a reputation for spectacular long-range strikes on goal

STEVE PALMER - Joined Watford in September 1995 for £135,000 from Ipswich. Midfielder who obtained a degree at Cambridge University prior to signing professional terms with the Suffolk club.

DEREK PAYNE - Joined the Hornets from Southend United during the 1994 close season together with Tommy Mooney, with Keith Dublin making the opposite journey. Previously with Barnet, and has suffered with injury this season.

GEOFF PITCHER - A 1994 summer signing from Millwall, who moved to Vicarage Road with striker Jamie Moralee for a combined £450,000 fee.

GARY PORTER - Former England youth and Under-21 international who has made over 350 appearances for Watford. Sunderland-born, but has been at Watford since he was a schoolboy.

CRAIG RAMAGE - Signed from Derby in February 1994, and has recently moved into a striking role from his usual midfield berth. Scored in Easter Monday's 1-1 draw at Southend.

JOHN WHITE - Midfielder who has suffered with injuries since signing a pro contract in 1993.

DAVID CONNOLLY - Signed professional forms

DAVID CONNOLLY - Signed professional forms in 1994, having lived locally as a youngster and supported the club from the terraces. Was called into the team at one hour's notice last Saturday, and responded with a hat-trick in the 5-2 win over Port Vale.

KERRY DIXON - Signed from Millwall in January for a nominal fee, having gone to the New Den a year ago from Luton Town. Started his league career with Reading, before moving to Chelsea where he won England honours, before moving to Southampton and then back to his home town

NATHAN LOWNDES - Joined the Hornets in October, and has been a regular scorer in the reserve side following his arrival from Leeds.

TOMMY MOONEY - Crowd favourite, who joined
the Hornets from Southend, having previously
been at Scarborough. Served as a trainee with
Aston Villa, signing professional forms under

GARY PENRICE - Now in his second spell with the Hornets, having re-signed for the club in November from QPR for £300,000. Started his career with Bristol Rovbers, before joining Watford in 1989. Joined Aston Villa in 1991 for £1 million, but has suffered with injury since his return to Vicarage Road.

KEVIN PHILLIPS - Striker who joined Watford from non-league Baldock in 1994, having converted from a fullback role as a youth team player with Southampton. Leading scorer this season before injury ruled him out.

DEVON WHITE - Much-travelled striker who has scored four times in his last two games.


Meet the Manager

GRAHAM TAYLOR (pictured below) returned to Vicarage Road at the end of February, following the departure of Glenn Roeder, appointing LUTHER BLISSETT as his first-team coach as the Hornets battled to avoid relegation.

Graham Taylor started the season as manager of Wolves, but left Molineux in November

following a 0-0 home draw against Charlton.

His first spell at Watford started in 1977, after five years in charge at Lincoln, and he masterminded the Hornets' rise from fourth to first division, before

Born in High Wycombe in March 1940, MIKE KEEN joined QPR as a junior and made his first team debut against York in March 1959, before going on to make 393 league appearances for the West London side


A midfielder with good touch and passing abilities he also had an eye for goal, scoring 41 times whilst with Rangers, including a hat-trick against the Town in a 7-1 thrashing at Loftus Road in 1964/65. Not one of our better days!

After skippering Rangers to Wembley for their League Cup win in 1967, as well as successive promotions in both 1967 and 1968, he was discarded early in the following season along with manager Alec Stock.

When Stock took over the hot-seat at Kenilworth Road in late 1968, one of the first things he did was to return to Rangers to buy the deposed Keen for £18,500.

After a patchy start Keen went on to become ever-present for three seasons during one of the brighter periods in the Town's history and, although not always appreciated by the Kenilworth Road faithful, we can now recognise his vision and the fact that he was always a couple of moves ahead of his team-mates.


When Alec Stock resigned in the summer of 1972, Keen also departed and ended up joining Watford where, a year later, he was appointed




player/manager at a time when the Hornets were dropping down through the divisions.

He retired from playing in 1975 and was relieved of his managerial duties two years later after failing to get the Vicarage Road side out of Division Four.

After a short, unsuccessful, spell as manager of Northampton he enjoyed four good years at then non-league Wycombe, before taking over the reigns at Marlow Town. - ROGER WASH.

HATTERS HERO REIGNS IN SPAIN



RADDY Antic has his own special place in Luton Town's history, after scoring that memorable goal five minutes from time at Maine Road on the final day of the season in 1983.

The resulting win sent Manchester City to Division Two, kept Luton in Division One, and prompted David Pleat's famous dance across the pitch to congratulate his players.

Now Raddy is poised for a celebration dance of his own, as the manager of Atletico Madrid, who last week lifted the Spanish Cup with a 1-0 win over Barcelona, and who are currently three points ahead of Johan Cruyff's side in the race for the league title.

Raddy's exploits were this week featured in THE SUN newspaper's 'Where are they now?' feature, reproduced below, bringing us up-to-date with the achievements of the 46-year-old Serbian, who won five international caps for Yugoslavia.

He played club football for Sloboda Tuzla, Partizan Belgrade, Fenerbache, Real Zaragoza and Luton Town, and has managed Partizen Belgrade, Real Zaragoza, Real Madrid, Oviedo and Atletico Madrid.

Raddy Antic was little more than a journeyman midfielder in his days with Luton.

The Serb, signed for a paltry £50,000, is best remembered for the goal that saved the skin of his manager David Pleat - and sent him skipping across the pitch when the Hatters avoided relegation at Manchester City in 1983.

He left English football a year later, never to be heard of again. Or so we thought.

Yet almost 12 years on, Antic stands on the brink of greatness - as the first man in Atletico Madrid's 93-year history to land the Spanish double.

Having beaten Barcelona 1-0 to win the Cup last week

and with a three-point lead over Johan Cruyff's team at the top of the League, as it stands this morning, Raddy Antic is the finest manager in Spain.

Not bad for a bloke who spent most of his career in England getting splinters on the bench. Antic came on as sub almost as many times as he played for Luton after joining from Real Zaragoza.

But he has survived almost a year with president Jesus Gil - the boss who sacked Ron Atkinson after four months and who has employed 22 coaches in less than nine years.

Gil remains an Antic fan, claiming: "He brought real men into the team.

"Last year we had a bunch of right softies. The sort who needed only a snotty nose as an excuse not to play."

Antic added: "Football is a question of perseverance and stamina. Atletico's success depends on teamwork our effort is shared evenly. We beat Barcelona 3-1 in December and that convinced everybody else of our potential. It is a night that will live with me forever."

If Atletico can lift the title, their first since 1977, it will be one in the eye for Antic's former employers at Real Madrid, who sacked him when the club were six points clear after a 15-game unbeaten run.

He went from the Bernabeu to Oviedo before Gil invited him to take over Atletico last July.

Antic admits friends advised him against joining Gil, who recently had a punch-up on TV with a director of a rival club.

But in one season, the team nicknamed the colchoneros - the mattresses to you and me - have sprung a surprise on everyone..... except perhaps their manager.

We'll let you know if Raddy can keep his side at the top of the league..... watch this space!





EXPERIENCED strikers Paul Wilkinson and Kerry Dixon could have been in for a confusing afternoon.

Wilkinson, currently on loan at Kenilworth Road, is more used to lining up in the yellow and red having played 138 league games for the Hornets, including four whilst on loan this season from Middlesbrough.

"We can get 53 points, and Luton can get 56, and that is the way we both have to look at it," said Kerry this week.

"You have to take one game at a time, and obviously our last two results have been a real boost. We felt we had been unlucky before that, with Derby getting a dubious penalty to draw, and Southend equalising three minutes into stoppage time, but I'm a believer that luck eventually evens itself out.

"Saturday's game is tough for both sides, and really a draw is no good to either team, unless all the other sides above us lose, and Reading. Oldham and Portsmouth are still in trouble.

"But Graham Taylor has been a real inspiration to everyone at Watford, has instilled a lot of confidence, and you can be sure that whatever the final positions of the two sides there is real pride at stake in winning the derby. You always want to finish higher than your rivals, but this weekend a win could also be the springboard to staying in a higher division."



New boys sting the Hornets

AFTER the Town had tumbled out of the old Division Two in 1963 most of us thought that a quick return was inevitable, given the blossoming talents of Ron Davies up front and a rearguard that had been pitting its wits against First Division defences only three years before

Unfortunately our optimism was short-sighted as Davies was sold to Norwich after only three games, and the defence soon began to show its age and shipped in goals at an alarming rate. As a replacement for Davies, Town manager Bill Harvey brought in John O'Rourke, a young forward from Chelsea, on a free transfer and although he took a little while to find his feet he exploded on to the scene, scoring four in a 6-2 win at Brentford in early February 1964. This was amazingly our first win on 'foreign' soil after 15 months of trying!

Although fortunes on the field took a marginal turn for the better, back-to-back defeats in early March, at home to Peterborough and away at Hull, slapped us back into the relegation zone as Easter approached. Only one team, Notts County, stood below us in the table and we were due to meet them twice over the holiday period.

In the first game the Town returned from Meadow Lane with a point after a creditable 1-1 draw, and then on Easter Monday we made hard work of winning 2-0 in the return at Kenilworth Road. O'Rourke hit home both goals

to add to the hat-trick he bagged in the 4-2 home win over Bristol Rovers on the previous Saturday, making it a rare, but welcome, Easter surprise.

The victory over Rovers was all the more surprising when it is remembered that the Pirates had won their previous five away games. The winning run continued with a 3-1 home thumping of Wrexham, making their first ever visit to Kenilworth Road, followed by a 2-1 victory at Bristol Rovers, making it four wins in a row. We had to go back to 1958 to see this run equalled.

O'Rourke was now beginning to make a name for himself and his pair at Eastville meant that he had scored 18 times in only 19 games, and when he notched a point-saver in a 1-1 draw at Colchester the threat of relegation was gradually receding.

For once O'Rourke was not on the scoresheet in the next game, away at Oldham, but Mark Lownds notched his second goal of the season to make sure that we returned with another win under our belts.

We had now amassed 12 points out of a possible 14 and most opposition sides were publicly stating that they could not see how we had ever been under threat of relegation.

O'Rourke was obviously regarded as the main reason behind the change in fortune, but full credit must also be given to manager Harvey who introduced goal-making winger Ray

Whittaker to the side during this period.

We now needed two points, with two games to play, to make our continued place in Division Three certain and in our final home game our visitors to Kenilworth Road were Watford, making their first trek to these parts since 1936/37.

Watford were also desperate for the points for a different reason as a win would propel them to Division Two for the first time, provided Coventry failed to win in their home game with Colchester.

Such was the local interest in the game that 19,799, the best crowd for nearly four years, gathered at Kenilworth Road and it was said that the M1 was blocked for a while - the first time it had happened!

The Town had to make a couple of changes to their side with Harry Walden and Tom McKechnie ruled out through injury, with Gordon Turner and Ray Smith taking their places. Watford were at full strength.

In view of the importance of the situation the game opened at a frantic pace and mistakes came thick and fast with both goals coming under a certain amount of pressure, although it was Watford goalkeeper Pat Jennings who was the busier in the opening half.

In the second period the Town opened the brighter and it was therefore against the run of play when Watford took the lead after 54 minutes, when the unchallenged George Harris sidefooted home a Ron Spelman cross.

Watford then made a mistake by sitting back on their lead and funnelling everyone back in defence. Thes would have been sound tactics six months earlier, but the Town now possessed a goalscorer in O'Rourke who was able to come up with the unexpected and turn a game. The deserved equaliser came with 10 minutes left, when O'Rourke was fastest to react to a loose ball in the area to shoot past Jennings and spark off a pitch invasion.

With the crowd at fever pitch the Town continued to push forward and with the Watford defence rocking, O'Rourke fastened on to a Turner shot and turned the ball past Jennings from close range with only three minutes left. The Watford players felt that O'Rourke had handled the ball and complained to the referee while another pitch invasion was in progress.

This was the final action in the game, and as it turned out the Town did not need the win, and a victory would have been no use to Watford.



Palace double in March awards list

Lee Walker, Controller of Broadcasting at the Football League, commented: "The integrity of the League Championship was paramount in the considerations of our Board of Directors.





BACKPASS - HANDLE WITH CARE!

A RECENT match in which a free kick for a deliberate kick to the goalkeeper resulted in a goal has again thrown up this controversial topic.

After FIFA had changed the law so that the goalkeeper could not pick up such a pass without being penalised, there followed a spate of decisions against defenders and goalkeepers which, in some instances, bordered on the preposterous. Gradually, however, as with many of the laws, the enforcement thereof became both clouded and compromised.

Thus in the last two or three seasons there had hardly been any penalising of such a deliberate kick, partly because defenders are more careful; goalkeepers are not prepared to take chances; and finally because referees have become reluctant to come to a positive conclusion where the kick might have accidental connotations.

Why then do I write about this subject? The answer is (and I have to confess that I personally hate the particular law in question) that again it is not being treated as seriously as it ought to be and there are many instances of deliberate kicks being treated as accidental.

That could prove to be a disaster because laxness in implementing the laws has in recent years led to Draconian measures by FIFA.

It is imperative that there must be no chance nor any excuse given to the governing authorities to fortify or supplement this current interpretation by banning ALL passes to the keeper and stopping KEN GOLDMAN of the North Middlesex Referees Society reviews an area of the law that constantly causes controversy..... eg at Bramall Lane last month!

his fielding the ball with his hands when it is knocked to him by a kick, chest, head or with any other part of the anatomy.

I would emphasise that the most simple way of solving the problem is to consider whether the defender's striking of the ball with his foot is a deliberate act. Thus if a player actually traps the ball or slides it to the side and the goalkeeper decides to then pick it up the offence is committed.

It becomes a deliberate act by BOTH the defender and the goalkeeper and must infringe the law. It will also be remebered that the offence is committed by the goalkeeper in handling the ball and not by the defender.

Can I suggest the following rule of thumb, which is as follows: 1) When the defender has his back to both the goal and the goalkeeper it is almost impossible for the kick to be deliberate;

2) When the defender is sideways on, the referee must observe the direction of the defender's boot but this will always be the hardest to interpret, and; 3) When the defender faces the keeper the majority of acts performed by the defender with his feet and the subsequent handling by the goalkeeper will be deliberate and


IN the event of any emergencies at Luton Town Football Club, the emergency services and the club have agreed on an evacuation policy which is designed to:
