


FRIENDS IN HIGH PLACES

MORE COLE MISERY


Bad news for former City striker Andy Cole who will miss the first six weeks of the new season after contracting pneumonia. Manchester United's £7m man would have been hoping to get off to a scoring start this season after notching only eleven league goals during United's triumphant "double" campaign. This has now paved the way for fellow striker Paul Scholes to cement a regular place alongside the mercurial Eric Cantona.

WEDLOCK WINS THE VOTE

It came as no surprise to many City historians when fans were asked to vote on which former player the new Database Computers Stand should be named after. Former England International Billy Wedlock, who won 26 caps for his country, won the vote convincingly and now his name joins that of record goalscorer John Atyeo as a permanent feature of Ashton Gate. Billy made 364 appearances as a half-back for his home town club scoring 17 goals during a distinguished career. Following his retirement, the player managed The Star public house in Ashton Road which was later renamed "Wedlock's", in honour of our most capped player. It's only fitting that Ashton Gate is now also paying tribute to an all time City great.

GORAN FROM STRENGTH TO STRENGTH

The Scandinavian Supporters Club of Bristol City, formed in 1990 by Gorar Pedersen, currently boasts 33 members dedicated to the City cause. The club regularly makes trips to Ashtor

Gate, their next one is planned for Friday 11 October 1996 when City play York City.

Goran is remarkably well informed with events at Ashton Gate and keeps his members up-to-date with a regular fanzine entitled Bristol City — Info. As well as watching City, the club also hope to take-in a major Premiership game the next day. I wonder if Gunnar Heinemann will be in the visiting party who has so far managed to watch City on 34 occasions, including 26 times at Ashton Gate. The main item on their agenda this season is the appointment of a new President, following the departure of Norwegian Vegard Hansen. The only player with Scandi-

navian links at present is Mark Shail who was born in Sweden.

SHARING SUCCESS

The new share issue finally closed on Saturday 17 August 1996 after raising over 400,000 towards the new transfer fund. All of this money has now been handed over to Manager Joe Jordan to improve the squad, of which £175.000 had already been spent preseason in purchasing Rotherham United forward Shaun Goater. As an incentive to buy shares, supporters were offered various discounts depending on the amount invested. Although the final sum rose was short of the original 500,000 target, Chairman Scott Davidson still regards the new issue as a tremendous success. "I would like to thank all those fans who have stood by us and pledged their hard earned cash to the cause."

CAPTAIN KUHL

Martin Kuhl has been handed the captain's arm-band at Ashton Gate this season and will be hoping for better luck than some of his predecessors. Being City captain proved something of a jinx last season as Mark Shail, Alan McLeary and Gary Owers were ruled out by injury. Joe Jordan believes Martin has all the qualities necessary for the job.

"He is a respected, experienced player and midfielder is the ideal position from which to captain the side," said the manager.

Martin was the only ever-present in City's side last season and picked up the Player-of-the-Year trophy, presented annually by the Supporters Club.

HOMEWARD BOUND

Vegard Hansen has left Ashton Gate to resume his career back in his home country of Norway. The popular defender returned to his club Stromsgodsett on loan at the end of last season and was expected to return to City for the current campaign. Manager Joe Jordan decided that the rapid development of Louis Carey and Gary Owers' successful move to right back meant that Vegard's opportunities would be limited.

Vegard was Joe's first signing on returning to manage the club and everyone wishes him well for the future.

BRISTOL BOX BOKOTO

City hope to have signed a star of the future in 21-year-old Mommainais

Bokoto, who has played for several lower league clubs in France.

Bokoto, whose parents are from Africa, has recently had trials with Hearts and Cambridge United. He was offered terms by Premiership Middlesbrough, but has accepted a two-year contract at Ashton Gate.

"I strongly believe joining Bristol City, with Joe Jordan as manager, offers the best chance of boosting my career as a striker"enthused Mommainais.

Jordan describes Bokoto as very much a player for the future, but has high hopes that he will develop during the season. No fee was involved in signing him.

GREAT SCOTT

Scott Partridge had special reason to savour his equalising goal in the Coca Cola Cup tie at Plainmoor last week.

City's striker spent part of last season on loan to Torquay United who were then desperately struggling for results at the foot of the Third Division.

Torquay never won a game during Scott's time there and his abiding memory of time spent on the English Riviera is of being part of a Torquay side drubbed 8-1 by Scunthorpe.

He did actually score a fine goal for Torquay at Plymouth in a 4-3 defeat, but it was nice to show the club's home fans that he can hit the back of the Plainmoor nets too.

Last season was one of travelling for Scott with several loan spells. Now he is hoping to find first team football closer to home, despite the fierce competition for places up front this season.





It's 26 years since Luton Town last played at this level. For more than two decades they had yo-yoed between the top flight and the Division directly below it. Last May the trap-door opened and Luton dropped into unfamiliar territory.

hen Lennie Lawrence came to Kenilworth Road in November 1995, it had all looked so promising. The Hatters immediately embarked on an eight match unbeaten run — including five wins — and thoughts turned to promotion. Then came the slump: in the last 16 games of the season, they only managed two wins — against West Brom and Port Vale; the latter in the penultimate match, when relegation had already been confirmed.

The loss of star midfielder, Scott Oakes, had long been predicted. A string of impressive performances in Luton's 1994 FA Cup run alerted the Premiership big boys and it was only a matter of when — rather than if— he went. In the event, Oakes teamed up with former Hatters boss David Pleat at Hillsborough. A deal that could see Luton net £700,000 — depending on appearances — may ease the financial pressures a little but the Kenilworth Road fans will sorely miss their crowdpleaser.

Three other players have moved on during the summer: Danish midfielder Johnny Vilstrup has joined Aarhus for around £100,000, Norwegian striker Vidar Riseth has signed for the Austrian side Linz and Eire U-21 international David Greene has gone to Colchester.

With only Paul Showler coming in — a £50,000 buy from Bradford City — Lawrence has not exactly set the transfer market alight. He believes,

however, that his squad is, by Second Division standards, a large one and that his players have the skill to make a telling impact on the promotion race.

An encouraging pre-season — where they had good wins against West Ham and Norwich — seems to bear out Lawrence's confidence. However, the opening day home defeat by Burnley will have let the Hatters boss know that there are quality sides in the Division and that a swift return to Nationwide top-flight action will not be easily gained.

One thing is for certain though, Luton will not be trying to 'long ball' their way back to the top. Lawrence's teams have always been noted for their neat, passing style and their crisp, inventive approach — and the side that he puts out tonight will be no exception.

Relegation was largely due to Luton's failure to convert chances. A big factor in the goal-drought was the absence of top-scorer Dwight Marshall through injury. The Jamaican born striker broke his leg at Sunderland in February and missed the rest of the season. Now on the road to recovery, he hopes to return in a few weeks — for the Hatters faithful, it can't come soon enough.

One player who will miss a good part of the season is defender Richard Harvey. He damaged medial knee ligaments in the friendly against West Ham, having already missed the best part of two seasons through an injury to his other knee.

Defensively meaner than you might expect of a relegated side, Luton will need to have more punch up front. Here they'll be relying on the likes of Ghanaian striker, Kim Grant. Signed from Charlton, where he made his debut under Lawrence, the 23 year-old only netted three times in ten appearances last season — Lawrence will be expecting a better return this time round.

Partnering Grant up front is likely to be David Oldfield. Converted from a midfield role last season, the Australian is in his second spell at Kenilworth Road. Last years six goal haul will need to be improved on.

The pair will face competition from John Taylor. The former Bradford striker struggled with a back injury for much of last season but is fit again and keen to prove to the boss that he can still do the job.

Also knocking at the firstteam door is Andrew Fotiadis. The 18 year-old England Schoolboy signed professional terms in the summer, having decided to complete his A levels first. He impressed in preseason and came on as a substitute on the opening day.

As well as having promising youngsters coming through, the Hatters have plenty of experience to rely on. Gary Waddock has been virtually ever-present since joining the club on a free from Bristol Rovers almost two years ago. His consistently classy performances earned the midfielder the Players Player of the Year Trophy last season. In defence, the former Spurs man Mitchell Thomas, has been playing some of the best football of his career. Recalled to the side when Lawrence took over. Thomas hasn't missed a game since.

Club Captain, Steve Davis, picked up a calf strain in preseason and missed the opening fixture — but is almost certain to play tonight. Signed last summer for £750,000 from Burnley, the 28 year-old suffered the agony of relegation with two different clubs in consecutive seasons. A classy and commanding centreback, he'll want to make it third time lucky.

With players such as Bulgarian international, Bontcho Guentchev and exciting winger, Tony Thorpe in the side, Luton have enough class about them to be optimistic about regaining Division One status. They know already, however, that it will be a long hard road before they get there.

Bristol City v Luton Town

PROFESSIONALISM

This evening's opponents Luton Town were visitors to Bristol in the first season of the newly named Bristol City Football Club following the adoption of professionalism. The need to change from the parochial sounding Bristol South End and the choosing of a name more in keeping with their aspirations had been decided by the South End Committee prior to the Club being elected to the Southern League on the 8th May 1897, but getting

the football authorities to agree turned out to be a lengthy and difficult process.

The request was first considered by the Gloucestershire Football Association. at a meeting held in the Full Moon Hotel. Stokes Croft, Bristol, on April 27th when they ruled that:- "it would be detrimental to the interests of the clubs in the city and neighbourhood if any one club was allowed to take the name of Bristol City." This setback however did not curtail the ambitions of the newly professional organisation and they continued to press for the right to adopt the Bristol City name despite protest from the rugby playing brethren at Bristol Football Club. The battle continued throughout most of the summer, lasting over three months, before a favourable decision was made. It was a visit by director Walter Tozer to

the Football Association Headquarters in London that had much to do with resolving the matter, though the Gloucestershire F.A had to check to see whether the older established soccer clubs, such as Eastville Rovers, had any objections.

BEGINNINGS

Approval for the change of name was eventually received on the 7th August 1897 and so it was

that the newly professional club was able to commence it's Southern League career as Bristol City on September 11th, when Wolverton were defeated 7-4 at St John's Lane. The adjacent photograph is of the City team that did duty on this day, a group of players who remained long in the affections of the City fans of such time.

This though wasn't the first match of the newly named organisation, as before the serious business began, three friendly matches were played at St John's Lane. The initial one of these saw Southampton, who had just dropped the St Mary's part of their title, coming to Bristol on September 1st. On this day some 600 fans were reported as being present, braving gale force winds and torrential rain, to witness City's 3-1 victory on a half-flooded pitch. Unfortunately though, this winning start to the career of the Bristol Babe (as the City were soon to become popularly known) was marred by the drowning of a little girl, taken to the game by her parents, in the swollen waters of the brook that ran alongside the ground.


Further victories then followed in the other two friendlies, 3-1 against Swindon Town and then a comprehensive 6-2 drubbing of Chorley (reigning Lancashire League Champions) before league action got under way. It wasn't therefore until the second Southern League fixture on the 18th September that the obstacle of facing the first away game presented itself.

TREMENDOUS SUCCESS

Millwall Athletic, the previous campaign's runners-up and Champions the season before that, were expected to be formidable opponent on their East Ferry Road ground, but City notched up a tremendous 6-2 success to please many in the 6,000 crowd who travelled up from Bristol on the special excursion organised by the Great Western

Railway. This magnificent performance astounded the soccer world and really proclaimed Bristol City's presence as a force to be reckoned with. Throughout the campaign City clearly demonstrated that this great start was no fluke and it was not until New Years Day that they sustained their first Southern League defeat when Southampton were able to notch four goals without eliciting any response from the Bristol Babe. Fortunately though, revenge was not long in coming as at St John's Lane two weeks late,r the Saints were dispatched 5-2 in front of a new record Southern League crowd of 12,170 paying receipts of £380. This brilliant win was not enough to prevent Southampton from ending the season as Champions, but City were good enough to finish as runners-up. In the Professional Section of

the Western League though the Bristol Babe was not to be denied and City's Championship winning side was described by the League Secretary (J.A Stevens) as being "the best team ever seen in the competition". This really must have been some side because in the pages of the local sports papers down through the years - the Sports Times, Sports News, Sports World, Sports Blue,

Pink 'Un Sports Post, Green 'Un - this City team of 1897-98 is foundly recalled by many oldtimers as being the best that they had ever seen representing the club, better even than the great side of the Edwardian era.

THE MYSTERY

City first met with Luton Town mid-way through

the season, on the 20th December, but as the Hatters were members of the Football League their visit to St John's Lane was only for a friendly encounter. City won this clash by the odd goal in five in front of about 1,000 fans, but on visiting the Bedfordshire town for the return some three months later on March 28th Bristol received its comeuppance, losing heavily 5-1 after being four down at the break.

In the FA Cup the City commenced their career by hammering the Clifton Association Club at St John's Lane 9-1 in the last Qualifying Round on the 25th September and followed this with a 5-2 away win over Trowbridge Town before losing 2-0 at Southampton.

The Babe was however more successful in the Gloucestershire Cup, progressing all the way through to the Final on the Rovers

ground at Stapleton Road on April 11th. On this day a new record crowd of 11,186 (paying receipts of £348.6.3) were present to witness City's 2-1 victory against the holders Warmley, to gain some measure of revenge for the 1-0 defeat inflicted on them by the famous white shirts at St John's Lane in the second round of the Bristol Charity Cup on the 21st February.



New club captain Martin Kuhl looks forward to the new season and reflects on meeting the legendary Muhammed Ali.



magine how any boxing fan would feel If Muhammad Ali suddenly walked into the room unannounced.

If you can't imagine it, ask Martin Kuhl, because City's new skipper went through just that experience during his time as a Birmingham City player.

Martin has always been a keen fight fan and used to make a habit of visiting Boys Clubs in the Midlands to hand out trophies at boxing nights.

Let him take up the story. "Muhammad Ali had been visiting this country to open various centres named after him and we had all seen pictures of him being in the Midlands on the local news." said Martin.

"I was getting changed before a match when suddenly this little guy bursts in and says: 'the big man wants to use the toilet', a remark which was about to get him thrown out by our manager Ron Saunders.

"Next thing we know this huge guy strides in who no one would argue with. He turned out to be the minder and was followed by the great man himself.

"We didn't even know he was at the game. I'm not usually an autograph hunter, but I was the first to shake Muhammad's hand and ask him to sign my programme."

That match programme is now proudly being cared for by Martin's dad. But what were his abiding memories of meeting the world's best known sportsman?

"First, I remember he wasn't as big as I expected. This was just before his illness struck, but he seemed to me about 6ft 1ins and in no way a giant like his minder.

"But he had enormous feet. no wonder he was rarely on the canvas!"

Parties at Elton John's house during his brief spell as a Watford player are also among Martin's favourite memories.

"The thing about Elton was that, although he was chairman and a big star, he would love to come and have a quiet beer with the players after a game," he said.

Memories are one thing, but it's the future which now concerns Martin most in his new responsibility as City captain.

It's a role he is used to. "I was made skipper the day I joined Sheffield United at 21 and was also captain at Portsmouth and Derby," he said.

"I think the best way to approach it is to try and lead by example. You can go around shouting your head off – and that is necessary at times – but you need the respect of the other players and that means doing your bit towards good performances."

Martin shared the pre-season optimism at Ashton Gate and admits the opening day defeat at Gillingham, after being ahead so near the end, was hard to take.

"It hit us very hard at the time, but we never really played in the first half and know we can do a lot better," he said.

"The support we received was fantastic and we know that will be the case if we can string a run of results together. "We're stronger than last year when we made a poor start and I'm still very hopeful that we can do well."



Back in 1988, the unwritten agreement of awarding the 1994 World Cup Finals to the United States Soccer Federation (USSF) was that the USA would launch a new national pro outdoor league. Talk of starting the league before the Finals was totally unrealistic — preparations for the tournament were taking up all of everyone's time and attention. The league, to be called Major League Soccer (MLS), was planned for introduction in April 1995 but various problems — not least a disappointing public response to the prospect and the lack of financial backing — resulted in the start date being put back to 1996. Andrew Jefferson takes a look at "Soccer" Stateside.

The MLS comprises of ten teams split into two divisions — The East and West Conference — similar to the system used in American Football. One thing we have learnt from the Atlanta Olympics is that the Americans like winners so you will not be surprised to learn that there are no drawn games in the MLS. Tied matches progress to a shoot-out situation, a system also used with great success by the Japanese J-League. Teams are awarded three points for a win and one point for a shoot-out victory. Two matches are played every Saturday, Sunday and Wednesday.

The East Conference comprises of Columbus Crew, New England Revolution, New York/New Jersey Metrostars, Tampa Bay Mutiny and Washington DC United while the West Conference consists of Colorado Rapids, Dallas Burn, Kansas City Wiz, Los Angeles Galaxy and San Jose Clash.

One of the unusual structure's of the new league was that the MLS would sign and own the contracts of all the players, would appoint the coaches and general managers of all the clubs, and organise all the marketing and sponsorship deals. The main idea behind the scheme was to stop clubs from bankrupting each other by getting involved in bidding wars over players. One of the main reasons why the old NASL went down the tubes in 1984 was because the New York Cosmos

were so much richer than everyone else that they simply bought success — and the other clubs all went belly-up trying to keep pace.

Throughout the second half of 1995, the MLS announced a slow, steady stream of signings. A few foreign stars, including Bolivia's Marco Etcheverry, flamboyant Mexican's Jorge Campos and Hugo Sanchez, Colombian Carlos Valderrama and Italian Roberto Donadoni - but mostly Americans. Some were well known: John Harkes, Tony Meola, Alexi Lalas, Eric Wynalda, Roy Wegerle, Mike Sorber and Tab Ramos. But the bulk of the Americans signed were young and mostly untried. According to MLS Deputy Commissioner Sunil Gulati, most of the players signed were Latin because they exemplify a

commitment to attacking, entertaining soccer. No English players, then? "No, we haven't really looked there. Also, if we applied the same standards to English players coming here as the English apply to our players going there, we'd have a tough time bringing in English players anyway"

The stadiums had presented a huge problem. Alan Rothenberg, President of the USSF, had called them the biggest obstacle to success. What was needed was ten, first-class. mid-size (say 20,000 capacity), soccer stadiums. And there was none to be found. There were stadiums that were the right size, but they usually belonged to high schools or colleges, and were certainly not of major league calibre. The stadiums that were of the required calibre were invariably way too big. The answer was to open up only certain areas, to "downsize" the stadiums as Rothenberg put it, by "attractively draping off" whole tiers or sections.

By the end of last year, the soccer part of the picture was much clearer. The MLS had signed over 200 players. The trick now was to get them distributed to the clubs. This was to be done in the traditional American way of a player draft. From the pool of players, each club makes a choice in turn with a limit of four foreign players per team. Part of the single-entity arrangement was that each club would stick to a salary cap of \$1.3m. That works out at an average of \$72,000 per player.


So, any idea of the MLS as a big-spending league goes right out the window. Most of the players in the draft had been signed at the MLS rock-bottom figure of \$25,000. Which leaves the big question unanswered. How can stars like Donadoni arriving from AC Milan be fitted into a \$1.3m salary cap? Answer: with a little help from our sponsors. Donadoni is rumoured to be

getting around \$1m; but most of it will come from sponsorship deals.

Will soccer finally take off in the land of the free? Only time will tell. Attendances so far have been good which has surprised many pundits who forecast that the Americans World Cup enthusiasm would have worn off by now. The MLS needs to make sure that the voungsters playing soccer at school today are not lost to the big three — American Football, Baseball and Basketball. The constituency of American soccer is made up of a mass of special-interest groups. Interests which frequently conflict. Everyone ought to act in the best interests of soccer. But which soccer? Outdoor? Indoor? Professional? Amateur? Senior? Ethnic? Youth? College? Club? Women's? If the Stateside game doesn't take off this time, then surely it never will.

1919 - Palmer Takes Charge

Former Army sergeant Joe Palmer succeeded Jack Hamilton as Bristol City's manager in August

1919. Previously City's trainer under George Hedley before the Great War, Palmer was a strong disciplinarian and demanded that his players be utterly dedicated and very fit. His first game in charge was the 1-0 win over Bury at Ashton Gate that kicked of City's 1919/20 Second Division campaign. Goalscorer Tommy Howarth was one of six players - together with Laurie Banfield, Billy Wedlock, Jock Nicholson, Bert Neesam and Joe Harris - who had played in the League for City prior to the war. Tragically Tommy Ware and Edwin Burton had been killed in action. Newcomers included local goalkeeper Frank Vallis and ex-Millwall half-back John Wren.

1932 - Hughes moves to Exeter

Following relegation, Bristol City's long-serving right-back Dick Hughes moved to Exeter City in August 1932. The former England Schoolboy captain had arrived at Ashton Gate from Sunderland in September 1920 and made 268 League appearances, featuring prominently in City's 1922/23 and 1926/27 Third Division (South) title successes. He helped his new club to finish as Third Division (South) runners-up in 1932/33. Bristol City travelled to Exeter for their opening match of the 1932/33 campaign and Bob Hewison's new-look team lost 2-0. Four days later, newcomers Bowen and Loftus scored on their home debuts as Torquay United were beaten 2-0 at Ashton Gate and City looked set to mount a strong promotion challenge during the early weeks of the season.

1947 - Townsend's Debut Hat-Trick

Experienced inside-right Len Townsend scored a hat-trick on his Bristol City debut as the following side

began their 1947/48 Third Division (South) campaign with a emphatic 6-0 win at home to Southend United in front of 23,874 on 23rd August 1947: Frank Clack, Ivor Guy, Jack Bailey, Cliff Morgan, Dennis Roberts, Syd Kearney, Dai Hopkins, Len Townsend, Don Clark, Cyril Williams, Sid Williams. The other goalscorers in City's biggestever opening League victory were Don Clark (2) and Cyril Williams. Initially with Haves. Townsend had joined First Division Brentford in May 1937 and was their top scorer in 1946/47. Moving to Ashton Gate with ex-Welsh international Dai Hopkins, he was destined to finish as City's leading marksman in two consecutive seasons.

1964 - High Fives at City

Brian Clark netted a hat-trick as the following Bristol City side recovered from an opening 5-2 defeat at Scunthorpe United to beat Barnsley 5-1 in front of 10,491 at Ashton Gate on 25th August 1964: Mike Gibson, Tony Ford, Mike Thresher, Gordon Parr, Gordon Low, Chuck Drury, Ray Savino, Brian Clark, John Atyeo, Bobby Williams, Lou Peters, Tough-tackling ex-England Youth star Chuck Drury was making his debut after a £7.500 move from West Brom. Four days later, with Terry Bush displacing Drury at left-half, John Atveo scored a hat-trick as Fred Ford's team beat Walsall 5-1 watched by 9,478 at Ashton Gate.



It was the first time since October 1947 that two different players had managed hat-tricks in consecutive League games for City.

1970 - Kellard Sold To Leicester

Bristol City skipper Bobby Kellard was sold to Second Division rivals Leicester City for a record £50,000 in August 1970. Previously with Southend United, Crystal Palace, Ipswich Town and Portsmouth, he had been reunited with Alan Dicks at Ashton Gate for a record £30,000 in July 1968 and scored six goals in 77 Second Division outings. Bristol City's midfield replacement was Scottish youth graduate Gerry Gow who made his home debut in the opening Second Division match of 1970/71 as Sunderland were beaten 4-3 in front of 17,554 at Ashton Gate. Kellard scored against City as Leicester won 4-0 at Filbert Street a month later and was an influential figure in their 1970/71 Second Division championship success.

1979 - Fitzpatrick's Record Signing

Noted for his natural leadership qualities, fiery Scottish U-21 midfielder Tony Fitzpatrick joined Bristol City for a record £225,000 in August 1979. he had skippered St Mirren while still a teenager and starred in the 1976/77 Scottish First Division title success, impressing Alan Dicks in the Anglo-Scottish Cup ties. Moving to Ashton Gate after protracted transfer negotiations, Fitzpatrick said at the time: 'There was no secret that I longed to sample soccer in England - that is where I wanted to make my name and now I have got that opportunity. The size of the fee doesn't worry me unduly. 'Forming a very competitive midfield partnership with Gerry Gow. He made his Bristol City debut at home to Leeds United as Dicks' team kicked off their 1979/80 First Division campaign with a 2-2 draw.

1984 - Walsh's Tribunal Transfer


Terry Cooper signed skilful striker Alan Walsh for newly-promoted Bristol City in August 1984. Walsh had joined Middlesbrough from Horden Colliery in December 1976 and gained top-flight experience before moving to Darlington in October 1978 where he scored a club record 90 League goals. Cooper had been tracking him since he scored twice against City in January 1983 and his bargain £18,000 transfer followed a Football League tribunal hearing at Maine Road. Darlington chairman Ken Warne dismissed Cooper's £10,000 bid as 'derisory' and demanded an £85,000 fee. Walsh recalls: 'I had to tell the five man tribunal my reasons for wanting to leave Darlington, then anxiously outside while representatives of both clubs went in to put their cases.'

1989 - McClaren Swapped For Shelton

Joe Jordan swapped Steve McClaren for Oxford United's tough-tackling ex-England U-21 midfielder Gary Shelton in August 1989. A former Walsall apprentice, Shelton had joined Aston villa for £60,000 in January 1978, then Sheffield Wednesday for £50,000 in March 1982 where he starred in their 1983/84 promotion success and moved to Oxford for £150,000 in July 1987. He added much-needed steel and determination to Jordan's team and was an inspirational figure in City's 1989/90 promotion triumph. Other newcomers included winger Dave Smith from Gillingham for £75,000 fixed by tribunal, midfielder Paul Wimbleton from Cardiff City and David Rennie from Leeds United. All four made their home League debuts as Birmingham City were beaten 1-0 at Ashton Gate.

1992 - Record League Cup Win

Andy Cole's hat-trick and further goals by Wayne Allison and Leroy Rosenior gave the following Bristol City team a 5-1 win over Third Division Cardiff City in the Coca-Cola Cup first round second-leg watched by 9.801 at Ashton gate on 25th August 1992: Keith Welch, Brian Mitchell, Martin Scott, David Thompson, Matt Bryant, Mark Aizlewood, Micky Mellon, Jackie Dziekanowski, Andy Cole, Leroy Rosenior (Wayne Allison), Gary Shelton (Gerry Harrison). Bristol City's record victory in the competition, it followed a 1-0 first-leg defeat at Ninian park a week earlier. City had previously managed 4-0 League Cup wins against Rotherham United in the 1970/71 second round replay and against Peterborough United in the 1979/80 third round replay.



his evening we look towards our next two games, against one side who came up from the Third Division and one that nearly went down from it.

We visit Bury on Saturday and on the third of September receive Torquay United in the Coca-Cola Cup. It was sweet revenge for Bury as they ascended to the Second Division on the final day of the regular season, as in 1995 they were defeated by Chesterfield in the Play-Off Final at Wembley. In fact Jon Gittens has already made the headlines for the wrong reasons due to his display in the shock 2-0 friendly win against West Ham, so he will have to be on his best behaviour.

We should be confident of progressing to the next round, but given that Torquay seem to have a fairy godmother somewhere up there, we must exercise caution. See you in seven days time.

HOW TO GET THERE

By Car: All main routes: Exit M62 at junction 17. At roundabout follow signs to Whitefield A56. Radcliffe A665. After 0.2 miles go straight over double set of lights (s/p Bury A56, Radcliffe A665). After 0.8 miles, just after Bull's Head pub, bear right where road divides (s/p Bury A56). This road becomes the Manchester Road. Straight on lights after 0.9 miles (s/p Town Centre). After 0.6 miles there's a sign for Newbank Garden Centre to the left. Don't follow it! Turn right instead - this is Gigg Lane. Ground is on RHS after 0.1 miles. From North and East (via M66): Exit M66 at junction 2 and follow s/p Bury A58 onto the A58 Rochdale Road. After 0.6 miles turn left at lights (s/p Manchester, Salford B6219). After 0.7 miles turn left at mini-roundabout into Market Street. Straight over mini-roundabout after 0.1 miles, and right at T-junction after 0.2 miles into Gigg Lane. From Metrolink Station (Bury): Trams run from Manchester Victoria and Manchester Piccadilly. By taxi: £1.20 By Bus: Nos 134, 135, 136 and 137 run every ten minutes down Manchester Road past the end of Gigg Lane. By foot: This route takes in a couple of the pubs listed below. Turn left out of station along covered passageway and past various bus-stops. At T-junction with Haymarket Street (ie with bingo hall ahead of you) turn left. Straight across crossroads, down Knowsley Street. This comes out by a clock tower and a white monument. The road opposite leads to The Tap and Spile. For the ground, turn left along the Manchester Road, passing the Staff of Life on LHS. Turn left after about 0.5 miles into Gigg Lane. By Bus: As above.




