Luton boast players of real pedigree

There won't be many sides coming to Edgeley Park this season who can boast a world cup semi-finalist in their side, but Luton Town are likely to lineup this evening with Bontcho Guentchev in their team. Guentchev, of course, is a Bulgarian international who

ioined Luton on a free transfer following his release from Ipswich Town, his wife's employment at the Bulgarian Embassy being enough to cut through sufficient red tape to enable him to gain a work permit. He will most probably line-up wide on the left this evening and his ability to beat his full-back and deliver crosses could prove to be an important feature of tonight's game.

IMPRESSIVE

He will attempt to provide the service for Luton's impressive looking front two Tony Thorpe and Kim Grant. Tony burst onto the scene in early 1984 when he scored on his full debut as Luton dumped high flying Newcastle

out of the F.A. Cup. He joined the club at the start of the 1992/93 season following a spell at Leicester but was restricted to just substitute appearances during the early part of his Kenilworth Road career. However, he was particularly impressive last season and was rewarded in the summer when he signed a new contract. Kim Grant is another full international amongst Luton's ranks, having been selected for their Ghanian national squad during the summer, making appearances against Egypt and Denmark. He signed from Charlton, where he made his debut for current boss Lennie Lawrence, for £250,000 in March 1996 and scored on his debut against Ipswich. His pace and willingness to make unselfish runs are something that County's back



Luton Town's goal this evening will be filled by the the ample frame of 6'7" keeper Ian Feuer, who signed from West Ham for a fee which could rise to as much as £580,000 depending on appearances. Ian never made an appearance for West Ham and was even kept off the bench by Les Sealey due to restrictions on foreign players. Ian is an American but was actually

spotted playing in Belgium, and is another player to have played at Edgeley Park before whilst on loan at Peterborough United, and by the way, Alun Armstrong beat him in a 1-1 draw. Ian is abley assisted by promising young understudy Kelvin Davis.

EXPERIENCED

Luton are likely to play experienced full-backs Julian James and Mitchell Thomas at numbers two and three this evening. James joined Luton as a trainee, and was introduced to First Division football in 1988, but was sent off on his full debut in a Littlewoods Cup tie at Leeds in November of that year. The former England Under-21 international was a regular at left-back

in the 1993/94 season, but made the right-back slot his own the following season and has remained there ever since. Mitchell Thomas is now in his second spell at Luton Town having left in 1986 to join Spurs and later West Ham. The versatile defender has

enjoyed top flight success for a number of years including an appearance in the 1987 F.A. Cup final. His experience has helped to bring out the best in Marvin Johnson, who has also come through the ranks at Luton and made his debut at Wimbledon in 1988. He will play alongside Steve Davis in the number six shirt.

QUICK FEET

Summer signing Paul Showler arrived from Bradford City, where he played under current boss Lennie Lawrence, for £250,000. He had previously played the majority of his football in non-league with Barnet and Altrincham, where he gained a reputation for being a clever, tricky player with plenty of pace. In a similar vein, Dwight Marshall is a player with exceptionally quick feet and the ability to score spectacular goals. These are qualities that inspired Luton to shell out £150,000 to Plymouth for his services. He has, however been plagued by injury in recent months. The Luton squad this evening is

completed by experienced defenders Des Linton and Richard Harvey, former City midfielder Dave Oldfield and bustling centre-forward John Taylor who scored here on his last visit for Bradford City in a 2-1 win.



Since Tom Bennett arrived at Edgeley Park from Wolverhampton Wanderers it has been impossible to ignore his flair and style both on and off the field. Without doubt he is one of the club's most gifted players with a measure of skill that is usually found in the higher divisions but football was not Tom's first choice of career.

The articulate Scotsman is equally happy with a paintbrush and easle - and had he not been so successful in football he could now be featuring in Art Galleries rather than soccer

stadia. Tom explained his love for the canvas, "I had dabbled with a paintbrush since I was at school and having achieved a pass in Art at 'O' level standard I had every intention of pursuing a career in the subject via university but football rather took over."

Whilst at Wolves Tom dug out his paintbrush again and he had good reason to as he revealed, "I did a few pictures for the house. Simply because I couldn't afford to buy them. A few of my mates came round and saw them and asked if I could do some for them - and it has really grown from there".

Attributes

Not one to shout about his own ability Tom didn't make his artistic attributes common knowledge in the County dressing room confiding instead in just two players, namely Chris Beaumont and Neil Edwards. Both showed a great interest so Tom did a portrait of both of them - he revealed, "Chris and Taff gave me a couple of pictures to work from and I produced a portrait of each. Chris was

so impressed he framed his but I reckon Taff might have binned his."

So, does Tom intend to do any more player portraits? "I've just done one of Mutchy and to be honest I'd like to do a portrait of each player and have them framed and mounted but the lads don't really know that I do this sort of thing. They're probably reading this thinking...what's he talking about?"

Unimpressed

The lads are aware of Tom's ability on the field though and the creative midfielder has been

> in fine form of late but Tom remains largely unimpressed by his own performances so far. "I've adjusted better than last season. I set my stall out before the season started to make a real impression and I've been a little bit happier so far."

Tom also admitted to being worried by our early season form, saying, "You're dead right I was worried. I don't want to be at a club that loses every week. What made it worse was the fact that we had finished so strongly last season and had done so well in pre-season. I suspect that this made it look worse than

it actually was, but I knew it would turn. There is just too much quality at the club to let a situation like that continue."

The move from Molineux to Edgeley by the talented sportsman surprised many people in the game but Tom has no regrets. "I knew when I arrived here that this was a club with ambition, so I didn't mind stepping down a division because I know it is only a temporary situation but it does take time to adjust.



Every division is different vou get more time on the ball in the first division and obviously the general standard of play is higher but you get better by playing with better players and I think this squad has enough experience in this division to make the grade."

Target

Tom is also anxious to score more goals this season and he has already hit the target twice against Sheffield United in the Coca Cola Cup. According to Tom it is all down to his partner in midfield Chris Marsden. "Last season I played a 'sitting' role in midfield but this season Mazza likes to play that role so I have been given more freedom to go forward. It's a confidence thing and it is vital that the midfield contribute to the overall goal tally just as Jeff and Warey did last season. We must share the responsibility and I intend to play my part."

So, can County join Tom's former club Wolves in the First Division - Tom certainly thinks so. "I think we will do it! We have a great team spirit and a quality squad but we've got to believe in ourselves even more. We believe that we are going to win, but we also tend to believe that we are going to concede goals. We have to believe that we are the best team in the division - it's the only way. We must also ensure that we play as 'eleven men' - not as individuals - whatever our level of ability! If we can do all that - then nothing can stop us!"

ESTO. NO SHOW

The World Cup is the biggest football competition in the world. As a sporting event the Finals are as big as they come. Suddenly people who normally have no interest in football, and would never think of going to a game. start talking about it. The qualifying rounds of the competition takes the best part of two years to complete and do not command the same attention.

Last week's match between Estonia and Scotland must rank as one of the strangest in the competition's history. FIFA brought forward the kick off time on the day of the match. Only the Scots turned up at the new kick off time. It looks like the Scots will be awarded the match The Estonians turned up at the original time and of course had nobody to play. It's the kind of thing you would expect to find in Sunday football but we are actually talking about the most important sporting competition in the World here.

Until the mid 1980s the standard of European football was relatively level. There were a few sides who were always whipping boys e.g. Luxembourg, Cyprus and Malta. Then there seemed to be an influx of teams like San Marino and the Faroe Islands. With the break up of Eastern Europe, and the formation of a number of new Republics, the qualifying rounds now feature Moldova. Belarus and Armenia. I am glad that I don't follow the Tartan Army abroad as I have no idea where many of these countries are, let alone how to get there. The increase in the number of sides in the European qualifying groups means that all the sides are playing

more games now. There is too much international

football being played now. Instead of groups of four teams, we now commonly have groups with six sides. This means that there will be at least ten weekends that have to be kept free

> because of players being on international duty. I am all in favour of these countries having their own national teams. Why not have pre-qualifying groups for them with the winners getting into the existing groups? The teams who finished bottom of their groups would then have to go through pre-qualifying

> > the next time. It would avoid the meaningless international fixtures

that are cluttering up the footballing calendar. If FIFA are going to allow these new countries into the World Cup then they should ensure that the facilities are up to scratch. There is nothing wrong with not having floodlights, the Irish have only recently got them at Lansdowne Road. If games are going to be played under floodlights then all you need to do is set minimum standards for them: brightness, height, angle and distance from the pitch would seem to be the obvious ones.

Which brings me on to that match between Estonia and Scotland. The Scots were unhappy about the floodlights in the Kadriorg Stadium. The lights were generally considered to be bright enough although some areas of the pitch were dark. The main concern was that some of the lights were at a very low level which would dazzle the players. FIFA made their final decision on the morning of the match. The Estonians took the humph and did not even attempt to turn up at the rearranged kick off time.







It was built by local contractor Josiah Briggs. The foundation stone was laid in October 1904 by the Mayor, Alderman Giles Atherton. In January 1907 the Mayor, Alderman Henry Bell, laid the top stone of the 130-foot-high clock tower It was decided not to have chimes - in case the patients in the Infirmary across the road were disturbed!

He also designed a similar town hall for Belfast.

On 7 July, 1908, the building was dedicated for public use by the Prince and Princess of Wales

The entrance hall is richly decorated with Italian marble; a double staircase of marble leads to the main floor above. Visitors are often asked if they can see the 'devil's head' - a freak arrangement of natural veins in the stone.

Within the town hall are several stained glass windows in remembrance of notable characters from the borough's history

Directly under the clock tower is the Mayoral Suite. A 60-foot corridor leads to the Ballroom, or Large Hall. Three oak panelled rooms with decorative plasterwork ceilings face the Council Chamber. The Chamber seats are arranged in the shape of a horseshoe, facing the Mayoral dais which also has seats for the Deputy Mayor and Chief Executive. Beautiful carvings, in the style of Grinling Gibbons, embellish the oak panels of the Members' benches

The Ballroom, described as 'magnificent' by Poet Laureate Sir John Betieman, can accommodate over 700 seated for concerts or neetings, and function rooms are available for public and private hire. During the First World War the Hall was used as a hospital; in the Second World War it accommodated refugees from the Channel Islands. The hall may be hired for a wide range of public and private events and is the venue for popular mid-week Tea Dances.

A fine collection of silver and plate is kept on display in security cases in the Corridor. Pieces date back to the 15th century



Come On You "Blues"?

It must rate as one of the best feelings in the world when your team has scored. The crowd cheers and everyone leaps up out of their seat shouting and the players jump all over one another! Not the same when you're losing. It's the pits when your team concedes a goal. It feels like an uphill struggle, just to get a draw out of it. For some people, that feeling just doesn't go away at the end of the match. It stays with them all day, all week, maybe all the time. Everyone feels down from time to time. Sometimes there is an obvious reason for this - maybe the end of a relationship, unemployment, or the death of someone close. At other times there doesn't seem to be any reason. Most people find that feelings of unhappiness fade after a while, but some people become so miserable that, to them, life doesn't seem worth living. At that point they are said others. This was the to be suffering from 'depression'. It's more common than you may think! At any one time, about 5% of people in the community suffer from clinical depression. That adds up to 15,000 people in Stockport.

If your mood has been low recently and you have lost interest in things, are more tired than usual and find it difficult to sleep or to concentrate, you may just be in need of a good rest or cheering up. 

Prior to last week's football internationals, Italy were poised to field their very first black footballer, but Foggia defender Dayo Joseph Oshadogan, who has a Nigerian father and an Italian mother, believes that his country is not yet a truly multiracial society. When he was called up for the U-21 team by coach Cesare Maldini, he made front page headlines which also highlighted the precedent set by Miguel Montuori, a mixed race Argentinian who played for Italy A in the mid 1950's

Last month, Denny Mendez, a black, 18 year-old, born in the Dominican Republic was voted Miss Italy, amid complaints from contest officials that she was "unrepresentative of Italian beauty"

Oshadogan was moved to say "Even though Italy wants to be perceived as a modern nation, our people are not vet used to being in a multi-racial country, like the United States, for example. In other sports Carlton Myers (basketball), Fiona May (athletics) and Patrizio Kalambay (boxing) have all represented Italy. But the average Italian, without

him being a racist, is not used to seeing a coloured person in a national team, and especially not the football team." Italy presently appear to be where England were about 25 years ago - back in the dark ages - but they'll pull through and be better for the experience. The long arm of the law in

Richard Harnwell looks at LUTON TOWN'S connections with the world of collectable trade cards

A former England Youth International, MIKE SMALL signed pro forms at Kenilworth Road in October 1979, but had to wait 2 years for his 1st team debut, when coming on as a substitute in his side's 2-1 win at Bolton. Luton went on to win the old Second Division Championship, but Small was restricted to just three substitute appearances. After a brief loan spell with Peterborough United, Small tried his luck abroad, having spells with Goahead Eagles in Holland and PAOK Salonika in Greece. Small returned to England in 1988 with Brighton. In his first full season he finished top scorer on the South Coast which lead to a £400,000 move to West Ham United. Another England Youth International VINCE HILAIRE spent eight years with his first club Crystal Palace, making over 250 league appearances, but was still only 25 when he signed for Luton Town in July 1984. He made his Hatters debut in a 2-4 defeat at Spurs and after just six games left Luton and the top flight for Second Division Portsmouth. This was the start of a love affair with Alan Ball, Vince following Ball to Stoke City and Exeter City. He finished his career on 499 League games scoring 67 times. PAUL FUTCHER was an England U-21 International who began his career with Chester. After just 20 games he moved to Luton Town in June 1974, still only 18. Made his debut in a 0-2 defeat at Chelsea. Never a prolific scorer he scored one of his two career goals for Luton in a 2-0 win over Hereford United in October 1976. After 131

League games moved to the North West for spells with Manchester City and Oldham Athletic. A year at Derby County followed before the longest stay of his career came with his stay at Barnsley. 230 League games later he moved to Halifax Town before ending his career at 37 years of age with Grimsby Town. GARRY PARKER was an England Youth and U-21 International. Made his Football League debut as a 17 year old as The Hatters went down 0-3 at Old Trafford at the end of the 82-83 season. His first goal came in February '84 in a 2-1 win at Wolves. In 1986 the stylish midfielder joined Hull City for £72,000. Brian Clough made it a £250,000 move to Notts Forest, two years later. Over 100 games followed at the City Ground before joining Ron Atkinson at Villa, the fee this time was £650,000. Helped Leicester City return to the top flight last season. PAUL WALSH had the full bag of International honours, Youth, U-21 and full. Joined Luton Town, his second club in July 1982 after a three year spell with Charlton Athletic. In his third game for Luton, scored a hat-trick in a 5-3 win over Notts County. Further hat-tricks against West Ham and Swansea followed and he finished joint top scorer with Brian Stein. His form led to a £700,000 move to Liverpool. Spurs bought Walsh for £500,000 and then moves to Portsmouth and Manchester City followed. A return to Pompey after Maine Road saw a serious injury last season which has still stopped his return this term.



Channel 4's Cutting Edge production of 'Gazza's Coming Home' last Monday cast the madcap geordie in a different light for most viewers and many of his critics. To see Gazza at home in Gateshead with family and friends and at his wedding where the guest list read like a who's who of football's elite, was indeed well presented, if slightly angled at an attempt to set the record straight on behalf of the star.

It was refreshing to see footage of Gascoigne at his very best both on and off the football field rather than portraying him as the perennial bad boy. In fact, the quality of the majority of his goals for Rangers shown was of the highest order, guaranteed to catch the imagination of even his most ardent detractor. And when he joked with a reporter over an alleged court appearance in Italy following an altercation with a Latin cameraman in June 1994, it was great stuff, with the geordie boy at his best. So, to learn that Glenn Hoddle had sat down with him for a heart to heart to tell him that if he looks after his body he can play a major part in England's challenge for the next two World Cup competitions, is a measure of the impact the likeable Gazza, 29, has had on the England coach, who admitted he has only recently got to know him as a person after long being an admirer of his enormous talent.

England and the world of football needs a few more characters like Paul Gascoigne and what he needs most as an individual is for the press to get off his back and to treat him with the respect his precociousness and sublime talent surely deserve.

Francis Lee's desperation was beginning to show. His patience was wearing thin at an increasingly long list of candidates for the vacant manager's post at Manchester City having rejected his overtures. Talk of moving into the hot seat himself did him no favours in terms of credibility although such a move had emerged, seemingly as a distinct possibility for the race horse trainer and toilet roll magnate. After heading a consortium who hounded out former chairman, Peter Swales, who sadly passed away last year, Lee had obviously expected one of his mates from way back when - Alan Ball - to revive City's flagging fortunes and

to put them back where he thought they deserved to be - back in the top ten teams in the Premiership. To choose a man with possibly the worst CV of any manager still in the game, was a puzzle for those observing proceedings outside the Maine Road enclave and it came as no real surprise when Manchester City were added to the list of Ball's failures in being

relegated to the Nationwide first division and Bally retired with his pride dented once again. Last week's appointment of Steve Coppell, once revered in South London as a capable and likeable guvnor at Crystal Palace, is worthy of praise, not only because of the former Manchester United and England star's credentials, but because, I believe, both Lee and Manchester City will have regained a great deal of


credibility despite recent humblings. It is of no consequence to Coppell that he did not make the top three candidates on the Manchester City managerial shortlist, as he was keen to return to football management and arrives at Maine Road with the blessing of his former chairman, the enigmatic Ron Noades, who even allowed him to travel to Manchester to sign his three year contract in a Crystal Palace club car.

Coppell himself was quoted as saving "I think it's only a matter of time before Manchester City are back in the Premiership among the big names. They have wonderful fans and we might just need a little patience." Everyone in football will hope he is correct in his first assertion and trust that the patience required does not wear too thin, too quickly.
