Better

Luton gave everything and were the better side in the 48minute first half, with Graham Alexander and Ceri Hughes bossing midfield.

But they paid the price for not adding a killer second goal after a free kick by Hughes had been comically backheaded into his own net by Dean Blackwell in the

But The Dons fought back after the break, settling for two at the back and beefing up the attack, and they gained the upper hand.

All set

Luton held out for 90 minutes, and the biggest attendance of the season was all set to celebrate famous victory.

But 83 seconds into stoppage time Stewart Castledine equalised after a corner for which all 11 Dons were in the Luton box.

And eight minutes into extra time Peter Fear completed Luton's misery with a thumping drive.

But the Luton team could proud of its disbe play. Wimbledon were forced show why they have been in the top flight for a decade, and are now unbeaten in 13 games.
