Hughes calms Luton

Luton LUTON Town, relegated

with Millwall last season, eventually began to believe they could beat them at the New Den last night and deservedly did so in the final minute with a low drive by Ceri Hughes that carried his team above the home side and Brentford to the top. It was only their third

away win of a season in which—like Wimbledon they lost their first three games. Despite a 6-0 victory over Crewe on Saturday, Lennie Lawrence's side still seemed apprehensive for half an hour, but it soon became apparent that what Millwall's manager Jimmy Nicholl had called "a wee dodgy spell" was about to become a prolonged one. The early promise of

improved attacking potency offered by Mark Bright, on loan from Sheffield Wednesday, soon faded and after the first 30 minutes of a disappointing game, Luton's Ian Feuer was required to do no more than bare essentials. From the time that Paul

Hartley pulled Jason van Blerk's cross high into the stands, the home team did not threaten again. Their goalkeeper, Tim Carter, was not worked any harder for much of the time, but the visitors did at least manage to get themselves into more dangerous places. Tony Thorpe, a prolific

scorer since being employed in attack because of injuries, unwittingly set the tone in only the second minute, shooting wildly as Dwight Marshall slid an inviting pass into his path. Hughes shot over after a scramble in the six-yard box and Steve Davis wasted Mitchell Thomas's precise cross with a weak header. As Luton grew in confi-

dence, Julian James struck the inside of a post and, with the electric scoreboard showing five seconds to play, Hughes finished off a sustained attack with a well placed shot from 20 yards. "It's a good scalp for us to

take," said Lawrence. "We had six or seven chances and missed the lot until the last one. It's an ordinary division."

Nicholl was understandably glum after a third successive home game without a goal and a performance
