A WIN TONIGHT WOULD BRING US ALL SOME CHRISTMAS CHEER

After the encouragement of our performance against Brentford here, I've been very disappointed with our last two away performances in the League. At Wycombe we were shocking and last Saturday at Bournemouth after making a good start with Mark Bright's early goal the game got a wee bit scrappy and we didn't use the ball well. After Paul Hartley had come on following Damian Webber's injury we starved him of the ball and with Mark Bright in the side crying out for service from the wings we just didn't play to our strengths. Whilst we did have one or two good opportunities I'm sure Bournemouth felt that they could have won the game.

Having taken just three points out of a possible twelve we've lost our lead at the top of the table and things have got a lot tighter around us, which makes tonight's game against Luton doubly important. I'm sure everyone will be up for this game just as they were for Brentford and rightly so, but the point that I've been trying to make to the players is that it's no good just responding and working hard in the big games, we've got to keep at it no matter who we're playing. It eats away at me I must admit why we can't seem to find that consistency of approach in every game.

I was quite pleased with the contribution of Mark Bright on Saturday. By his own admission he's still a bit ring rusty, only having played a handful of reserve games this season. But when you look at his goal, it's a long time since we scored one like that, and once he settles in I'm sure we'll get a lot of benefit out of him. He worked very hard, defensively as well as up front

The injury to Damian is a cause for concern and he's looking doubtful for Luton, but with Anton Rogan and Tony Witter training on Monday morning I'm hoping that one of them will come into the side if Damian doesn't make it. Otherwise it's a question of Ricky Newman continuing at the back which he's quite capable of, but we do miss him in midfield whenever he has to do that.

Tonight's game is the start of our busy Christmas/New Year programme and

whilst nothing is decided over the next fortnight we know that we could come out the other side looking healthier still in first or second spot, or else find ourselves down in fifth or sixth having lost the initiative. These two home games against Luton and Peterborough give us the chance to have a good Christmas and put the wee dodgy spell out of our system. Maximum points from these two will certainly put us in good heart for the difficult trips to Bristol Rovers and Crewe over New Year.

At the end of this week we've got Scott Fitzgerald coming back for another couple of months on loan. The plaster comes off his ankle then and we want to have him in the hands of our own medical people from that point with a view to him being fit and ready by the middle of January. Rhino is now looking likely to be ready for a reserve game early in the New Year. He's worked really hard and although he's suffered a couple of set backs he's progressing well again and his presence and that of Fitz will provide further encouragement for us hopefully in the next few weeks.

Finally, let me welcome Lennie Lawrance and his squad to The Den for tonight's game. They had a marvellous result at the weekend and are bound to be on a high, so this promises to be a real Christmas cracker. I'd like to wish all our supporters a very Merry Christmas and I hope that we can add to your pleasure with a couple of good results over the next week.

Tonight's Visitors Luton Town

Whilst The Hatters' fortunes like our own have taken a bit of a downturn of late, theirs is a topsy turvey tale in which spells in the doldrums have been more than balanced by life in the fast lane.

Luton's early history is closely linked to Millwall's. Founded in the same year, 1885, they became the first professional club in the south in 1891, paying their whole team including an allowance for working time lost when travelling to away games. Along with ourselves, Luton became founder members of the Southern League in 1984, and whilst we won the championship in the first two seasons they finished runners up on both occasions. In 1896 they embarked on a brief flirtation with the Football League but soon returned to the Southern League until the formation of Division Three in 1920, Millwall also joining the League at this time.

The Hatters began to make their mark in the late thirties, narrowly missing out on promotion in 1935/36, the season in which Joe Payne scored ten goals in a match, a 12-0 win over Bristol Rovers. Luton won the championship in some style the next year with Payne netting 55 League goals, but again like ourselves the Second World War intervened just when they had built a particularly promising side.

However, in 1955 Luton gained promotion to the First Division and for a brief period joined the game's elite, culminating in reaching the FA Cup Final in 1959 where they lost 2-1 to Nottingham Forest. If the Bedfordshire Club's rise had been steady, their descent was alarming. Within six years Luton had fallen from grace to such an extent that they had slid down to Division Four.

The road to recovery began once more in 1968 with the Fourth Division championship and two years later another promotion followed inspired by the striking form of Malcolm McDonald. By 1974 they had climbed all the way back to the top flight and although their stay was short on this occasion the arrival of David Pleat as manager in 1978/79 led to another colourful period in the club's history. The Division Two championship was duly won in 1981/82 with a record points haul and only four defeats, and whilst The Hatters found life amongst the big boys tough going at first they clung onto their status and even reached an FA Cup Semi-Final before losing somewhat unfortunately to Everton. They were to have their moment of glory at Wembley however, beating Arsenal 3-2 to lift the Littlewoods Cup. They almost repeated the feat a year later but on this occasion Nottingham Forest were once again their Cup Final conquerors. By the time Luton reached Wembley again in 1993, Pleat had left and then returned and The Hatters had lost their place amongst the elite. This visit to the twin towers was for an FA Cup Semi-Final against Chelsea which was lost. That was to prove their last flirtation with success. David Pleat having departed for a second time, to be replaced initially by Terry Westley and subsequently Lennie Lawrence, Luton found themselves relegated, along with Millwall, to the newly constituted Division Two last May, the first time they had been out of the top two Divisions in more than two decades. Such is the pattern of Luton's history, however, that you wouldn't bet on them remaining there for long.

HATTERS ON THE UP

During the first fortnight of the current season, Lennie Lawrence's Luton seemed to be suffering a real relegation hangover. They lost their first three League games and the 5-0 defeat at Bristol City saw them rock bottom and out of sorts. The Hatters boss immediately found the hangover cure, however, and after a run of just three more League defeats in the next eighteen outings Luton had clawed their way into a position amongst the front runners. They have also found time to embark upon their customary Cup exploits, ousting Premiership Derby from the Coca Cola Cup before

falling narrowly to Wimbledon in the next round. In the FA Cup the boot was very nearly on the other foot in the Second Round when non-League Harrow Borough gave The Hatters a real scare at Kenilworth Road before they finally squeezed through with two late goals, but we know all about the pitfalls of ties against such opposition.

Lennie Lawrence has had the benefit of being able to field a relatively settled side of late. In goal 6ft 7in American IAN FEUER has made the number one jersey his own since arriving from West Ham last season for a fee which could ultimately reach £580,000. He was Luton's player of the year last season

and is certainly one of the top keepers in the lower Leagues.

JULIAN JAMES, ever present at right-back this year is now in his tenth season with the club and at 26 has been granted a testimonial this year. A former England Under 21 international, he has now made well over 250 senior appearances for the club.

MITCHELL THOMAS is in his second stint at Kenilworth Road, having had spells at Spurs and West Ham in between. He played for Tottenham in the 1987 Cup Final and now at 32 continues to add his experience on the left-side of the Hatters defence. MARVIN JOHNSON is the third member of the Luton back four with over 200 League appearances for the club to his name. Johnson made his Luton

regular in midfield. He joined Luton on a free transfer from Bristol Rovers in 1994 having appeared for the West Country side in the last ever game at the old Den. Rebuilt his career with Millwall after a serious knee injury had threatened a premature end. Now at 34 years of age Gary is still going strong.

TONY THORPE is currently The Hatters leading scorer with eleven from midfield. He announced his scoring potential with a goal on his debut in a Fourth Round FA Cup tie against Newcastle in January 1994. At 22 Thorpe is beginning to fulfil his potential after signing a new contract in the summer.

Dave was nonetheless capped by England at Under 21 level. Began his career at Kenilworth Road before moving on via Manchester City to Leicester from whom Luton re-signed him for £150,000 in July 1995. Has been out of the picture in recent weeks.

DES LINTON is also a former Leicester City man, having signed along with Scott Oakes back in 1991. Has been dogged by injury for much of his Luton career but has been back in action in the past month.

During the recent absence of Gary Waddock, 19-year-old PAUL McLAREN has given the Hatters midfield an even more youthful

League appearances for the club to his name. Johnson made his Luton debut back in 1988 and has now

debut back in 1988 and has now established himself alongside Steve Davis at the heart of the defence although he can also play at full-back.

STEVE DAVIS joined The Hatters from Burnley in the summer of 1995 after making over 160 appearances for The Clarets. Ironically, he suffered relegation with his former club in 1995 and followed suit with Luton last season.

Lennie Lawrence went back to his former club Bradford City to snap up PAUL SHOWLER for £50,000 in the summer. Now 30, Showler gained his first taste of League football with Barnet and can play either in midfield or up front. Until recently former Lion GARY WADDOCK has been a

Former Scunthorpe midfielder **GRAHAM ALEXANDER** is another youngster who is coming into his own this season. Has only missed one start this term to date and is looking a bargain buy at £100,000.

Another name familiar to Lions fans is that of **DAVID OLDFIELD** who had a lengthy loan spell at The Den towards the end of the season before last. Born in Perth, Australia,

One to Watch – CERI HUGHES



Welsh international midfielder who made his Luton debut at Aston Villa in 1990. Suffered serious knee ligament damage in November 1994 and then last season was again plagued by injury and suspension. Now approaching his best form once again, he will surely reestablish himself in the Welsh squad before too long.

Still only 25, and with well over 150 senior appearances for the club to his name, Ceri will be a key figure in Luton's drive for promotion this season

LENNIE LAWRENCE

One of the most respected managers in the game, Lennie is living proof that you don't have to have played at the highest level to become a top coach. His playing career took in spells with Croydon, Carshalton and Sutton United before he gained coaching experience with Plymouth and Lincoln City. His first managerial appointment came at Charlton in 1982 and

he attained near legendary status at The Valley steering the club through turbulent waters when they nearly went out of business and then guiding them to the old First Division in 1986. He earned a reputation as an expert escapologist, keeing the Addicks up against the odds until 1990. He



left the club a year later for Middlesbrough whom he also guided to promotion to the Premier League in his first season. In 1994 he was appointed manager of Bradford City and became Luton's 21st boss in December 1995 succeeding Terry Westley.

KIM GRANT moved to Kenilworth Road from Charlton for £250,000 in March 1996 as a replacement for Marshall but his three goals in ten appearances weren't enough to help save the club from relegation. Has struggled to establish himself as a regular in the starting line-up this







◆ Gary was born in Kingsbury, London on 17th March 1962.

♦ He started his career with Queens Park Rangers making his League debut in September 1979 as an 18-year-old, and made 203 appearances scoring eight goals for Rangers.

♦ Gary played 18 times for the Republic of Ireland side as a QPR player. He added full, under-21 and 'B' caps to his total as a Millwall player.

♦ He joined The Lions from Royal Charlerol (Belgium) in August 1989, after Irish teammate Tony Cascarino recommended him to John Docherty

♦ Gary played 72 games, scoring two goals for Millwall before leaving The Den for QPR again.

♦ In 1991-92 he went on loan to Swindon Town for six games and eventually signed for Bristol Rovers for the 1992-93 season where he played 70 games, scoring one goal.

♦ He joined Luton Town in 1994-95 where he holds a regular midfield position.

Q: Who did you room with on away trips?
A: Ian Dawes.

Q: How did you get on with the managers at Millwall?

A: John Docherty brought me back to English football from Belgium and I was delighted when he signed me. I thought he had done very well for the club overall. Then came Bruce Rioch whom I thought was an excellent coach who had some good ideas on the game. I also thought Bob Pearson was a lovely fella who was Millwall through and through.

Q: What was the best goal you scored for Millwall?

A: There weren't many. My one goal was against Hull, it was a near post header. I can't believe I was in the penalty area, I don't usually get that far up.

Q: What was your most memorable game?

A: Obviously my first game back in the English League. I came on as a sub against Sheffield Wednesday and it was one of my highlights and getting so close to

promotion with the play-off games. It was a memorable couple of seasons.

Q: Do you remember any funny moments?

A: When I played in the last game at the old Den for Bristol Rovers, the crowd invaded the pitch. We were taken off and waited in the dressing room. When we went back out, the ref said "when you see me near the tunnel get ready to come off when I blow the whistle". The crowd came on to the pitch looking for keepsakes and souvenirs, and when the players got back to the dressing room they had lost their shirts, shorts and socks. It was a hell of an atmosphere.

Q: How did you leave Millwall? A: I was offered a new contract but I couldn't agree to the new terms. I left during pre-season and trained with QPR. Gerry Francis offered me a year's contract. I played in the reserves, then I moved to Bristol Rovers because I wanted first team football.

Q: Do you keep in touch with any of the players?

A: Yes, I speak to Dawsy. I often phone or pop round. I knew Dawsy from QPR. We grew up there from kids and I see Rhino when we play against Millwall.

Q: What are you doing now?

A: As well as playing for Luton Town I'm concentrating on coaching. I've got my full FA badge and the next step is to coach after I finish playing hopefully in two or three years time. And I'd like to wish all The Millwall and Luton fans a Happy Christmas and a Prosperous New Year.

Alan was a product of Millwall's youth policy, and was playing as an amateur for the club in 1963. He then went as a part-time professional with the club before signing full-time in September 1968.

He made his Football League debut against Sheffield United at The Den on March 14th 1969.

Throughout his playing career at Millwall he never grabbed the headlines, but he always gave one hundred percent. A very defensive player who rarely crossed the half-way line, it took him 212 games before he registered his one and only League goal. After some fourteen years at The Den he bowed out of League football and joined Dartford in July 1977.



Bottom: Dave Savage attacks the heart of the Brentford defence




After the disappointment of the Woking Cup defeat three days earlier the response of the players for this top of the table clash was crucial. Clearly stung by the criticism







An old Millwall name featured in the news recently. George Petchey, who was manager here in the late 1970s was appointed temporary manager of Brighton following the sacking of Jimmy Case. This must be the most poisoned of all poisoned chalices. The Seagulls, in the grip of a bitter battle between the board and supporters, are without a ground after this season, were dumped out of the FA Cup by non-League Sudbury Town and are stranded at the foot of the Third Division. They recently lost 2-3 at home to Darlington, the club just one place above them, after twice being ahead and then had two points deducted by the authorities for a pitch invasion in a match in October. This left Brighton 11 points adrift and staring into oblivion. No wonder Petchey, who was coach under Case, did not want the manager's job permanently. He held the fort until former Charlton manager Steve Gritt was appointed last week.







Some of our Second Division colleagues have financially attractive ties and the chance to pull off an upset. Brentford must fancy their chances at home to Manchester City, a club they knocked out of the League Cup a couple of years ago. Watford may start as favourites against First Division Oxford at Vicarage Road whilst Luton can test their promotion credentials against First Division pacesetters Bolton at Kenilworth Road. There are four Second Division teams who take on Premiership sides at home, Crewe (against Wimbledon) Gillingham (against Derby), Notts County (against Aston Villa) and Wrexham (against West Ham), with the visitors in each case feeling they have more to lose

interesting ties. For Swindon's Steve McMahon and Crewe's Dario Gradi there is the prospect of returns to their former clubs, Everton and Wimbledon respectively. Leeds manager George Graham and goalkeeper Nigel where both spent several years as players, whilst Robert Lee is likely to make this first appearance against Charlton since he left the Valiants for Newcastle. Football historians will have noted, moreover, that the ties between Liverpool and Burnley and between Wolves and Portsmouth are reruns of previous Cup Finals (of 1914 and 1939)

We are now at the halfway stage of the season, and supporters and managers probably take the League tables a little more seriously than they did a couple of months ago. Today, Millwall and Brentford are the top two clubs in Division Two, with Rotherham and Wycombe occupying the bottom positions. At the end of September, with just nine games played Division Two was headed by Millwall and Brentford whilst propping up the rest were Rotherham and Wycombe. At the end of October, a third of the way were at the top and bottom of Division Two.

There has been some movement in the table over the last couple of months of course, but no club has put together a run which has propelled them up to the top or left them stranded at the foot. Luton and Bury are perhaps the two sides which have done most in the autumn to improve their promotion prospects. Relegated last May, Lennie Lawrence's team took time to adjust, and after nine games, had only 13 points and were stuck in mid-table. Since then, they have lost just two of 12 matches and climbed to fourth. The Hatters could well have been level with us at the top had they not squandered a lead at Bournemouth, conceding two goals in the last ten minutes. In Tony Thorpe, Luton have one of the Division's top scorers, who is now being supported by a fitagain Dwight Marshall, the scorer of four goals in the last three matches. Two of these came against Boreham Wood in the Cup, which earned The Hatters an attractive home tie in the Third Round against Bolton. Another team to keep an eye on is Bury, who like Luton, have lost only twice in their last 12 League outings and are now in third place. The Shakers most recent defeat came in a seven goal thriller at Bristol Rovers, in which five goals were scored in a seven minute spell around half-time. Bury are spared the distraction of FA Cup commitments, having been eliminated at the first hurdle by Chesterfield.

For Crewe, the season seemed to be going in the other direction. After reaching the play-offs last May, and starting this campaign in promising style, their form dipped in October and November. Long serving manager Dario Gradi recently signed a new ten year contract, which, if he completes it, will mean he will be in charge of the Railwaymen for a quarter of a century. With this news, Crewe seemed to rediscover their early form. After thrashing Shrewsbury 5-1 in the League, they went to Hull in the Cup and won by the same score; the ten goals were shared between seven different players. They now welcome highflying Wimbledon to Gresty Road in Round Three.





The problem has been with my left knee which has been bruised and the medical people are not sure how the bruising has been getting there and why it keeps swelling up every time I play. I had a biopsy operation where they took a bit of the bone out to see if it was growing irregularly, but that showed everything was OK and yet the problem still hasn't quite gone away. Now I've just got to play and hope that it clears up of its own accord. I don't really have a problem whilst I play, but it just aches a bit and swells up afterwards so I put plenty of ice on it and hope its OK for the next training session.

Having started playing regularly again and forced my way into the first team squad for the Hereford game I'm determined to try and show the manager that I'm worth a place on a regular basis. I realise that with other players coming back to fitness, competition for places will be fierce, but it's up to me to prove that I've got something to offer."

It could be the poisoned chalice at the moment, to be named Millwall captain and be a defender to boot. Ricky Newman is the only player who has featured regularly in the back four this season not to have suffered a lengthy absence through injury, but no sooner had he been named as successor to injury victims Keith Stevens and Bobby Bowry

as skipper than he was ruled out of the Wycombe game with an ankle knock.

"It was obviously pleasing to be named as captain initially for the Brentford game and I'm not really worried about any injury hoodoo. Having the armband won't make a great deal of difference to the way I approach things. We're all aware of how important the games over Christmas period are going to be for us and my hope is that we've had our little sticky patch now and that we

can get back on a winning streak. It's a question of reproducing the passion and commitment we showed in the Brentford game. The crowd showed their response that night so we know what we've got to do to get them on our side, and for their part perhaps they just have to be a little bit patient with us if things don't go right straight away."



or Davey Sinclair it was the worst possible start to his Millwall career, injured in his first competitive game and then out of action for the next three months. The good news now, however, is that he's back in action and doubly determined to show Lions fans what they have been missing.

"It's been very frustrating for me. To get injured in the first game was a nightmare and then for the injury to take so long to heal has just made matters worse. It was a bad tackle that did it. The boy came in two footed, his first foot caught me on the knee-but it was his second that did the damage

on my ankle bone.

"After a wee while I thought the problem had cleared up, but when I got back into training I was pinging balls and still feeling discomfort. So the doctor sent me for a few scans and nothing showed up, so the only solution was to try to play through it in the hope that it clears up of its own accord. I still get a bit of pain when I strike the ball in a certain way but it's something I'm learning to live with.

"We have had our fair share of injuries so far, particularly to defenders. In fact I don't think anyone has escaped injury at one time or another. Certainly when everyone is fit competition for places is going to be pretty fierce so I'm staking my claim now in the hope that I can hold onto the shirt until the

end of the season.

"At the start of the season I think the manager was looking to play with three at the back and two wing backs, which is the way we played up at Raith. Unfortunately, we've rarely had three centre-backs fit at the same time to enable him to do that, but I have the feeling that this is the way we're going to go from now on and it is a more attacking approach and one I think the fans will enjoy watching. It certainly benefits the strikers because with five in midfield there is always the opportunity for one or two midfielers to get up in support more

"The Christmas period is going to be vitally important to us. We've had a sticky patch recently, and instead of being six points clear at the top we've been sucked back into the pack. We need to go out in these next three games and reproduce the level of commitment we showed against Brentford, and if we do that I believe we'll go into the New Year in pole position and with every belief that we can stay there until the end of the season. What we don't need is a repeat of what happened immediately after Brentford. It's no good performing magnificently one week and then only half of you effectively turning up for the next game which was the case at Wycombe. We've got to win games like that if we're going to win this League, and all the players know that they let themselves and the fans down that night. But it's no good just talking about it we've got to do good just talking about it, we've got to do our talking out on the park by not allowing that to happen again."
