that we couldn't break them down," said Town boss Lennie Lawrence. "In the first half we lacked quality in the final pass or cross. Then in the last 15 or 20 minutes we lost it a bit, and started to get too frustrated and angry with ourselves.

"Bury set their stall out to stop us playing and I can't blame them. It's a style that will probably take them to the championship.

"But I think we would be the better-equipped team to cope with the First Division."

Bury's point ensured them a top two finish, but if that was genuine championship football, many of us will be pleased to settle for second place, and enjoy a bit of skill and flair with it.
