



From the manager's chair

OUR last two games at Millwall and Southend have seen solid, professional, disciplined and battling performances.

We have gained two hardfought but deserved victories, in ground conditions not experienced for some considerable time.

At Millwall we won in the closing minutes of a game we never looked likely to lose, although it seemed our best chance of winning had passed us by. We surrendered a lot of games last year in the latter stages and it was pleasing to see a victory at the death on this occasion.

At Southend we had to contend with very windy conditions, a heavy pitch, and a fierce storm midway through the first half.

Southend are a passing team, who are better than their league position indicates, and they put us under plenty of pressure in the first half.

Indeed, I felt we were fortunate to come in level at the interval.

But in the second half it was a different story as they ran out of ideas, we had three or four chances on the break, and the win was no more than we deserved.

The result continues our unbeaten away record from the defeat at Bristol City at the end of September, but obviously that sort of record of winning games and containing the opposition needs to be reproduced at home.

If we can do that with



immediate effect then many things are still possible.

We can't finish in the top two, but because of the peculiar nature of this league a play-off place is by no means out of the question.

So many teams are covered by so few points.

We find ourselves in the highly unusual situation of being 10 points behind the third placed club and eight behind the sixth placed.

In a normal year, anything other than sixth place would be totally beyond recall, because the third placed team for example would normally have six or seven more points than at present.

Nevertheless, all that means nothing unless we can maintain our run with three points today against Blackpool, and we welcome the Seasiders, their players, officials and supporters to **Kenilworth Road this**

Blackpool come to us in midtable, with an excellent home record and an indifferent away record - a situation common to most teams in this league except us.

They will obviously be looking to improve their away form today, but if we are to challenge for a play-off position then our home form must be turned round this month.

We have three games at home out of our next four league fixtures - and in total it's four out of five including the re-arranged Auto **Windscreens Shield match** against Brentford.

Fulham will obviously be a difficult game, but nothing less than six points will do from the game today and against Bournemouth at the end of the month.

Blackpool beat us 1-0 at **Bloomfield Road in the 90** degree heat on the opening day of the season, when we were totally ineffective as an attacking force.

Today the weather conditions will be vastly different, and hopefully the performance and the result will be as well.

On the injury front, Paul Showler, Phil Gray and Marvin Johnson are all back in training, but had their comebacks put on hold by the postponement of the reserve game against Tottenham on Wednesday. Hopefully all will instead feature in a rearranged reserve game at Oxford on Tuesday.



Fulham's match against Wycombe was also delayed due to Fulham's FA Cup match at Tottenham being played on Monday night.


in the northern section - Burnley v Notts County, Macclesfield v Preston, and Wigan v Rotherham were all postponed.

In the northern section, Carlisle beat Rochdale 6-1, Grimsby beat Hull 1-0, and Scunthorpe won 2-1 at Hartlepool.

But the most dramatic tie involved this afternoon's opponents Blackpool who beat York City.

The teams were level at 1-1 after extra-time - Phil Clarkson having equalised for Blackpool after 87 minutes - so a penalty shoot-out was


Take M1 north - then either M6 north and M62 east - or continue on M1 and take the M62 west. The M6 route is slightly shorter in miles, but the M1 route tends to be a clearer run. Exit the M62 at junction 20, (s/p Rochdale, Oldham A627M). After 0.5 miles, where road divides, keep right (s/p Manchester East A663, OLdham, Ashton A627). After 1.4 miles exit A627M (s/p Oldham, Ashton A627). At roundabout take 2nd exit (s/p Oldham, Ashton A627) into Chadderton Way. The floodlights are visible from here. After 0.7 miles take first turning on LHS (s/p Boundary Park) into Boundary Park Road. Follow road round into Furtherwood Boad Ground is on LHS.

WREXHAM

Take M1 and M6 north, exiting M6 at M54 for Telford. Continue on M54, until it becomes the A5 continuing on round Shrewsbury and heading for Oswestry. WHEN Neville Southall played for Southend against Luton last week, he was further cementing his place in the top ten oldest players in league football.

The Welsh international is currently on loan at Roots Hall from Everton, and was one of four goalkeepers in a list published recently by The Daily Telegraph.

Ironically, just ahead of Southall was Millwall goalkeeper Nigel Spink who played against the Hatters the previous week.

But top of the list is Luton's own Trevor Peake after his one substitute appearance earlier this season.

Also still going strong is former Town favourite Steve White, now with Cardiff City.



Tangerines dream of promotion place

NIGEL Worthington's side look well placed for a play-off challenge, and prior to the Christmas programme enjoyed a mid-table position built around an impressive home record at Bloomfield Road.

A Jason Lydiate goal gave them a 1-0 win over the Hatters on the opening day of the season, and since then they have lost just once at home in the league - 4-2 to Wycombe and also overcame Manchester City and Coventry in the opening rounds of the Coca-Cola Cup. Manchester City were eventually beaten on penalties, and the Tangerines only lost to Coventry 3-2 on aggregate after giving the Premiership outfit a real fright. Blackpool have been in

Division Two since gaining

promotion via the play-offs in

1991, when they beat Scunthorpe - including our own Graham Alexander - on penalties at Wembley.

After two seasons finishing just above the relegation zone, 1994/95 ended in mid-table after at one time being on the verge of the play-off places.

Season 1995/96 ended in disaster after being in an automatic promotion spot until two games from the end. In the play-offs they won 2-0 at Bradford but then lost the second leg 3-0 at home - with manager Sam Allardyce subsequently losing his job.

Gary Megson almost guided them to the play-offs last term after a slow start, but then Megson resigned in the summer to become manager at Stockport, and was replaced by the experienced Worthington.

SPOTLIGHT ON TODAY'S VISITORS

STEVE BANKS - Goalkeeper now in his third season with the club after signing from Gillingham. The only player to start every game last season, he was awarded the Player of the Year title.

MARK BONNER - Midfielder who has been with the club since a junior.

GARY BRABIN - Cost £200,000 from Bury in the summer of 1996. Competitive midfielder who started at Stockport, and has also played for Gateshead, Runcorn and Doncaster.

MARVIN BRYAN - Attacking right-back now in his third season with the club after joining from QPR for £20,000.

TONY BUTLER - Central defender who cost £240,000 from Gillingham in the summer of 1996. Made 47 appearances, forming a good defensive partnership with David Linighan.

PAUL CARDEN- First year professional who was top scorer for the juniors last season. Made his full debut in the AWS at Rotherham last season.

PHIL CLARKSON - Signed from Scunthorpe for £80,000 in February 1997, and soon made an impact from midfield with five goals in his 17 appearances, including both in a 2-1 win over local rivals Preston. Also played at Fleetwood and Crewe.


JAMIE CROSS - First year professional who has impressed in the reserves at left-back.

JASON LYDIATE - Defender who joined from Bolton Wanderers in march 1995 for £75,000 after previously being a trainee at Manchester United. Scored the winner in Blackpool's opening day victory over the Hatters.

CHRIS MALKIN - Club record signing from Millwall in October 1996 for £275,000, but was hit by various injuries throughout the remainder of the season. Started his career at Tranmere before going to Millwall for £400,000 in July 1995.

BRETT ORMEROD - Striker signed from Accrington Stanley in March 1997 after previously being a YTS at Blackburn.

LEE PHILPOTT - Left-sided midfielder who came from Leicester in March 1996 for £100.000. Suffered with injury last season after being among the goals early on. Formerly with Cambridge.

ANDY PREECE - Tall striker who joined the club from Crystal Palace in the summer of 1995 and scored 15 goals in his first season. Played the majority of last season as partner to Tony Ellis, and has also previously played at Northampton, Wrexham and Stockport.

JAMES QUINN - Highly-rated young striker who is now an established Northern Ireland international. At the start of the season had scored 43 goals for Blackpool in 136 starting appearances.

KEITH RUSSELL - Left-sided midfielder signed from non-league Hednesford on transfer deadline day last season, having played against Blackpool in the FA Cup.

contract after only one year as a YTS player.



The Hatters and The Seasiders

GAMES against today's visitors in the Football League go back to the end of the last century when we enjoyed three seasons in Division Two before slipping back into the Southern League after finding the cost of travel too great.

For the first two of our Football League seasons we came up against Blackpool with the first meeting taking place at Dunstable Road on 29th November 1897.

We were three goals up at the interval James Coupar but playing with the wind in the second period Blackpool managed to pull a goal back.

We went down I-0 at Bloomfield Road later on that season but in the following campaign we won both games 3-2 with Bill Ford (2) and James Kemplay hitting the important goals at Dunstable Road after we were I-0 down at the interval.

At the end of that campaign Blackpool failed to win re-election and we therefore had to wait until 1955/56. following our promotion to the old Division One, before paths crossed again

At that time the Seasiders were one of the biggest crowd draws in the country due, in no small part, to the 'Wizard of the Dribble' Stanley Matthews.

A Kenilworth Road crowd of 24493 turned up to see our first league clash for 56 years but were disappointed to hear that Matthews was absent from the Blackpool side.

We were going through a 'purple patch' at the time, especially at home, and after the early shock of a disallowed goal from the Seasider's Bill Perry two strikes from Gordon Turner mid way through the first half set us up for an eventual 3-1 victory.

We gained a notable double two seasons later when Turner scored both while Allan Brown (against his old club) and Mike Cullen were on target in the return which was won 2-0.

In the following season, after we had knocked Blackpool out of the F.A.Cup in a sixth round replay, the fixture list decreed that the two sides should meet at Kenilworth Road on the Saturday

In a pale imitation of our cup clashes



over Blackpool at Kenilworth Road last season, when Kim Grant's first-half goal gave Luton the three points.

the two sides put on a distinctly end of season performance only enlivened by an own goal from Brendan McNally in the 70th minute and a strike from Turner, who was first to a rebound, ten minutes later.

Following our relegation in 1960 we had to wait eleven years before renewing acquaintances, this time in the old Division Two.

In November 1971 we travelled to Bloomfield Road on the special train (£1.25 return wherever we went) along with the team, but due to a derailment at Warrington we did not pull into Blackpool until 2.50.

A police escort was waiting for the team but we did not arrive until after kick off and through the snowstorm managed to spot Don Givens score the only goal of the game. To top it all the train suffered a heating problem on the return journey and

believe me it was cold!

That game signalled our last win at Bloomfield Road but in the intervening time we have seen some sparkling home performances starting with a televised 2-2 home draw in 1972/73 when Seasiders' goalkeeper, a young John Burridge, pulled off a string of brilliant saves.

In the following season we trounced Blackpool 3-0 in an early game with a display that gave rise to thoughts of promotion which was eventually

Another 3-0 win followed on the final game of 1975/76 but in the next campaign we were held 0-0 in a match that saw only the second appearance of 17 year old Tony Knight in goal.


It was back to winning ways in 1977/78 when we scored three times in the last 14 minutes to secure a 4-0 victory and push Blackpool nearer the drop which they suffered at the end of that season.

We met up again last season when a single goal from Kim Grant earned all three points at Kenilworth Road with both sides fighting out a 0-0 draw at Bloomfield Road. We have, however, a score to settle following our 1-0 defeat at sunny Blackpool on the opening day of the current campaign.

As a post script I recall taking my, then fairly new, wife to Blackpool in October 1975 for the weekend to see the lights.

As we strolled along the front near Bloomfield Road at 2pm on the Saturday afternoon we spotted an advertising board that announced that Blackpool were playing the Town that day. "What a strange coincidence," said my wife in all

As punishment for my conniving we went down 3-2 after twice taking the lead and in case you ask, yes, she is still my wife although unfortunately nowhere near as gullible nowadays.

This afternoon we remember a former Town player, highlighted briefly in our last programme - ANDY RENNIE

TUCKED away in the programme for the recent Northampton game was a piece welcoming the son of Joe Rennie, a player who enjoyed modest success for the Town in the 1930's, to the match.

A mention was also made of Joe's illustrious brother Andy who was the scourge of Third Division defences for a ten year period before the War and who, on one occasion, was the top scorer over a season in the Football League.

Andy Rennie was born in Baillieston, Glasgow in 1901 and played his early football for Paisley Waverley and Kilwinning Rangers where he came to the attention of Luton trainer Billy Barr who recommended him for trials at Kenilworth Road in December 1925.

Originally a goalkeeper, Andy had made the switch, with some success, to centre half and it was in that

position that he made his debut for the Town against Millwall Reserves at Kenilworth Road just before Christmas 1925.

He was such a success that his retention was never in doubt and he signed professional forms long before his four week trial was up.

After a good grounding with the reserves a full League debut came his way, at centre half, in a 4-1 win against Swindon at Kenilworth Road in February 1926 and he retained his place until the end of he

He made 35 appearances, all at centre half, in the following campaign scoring his first goal in the process and then early in 1927/28 when we were struggling to find a suitable centre forward, following the departure of Jimmy Thompson to Chelsea, Andy was asked to have a go in that position and the rest, as they say, is history.

Andy scored in his first game as centre forward and went on to become the club's top marksman that

season with 24. Just to show he was just warming up, he notched 43 goals in 1928/29, almost half the Town's total that season, including five against luckless Gillingham who were thrashed 8-0 at Kenilworth Road. This feat meant that he proudly led the list of leading goalscorers in the country that season alongside Halliday of Sunderland and McConnell of Carlisle.

The following season was started in the same vein and included a hat trick at Watford as we trounced the Hornets 4-0 (we can do it as well!). But in a 2-2 draw at Torquay at the end of October, Andy was badly injured as the result of a bad foul and he was on the injured list for almost four months - but still managed to end up as the Town's top scorer for that campaign.

It was generally reckoned that Andy never truly recovered from that injury

with the result that he was eventually moved over to inside left where his passing abilities came to the fore and he set up a good number of chances for the new owners of the number nine shirt including Tom Tait and, in later years, Jack Ball.

Despite all this Andy was still top scorer in 1930/31 and again in 1933/34 to show that he still had his shooting boots on.

His left foot drives were legendary and, according to my late grandfather, he used to "swing his leg from the hip" before connecting with the ball.

Because of his goalscoring prowess he suffered unfairly at the hands of a good many defenders and although he showed a quick temper, earning him the nickname 'Ratty' Rennie, he was only sent off once during his career.

On that particular occasion he said afterwards, "He (the defender) dared me to pull his nose, so I did". Obviously 'pull' and 'thump' had the same meaning pre War!

Following a 1-0 defeat at Reading in December 1934 Andy lost his place to Fred Roberts and at the end of that campaign he was granted a free transfer. He had played in a total of 385 games for the Town, in all competitions, scoring 184 goals which would have made him a multi- million pound player today.

Trials followed at both Walsall and Newport which came to nothing and he decided to hang up his boots and take a job at J.W.Green's brewery in Luton.

Three years later Andy was admitted to the Bute (St Mary's) Hospital in Luton for a routine hernia

operation. The operation was a success but complications set in and Andy died from pneumonia on 5th September 1938 at the young age of 37 leaving a widow and two small children.

Tributes for Andy poured in following his death and 'Crusader' of the 'Luton News' gave a couple of instances of his generosity which included handing over a week's wages to a wizened old lady who was scouring the gutters in Merthyr and paying the train fare from Exeter to London for some other unfortunate.

5 YEARS AGO


9/1/93: After a run of three games without defeat we went down 2-1 at St Andrews, Birmingham. Ceri Hughes scored the sole Luton goal in front of a crowd of 9,601.

9/1/88: It was FA Cup day, and in a third round tie we had to travel to deepest Hartlepool where we had never won before. Goals from Micky Weir and Darron McDonough, however, enabled us to scrape through 2-1 in front of a partisan crowd of 6,187.

Trust publish survey on disabled facilities

THE Football Trust, in conjunction with McDonald's Restaurants Ltd. has published the results of a national survey of facilities for supporters with disabilities at FA Premier League, Football League and Scottish Premier Division grounds.

The research scheme was launched in February of last year with the aim of highlighting those clubs who have provided the highest standards of facilities for their disabled supporters.

The aims were to look at how facilities have improved since the last survey of this nature was carried out in 1992 and what improvements are still required.

The report assesses the nature and extent of facilities for supporters with

disabilities and highlights examples of good practice at professional clubs.

In conjunction with the survey the Football Trust launched their "National Guide to Disabled Football Supporters Facilities", a pocket size club-by-club guide to facilities.

The research and the guide provides an invaluable and enlightening source of information on the facilities currently on offer at grounds throughout the country.

League's early warning procedure

WITH the winter weather yet to cause any major disruption, the Football League have once again set out their early warning procedure for the inspection of pitches.

In an effort to prevent unnecessary inconvenience to the travelling clubs and their supporters. League clubs are instructed to liaise closely to ascertain the travelling arrangements of the visitors.

Home clubs are also asked to contact the

match referee for his travel details and any plans to stay overnight in order that he can be reached at short notice.

Clubs can also request referees to travel the day before the match if an early pitch inspection is necessary. In the event that the match referee is unable to travel early to the ground the Football League would call in a local official to advise them on the condition of the playing surface.


LTFC EVACUATION **PROCEDURE**
