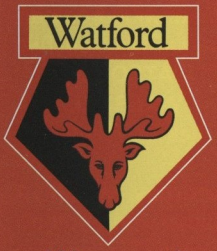

Manager's Notes

Graham Taylor



NOT for the first time this season I am repeating programme notes I wrote some years ago.
In fact these were written in the programme for our game against Luton Town on Tuesday March 19, 1985 – almost 13 years ago – under the heading:

Standards of behaviour

*"Tonight's game is the fourth time Watford and Luton have played one another in the last 15 days, and as everyone knows Luton have reached the semi-finals of the FA Cup.
I see no harm in local rivalry provided it is kept in perspective, and I think it is fair to say that our clubs have worked very hard to emphasise to both sets of supporters that nothing is to be gained by loutish behaviour and that we want no part of it.*

*Last season we reached Wembley at Luton's expense and it ill-behoves us now if we cannot congratulate our neighbours on their success.
There have been recent incidents involving crowd behaviour that makes me despair for our game and yet all we can do at our respective clubs is to stand our corner and fight for standards of decency we believe in.*

For me, this is even more important than the actual winning of games – and tonight's match represents a great opportunity for both Watford and Luton supporters to show that while you can support your own team, you do not have to resort to an animal level of inflicting physical damage on either person or property.

Our last three games against each other have shown a great level of common commitment – tackles being taken and given without any real malice, no cautions and very little if any trouble on the terraces.

Perhaps the quality of the football has not impressed some of the national press – and David Pleat made reference to this in his notes in the second cup replay – but I think there are so many factors involved in local derbies – in three successive cup games – that some of that criticism was very unfair and short-sighted.

In the long term, I believe that if both our clubs can keep emphasising their demands for good

*standards of behaviour, they are doing football far more of a service than by simply allowing the result and performances on the field to be the measure of their success or not.
I hope everybody enjoys themselves tonight and to the Luton supporters – have a good day at Villa Park!"*

Both Lennie Lawrence and myself have gone on record earlier this week (see page 5) stating the importance of this game for supporters, players and officials of both clubs. But the need for there to be no violence either at the ground or the town is of far more importance than the result.

No game of football is worth physical confrontation and/or wilful destruction of property.

The great majority of people at the game today are good, law-abiding people, who of course want their team to 'stuff' the other one, but do not want any associated violence that unfortunately a small minority seek.

Let the majority be the winners today.

What's happening

Let's enjoy the day - peacefully

ON MONDAY FEBRUARY 9, Graham Taylor and Lennie Lawrence met at Vicarage Road to host a joint press conference. The aim of the conference was two-fold:

1. To emphasise the history of fixtures between the two clubs
2. To talk about, and issue a joint statement regarding the behaviour of both clubs' supporters at today's game.

Here's the full text of that statement:

'What we expect from supporters at today's game'

IN keeping with the cut and thrust of local derbies, let's get straight to the point:

Each of us knows how important today's game is to both clubs - and both sets of supporters. So we want to make absolutely clear the standard of behaviour we would like from our respective fans.

We also wish to make it clear that the Boards, management and players of both clubs want no association with people who say they 'support' either team, and then act in a manner which has nothing to do with the true meaning of the word 'support'.

We know that the majority of Watford and Luton supporters are well-behaved and will echo these sentiments.

Passions run high in local derbies - that is to be expected and we even encourage that; it gets the adrenaline flowing and that enhances performances on the field. Players will be 'up for it' and the competition will be fierce. Matches between local rivals should be like that. That's the main attraction.

But off the field, the word 'rivalry' has both a positive and negative side.

So let's get the **negative** stuff out in the open now. This afternoon, neither of us want to experience:

- foul and abusive chanting directed at opposition players or supporters.

- any threats of, or actual confrontations between supporters - inside or outside the stadium, or anywhere in the locality.

None of these, or any related types of behaviour, do anyone any good and simply blacken the name of both clubs.

On the **positive** side, what we do want to see and hear this afternoon is:

- as many people as possible wearing their team colours.
- vociferous and constant vocal backing for the team you follow.
- generally, an electric atmosphere at the ground before and during the game.

Both of us hope our team 'stuffs' the other, but whatever the outcome, there are only three points at stake and these should be competed for on the football field only.

Hornets v Hatters - the essential historical data

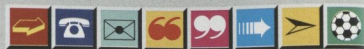
The local rivalry dates back to Victorian times, the first meeting having taken place as long ago as 1885.

Although Watford is Luton Town's nearest Football League neighbour, there are actually seven League clubs closer than Luton is to Vicarage Road.

Nevertheless the Luton game is always regarded very much as 'the' local derby.

Watford's home record in derbies during the 50 seasons we have shared equal League status is: Won 23, drawn 11, lost 15. Watford's away record is: Won 9, drawn 11, lost 30.

The home and away double has been achieved five times by Watford and 11 times by Luton Town.

Recent League encounters:

FORMED in 1885, Luton Town became the first professional club in the south five years later.

Elected to Division Two of the Football League in 1897, their reign was short-lived as they failed with their re-election in 1900.

The next 20 years were spent in the Southern League, until this became known as Division Three. In 1921 this League changed to Division Three South, where Luton remained until 1937 when, thanks to a club record 55 goals from striker Joe Payne, they won the championship.

In 1955, Luton's rise to the top flight was complete when they achieved promotion to Division One on goal difference after

finishing level on points with Birmingham and Rotherham.

In 1959, Luton reached the FA Cup final, only to lose 2-1 to Nottingham Forest. Six years later, the Hatters were playing in Division Four.

More recently, Luton made the trip to Wembley for two successive League Cup finals, in 1988 and 1989. First they beat Arsenal 3-2 to lift the trophy, but were beaten again, 3-1, by Nottingham Forest, the following year.

Relegated to Division Two in 1996, Luton nearly bounced back at the first attempt last season. However, they failed in the semi-finals of the play-offs when eventual winners Crewe Alexandra beat them 4-3 on aggregate.

LUTON boss Lennie Lawrence is hoping for a change of luck today – as he makes his fourth attempt to beat Watford.

The former Middlesbrough and Charlton boss went as close to winning as he could have possibly hoped last season, before finishing up with a draw.

Luton were 1-0 ahead at Vicarage Road and Tony Thorpe hit the woodwork before Darren Bazeley scored a rare goal in stoppage time to level the match.

Lawrence says: "Last season we came close and I hope we can get a taste of that again."

What Lawrence does not want a taste of again is the 4-0 defeat he suffered against Watford in October.

He explains: "In that match we were without three-quarters of our first-team players and escaped with 4-0. We will be better equipped this time around to give Watford a game and we will do ourselves justice."

"In that match we had youngsters and loan players in the team but when you're playing Watford you need your best players available."

And Lawrence can be sure his team will be fired up for this match, given both the nature of the game and Luton's perilous position near the relegation zone.

"This game is self-motivating for the players. We also need to climb the table as quickly as possible because we can't feel safe yet from relegation. The teams below us have closed the gap on us a touch recently."

However, despite the clubs being at opposite ends of the table, Lawrence can look forward to this game because it is away from Kenilworth Road that the club have

produced some of their best performances of late.

"Our away form is significantly better than at home and over the last few months it's been probably as good as Watford's. We've hardly lost away in the last three months."

The Hatters have certainly covered some ground recently. This will be Luton's third consecutive away game, after matches at Wrexham last weekend and at Bournemouth in the Auto Windscreens Shield in midweek.

But come what may this afternoon, Lawrence is convinced Watford will be promoted this season.

"Graham Taylor's done an excellent job at Watford. It's impossible to envisage them not getting promoted with the amount of points they've got now and still with so many games to go."

In charge

Luton fans may have been expecting another serious push for promotion this season, but manager Lennie Lawrence instead faces a battle to keep the Hatters from dropping. One thing is for certain, though, Luton will be keen to avoid the 4-0 mauling Watford handed them at Kenilworth last October.

GOALKEEPER Ian Feuer was Luton's only ever-present player last term, a record that the American cannot repeat this year after a shoulder injury ruled him out for 11 weeks before Christmas. The 26-year-old cost the Hatters £580,000 from West Ham United in December 1995.

Waiting in the wings is 21-year-old Kelvin Davis, a product of the Luton youth system who made his League debut in the 2-2 draw at Stoke on the final day of the 1993/94 season. He is also an England under-21 international.

Former England youth international defender Richard Harvey is on a month-to-month

contract at Kenilworth Road after being given a free transfer at the end of last season. He has made more than 150 League appearances for Luton in a career plagued by injury.

Long-serving defender Julian James was granted a testimonial in 1996, after making more than 300 appearances for Luton since graduating from the youth scheme in July 1988.

Strong tackler Marvin Johnson is another on-club man after coming through the Luton youth scheme in November 1986, to make more than 250 League appearances. The 29-year-old defender missed only two League games last season.

Former England 'B' international Mitchell Thomas returned to his hometown club in November 1993, after spells at Tottenham Hotspur, who he represented in the 1987 FA Cup final, and West Ham.

A product of the West Bromwich Albion youth scheme, Darren Patterson cost Luton £100,000 from Crystal Palace in August 1995. The 28-year-old Northern Ireland international's

appearances have been limited by the form of James, Davis and Johnson.

In midfield for the Hatters are Graham Alexander, Paul Showler and Paul McLaren. The first signing of former Luton manager Terry Westley in July 1995, when he cost £100,000 from Scunthorpe, Alexander is renowned for his tough tackling.

A groin injury has meant Showler has had to watch Luton from the sidelines this season, making only one appearance from the bench. The 31-year-old played for Barnet and Bradford City before joining Luton for £50,000 from the latter in August 1996.

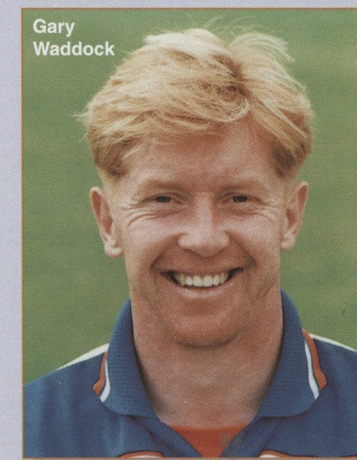
Having joined Luton from school, Paul McLaren made his debut on the final day of the 1993/94 season. The 21-year-old former England youth international is expected to make a big impact at the club this season.

A product of the celebrated Manchester United youth scheme, 23-year-old midfielder Simon Davies scored a goal for the Old Trafford club in a

European Cup match against Galatasaray in 1994. He cost Luton £200,000 last August.

The veteran in the Luton attack is 29-year-old David Oldfield, now in his second spell at Kenilworth Road after spells at Manchester City and Leicester City. Born in Australia, he won one England under-21 cap.

Former England schoolboy international Andrew Fotiadis contributed three goals to Luton's cause last season in what was his first as a professional.

THE last time the old rivals met there was something of a historic reversal of fortune which Watford fans will long remember and Luton Town supporters would probably wish to forget.

At Kenilworth Road, Watford faced an injury-depleted Luton and before 30 minutes had expired on the game clock, the Hornets had put four goals past a despairing Kelvin Davis.

Peter Kennedy picked up a brace and Richard Johnson and David Thomas helped themselves to a goal apiece to complete the Hatters' misery.

It was the first time in 10 years that Watford had secured a League victory over Luton and 9,041 people were packed into the Kenilworth Road stadium to see it.

Key defender

Former Southampton trainee Steve Davis made more than 200 appearances for Burnley and captained the side during their rise to Division One, before switching to Luton for £750,000 in July 1995.

The 29-year-old, who also had a loan spell at Notts County, won a Division Four championship medal with Burnley in 1992.

A regular in the centre of defence last season, Steve has now appeared over 100 times for the Hatters.

Key midfielder

Club captain Gary Waddock came through the ranks at Queens Park Rangers to make more than 200 League appearances for the Londoners, before embarking on a tour to Charleroi, Millwall, Swindon and Bristol Rovers.

The 35-year-old, who joined Luton on a free transfer from Rovers in December 1994, missed only one game, through suspension, during the 1994/95 season. He holds 21 full caps for the Republic of Ireland.

Key forward

Tony Thorpe became the first Luton player to top 30 goals in a season since Malcolm McDonald in the 1970/71 season, when he hit 31 last season to head the Second Division scorecharts.

Tony made an immediate impact for the Hatters, when he scored on his full debut at Newcastle United.

The 23-year-old came to Luton in August 1992 from Leicester City juniors and looks set to score more than 20 goals for the second successive season.

Tony Thorpe

TONY THORPE has proved himself to be the most prolific goalscorer in Division Two but one thing still needles him – he's never scored against Watford!

Despite scoring 50 goals over the last season-and-a-half, Luton's lethal hitman has drawn a personal blank in his three local derbies.

Added to that, he has yet to finish up on the winning side against the Hornets, drawing twice and ending up a loser after our 4-0 win at Kenilworth Road earlier this season.

Thorpe says: "I'm quite disappointed that I haven't scored in a local derby yet – but I'm hopeful that it will come sooner rather than later. I think I'm in great form at the moment and I'm looking forward to taking it into the Watford game."

And on the Watford-Luton battles, Thorpe comments: "The 1-1 draw at Vicarage Road last season was probably the best local derby I've played in. We were winning five minutes into injury time and Watford grabbed an equaliser. It was unfortunate that we didn't take all three points but it was a good game to play in. I didn't score but I think I hit the crossbar and the post.

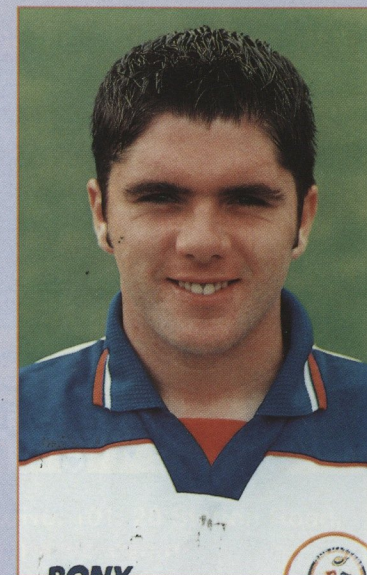
"The one that I'd like to forget is obviously the 4-0 thrashing at our place. We had an awful lot of injuries but Watford did play well and they punished us."

Thorpe believes that the Hornets are a definite banker for promotion but doesn't necessarily rule out a late Luton surge for the play-offs.

He says: "A lot depends on the next five games as to whether we've got a chance of reaching the play-offs or not. If we can go through them unbeaten, then we could be on our way.

"If we get ourselves into touching distance, then we'll go for it, but our main priority is to stay up and be safe. Anything over that is a bonus."

He adds: "I don't think anybody can catch Watford and Bristol City – they're home and dry. I'd say they were the two best teams we've played. Both teams are very organised and very strong."



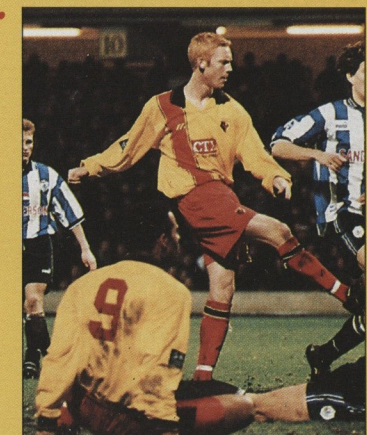

Player profile



Tommy Mooney



THE conversion of Tommy Mooney has been one of the talking points of the season so far, and the fact he has starred in many of the key moments in the last few months is proof he can add flexibility to his many other qualities.

Now in his fifth season at Vicarage Road Tommy is the darling of the Vicarage Road end, winning the hearts of the Hornets' thousands with his never-say-die attitude.

So what about the transformation from goal scorer to goal stopper?

"The first I heard of the idea was when I was talking to Graham Taylor about my new contract the summer before last, and it came out of the blue. I thought no more about it until the second half of Les Simmons' testimonial last May when we changed formation, and I thoroughly enjoyed it."

He has still found time to loiter in opponents' penalty areas, though, scoring crucial goals at home against Oldham and Plymouth, and at Brentford.

"I'm not going to forget how to score goals," he says. "They have meant a lot to me," (although a teammate did unkindly described his splendidly struck late winner against the Latics as a 'shank!').

Tommy's retreat has also added more experience to a defence regarded as amongst the toughest

in the League to break down, and his partnership with Keith Millen has particularly impressed.

"We're very different. Keith is great in the air but I much prefer to get the ball at ground level."

It says much for Tommy's contribution to Watford in recent seasons that it's almost forgotten he originally joined us on loan from Southend, before making the move permanent when he and Derek Payne moved from Roots Hall and Keith Dublin went the other way. Glenn Roeder remarked at the time that making him a Watford player was a big public relations hit as well as a footballing one, and anyone who has taken youngsters to a coaching clinic or similar function attended by Tom is bound to have a photograph and memories of a good day.

The season so far really speaks for itself, but Tommy sounds a note of caution about the final weeks.

"It's that much harder in the second half of the season. We surprised many teams in the early weeks but playing them for the second time they will be ready for us. We have got to be prepared for that."

Having played in our 4-0 win at Kenilworth Road last October, Tommy says of today's game: "Until I came here I didn't know how much this fixture meant." There is little doubt he does now.

The arrival of the twins just before Christmas has meant 'peace and quiet' are words not associated with Tommy Mooney these days.

But he still has time for his family and his football.

Talk to Tommy and you will be aware that he shares the optimism throughout the club that this team can go all the way to promotion. Every Watford supporter knows there will be no-one more determined to achieve that dream than Tommy.

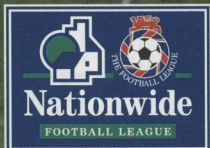

FA Trophy

BOREHAM WOOD's excellent form in both league and cups has continued with them reaching the third round of the FA Umbro Trophy.

It was Danielle's first half-marathon since the World Championships, but she was still able to finish 20th overall in a time of 1hr 19mins, a minute clear of her nearest rival.

There was a total field of nearly 1,000 for the race, which attracted coverage by Sky TV.

Watford Ladies

WATFORD LADIES have made a key signing as they bid to reach the top of the womens game.

Former Arsenal and England goalkeeper Leslie Higgs has joined the club. She played for her country in the last World Cup.

Meanwhile, the club's Under-13 team gained a notable result when they beat Northampton Town 6-2, ending their three-year unbeaten record.

Watford Royals

WATFORD ROYALS pulled off one of the biggest Budweiser League shocks of all time when they beat defending champions London Towers 79-78 at Wembley.

There were wild scenes of delight among the Royals contingent after the most unlikely of victories, only their second in the league this season.

At one stage in the first half they trailed Towers by 14 points but incredibly Royals drew level in the third quarter and were leading 62-60 going into the final 10 minutes.

In the last couple of minutes Royals stretched their lead to 79-75, but saw Towers' Danny Lewis score a three-pointer to make it 79-78.

Royals then blocked Lewis' next shot and, with only 34 seconds left in the game, tried to run the clock down.

Ernesto Moreno scored a two-pointer as the 30-second shot-clock

ran out but the referee decided he had released the ball after the buzzer and ruled it out.

There were furious scenes as Royals players were incensed by the decision but they gathered themselves during a time-out.

Towers were left with 4.6 seconds to score but in an attempt to hurl the ball the length of the court it ran loose and Royals scrambled it away as the time ran out.

Royals players and their fans danced together on the Wembley court, celebrating a famous victory, their first over Towers since February 1991.

"Without doubt this is the greatest result since Christine Thompson and I joined the Royals in 1993," said a delighted Vince Macaulay-Razaq.

"We have come through so much adversity this season yet I have always believed the players were capable of a result such as this."

Royals included new signing John Wassenbergh in their team. He top-scored in Division One of the British League last season and had been playing in America earlier this season.

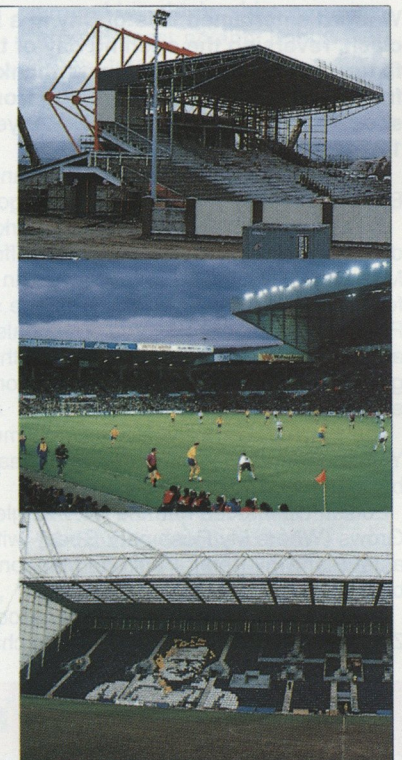

This Day in History

February 14

GET READY TO TRAVEL BACK IN A HORNETS' TIME WARP - IN THE COMPANY OF PAUL LEVENE.

1948

Fifty years ago today Watford suffered when Crystal Palace visited Vicarage Road and left no room for sentiment as they triumphed 5-0. This Division Three (South) fixture was watched by 14,667 spectators with the South London club's goalscorers being Fred Kurz, Marcel Gaillard, Jack Lewis and James Clough (2).
Ronnie Rooke scored twice for Arsenal in their 3-0 home win against Burnley in Division One. Aston Villa won 1-0 in the same division away at Huddersfield Town and Middlesbrough had a comprehensive 4-1 victory against Bolton Wanderers at Ayresome Park.
The day before in London the ATS became the Women's Royal Army Corps and the WAAF was renamed the 'Women's Royal Air Force'.

1970

Watford entertained Bristol City in a Division Two clash, reversing the opening day of the season's fixture and ran out 2-0 winners thanks to goals from Terry Garbett and Ray Lugg from the penalty spot. The Vicarage Road crowd 28 years ago was 12,744.
The Hatters were in Division Three and lost 2-1 at Barrow. Graham French was Luton's goalscorer.
In Division One all five games, remarkably, ended in draws! Crystal Palace went to Old Trafford and held Manchester United to a 1-1 draw. Brian Kidd scored for the Reds and John Sewell from the spot for Palace. Leeds United scored both goals in a 1-1 draw at White Hart Lane. Terry Cooper put through his own goal for Spurs, while Peter Lorimer scored at the right end.
Joe Frazier was preparing to fight Jimmy Ellis in New York on February 16th for the world heavyweight boxing title.
Edison Lighthouse had the No.1 single with 'Love Grows (Where My Rosemary Goes)' with 'Leavin' On a Jet Plane' by Peter, Paul and Mary one place behind.
'Motown Chartbusters Vol.3' had knocked Led Zeppelin 2 from the top of the album chart.

75 years at the Vicarage Road Stadium

1981

Watford tamed the Shrews at Vicarage Road with a 1-0 victory coming via a first-half goal from Ian Bolton. The win against the Gay Meadow outfit was the Hornets' first in Division Two since December 20th.
The Hatters did not play on this date in 1981.
It was FA Cup fifth round day and eventual finalists Spurs and Manchester City went through without needing a replay. Tommy Booth scored City's winner at Peterborough United and Spurs beat Coventry City 3-1 at White Hart Lane. Ossie Ardiles, Steve Archibald and Chris Hughton netted for the North London side.
The evening of February 14th brought tragedy to Dublin when 49 people, mainly teenagers, were killed and over 130 more injured when fire swept through the Stardust Club during a St.Valentine's Day disco.
John Lennon's 'Double Fantasy' was the week's best-selling album and 'Woman' topped the singles chart in the wake of his untimely death the previous December.

1989

Queens Park Rangers were the visitors to Hertfordshire for a Simod Cup quarter-final match. A crowd of 8,103 saw Dean Coney give Rangers a first-half lead, but Gary Porter's penalty levelled matters and set up extra-time during which there was no addition to the scoreline. The game went to a penalty competition and QPR 'keeper David Seaman helped his team to triumph 2-1.
Luton Town had an evening off after losing 4-1 at Crystal Palace in the previous round.
Ron Atkinson returned from a brief spell in Spain to take over for the first time at Sheffield Wednesday and in a friendly at Highbury Arsenal beat the French national team 2-0.
It was an unhappy day for author Salman Rushdie when in Iran the Ayatollah Khomeini issued a 'fatwa' calling for his death for blasphemy after the publication of his book 'The Satanic Verses'. Rushdie immediately went into hiding.
Marc Almond teaming up with 60's star Gene Pitney was in his fourth and final week at No.1 in the singles chart with 'Something's Gotten Hold of my Heart'. The Fine Young Cannibals 'The Raw And The Cooked' replaced New Order's 'Technique' at the top of the album chart.

S is for...
SCOTS

THERE isn't a single Scot on the club's current playing staff. Indeed, apart from Gerard Lavin, who was born and raised in England but won Scottish under-19 and under-21 caps on the strength of his father's nationality, we haven't had one since Joe McLaughlin left six years ago. So how many of the nearly-900 players who have represented Watford in senior competitive football were from over the border? Thirty? Fifty, perhaps? The answer, believe it or not, is no fewer than 117 - almost one in seven.
There have been periods when the Scottish influence within the club has been very substantial. Among the leading stalwarts of our

first decade of professionalism, for instance, were Jack McNee, Johnny Hill, Jimmy Chalmers, Dave McCartney, Jimmy Ternant, Peter Turner, Sandy Main and George Fyfe. And they were by no means the only Scots during that period – not by a very long way.
Our first manager, John Goodall, was renowned as an England international, having been born in London. But this was only an accident of birth, his father being stationed there whilst serving with the Scottish Fusiliers. The family soon returned to Scotland, where Goodall was brought up and began his football career. His successors as managers included Neil McBain, Bill Findlay and Johnny Paton – Scotsman all, with no 'foreign' birthplace, as in Goodall's case, to confuse the issue.
It was McBain who, in the 1950s, assembled the last big Scottish representation here, with a

succession of players from in and around his old Ayrshire stamping ground, most notably Bobby Bell, whose total of first-team appearances exceeded 300. Of all his compatriots, only Stewart Scullion played for the club more often.
We had no Scottish goalkeeper until 1926, and haven't had one since 1969, but between those dates had the services beneath the crossbar of Dave Russell, Jim McLaren, Jock McHugh, Tommy King, Johnny Curran, Jimmy Linton and Bert Slater.
Only one player – Maurice Johnston – won full international honours for Scotland whilst on Watford's books (although two others, Tommy Niblo and Neil McBain, had done so before coming here), and Gerard Lavin, as already mentioned, brought the club's only other Scottish honours at any level.

Behind the scenes with...

Ann Watt, Watford FC's receptionist



JUST as football managers have to put up with a lot of 'stick', the football club receptionist is in the front line when supporters come in with those inevitable gripes. Ann Watt has a unique capacity to defuse potentially volatile situations which makes her worth her weight in gold (fortunately for us, she doesn't weigh all that much!).

Ann Watt has been the 'voice of Watford Football Club' for the past three years, and in many respects hers is just about the hardest job of all those behind the scenes at Vicarage Road.

As the club's receptionist, and the first point of contact for everyone, from those wanting to bid 20 million pounds for a star player to the youngster wanting a trial, and more besides.

Ann is a proud Watfordian. Born in the town and currently living in Garston, she joined the staff at the club after answering an advertisement in the match programme.

"I was at a game when I read that the club was looking for an office junior. I was just finishing a course in business administration so I applied."

Actually Ann's entire family are devoted Watford fans and two of her brothers are long-standing Vicarage Road season ticket holders.

Ann faces the daily task of dealing with countless enquiries from all sorts of people, but

mention Oxford to her, and her entire demeanour will change. She says without hesitation that the night of the now notorious FA Cup postponement was her worst experience, as she subsequently took dozens of 'phone calls from angry supporters.

"The whole mood of the club, including those of the supporters who call in, is determined by results. A good day on Saturday leads to an easy Monday," says Ann, who often has to turn the club's reception into a counselling office when a player turns up (often injured) ready to audition for a part in 'The Glums'.

Now her influence stretches beyond reception, as she is currently undertaking duties in the marketing and communications departments, as well as assisting in the hectic world of ticket sales.

Ann, who played hockey for West Herts before joining the club, is now so devoted to the Hornets that she admits to having 'phoned home regularly while on holiday recently, to find out about the comings and goings at Vicarage Road.



"I really don't like the end of the season as I often have to say goodbye and good luck to players I have enjoyed working with, but then it does mean there's my holiday to look forward to, with sun, sea, sand and no switchboard!"

Ann does, though, have one other dislike - Valentine's Day.

"Dozens of flowers and roses come for the players, and there's me playing 'guess-the-perfume', but there's never anything for me."

Many members of Watford's backroom team - and many supporters, too - owe Ann a very large bouquet, and not just on Valentine's Day.

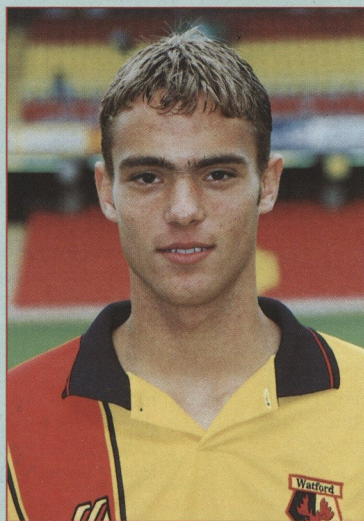

Jimmy Gilligan's young Hornets went out of the FA Youth Cup, despite taking a 2-0 lead.

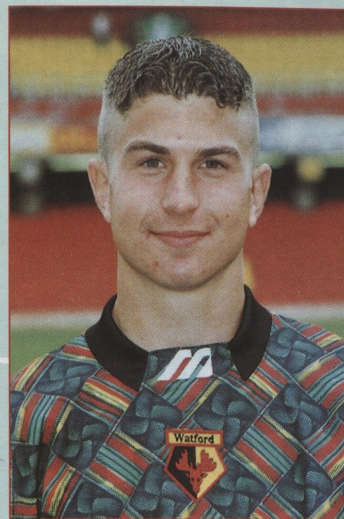
