




We warmly welcome the officials for today's match and trust they enjoy their time at Home Park as much as possible. The referee today is MR. ANDY D'URSO from Billericay in Essex. He is assisted by Mr. R. Melinn from Bridgwater, Somerset and Mr. M. North from Wimborne. The fourth official is Mr. R. Scott. Andy D'Urso, who is 33, began refereeing in December 1979 in youth football and a year later in men's football. He progressed via the Isthmian League, initially as a linesman, then on to the referees list and panel of league's list of linesman in 1989. He was appointed to the National List of League referees for the season 1994-95, his first league game on the 13th. of August 1994 between Fulham and Walsal

Some of the notable matches he has officiated in: Essex Senior Cup final, as a linesman in 1989, F.A. Youth Cup semifinal, as linesman the following April. He also ran the line in 1993 for the F.A. Challenge Cup Quarter Final and a little later that year he refereed the Essex Senior Trophy Final. He has since refereed the F.A. Vase quarter final, F.A. Trophy Quarter Final and a F.A. Youth Cup Semi-Final. In April 1997 he was a referee's assistant in a UEFA under-18 international between Israel and

Again the swing came back on Tuesday night with a 3-0 defeat at the hands of Southend, the spirit in the dressing room after the Walsall match was electric with joy, after the Southend game it was like a wet weekend. But all supporters know the feeling as well as the players, up one minute down the next. Mick Jones stated before last weekend he didn't want to draw both games, he'd rather win both but wanted three points from at least one game, we achieved that. Luton Town F.C. were formed by an almagamation of two leading local clubs, Wanderers and Excelsior a works team, at a meeting at Luton Town Hall in April 1885. The Wanderers had three months earlier changed their name to Luton Town Wanderers and did not take too kindly to the formation of another Town club but were talked around at this meeting. Wanderers had already appeared in the F.A. Cup and the new club entered in its inaugural season. Luton have won a number of trophies over the years. They were division 4 champions in 1967-8. They won division 3 south in 1937. The Hatters were division 2 champions in 1982, and won the League Cup in 1988, immortalised by David Pleats victory leaps on the Wembley turf. They have also had some near misses, they finished runners-up in the F.A. Cup in 1959, and finished 2nd in the League cup the year after they won it, 1989. Luton have had a real mixed bag of results over the last 12 games. They have won five, drawn two and lost five. Good results have included a 3-0 home win over Blackpool, while on the minus side they were beaten 4-1 at home by Fulham (Argyle fans know the feeling well). They have achieved creditable draws, 0-0 at home to Bristol City, and 1-1 at Watford. They still-find themselves looking anxiously over their shoulder, as do Argyle

LENNIE LAWRENCE - Manager

Lennie Lawrence was appointed manager of Luton Town in December 1995, following the departure of Terry Westley. A player with non-league Croydon, Carshalton Athletic and Sutton United, Mr Lawrence was an assistant manager at Home Park, where he was also caretaker manager, and at Lincoln, before becoming manager of Charlton Athletic in 1982, having initially joined the Addicks as reserve team coach. Charlton finished as runners-up in Division Two in 1985/86 earning promotion to the top flight after an absence of 29 years. In the following season they were involved in the first promotion/relegation play-offs, overcoming second division Leeds United in extra-time in a dramatic play-off final replay, but were relegated in 1990. Lennie left Charlton in 1991, after nine years with the club which at the time made him the third longest-serving manager in the country behind Nottingham Forest's Brian Clough and Oldham's Joe Royle He headed north to Middlesbrough, where he took the Teeside club into the FA Premier Legaue in 1992 in his first season with them. They returned to Division One in 1993, and Lawrence left in 1994, when Bryan Robson took over at Ayresome Park. He then joined Bradford in May 1994, leaving Valley Parade in November 1995. He is the 21st manager in the history of Luton Town. Unable to keep Luton in Division One in his first season in charge, he guided them to the Division Two play-offs in 96/97. After Christmas 1996 the Hatters were rarely out of the top three, but lost out to eventually promoted Crewe in the two-legged play-off semi-finals.

PAUL SHOWLER - Midfield/Forward

Signed in August 1996, from Bradford City where he played under current Luton boss Lennie Lawrence. Played non-league football for Altrincham and Barnet, with league appearances for the latter following their promotion from the Conference. Scored his first goal for the Hatters on the 3-1 win over Walsall in October 1996. Suffered with injuries at the start of the 97/98

KELVIN DAVIS - Goalkeeper

Kelvin is a highly-rated keeper who made his league debut for the Hatters on the final day of the 1993/94 season in a 2-2 draw at Stoke. He spent a month on loan at Torquay in September/October 1994, before winning a place in the Luton starting line-up in March.

With Juergen Sommer on international duty, Kelvin made his home debut in the televised 'derby' with Watford, saving a penalty in the 1-1 draw. He kept his place until the end of the season, and also won two England youth caps. Kelvin was selected for the England Under-21 squad for the Toulon Tournament in June 1995. Signed new four-year contract in June 1995, and was again in England Under-21 squads throughout the 95/96 season. Went on loan to Hartlepool in August 1997, but was recalled following the injury to

shoulder injury in August 1997.

IAN FEUER - Goalkeeper
Ian signed for the Hatters from West Ham in December 1995, for a fee which could rise to £580,000 depending on appearances.

The 6ft 7ins American arrived at Luton in September, and spent three months on loan. Was Luton's Player of the Year for the 95/96 season. At West Ham he was understudy to Ludek Miklosko, but never played a first team game, and due to restrictions on overseas players was kept off the bench by Les Sealey. His Luton debut wasn't his league debut though, as he was on loan at Peterborough in 1994/95, playing 16 games in Division Two Spotted by West Ham playing in Belgium, although he actually signed from Los Angeles Salsa. Regular for the Hatters in 96/97, but suffered a serious

SIMON DAVIES - Midfield

Joined the Hatters from Manchester United in the summer of 1997, after only rare appearances in the Old Trafford first-team. Made 11 league appearances for the Reds, and also played six matches during a loan spell at Exeter. Scored for United in a European Cup match v Galatasaray in December 1994, when they won 4-0, and also played in the 3-1 defeat in

RICHARD HARVEY -Defender

Richard resurrected his Town career in 1994/95 after two years plagued by injury. The former England youth international missed the entire 1993/94 season after a cruciate knee ligament operation, and made his first appearance of the following campaign at Barnsley in January. His appearance at home to Watford in March 1995 was his first at Kenilworth Road for three years. A regular on the left side of defence/midfield for the first half of the 95/96 season, he lost his place to Mitchell Thomas after the arrival of Lennie Lawrence as manager. Suffered with another knee ligament injury in the 96/97 pre-season campaign. Was given free transfer at the end of last season, but remains on month-to-month contract.

JULIAN JAMES - Defender

Julian joined Luton as a trainee, and was introduced to First Division football in 1988, but was sent off on his full debut in a Littlewoods Cup win at Leeds in November of that year. A former England Under-21 international, he was a regular at left-back in the 1993/94 season. He made the right-back position his own in 1994/95 with a string of consistent displays which earned him the Player of the Year award from the Loyal Luton Supporters Club. Was in and out of the side at the start of the 95/96 campaign, before an extended run at right-back after Christmas. Granted a benefit match in 1996. Regular at right-back during 96/97.

MARVIN JOHNSON - Defender

Marvin made his Football League debut against Wimbledon in 1988, and quickly established himself as a versatile defender. Started the 1994/95 season at left-back, but then switched to the centre of defence to form a reliable partnership with Trevor Peake. Marvin was one of only three players to play in every first-team match in the 94/95 season, and was awarded the Players' Player of the Year trophy. He was again a consistent performer in 95/96 at centre-back, alongside Steve Davis for the most part, and Darren Patterson, Similarly in 96/97.

PAUL McLAREN - Midfield

Paul made his debut in the Town first-team on the final day of the 1993/94 season, coming on as a substitute at Stoke City. He joined the Hatters from school, and is an England youth international. Started as a centre-half, but spent much of the 1994/95 season in the reserves in centre midfield. Made his full debut at Tranmere in October 1995, and then played in the Anglo-Italian Cup game in Genoa. Was an able deputy for Gary Waddock and/or Ceri Hughes in 96/97, and is set to be a regular this term.

DAVID OLDFIELD - Midfielder/Forward

David returned to Kenilworth Road in the summer of 1995, six years after leaving Luton Town. He started his career with the Hatters, progressing through the junior ranks to a two-goal senior debut in a 2-1 Simod Cup win at Everton in February 1988. He also scored on his full league debut in a 2-1 home win over Watford in May 1988, and went on to make 29 league appearances for the Hatters, scoring four goals. Australian-born Oldfield who played for England Under-21s, joined Manchester City for £600,000 in March 1989, before moving on to Leicester City.

TONY THORPE - Forward

Tony made an immediate impact in the Town side when he scored for the Hatters on his full debut at Newcastle United, in the fourth round of the FA Cup in January 1994. He joined the club at the start of the 1992/93 season, following a spell at Leicester. He was restricted to just five substitute appearances during the 1994/95 campaign. Scored Luton's winning goal at Southend in August 1995 - the Hatters' first win of the season, and their first under Terry Westley. Signed a new contract in the summer of 1996, and went on to enjoy a record-breaking season, becoming the first Luton player since Malcolm MacDonald in 1970/71 to reach 30 goals. He has been the scourge of Argyle since last season, scoring every time the teams met, he may

GARY WADDOCK - Midfield

Gary completed a free transfer move from Bristol Rovers in December 1994, after a three-month loan spell at Kenilworth Road. Started his career with QPR making over 200 appearances, including an FA Cup Final against Spurs in 1982, and the subsequent replay. That was followed by a spell in Belgium with Charleroi as Gary recovered from a serious knee injury, and he also had spells at Millwall, QPR again, and Swindon, before moving to Bristol. Gary missed only one game through suspension after joining the Hatters in

1994/95, and scored his first goal for the club on the final day of the season. His consistent displays in 95/96 were rewarded with the Players' Player of the Year Trophy. Team captain in 96/97 and 97/98.

STEVE DAVIS - Defender

Steve joined the Hatters in the summer of 1995 after making over 160 league appearances for Burnley, scoring 22 goals. He joined the Turf Moor side in August 1991 for £60,000 from Southampton, after loan spells at Burnley and Notts County. He captained Burnley during their rise up the league into Division One, and played in both their victories over Luton in the 1994/95 season. Was a commanding figure for the Hatters in 95/96, but again suffered the agony of relegation as Luton, like Bumley the previous season, dropped out of Division One. Regular in the centre of defence last season.

ANDREW FOTL4DIS - Forward

Andrew joined the Hatters on a full-time basis in the summer of 1996, aged 18, after staying on at school to complete his A levels. He had been a regular member of the youth and reserve sides in the preceding two seasons, and won England Schoolboy caps at Under 15 and Under 18 levels. Made a good impression in early league games, signing an extension to his contract in October 1996, and celebrated with his first goal for Luton in the 3-1 win over Walsall. Suffered with injury in his first season, and also at the start of the 97/98 campaiar

GARY DOHERTY - Striker/Defender

Made his first-team debut as a substitute against Millwall in September 1997 whilst still a youth team player. Born in Eire but educated in Luton, playing for the Luton Schools and Beds County teams. Has represented Eire at Under 18 level, playing at centre-half where he started in the Luton youth side before being switched up front as an emergency striker.

STUART DOUGLAS - Striker

After an impressive scoring record in youth and reserve team football, Stuart made his first-team debut, as a second year trainee, against Oldham in November 1995, and scored after 41 minutes. Injuries gave him a chance to press his claims for a starting place at the start of the 97/98 campaign, and he responded with the winner in the televised game against Southend in

MITCHELL THOMAS - Defender

The former England Under-21 international made over 100 appearances for Luton before moving to Spurs, shortly after David Pleat, in 1986. He played in the 1987 FA Cup Final, and later moved to West Ham. He was on loan at Luton in the 1993/94 season before a permanent free transfer move. And after missing the start of the season through suspension was a regular at left-back in the 1994/95 campaign. Recalled by new manager Lennie Lawrence in December 1995, and responded with an ever-present record until the end of the season. Was regular left-back during the 96/97 campaign, but underwent a hernia operation just after the start of the 97/98

DARREN PATTERSON - Defender

Darren signed for the Hatters in August 1995 from Crystal Palace for 150,000, a fee which could rise to over £200,000 based on appearances. The Northern Ireland international started his league career with Wigan, and

joined Palace for £250.000 in 1992. An achilles injury ruled him out of the first two months of the season, and kept him out of Northern Ireland's final European Championship qualifying matches. Made his first Luton appearance in the Anglo-Italian Cup defeat in Cesena in November 1995. Went on loan to Preston in October 1996, and won his place back in the Northern Ireland squad at the end of 96/97. Ruled out with an ankle injury at the start of the 97/98 season.

DWIGHT MARSHALL - Forward

Dwight signed in the summer of 1994 from Plymouth for £150,000, after scoring. 14 goals for Peter Shilton's side the previous season - his third campaign at Home Park after playing non-league football with Grays Athletic. A Home Park favourite and still listed in many peoples modern top 11 Argyle sides. Started well for Luton, with two goals in the 5-1 win over Middlesbrough in October, and despite being troubled by an injury late in the season he finished as the Hatters' leading scorer with 13 goals in league and cup. Scored 13 goals in 95/96, but suffered a broken leg in February 1996, ruling him out for the rest of the season. Returned in November 1996.

TREVOR PEAKE - Defender.

Trevor started his league career at Lincoln City in 1979, before moving on to Coventry City in 1983. He enjoyed eight full seasons at Highfield Road, winning an FA Cup winners' medal in 1987 as the Sky Blues beat David Pleat's Tottenham 3-2 at Wembley. Trevor joined Luton for £100,000 in August 1991, and signed a new one-year contract in the summer of 1994. For the first time in his career he maintained an ever-present record throughout the season, being voted the Supporters' Club Player of the Year, and signed a further one-year deal in the summer of 1995, and was appointed reserve team coach during the 95/96 season. Beat his own record as Luton's oldest ever player, when he came on as a substitute against Wrexham in September 1997.

SEAN EVERS - Midfield

Sean made his first-team debut in the Anglo-Italian Cup match against Perugia in September 1995, making his league debut in the final home match of the season. Made one league appearance in 96/97. **PHIL GRAY - Forward**

First signed for Luton in August 1991, but missed most of the season due to injury as the Hatters were relegated from the top flight. Scored 20 goals in the new Division One the following season, and was subsequently transferred to Sunderland for £800,000 in July 1993. Had three seasons at Roker Park. before moving to France to play for Nancy - a free transfer under the Bosman ruling - and from there he moved to Dutch side Fortuna Sittard. Returned to Luton in September 1997 for £400,000. A regular in the Northern Ireland

GRAHAM ALEXANDER - Defender/Midfield


Graham joined the Hatters in July 1995, and was new manager Terry Westley's first signing. The Town coaching staff had been watching him for two seasons before deciding to make their move, with the fee in the region of £100,000, with further payments depending on appearances. A regular on the right of midfield; he played in all but one of Luton's league and cup games in the 96/97 season.

couldn't believe what I was reading. 'Gullit sacked. Vialli to become player-manager'. The popular dreadlocked Dutchman had built on the foundations left for him by Glenn Hoddle. He had turned Chelsea into genuine championship contenders. Zola, Vialli, Di Matteo, heck even Graeme Le Saux had arrived. I must admit I thoroughly enjoy watching Chelsea these days, they play superb passing football with a continental flavour, they score cracking goals. Whatever you say about money, squad rotation or bad defending, Gullit managed that team and managed to make these world-class players click. He won them their first trophy for 27 years. Ken Bates even kissed Ruud at the cup final last year. 10 months on, as Argyle fans well know, things can change beyond belief. So why on earth was this popular and successful manager dismissed? If he remained in charge, they would probably have won the European Cup Winners Cup, possibly the Coca-Cola Cup and finished in the top three of the league. They might well do that under Vialli, but why did the change take place?

It gives me great regret to confirm what we know already: MONEY **RUNS THE WORLD OF FOOTBALL**

Not players, not managers, not chairmen, and certainly not the fans who were supporting their clubs long before the current managers or chairmen popped up. Ruud apparently asked for £2 million per annum, the club say it was nearer £4 million. Obscene amounts of money? Yes. But Ruud will now prove what is

the norm today, he will take his considerable skills and go to someone who will pay him what he wants. Chelsea would receive that 2 or 4 million in an instant if they qualify for the Champions League. I was appalled to hear Glenn Hoddle of all people suggest that Ruud didn't do much of the work at Chelsea, that Graham Rix and the backroom staff did most of it. Yes, but who chose the players to buy, the tactics, the team, motivated them and passed his knowledge on? Gullit that's who. As I write this, Chelsea have signed Brian Laudrup for next season. He could be followed by Deschamps, the French skipper and Stam the impressive PSV defender. I am sure Ken Bates will take all the credit when Chelsea win trophies this and next season under Vialli but he will have forgotten who laid those foundations, attracted players to the club and brought Chelsea back to the forefront of English football. I hope Ruud is successful wherever he ends up. Maybe then Ken Bates will realise that he should have persisted with Ruud, and worried less about those purse strings. Bates has made money out of

This is all a million miles and a couple of million pounds away from the managers position at Argyle but the problems often boil down to the same thing, money? Dan McCauley also is trying to keep expenditure down, he isn't getting rich out of Argyle and neither is the manager, who certainly does work hard. Due to money the players cannot be attracted to the club and that raises the argument that if they only want to come for the dosh we don't want them! A strong moral argument but in modern football is fatally flawed. Good players earn good money, very good money. The

Chelsea so can he accuse Gullit of

greed?

scale of charges varies with each division but the good players in each division cost a lot and the players wage bill must be the single most expense for most clubs. As Ken Bates would surely argue, Chelsea fans want the best players so they have had to see a huge hike in their entrance prices as they can't get enough through the turnstiles due to building work. They can get 30 odd thousand but they need 40 odd thousand packed in to Stamford bridge, then gate prices can be less and the best still players paid (that's the theory though when Chelsea are at full capacity do not expect to see a price reduction). Again the basics are the same at Argyle, if more came to Home Park that would see the easing of financial constraints, the possibility of bringing in and keeping the better players, particularly with Bosman now ruling!

One difference between a Premiership problem and a Division Two problem is that if Chelsea get the ground sorted out they will fill it, Arayle could even increase the capacity at Home Park but to what end? The armchair Argyle fan, the armchair moaner who states Arayle play the worse football he's "never" seen, the guy who says he will not return until they start playing good football and have some new star players, they are the problem for Argyle. They do not seem to realise that if they actually came to Home Park along with the rest of us, through the bad times as well as the Wembley trip, then their wishes are more likely to be fulfilled. Then the day will come when we are shocked when Dan McCauley sacks Mick Jones because Mick wants £2 million net. Chance would be a fine thing.


did they react? Polite applause. No hugging or kissing, maybe a ripple of "Bravo" or some such outrageous chant.



"I never really set-out to run a mail order business (it sounded too much like hard work), but it just happened as a result of setting up Ruptured Ambitions as a record label in the first place".


