



In December 1927, Northampton Town went in at half time losing 5-1 to Luton Town. I'm not sure what was in their tea, but after the break they came out and managed to completely turn it around, winning the game 6-5, creating one of the greatest ever comebacks of all time.

The great Stanley Matthews only managed to score one goal in the Football League throughout the whole season 1962-63, it was on the 18th of May 1963 in a 2-0 win over Luton Town at the Victoria Ground. It enabled Stoke City to win the Division Two Championship and relegated poor Luton Town.

The Luton Town Chairman, Peter Nelkin in 1991 said after his club had avoided relegation on the last day of the season: 'The manager (Jim Ryan) has had a very difficult job and in the circumstances he has done well'. Yet all of 48 hours later, the chairman had sacked his manager saying: 'You don't take a decision to sack a manager on a whim, but Jim wasn't going to change and neither was I'!!!

Wayne Burnett was their hero, drilling the ball home from a corner with eight minutes of extratime left to the delight of the Mariners fans in the crowd of 62,432, the third highest crowd in the competition's history.

It was not a thrilling game early on until Bournemouth took the lead when John Bailey picked up a flick-on from Mark Stein and made space to fire into an empty net. Grimsby equalised with 10 minutes remaining when a Kingsley Black effort went in off the legs of Cherries goalkeeper Jimmy Glass. The sudden-death extra-time was very exciting with both teams making plenty of chances before Burnett spared everybody the agony of a penalty shoot-out.

Grimsby are the 13th different winners of the competition since the final moved to Wembley in 1985. Bournemouth ironically won it the season before, when it was the Associate Members Cup, by beating Hull at Boothferry Park.

No more issues were settled in last Saturday's matches but Grimsby could have had a bearing on the position at the bottom on Tuesday when they were due to play at Carlisle. If they won at Brunton Park they would have virtually condemned The Cumbrians to relegation.

Southend are already all but mathematically down after last Saturday's 1-1 draw at York. Anything but maximum points from their final two games will see them suffer their second successive relegation while one more point for The Bees and Plymouth will also finish off The Shrimpers whatever they do themselves.

Burnley's game in hand incidentally is at Oldham next Tuesday while they entertain Plymouth next Saturday in a final day showdown.

At the other end of the table Fulham need one point to book their place in the play-offs while Grimsby would have joined them if they won at

Carlisle. Three points today at already-promoted Watford would also do the trick. Our final opponents Bristol Rovers have moved into the play-off zone and if they win at Blackpool today and Wrexham and Gillingham fail to beat Preston and Plymouth respectively, they will be in the end-of-season finale.

Northampton will also be watching for the Wrexham and Gillingham results while entertaining Fulham as they are level on points with Bristol Rovers.

Meanwhile League new boys Macclesfield could be a Second Division club by 4.45 tonight if they avoid defeat against their former tenants Chester. The odds would favour a home win as it has been the side's amazing record at Moss Rose that has put them second in the table. Before today Macclesfield were the only club in all four Divisions still with an unbeaten home record after winning 18 and drawing four of their home matches. If they had gained more than their three triumphs away from home then they would surely have run away with the Third Division championship.


The challenge to go up with them and Notts County has really hotted up with just a point separating Torquay, Colchester, Scarborough and Barnet. Lincoln compete the play-off zone.

The battle to avoid the drop into Division Two is also tense. Port Vale, who entertained Middlesbrough last night, and Stoke who travel to Sunderland this afternoon, are both two points ahead of third bottom Manchester City, who entertain QPR. Portsmouth, who face Huddersfield, and Reading who go to Nottingham Forest tomorrow and move into a new ground next season are further adrift.

Finally Oldham have signed Bruce Grobbelaar for the rest of the season on non-contract terms.

A word from Jack Straw

For many clubs it's the last home game today of a fantastic domestic football season. But don't despair, in just a month's time, the World Cup kicks off.

Like all football fans, I'm excited about a month-long competition featuring the biggest names in the game - particularly when England under Glen Hoddle have a good chance of doing well.

Most of us will be watching the games on TV. A lucky few will be travelling to France. The vast majority of travelling fans will be genuine supporters. But we have to accept a hardcore hooligan minority are making plans to travel as well.

So we have been working flat-out with our French counterparts to ensure the World Cup is remembered for all the right reasons. The co-operation will continue right through the tournament.

We want to ensure genuine English supporters get the warm and friendly welcome in France they deserve. That has not always happened abroad in the past.

So French police have attended games here to understand better the special atmosphere at our matches. They have promised to treat all supporters, wherever they come from, firm but fairly.

But we must also stop the tiny minority of mindless hooligans again damaging the reputation of England abroad.

That is all the more important with our bid to host the 2006 finals, which has the full and

enthusiastic support of Tony Blair and the Government, winning new friends every week.

We have made real progress in rooting out the cancer of hooliganism from our domestic game. I watch as many matches of my side Blackburn as I can. All match-goers know, despite a handful of appalling recent incidents, how much better the atmosphere is at games today compared with a decade ago.

We have also tackled the hooligans who masquerade as England fans. Euro'96 was memorable for many, many reasons. But the football authorities, police and decent fans can take great pride in the fact that the tournament was mainly trouble free.

There is, however, no room for complacency. No one should doubt our determination, and that of the French authorities, to prevent the thugs wreaking this sporting festival.

We have encouraged the courts to make full use of the powers to stop convicted hooligans travelling to matches

French police are making full use of the sophisticated intelligence networks and policing procedures we have developed in this country.

British football intelligence officers will be travelling to France to spot potential troublemakers and liaison officers will also be on hand to enable instant throughput of intelligence.

You, too, can play your part. We have relaunched our Hooligan Hotline which provided such a success at Euro'96. By calling 0800-515495, decent fans can blow the whistle on the thugs. It is already providing a

stream of useful intelligence. It's completely confidential

There's one other way you can help prevent flashpoints. That's by not travelling to France unless you have a ticket.

I know tickets are in short supply despite the best efforts of the FA. But I fear there is still a widespread view that if you want to catch a match, all you have to do is go over to France and buy a blackmarket ticket even if you have to pay over the odds. But you would be wrong.

Your chances of getting into the ground are very slim indeed. A black market ticket is no guarantee you will get into the match.

France has very tough touting laws which will be strictly enforced. That will cut down the chances of tickets being available.

But, more importantly, every ticket sold in France has the original purchaser's name printed on it. There is no point in pretending you are Eric Cantona when you are really Vinny Iones.

It will be a simple matter for the police or turnstile staff to check. At best, you will be turned away and lose your money. At worst, you could face imprisonment.

So the advice is No ticket. Don't travel. Otherwise you could be wasting your time and your money.

We want this summer's World Cup to be remembered for all the right reasons. A festival of football for all to enjoy. And let's hope for a success for England.



ev dates

(A look at some of the significant dates in Luton's history)

SEPTEMBER 4, 1897 - Luton start their Football League career in Division Two with a trip to Leicester Fosse and come away with a creditable 1-1 draw.

MAY. 1900 - The Hatters lose their League status after three seasons when they fail to gain re-election. They do not reappear until the formation of the Third Division in 1920.

DECEMBER 4, 1920 - Luton play their first League game against Brentford and end up winning 2-0.

APRIL 13, 1936 - The Hatters hit a hatful of goals as they thrash Bristol Rovers 12-0 with centre-forward Joe Payne claiming an amazing 10 of them. The victory is still the club's best-ever, Rovers' worst-ever and was the highest-ever win in the history of Division Three (South).

MAY 1, 1937 - A 2-0 triumph over Torquay secures the Division Three (South) title for Luton in the final game of the season.

APRIL 30, 1955 - Luton win 3-0 at Doncaster in the final match of the campaign to finish second in Division Two on goal average from Rotherham and earn promotion to the top flight.

MAY 2, 1959 - The Hatters face Nottingham Forest in the FA Cup final but suffer a 2-1 defeat.

MAY 11, 1968 - Brentford are guests at a promotion party as Luton celebrate wining the Fourth Division title by beating us 2-1.

APRIL 24 1988 - Luton enjoy a triumphant return to Wembley by beating Arsenal 3-2 in the Littlewoods Cup final.

APRIL 9 1989 - The Hatters are back under the Twin Towers to defend their trophy but bogev side Nottingham Forest dash their hopes with a 3-1 win.

Luton come into this afternoon's game knowing that a victory will secure their Second Division status for another season.

Their recent revival has given them a great chance of avoiding the drop with Rory Allen the hero for his four goals since arriving on loan from Tottenham on transfer deadline day. His performances have inspired a run of four wins in six matches following a sequence of just one win in their previous 12 League games.

The Hatters and Brentford's problems are a far cry from 12 months ago when both clubs harboured serious hopes of claiming a place in Division One. Luton, who were second in the table behind us from the end of December to the middle of March, finally finished in third place four points adrift of Stockport, and like us saw Crewe put paid to their promotion hopes in the play-offs. In The Hatters' case they lost 4-3 on aggregate in the semi-finals.

This season things have been very different in the League with not much more success in Cup competitions. Third Divison Torquay dumped Luton out of the FA Cup with a 1-0 first round win in Bedfordshire while West Brom ended their Coca-Cola Cup hopes in the second round after they had put paid to Colchester. They reached the southern semi-finals in the Auto Windscreens Shield, beating us and Fulham en route, before they went out 1-0 at eventual Wembley finalists Bournemouth.

Luton were our first League visitors of last season and we started on a run of five straight victories by beating them 3-2 in

A Tony Thorpe penalty just on half-time put The Hatters ahead and although Carl Asaba equalised midway through the second half, Ceri Hughes almost immediately restored Town's lead. However goals in the last 10 minutes from Jamie Bates and Robert Taylor gave us the points.

We have made two trips to Kenilworth Road this season, losing 2-0 in the League in October and 2-1 in the Auto Windscreens Shield three months later.

SUPER SEASON

One of the most memorable seasons in Luton's history occurred in 1981/82 when they won the old Second Division championship by eight points from local rivals Watford.

They were never overtaken after going top at the start of October and only lost four times all campaign, with two of those defeats coming in their first six matches. After the second of those losses Luton embarked on a run of seven wins and a draw to roar into pole position, including a 6-0 thrashing of Grimsby along the way.

Their worst sequence was five games without a win in March but they had built up such a helathy lead at the top that no-one could overtake them.

Luton's second spell in the top flight lasted 10 seasons and saw them finish in a club-best seventh place in 1986/87.

THE MANAGER

Lennie Lawrence, who took over at Kenilworth Road in December 1995, is no stranger to pulling off great escape acts.

He was manager of Charlton for eight years and memorably kept them in the old First Division in 1987 when they beat Leeds after extra-time in the end-of-season play-offs. In his time with the Addicks, Lawrence took them back to the top flight for the first time in nearly 30 years after they had had to leave The Valley for Selhurst Park.

He also managed Middlesbrough, leading them into the Premiership, and Bradford City before arriving at Kenilworth Road while he is one of the few managers on the circuit never to have played League football, spending his playing days with Croydon, Carshalton and Sutton.

Former Bee Clive Goodyear is Luton's physiotherapist.

THE SQUAD

Ex-trainee and former England under-21 player **Kelvin** Davis has been the regular goalkeeper this season. Former YTS player Nathan Abbey is the other 'keeper on the books.

Alan White (ex-Derby and Middlesbrough), former England B star Mitchell Thomas (ex-Tottenham and West Ham), in his second spell at Kenilworth Road, and Northern Ireland international Darren Patterson (ex-West Brom, Wigan and Crystal Palace) should all play at the back but long-serving Julian James broke his leg at Bristol Rovers last week.

Ex-apprentices Richard Harvey and Marvin Johnson and former Burnley captain Steve Davis are fighting for his place.


Former Republic of Ireland international Gary Waddock (ex-OPR, Millwall and Bristol Rovers), Simon Davies (ex-Manchester United), ex-trainee Sean Evers and Graham Alexander (ex-Scunthorpe) are likely to fill midfield with second year pro Matthew Spring on the bench. Another ex-trainee Paul McLaren could also be involved.

Dwight Marshall (ex-Hampton and Plymouth), David Oldfield (ex-Manchester City and Leicester), in his second Luton spell, and winger Chris Allen (ex-Oxford and Nottingham Forest) provide the firepower with ex-trainee Stuart Douglas a substitute.
















Trust us to help the game




The Early Days

Prior to our first league game the clubs had met on 26 occasions in the Southern League and a controversial FA Cup match back in 1909.

"With the score at 1-1, Luton's Smith was clear with only Archie Ling to beat, however Bees Jim Riley took him out with a choice piece of "Ju-Jitsu". Riley was only booked and Smith played very little more of the game. George Reid later scored against 10 man Luton to give us victory. The FA held an enquiry and Riley was later given a two week suspension as it was adjudged that he should have been sent off. The Ref was also banned for a month - for "failing to do his duty"

40 YEARS AGO: Shock of the season in Division One as runaway champions Wolves lose 2-1 away to already relegated Sheffield Wednesday..... the title issue goes to the final day in Division Two..... West Ham win 3-1 at Middlesborough to claim top spot.... London neighbours Charlton miss out when losing 4-3 at home to Blackburn (att. 56,535) which enables the men from Enoud Park to leapfrog them into Second position.... The Third (South) Championship has now been whittled down to a straight fight between Brighton and Brentford.... In the Northern Section Scunthorpe beat Chester 2-1 and with nearest challenges Accrington Stanley losing 1-0 at Wrexham the title is theirs.

20 YEARS AGO: Nottingham Forest, beaten only 3 times all season, are held 0-0 by Birmingham at the City Ground (att. 37,625) but they are streets clear and the trophy is already in their safe keeping..... here's a funny one: Southampton play Spurs on the final day knowing that a point apiece will ensure them of promotion to Division One along with champions Bolton and deprive Brighton of a place in the top echelon..... the game end's 0-0!!.... Wrexham are champions of Division Three following a 0-0 draw with Peterborough at the Racecourse ground (att. 20,000)..... Graham Taylor's Watford are the outstanding team in Division Four..... they beat Southport, who are about to lose their league status and finish 11 points clear of runners up Southport.

1938 Division One - Last post

Although the season had a few weeks to run yet, Brentford's 4-0 defeat at Leeds signalled the end of any last lingering hopes of the championship.

Manager Harry Curtis expressed his frustration at finishing empty handed, especially as the Bees led the race for 16 weeks with at one stage a clear 5 point advantage, and promised that next year he would play it differently.

However, there can be no denying that a golden opportunity had been missed and for Brentford the likelihood of a second bite of the cherry was remote.

The title has rarely gone to a club so low down the pecking order in terms of support and, yes even in 1938, financial clout.

Underlining how Brentford threw away the chance of a lifetime is the fact that no side has won the First Division with less points

than Arsenal's success in 1937-38.

There were some rumours that some of the players were getting itchy feet and felt they could better their prospects at a bigger club.

Rumour turned to fact when Scottish International Duncan McKenzie was granted a transfer and moved to Middlesborough.

On a brighter note skipper Arthur Bateman was selected as travelling reserve for England's International against Germany in Berlin on May 14th.

Luton, champions of Division Three (South) in 1936-37 looked for a long time as if they were going straight back down.

But towards the end of the campaign their form picked up dramatically and they finished on a high with wins against Swansea (5-1), Norwich (4-0) and Newcastle (4-1) to settle for 12th position.



Brentford's 4-1 (Towers (3), Rainford) victory over Port Vale set up the tantalising prospect of visit from Brighton to round off the season.

They were the only two sides left in the championship race, although the odds favoured Brighton as they still had to play Watford and also held a two point advantage.

Brentford went into the game buoyed by a run of just one defeat in 12. The seagulls, in contrast, had been sending out distress signals in recent weeks and looked anything but championship material.

A crowd of 25,720 flowed into Griffin Park and witnessed a game of cut and thrust, the outcome which was settled by Bill Goundry's first goal of the season six minutes after the break. Victory took Brentford top and left Brighton needing to beat Watford at the Goldstone to take the title.

While Brentford crossed fingers and hoped their

neighbours would do them a favour, in reality the outcome had already been decided.

Rumour was rife that certain members of the Brighton team had greased a few Watford palms to ensure themselves of the Third Division (South) Championship and the bonus money that went with it.

So, Brighton's 6-0 victory needs little comment from me, and a 'Daily Mail' expose a few years later confirmed that Brantford had been literally robbed of honours in 1957-58.

Luton, in Division One lost 4-2 at WBA, but finished 8th to attain their highest position ever.

Their side that season included the club's record goalscorer Gordon/Turner (243), appearance maker Bob Morton (494), most capped player George Cummins (Eire) (19), and International Ron Baynham and Syd Owen, and winger George McLeod, who was later to give Brentford sterling service.

1978 Division Four - Red letter day

With just three matches remaining Brentford's season long quest for promotion looked like bearing fruit.

A win against lowly Darlington in the final home game would almost certainly clinch a spot in Division Three and a crowd of 11,930 packed into Griffin Park to lend their favourites maximum support.

Manager Bill Dodgin (Junior) had his team fired up for the occasion and there was never really any doubt about the outcome one Andy McCulloch scored with a superb diving header on 16 minutes.

Goal Number two came just before the break when Doug Allder waltzed into the box and was sent flying by a miss timed tackle, leaving Steve Phillips to step up and net his 35^{ih} goal of the season from the resulting spot kick.

From then on it was just a matter of waiting for the final whistle to sound and when news filtered through that Aldershot, the only team capable of equalling the Bee's points total, had only drawn at Scunthorpe, the celebrations began in earnest.

Bill Dodgin, who normally preferred to let his team do the talking allowed himself a celebratory pat on the back and said: "I always wanted to have a go as manager of Brentford – ever since my father's days when he was a manager. The tradition, atmosphere and potential is so exceptional and appealing. Today's success has a special meaning for the Dodgin's family".

Luton, in contrast, had a disappointing season and a 2-1 home defeat by Southampton left them uncomfortably close to the relegation zone in Division Two.

Further defeats by Millwall and Burnley didn't help their cause and although in the final reckoning the Hafters finished 18th one less point would have left them level with Blackpool, one of the three relegated sides!


