





## Be Our Guest Gina Allan

Our football fanatic doctor, Gina Allan, is part of the matchday medical team that looks after the players. Today Gina recalls experiences from France 98.

After all the talk of allocation of World Cup tickets, we did not really believe we could be

lucky, then the envelope arrived from The England Members Club with news of tickets for England v Columbia in Lens, Northern France. Fantastic. There was a bit of worry as last time we had seen England abroad we had spent an interesting time in Rome being pelted by Italian coins and incarcerated in the ground for three long inexplicable hours after the match. However, undaunted, the scramble for travel arrangements and accommodation began. Even in April, most places were fully booked but eventually a cheap hotel and Le Shuttle were confirmed (or I hoped they were as my knowledge of French is poor). The tournament arew closer and everyone was talking football-nothing better. The tournament began. The rioting in Marseilles was a great talking point. Friends (those without tickets I may add) were happy to offer promises of bail money. Very funny. The big day grew closer with increasing excitement. When WWFC are playing at Walsall on a Tuesday night, I like to be at the ground very early to prevent an acute attack of "we will never get there on time" anxiety. I am too embarrassed to say what time we set off on the Friday morning. At Folkestone, we were advised of delays as England fans were being checked for alcohol and weapons. Very reassuring. Determined not to waste valuable time, off came the English scarves and clutching our "Tourist Guide to France", we were waved straight through. It was a happy drive through France, hooting the car horn at any other car with an English number plate, supporter or not. On the good advice of Monsieur Alan Parry, we used the Park and Ride facility (field), 20 minutes from the ground. I changed into my WWFC shirt in the field, safe in the knowledge I would never be recognised. Was immediately recognised by a Luton Town Supporter whose laughter was only partially squashed by my discussion of Luton's poor performance last season. Onward. An easy ride to the stadium, home to France's League Champions, Lens. I sat next to a cheery but outnumbered Columbian. We chatted on as only those who do not speak each others language do, but not a cross word was exchanged, I think. Getting off the bus, we followed the crowds to the ground. It was amazing. The organisation was faultless. We saw no trouble at all. We had fantastic seats just near the goal where England twice triumphantly scored. The whole evening was full of the best football,

cheering singing and dancing. When Darren Anderton's goal went in, the whole place erupted. When Beckham scored, we were hysterical. He came running to the stand just in front of me to celebrate his goal. I like to think he mistook me for Posh but was rather hurt by the great distance he realised his mistake. However, a girl can dream. It was 90 minutes and more of magic. We tumbled out of the ground as if we had won the World Cup already. We were all sure 1998 was going to be England's year. I dreamt that night that England won the 2006 World Cup final at Wembley, the winning goal being scored by a young lad from the Premiership side Wycombe Wanderers.



### The Man In Charge

#### Lennie Lawrence, Born Brighton 14.12.47

Four months in the autumn of 1995 saw £2 million spent, but only four matches won out of 22. Luton decided they needed an experienced hand and Lawrence fitted the bill perfectly. Perhaps more importantly, he knew about running clubs on shoestring budgets, having made his name by taking impoverished Charlton into what is now the Premiership.

Lawrence was a non-League player, with Croydon, Carshalton and Sutton United. His managerial career started as assistant at Plymouth and then Lincoln. He went to Charlton as reserve team coach before landing the hot seat. He had been boss for nine years when he left Charlton in 1991 and took over at Middlesbrough. He led them to promotion to the Premiership a year later. Bradford City offered the next opportunity, but he left after 18 months to return south. A few weeks later he became Luton's 21st manager. The survival task proved too much, with the December leeway too big a gap to close, but relegation was followed by a thrilling recovery. In their first season back in Division Two, Luton were rarely out of the promotion frame, but it ended in disappointment, with play-off semi-final defeat against Crewe. Last season beset by injuries, and forced to sell leading scorer Tony Thorpe to balance the books, relegation was a real threat until Luton picked themselves up in the last couple of months of a frustrating campaign.

The manager's record at Luton, to the start of this season: Played 138, won 49, drawn 42, lost 47, goals for 182, goals against 162.

#### Marvin Johnson. Born Wembley 29,10,68

A versatile defender, normally a centre-half but capable of filling in on the flanks or in midfield, Johnson is celebrating a full decade as a first-team regular at Luton, his only club. Injuries have been a problem, but he has always bounced back, and is a former winner of the Players' Player of the Year Award at Kenilworth Road after becoming a regular in central defence.

#### Mitchell Thomas. Born Luton 2.10.64

Now the senior professional at Kenilworth Road and appointed player-coach at the start of this season. Luton signed him on schoolboy forms, and he moved up through the ranks to make a league debut in the old First Division in January 1983. He won England Under-21 honours and Luton were not entirely delighted when then manager David Pleat left for Spurs three years later and persuaded Thomas to go with him. The tribunal fee was £250,000, half of what Luton wanted.

Thomas moved on to West

Ham for £500,000 in the summer of 1991, and three years later returned to Kenilworth Road, signing for David Pleat again, on a free transfer. By the start of this season Thomas had made 456 League appearances for his three clubs.

Luton record in his second spell, to the start of this season: 175 appearances, 5 goals.

#### **MAURICE HARKIN**

Matthew Spring, Born Harlow 17.11.79

A competitive midfielder, Spring was a driving force in the Luton side

which reached the FA Youth Cup semi-finals in 1997, and it was no

#### Gavin McGowan. Born Blackheath 16.1.76

A right back fighting for a Premiership place against very stiff competition at Arsenal, McGowan signed for Luton for the third time in June 1998. The first time was a loan deal in March 1997, but that ended after only two impressive appearances. A calf muscle injury needed surgery, and after getting over that he joined Luton on loan again, this time for three months, at the start of the 1997/98 season. Lennie Lawrence rated him, but could not afford to make an offer, and was delighted to conclude a quick deal a year later when Arsenal offered the defender a free transfer.

Luton record to the start of this season: 10 appearances, no goals.

#### Herve Bacque. Born Bordeaux 13.7.76

Signed from Monaco a week before the season kicked off, the 22 year old striker admits that one of his reasons for joining Luton was that he had a special feeling for the English way of life. He started his career with Lorient, in Britanny, and after two years, and still only 21, he was recruited by Monaco.

There, at a very rich club full of international stars, he found it frustrating playing his football for the reserves. Monaco agreed to a free transfer, and after looking at several English clubs Bacque settled for Luton, because he said he was more impressed by Lennie Lawrence than the other managers he met.

#### Phil Gray. Born Belfast 2.10.68

Greeted like a prodigal son when he signed for Luton for the second time in September 1997, the Northern Ireland striker soon discovered that football can be cruel. A succession of injuries struck, culminating in surgery to cure a back problem, leaving Gray determined to make up for lost time when this season kicked off. He was in Spurs reserves when David Pleat splashed out £275,000 for him in August 1991. Two years later he moved on to Premiership football with Sunderland for £800,000 and after three years at Roker went to Nancy in France, and then to Fortuna Sittard in Holland. He needed little encouragement to return to Kenilworth Road in exchange for £400,000.

Luton record to the start of this season: 19 appearances, 2 goals.


#### Dwight Marshall. Born Jamaica 3.10.65

A late starter in pro football - he was playing with non-league Grays Athletic until he was 24 - a succession of defences have paid the price as Marshall has made up for lost time with a string of goals. Plymouth gave him his League chance and the nippy striker rewarded them with 34 goals in 119 full appearances. Luton paid £150,000 for him in the summer of 1994, and despite being used occasionally as a wide attacker he still averaged better than one goal every three games. A broken leg at Sunderland in February 1996 forced him to take a year off, but he came back to show every sign he still had an appetite for goals. Luton record to the start of this season: 156 appearances, 37 goals.

#### Alan White. Born Darlington 22.3.76

Lennie Lawrence went back to Middlesbrough, one of his old clubs, when an injury crisis robbed him of three of his back four in September 1997. The Luton boss, as ever, had little money to spend, but centre-half White was a prospect he knew well: Lawrence had signed him as a 17 year old at Ayresome Park. White was unable to force his way into Middlesbrough's Premiership squad and grabbed the chance to rejoin Lawrence and sample League football. And the £40,000 fee has looked a bigger bargain with every match.

Luton record to the start of this season: 33 appearances, 1 goal.



#### Sean Evers. Born Hitchin 10.10.77

Another young player brought on through Luton's productive youth squad, Evers was on the fringe of the League squad until midway through last season. But when injuries struck Lennie Lawrence had to "ask boys to do men's jobs". The tenacious midfielder coped very well and established himself as a regular.

Luton record to the start of this season: 32 appearances, 3 goals.

#### Simon Davies. Born Middlewich 23.4.74

Midfielder who was in the Manchester United squad that won the FA Youth Cup in 1992, but with so much talent at Old Trafford found it difficult to make an impact in the Premiership and was loaned out to Exeter. Luton offered a realistic chance of regular League football, and bought him for £200,000 in the summer of 1997. However, despite being capped by Wales, Davies was unable to command a regular place in the Luton team, but he hopes to do so now. Luton record to the start of this season: 27 appearances, 1 goal.

#### Stuart Fraser. Born Edinburgh 9.1.80

Stylish defender and skipper of the Luton youth team which ran away with the South East Counties League Championship last season. Reckoned by the Luton coaching staff to be an outstanding prospect, he was given his League debut against Carlisle, in a 3-2 win, on the final day of last season.

### CELEBRATES 100TH CHAMPIONSHIP

The world's original league football competition enjoys its centennial season in the coming campaign and this promises to be a celebration for all 72 clubs and their supporters.

The Football League Championship, which has provided the blueprint for other domestic competitions around the world since its foundation in 1888, lost eleven campaigns due to the two World Wars and therefore enjoys its 100th Championship this season. The competition has been won by no fewer than 26 different clubs with Nottingham Forest being the most recent winners of the famous Football League Championship Trophy following their Division One success last season.

### WORLD CUP FINAL MAN ON LEAGUE'S LIST

The Football League's list of referees for the new season has 72 names and includes World Cup Final assistant referee Mark Warren.

The 38 year old policeman from the West Midlands is one of eight new referees officiating in Nationwide Football League fixtures. The other seven are Lee Cable (Woking), Mark Cowburn (Blackpool), Phil Dowd (Stoke-on-Trent), Keith Hill (Royston), Bill Jordan (Tring), Ray Oliver (Sutton Coldfield) and Peter Walton (Winwick).

#### LEAGUE PREDICTS FURTHER ATTENDANCE BOOM

Attendances in the Nationwide Football League smashed through the 13 million barrier last season and also the total recorded for the previous campaign's competition.

The Football League are once again confident that this unprecedented climb - which has seen attendances rise for twelve consecutive seasons - will continue in the forthcoming campaign.

This statistic makes The Football League the largest supported football competition in Britain. Indeed, the three divisions of the Natiowide Football League can boast more spectators in one campaign than any other British sporting event or competition. Average attendances for last season were up more than 13% on the previous year's levels with Division One showing the most striking rise thanks to a 20% increase.

The Football League can also confirm that gates in the three divisions of the Nationwide Football League have increased by a staggering 6,000,000 spectators over the last twelve years since the introduction of the Play-Offs.

Average attendances for last season compared to the 1985/86 campaign - the last-season before the Play-Off system was introduced - show a phenomenal 72% increase. Division One leads the way with an incredible increase of more than 96% over the last decade, while Divisions Two and Three are boasting a 40% and 25% rise respectively. An attendance analysis of Nationwide Football League figures for last season in comparison to the 1985/86 campaign totals is detailed below.

In a remarkable week, the England international moved for £3m from West Ham United to Villa, played against Wycombe (conceding a penalty), and then moved back to Everton, his original club, also for £3m! During those few days several dozen Villa fans forked out around £50 for club shirts bearing the new signing's name. Villa have now offered those fans full refunds! Remember that question for those quizzes in a few years time!!

### Just For The Record

(Some facts about today's visitors unearthed by Neil Smith)
Luton are accepted as the first club from the
South of England to turn professional -

doing so in the 1890s. At the time, the club's colours were a rather striking Navy Blue and Pink halved shirt and caps.

Whilst today's players often take on managerial and coaching duties in addition to their playing commitments, this has not always been the case. Luton were thus somewhat unique in the first season following the Second World War - Scottish International Dally Duncan was Player Manager, and wing-half Frank Soo was their Player Coach.

Duncan went on to become Manager outright and took the club into the First Division for the first time in their history in 1955. In their first season in the top flight the club produced the shock of the season when beating Sunderland 8-2 at Kenilworth Road - at the time Sunderland were the First Division leaders.

Duncan left in 1958 to manage Blackburn Rovers and Luton remained managerless until the end of the season. That season culminated in an F.A. Cup Final appearance when they were led out by Chairman Tom Hodgson.

Goalscoring centre forwards are numerous in the Hatters' past - MacDonald, Davies, Harford and Thorpe in recent years. Earlier, Joe Payne is best remembered for his 10 goals in a fixture with Bristol Rovers in 1936. He scored 83 times in just 72 League games and while still in Division Three, was capped by England. He scored twice on his debut against Finland - his only full international Another England international from Kenilworth Road was goalkeeper Ron Baynham. After playing his part in the Hatters' promotion to the First Division in the 50s, he was selected to replace the Wolves custodian Bert Williams. Capped three times in the space of two months, he was on the winning side each time. His international days came to an end however when Enaland manager Walter Winterbottom selected a Third Division keeper to replace him - Coventry City's Reg Matthews.

I'm getting old. I know I'm getting old because policemen now call me 'sir' and because, if I was a footballer, I'd qualify for my pension before the end of the season. Another sign of age is the fact that the new season comes round so quickly these days. The last campaign seems all too fresh in the memory and what with the World Cup and the fact that the European campaigns have kicked off already, we really appear to have had no break at all this summer. I was in Switzerland a couple of weeks ago and they were already three games into their new campaign. However, the main reason for that is because they do something sensible in the bleak midwinter - they have a three week break.

#### Coupe de Monde

So, what did you make of the World Cup? Pretty much as expected I'd say. Three of my four tips for the semis lived up to expectations (I actually don't think it was possible for all of my tips to make the last four). I was very pleasantly surprised by Croatia, and badly let down by Spain. I watched the Spaniards knock four past Northern Ireland on the eve of the World Cup when they looked terrific. I then saw them leading 2-1 against Nigeria and again, I felt they looked a good bet to go far in the competition. At that point, I went out when I came back, they'd lost. Against Paraguay they were awful - they reminded me of England when faced by a poor side totally lacking in the ability to do something creative to win the match. Of course, in their final tie, Spain were superb. But by then, it was too late.

And what of England and Scotland? I get so fed up of following 'gallant losers and bravehearts'. The Scots got all offended when Norwegian Manager Egil Olsen stated they were the worst side in the Group. Results proved him

England played to the best of the team's abilities but lost to Romania and failed to beat a pretty ordinary Argentina. Sure we had Beckham to blame. His petulence and sheer immaturity let England down badly. But the signs at the end of the first half when Argentina equalised from a well-worked free kick was that they had weathered England's storm and were warming to the task in hand.

With a month and more of hindsight, I'm beginning to form an opinion of England's World Cup that's less coloured by the emotions of the fortnight when football fever rivalled Diana's death in the media stakes.

On the positive side, Gazza wasn't missed at all and Glenn Hoddle was vindicated in his decision to leave him behind. Secondly, youth was given its head. In past World Cups, England have come unstuck due to injuries to elder statesman such as Brooking and Keegan in '82 and Robson a few years later. The bonuses for me this time round were the emergence of players with real international calibre such as Campbell, Scholes and even Beckham (though he has to grow up - and quickly). Owen, of course was the real star and I can polish my halo and grin along with all those other pundits who were urging Hoddle to draft him into the England side back before Christmas.

#### **Negatives**

The negatives occurred both on and off the field. On the field, some of the players, Sherringham, Adams and Le Saux to name a few looked jaded mentally - if not physically - reflecting the fact that we play too many games in this country which clearly detracts from our international performance. The other negative is that we still lack creativity in too many departments. Ince, Batty and the back line will give their body and soul to England's cause, but I never once saw that telling pass that the likes of Dunga or Deschamps conjured on occasion that had the ability to turn a game.

Clearly, the real negative was off the field where the 'little Englander' mentality of the minority spoiled it for the majority again. There is a very sizeable minority among England's following who puport to follow the flag where the three lions with pride and will defend the fact that England is best to the last man. Unfortunately, they failed to realise that they were going to a festival not a war. Instead of celebrating and joining the party, they became entrenched in a battle zone and ahettoised themselves. I was in the USA in '94 and watched the Irish fans get drunk and have a party. As far as I could see, the Scots and every nation other than the Germans and the English did the same in France. It appals me that the English attitude is to get drunk and not have a party, but have a fight. And, though I may incur the wrath of the apologist, I feel that attitude is endemic in the majority who follow England. Too many around the edges get sucked into the bone-headed mentality of the hard-core nutters who are only out for a right. The result is that bottles get thrown rather than drunk from, and that the police go storming in with the obvious consequences.

Anyway, enough of my soap box. The new season is a time for optimism and expectation. Both Wycombe and Luton will be hoping for better things than the last couple of campaigns have produced. So, get behind your team and remember - Wycombe could be top of the League by the end of this afternoon. And at worst, they'll only be three points behind the leaders! Come on you Blues!



Although Adams Park seemed a long way away, Wycombe Wanderers connections kept cropping up. My boardroom colleagues Ivor Beeks and Graham Peart joined me in Toulouse for England v Romania and our club doctor Gina Allan was in Lens for England v Colombia.

I had a couple of nights out with former manager Martin O'Neill when we were in the south of France and shared a few drinks with ex-player Kenny Swain - who might have become Wycombe's manager before Martin - down in Marseille.

I will treasure some very special memories of France '98 and it's a subject I'm bound to come back to over the coming season - you've been warned!

#### **Toughest Yet**

After the World Cup I took a two week holiday in Italy, so I've managed to miss most of the so called British "Summer". Unfortunately, I also missed Wycombe's preseason friendlies so I'm not in the best position to judge our prospects for the coming season.

One thing that I am sure of - this will be our toughest season since we entered the Football League five years ago. The Second Division has never had so many clubs with wealth, support and tradition. Just consider the size of clubs like Manchester City, Fulham, Stoke City, Burnley, Preston North End and Reading.

Wigan Athletic have a multi-millionaire as chairman and the likes of Luton, Millwall, Oldham, Blackpool, Northampton and Notts County have all experienced life at the highest level of English football.

I detest the word "consolidation" but when you compare the size of Wycombe Wanderers to those clubs I have mentioned it makes you realise that we do well to compete so vigorously at this level. Nevertheless, we remain ambitious and there's no reason why we can't set our sights on a place in the top six.







Goals by Mark Stallard and Steve McGavin gave Wycombe Wanderers a 2-2 Second Division draw on Luton Town's last visit to Adams Park on 1st November 1997. The two sides drew a blank in the return fixture at Kenilworth Road four months later. Wycombe have failed to beat Luton in their four League meetings to date, while the Hatters triumphed here 1-0 in September 1996 with a goal from David Oldfield.

#### **Turner's Triumph**



Wayne Turner - a brief

Wycombe Wanderers' Former first-team coach Wayne Turner featured in Luton Town's 1981/82 Second Division title triumph. Signing professional as midfielder at Kenilworth Road in April 1978, he scored twice in 84 League outings for Luton prior to joining First Division rivals Coventry City for £75,000 spell at Adams Park as the Hatters as reserve in July 1985. He rejoined team coach under David

Pleat, then coached their first-team until replaced by John Moore in November 1997 and briefly moved to Wycombe in a similar capacity this summer.

#### Star Graduate

Former Wycombe Wanderers striker Viv Busby helped Luton Town to clinch promotion in 1969/70. A notable graduate from Wycombe's non-League days, he scored 19 goals in 50 Isthmian League outings for Wanderers prior to joining Luton in January 1970. He played alongside the likes of Malcolm Macdonald and Don Givens at Kenilworth Road, netting 16 times in 77 League games before following manager Alec Stock to Fulham for £25,000 in August 1973 after a loan spell at Newcastle United.

#### **Relegation Escape**

Wycombe Wanderers' former loanee striker Trevor Aylott was an influential figure as Luton Town managed to cling on to top-flight status in 1982/83, winning 1-0 at relegation rivals Manchester City in the final match of the season. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Millwall for £55,000 in March 1983, he scored ten goals in 32 First Division games before being swapped for Crystal Palace's Vince Hilaire in July 1984. He joined Wycombe on loan from Gillingham in March 1993, making three Conference League appearances as Martin O'Neill's side clinched the title that season.

#### **First Meeting**

Wycombe Wanderers' first League meeting with Luton Town was at Adams Park on 7th September 1996. Watched by 6,471, David Oldfield's secondhalf strike gave the following Luton team a 1-0 Second Division victory: Ian Feuer, Julian James, Mitchell Thomas, Gary Waddock, Steve Davis, Mervin Johnson, David Oldfield - he netted Ceri Hughes, Graham David (Tony Thorpe), Bontcho

Guentchev. The two sides drew a blank in the return fixture at Kenilworth Road seven months later and Luton reached the play-offs that season.

#### **Ever-Present**

One-time Wycombe Wanderers manager Mike Keen was ever-present in three consecutive seasons for Luton Town, including their 1969/70 promotion success. Following manager Alec Stock from QPR to Luton for £17,500 in January 1969, he became captain at Kenilworth Road and scored 11 goals in

145 League outings prior to joining Watford on a free transfer in June 1972. He became Wycombe's Manager for four years in April 1980 and his son Kevin played three games in Wanderers' 1982/83 Isthmian League Title campaign.

#### **Promotion Winner**

Wycombe Wanderers' former England Amateur international midfielder Peter Cruse featured in Luton Town's 1973/74 promotion campaign. Moving to the Hatters from Arsenal in July 1973, he made his League debut at Nottingham Forest on the opening day of that season and made three further Second Division appearances prior to joining Enfield in July 1974 after a loan spell at Shrewsbury Town. He played ten Isthmian League games for Wycombe during the 1976/77 title challenge.

#### **Much-Travelled**

Much-travelled midfielder Barry Silkman briefly played for both Luton Town and Wycombe Wanderers during his career. He joined Luton on loan from Plymouth Argyle in February 1979 and made three Second Division appearances while at Kenilworth Road. Moving to Wycombe from Crewe Alexandra in October 1986, he replaced the injured Kevin Durham and played six consecutive games in that season's Isthmian League triumph prior to joining Chelmsford

Born locally, he scored on his Wycombe debut in a 6-2 win at Woking in November 1966 and netted 19 goals in 50 Isthmian League outings prior to joining Luton Town in January 1970. He helped them to clinch promotion that season and had a Joan spell at Newcastle United before following Alec Stock to Fulham for £25,000 in August 1973.

An F.A. Cup finalist in 1975, he moved via Norwich City to Stoke City for £50,000 in November 1977 and featured in their 1978/79 promotion success. He was loaned to Sheffield United and Tulsa Roughneeks prior to joining Blackburn Rovers for £40,000 in February 1981, then York City as player-coach in August 1982. Helping to plot their 1983/84 Fourth Division title triumph, he also assisted Denis Smith at Sunderland before managing Hartlepool United for nine months, then assisted Howard Kendall at Sheffield United and Everton until last






