Welcome to a new season, and a new competition. Tonight sees the first matches in the Worthington Cup, the new name for the League Cup which has counted milk and Coca-Cola among its previous sponsors.

It was a bit of a Cinderella tournament when it started in 1961, but by the time the final was moved to Wembley six years later it was well on the way to being a much-coveted prize.

It certainly was in 1988 when Brian Stein's late winner brought the then Littlewoods Cup to Luton. It was the Milk Cup when Oxford won it two years before that.

Worthington, part of the Bass brewing and leisure group, are sponsoring the Cup to the tune of £23 million over five years, and as well as the change in name a few other new features make their debut in the competition this season.

Seeding has been introduced in the first round, so that lower division clubs who succeed get an opportunity to play one of the "big boys."

Carling Premiership teams not involved in European tournaments will join the Worthington Cup trail in a seeded second round, and the rest will come in at round three.

The sponsors are determined to do more than just throw money at football, and five lucky home fans will be able to discover that for themselves tonight.

Have a good look at your seat; five of them have attached to them a pair of tickets for next week's second leg game at Oxford.

And for your diary, the full schedule for this season's Worthington Cup is: Round two, first leg, week commencing September 14, second leg w/c September 21; third round w/c October 26; fourth round w/c November 9; fifth round w/c November 30. The first legs of the semi-finals will be played week commencing January 25, and the second legs week commencing February 15, The Worthington Cup final will be at Wembley on Sunday, March 21. And wouldn't Steve Davis look great walking up those steps to the Royal box?

We're going to win promotion. Or at least Arsene Wenger thinks so, and he should know. The manager of league and cup double champs Arsenal was full of praise for our lads after seeing us hold his Gunner's to a 1-1 draw at Kenilworth Road. "It was a fair result," he said. "Luton were a good team."

Nice work if you can get it... while we wait for a Whitehall decision on the Kohlerdome planning application, a lot of us will look enviously at the new stadium Reading have had built near the M4 to replace run-down Elm Park. And if we see Reading chairman John Madejski looking pleased with his club's new home when we play there later this month, there might be another reason for him to smile – he has just received £175 million from the sale of the Hurst Publishing Group to a venture capital company. Relegated after finishing bottom of Division One last season, Reading spent more than £1 million on new players in the summer.

Congratulations – to Gary Doherty and Liam George, who came back from Cyprus with gold medals for helping Ireland win the UEFA under-18 championship. An ear infection restricted Gary to two group games, but Liam played in every Irish match and converted their fifth spot kick in a penalty shoot-out victory over Germany in the final.

England were knocked out by Croatia, failing to get beyond the group stage. Incidentally – and this is one of the anoraks – Liam has the distinction of scoring the last-ever hat-trick by a visitor at Roker Park. He did it in our 5-2 FA Youth Cup victory last year, a few weeks before Sunderland moved to their new Stadium of Light.

The Reserves – kick off their season tomorrow (2pm) when Brighton and Hove Albion are the visitors to Kenilworth Road, for a match originally scheduled for August 19.

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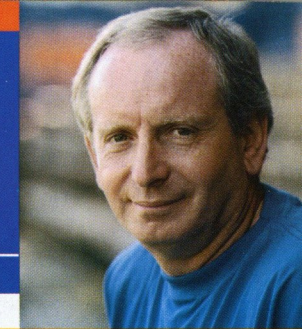

from the manager's chair



We could not have asked for a much better kick-off to the new season than we saw at Wycombe. It was our first opening day win since I have been here, and although the margin was small, make no mistake about it, we well deserved the victory.

The platform has to be a good back four, and after a couple of early scares the defence settled down to deny Wycombe any real openings, while we created several of our own.

Tonight it's a different competition and we welcome Oxford and their supporters for the revamped Worthington Cup. Because of the new seeding arrangement, it means that for the first time since I came to Luton we are entertaining a team from a higher division in the first round. So it will be harder to progress to the second round, as we have done in the previous two years. Hopefully we can give a good account of ourselves over the two legs against Oxford.

We are looking for a good start to the season. Having started with a good result at Wycombe we want to start our home campaign with two wins, tonight and against Preston in the league on Saturday.

We have started the league campaign badly in my two previous full seasons here, but this time we changed the nature of the pre-season training to some extent, and played fewer games. The aim was to be perfectly prepared for the start of the league season. Certainly, in our two prestige home friendlies, against Arsenal and Coventry, we looked sharp.

Pre-season results can be misleading, but I was well satisfied with the performances against Premiership opposition. We have never looked as sharp as this at this stage of the season before, and hopefully we can carry it through with a good display tonight. Having said farewell and good luck to David Oldfield, Darren Patterson and Gary Waddock, we have been busy trying to strengthen the squad.

We looked at the Bosmans available in this country throughout May and June, but the players we wanted required higher salaries than we thought they were worth. In two or

three cases when we identified suitable recruits for Luton, we were topped by bigger clubs. I was beginning to feel the Bosman ruling was working against Luton, but since pre-season I have changed tack. We have had as many as a dozen players on trial, many of them foreign, and we selected two we wished to sign.

So it is a pleasure to welcome Herve Bacque from Monaco. He did well in his three trial matches, and we wish him every success. We also welcome Ray McKinnon a midfielder from Dundee United and hope he too enjoys a good career with us.

We have, of course, welcomed back Phil Gray and Marvin Johnson after injuries, which to my mind means we have four new players in the squad to start the season. With Paul Showler nearing fitness again, it is five.

We have seen some good young players emerge, and if key senior players stay fit, and free from suspensions, and if the younger players continue to progress and develop, a challenge for a play-off place is certainly possible. And all of us in the club want that just as much as you do. Let's hope we all have a season to remember, for all the right reasons.

A cup win tonight would get our home season off to the right start, and hopefully we can give you that, and football entertainment as well.

Enjoy the game.

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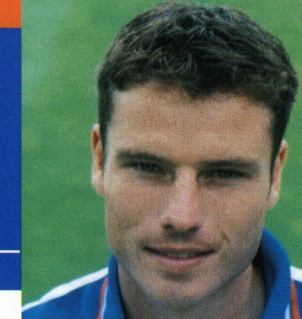

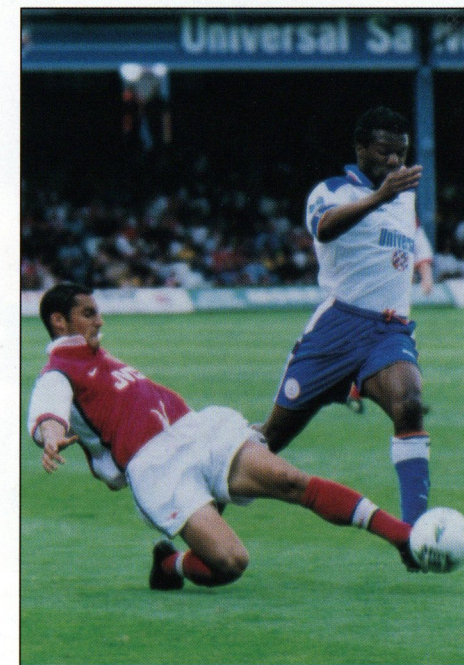

defend, and also give us a chance of progressing and hopefully draw one of the so-called "big fish."

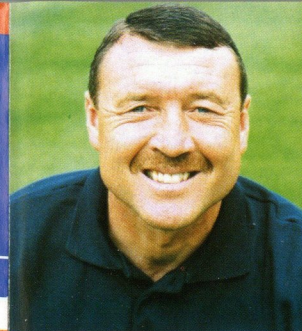

Malcolm Shotton (Manager)

Malcolm Shotton re-joined Oxford United in January 1988 as first team manager.

Malcolm joined Oxford in May 1980 and soon became a very popular figure at the Club. He made the no 6 shirt his own, forming a fearsome partnership with Gary Briggs at the heart of the United defence. His playing career really took off with the arrival of Manager, Jim Smith, at the Manor. Malcolm captained the side to consecutive title successes in the old Third and Second Divisions. Few could have envisaged that further success was to follow when in April 1986, against all the odds, the Club won the Milk (League) Cup, beating QPR 3-0 at Wembley.

Malcolm Shotton was sold to Portsmouth in 1987, after making 336 full appearances for Oxford. Later that season he joined Huddersfield and then on to Barnsley. He left The Tykes for Hull City and eventually joined Ayr United as Assistant Manager. He returned to Barnsley once again in 1994 as Reserve Team Coach.

Shotton was a popular choice for the Manager's job at the Manor following Denis Smith's move to West Bromwich Albion. He steered the Club to 12th position last term and is hopeful of further progress this season.

Nicky Banger; Date of Birth: 25.02.71

Nicky came through the ranks with his home town club Southampton. His big chance came following Alan Shearer's move from The Dell. In total, he played 94 games for the Saints. He joined Oldham originally on loan in October 1994, with the move soon being made permanent with a £250,000 deal, but his appearances were limited by injury. Nicky made the switch to Oxford in July 1997, scoring four goals in his first season at the Club.

Joey Beauchamp; Date of Birth: 13.03.71

Joey rejoined Oxford at the start of October 1995, 15 months after leaving the Manor for West Ham United. Local born winger, Joey came through Oxford's youth ranks making his debut on the last day of season 1988/89 against Watford. His appearances in the first few seasons were scarce and it was only after returning from a loan spell with Swansea City in season 1991/92 that he started to get a regular place in the United line-up until he became a regular before leaving for West Ham at the end of the 1993/94 season for a fee approaching £1 million. His stay in East London was brief and he did not make a first team appearance for them, and joined Swindon soon afterwards. Following a change of manager at the County Ground, he fell out of favour and took the opportunity to return to Oxford for a cut price fee. Joey was in sparkling form last term with 19 goals.

Steve Davis; Date of Birth: 26.07.65

Steve is an experienced centre-half, comfortable on the ball, and is also always likely to pop up with a goal or two. Birmingham-born Steve, began his professional career at Stoke City before finding his way to Dario Gradi's Crewe side. He made his League debut with the Gresty Road outfit, going on to make 140 league starts. After four years he made the move to Burnley for a £15,000 fee. He moved again, four years later, to Barnsley for £180,000.

Kevin Francis; Date of Birth: 06.12.67

Kevin began his professional career at Derby County but he really established himself in League football following a £45,000 move to Stockport County two years later. In his four years at Edgeley Park Kevin scored 88 League goals from only 147 starts. It was little surprise when he was signed by Birmingham City for £800,000. He continued to score goals for the Blues and played an important part in

their Second Division championship success in 1995. At 6' 7" his physical presence has always caused opposition defences big problems, both as a goalscorer and creator of chances for others. Kevin came to the Manor in February as part of the deal that took Darren Purse to Birmingham City.

Philip Gilchrist; Date of Birth: 25.08.73

Phil joined Oxford from Hartlepool for a small fee in February 1995. He made his league debut against Stoke City in December 1992 and hardly missed a game before joining Oxford. He was an instant success in United's side and scored his first ever team goal for United with a goal against Chester City. Has been virtually ever-present since making over 100 League appearances for the U's.

Danny Hill; Date of Birth: 01.10.74

Danny progressed through the youth ranks at Tottenham. He is a promising midfield player with 4 England Under 21 caps under his belt. Danny made 20 appearances for the London club but welcomed the chance to get first team football at the Manor Ground. He signed in June 1998 and big things are expected of him.

Martin Gray; Date of Birth: 17.08.71

Martin joined Oxford from Sunderland player at the Manor following his £100,000 move on deadline day in March 1996. A 5' 9" midfielder, who is equally at home in defence, he was spotted by the Roker Park side as a youngster while playing non league football with Ferryhill Athletic. Martin progressed through the Sunderland ranks at the same time as David Rush and spent five games on loan at Aldershot in 1991. Gray also links up with former bosses Denis Smith and Malcolm Crosby at Oxford, and made his United debut in the goalless draw with Wrexham before an injury cut short his second appearance against Blackpool at Easter. A committed performer expected to feature regularly in the United midfield this term.

Simon Marsh; Date of Birth: 29.01.77

Twenty one year old Simon made his first team debut as a youth team player at Brighton in September 1994 and has since had further games in the left-back spot. Simon, who progressed through the Youth ranks was rewarded with a pro-contract. His continued progress was recognised by England Under 21 Manger, Peter Taylor, giving Simon his international debut in the Toulon tournament in May 1998.

Matthew Murphy; Date of Birth: 20.08.71

Matthew, a midfielder player, was signed in February 1993 from Corby Town for a fee of £20,000. The former building society clerk was one of the Beazer Homes League's leading scorers prior to his transfer here. Matt is 26 years old and made his first team debut near the end of season 1992/93 in front of a full house at Newcastle. Did not feature in the first team during 1993/94 but came into the side last season initially following injuries to others, and his goal scoring prowess has made him an important member of the squad. A regular on the bench last season having appeared 15 times as a substitute - he continued to score his quota of goals despite his lack of games.

Paul Powell; Date of Birth: 30.06.78

Paul came through the ranks at Oxford and was signed as a professional following a successful time as a YT player. It was no surprise when he was awarded the 1996 'Young Player of the Year' award. Paul is a player who shows much promise - he is a fine athlete, with pace and skill on the ball. He has appeared in a variety of positions on the left side of defence and midfield. He made his debut against Chesterfield in 1996.

Les Robinson; Date of Birth: 01.03.67

Born in Shirebrook, 5' 0" Les Robinson was signed from Doncaster Rovers for £150,000 just prior to the 1990 transfer deadline. Les had been a midfield player but came to Oxford's attention after switching to full-back. Injury meant Les did not make his debut until the last game of the 1989/90 season but was then a regular until picking up a long term injury which kept him out for nearly ten months. 'Robbo'

remains a popular and consistent performer in the rightback position last season, winning the Supporters Player of the Season award.

David Smith; Date of Birth: 26.12.70

Liverpool born David, 27 years old, joined Oxford in the Summer of 1994 for a fee of £100,000 from Norwich City. He played just 23 times in the previous four seasons and jumped at the chance of first team football here at Oxford. The midfielder has now made over 200 appearances for United.

Andy Thomson; Date of Birth: 01.04.71

Experienced striker, Andy first caught the attention with Queen of the South in his native Scotland. Southend invested £250,000 to secure his services. He was troubled by injuries during his time at Roots Hall but is looking forward to a new start at the Manor Ground.

Phil Whelan; Date of Birth: 07.03.72

Signed in a £170,000 deal with Middlesbrough in June, 1997. Phil first came to prominence in his days at Ipswich Town. Whilst with the Suffolk club, Phil broke into the England Under 21 side making four appearances. He made the move to 'Boro for £300,000 but found it difficult to establish himself as a regular first team player at the Riverside. Phil was involved in a tragic accident with team-mate David Smith at the Hawthornes which left Phil with a broken leg. He has fought back to regain fitness and will be pushing hard for a first team place this term.

Philip Whitehead; Date of Birth: 17.12.69

Phil a 6' 3" goalkeeper, joined Oxford in November 1993 following a month's loan from his previous club Barnsley for a tribunal set free. He started his career at Halifax and made his debut for his home town club against Burnley in September 1986. He was never a regular keeper in this time at the Shay until his final season, 1989/90 when he joined Barnsley for a £60,000 fee. In his four years at Barnsley, Phil made just 16 appearances but spent loan period back at Halifax, Scunthorpe (twice), Bradford City and Stockport. Has become a first choice keeper at Oxford since his signing, hardly missing a game. He has now completed over 200 games as the regular number one at Oxford.

Brian Wilsterman; Date of Birth: 19.11.66

Dutchman, Brian, joined the Club from Belgian club, Beerschot, in February 1997 in a deal worth £200,000. His twelve year career has also included spells at Dutch clubs NEC, S V V, 'Go Ahead Eagles, Dordrecht and Vitesse Arnhem. His first start for Oxford came against Crystal Palace in March 1997, and made 14 League starts last season.

Dean Windass; Date of Birth: 1.4.69

Dean is United's record signing at a fee approaching £470,000. He joined the Club from Aberdeen in July. He was delighted to link up again with his former youth team manager from Hull City, Malcolm Shotton. Dean spent two and a half years with the Scottish club after they won the race for his signature in 1985. Dean joined The Dons for a fee of £800,000 in December 1995. He can perform both in attack and midfield, and great things are expected of him at Oxford.

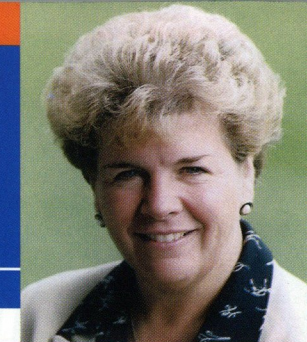

In offering a very warm welcome to all supporters for our first home game of the season, I will be interested to hear from our fans how they react to a change of ticket policy for this cup-tie.

Normally, as you probably know, cup-ties at Kenilworth Road are all-ticket, and that is done for the convenience of season ticket holders, who like to claim their own seat.

But last season we heard from supporters who did not like the idea of having to buy tickets in advance. We listened, and that is why for tonight's game, as an experiment, we have made it a simple pay-on-the-gate occasion.

But that, of course, means that seats are unreserved. And perhaps there will be season ticket holders who are not so keen on the idea.

But as the chairman said in the programmes for the Arsenal and Coventry matches, we know we are in the entertainment business, competing for customers, so we have to listen to what the customers say. So, if you have a view on the subject of ticket arrangements, please write to me and let me know.

Tonight's match, of course, is for a new trophy, the Worthington Cup, the latest version of the League Cup in which we and Oxford have both enjoyed some fair amount of success, Oxford winning the final in 1986 and we enjoying success two years later.

Much has changed in football since then, and one difference tonight is the substitutes rule: for the first time in this competition, the teams can use any of three of five named subs.

While first team fixtures inevitably take priority with supporters, don't forget the reserves start their season tomorrow (2pm) with a home match against Brian Horton's Brighton Reserves. Admission is free to season ticket holders. Others pay £2, half-price for under-16s and senior citizens.

A similar pricing policy will be in force tomorrow week, when we host a prestige friendly. The Kuwaiti national squad is on a tour of this country, and they will bring a team to Kenilworth Road to play a Luton Town XI, kick-off 2pm.

Finally, we have now received our ticket allocation for our game at Reading later this month. See the ticket news page for details.

In the meantime, enjoy tonight's game, and the second leg at Oxford next week, if you can get to the Manor Ground to support the team.

Into the Archives

a blast from the past courtesy of Roger Wash

In welcoming Oxford to Kenilworth Road this evening, thoughts will obviously go back to the last time we played United in the competition when, in 1988, we were paired together in the semi-final of the Littlewoods Cup, as it was then known.

We had battled through to the semi-final stage and, for the Hatters, it was uncharted territory reaching this far. United were one up on us, having won the Cup two years previously when they were comfortable 3-0 victors over Q.P.R.

Having beaten Oxford 7-4 in the league at Kenilworth Road the previous Saturday the Luton supporters who made their way to the Manor Ground were fairly confident of at least a draw to take back for the second leg.

The pitch had been covered in snow, which was now thawing to reveal a slippery surface but this seemed to suit the Town who were first to go close when Mick Harford brought a flying save from ex-Hatter Alan Judge. Luton keeper Les Sealey was forced to tip over a 30 yard effort from Trevor Hebbard while at the other end Harford appeared to be tripped by Tommy Caton but referee, Keith Hackett, would have none of it.

The breakthrough came five minutes before the interval when Harford and Brian Stein exchanged passes before the latter drilled a left foot shot past Judge from 20 yards.

Only 33 seconds after the interval Oxford were level when Judge's long clearance enabled Dean Saunders to beat Mal Donaghy for speed before falling over. The referee, still 40 yards behind play, pointed to the spot with Saunders sending Sealey the wrong way with his kick to keep up his record of scoring in every round.

The Town players were incensed when Saunders and Donaghy were involved in another tussle with the result that a second penalty being awarded. This time Sealey listened to the advice of Danny Wilson, who played with Saunders at Brighton, and went the right way to save the kick.

The drama was not yet over as Saunders went over for a third time in the area, which looked the most blatant penalty of the lot but the referee waved play on.

Afterwards, Saunders expressed surprise that the referee had awarded the first penalty from so far away and admitted that the second was no more than a little bump!

Although the Town had beaten United twice in the

league during that season the second leg could not be looked on as a foregone conclusion. United quite liked playing on the Town's artificial surface and had won on it twice previously.

The second leg was played on a Sunday afternoon to accommodate a live T.V. audience. Even seasoned professionals like skipper Steve Foster were tense before the start as the feeling around the ground was that the Town had done the difficult job at Oxford. All Foster could do was trot out the old cliché about it being 'Only half time.'

On the pitch the Luton players were heartened to see creative midfielder, Trevor Hebbard, lining up as a sweeper for Oxford. Whatever the formation, the Town stuck to their game plan and attacked from the start and by the interval were two goals up and strolling.

Firstly Brian Stein took advantage of a clever cross from Rob Johnson to head the ball powerfully into the top corner of the net and then, after Tommy Caton was judged to have fouled Harford, Ashley Grimes curled a sweet left foot free kick over the wall for number two.

The Hatters easily contained Oxford in the second half with Les Sealey having only one save to make while at the other end both Wilson and Stein went close to adding to the tally.

The Hatters were going to Wembley and I think we all know what happened next!

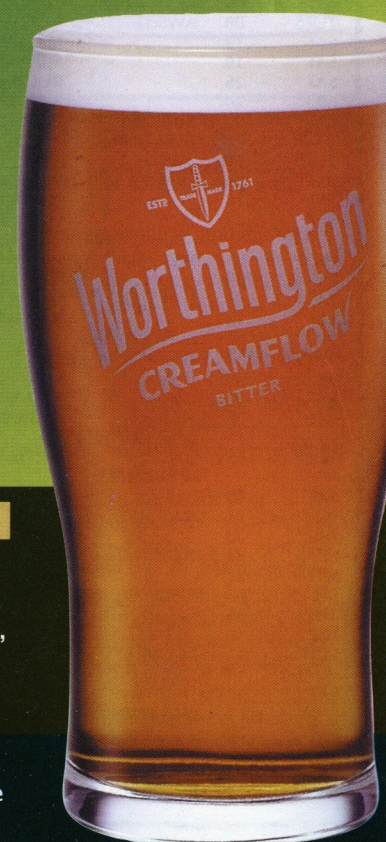
