Alexander shoved his keeper away after a noseto-nose debate about a conceded corner but, with that aggression channelled more constructively, there was only ever going to be one winner at Kenilworth Road.

Johnson received his marching orders nine minutes after the interval when he got into a dreadful tangle just inside his own half.

An attempted dummy became a stumble and Gregory suddenly had a clear run on goal.

With few options left, Johnson pulled the Colchester man down and it wasn't a surprise when referee Roger Furnandiz pulled out his red card.

## SACRIFICED

Phil Gray was subsequently sacrificed to a mixture of catcalls and claps from the home crowd with Mitchell Thomas filling in at centre back.

Gray had a frustrating afternoon and had was abused by sections of the Kenilworth Road crowd after missing a gilt-edged chance in the third minute of first-half injury time.

Matthew Spring's vicious volley was only palmed into Gray's path by Colchester keeper Carl

Emberson but, the Hatters striker hit his point blank shot straight at a prostrate Emberson who hadn't had time to recover from the first shot.

Gray had exited the action by the time his partner Douglas broke the deadlock on 62 minutes.

Seconds away from being replaced himself and perhaps heading for another spell in the reserves, Douglas' timing could not have been better.

His goal owed a lot to the persistence of Sean Evers and a kind bounce but he made the most of his luck with a tidy side-footed finish into the bot-

Six minutes later, the hard-working forward could have had a second when he raced on to a searching pass from the impressive Gavin McGowan but dragged his shot wide.


Davis and McGowan both enjoyed outstanding afternoons with the ever maturing Matthew Spring not far behind.

Sale wasted their only real opportunity of an equaliser on 72 minutes when he rode a wild challenge by Steve Davis and bamboozled Thomas before shooting weakly at Kelvin Davis.

After last season's Kenilworth Road problems, manager Lawrence

was pleased to get over the mental barrier of winning at home for the first time this season.

He said: "It was pleasing to pull out of the fire like that after going down to ten men. We were always in control and I was happy that Douglas got on the scoresheel because he has worked hard for that."
