# Lennie's Roverhe moon

LENNIE LAWRENCE watched his young guns claim another notable scalp on Saturday and then included them as part of the "strongest squad" he has ever had at Kenilworth Road. Bristol Rovers were the latest victims of a Hatters performance full of vigour, enthusiasm and

running which left their happy manager gushing with praise.
"These players are showing a great commitment to the club," Lawrence said after Saturday's

2-0 victory. "Half of the players have been raised here and this is the strongest squad I have had Alongside the youngsters, the old heads are also playing their part with top marksmen Steve Davis and Graham Alexander scoring the goals and Ray McKinnon turning in a performance

that suggested he is ready to fulfil his pre-season promise. The Scotsman enjoyed an outstanding first half full of vision and, as he tired before eventually leaving the field with a sprained ankle, 18-year-old pair Michael McIndoe and Matthew

Spring ensured the Hatters' midfield didn't flag too badly. Spring continues to grow in confidence by the game and, on Saturday's evidence, McIndoe deserves to keep his place in the side after displaying left-wing skills Ken Livingstone would have been proud of.

Some of the Hatters high-profile names of recent times such as Tony Thorpe, David Oldfield, Ceri Hughes and Ian Feuer might all have gone but there can be no doubt that this current crop of youngsters want to play for Luton Town and Lennie Lawrence.

It was the willingness of another youth team graduate Stuart Douglas that got the home team off to a flying start on seven minutes. The hard-working striker tricked French right back tephane Leoni to make the space for a cross that Phil Gray left at the near post for skipper Steve Davis to coolly stroke home from six yards.

Clashes between these two sides have often ben billed as Hayles v Davis, the division's best striker against the division's best centre half, but few people could have imagined that this season the Hatters' captain would be challenging the ex-Stevenage striker at the top of the goalscoring charts. Davis, in fact, left Barry Hayles on the half-way line to join in the Hatters' attack and grab his fourth goal of the season

Two minutes later the home side's other defender turned goalscoring phenomenon Alexander doubled the Hatters' lead with his third of the campaign

The peroxide-headed full back stormed out of defence fed Gray just outside the visitors' penalty box and continued his determined run.
