IF TONIGHT'S entertainment matches what we enjoyed at Portman Road a week ago we're in for a treat - and Ipswich will surely know they face a bit of a problem even though the Town are a division below them.

A lucky bounce led to Ipswich's late winner, with the Town already having an away goal in the bank and looking capable of at least holding a classy home outfit.

And once more the bad news of another injury, with Ray McKinnon ruled out, led to the good news of the emergence of yet another 18-year-old mature enough to take his big chance. Jimmy Cox became the latest home-grown youngster to be given a debut, and his willingness to run at defenders, and get back to help out his own rearguard, gave every indication that he is on the threshold of a good career. Three of the four midfielders were 18-year-old boys playing like men - and Sean Evers, the midfield "veteran" is not 21 until next month!

He was part of a midfield which had pace and precision in its passing, and it was a shame that in a first half when counter-attacks often exposed Ipswich we could not find the telling final shot.

Evers went closest, but scuffed his shot when his powerful burst forward got him onto the end of a pass from Phil Gray. At the other end, the best first-half effort Ipswich produced was a header by David Johnson which Kelvin Davis held.

But in Johnson and James Scowcroft Ipswich possess a top quality attacking combination, each a potentially lethal foil to the other. They proved it two minutes into the second half, when Ipswich enjoyed a brief spell of domination: Johnson crossed from the right and Scowcroft was in the right place at the far post to convert the cross.

Luckily for us Johnson shot wide a few minutes later when a stumble by Marvin Johnson let him in, but the Town recovered their poise after that, with Steve Davis again the rock on which many attacks founded.

The Town gave as good as they got, with Richard Wright glad to shove an angled drive by Evers round a post, and offside intervening when Stuart Douglas netted from an incisive pass by Matthew Spring.

That was the sighter: Douglas got it exactly

right in the 60th minute to equalise from an opening made by his own persistence and a canny pass by Evers.

A draw looked the likely outcome as each side dealt with the best the other could offer, only for the Town to concede a scrappy goal 10 minutes from time: Gavin McGowan went to head clear from a long cross, and when the ball rebounded off Matt Holland, it fell to debut defender Manuel Thetis, who accepted the chance and his good fortune with easy expertise.

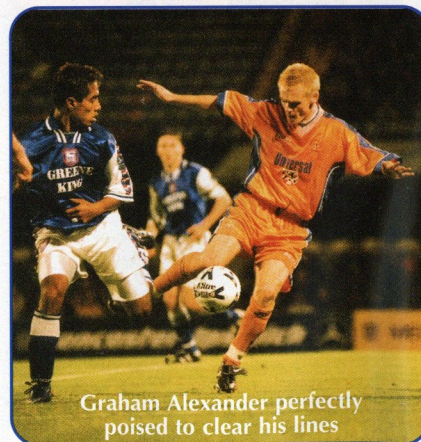

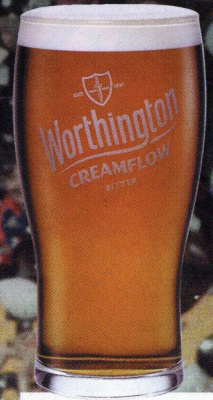

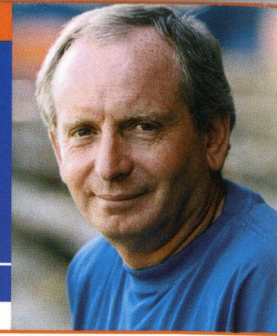

IT'S A FAN THING

from the manager's chair



IT IS a pleasure tonight to welcome First Division Ipswich Town for a cup-tie which is finely balanced after our close encounter last week.

I hope we see something similar tonight: at Portman Road it was an entertaining match, with good football played by both sides. We felt unlucky not to gain a draw on the night. Tonight a 1-0 win over 120 minutes would put us through to the third round of the Worthington Cup, but we are looking to score two or more, as we always should at home. We know we will have to be careful, and not give space to Ipswich for counter-attacks. We must play with our heads, as well as with our hearts. I believe we are capable of doing the job tonight, but don't forget we are meeting a team that finished in the Division One play-offs last season, and might well do it again this time round.

There is a big gap between divisions, but we want to be in the First Division again next season so tonight will enable us to check on our progress. We are under no illusion: Ipswich are a

quality team, and to beat them is a tall order. And we will have to keep a close watch on their front men - David Johnson and Jamie Scowcroft are a tremendous partnership, and certainly there is nothing to match them in our division. But if we can get up a head of steam all things are possible.

I expect it to be a close game, but we are up for it, and we're well prepared. We even practised taking penalties yesterday, just in case! Over two legs, you would normally take the Division One team to come out on top against Second Division opposition, but football has a habit of throwing up exceptions to prove the rule, and this is a cup-tie which might do just that.

I suspect our present team is the youngest Luton Town have fielded for many a long day, and might even be the youngest ever.

Jimmy Cox was the latest to make his debut at Ipswich, and he was tremendous in a very young midfield.

Ray McKinnon was hoping to be back tonight after injury, but to see our boys becoming men so quickly augurs well for the club.

And much as we want to win tonight, and perhaps line up a "glamour game" in the next round, promotion back to the First Division is still the number one priority.

Supporters can help us, and I hope there will be a good atmosphere in the ground tonight.

If we are to have success, in the League and in the cups, we must have a solid home record. We scored twice in the first nine minutes in our last home game, and there was a lesson in that: Bristol Rovers didn't start playing until they were two down, and then it was too late. It might be asking a lot to do the same against tonight's opposition, but the need to score before they do is obvious enough.

We produced a winning recovery at Oxford after going two goals behind, but I suspect Ipswich are a better side than Oxford.

If the fans get behind us, anything is possible. I hope the supporters of both sides can leave the ground tonight with pride in their team, whatever the result. And I hope we all enjoy the game.

Richard Wright

Very highly-rated youngster who progressed through the ranks at Town to become first choice in the 1995-96 season. Capped by England at youth team level and was called up to the full squad.

Jamie Clapham

Started his career at Tottenham where he made his one and only league appearance in the 1996-97 season. Went on loan to Leyton Orient and Bristol Rovers before arriving at Portman Road on a similar basis. Jamie impressed manager George Burley so much that the club forked out £200,000 to sign him on a permanent basis.

Mauricio Taricco

Hails from Cambridge and joined Town's Centre of Excellence. Has progressed from there into a promising young central defender and joined the senior squad last season.

Mark Venus

Made his league debut for his hometown club in the 1984-85 season before being snapped up by Leicester. Spent three seasons at Filbert Street before heading to Wolves in the 1987-88 season. He clocked up 287 league appearances for the Molineux club, scoring seven goals before joining Ipswich in the summer of 1997 in a deal that saw Steve Sedgley move the other way.

Kieron Dyer

Home grown talent who has come up through the ranks to win a first team place. Quick, skillful midfielder who has recently signed a new contract at Town. During the summer of 1997 Kieron represented England in the Youth World Cup and has gone on to win Under-21 and B honours.

Matt Holland

Highly-rated young utility player who is a good passer of the ball and signed for Ipswich for a fee of £800,000 at the end of July 1997. He was previously Bournemouth skipper and had been the club's Player of the Year for 1995-96. Made a great start to his Town career by being named as the Supporters' Player of the Year for the 1997-98 and was an ever present in

Marco Holster

Talented young player who joined Town in the summer as a free transfer under the Bosman ruling. Holster is the latest in a long line of Dutchmen to arrive at Portman Road and his sweet left foot might even revive memories of Arnold Muhren's days at Town back in the 1980s.

Richard Naylor

Another who has graduated through the youth ranks at Portman Road and made his first team debut in the 1996-97 season. Strong, competitive striker who goes by the nickname of BamBam. Scored his first senior goal in the Coca-Cola Cup win over Gillingham in 1997.

James Scowcroft

Came through the youth ranks to stake his first team place in the 1995-96 season. James has now cemented his place in the senior side with a string of outstanding displays. Regular in the England Under-21 side, he can either play as a target man or drop off in to deeper positions in midfield.

David Johnson

An amazing 20 goals in only 31 League appearances shows you the impact Johnno made at Portman Road in his first season at the club. The England schoolboy international grew up at Old Trafford in the same junior side as David Beckham, Gary Neville and co but had to move to Bury in 1995 to get his first outing in League football. A £1 million move to Town in November 1997 sparked off an avalanche of goals as he finished the season Blue's top scorer. Was chased by three countries to represent them last year, Northern Ireland, Jamaica and England and was even in with a chance of going to the World Cup with the Reggae Boyz.

Alex Mathie

Began his career in Scotland with Celtic, making 11 League appearances before moving on to Morton. He soon came to prominence, banging in 31 goals in 74 League games and Newcastle moved in to sign him for £285,000. But his first team outings

were restricted at St James' and Town swooped in February 1995 with an offer of £500,000 taking the Scottish striker to Suffolk. A fast, effective goalscorer, many feel that Mathie was unlucky not to get a chance for Scotland last year after showing he was back to his best after shoulder injuries curtailed his 1996-97 season early.

Mick Stockwell

Versatile performer who has played in defence, midfield and even upfront as an emergency striker. Joined the club in 1981 after having trials as a youngster at Leyton Orient. Voted Supporters' Player of the Year in 1992-93 and was awarded a well deserved testimonial in 1993-94. Signed a new two year contract in the summer of 1996 and was one of Town's most consistent performer last season.

Adam Tanner

Made a sensational start to his first team career by scoring on his debut against Leicester in a 4-1 win on January 2, 1995. Then followed that up with a spectacular winner against Liverpool at Anfield. Had been a regular in the reserves until tasting senior action and is at home in the centre of midfield, although he can play in the heart of the defence just as comfortably as he showed last season.

Bobby Petta

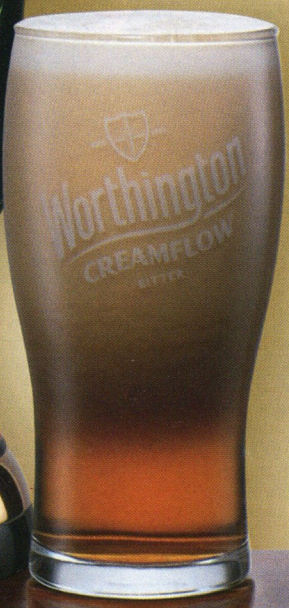
Flying Dutchman who was a sensation for Blues on the wing last season. Capped by Holland at Under-18 and Under-21 level, he made his Town debut against Manchester City in front of the Sky cameras in 1996. Had a disappointing campaign that year but more than made up for it last season where his pace and exciting skills made him a big favourite with the crowd.

Danny Sonner

Was at Burnley for three years but chose to further his career abroad in Germany. Recommended to Ipswich by former England star Tony Woodcock, who is managing out there, and the Northern Ireland B cap arrived from Preussen in the summer of 1996 on a free transfer.

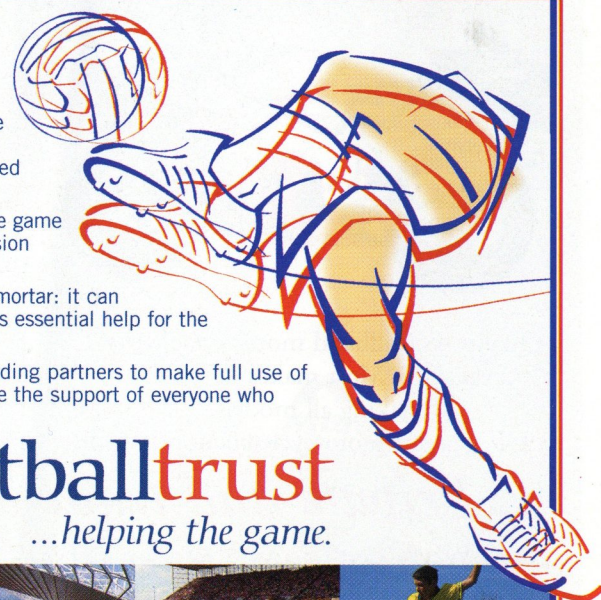
ALTHOUGH we are still very much in the tie, we were a little disappointed not to draw at Ipswich last week.
