A RED card which left the opposition fuming paved the way for the Town to break down a team which seemed to have come to Kenilworth Road to defend and survive.

It also made Andre Scarlett, another 18year-old product of the Town's youth system, into an instant hero. His 25-minute debut led to Scott McNiven's rash tackle and red card, and ended with his first-ever league goal.

But there was a lot of frustration before the dramatic finale in which referee Raymond Olivier took centre stage.

Battling to avoid relegation - this fourth away defeat of the season dropped them into the bottom four - Oldham opted for a back five and a three-man defensive midfield, apparently hoping for a draw at least, and perhaps a win with a goal on the break.

They might even have achieved it, because Kelvin Davis had to make a top class save to keep out a thundering longrange drive by Mark Allott in a first half the Town dominated without getting to close quarters.

Oldham swamped the midfield and it took us 59 minutes to get our first shot on target, a low drive by Ray McKinnon that was comfortably saved.

Lennie Lawrence sent on three subs in quick succession to try to find the formula to unpick a massed defence, with Steve Davis converted to a striker and Scarlett operating on the left wing.

He may be small, but Scarlett made a big impact, with pace and trickery setting new problems for Oldham.

Scott McNiven was sent off in the 71st minute for serious foul play, for a tackle which the ref said could have caused serious injury to Scarlett.

Oldham boss Andy Ritchie was furious as he saw his gameplan wrecked - he was frightened to talk about it after the game on the grounds that he might incriminate himself with the FA if he spoke his mind. He might recall that, while Lawrence thought McNiven was "a bit hard done by" Paul Reid had escaped with a yellow in the first half for unloading McIndoe with a challenge that looked equally as bad as McNiven's.

The enforced change at last made a little space available, and Ritchie was doing his nut for a second time soon after McNiven's

departure when Phil Gray escaped his markers on the edge of the six-yard area to head in a cross by Graham Alexander.

That forced Oldham to be more adventurous, and Davis made another good save to keep out a piledriver by Lee Sinnott.

But five minutes into stoppage time Andrew Fotiadis won a crucial challenge in midfield, and Oldham were stretched and out of sight as Sean Evers burst forward. The keeper pushed out his crossshot, but Scarlett raced in to snap up the close-range chance.

The result was well deserved, but the Town manager was only too well aware of how narrow is the line between victory and defeat. It had been frustration against a dour and defensive formation for 70 minutes, he said. The worry was that you can all too easily go a goal down in such circumstances.

"We took the plunge with substitutes, and that worked," said Lawrence. "And the sending-off helped us. We found them difficult to break down for a long time, but in the end it was a convincing victory."

THREE more home points at the expense of Oldham was a very satisfying return from a game that was never going to be easy. We deserved to win, but there is always a danger in matches like Saturday's that you can be caught out.

The same is true tonight: Northampton's visit is a potential banana-skin, and we must make sure we do not slip up.

Oldham certainly set us a few problems. In previous games they had used a 4-4-2 formation, but they came to us with a back five, and their intentions were obvious. I don't criticise them for that: they are having a difficult time and I suspect many teams will come here with the aim of avoiding defeat.

I thought we did OK in the first half, but the final pass and cross lett us down. The wind didn't help, either. Oldham defended well - but it's only very rarely that teams can keep up that standard of defence for the whole 90 minutes. The danger, which we spoke about in our dressing room at half-time, is that however much attacking you enjoy one silly mistake can cost a goal. Our feeling was that we are always capable of scoring at least one, and I recall telling the players at half-time that if we had to wait until 85 minutes and then get a scrappy goal, that would do.

In the event there was nothing scrappy about the 82nd-minute header by Phil Gray - he was alive and alert to meet an excellent cross by Graham Alexander. By then we had made our team changes, and it was certainly a 14-man game on Saturday. We needed everyone who was in the squad, as events proved.

Andre Scarlett took his chance to make an impression on his debut, and we are all pleased for him. He is still a young man, but once again it was a case of if you're good enough, you're old enough.

I have seen all our reserve matches this season, and recently Scarlett had done more than enough to impress me and prove that he was ready for a taste of the first team.

Jimmy Cox and Michael McIndoe have also made the breakthrough this season, and the long-term future of the club is looking very promising.

The short term, however, is still a concern, and we are looking at possible loan deals. But they can be tricky: you may recall the wretched luck we had with loan players who got injured as soon as we signed them, and it's not often you strike as lucky as we did with Rory Allen last season. He is the best loan signing I have ever made in my career. At the moment, while we are monitoring a few possibilities, there is no great urgency, and the return of Gavin McGowan after suspension is bound to help us.

Three more points tonight will also be very welcome, but we can be sure they will not be yielded easily by Northampton.

Like Oldham they have had an indifferent spell recently, but a draw at

confidence a boost, and certainly I expect them to move up the table before too long. We must work to ensure they do not do so at our expense tonight. My mind goes back to the last time they came here, on Boxing Day, They went two up early in the game, but that match turned out to be a turning point for us, because we pulled it level and then had a very good run-in to the end of the season.

will have given their

We must make sure that tonight's game is not a turning point for Northampton, but we know they will give us a god game. They are a strong and determined team, and will probably be more attack-minded than Oldham were.

We will have to be a professional as we were on Saturday, and there is no reason to suppose we are not capable of another victory.


It would cement our place in the top six, set us up nicely for

SATURDAY'S match against Oldham was the first of three in eight days, and thankfully all the players involved came through it without injury.

There were the usual bumps and bruises, but nothing too serious. The worst was an ankle injury suffered by Marvin Johnson, but I do not expect it to keep him out of contention for tonight's match.

Ray McKinnon had a dead leg, but again I will be very surprised if it has not cleared up by tonight.

We winced during Saturday's game when first Michael McIndoe and then Andre Scarlett went down under strong challenges which brought action from the referee, but both are OK. McIndoe needed a little treatment on the field, but

Scarlett jumped out of the way of Scott McNiven's "tackle" very smartly, and to his credit got up quickly after being brought down. Our players are not encouraged to play it any other way.

One who has suffered a disappointment this week is Gavin McGowan, who has now completed a two-match suspension. He was hoping to be in with a chance of returning to the team tonight, if the manager decided on a change, but he twisted an ankle in training on Thursday, and if he had not been suspended I don't think he would have been able to play against Oldham.

He has worked very hard in the gym and on general fitness, and it will not take him long to be ready for first team consideration again.

Unfortunately Julian James has had a setback as he works to get over his broken leg, sustained at Bristol in April.

As you may recall both bones between the knee and ankle were fractured. One has healed, but the other has not knitted together as it should, so Julian will have another operation within the next week or two.

Then he will have the leg set in plaster again, ready for rehabilitation work six weeks later. Julian has taken the knock-back like the good pro he is, and we all look forward to him making a full recovery as quickly as possible. He should be well on the way before Christmas.

Luton Town the Modern Era



League is asking fans to name their own club's legends - full details of how you can have your say are on pages 34 and 35 of tonight's programme.


The League is looking for the Town's



Stop the take-over!

One of the most controversial issues facing football today is the question of BSkyB's attempt to take over Manchester United. The FA has expressed its doubts about the plan, and its effect on the game, and today David Sheepshanks, Chairman of the Football League, and Chairman of Ipswich Town, explains why he too believes the take-over should be resisted. Our own chairman, David Kohler, says he agrees with every word. Mr Sheepshanks writes:

THE PROPOSED take-over of Manchester United by BSkyB highlights the great importance for the FA Premiership of winning the case that the Office of Fair Trading is bringing against them in the Restrictive Practices Court early next year.

The OFT case essentially concerns the question of whether the Premiership may sell its broadcasting rights collectively on behalf of its members (ie the existing Sky contract) or whether it is acting as a cartel against the public interest, and that therefore such TV rights should be sold individually by clubs.

The Premier League and all those who have been members are vigorously defending their right to sell collectively, but it is ironic that the OFT should be pursuing a deal supposedly for the public good when actually their success would be to the detriment of the game and its supporters. It is certainly preferable to retain plenty of terrestrial coverage, but at least the current Sky contract ensures reasonably equitable distribution of monies among the top 20 clubs.

For the majority of Premiership clubs, successfully defending the OFT case provides the last chance of retaining the concept of a level playing field. This is vital for all supporters of the game who understand that wider prosperity among a greater number of clubs is needed to provide meaningful competition, and equally vital for the Nationwide League, for whom it cannot be allowed that they are cut adrift to satisfy the financial avarice of our most famous club in England.

This take-over can, in my view, only result in the widening of the gap between the richest and the rest, and for this primary reason it must be resisted

with the strongest possible force as being potentially anti-competitive, and against the public interest.

It is a fallacy to suggest, as some have, that what is good for Manchester United is necessarilly good for our game in this country.

Of course we want our best clubs to flourish, but not at the expense of their breeding ground. The strength of our game now and in the future will come from the strongest possible profesional competition, and this requires a level playing field among the Premiership, with a profitable and vibrant Football League structure to underpin and feed into it.

BSkyB have backed both horses: if the Premiership win the case then they have a seat at the Premier League table, with all the difficulties of conflicts of interest then to he confronted. How would the Premiership openly consider their options for the future TV arrangements with Sky at the table?

If the OFT win their case, then not only do BSkyB own our biggest club, but the door is open for other TV companies, eg Carlton with Arsenal, to conclude individual deals with a handful of our elite at the expense of the rest.

The consequences for our game would be huge, with half a dozen wealthy giants, and the rest of us scrapping for the crumbs under the rich man's table.

And where do the customers come in all this? We are in danger of seeing no further than the broadcasters as the final customer - but of course they are not the end user.

How long will the supporters put up with it? Many Manchester United supporters have shown they can see further than the end of their noses, and their pockets, unlike the directors of their beloved club.

They know that although the riches may be good for the club today, tomorrow they are in danger of being priced out and bored out, left to watch a less meaningful European Super League without the passion either on the pitch or in the boardroom. And What are we to make of the secret meetings between Murdoch and the Berlusconi brigade?

The majority of Premiership clubs face being left behind as, of course, do the Football League.

It is a little known fact that 50,000 more people attend the 72 Nationwide League clubs in their matches every weekend than go to Premiership games.

It is a huge number of customers who care, and who can only be ignored at peril.

Some of us may feel uncomfortable trying to reconcile what is good for the game with living in a free market culture. There is no bigger free market economy than in the United States, where they are fiercely competitive in sport and in business, but by the same token must satisfy the most stringent regulatory bodies, particularly in the event of take-overs - far more draconian than here in the UK.

The philosophy is that a free market can only thrive with adequate consumer protection.

We have a free market economy here in football, but we lack controls to protect us from ourselves, hence the advent of the Task Force and the growing political lobby that action must be taken. The game is enjoying unparalleled popularity, but our players and our clubs have overtaken the administration.

This must now be addressed with strong governance and with the adoption of firm standards and regulatory controls.

So where does this all leave us?

It is entirely logical that media companies should want to invest in highly profitable leisure and entertainment enterprises like top football clubs. Why should we stop them? In the long, even

medium, term, perhaps we should not resist, but indeed encourage it... but only after we have properly set the ground rules that provide for

competition on the widest sensible basis, in the public interest. I believe that until those ground rules have been set all such media take-overs should go on hold.


In American football the NFL television contract provides the equivalent of £40million to EACH of their 30 clubs.

Ignoring the amount, which from a Football League perspective at a club like mine is hard, the point is the level playing field and the culture is about equal opportunity for all.

Every club has a chance, and they compete like mad in packed stadia to a variety of TV audiences. A template for our Premiership perhaps?

Keeping the shareholders happy before, or without, the customers - that was surely never intended.

I think we need to rediscover the plot... and quickly.


Born in Birmingham 1957

Started his career as an apprentice with Shrewsbury Town in 1973 and went on to play over 300 league and cup games, scoring 58 goals and helped them to secure a place in the old second division for the first time in the clubs history. He then joined Sunderland in 1982 and played over 50 matches before joining Everton in 1984, where he achieved a League Championship Winners medal and a Cup Winners Cup medal. He left for Ipswich Town in 1986 and played in over 50 games before joining Birmingham City in 1988 during which time he played just under 100 games, his leadership qualities were such that he captained all of the sides that he played for with the exception of Everton.

lan's managerial career started as player-manager for Colchester United in 1990, the season following their relegation to the Vauxhall Conference, in his first season as a manager he secured them runners-up position behind Barnet and played 41 games, scoring 7 goals. His next move took him back to Birmingham City, this time as assistant manager to Terry Cooper in the latter half of 1992 and also played in 8 matches before joining Cambridge United as manager for the remainder of the season. His next managerial post was a

brief spell at Doncaster Rovers, where again he continued to play first team football before leaving Belle Vue and taking up his current post as manager of the 'Cobblers" in early 1995, and steady improvements saw promotion via the play-offs at Wembley in May 1997. With a tight budget he has assembled a squad which is capable of holding its own in Division Two and has fully deserved his two manager of the month awards, April 1997 and September 1997.

Following promotion to Division Two, Ian successfully guided the 'Cobblers" to a second successive play-off final with Grimsby after an exciting 3-0 home win against Bristol Rovers in the play-off second leg, to send the club through 4-3 on aggregate, only to lose at Wembley in front of a record Division Two crowd of 62.998.

ANDY WOODMAN

(Goalkeeper), Highly rated, bigkicking keeper who started his career as a trainee at Crystal Palace. Andy was allowed to join Exeter City on a free transfer, and only stayed with the "Grecians" for a brief spell before joining the "Cobblers" on a free transfer in March 1995. Andy has now made over 150 appearances for the Cobblers and was the only ever present player during the 1997/98 league campaign.

COLIN HILL (Defender), Current Northern Ireland International who has been capped on 27 occasions, the most recent being on 5th September 1998 for their European opening Championship Qualifier against Turkey. Signed for the "Cobblers" in November 1997 having just competed the final match of the Sweden season for Trelleborg. Colin started his career at Highbury as an apprentice and stayed with the "Gunners" for 5 seasons before joining Maritimo on a free transfer in the Summer of 1986. Returned to England with Colchester United in October 1987 and played in over 80 games before an £85,000 move from Laver Road to Bramall Lane in August 1989. He played just under 100 games for the "Blades" before a £200,000 transfer to Filbert Street in March 1992 where he played over 150 games for the "Foxes" before being released in the Summer and opting to play in Sweden.

TONY DOBSON (Defender),

Left-sided central defender, who can also fill in at left back. Tony started his career as an apprentice with Coventry City and was part of the squad that won the F.A. Youth Cup in 1987, subsequently he signed professional forms for the "Blues". He stayed at Highfield Road for four and a half years, playing over 50 top flight

matches them. In addition he was also recognised International level, gaining 4 England under-21 caps. In January 1991, Blackburn Rovers paid £300,000 to take him to Ewood Park, where he figured in 49 matches before a £150,000 transfer took him to Fratton Park in September 1993. He remained at Portsmouth for four years during which time he spent time on loan to Oxford United and Peterborough United, before he signed for West Bromwich Albion for an undisclosed fee. Tony left the "Baggies" to join the "Cobblers" in September 1998 for a fee of £22,500.

IAN SAMPSON (Defender),

Started out with non-league Goole Town before moving to Sunderland in November 1990. Signed by the "Cobblers" for £30,000 in August 1994 after impressing during a loan spell. lan was the only ever present player during 1994/95 season, and was loaned to Tottenham Hotspur for the Inter-Toto Cup. Ian has made the number 4 shirt his own since joining the club, only missing a handful of games due to suspension and injury. Has now played in over 200 games. Did not start this season until the Wrexham game on 29th August as a result of an injury sustained in a preseason game with Cambridge United.

JOHN FRAIN (Defender),

Signed on a free transfer from Birmingham City on transfer deadline day after some impressive performances whilst on loan earlier in the year, especially so when considering he had only just recovered from a double hernia operation. John started his career with the "Blues" as a trainee and spent over ten years there, playing well over 300 first team matches and was deservedly granted a testimonial. John was also in the Birmingham City team which played at Wembley in the Associate Members winning side of 1991. Will always be remembered by 32,000 ecstatic "Cobblers" fans for his last minute winning freekick at Wembley in the play-off final against Swansea City in 1997. Missed just one match last season, through injury.

IAMES HUNT (Midfielder),

Highly rated young midfielder who was signed on a free transfer during the Summer of 1997 when he was surprisingly released from Notts County at the end of his contract. lames displays plenty of determination along with good passing and vision, which he has displayed when called upon on numerous occasions this season. Has now played in over 50 games, including last seasons play-off

DEAN PEER (Midfielder),

Hard running midflelder with tremendous stamina, who can also play at the back. Progressed through Birmingham City's youth policy, played over 100 league games for the St. Andrews outfit and also appeared in the side which won the Associated Members Cup in 1991. Dean moved to Walsall on a free transfer in November 1993 and signed for the "Cobblers" during the Summer of 1994/95 after being released and has been a valuable squad member over the past three seasons playing in over 100 league and cup games.

DAVID SAVAGE (Midfielder),

A hard working midfielder with a stunning shot, who has appeared S times for the full Republic of Ireland squad in addition to the 5 caps he won at Under-21 level. David started his career in England with Brighton & Hove Albion, having signed from Kilkenny in March 1991. However he did not play for the "Albion" before signing for Longford Town in May 1992. Re-ioined league football in May







1994 when Millwall paid £15,000 to bring him to the Den, where he figured in over 150 games for the "Lions" scoring 11 goals in his four and half year stay at the club. Joined the "Cobblers" in a deal worth £80,000 on 7th Ocotber 1998.

ALISTAIR GIBB (Forward),

A promising young right winger who was bought form Norwich City for £30,000 in February 1996 after an impressive loan spell earlier in the season. Featured in 25 of the "Cobblers" first team matches throughout the 1995/96 season, scoring two goals. Ali has been featured regularly since his arrival and now is fast approaching 100 appearances for the "Cobblers

CARL HEGGS (Forward),

Started his league career with West Bromwich Albion in time for the 1991/92 season when they signed him from Leicester United for £25,000. He staved at the "Hawthorns" for three and a half years before Swansea City paid £60,000 for his services. Played against the "Cobblers" in the play-off final before signing at the end of July for a tribunal fixed sum of £40,000. Helped to achieve a second consecutive Wembley appearance with the first goal against Bristol Rovers. in his first game following a four match suspension.

PAUL WILKINSON (Forward).

Excellent target man who will weigh in with his fair share of goals. Former England under-21 International who started his career as a trainee with Grimsby Town. Everton paid £250,000 for his services in March 1985 scoring 16 goals from just 31 starts, collecting a Charity Shield Winners medal in 1985 and the League title medal in 1987 before moving from Goodison Park to the City Ground in March 1987 for £200,000. He spent just over a season with Nottingham Forest before a £300,000 move to Watford in August 1988. During his three

seasons there he figured in over 150 games, scoring 56 goals. He then moved to Middlesbrough in August 1991 for £550,000 and played just short of 200 games, scoring 66 goals for "Boro" and had loan spells with Oldham Athletic, Watford and Luton Town before being released on a free transfer in the Summer of 1996, signing for Barnsley. Paul was a major influence in helping Barnsley achieve promotion to the Premier League, as he had done with Middlesbrough two seasons earlier. Millwall paid £200,000 for him prior to the start of the 1997/98 season where he stayed for the season before agreeing to join Northampton in the close season on a free transfer.

DAVID SEAL (Forward),

"Cobblers" record signing when he signed from Bristol City in September 1997 for £90,000 part way through his loan period having scored four goals in just five starts (one being against Bristol City!! !). A natural goalscorer, most of which are spectacular signed for the "Robins" from Eendracht Aalast for £80,000 in October 1994. He went on to score 14 goals in just 26 starts during the 1995/96 season, finishing top scorer. However, he did not start a match during 1996/97 and only used a substitute on 13 occasions before he was granted a transfer from Ashton Gate.

KEVIN WILSON (Forward),

Former International who made 42 appearances for Northern Ireland and has now surpassed 200 first team goals. Started his career with Derby County who paid £20,000 for him from Banbury United in 1979. After scoring 41 goals in 124 starts for the "Rams" he was snapped up by Ipswich Town for £100,000 in 1985 where his goalscoring record remained just as impressive with 49 goals in 119 starts. Chelsea bought him from "Town" in 1987 for £335,000

during which time he scored 55 goals in 155 starts before being transferred to Notts County in 1992 for £225,000. The "Magpies" granted him a free transfer to Walsall in 1994 via a brief loan spell at Bradford City. After three years at Bescot Stadium he joined the "Cobblers" as player/assistant manager for the 1997/98 season.

CHRISTOPHER FREESTONE (Forward), Speedy striker who was signed permanently from Middlesbrough for £75,000 on Christmas Eve following a bright loan spell, where he scored both goals on his full debut against Plymouth on 20th December in a 2-1 win. Chris was signed by Middlesbrough for £10,000 in December 1994 from nonleague Arnold Town. His first team chances were limited and as such he was loaned to Carlisle United where he scored twice in three starts before being recalled. Although his time at the Riverside Stadium was brief, he did manage substitute appearances against Manchester United at Old Trafford and Leeds United at Elland Road last season. Scored the first hatrick of his career in the 3-1 away win at Plymouth Argyle in April.

GIANCARLO CORAZZIN (Forward)

Canadian International who has represented his Country on over 25 occasions. Started his career with Vancouver S6ers, before signing for Cambridge United in December 1993 for £20,000. During his three seasons at the "Abbey", he played in over 100 games scoring 43 goals before signing for Plymouth Argyle just before the transfer deadline, 1996 for £150,000. International call-ups for Canada limited his appearances, however he still managed to figure in 84 games scoring 24 goals before his contract expired. Signed for the "Cobblers" in July 1998, under the Bosman ruling.

Hatters On Card

No. 4: Barratt & Co Ltd Famous Footballers Series A3, 1955 ALTHOUGH the London confectionery firm of Barratts had been giving away cards with their products since the turn of the century, they are probably best remembered for the seemingly endless sets of Famous Footballers.

These were issued with what used to be called sweet cigarettes, but nowadays, for political correctness, are called candy sticks.

They first appeared just before the war, and continued most years until 1967.

The earlier sets are difficult to distinguish from one another, especially the pre-war issues, but in 1953 the company began numbering the series A1, A2 and so on.

Barratts had not featured many Town players - only Joe Payne before the war and goalkeeper Les Bywater just after it - but in Series A3 we find Bernard Streten on card 21.

Cards in this series were wider and almost square compared to the shape of the traditional cigarette cards, although the company reverted to the old style from the A4 series onwards.

The front of each card featured a head and shoulders pose in black and white - colour was introduced in 1960 - and a facsimile of the player's autograph.

As the text on the reverse of this card tells us, Gillingham-born Streten was capped for England at both amateur and senior levels.

His full international appearance was in 1949, in a 9-2 victory over Ireland, just a year after Streten had turned professional with Luton.

Despite this, he was not assured of his place in goal for us, and had to share first team duties with Welsh international lowerth Hughes. Streten was on the short side for a goalkeeper, but he was often spectacular and daring, and played many brilliant games during his ten years at Kenilworth Road.

He was rumoured to have a sweet tooth, and when this became known he was well-supplied by the lads behind the goal.

Ironically, the next Luton player pictured by Barratts was Streten's last rival for the No. 1 jersey, Ron Baynham, who appeared on card 7 of the A4 series.

It was a mystery why Streten was never chosen by England again, after his one appearance in a winning team. Baynham won three caps.

Sadly, Streten and Hughes are now both dead. A copy of the Streten card illustrated is worth around £2.50 in top condition.



20th October 1966 Luton Town 0 Bradford City 0

The Town were now approaching their lowest ebb. Having suffered three straight defeats. including a 2-5 thumping by Notts County at Kenilworth Road, the team was drifting towards the bottom of Division Four.

Little wonder that a crowd of only 4150, which turned out to be the lowest of the season, rolled up on a miserable evening to see a game completely devoid of goalmouth action.

Missing Bruce Rioch through injury, the Town did not have a worthwhile shot on target all night with the Bantams content to settle for the point with which they had started.

What a woeful time!

20th October 1979 West Ham 1 Luton Town 2

The Town had already topped the Division Two table during the campaign and, following two sparkling home victories over Bristol Rovers and Sunderland, they had the chance to regain top spot if they could beat fellow promotion contenders West Ham at Upton Park.

Missing veteran Bob Hatton following a training accident the Town recalled Godfrey Ingram to the starting line-up for the first time that season. This enforced change did not seem to upset the Town and they started the brighter side, taking the lead after 16 minutes when Paul Price knocked back a David Moss corner for Brian Stein to sweep the ball home- his first goal of the season.

Centre-half Mike Saxby extended the lead on 35 minutes when he stole in on the blind side to head in a Moss free kick and by half time the Town were cruising comfortably.


In the second period the Hammers tried to make a game of it and Paul Allen reduced the deficit just after the hour mark, taking advantage of a punched clearance from Town goalkeeper, Jake Findlay. The Hatters then decided to defend in depth and the offside tactics and backpassing did not endear them to the Upton Park faithful but the players did not mind as they were back on top of the league.

20th October 1984 **Luton Town 3 Watford 2**

With both teams struggling at the wrong end of Division One the local derby scrap took on more significance than usual. The Hornets had more reason to be alarmed having won only once that season but they were the more lively side early on and took the lead when George Reilly headed in Nigel Callaghan's corner after eight minutes.

Frank Bunn levelled after taking advantage of a poor Richard Jobson back pass but Luther Blissett put the Hornets back into the driving seat soon after. Not to be outdone Bunn hit his second. slightly against the run of play, latching on to Brian Stein's incisive pass.

If the Hornets shaded the first half there was no doubt who took the second as, after Steve Elliott fired the Town in front for the first time on 61 minutes, there was only one likely winner as the Watford defence caved in and were lucky not to concede a hat-full.

The Hatters got off to a brilliant start to the 1968/69 season when they simply kept up the form that had seen them pick up the Division Four championship trophy at the end of the previous campaign. Backed by the wealth of club directors Tony Hunt and Reggie Burr, vast amounts of money, by Luton Town standards, had been spent on improving the facilities at Kenilworth Road and on strengthening the playing squad.

Brian Lewis, Mike Harrison and Laurie Sheffield were all signed for big fees during the close season and all made their debuts on the opening day of the campaign when Oldham were beaten out of sight at Kenilworth Road. The Town, in fact, went eight games unbeaten at the beginning of the season earning top spot in the process, but then things started to go wrong.

A 0-1 defeat at Brighton ended the unbeaten run but this was then followed by losses at Watford, Barnsley and Plymouth in quick succession. Cavalier football was all very well at home, where the Town still boasted a 100% record, but on their travels the same system was too easily countered by teams that packed their midfield.

Before the visit of Northampton at the end of October, manager Allan Brown decided to spend some more money in a bid to strengthen the Town's rearguard. Goalkeeper Sandy Davie was signed from Dundee United for £8000 while £10000 was handed to Crystal Palace for defender lack Bannister.

Both made their debuts as the Town entertained the Cobblers for the first time in the league since March 1937. Northampton had been in Division One as recently as 1966 but were now in free-fall and would be back in Division Four at the end of the season. They would therefore have completed a crazy roller-coaster ride of moving from Division Four to the top and back again in only nine years.

A crowd of 17818 gathered at Kenilworth Road to see the new boys as well as see whether the Town could extend their home run to eight straight victories since the start of the campaign.

Davie took over in goal from Bob Taylor who, in turn, had stood in for the injured Tony Read while Bannister slotted into a defence that was missing both Fred Jardine and skipper Terry Branston. The Cobblers included future Hatter, Bob Hatton who had scored twice on his Northampton debut the previous week.

By half-time the game looked over as the Town were two up and coasting. After 25 minutes Brian Lewis was body checked outside the Northampton box and Keith Allen floated in on the blind side to head Ray Whittaker's accurate free kick into the roof of the net.

Two minutes later Bruce Rioch was tripped on one of his typical surging runs towards goal. This time Lewis's free kick was deflected off the wall but the ball was fumbled by Cobblers goalkeeper Gordon Morritt with Sheffield first to react.

The Hatters received a rude awakening in the second period, however, as the Cobblers fought with a passion to get back into the game. Ably led by ex-Wolves and England half-back Ron Flowers, Northampton pressed the Town back and it came as no surprise when John Fairbrother netted from close range after a throw in was back headed into his path by John Byrne on 63 minutes.

Shortly afterwards Byrne kicked Bannister in the "groin" and was booked but spent the rest of the game being booed every time he touched the ball. It was generally regarded that he was lucky to stay on the pitch.

Northampton continued to press and it was more by luck than judgment that the Luton defence managed to hold out and it was from at least 15 minutes before the end that the supporters were calling for the referee to blow the final whistle.

By the time of the return, played at the County Ground at the end of December, quite a lot had happened at Luton Town F.C. Manager Allan Brown had been dismissed for "disloyalty" having applied for and failing to get the manager's job at Leicester. His place was immediately taken by Alec Stock who had been dismissed in controversial circumstances by Q.P.R. the previous summer.

Stock's first game in charge, just before Christmas, had seen the Town put on a sparkling show to beat Plymouth at Kenilworth Road in a match that saw the Pilgrims goalkeeper Pat Dunne pull off a string of amazing saves to keep the score down.

One thing had not changed, however, in that the Town had now lost seven away games on the trot scoring only one goal in the process.

For the Town's first league visit to Northampton by the people who brought me! since 1936, Alec Stock's simple instruction was

"impress me." This was easier said than done as the players had to scurry around seeking out rubber soled boots to counter the rock hard, icy surface

For some reason I decided to hitch a lift for the first (and last) time to a Luton game and amazingly was picked up within minutes- I certainly would not have given me a lift! At the ground the crowd was a best of the season 15161, a figure not subsequently beaten in a league game at the County Ground.

The Hatters adapted better to the treacherous pitch and took the lead after seven minutes when Brian Lewis stepped over a pass from the right leaving Bruce Rioch clear to blast the ball past Gordon Morritt in the Cobblers goal. The lead was doubled on 21 minutes when Morritt, attempting to clear the ball from the edge of the area, miscued it straight to Rioch who shot into an empty net from 30 yards.

Northampton rarely threatened after that with ex-Cobbler Terry Branston in commanding form and to cap a memorable day I was given a lift home by the people who brought me!


Evacuation Procedure



IF YOU had to choose just one Luton Town player to be named as the best the club has ever produced, in more than a century of football, who would it be?

You may recall a month or two ago that the Football League, to mark its centenary season, produced a national list of the best 100 players in the League's history.


As always the choices were open to argument, and now there might be a few more because the league has asked each club to find out which of its players can be named as its local hero.

As with the national list, it might just depend on your age, and how long you have been watching the Town.

Our own feeling is that to be called a legend you have to be a very special footballer. Thankfully, we have had a few of those over the years.

You could make a very good case for suggesting the late Joe Payne is the only





true legendary figure Luton Town have produced in that he is the only player we have who is in the record books.

It is unlikely that anyone will beat his ten goals in a match, against Bristol Rovers in 1936. And yes, we know the story that suggests he only got nine, and that George Martin disclaimed one to enable Joe to beat the then record of nine goals in a match.

Joe still holds another Town record that is likely to last for ever: 55 goals in a season, 1936/37 in Division Three South.

But those of us not old enough to have seen Payne play have some lovely memories of others who were and are legends of Luton Town.

When subscribers were asked to name their favourites for Roger Wash's new book, Mick Harford topped the poll. So is he the man who should represent Luton Town in the Hall of Fame?

What about Gordon Turner, our record goalscorer and a wonderful clubman? Or Bob Morton, our record-holder for appearances?

And would Mick Harford have been as good if he did not have the likes of Brian Stein, Ricky Hill, Mal Donaghy and Steve Foster backing him up?







FOR THE second consecutive match we are tonight meeting a team whose need for points is as great as ours, but for more unwelcome reasons. Northampton, like Oldham, are in danger of being dragged into the relegation mire, although a draw at Bournemouth on Saturday did us as well as them a favour.

Our victory failed to move us higher up the table because Stoke, Preston and Walsall, the teams above us, also won.

But Bournemouth, who were fifth and are still unbeaten at home, were pegged back by Northampton at Dean Court. Mark Stein's ninth goal of the season gave Bournemouth a first-half lead, but four minutes after the break Dougie Hodgson, on his full debut for the Cobblers after a £20,000 move from Oldham, cashed in on a goalkeeping error to equalise.

Bournemouth dropped a place, Fulham easing above them with a 1-0 victory at Millwall - Kit Symons scored a timely first goal for Fulham, in the 89th minute.

Leaders Stoke ended a run of three games without a win by scoring twice in the second half after turning round a goal down at Lincoln.

Preston stayed second by seeing off Colchester 2-0 at Deepdale while third-placed Walsall beat Blackpool 1-0 at the Bescot Stadium.

That was the third defeat on the trot for Blackpool, who were third three weeks ago and are now eighth.

Manchester City are beginning to look more like

the pre-season favourites tipped by the bookies for an instant return to the First Division: they bounced back from a midweek home defeat by Preston with a win at Wigan. Shaun Goater netted the only goal, his tenth of the season, to become leading marksman in the division.

Gillingham, our opponents on Saturday, kept their good run going - a 0-0 draw at Reading made it six games without defeat, since they were beaten at home by Northampton. Walsall are the other visiting team to take all three points from Priestfield Stadium. Bristol Rovers and Macclesfield escaped with draws, and Gillingham chalked up home wins at the expense of Wrexham, Burnley and Wycombe. They are away to Bournemouth tonight.

Wycombe are still adrift at the bottom of the table, but it was 13th time lucky on Saturday, when they managed their first win of the season, 3-0 at home to Macclesfield. That was the end of the Silkmen's run of three games without defeat, and they are still third from bottom, one place above Lincoln, who were promoted with them last season.

Oldham dropped into the bottom four for the first time this season because of their defeat at Kenilworth Road, and Reading and Northampton are hovering dangerously close to the dropping zone.
