WE WERE left to think wistfully of what might have been after the thrilling Worthington Cup run spluttered to a disappointing halt in front of the biggest crowd to watch us this season. Lennie Lawrence and players who had given their all at Sunderland had the frustration of not knowing how they might have fared if Mitchell Thomas had not been sent off, leaving ten men to try to cope with the power of a team which is running away with the First Division championship.


Both managers thought referee Eddie Lomas was harsh in enforcing the playercoach's second yellow card after 34 minutes. Other officials, said the Town boss, would probably have settled for a word of final warning for the foul on Nial Quinn, well outside the danger area at a time when Sunderland were starting to get frustrated at their inability to break the Town's resistance.

The boss added that the ref applied the letter of the law, and Thomas of all men should have known better than to risk a second caution after picking up his first ten minutes earlier for petulance in retaliation for a foul by Kevin Ball.

It was, of course, done in the heat of battle, which was the watchword for a Town side that was always going to be up against it with 11 men, let alone 10.

The need was to survive to the interval, to pile on more frustration for the home side and their fans. But within five minutes the ball was in our net, and after that Sunderland were too good to allow ten men's heroics to upset the steely resolve of 11.

The final margin was harsh - Sunderland scored twice in the last four minutes, when the Town were committed to all-out attack, with Steve Davis upfield as an extra striker. But the Town rarely looked like getting through an uncompromising defence which has let in only six goals in nine home games in the First Division.

Sunderland have lost only once in 27 league and cup games this season, ironically to Barnsley, the team we beat to qualify for Tuesday's quarter-

We never looked like repeating that upset, and Kelvin Davis was the man of the match for several outstanding saves. At the other end we mustered only one serious shot all night - a thundering drive by Paul McLaren which was tipped over the bar in the first minute of stoppage time. Sunderland had scored their second three minutes earlier, and wrapped it up with another quality strike after 92 minutes.

Sunderland boss Peter Reid'called the sending-off an amazing decision, and while he knew his team deserved to



the ball against his old club.

win added: "Luton never chucked it - they just ran out of legs at the end." Lawrence's view: "Three-nil was a bit harsh. One-nil would probably have been a fair reflection. I will always wonder - what if we had got to half-time with it still 0-0 and 11 men on each side? It wasn't to be, but our players did everything they could - they never let themselves down.

"The referee was entitled to send off Mitchell Thomas who foolishly was guilty of two bookable offences. But is the spirit of the law dead? If everyone was sent off for fouls of that nature, we'd finish up with five a side football."



from the manager's chair



OUR Worthington Cup hopes ended in disappointment and frustration at Sunderland, but I was proud of the way our players acquitted themselves in very difficult and demanding circumstances. We went to the Stadium of Light hoping our players would be able to play their own game without being over-awed by the occasion, and that proved to be the case,

We had restricted Sunderland to only one chance, and were hoping to get through the first hour or so without giving anything away. The game plan was working, and you could sense that the home fans were starting to get worried, until it all went out of the window with the sending-off of Mitchell Thomas. The referee went for the letter of the law, and perhaps if he had given a few more seconds consideration he might have decided to give Mitchell a word of final warning, and then who knows what might have happened.

With ten men, and an unlucky goal conceded, we faced an uphill climb. We sent Steve Davis upfield for the last ten minutes, and were punished when Sunderland scored twice, but we didn't deserve to be beaten by three goals.

On the positive side, it was a very good cup run, and the players gained a lot of experience from it. It was a shame it had to end the way it did, but it was good to play in a fantastic stadium, and the club has earned good money.

Now we must do it again, and today the roles are reversed. Hull come to Luton as the Davids, and we are cast in the role of Goliath. They have perked up after changing their manager, and they will be on a nice day out today, hoping to catch a few of our players on an ego trip. They may well be difficult opponents, and we must beware - it's another banana skin where we are on a hiding to nothing.

It's my job to lift the spirits of the team, and to get them to show they are back in the right groove. We have stuttered recently, and we must do a professional job today.

There will probably be one or two changes in the team. No-one deserves to be dropped after the performance on Tuesday, but rotation might have to be the order of the day.

League points are still the first priority, and a play-off place is the least we must achieve this season. Fulham's defeat at Wigan in midweek gives us hope, but obviously we need to win at Macclesfield next week.

But first we need a cup win today. I am aware of the real dangers of an adverse reaction to Tuesday's disappointment, and this afternoon our professionalism will be tested. I know it is down to me to get the team in the right shape and frame of mind, and the players must be able to forget about Sunderland and concentrate on beating Hull.

Defeat at the Stadium of Light was no disaster, but we must beware of the danger that today is an anti-climax. We have made money from the Worthington Cup run, but we need more to be able to keep our squad together to


GARY DOHERTY, fast building a reputation as a super-sub, has admitted to being a bit of a split personality - and does not mind in the least.

We were hoping for an unusual "hat trick" at Sunderland on Tuesday after his two previous appearances had seen him go on as a late sub and net equalisers, against Lincoln and Manchester City, but it was not to be.

Most of his appearances in our youth and reserve teams have been as a centre-half. But he has shown he is pretty useful as a striker, and so far his first team action this season. has all been in attack.

So what does he think? "I am a centre-half for Ireland under-18s, and I like playing there," said Doherty, who is pictured in action at the Stadium of Light. "But here the gaffer has used me as a striker, and I am happy with that. I just want to be involved in the first team - and it's more fun scoring goals than stopping them!"





THE WORTHINGTON Cup run has come to an end, and now we embark on another mystery tour, in the FA Cup. How can one person influence a game as much as the referee did at Sunderland?

Personally, I thought he had a poor game, and to use a phrase from the manager he played the occasion as opposed to the game. The tackle on Mitch deserved a red card in itself. And the second booking nine times out of ten would not be given. As a result, Mitch was off, and it was always going to be an uphill struggle after that.

Sunderland are a good team, and I hope they go on and win the cup. For ourselves, we have had a good run, had some good publicity, and put Luton Town on the back pages for the first time in a few years.

I think the draw against Manchester City last Saturday was probably a fair result. City, I think, shaded the first half, but we definitely dominated the second.

Big Dozza came off the bench and snatched an equaliser with a good header. He is on a bit of a roll now, so us leading scorers had better watch out!

Although the point each was probably fair, it didn't help us consolidate our position in the league - in fact we dropped a place. We haven't won in the league since Northampton, which is a little worrying. We need to get back into winning ways, especially with the busy Christmas period upon us.

Depending on results we could in the new year find ourselves well positioned to try to get a play-off place. Or, playing a chasing game, which is so much more difficult because you just cannot afford to lose matches when you are playing catch-up.

Today we meet Hull, managed by an ex-Burnley team-mate of mine, Warren Joyce. I was surprised to hear he had got the job but

I am sure he will do well, and he has an experienced man in John McGovern alongside him. One thing's for sure: pre-season will be hard as Joycey's a bit of a fitness freak.

We had a good game against Hull in preseason and just shaded the result 1-0. I forget who scored that night! They played well on the night and we know we will have a tough game this afternoon. If we play to our potential, we can, hopefully, progress to the next round.

Thanks for your support at Sunderland on Tuesday. It is appreciated by the lads, as we know it's not cheap to make such a long trip, and time has to be taken off work. It is disappointing to be knocked out of any competition, so get behind us today and we will try to progress as far in the FA Cup as we did in the Worthington.

It was a hard match, so some aches and pains were inevitable, but thankfully there was nothing serious.

Marvin Johnson needed a little treatment on the field after taking a bang on the head in a crowded goalmouth when our first goal was scored, but he is all right.

Phil Gray hurt an

ankle, but was able to play on after treatment. It was very sore, and he was not able to train properly for the first part of this week, but all the signs are that he will be OK for this afternoon.

Kelvin Davis suffered a kick on the ankle, and I took advantage of the fact that you are given more time to treat goalkeepers on the pitch than you are outfield players. Again he suffered a little soreness, but has recovered.

Recovery is also the right word to describe the very good progress Liam George is making after his broken leg. He has come on much guicker than expected, which is a tribute to his general fitness and perhaps more important his attitude.

A positive outlook can help a lot, and Liam is proof. He still has a metal plate in one of the bones he fractured in August, but has started running again, although not yet at full speed.

Very often after ankle surgery there is a problem with stiffness and mobility, but Liam has not suffered too badly in that respect.

is now building up fitness levels and working to get the ankle strong again, and to his credit is prepared to work hard. He is still some way off consideration



for competitive football, but his progress is excellent.

Stuart Fraser has also worked well to overcome injury. He is now back in full training after his cartilage operation and could be playing in the reserves in a couple of weeks or so.

Working to regain fitness can be boring, so we try to vary routines, and I am glad to say that everyone at Luton Town appreciates the need to have the right attitude - they all respond, and work well.



FANCY getting away from the turkey left-overs and warmed up Christmas pud on Boxing Day? And a classy way of watching Luton Town in action?



Secondly, I would like to thank you also for the quality of pictures in the magazine, with also your stories they are enjoyable.


Last, but not least, I am kindly appealing to



Position: Midfield

Experienced midfieider who joined the Tigers from Burniey in July 1996 for a fee of £30,000 having previously spent two months on loan at Boothferry Park back in 1995. Captained the side during what many will remember as the most turbulent season in the club's history and showed his true leadership qualities in the heart of the City midfield with some hard working performances, scoring 7 goals. Briefly handed over the captain's role to Gregor Rioch before gaining it back, and after Billy Kirkwood's departure was installed as player/coach. However, after Mark Hateley's recent departure Warren threw his hat into the ring for the fulltime job and was successful in his application, taking charge of his first game in the recent defeat at Scunthorpe. He will be assisted by ex-Forest and Derby star John McGovern who was appointed at the same time as Warren in the role of assistant manager.

David D'Auria Midfield

Midfield dynamo who signed on a free transfer from Third Division neighbours Scunthorpe United in July 1998. Began his career with his home town club Barry Town and moved to Scarborough in 1994. Attracted the attention of several clubs during the summer when his contract expired at Glanford Park, including both his former league teams and Cardiff City, but the former United captain jumped at the chance of joining up with the Tigers. Has been one of the club's most consistent performers, and was recently the subject of an enquiry from Division 3 rivals Plymouth Argyle.

David Brown Forward

A pre-season capture from Man Utd who was high on Mark Hateley's shopping list having impressed during a seven game spell with the Tigers at the end of last season. Has settled well into his new environment and is the Tiger's leading scorer this season with seven goals in all competitions.

Rob Dewhurst Defender

Rob joined the Tigers in November1993 after being released by Blackburn Rovers and became an important member of the team until suffering a badly broken leg in December 1995. Spent the following summer regaining his match fitness and made his comeback in October 1996 where he made his 100th appearance for the club. Underwent a hernia operation during the summer and has mostly been confined to the reserves in his battle to regain full fitness. However, he has been recalled to the first team squad in recent weeks, and with the ligers' current injury crisis has stepped in and done a good job in the heart of the defence.

Craig Dudley Forward

19-year-old striker who is currently on loan at Boothferry Park in a bid to solve the Tigers' striking crisis. Made his debut in the home defeat by Brighton where he made a big impression and although cup-tied for the FA Cup clash at Salisbury, he came back into the side at Scunthorpe and scored one of the Tigers' goals in a 3-2 defeat. Quick and elusive, Craig has been a useful addition to a depleted squad and his stay may well be extended in the near future.

Mike Edwards Defender

Captain of the Tigers successful FA Youth Cup side last season who went on to become a first team regular towards the second half of the campaign after making his debut in the thrilling 5-4 defeat at Rotherham in December. A local lad with a bright future ahead of him, although with the form of Matt Hocking and Neil Whitworth he has found it hard to hold down a regular first team place. Most of his first team outings this season have been at full-back but he has started to re-emerge in recent weeks and is now pushing for that regular spot.

Lee Ellington Forward

Leading scorer for the juniors last term, Lee made his first team debut as a first year YT when he came on as sub at Torquay two seasons ago. Made a handful of appearances last season and scored his first senior goals for the club when he netted twice after coming on as a second half sub in the 3-2 victory over Exeter back in November 1997. Signed pro forms along with former youth trainees Matthew Baker, Mike Edwards and Dexter Tucker during the summer, and has featured in the first team squad for most of the season so far.

Paul Gibson Goalkeeper

Young goalkeeper who was brought in on a month's loan to provide cover and back-up for the Tigers' only fit senior keeper, Steve Wilson. Has played in three of the Tigers' last four games and may well find himself at Boothferry Park for a longer spell where he will battle for the No.1 spot with regular keeper Steve Wilson.

Mark Greaves Centre Back


This local lad signed a three year contract in June 1996 from non-League Brigg Town for whom he had won an FA Vase winners medal at Wembley just a month earlier. Made his first team debut against Scunthorpe United in October 1996 and later switched to an attacking midfield role from where he scored his first senior goal for the club. Enjoyed a good run in the side towards the middle of last season when he again weighed in with a couple of goals. However, his first team opportunities have been limited this season, and although he recently forced his way back into the reckoning he is getting ready to serve a two match ban after being sent-off at Chester earlier in the season.


Steven Hawes Midfield

Young midfielder who finally put pen to paper during the summer following a lengthy spell at Boothferry Park last season where he featured regularly in the reserve side. Steve started the season in a central midfield role but has since had stints in the full-back berth. Spent a bit of time on the bench in recent weeks, but is now back to form and has been one of the Tigers' outstanding players in the last few games.

Matthew Hooking Defender

Joined the Tigers in September 1997 and went straight into the side for his League debut against Scunthorpe United. Had an excellent game for the Tigers three days later as the Third Division outfit overcame Premiership side Crystal Palace in the Coca Cola Cup and was an ever present until suffering a dislocated shoulder in the defeat against Cardiff in March which sidelined him for for the remainder of the season. However, he has suffered no reaction to the problem this season and has formed an excellent partnership with Neil Whitworth at the heart of the Tigers' defence.







Brian McGinty Midfield

Signed a short term contract after being released by Mark Hateley's former club Glasgow Rangers and later signed a one year deal for the Tigers. Made his debut in the home victory over Doncaster, but was later sidelined with a foot injury. Returned to action and scored his first goal for the club in the 2-1 win over Scunthorpe and went on to form a strong partnership with Warren Joyce and fellow Rangers midfielder Steve Boyack in the middle of the park. An Achilles tendon injury hampered his early season form, but in recent weeks he has started to show the form which he produced last year. Isn't noted for scoring goals, but has scored four this season, including one at Salisbury in the FA Cup where he was forced to play as an emergency striker.

Neil Mann Midfield

Left footed and arguably the most skillful performer in the squad, Neil joined the Tigers in 1993. Struggled to recapture his early season form last term and suffered a series of niggling injuries which sidelined him in the run up to Christmas. Underwent a hernia operation in the summer, and after a shaky start his form was transformed when he was switched into the left-back role. Has been the Tigers' best player over the past couple of months, but he now faces an agonising spell on the sidelines after badly damaging knee ligaments in the recent defeat at Scunthorpe.

Richard Peacock Winger

A winger with great pace, Richard has made remarkable progress since joining the club from Sheffield FC in 1993 and has also weighed in with his fair share of the goals. Sidelined for most of the second half of last season after undergoing a hernia operation in January, he had hoped for a big year this time around and his form had been impressive. But bad luck has struck him down again and he is another who faces a spell on the sidelines after having another hernia operation in November.

Gregor Rioch Defender

Gregor joined City from Peterborough United in July 1996 and has since become afirm favourite with the supporters. Currently halfway through a new 2 year contract with the Tigers, he was appointed captain at the start of last season, but handed the role back to Warren Joyce for the final run-in. He missed the start of the season with a niggling knee problem and has played in a number of roles since returning to first team action in mid-September. However, he is yet another victim of the Tigers' current injury crisis and he will be out for a month after undergoing knee surgery. He would have enjoyed playing today, the son of Bruce Rioch, he was a in the Luton Town youth squad as a teenager.

Sam Sharman Defender

Signed for his home town club in February 97 after being released by Premiership side Sheffield Wednesday. Had already proved himself at reserve team level during a short trial spell with the Tigers, but struggled with injury for most of last season and was unable to prove his capabilities. Hasn't been able to force his way into the first team so far, but looks like getting his chance under the new management duo of Warren Joyce and John McGovern.

Justin Whittle Defender

Recent signing from First Division Stoke City who went straight into the side that faced Carlisle Utd in place of the injured Neil Whitworth. Became a main target for new player manager Warren Joyce after earlier attempts to shore up his defence failed.

Neil Whitworth Defender

The fourth of Mark Hateley's pre-season captures, Neil returns south of the border following a stint with Scottish Premier League side Kilmarnock whom he joined from Manchester United in a joint £350.000 deal back in 1994. A former England Youth international, he has made a promising start to his career with the Tigers and has been a model of consistency at the back. Was also an ever-present in the Tigers side until an achilles injury forced him out of the side for the recent clash at Scunthorpe.

Gareth Williams Midfield

Midfield man who had spent two previous loan stints with the Tigers scoring 2 goals in 16 games. However, he recently became Warren Joyce's first permanent signing after agreeing to switch to Boothferry Park from local rivals Scarborough.

Steve Wilson Goalkeeper

Steve became the Tigers first choice No.1 during the summer of 1995 after regular keeper Alan Fettis became embroiled in a contract wrangle. Responded in magnificent form with a string of fine displays, but the team's continuing struggles led to a loss of confidence and he was replaced by the young Roy Carroll in January 1996. A true professional in every sense of the word, he certainly showed he has the spirit and ability to bounce back when he returned to the side the following October Spent another spell in the wings after the loan signing of Aidan Davison and returned to the starting line-up once more last September in place of Scott Thomson.
























Carrying the colours



Hatters On Card

MANY football cards were given away with children's comics, dating back to the "boys' papers" of the 1920s. IPC were not prolific issuers of cards, but in 1970 they gave away sets of 32 footballers with five of their titles, including The Lion and The Tiger, which meant there were 160 cards to collect in all.

Only one Luton player was pictured among them, but it was

the first time for several years that we had been featured on cards of any description.

Thus the appearance of Freddie Jardine as number 32 of The Lion issue was greeted most enthusiastically by Hatters-made youngsters like myself.

The choice of Fred seemed very appropriate. He was the club's longest-serving player at the time this set came out in 1970. He had endured the club's rapid fall of the early 60s, suffering the nadir of the Fourth Division in 1966, and then helped in the climb back towards the top.

Jardine was signed from Dundee in 1961 as a left winger, and made his League debut at Walsall on Boxing Day of that year. He was converted to the left back role by Bill Harvey in 1964 and became a regular in that position for the next four years.

Fred always seemed cool under pressure, and the speed and accuracy from his days on the wing served him well as a defender.

During the terribly disappointing campaign of 1966/67 Jardine was made captain of the side, and it was apparent that the additional responsibility did not altogether suit him, and perhaps had a detrimental effect on what was already a very stretched rearguard.

One of his last acts as skipper was to lead a players' deputation in a dispute over the allocation of FA

Cup final tickets. Rumour has it that the directors locked themselves in the boardroom to escape fiery Fred and his men! Those of us who remember the team's performances that season wished some of that spirit had shown itself on the field more often.

The arrival of Terry Branston allowed Jardine to concentrate on his own game the following season, which ended with Luton as Fourth Division champions.

However, the signing of Jack Bannister from Crystal Palace in October 1968 meant that Jardine's appearances were restricted, and his subsequent outings were back on the left wing.

He eventually left in 1970 for a brief spell with Torquay after a Luton career of 220 league appearances and nine goals. He did not stay long in Devon, and soon returned to work in Luton, where he is still settled with his family.

Examples of the Jardine card can still be found for a modest price, around 30p. IPC repeated the issue of cards with their comics the following year, and this time five Hatters were chosen. All will be revealed in a later column.





5th December 1959 Leicester 3 Luton Town 3.

After a run of three games without defeat the Town had lost their last two matches and slumped back to the bottom of the old Division One. The forthcoming trip to Leicester was therefore looked on with a certain amount of trepidation especially as we had never won at Filbert Street and, since the Foxes promotion to Division One two seasons before, we had suffered a couple of heavy defeats

Ably led by by Allan Brown, who was recalled to the forward line, and the speedy wing play of Billy Bingham the Town created chance after chance and three times took the lead against a hesitant Leicester

Unfortunately the Luton defence was just as porous and the Foxes managed to break away to level each time the Town scored, with the final equaliser coming five minutes from the end.

5th December 1964 Luton Town 1 Gillingham 0 (F.A.Cup).

After narrowly beating Southend at Kenilworth Road in Round One the Town were drawn at home again, this time against another fellow Division Three side, Gillingham.

The Town had lost 0-5 against the Gills at Priestfield in the league a few weeks before but started the Cup tie in determined fashion with Tom McKechnie going close in the opening minutes. The Gillingham defence decided to single out McKechnie for personal attention and he was subjected to some fearful fouls before Gordon Riddick scored following a corner.

The Gills then had to chase the game and in the second period put the Luton defence under a great deal of pressure but veteran Luton goalkeeper, Ron Baynham, was in top form and threw himself around his muddy penalty area. Despite this, Charlie Rackstraw missed three clear cut opportunities for Gillingham and his colleague Brian Gibbs hit the bar in a late onslaught, but the Town held on to earn a tie with Sunderland in Round Three.

5th December 1970 Luton Town 2 Sheffield United 1.

After losing at home to Sunderland at the end of October the Town had been undefeated during the following month and had forced themselves back into second position in the old Division Two. Opponents Sheffield United, sixteen games unbeaten, were coming up fast on the rails and the scene was set for an absorbing contest.

The crowd of 19665 was not disappointed and an end to end contest developed with both sides going close in the early minutes. The breakthrough came when Malcolm Macdonald headed in John Rvan's cross in the 28th minute and the lead was doubled when Jim Ryan headed home after hesitancy by Blades goalkeeper Alan Hodgkinson.

The Town seemed to be cruising home but were rudely awakened twelve minutes from the end when Jack Bannister upended Bill Dearden in the box with Tony Currie netting from the resultant spot kick. The final minutes produced some frantic defending from the Hatters but the slim margin was maintained with the supporters breathing a huge sigh of relief at the final whistle.

Clashes with today's visitors did not start to take place until the Tigers promotion to the old Division Two in 1949. Hull had won the championship of Division Three (North) in style in 1948/49 and remarkable crowds approaching 50000 were commonplace at Boothferry Park as they achieved this feat.

Much of the credit for this revival was placed firmly at the feet of new player-manager and ex-England international, Raich Carter, whose appearances seemed to have a galvanising effect on the rest of the players. It was said that Carter took all the free kicks, corners and even throw-ins such was his total control of the team but it obviously had the desired impact!

Carter and his side were the talk of the football world at the time and when they visited Kenilworth Road for the first time, in November 1949, a crowd of 22269 turned up to see the Tigers win 3-0 with Carter, inevitably, on the scoresheet.

It was not until after the shock resignation of Carter in September 1951 that the Town finally managed a win against the Tigers at the fifth time of asking. Goals from George Stobbart and Bert Mitchell secured a 2-1 victory at Boothferry Park but the Hatters were unable to achieve the double as Hull escaped with a point following a 1-1 draw at Kenilworth Road in the return. Amateur centre-half, Peter Stone, making his one and only first team appearance for the Town was blamed for the Hull goal.

With the loss of Carter, Hull began to lose their near invincibility and the Hatters achieved the double in both 1952/53 and 1953/54 but the biggest win was saved for the following season at the end of which we finally achieved promotion to the old Division One. On Boxing Day 1954 we thrashed the Tigers 4-0 at Boothferry Park with Bob Morton netting twice. Amazingly this was to be the Town's last away win until the final day of the

Paths crossed again in the old Division Three in 1963 and Hull were rather miffed when John O'Rourke scored for the Town in the final minute at Kenilworth Road to secure a 2-1 victory. Apart from dropping the points they were doubly annoyed as O'Rourke received the ball in a seemingly offside position but their protests were waved away by the referee. Revenge was taken three weeks later when, in front of a Boothferry Park crowd of 3576, Hull won through 2-0 but only after O'Rourke had missed a couple of sitters.

In the following campaign the Town were well beaten 1-3 at Kenilworth Road by a Tigers side that led 0-3 at the interval. In the return, a crowd of 22986 turned up at Boothferry Park as the Tigers made a bid for promotion, but the inclusion of Ted Phillips in the Town side. making his debut, made little difference as the Hatters were again turned over 1-3.

When the two sides met up again five years later, in the old Division Two, both were making a concerted bid for promotion to the top flight. We had been down to the depths and were slowly resurfacing while the Tigers, after promotion to Division Two in 1966, had gathered together probably the finest strike force in their history.

Ken Houghton, Chris Chilton and Ken Wagstaff against Don Givens and Malcolm Macdonald was an eagerly anticipated contest and such was the interest that the 'Match of the Day' cameras were present at Boothferry

Givens and Macdonald saw the game over by half time as the Town cruised to a mightily impressive victory.

The return was also covered by 'Match of the Day' and many supporters will remember commentator David Coleman scathingly attacking the Luton public by criticising the fact that the crowd was 'only' 19566 for a promotion clash.

die' signings in their bid for promotion but a interval lead. The Luton defence looked decidedly shaky for a time after Houghton levelled for the Tigers but late efforts from Viv Busby and Macdonald earned the points and pushed the Town above Hull in the table.

Neither side managed to achieve their dream of promotion and over the next few seasons, leading up to the Tigers relegation in 1978, the games failed, in the main, to live up to the two classic encounters in 1970/71.

Park in November 1970. Superb goals from The one exception came on a cold night at Kenilworth Road in January 1977. Hull had taken an early lead and decided to sit back and frustrate the Town for the remainder of the game. They almost succeeded, but very late goals from John Aston and Jim Husband earned the Town two of the most deserved points in their history.

Hull assistant manager Andy Davidson, seeing the points stolen at the death and after being Hull had boosted their side with three 'do or goaded by the Luton supporters behind the dugout, took his coat off at the end and was rare strike from John Moore gave the Town an only just prevented from vaulting over the barrier. What passion this game brings out in people!

WHEN THE only goals from two of the better footballing sides in the Second Division come from set pieces, it tells you something about the overall quality of the match, said Lennie Lawrence after the biggest crowd of the season had seen a game which threatened more than it achieved.

A golden opportunity to open a gap on rivals also chasing promotion was lost because the Town failed to show anything like their best form, with too many passes going astray.

There was not a lot wrong with the defence, but City's looked even tighter until they lost skipper and centre-half Andy

Morrison at the interval.

He missed the second half after injuring his hip in a heavy fall, and City boss Joe Royle believed his absence cost them victory

Lawrence fumed at another slow start, and wondered if, however important this game was, players were unable to focus completely with the big cup-tie at Sunderland on the near horizon.

Whatever the reason - and to be fair to City they looked hard to beat - the Town were once again indebted to 18-year-old Gary Doherty for going on as a late sub and snatching a point-saving goal, just as he had done at Lincoln a week earlier.

"He wouldn't have scored if Morrison had still been on the field," grumbled Royle. "I know a point away from home is always worth having, but this was a case of two points lost because we gave away a goal to a free header at a corner." But as Lawrence pointed out, it might have been even worse for City, because after Doherty's 75th-minute header from a corner by Ray McKinnon visiting goalkeeper Nicky Weaver did well to grab a fizzing low cross by Sean Evers when the Town at last got their act together. McKinnon was inches short of a decisive contact, and a few minutes later City escaped again when Steve Davis thumped a header wide from a quick diagonal free kick by Graham Alexander.

It would have been a steal, because for much of the game it looked as though City would be the snatch and grab experts. They had much the better of the first half, with Morrison and Gerard Wiekens bottling up Phil Gray and Stuart Douglas. Shaun Goater missed a sitter when he got behind the defence for a free header into the crowd, before Morrison went upfield for City's first corner, and turned it into a goal with a powerful header.

Alexander and Davis produced the Town's best replies, the first a shot

which caught a deflection and went for a corner, the second a tremendous low drive by the skipper to round off a slick move by Matthew Spring and Gray. Weaver dived full length to tip the ball round the post.

City had to reorganise for the second half, and with Morrison missing the Town were able to enjoy being on top. But there was still a lot of midfield stalemate until Doherty's header made the result right.

Lawrence believes City are good bets for a playoff place. If so, despite the loss of two home points, we must be in the same category.

Stoke are beginning to look unstoppable as they seek a quick return to the First Division, although lowly Wycombe caused them a problem or two before Brian Little's men scraped home 1-0 with a 79th-minute goal by Graham Kavanagh. Stoke are currently the only side showing title-winning consistency - that was their fifth consecutive victory, including an FA Cup success at Reading.

Walsall's run is four league games without defeat. They ground out a one-goal home win over Bournemouth, to take second place on Saturday night, and must have enjoyed Tuesday's news that Fulham had lost at Wigan.

Preston, league leaders for a week in mid-October, have faltered in local derbies - after a 0-0 draw bore at Blackpool, they were surprisingly held 2-2 at Deepdale by Wigan, and although they are still fourth Gillingham have closed the gap to a single point.

Down at the bottom, Lincoln are deeper in trouble after being beaten 2-1 at Reading. Wycombe, Oldham and Northampton are in the other three relegation spots, but our next opponents are only a

point above the current safety line.

Scoring goals is Macclesfield's major problem, particularly on their own ground, where they have netted only seven times in nine outings. But they have

conceded only nine.

Only two visiting sides have been sent home pointless from the Moss Rose Ground - Reading in September and Burnley in late October, both beaten 2-1. Lincoln and Notts County managed 0-0 draws and four visiting teams have won: Fulham, Notts County, Manchester City and Northampton. It was 1-0 on each occasion

Macclesfield took one notable scalp in the Worthington Cup, beating Stoke 3-1 in the first round first leg, and going through on aggregate by losing the second 1-0 at the Britannia Stadium. But they paid for their cheek - they drew Birmingham in the second round, and lost on a 9-0 aggregate, conceding six goals in the second leg at St. Andrew's.

In the FA Cup non-league Slough managed to draw at Macclesfield, and then again in the replay, with the Silkmen going through 9-8 on penalties to earn today's tie at home to Cambridge.
