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PHIL Gray starts a three-match suspension today, despite the club's best efforts in an appeal to the FA over his sending-off against Wycombe a fortnight ago.

Lennie Lawrence's first reaction on the day was that although he felt yellow cards could have dealt with Gray and Wycombe's Paul McCarthy, the ref had applied the letter of the law.

But after studying the video-tape, and running it in slow-motion and freeze-frame mode, the boss thought it worthwhile to ask for the violent conduct verdict to be

The incident started with Gray going down, apparently body-checked by Wycombe's Paul Emblen. The two got into a bit of a tangle on the ground, but then McCarthy joined in, having a go at Gray.

Referee Matt Messias, having red-carded Gray and McCarthy, awarded Wycombe the free kick.

The Town hoped that after seeing the video evidence the FA would agree that the most Gray deserved was a one-match suspension, but the appeal was rejected. As it happens, Gray would have missed today's game anyway, with a toe injury which forced him out of the side at Preston. Physio Clive Goodyear thinks it would be touch and go for next week's game at home to AFC Bournemouth. Now Gray will also miss a trip to Turf Moor, and the chance to put a goal or two past Steve Davis's mates.

LENNIE Lawrence was talking to Sunderland boss Peter Reid this week about extending the loan of Gerry Harrison, and with the player enjoying first team football with us, an agreement for a second month's loan is highly likely. His arrival has been timely, to say the least, with the recent rash of injuries, particularly those that have decimated defensive ranks.

EARLY WARNING: Our home match with Gillingham on March 27 will kick off at 11.30 am instead of 3pm, to avoid a clash with the England v Poland international which is being televised live that afternoon.

She had plenty of friends in Luton. Alan recalled: "She came from Wolverhampton, and supported the Wolves until I started courting her daughter Anne. She soon became a committed Luton Town supporter, and always was, even after I left the club. She was a lovely lady, a very young 74.

"Alan West was her favourite player, and he has very kindly agreed to conduct the funeral. I think she would have a chuckle over that."

The service will be at Luton Crematorium at Stopsley on Monday at 9am, and all friends are welcome to attend.

Alan and his wife run football coaching courses for youngsters in Torbay, and there are now two more Sloughs playing in local football in that area, their sons Chris and Andy. Alan reports that he also has an 18-month-old grandson "with a pretty good left foot!"

FULL CIRCLE: He never played for us, but Neil Smillie has good reason to remember Luton Town if he ponders on the ups and downs of football. Some of us remember, with considerable mortification, how well he played for Reading, and scored, when the then Third Division club produced a shock victory over us at Wembley to take the Simod Cup 4-1. We more than made up for it a few weeks later by winning the Littlewoods Cup.

Having enjoyed a Wembley experience against Luton, Smillie was left with bitter memories of his visit to Kenilworth Road a fortnight ago, as manager of Wycombe. He saw his side slaughtered, got involved in a row with the ref after the match, and was sacked two days later.

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

from the manager's chair



YOU ARE always disappointed to lose a football match, so there was no pleasure for us in the result at Preston last week. But rarely have I been less disappointed in defeat than I was at

The emphasis in our preparation was that we were facing a team who posed a real attacking threat, the highest home scorers in the division. We knew we would have to compete physically all over the pitch, and make counter-attacks pay. Preston get a lot of men forward, but that offers scope to hit them on the break.

That was how things panned out, and an excellent free kick and a great header enabled us to take the lead. In fact, our set plays throughout were very good - we were first to the ball, for instance, several times from corners.

One up at half-time, we knew that Preston would be getting a rollicking in their dressing room, and would come out with all guns blazing. Our instruction was "Make sure you put your lot in," and the players did.

But Preston showed why they are good bets for a play-off place at the very least, and they put together some excellent attacking moves, including one that ended with a shot hitting our bar, and then their goal.

But then we steadied the ship, and looked good for a draw at least. But what followed was the only real disappointment: we set up counterattacks only to fail through the inability to hit a telling final pass. Preston were wobbling, and we needed a second goal. I sensed we might get one, and if we had we would probably have won the game.

You know the rest: the ref played seven minutes of "extra time" at the end of the 90, and during that spell, with Gavin McGowan a passenger because of cramp, Preston got the winner from the only ball they were allowed to cross in behind our back four all match. Defeat was very harsh, but we had several key players missing and I would not criticise our players too much for that

The performance overall, the attitude and the workrate could hardly be bettered, and Preston are one of the most effective teams in the league.

In away games, we are equal top scorers in the division, but the problem is that we let too many in, and we must tilt that balance in our favour. Ironically, because we scored at Preston, and despite the result, we moved up one place in the table. In 16 months, we have only three times lost by more than the odd goal in away games, and at two of those. Sunderland and Stoke, there were goals in the last minute when we were chasing the game.

Today, we are back in front of our own supporters, and boast the equal best home defensive record in the league. It's the first of two consecutive home matches, and it's crunch time: a win and a draw is the very minimum required from the two matches if we are to revive our play-off chances.

It was a real test of our squad at Preston last week, and today they face another. I am sure Wigan will be disappointed with their season so far, having invested in their

team, while we have put our faith in young players. Injuries mean we will again be without seniors like Graham Alexander, Mitchell Thomas, Phil Gray, Paul Showler and Ray McKinnon. Gray is also suspended, as is Paul McLaren, and we are down to the bare bones. That's life at Luton, but we can take encouragement from last week's effort: put your lot in again, will be the demand, and with our supporters backing us we can kick in again with

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captain's log



WHEN WE kicked off this season, I never dreamed that before the end of it I would be captain of Luton Town, with all sorts of responsibilities, including writing this column. We were all sorry to see Steve Davis leave, but we understood the reasons, and when the boss asked me to take over as skipper I was delighted to accept.

Luton Town was always the only club I had ever wanted to play for, and I have had nearly 14 happy years here since I signed on as an apprentice after leaving school.

Naturally I have had a bit of stick from some members of the dressing room, with Gerry Harrison in particular insisting on calling me skip. But I am still the same old Mary, and glad to be pat of a very happy dressing room.

When I thought about the captaincy, I realised that I have some hard acts to follow. Stevo was a very good skipper, expressing himself best by setting an example on the field. He was not much of a shouter. but such a good player, and he had the respect of all

When I first got into the league team regularly Steve Foster was captain, and he too was something special. He was a good talker, had tremendous presence on and off the field, and I learned a lot from him.

Danny Wilson followed - a real midfield general and a grafter, and another who led by example. I confess when he was playing for us I did not realise that we were with a man who would become a very good manager, but when I look back at his time with us I remember a man who thought about the game. Circumstances led to him moving into management, and he has taken to it very well.

John "Tumble" Dreyer held the captaincy for a season or two and did a good job - he was a senior player, and very consistent on the pitch. We knew we could rely on him.

One of the best skippers I have played for was Trevor Peake. Good player, good captain, and good professional - you couldn't ask for a lot more in one man. It was a very shrewd move by David Pleat to bring Peakey to Luton, as it had been when he

signed Steve Foster from Aston Villa reserves.

Which brings me back to Steve Davis. Terry Westley made him captain, but it affected his form for a time, but once he had settled down and got the job back he did this club proud.

I don't think captaincy will affect my form. I always have my game plan before I go out onto the pitch, and if I have a dodgy game it won't be because of the cares of captaincy.

The boss has said I yap a bit on the field. He's right -I have always done that, trying to help players around me. When I was much younger, lots of players helped me. We have a lot of good young players in our squad now, and I hope

I can help them, in the same way that I was helped.

We haven't done too badly since Steve left, and at Preston last week we showed that we can compete with the best. We were certainly outclassed, and if we play like that we will win more than we lose. And a string of performances like that will see us with an excellent chance of reaching the play-offs. Finally, we all want to thank the supporters who were at Preston, not just for the way you shouted us on during the game, but also for the reception we were given when the match ended. message seemed to be that you knew we had done our best, despite a cruel result.

Understanding like that from fans can be a big help to us all, and I hope we earn it again today - but this time with the right result!

OUR RESERVE team fixtures in the Avon Insurance Combination have now switched to Leighton Town for our two remaining mid-winter home games, and Luton Town extend very grateful thanks to our friends at Leighton for helping us out.

We have been suffering a very wet winter, and it was important for Lennie Lawrence that we protect our pitch at Kenilworth Road as much as possible, and Leighton's offer to give us a temporary home has been much appreciated. They were also very good hosts when we went there for the first time this season, for the match against Wimbledon (report page 42), and arrangements are now confirmed for our next two home fixtures to be played at Leighton, against Bournemouth on February 1 and Barnet on February 22. Admission is £2, half-price for under-16s and senior citizens, and I hope supporters will not be inconvenienced too much by the change.

Notification of the draw for the Bedfordshire County Premier Cup semi-finals came in from Beds FA this week. We will be away to Biggleswade Town, and the match is to be played by February 10, but so far we have no date confirmed. In the other half of the draw Stotfold and Arlesey have to play each other in a quarter-final to qualify for a home semi-final against Leighton Town.

I have received a lot of comment about the appearance of the Sandye (yes, that is the right spelling!) Band at our last home game. Supporters obviously enjoyed their music, with several taking the trouble to tell us how much they enjoyed the band's performance. Your comments and letters are always appreciated, and in view of the response we have had on this subject, I hope to have the Sandye Band playing at another home fixture before too long. Usually, they include a spot of marching and counter-marching as part of their programme, and hopefully our pitch will dry out sufficiently for them to demonstrate that part of their repertoire next time they come!

Today we welcome to Kenilworth Road guests from St. George's School, Harpenden, with the hope that they enjoy their day with us, and see an entertaining and winning performance from the team.

Finally, here's a very early item for your diary, looking ahead to Christmas! I don't know how many shopping days there are, but we have already booked the date for our popular annual carol service. It will be on December 16, at St. Mary's Parish Church, Luton.

THE TREATMENT room is still busy, with Phil Gray the latest to join the list of injured players. He missed the match at Preston because of a toe injury sustained against Wycombe. He is suspended today because of a red card in that match, but as it happens I doubt if he would have been fit to face Wigan anyway.

He already had a slight infection in his toe, something like athlete's foot, but the real pain came from a knock which left his toe very bruised and swollen.

It was not a pretty sight, and we had X-rays taken in case there might be a fracture, but happily that is not the case. Gray is improving slowly, and should be all right within a few days.

Graham Alexander has been out of action since the game at Colchester because of an ankle injury, and when the swelling and bruising subsided we were able to investigate further, and we now know he has ligament damage. He has not been able to train this week because the ankle joint cannot take a lot of weight, so at present it's a case of "on your bike"... the everpopular exercise bicycle, of course. With little or no training possible this week, Alexander can but hope that things will be much better within seven days, and that he will be ready to compete for a team place against Bournemouth next Saturday, or perhaps at Burnley the week after.

Ray McKinnon is making good progress after a hamstring injury picked up six weeks ago. That is a long time to be out of full training, so for him it is now a case of building up the training routine, and seeing how quickly he gets to somewhere near match fitness.

Mitchell Thomas also has to take a little while longer to get over a hip and groin strain. One or two have taken some pleasure in telling him that the older you get, the longer it takes! That might sound slightly cruel, but it is true, as Mitch is discovering for himself. But after three weeks out, he is slowly getting there, although I would not

think he has much chance of a return to the team this afternoon.

Nor will Paul Showler figure in today's match, but we have had some good news for him, after a thorough examination of his latest injury. We feared it might be a hernia, but it is "only" a stomach muscle strain. That's bad enough to keep him out of training this week, but he is working hard on the exercise bike and the rowing machine, and could be in contention for a return before too long.

Reserve goalkeeper Tanny Abbey is back in training after his first team appearance against Walsall cost him a groin strain, and it is a great pleasure to report on another young player getting back into the swing of things.

Liam George, who broke a leg at Wigan way back in August, has made tremendous progress, and done far better than we ever dared hope a few months ago. He is now back in full training, and looking good. He needs at least a couple of weeks to build up fitness and confidence, but if it goes well - and he has the right attitude to help himself - we might then be able to think about a comeback in the reserves next month.

Julian James, our other broken leg patient, will need a little longer than that, but is getting better day by day, and it is good to see him jogging gently. As with Liam George, it has been a long hard road, and I am sure they will both reach journey's end to resume their careers.



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

WATCHING the Town's matches can be very lucrative for one lucky supporter at every game, as our latest Golden Gamble winners will testify.



We have a ball boy and a ball girl on duty: Mark Hartley and Emma Waldock.

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






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

A then club record £350,000 was paid to Hull City to secure the services of this outstanding young keeper. Roy is the regular Northern Ireland U2I keeper and has made one appearance at senior level for his country v Thailand.

STUART BALMER (Defender)

A £200,000 capture from Charlton Athletic in September '98, Falkirk-born Stuart made over 200 appearances at The Valley and helped the London Club gain promotion to the Premier League. A consistent performer.

NEIL FITZHENRY (Defender)

Local lad Neil is a strong centre back who has come through the youth ranks and is now in his second season as a professional. Injury restricted his appearances last term to just four and so he is keen to establish himself this year.

SCOTT GREEN (Defender)

Scott signed for Wigan in June 1997 from nearby Bolton Wanderers for a £300,000 fee. Scored on his league debut for Latics on the opening day of last season but failed to add to his tally in 43 more games. A versatile performer, he has played at right back, right wing back, central defence and midfield.

COLIN GREENALL (Defender)

After over 700 professional games the veteran defender became the club's reserve team coach at the start of the season with most observers believing that his appointment signalled the end of his playing career. Six games into the season however Colin was back in the first team playing as a sweeper, and has turned in some impressive displays.

GARETH GRIFFITHS (Defender)

Like Andy Porter, left Vale Park in the summer of 98 on a free transfer under the Bosman ruling. Tall central defender who has been unfortunate with injuries over the past few years. Scored his first goal for Wigan in the Worthington Cup at home to Norwich City.

PAT McGIBBON (Defender)

Strong centre half who is good in the air, Pat is a Northern Ireland international signed from Manchester United in July 1997 for an initial £250,000. Famously scored the goal against Colchester in 1997 that secured Wigan's promotion to Division Two.

CARL BRADSHAW (Defender/Midfielder)

A very versatile player who has twice signed for John Deehan, first when he moved from Sheffield United to Norwich City, and most recently in October 97 when he followed John Deehan to Wigan. Ironically Deehan is now coach at Sheffield United, Bradshaw's home town club. The club captain proved an able deputy in goal for Roy Carroll when the keeper was stretchered off at Wycombe last season, letting in only one goal in a match Wigan won.

KEVIN SHARP (Defender/Midfielder).

Signed from Leeds United in November 95 for a then record £100,000. Canadian born Kevin usually plays at left back, though has occasionally moved into midfield. Is currently out of contract, and has yet to agree new terms with the club.

IAN KILFORD (Midfielder)

Bristol born Ian came to Wigan from Nottingham Forest in 1993 and is the clubs longest serving player. A pacey midfielder he averages a goal every four games. Signed a new two year contract in the summer he is a firm favourite with the fans who appreciate his tremendous work rate.

LEIGH IENKINSON (Midfielder)

Left sided player, who signed on a free transfer from St Johnstone in July 98. Previously with Hull City and Coventry City.





ROBERTO MARTINEZ (Midfielder)

Signed from Spanish Second Division side CF Balaguer in 1995, Roberto was Latics top scorer in his first season in England with thirteen goals. Twice named in the PFA Division Three team he is the only one of Wigan's three amigos still at Springfield Park.

MICHAEL O'NEILL (Midfielder)

Ray Mathias' first signing, Michael arrived on a free transfer from Coventry City in September 1998. Has won 31 Northern Ireland Caps and previously played for Newcastle, Dundee United and Hibernian.

ANDY PORTER (Midfielder)

Signed in the summer of 1998 after he was out of contract at Port Vale. Had spent his entire career at Vale Park after coming through the youth ranks, Andy is a no nonsense tough tackling midfielder.

PAUL ROGERS (Midfielder)

The Former Sutton United, Sheffield United and Notts County midfielder signed for Wigan for £50,000 in their 1997 Championship season. Strong tackler in the middle of the park and when called upon can also play at centre back.

STUART BARLOW (Forward)

Signed on transfer deadline day in March 1998 for £45,000 from Oldham Athletic. A quick striker with an eye for a goal. He started his career with Everton.

SIMON HAWORTH (Forward)

At £600,000 Simon is the club's record signing arriving from Highfield Road, Coventry in October 98. Capped 5 times for Wales, and a regular in the U21 squad. He started his career with Cardiff City.

DAVID LEE (Forward)

Another player who made the short trip from Bolton Wanderers in the summer of 1997.



£250,000 was paid for the former Bury and Southampton winger who is proving as tricky as ever down the right flank.

ANDY LIDDELL (Forward)

Hard-working striker signed from Barnsiey for £375,000 in October 1998. Spent his whole career at Oakwell and was part of the side that took Barnsley to the Premier League. Won 11 Scottish U21 caps.

GRAEME JONES (Forward)

Arrived from Doncaster Rovers in the summer of 96 for £150,000. Proved to be a bargain buy as his 33 goals including four hatricks, helped Wigan to the Championship. His first season in Division Two was dogged by injury and suspension but he still managed 14 goals. A further injury at home to Blackpool in the third league game of this season has sidelined him until after Christmas.

DAVID LOWE (Forward)

Returned to Springfield in March 1996, via Leicester City, nine years after leaving for Ipswich Town. His goal at home to Watford last season beat Peter Houghton's longstanding record of 62 league goals for Wigan Athletic. Captained the side towards the end of last season, and was last year's supporters and players Player of the Season.

JORG SMEETS (Forward)

Signed in October 97 from Dutch side Heracles. Has not yet managed to established himself as a first team regular, however he scored one of the goals of last season a thirty yarder at home to Brentford.

PAUL WARNE (Forward)

Signed pro in July 1997, after regular goal scoring for Norfolk non League side, Wroxham brought him to the attention of John Deehan. Scored five minutes into his first league start in the 2-0 win at Blackpool last term.





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Hatters on Card

SO FAR in this series we have featured cards given away with various products like cigarettes, confectionery, bubble-gum and children's comics.

Another valuable source has been the popular press. From time to time our leading newspapers have issued cards to their loyal readers and as one would expect the "Soaraway Sun" was not left behind in this respect.

For the 1970/71 season they produced a set of 134 swap cards. They were not actually given away with the daily paper. The cards could be obtained by collecting tokens from the Sun, and

sending them to Fleet Street in exchange for a packet of a dozen or so of these picture cards. The idea was to swap them with your friends, and then stick them into a special album which could be purchased from newsagents for two shillings (10p).

There was a curious hierarchy in the make-up of this set. The then First Division clubs were each represented by a team picture, the captain, and a star player. Second Division teams, including Luton at that time, had the same apart from captains, while Division Three sides had just a team photo. The Fourth Division (now Division Three) was not featured at all, and nor were Scottish teams.

Luton's team picture card showed a group of 19 players, which meant they were so small it was difficult to identify most of them. But you could just make out Graham French's Afro hairstyle at the end of the front row. The photo was taken just days before his sensational arrest in July 1970.

Not surprisingly Malcolm Macdonald was chosen as the Town's Star Player, on card No.122.

"SuperMac" had burst on the scene the previous

season, and his 25 League goals had been instrumental in taking us back to the Second Division.

The step up in status proved no problem whatsoever to young Malcolm. Strong, fast, fearless, and above all supremely confident, his goals took Luton to the top of the division, and it looked very likely that he would be banging them in for the Town in Division One the following

> season. Crowds of 20,000 plus hushed in expectancy whenever the bow-legged striker tore down the middle with the ball at that explosive left foot.

Of course, Malcolm did play in the top flight in the next campaign, but not in the way Town fans had dreamed of. After the collapse of our chairman's insurance business and the team's capitulation in the Easter matches that spring, Luton ended in only sixth place. Sadly, it was inevitable that SuperMac would have to go. Newcastle sent down a cheque for £180,000 and a Rolls Royce to take him away, leaving me and countless other Hatters



broken-hearted.

Needless to say, he was a success on Tyneside, for England, and later at Arsenal. It also goes without saying that all of us who saw him play for Luton in those two wonderful years will not forget him.

Those Sun cards are not that common these days, but still go for under a pound each.

Next time we will have a look at another offering from the nation's favourite tabloid.

23rd Ianuary 1937 **Luton Town 2 Exeter 2**

The Town were having a good season. Fresh from an 8-1 thrashing of Cardiff at Kenilworth Road and a 4-0 victory at Crystal Palace and with 'ten goal' Joe Payne in scintilating form the visit of Exeter was seen as a formality.

An early goal from George Stephenson seemed to signal another rout as the Town players toyed with the opposition before the interval, but uncharacteristically Payne decided to have one of those days when nothing would go in.

'Never mind' thought the supporters 'Everything will come right in the second half.'

Unfortunately it did not as Exeter, realising the game was there for the taking, attacked with a will and scored twice against a bewildered Luton defence. With the minutes ticking away, however, Payne took one last throw of the dice and sent a rocket shot into the top corner for a point the Town hardly deserved.

Taking something from a game without playing well is how championships are won as the Hatters were to prove as they looked back on this midseason slip-up.

23rd lanuary 1960 **Luton Town 4 Fulham 1**

Amidst a season of gloom that was to end in the Town suffering relegation from the old Division One there was the occasional beacon of hope.

Fulham had been worthy 2-4 winners at Craven Cottage earlier in the campaign and looked likely to repeat this emphatic victory when clever play between Graham Leggat and Johnny Haynes set up Jimmy Hill for an early goal. Hill then suffered the misfortune of retiring injured with torn knee ligaments and the Town started to push forward against the ten men.

Allan Brown eventually opened the floodgates when he slid through the mud to finish off a shot from Billy Bingham and from then on there was only one likely winner.

Further efforts from Bingham, Gordon Turner and Bob Morton enabled the Town to seal a valuable victory as they attempted to force themselves off the bottom of the table.

23rd January 1982 **Luton Town 0 Ipswich 3** (F.A.Cup)

Top of the old Division Two and coasting towards the championship the Town were about to face their toughest test of the season with Cup visitors Ipswich sitting proudly at the top of Division One. A crowd of 20,188 gathered to see Ipswich keep the Hatters at bay in the first period with only a Ricky Hill shot that hit the bar troubling goalkeeper Paul Cooper. The Blues stepped up a gear in the second half, however, and an Alan Brazil goal on the hour opened up the game.

Luton manager David Pleat gambled by bringing off defender Mark Aizlewood and replacing him with Raddy Antic in an attempt to chase the game but two further goals from Eric Gates emphasised the gap between the sides.

'If Luton go up they will not meet teams like us every week' commented Ipswich striker Paul Mariner afterwards!

a blast from the past courtesy of Roger Wash

It is forty years ago this month that the Hatters embarked on a famous F.A.Cup run that would see them fight their way through to Wembley for the first time in their history. Thoughts of the 'twin towers' were, however, a long way from supporters minds when the run started in January 1959.

The Town were then an established Division One side, following promotion in dramatic fashion four years before, but were going through a rough patch after topping the table in late September 1958. Since soundly beating Preston at Kenilworth Road on September 27th, to go into pole position, only three wins had been recorded out of the fourteen games leading up to the start of the F.A.Cup campaign.

The loss of manager Dally Duncan, who had decided to depart to Blackburn in October, did not help matters and, apart from a 6-3 hammering of Arsenal at Kenilworth Road over Christmas, the players were showing relegation form.

On the Saturday before the F.A.Cup Third Round the Hatters had plumbed the depths with a 0-1 home defeat at the hands of Birmingham and the committee running the playing side, consisting of three directors together with player/coach Syd Owen and trainer Frank King, decided on drastic action.

For the attractive F.A.Cup tie against Leeds at Kenilworth Road out went winger Jimmy Adam and, much to the disgust of the supporters, crowd favourite Gordon Turner to be replaced by young Tony Gregory and veteran Allan Brown. The upshot was that only 18,534 turned up on a cold day to reflect both the Town's lack of form and the disapproval of the team changes.

Ninety minutes later the fans had changed their tune somewhat after the new look side put in a powerful display to completely sweep aside their fellow Division One opponents. Winger Billy Bingham skated over the icy surface to fire the Town into the lead after 16 minutes and after

Leeds full back Jim Ashall injured a wrist, which left him a passenger in the days before substitutes, it was one way traffic.

Tony Gregory increased the lead soon after the interval and although Leeds caused momentary panic when pulling a goal back, Bob Morton soon regained the two goal advantage and further efforts from Bingham and Gregory confirmed an emphatic victory.

The prize for the Town was an away trip to Leicester who were looked on as a bogey side at the time. The two teams had met twice since the War in the F.A.Cup and on both occasions the Foxes had emerged victorious, 3-5 in 1949 after a 5-5 draw and 0-4 in 1956.

Despite this over 3,000 Luton supporters made their way to Filbert Street to swell the crowd to 36,984 on another bitterly cold day. The pitch was a lottery, being partly frozen, and with the players unable to turn the game was liable to hinge on a mistake.

After a grim battle in the first half with the Town having most of the play, Leicester went ahead five minutes after the break when, after the ball crossed the Luton area a couple of times with defenders slipping and sliding, Ian McNeill headed well wide of Ron Baynham in the Hatters goal.

The Town attempted to battle back from this set back but with the game drawing to a close only half chances came their way. There were just thirteen minutes left when Bingham repaid a large slice of his transfer fee by chasing a seemingly lost cause and forcing the ball home for a deserved equaliser. Although Leicester put the Luton goal under tremendous pressure in the closing minutes the defence held firm to earn a replay.

For the first time an F.A.Cup replay was played at Kenilworth Road under floodlights and a crowd of 27,277, which was the best of the season at that stage, turned up to see if the Town could finally lay the Leicester bogey to rest.

They did not have to wait long as, after only nine minutes, Bingham beat full back Joe Baillie with ease and sent over a perfect centre for Brown to head powerfully past Dave Maclaren in the Leicester goal. Ten minutes later Bingham's corner was headed down by Bob Morton to Gregory who lashed in an unstoppable shot.

It was ironic that the two players introduced to the side to the disgust of the supporters should be the ones putting the Town on the way to a resounding victory with the night remaining a personal triumph for Brown. Aided and abetted by Bingham, who was showing mercurial form on the wing, the man who was the butt of the crowds displeasure only a couple of months before slammed in goals in the 56th and 57th minute to claim his hat-trick.

Firstly he chased a long ball down the middle before firing home and then from the restart Bingham sent Gregory away and his pinpoint cross was gobbled up by the ex-Scotland international.

Although Leicester pulled back a consolation

with two minutes to go through Ken Leek new Foxes manager Matt Gillies was faced with a baptism he would rather forget.

The Town already knew that their Round Five opponents would be Ipswich of Division Two at Portman Road and watching manager Alf Ramsey could see that his side would have to be at their best to stand any chance of stopping the in form Bingham and Brown.

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


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Carrying the colours

WE KNOW Luton Town fans turn up in all four corners of the world, but this week we feature one family who have spread themselves more than most on holidays.


Mark Carroll is pictured in his Town kit, with the Great Wall of China providing the dramatic background. The photo was taken at a place called Badaling.

Mr Clark has written again to say:


I was highly delighted to see my name in the match programme. The last time was in a Luton team, written on the back of an envelope by George Martin, v St. Albans, 25.9.1943.

There could be no other team for me. Joe didn't come into my reckoning for the Luton legend because he chose to go to Chelsea after a couple of years.

The 18 nominees were all worthy of merit, but with Gordon Turner the Luton Legend there is no contest. I knew him as a player and then when he ran a sports shop with Wally Shanks.

The 1959 Wembley cup final was a sickener - of course we would have won had Turner been in the team. I could have cried watching him walk onto the Wembley turf in his best suit - pity there were no subs then. I have enclosed a photo of Gordon and myself, taken behind the main stand in the mid to late 50s.

THE FIRST double of the season was achieved with something to spare as the headlines were made by three red cards and a row between Wycombe manager Neil Smillie and referee Matt Messias after the game.

We were well below full strength, with injuries ruling out Graham Alexander, Mitchell Thomas, Gavin McGowan and Paul Showler, but the makeshift formation had a lot too much for a Wycombe side looking more and more like relegation fodder.

Matthew Spring chose the perfect day to score his longoverdue first goal in the league, a 30-yard cracker which must have impressed watching England under-21 manager Peter Taylor.

Flashpoint came 25 minutes later when Phil Gray and Wycombe defender Paul McCarthy were sent off for violent conduct against each other.

Wycombe did not have a lot to offer when they kicked off with five at the back, but they were left without a prayer five minutes into the second half when Neil Ryan was sent off for rugby-tackling Stuart Douglas on a run for

That left a 3-3-2 formation facing a Town side in which Landry Zahana-Oni had been given a debut on the left wing. He was subbed at the interval after struggling on the sticky side of a heavy pitch, under the lee of the main stand. It was not that he had played poorly, said Lennie Lawrence, but because he needed to send on Garv Doherty to replace Gray in attack.

Smillie was incensed not just by his side's two red cards. but by the fact that when Kelvin Davis charged out of his area to body-check Jermaine McSporran, the keeper was yellow-carded, and not, as Smillie expected, sent off.

And his frustration grew as the Town cashed in, with Sean Evers doubling the lead after good work by emergency right back Gerry Harrison, and Douglas, having had two ruled out for offside, scored another excellent goal to round off a brilliant counter-attack.

The only disappointment for Lawrence was that the Town lost their way a little after going three up, and let Wycombe back into it. McSporran shot against a post ten minutes from time, and with three minutes to go Dave Carroll converted the penalty after Sean Dyche was adjudged to have pushed Keith Scott to earn the day's sixth yellow card.


Mr Smillie failed to show up for the after-match Press conference - it turned out he was too busy giving the ref a piece of his mind in the officials' changing room and probably collecting a red card of sorts himself. And he got another 48 hours later - after Wycombe's third defeat in eight days he was sacked.

DEFEAT IN stoppage time was a cruel blow to an injury-hit Town team at Deepdale, against one of the best sides in the Second Division. Referee Frazer Stretton, a prison officer, must hate to see prisoners released on parole - he played more than five extra minutes at the end of the first half, and another seven minutes beyond the 90.

And the last energy-sapping addition condemned us to lose a game on a day when sheer hard work and physical effort had deserved some reward.

Phil Gray joined those absent through injuries, but if it was a makeshift team Preston boss David Moyes was full of admiration for the way the Town set about their task. Inevitably, in front of a big passionate home crowd, it was a case of close down the opposition first, and then hit them on the break.

Part one of the game plan was executed admirably. Part two eventually failed because promising counter-attacks faltered for want of a telling final pass.

Preston created more chances, with Jon Macken missing a couple in the early minutes before Preston were stunned by a 15th-minute goal. Andrew Fotiadis, deputising for Gray, muscled in at the far post to head home from a tantalising free kick played in by Matthew Spring.

Deepdale expects to see its heroes in the First Division next season, but they rarely looked a class above the Town as they probed for openings on a wide front. Only once did a gap open up between Sean Dyche and Marvin Johnson, and luckless Macken miskicked when he should have equalised.

Kelvin Davis tipped over a thundering drive by David Eyres, and in the first minute of the second half was rescued by the crossbar when Paul McKenna beat him with a snorter from 25 yards. But Preston then enjoyed a period of domination, and a raking cross-field ball let in

McKenna for an angled shot which Davis parried, only for Kurt Nogan to pounce for the equaliser. It was his 100th league goal, nine years and three days after his first, for the Town on his debut at Liverpool.

For a brief period after that the Town had to be strong to withstand pressure which was not allowed to amount to too much of a problem in the penalty area, and as Preston's big effort faded the Town got back to be well in contention.

A solo run and shot over the bar by Fotiadis, and a powerful header by Dyche from a corner which went just wide, reminded Preston that defeat was as likely as victory, but 75 seconds into stoppage time Jason Harris, a lively sub who made fresh legs count, headed the winner, on the far post from a cross by McKenna.

For industry and commitment, we deserved a point, was Lennie Lawrence's verdict. But he added: "Our quality on the break was not good enough - too often the last pass was diabolical. But in terms of the effort they put in, I am proud of them."





JUMPING TO IT: Alan White head and shoulders above the rest as Preston's goal comes under attack.







OUR youth squad has had to put up with unusual problems in recent weeks, kicking their heels instead of footballs. It has been frustrating for everyone as games have been called off because of unfit pitches, making it a much longer break than usual over Christmas and the new year.

Other teams have suffered as well, and we are still well clear at the top of the South East Counties League, despite having had no league match since December 12. A home fixture with Oxford Utd and last week's scheduled trip to Reading both fell foul of the weather, and we were hoping for better luck this morning, when we were due to entertain Wycombe Wanderers.

Some of the youth squad have had a little action with the reserves, but we now have a lot of young players mad keen to play a real game.

Even training can be difficult when the ground is as wet as it has been recently. You can't go on to grass areas because if you use them one day they are out of action the next. So you have to chop and change. The artificial pitch at Vauxhall, the main hall at Luton Rugby Club and the gym at Dunstable have all played their part as we try to keep players occupied and fit.

But it's not all bad news: the boys have been involved in exams this week, studying for the GNVQ, mostly in leisure and tourism. A college tutor comes to Kenilworth Road every Thursday, and education is compulsory for all our YTS boys. They all want to be professional footballers, naturally, and we hope they all achieve that ambition. But life is not quite so simple: some will not make the grade, and it is important that they have good qualifications for the future if they have to leave us at 18.

The course our lads take is the equivalent to two A-levels, and they are under continuous assessment to make sure they keep up to date with their studies.

The scheme is backed by the Professional Footballers Association, and that is a tremendous help, with the PFA giving 75 per cent grants towards course fees.

Many young boys who see dreams shattered when they are released by football clubs after doing their YTS time discover that however disappointing it may be, it's not the end of the world. Andrew Barr, for instance, one of the unlucky ones at Kenilworth Road last year, took his GNVQ while he was with us, and he is now at Salford University, taking a degree course which will see him emerge as a qualified physiotherapist.

He might well return to football in that field, while other youngsters will find good jobs in the expanding leisure industry, often at sports and recreation centres.

But of course, all this is of minor consolation to our YTS lads today - all they want to do is get back on the football field, and resume our chase for another South East Counties League championship. Hopefully, in next week's programme, we will have another victory to report.

THE TOWN had the rare experience of losing a match but still rising one place in the league after last week's defeat at Deepdale. Today's visitors, Wigan, were the victims of a mathematical oddity.

On Saturday morning they were 12th, one place above us. Both teams had 34 points, and goals scored decides the pecking order. Both teams had netted 32 goals, so Wigan were above us because they had conceded 26 goals to our 27. While we were scoring through Andrew Fotiadis at Preston, Wigan had a day off, their home game with bottom club Lincoln postponed because the pitch was waterlogged, leaving us one ahead in the goals scored column.

Fulham are still favourites for the championship, but FA Cup diversions could prove costly. After beating Southampton in a replay at Craven Cottage, they went to Maine Road and were stuffed 3-0, their first league defeat in five outings, since Wigan beat them 2-0 at Springfield Park in early December.

With second-placed Walsall idle because Northampton's ground was waterlogged, Preston's victory over us closed the gap, and took them clear of

Stoke, whose match at Macclesfield was another victim of the weather.

Gillingham retained fifth place with a 3-1 home win over York, but the team that is really flying is Bournemouth, who come to Kenilworth Road next Saturday. They boast the only unbeaten home record in the whole of the Nationwide League, and their current run in all competitions is 16 without defeat. The latest success, a 2-0 home win over Notts County, included Mark Stein's 21st goal of the season.

Chesterfield are level on points with Bournemouth, and have perhaps got the away form right at long last. After eight months without a single away victory, they have knocked off two on the trot, at Reading and last week at Burnley.

Reading's surge took an even more dramatic downturn. Bristol Rovers, only one away win to their name until then, celebrated their first visit to the Madejski Stadium by creating history. After a goalless first half Rovers ran in six without reply after the interval, with lamie Cureton netting four in 21 minutes.

Down at the dead men's end of the table, Lincoln and Macclesfield both had games postponed, and Wycombe probably wish the same had happened to

They sacked manager Neil Smillie 48 hours after the defeat at Kenilworth Road, and appointed youth team

physio Terry Evans as caretaker boss while they try to find someone experienced to take

The new man faces a challenge: Wycombe were beaten 1-0 at Adams Park by Millwall, and no-one else in the division matches Wycombe's unhappy record of eight home defeats.

They could be deeper in trouble by tonight: their fixture at Bristol Rovers has been postponed because Rovers are in the FA Cup, while Lincoln, at home to Northampton must fancy their chances of picking up a point or three.
