Tillson's starting to drive the Hatters mad

AYBE Ian Holloway knew something nobody else did when he told Andy Tillson at 1.45pm that he'd be playing his first game for almost five months.

The club skipper may not make the net bulge too often, but he has a habit of doing it against

Tillson had scored to help Rovers to victory the previous two times the Hatters had been in

And when he completed an unusual hat-trick with a match-winning 26th-minute header from the player-manager's free kick, it was the perfect way to celebrate his 200th League appearance for

It's fairytale stuff, but typical of Tillson that his first thoughts went out to the man he had ousted from the side, Steve Foster.

"I really feel for Fozzie," said Tillson. "He's been unlucky to come out of the team because he's been the main man for so long.

"He's the one who has brought young lads like Mark Smith and Mike Trought through alongside him over the last few months and he's helped the side keep quite a few cleans sheets this season.

'But he'll be back - we've had a chat about the situation and things are fine. It's good competition, which is obviously a healthy thing for the

Tillson spent much of his recovery from knee surgery watching Rovers stockpile potential cen-

Though disappointed not to have been involved at Barnsley the previous week, confirmation of his comeback still came as a surprise.

'I was wondering whether I might get a place on the bench," Tillson confirmed. "Just playing again was great, but getting a goal too was really

"It's strange the way I've always seemed to score in this fixture over the last few years, but it's a nice habit to have. I suppose I ought to be singing: 'Can we play you every week!'"

Not all that long ago, it wouldn't have been hard to imagine Rovers conceding a leveller in the final 10 minutes of this sort of match - a blustery wind, a bobbly surface, Luton throwing men forward on the break as they chased the game with the home crowd getting increasingly edgy.

But Tillson's experience and constant encouragement alongside the mobile and impressive Andy Thomson played a major part in securing a

welcome if largely unspectacular win.

There may not have been too much to stick in the memory from what was often a scrappy game of relatively few chances, but Rovers looked the likelier winners pretty much throughout.

The pace and trickery of Jason Roberts and Jamie Cureton up front meant a busy afternoon for on-loan Sean Dyche - predictably and enthusiastically baited by home fans all afternoon - and his central defensive partner Marvin Johnson.

Keeper Kelvin Davis made a noteable diving save to foil Cureton after the break, while Roberts' power on the turn was a constant worry for the depleted visitors. At the other end, the only real scare of note came early in the second half when Gary Doherty saw Rovers' defence open up in front of him for just about the onlytime in the match, but Lee Jones pulled off a


