




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think the occasion proved to be a little bit too much for a few of the lads last week, but it was a great experience for them and, for most, it was the biggest game they have ever played in and you can't buy that sort of experience. I think the scoreline flattered Barnsley a little bit and we did one or two things wrong once they got in front, but we did well in the opening twenty minutes and again in the final quarter of an hour, when Gary Penrice went on and we took the game to them. However, I was a little bit upset that we didn't actually believe we could do it and go for it. As halftime approached, I didn't think we were doing too bad, but the second goal really shook me and I didn't know whether to make a change or not. I wasn't planning to, I was simply thinking of making a few points to the lads. We didn't seem to have too many leaders and on the pitch, but when you look at it, I was asking an awful lot of the team that was out there to expect that. Had I played, I wouldn't have been able to do myself justice and I think I have to be able to show faith in the lads who have come through and I believe a fit Jamie Shore is much better than an unfit Ian Holloway. Obviously, some might say that my experience and the way I go about things might have helped us on the day, but I simply wasn't fit. In the week leading up to the game, we said goodbye to Mark McKeever. I think he is an outstanding talent and he will be sorely missed at the club. We enjoyed having him here and I think he played with Premier League quality. Obviously, he belongs to Sheffield Wednesday, but I wish we'd had the money, and noticed him when he was at Peterborough, and have been able to have brought him here. You will know that I have signed an extension to my contract and I'm very, very proud of that. I think we have got this club up and running and planning for the future and I don't think that's happened before. I think the Board of Directors know which direction they want this club to go. They want a sound, solid base, with a youth set up and a scouting network bringing in quality players of a certain age, who will become financial assets as well as being very good players. The way we are doing things is not the easiest, because you have to rely on talent rather than experience and sometimes when you go into something and you haven't got experience, it makes things that much more difficult but we're having these young lads playing through that

situation, so you will take a few bad results, but because

I want to be here long term I'll take the gamble and the risks. I would rather have young and enthusiastic players than players who have already done the rounds. My dream is to keep all of these players together, eventually, and not have to sell them, unless I think they are not vital to our cause. That will take time, but we are moving that way. The Board are happy with the squad we are getting together and with the way I want to do it. I could have thrown money at all sorts of players when Barry Hayles left, and there was pressure on me to do that, but if you look at Andy Thomson, you realise that you don't have to spend a fortune to bring in a quality player. We will continue to look for players, from abroad, from non-league, the first division or at those like Mark, whose progress is being held up at their club and if we can do that and convince them of the dream we have of getting in The Premiership, I think, eventually, we'll be able to do it. The lads coming through our youth set up are being

treated correctly and I think Phil Bater has got that running absolutely spot on and I don't think we will lose the type of youngsters that we might have done in the past, because we can now offer them the best of everything, including the opportunity to play in the first team at a younger age than they would anywhere else. My plan is to stop playing myself, but its about getting the timing of that right and it may be a little bit frustrating for our fans if they see that myself and Gary Penrice aren't playing, but all we ask is for a little bit of patience, because we know what we are trying to do here and I think the place is really moving forwards. From to top bottom I think the club is being run correctly and the fans deserve that, but we want to build and we want to stay here for a long, long time. This is only the start. We all share the same dream of playing stylish football with good players. We have to teach them how to play these big games, because they are all so young, but that will come.

Our fans are magnificent, as they demonstrated last week. They always have been and always will be and I think they know that we want to get something right for them and be here and share it with them, and not use this club as a stepping stone for ourselves.

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CAPTAIN'S COMMENTS

I don't care what anyone says, it was a great achievement to get to the fifth round of the FA Cup and we enjoyed a good day last Saturday. People will be disappointed we lost to Barnsley, but we did well to get that far and it's better to have reached the fifth round than to have gone out in the first round. I think the lads can take great heart from putting a good cup run together. Our fans turned out in great numbers again last week and I'm sure they enjoyed it though, at the end of the day, the result was disappointing.

I was commentating on the game for Radio Bristol and really felt for the lads when the second goal went in just before half-time. Craig Hignett is obviously a very good player, but if we had only been one down at the break, we could have, perhaps, been talking about how to take care of him in the second half. However, when you are 2-0 down, you can't really deploy someone to undertake man for man making duties, because you will lose a little bit from your own game. It was, therefore, always going to be difficult and it was just a shame that, on the day, we couldn't hold out a little bit longer. Our fans were absolutely brilliant. It was amazing to see so many blue and white quartered shirts in the ground and its just a shame that the game finished up as it did.

We had drawn our previous two games, against Colchester and Preston and these days it seems as though its sometimes better to win a few games and lose the odd one, rather than draw as many as we have, at least in terms of gaining points. We have put quite an impressive run together of late and not been beaten that often, but we do need to take three points from a few more of our league games, so its important that we do get a few wins under our belt now. It was disappointing to concede a last minute penalty against Colchester and although I haven't seen the replay of the incident since. I didn't think it was a penalty at the time. Still, these things happen and decisions do go against you sometimes. The following week, we went to Preston and put in an outstanding performance. Deepdale is a difficult place to go and get a result. After falling behind early on, we showed great resilience to hit back and go in 2-1 ahead a half-time. I think we were unfortunate to


concede an equaliser, but the draw meant that we had lost another two valuable points.

Its back to league action against today against a Luton side and that caused us a lot of problems during the first half of our game at Kenilworth Road earlier in the season. We spoke about how to combat these problems at half-time and gave a good account of ourselves in the second half. They are a decent team and capable of scoring goals, but we have done well against them at home in the past and, hopefully, we can do well again today. Starting today, we have five home games over the next three weeks and its important that we pick up as many points as possible. Our cup run has been a little bit of a distraction and as much as we enjoy them, it means we get behind with our league fixtures, so now its time to get our heads down and crack on with our fixtures and keep progressing, because we've got a good young side and a lot to be proud of, so we just need to keep things going.

We enjoyed a day on the golf course before the Barnsley game and Gary Penrice and I were the last back to the Clubhouse. We completed sixteen holes before the cold got to us, which was quite a few more than the rest of the lads! There are only a few golfers in the squad now, but it was a good get together and we all had a laugh and a joke out on the course and enjoyed the day.

Whilst I am nearing match fitness and raring to go, its good to report that Tom White is also on the way back. He played the second half of a reserve team game ten days ago and did well, even though he picked up a dead leg midway through the half. Its been a long time since he was able to take part in a match and we were all pleased to see him out on the pitch again.

Waiting in the Wings

ONE TO WATCH - DREW SHORE

Former pupil of Chew Valley School, Drew Shore played for St... Nicholas and Boca before joining Rovers. He also represented Bath and Wansdyke at District level, Somerset at County level and played for South West England. A central midfielder, who can also play on the left of midfield and at left back, he has been a regular member of our South East Counties side this season.

HE SAYS: "I thought I played really well at the beginning of the season, but then I went through a bit of a bad patch. However, I seem to be getting it together again now. Before I came here, I thought I would play quite a few games in the South West Counties side, but I've played every game in the South East Counties side, which I'm quite happy with. The games are a lot faster than schoolboy football, though, as you don't get half as much time on the ball, you have to think a lot quicker and your touch has to be so much better. Its also been a good experience to play at some very good grounds, including The Memorial Stadium and London Road, Peterborough.

Since I was very young, I've almost always played in a central midfield position, but Phil has started playing me wide on the left, because I'm naturally left footed. I didn't start off too well in that position, but now I'm getting used to it. I'm really enjoying it. I would say that my strengths are my crossing and my shooting, because I've got quite a good left foot. However, there are areas of my game I need to improve, namely my heading and using my right foot. I'm also enjoying combining my studies with my football and I'm studying leisure and tourism at college.

I've played a couple of reserve games this season, as well, and I just want to keep doing well, really. It helps being with such a good group of players. We are all really close and get on well together."

PHIL SAYS: Its great that Drew, and many of the other lads on three year scholarships are playing South East Counties football. The good part about the system is that our first year trainees, including Drew, have not only played at this level, but in U-21 and reserve team games as well, whereas they would normally only play in the South West Counties side. It hasn't been a problem for Drew, because he's a very, very strong player and he can deal with the physical side of things, though he does need to work on his understanding of how I am asking him to play at present, because I have played him out of position. He is a midfield player and I think he may even end up playing full-back. I've been talking about that to Roy Dolling recently and we think, because he is such a strong player, he may well play better with the game in front of him, but I've been playing him wide on the left which means he has to get wide when we attack and then has to fill in when we defend and it's a very demanding role.

We have problems asking our pros to fill that role and Drew has found it difficult over the last few weeks, but I have been more than pleased with him this year and I think he's been outstanding. To come here in his first year and to do what he's done, played the amount of games he has and filled in that position to help me out, is fantastic. When everything has settled down, then maybe I can play him in his own position. He's a left footer, very strong, as I've already mentioned and very, very determined. He is a great tackler, when he wants to be, doesn't take any prisoners and has a great left foot shot on him as well. He's definitely not an out and out left winger, but I play him there to balance the side. He's also a grafter, perhaps lacking in a bit of pace, but over the course of his three years, he could well develop into an excellent left back. He's already taken a big step and in the few months he's been here, has



achieved more than many youngsters at other clubs. We have come up against sides this season who haven't included any first year trainees in their line-up. Drew doesn't lack confidence and he and the other lads have been together quite a long time and are a great group to work with. They all know each others styles of play and help each other out, though they let themselves down at times, through a lack of knowledge. In other words, they haven't learnt how to play the game properly yet, but their willingness and attitude is first class. Like many of the lads, his family are right behind him. His father, whom I've known quite a long time, is

right behind him. His father, whom I've known quite a long time, is fantastic and watches all of our games. However, he's never interfered or pressurised us and lets us get on with things, which is nice.

I've had to explain to Drew why I've played him out of position, but at his age, I think that's what its about and the lads will get moved around. However, I have to say that he's a very talented boy and I have high hopes for

him, I really have.

"It's a game I'd like to forget" said Phil Bater after his side suffered a crushing 7-0 defeat at Brentford. "We had a long journey, through thick fog and arrived a quarter of an hour before kick off. It wasn't too long before I was wishing we hadn't arrived at all! However, there are no excuses for this result. Football is a game which is 90% playable in the head and we never applied ourselves from the start. Brentford were a big, physical side, who dominated us from the kick-off and it taught our players a lesson in that ability alone is not enough and unless you go out and physically compete with the opposition, then you will not get anywhere.

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
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


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LUTON TOWN FOOTBALL CLUB

t has certainly been a season of mixed fortunes for Luton Town, with widely contrasting fortunes in both the league and in cup competitions.

When Rovers lost 2-0 at Kenilworth Road in September, it was the eighth game both teams had played and Luton seemed set for a promotion campaign with a single defeat leaving them in second place. But going into last weekend's home game with Wrexham, following a long-awaited

away win at Burnley, Town had sunk to mid-table with their results since the turn of the year including a 4-0 home defeat against Wigan Athletic.

In the Worthington Cup, a tricky looking first round tie against Oxford United was won 5-4 on aggregate and they followed this up with even more impressive victories over Ipswich Town and Coventry City, before eventually going out to Barnsley in the fourth round.

Compare this to the FA Cup, where the second round brought a home tie against the third division's bottom side Hull City - and a 1-0 defeat. The most significant departures since Euton were last at the Memorial



Meet the Boss – Lennie Lawrence


hat have Croydon, Carshalton and Sutton United all got in common that can't be matched by any league club? They all had Lennie Lawrence turn out for them as a player.

Lawrence has become one of the most enduring faces on the managerial merry-go-round despite having failed to hit the heights in his playing days. He got a start in management as number two at Plymouth Argyle and has hardly been out of work since.


After filling a similar post at Lincoln

City, he made the right move to become reserve team coach at Charlton Athletic. He was promoted to the manager's job and not only took them into what is now the Premiership, but kept them there for four years.

Lawrence finally left Charlton after nine years in 1991 to take over Middlesborough, who he again led into the top division. This time life in the top flight lasted just one season, Lawrence was replaced by Bryan Robson and then came a new challenge at Bradford City. The Brighton-born manager was in charge at Valley Parade for 18 months and had a short break before joining a Luton Town team struggling at the bottom of the first division in 1995. He failed to keep them up but had already started to improve things and the following season saw them bounce back to achieve a play-off place.

Stadium in April and went down 2-1 to goals from Peter Beadle and Andy Tillson have been in midfield and defence. Former Rovers skipper Gary Waddock, who always seemed to enjoy playing against the Gas as much as he enjoyed playing for us, retired in the summer, and inspirational centre-half Steve Davis rejoined Burnley - in time to play a key role in that 4-3 victory last month

Luton's goalscorer in the April game, David Oldfield, has also returned here with another club this season, but he suffered a 1-0 defeat with Stoke City. Town are most likely to be looking to Gary Doherty, Stuart Douglas, Andrew Fotiadis or Phil Gray to score their goals today.

Doherty was originally seen as a centrehalf but moved up front during an injury crisis and is now starting to score some important goals. He was on the mark in the recent home game against Bournemouth and came off the bench to





score the winner at Burnley. He worked his way through the ranks, playing in central defence for the Luton team which reached the semi-finals of the FA Youth Cup and won their league last season. He has been capped at youth level by the Republic of Ireland.

Douglas is two years Doherty's senior but came up by the same route and made his debut against Oldham when just 17. He scored twice in the cup games against Ipswich and got the third goal in the 3-1 home defeat of Wycombe Wanderers. Twenty one year old Fotiadis won England schools caps at under 15 and under 18 level before finishing his A-Levels and becoming a full-time professional with Luton. He scored the

first goal at Burnley and his other victims have included Preston North End and Ipswich.

Gray is in his second spell with Luton, having first cost them £275,000 when he signed from Tottenham Hotspur in 1991.


He scored 22 goals in just 59 league games before an offer of £800,000 was enough to take him on to Sunderland for three years. His travels since then have taken in Nancy in France and Fortuna Sittard in Holland before £400,000 brought him back to Kenilworth Road in September 1997. He has suffered a string of injuries since but was recalled to the Northern Ireland squad in November. The midfield is likely to include a Scot enjoying life much better in England second time around. Ray McKinnon had a disastrous time at Nottingham Forest, having cost £750,000 from Dundee United. He was one of Brian Clough's latest signings and did not find favour with new manager Frank Clark. He moved to Aberdeen and then Dundee United again before joining Luton in the summer.

Other regulars have been the locally produced Sean Evers, Matthew Spring and Paul McLaren. Evers broke into the league team midway through last season and stayed there, Spring came on as a substitute for Waddock in last season's game and McLaren only missed three league games last season - including the game at the Mem - after taking over Ceri Hughes' role when he signed for Wimbledon.

Town are also well blessed with young talent in wide positions with both Andre Scartlett, who scored on his league debut as a substitute against Oldham in October, and Michael McIndoe featuring recently. McIndoe also made his debut earlier this season.

Left winger L'Andry Zahana Oni may also feature. He was born in the Ivory Coast but is a French national and had six years with Le Havre before joining Bromley in the Ryman Premier League, via Stirling Albion. Lawrence paid £25,000 for him in January, with more to follow dependent on appearances.



Arsenal and played six league games for the Gunners before signing for Luton in June after a number of loan spells with the club. Other defenders are Graham Alexander, Stuart Fraser and Alan White. Alexander cost £100,000 from

Scunthorpe United in 1995 and although he has frequently turned out at right-back for Luton, he is probably happier in

Fraser skippered last season's titlewinning youth team and made his debut in the last game of last season against Carlisle United. White cost £40,000 when Lawrence signed him from one of his former clubs, Middlesborough, in

Goalkeeper Kelvin Davis is another product of the Hatters' youth policy who finally became first choice last season after seeing off two Americans, Juergen Sommer and Ian Feuer. Davis was sent off in the game against Wigan that ended in a 4-0 defeat. His understudy is Nathan Abbey, a 21 year old who made his first team debut last season and has had a loan spell with Woking in the Conference. KEVAN BLACKADDER

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

The team could actually BE relegated as well, which doesn't help. Conversely a few more assaults on the big boys at the top can raise the expectancy level a tad too high and the fans become more easily frustrated sound like anyone we know? A bit strange then to supposedly wish for less success, but I'm not one of these freaks who are a roof short of a Clubhouse obviously I want the Gas to suffocate everyone else and take all the silverware. But I like the way we've come out of the wash - the reliable pair of pants that fit comfortably and never run with those damned red socks year after year. 

Tomorrow's World

he week ahead is an important one for many of the youngsters currently at the club, as our second year trainees will learn whether they are to be offered a professional contract next season.

"As far as they are concerned," says Roy Dolling, "the rules state that we must let them know if they are to be taken on two months before they are due to finish their time as a trainee, so really, we have until May to let them know our decision. However, if we leave things until then, those that are being released will not have the opportunity of arranging trials for themselves with other clubs. This is because most youth team football fixtures are completed by the end of March and I think it is unfair to wait until May before notifying the boy that he is being released, as it will mean he has to wait until the following September to have the opportunity of training with another club. We feel that by telling them of our decision as early as possible, it will help them get a chance elsewhere and gives us a chance of helping them obtain another club."

It's a difficult task, telling a youngster that he is not being offered a professional contract. "The easiest part of my job," says Roy, "is getting them to sign for us in the first place. Some of the boys we will be releasing will have been with us for a long time and won't understand how they can have spent so much time here and still not be offered anything and it is very hard to tell them they are being released. All I can say to them, right from the beginning, is that they have had the opportunity that probably 90% of young footballers

don't ever get. As a football club, we pride ourselves on being honest with them all and, whatever happens, I will be sat round the table with Phil when the boys are told of our decision. During the day they are told, we will have telephoned their parents to let them know, so that when the boy gets home, it will soften the blow. There is, though, nothing worse than telling a boy he is not going to be taken on, because he won't listen to anything else you say and whatever else you try to say doesn't really help. I suggest that I call round to their house to see them and though that's something they may not want at first, I usually call round within a week to talk to them and I will do my utmost to help them find another club."

Any decision to retain or release a player is of course, merely an opinion, as Roy explains. "One of the first things I tell them is that it is an opinion of this football club at this time. We don't know what will happen in, say a years time and we would be foolish to tell any youngster that they are not good enough to make it in the pro game, because it depends on what quality of player other clubs are looking for and during the last two years of playing youth team football, they will have been watched closely by a representative of our opponents, in the same way that I will have been watching the players of other clubs. The important thing is that the players we release, leave in the right frame of mind and understand that we are simply expressing an opinion. Some will say they will prove us wrong, but I don't think we should look at it that way. We have to wish them well and hope that

what we have done for them during their time with us has been good. The positive thing is that we will have improved their game whilst they have been with us and whatever the age they are when they leave the club, the coaching we have given them will mean they will be a better player than when they first joined us. Just to illustrate that point, a parent of one of the lads we recently released from our Centre of Excellence, told me that he appreciated the fact that we had improved his boys games at no cost, other than his transport to the training sessions, whereas his other son, a promising tennis player, has to pay for specialist coaching to improve his game, with no guarantee of success."

There's no doubt about it, football is a harsh world and dreams of becoming a professional will be shattered for some of our lads next week. However, as one door closes for some, another opens for others, as decisions are also being taken on next years intake on to the three year scholarship scheme. We'll be looking at that process and also the decisions that need to be taken at Centre of Excellence level in our next programme.

Ithough he was born and raised in Bristol, David Lee's route into the professional game was with Chelsea. "They had a Bristol based scout," he recalls "and though I'd had one or two offers from other clubs, I decided to sign for Chelsea, as I was impressed with their set up at the time. I left school at 16, graduated through the youth and reserve teams, got into the first team squad towards the end of the 1987/88 campaign and made my debut the following season." That debut came against Leicester City, at Stamford Bridge, on 1 October 1988 and was marked with a goal. "Yes, we were one down and I scored the equaliser then I got brought down for a penalty, which was converted by Graham Roberts and we won 2-1, so it was a good debut."

Having spent such a long time with Chelsea, he inevitably, saw many changes and, by my reckoning, played under seven different managers.

"That's right," he says adding "some were good, some bad, others indifferent. However, I enjoyed every minute of my time at the club and though there were many changes, they were for the better. I think Glenn Hoddle started things off, really, and it was a shame to see him go, but you don't get offered the England managers job every week! Personally, I was sad that he left, because I had just established myself in the side in what I regard as my best position when he went. I played under Ruud Gullit when he came in, but I broke my leg soon afterwards, which was a bit of a nightmare. After that, I

afterwards, which was a bit of a nightmare. After that, I was unable to get back into the side." It was whilst he was out injured that the influx of foreign stars into the club began, which made for an interesting atmosphere around the dressing room. "It was certainly different, and I found that the English players used to stick together, as did the foreign players, but not in a bad way. Its just that their idea of life is different to ours." He played just one league game and had a couple of outings as a substitute in the Coca Cola Cup last season, after his return to action, but was faced with the prospect of seeing out his contract in Chelsea's reserve side. "My

seeing out his contract in Chelsea's reserve side. "My contract was up at the end of this season and the club wouldn't let me go out on loan. There was no point, really, so it was a case of finding another club and playing first team football again. I could have sat in the reserves and picked up my wages, but that's not really me. I'm 29 and don't need to be playing

So, after a frustrating morning spent training with Bristol City, in stepped Ian Holloway. "He's been brilliant to me," says Dave "he was on the phone to me when he heard I was available and told me exactly what things were like at the club. He didn't pull any punches and told me that he had a good set of young lads here and he wanted someone with my experience to come in to help them play.

I have a lot of time for him. He didn't give me any bull on the phone, told me just what it was going to be like, and that was



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

The players believe that if we can put a little run together, we have a good chance of making the play-offs. That's my aim, anyway. I haven't come here just to play and pick up my money, I want to

proud, I just get on with things and muck in. I have to wash my own kit now, but it doesn't bother me. I left home at 16 and had to grow up pretty quickly, so things like that don't bother me at all."

The 6-0 win at Reading a few weeks ago, brought back memories of other high scoring games he's been involved


figures, but it was brilliant to win 6-0 away from home and it says something about the boys, really."



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
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
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Second Glance

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



t's taken longer than usual this season, but Gasheads can finally start talking about 'concentrating on the league' now. As with anyone who comes out with that cliché we'd clearly rather be looking forward to the next round, but the quarter finals will have to wait for another year. The scoreline at Barnsley was as flattering to them as the Orient result in the previous round was to Rovers and but for a few lapses in concentration it could have been a great deal closer. To be honest, the main difference between the sides was probably experience. Rovers, yet again had no choice but to field a very young side, while Barnsley not only had last season's Premiership campaign behind a number of their players but also the impressive Craig Hignett. The fact that Rovers were without players used to competing at a higher level, with Holloway and Thomson unavailable, merely compounded the problem. Saving all of that, Rovers still matched Barnsley for long periods, and a game like that also prepares the team for the future. Barnsley's previous experience was invaluable to them last weekend and the tie will have taught Rovers important lessons too. We all know that Ian Holloway is building a team with a view to long term and lasting success, rather than immediate silverware and the Barnsley match is another step in the learning process. Cliché or not we can now concentrate on the league, and catching up on a few of our numerous games in hand. Rovers have shown what we're capable of, and a late push for the play-offs is still not out of the question. One person who certainly has seen their own season end since my last programme notes is Glenn Hoddle. The Hoddle saga has been debated to the death (and beyond) the length and breadth of the country but the biggest question still remains at the time of writing. No, not whether Hod was a donkey herder (does such a thing exist?) in a previous life, but who'll take over from him. More to the point, is there anyone who actually wants to take over? It looks increasingly like Kevin Keegan may be about to jump into the lions den, despite his continual denials that he is interested. and I certainly won't be surprised if he's installed by the time you read this. If he

doesn't take it, then I can't say I blame him.

In fact I don't blame anvone who doesn't fancy the job. the country. They weren't wrong either. You get constant media attention and rabid inspection of your private life throughout your time in 'office'. Hoddle made things even worse by seemingly courting attention through comments which ranged from the cranky (anything to do with Eileen) to the downright insane (the fateful last interview), not to mention recording conversations with players and writing about them while still in the job. But, even if you don't do any of this then public interest in football is so high in this country that the press will still find something to write about. In the end though, it wasn't any of the written media who brought home to me exactly how far things had gone. Instead it was a newsflash on ITV, which wasn't even to announce the Coach's departure but merely to say that the FA would make a statement on the situation the next day. It amazed me. I'd always thought that newsflashes were reserved for royal deaths, catastrophes and other extraordinary events, but here was one saying that England Coach may or may not be in a job the next day. And then you get Tony Blair talking about Hoddle on Richard and Judy. Quite frankly I found the whole concept of Blair on Richard and Judy bizarre in the extreme but talking about

Hoddle as well was pretty astonishing. It got worse later in the week when William Hague brought up Blair's involvement in Prime Minister's Question Time. OK, it happens in Italy, but has the House of Commons ever debated the position of the England Manager before? I half expected the Queen to come out with a statement too. Well Prince Harry at least... In return for all the grief, all you get is a reported salary of £100-£200k, although the FA is supposed to be reviewing this. They'll need to if they want to land Keegan, as Mr Al Fayed is almost certainly paying him a great deal more than that already! OK, you get the prestige as well but that's hardly compensation for the negative aspects of the job or a relatively small salary. If I were Keegan, O'Neill or any of the others linked with the job then I'd certainly stay where I was. After all, Keegan has a fairly adoring audience at Fulham, albeit a relatively transient one, but he's far less likely to get the same sort of idolisation in the England job. No, if I were him I'd stay put in a job that is undoubtedly stressful, but has nowhere near as much pressure as he'd get as England supremo. 



On the same day, en route to a convincing Third Division (South) championship, today's visitors Luton attracted a crowd of 27.632 for their visit to Vicarage Road where, surviving a goal from the former Manchester City forward Len Fletcher, the Hatters won 3-1. Four weeks later, two more Hartill goals helped Rovers defeat the champions-elect 4-0 in a very convincing display at Eastville.



Player of the day Despite claims from a certain Ian Holloway, who started a game for Rovers for the first time on this date in 1982, and birthday boys Dave Rushbury and Mike Adams (sixteen and one league game(s) respectively), today's star name is Billy Hartill. Wolverhampton-born in 1905, Hartill was Wolves's record league goalscorer until his tally was bettered in 1991 by Steve Bull. His 162 league goals included two five goal hauls. After spells at Everton and Liverpool, 30 vear old Hartill joined Rovers in March 1936 and was to score nineteen goals in 36 league matches before retiring through injury. He played in the infamous twelve goal defeat at Luton, but he bounced back with a hat-trick against Torquay 62 years ago today. Hartill later ran a pub; he died in Walsall in 1980.

Died on this date

George Tweed, who died in Wells 28 years ago today, made 25 league appearances for Rovers as right back. Born in Newmarket in 1910, he had been Newmarket Town's top scorer in 1930/31 before being converted into a defender and spent six years with his home town club before being signed by Coventry City. He was on Rover's books from August 1936 to October 1937, before making 31 league appearances for Gillingham. The Gills lost their league status in 1938, and Tweed went on to represent Bath City and Gloucester City.





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Retro Rovers

ne of the many responses received following the announcement of the formation of an ex-players association, came from a relative of Bert Edwards, who was on Rovers books in the 1930's. Bert played just once for Rovers first team, in a Division 3 (South) Cup Tie, against Coventry in January 1934 and in doing so, became a member of a select band of players who have appeared for the club in a first team match, but never represented the club in a football league fixture.

I recently spent a couple of hours with Bert and his wife, in their home at Lawrence Weston and though he's 86 years old and not in the best of health, he enjoyed talking of his two seasons at Rovers, of the players he remembered and of his lifelong support for the club.

A left winger, Bert played in a Woodcock Shield Final for Mina Road School against Windmill Hill, at Ashton Gate, at the age of eleven. He had played for St George and Hanham before the flamboyant Rovers manager Captain Albert Prince-Cox signed him for Rovers. As a part-time professional, he trained with the first team and attended evening training sessions on the Eastville pitch, supervised by either first team trainer Harry Lake or reserve team trainer Bert Williams.

Sadly, Bert has no photographs or press cuttings of his time with Rovers, but recalls only too well his one senior game for the club, which ended in a 2-2 draw. The brief report of the game in the "Evening Post" read as follows:-

"Rovers did well to force a replay in the Southern Section Cup Tie with Coventry City, where 9543 spectators saw the teams share four goals. Smith, who gave a promising display at centre forward, gave Rovers an early lead but Lake soon equalised and Lauderdale put Coventry ahead midway through the second half. Only three minutes remained to play, with Coventry still leading 2-1, when a dropping shot by Lewis deceived Pearson, who concluded that it would fall behind the

Edwards, the former Bristol St George player and the ex-Bristol schoolboy was given a run at outside left, taking the place of Watson. A little nervous at the start, he improved as the game progressed and he did some useful work in the second half."

Having spent most of his Rovers career playing for the reserves in the Western League, Bert later played for Street in the same competition. Having been sacked by Robinson's for taking too much time off to watch Rovers, he went on to work for BAC. He also played football for the company, as the team photo from 1939, reproduced here, shows. He served in the Navy during the war and continued to watch Rovers, whenever possible, when the war ended. Indeed, his wife recalls queuing up for a ticket for him for the FA Cup replay against Newcastle in 1951.

Strangely enough, for the replayed cup tie against Coventry, Rovers fielded another player who was making his only first team appearance for the club. T. Cowan was in the side that lost 2-1 at Coventry on 1 February 1934, but had the satisfaction of providing the pass which led to Rovers goal,

as reported in the local press "Cowan got the ball and gave a shrewd pass to McCambridge. The latter made no mistake and gave Rovers the lead."

On March 15th 1988, though, five players turned out for Rovers in the Gloucestershire Cup Final at Ashton Gate, against Bristol City and none of them was to make an appearance in league football for the club. In fact, manager Gerry Francis named a reserve side for the game, saying that it was no reflection on the competition, but he had such a small squad that he couldn't risk injuries or suspensions whilst his side were battling to avoid relegation. Rovers lined up as follows:

Mark Stevens, Nigel Patterson, Steve Yates, Lee Howells, Nicky Tanner, Jason Eaton, Ian Weston, Gerry Francis, Richard Dryden, Martin Boyle, Christian McClean Substitutes: Marcus Carota for Francis, David Mehew for Dryden.

The match report read as follows:

"It was a hard fought game and a credit to the young players on both sides. Rovers rookies contributed fully to a really entertaining first half, yet found themselves 3-0 down at the interval as Paul Fitzpatrick, Steve Galliers and John Pender all scored. However, Rovers launched several dangerous attacks and Jason Eaton forced City 'keeper Mark Coombe to make two fine saves and Ian Weston and Lee Howells shot narrowly

The second half proved to be an anti-climax, apart from Rovers consolation goal, scored by substitute Carota, with a 30 yard volley on 71 minutes, which Coombe could only get a hand to as it fizzed into the roof of the net.

The report concluded that no youngster on either side shone as an obvious future league player.

In the case of Boyle, Carota, Howells, Patterson and Stevens, the report was correct, as they never did make a league appearance in Rovers colours. However, like Bert Edwards and Cowan and a number of others before them, they can at least say they came as close as they possibly could.


