#### **Brian Swain reports**

FEARING that the very existence of Luton Town may be under threat, various groups of supporters have joined forces to launch a campaign to rally public backing for the

Their umbrella organisation is FLAG - Fans of Luton Action Group - and they see Bournemouth's survival plan as a model for what could be achieved for the Town.

John Kelly, the receiver, has emphasised the importance of having a survival plan as soon as possible. His continued appointment is likely to put at risk the club's membership of the Football League, and lead to increased uncertainty over its future. An advert was published in the financial Press this week offering for sale the business and assets of Luton Town as a going concern.

Leading members of Luton Town Supporters Club, Loyal Luton SC and the Mad as a Hatter fanzine have united in FLAG and their plan is to get the people of Luton to follow the example set when Bournemouth were close to liquidation.

The aim is to buy the club for the community, and ensure its survival though the combination of a supporters' trust and investors.

FLAG will launch its campaign on Sunday, with a public meeting, open to all, at the Vauxhall After Sales complex at Luton Road, Chalton. It starts at 6 pm and FLAG hopes for a full house to demonstrate solid support to achieve the objectives of safeguarding the future of Luton Town FC.

#### **Objectives set out**

ONE DOWN, two to go, was the progress report at Kenilworth Road as we go into the last month of the season. After recent traumatic times, top of the priority list for Lennie Lawrence and the players was to achieve Second Division survival.

The victory over York settled our nerves on that score, but two new targets were immediately set by the manager: beat last season's total of 57 points, and finish in the top half of the table.

We are on course, but 12th place looks the best likely. The boss accepts that it would take a very unlikely combination of results to allow us to overhaul Reading, who are

But Notts County, Blackpool and Wrexham are all competing with us for 12th place, and the target is to ensure they are all below us when the final table is compiled. (See page 45).

#### Mixed memories

IT WAS a pleasure to meet Darren McDonough at Boundary Park on Good Friday. Although he finished his career with Kevin Keegan at Newcastle United, he still supports Oldham, his first club and Luton, his second. He recalls with great affection his days at Kenilworth Road, except for the injury nightmare that cost him a place in a Wemblev showpiece.

Now 36, "Dasmo" looks little different from the 24-year-old defender John Moore signed from Oldham for £85,000 in the autumn of 1986. His best days came when Peter Nicholas was sold to allow McDonough to claim a regular place as defensive midfielder in the old First Division, but a cruel injury robbed him of a place in our 1988 Littlewoods Cup final squad - he was injured in training 48 hours before the big game, and a succession of injuries kept him on the sidelines for nearly two years.

Keegan was beginning to rebuild Newcastle in the spring of 1992, when United were in danger of dropping into the Third Division, and his first transfer deal was to sign McDonough from the Town for £90,000. But an Achilles injury struck soon afterwards, forcing McDonough into early retirement five years ago.

He went back to Lancashire, and is still well-respected at Oldham - he made his debut at Boundary Park as an 18-year-old. His last game there, before we signed him, was a 1-0 win against Ipswich - and Ron Futcher got the goal from a penalty.

McDonough still likes his football, is a committed Oldham supporter, and regularly attends Boundary Park matches. He now earns his living in the construction trade.

# from the manager's chair



AFTER the run of four games unbeaten, including a narrow but deserved home win over York, we faced two difficult and contrasting away matches at Northampton and Manchester City.

The game at Northampton, against a very strong and physical outfit, was a poor spectacle, not helped by the high wind and a bumpy pitch. A 0-0 draw would have been an accurate reflection of the ability of both teams as attacking forces, but we conceded a sloppy goal and missed two chances at the end. We felt hard done by when we came home with nothing, having dominated much of the game.

Manchester City on Wednesday was an entirely different kettle of fish. City are a big club playing in a wonderful stadium, which illustrates the unbelievable variation there is in the Second Division this season. I don't think there has ever been such disparity in this league between clubs in terms of size of ground, attendances and financial muscle, or lack of it.

We knew that the game would be played at a quicker pace, not by "direct" football, but by players' ability to move the ball around quicker, and so it proved.

To concede two goals in the first eight minutes was a bitter blow. Our defenders thought there was an offside in the build-up to the first, although I doubt it. For the second no-one in the entire ground, including the Manchester City players, expected a corner to be given. Except for the referee, that is, who over-ruled his assistant as the City players were turning away to face the goal kick that should have been given. We then contrived to make the problem worse, with poor defending at the set piece leaving us two down.

To their credit, the players battled back, and perhaps Manchester City took their foot off the pedal to some degree. We put in a commendable performance, especially considering the youthfulness and inexperience of some of our players. But we did not pose a real attacking threat until the last quarter of an hour. A consolation goal would have been deserved, and it might have given City a nervous last ten minutes, but it was not to be. You can only ask players, of whatever age, to put in their lot, and they did, and Wednesday night should be a great learning experience for them.

We are facing difficult times, as you know, and on the field we have not been helped by the number of men unavailable to us. Marvin Johnson was suspended at Northampton, while Liam George and Gary Doherty are still in Nigeria with the Irish youth team. Julian James and Paul Showler are on the long-term injured list. The treatment room has also been busy with Phil Grav. Ray McKinnon, Paul McLaren, Tony Thorpe, Andrew Fotiadis and Jimmy Cox.

I hope Tony Thorpe will return to the team today, after going on as a sub at Maine Road, but we lose Gavin McGowan through suspension, so once more it will be an opportunity for a young player to come in and make a name for himself.

We are also about to lose another valuable asset: Sean Dyche plays his final game for us today, his loan ended by the regulations. I have already said that the best loan signing I have ever made in my management career was Rory Allen.


Sean Dyche runs him very close for his professionalism, consistency, performances and for being totally committed to the club, despite only being here on loan. I can't make the deal permanent yet, but if anything needs to be made permanent, it is his signing. We will have to wait to see what develops, but in the meantime I want to put on public record our appreciation of Sean Dyche's services, on and off the field alike.

Finally, I offer a warm welcome to Lincoln, where I spent some of the early days of my coaching career. We had an exciting game with them at Sincil Bank in the 2-2 draw in November, but now their Second Division life hangs by a thread. A win today would keep their hopes alive. Anything less means they will probably be relegated. So we can expect another battle.

But we too, have our objectives. I want to finish in the top half of the table, and with the ridiculously small number of senior players available, that would be no mean achievement. So today for both teams, it is all about result, more than performance. I hope we give you both.

## captain's log



WE HAVE suffered a couple of setbacks in terms of results at Northampton and Maine Road, but the dressing room is not downhearted as we prepare for today's match.

The defeat at Northampton was double frustration for me, because I was suspended and could only watch helplessly from the stand, alongside Phil Gray and Paul McLaren, who were injured.

It was a battle more than a football match, as it was bound to be because Northampton are fighting for their lives, and to lose to a goal that was a real fluke was painful.

Our traditional way of playing is to pass and move, but when we have to, we can battle as well and from my seat it looked as though we were very unlucky to lose that game. And talking of luck, we haven't had a lot recently on the pitch, or in terms of injuries. The count of absentees who would have been in the 14 at Northampton was eight. The other side of that coin is that youngsters get their chance, and the experience of playing there, and at Maine Road on Wednesday, will do no harm to young players like Tresor Kandol.

Maine Road was a very different game - a football game, not a football war. It might sound odd to supporters who cannot have enjoyed the result any more than we did, but it was a match I really enjoyed playing in.

The difference between Sixfields and Maine Road is staggering: Manchester City are a big club in every sense of the word, and as far as I can work out only Mitch and I had played in front of 26,000 supporters. I was well pleased to be back in the team, but not at all happy about our start.

Our game plan was to try to hold City for half an hour or so, and see if the tension got to them. We now know it would: even when they were two up, City and their fans were nervous at times.

I can't explain our slow start, but I am sure it was not a case of being over-awed. We were focused on the job, and obviously well aware that City were on a very good run, and desperate to cement a play-off place at the very least.

So often in football one lucky bounce, or a split-second decision, can be crucial, and we were the victims twice as City scored their goals in the first eight minutes. Was Paul Dickov offside when he got onto the end of Shaun Goater's flick? We thought he was. Unfortunately the linesman and ref thought otherwise.

For the second goal, we have to hold our hands up about defending from a set piece, knowing we should have done better. Equally, the ref should have done better: the ball went out of play off Goater, very close to the linesman. He gave a goal kick. The ref, much further away, over-ruled him, and awarded City the corner. The old saying about the ref always being right even when he is wrong comes to mind!

I thought we did well after those two hammer-blows so early in the game.

City are an excellent team, but we did not buckle, and played our part in a good contest. They played the sort of football I believe in. Every player knew his role, and their passing and movement was top quality.

Thankfully, after the early shocks, we showed we could play a bit as well, and we relished the

atmosphere. We created a few decent half-chances, but that was our major problem - half-chances only, and none of them taken, although Matthew Spring was very close with a shot that was tipped over the bar.

Maine Road is already a memory, and today we are looking to bounce back at the expense of Lincoln. They have everything to fight for, so it might be another battle job, but we believe we are capable of mixing battle and football in the right proportions to get a result. I would particularly like a handsome win as a farewell and thank-you to Sean Dyche, whose loan ends after today's match. He has fitted in perfectly - Luton Town is his sort of club, and I am sure you will have seen that he is our sort of player. It has been a real pleasure to have him in the squad, and we all hope that Dychie is back with us next season. He feels the same way, but obviously with all that is going on off the field, we have to


We had an unusual gathering in one of our lounges today, helping a survey of supporters' views on football clubs. It is being carried out by Leicester University, in conjunction with the Football League. They are spending three years on contacting supporters at all League clubs, as a "Fans' Feedback" exercise. At the end of it, the University will be able to present to the League a comprehensive picture of what true supporters feel - their likes and dislikes about football and their clubs, their thoughts of the impact TV has on the game, especially pay per view, and concerns, or otherwise, on the gap that is opening up between the FA Premiership and the Nationwide League.

Leicester University used our membership list as a database and picked out a dozen supporters' names at random. I suspect that we will not be the only club in the survey where the question of car parking will arise. Like so many clubs in built-up areas, we know we have a problem and cannot satisfy demand for parking. We have been contacted by Sainsbury's, who are concerned that their store at West Side is being used by supporters, to the detriment of Sainsbury's customers. So can I please remind supporters that parking restrictions around the ground, including on private property, are in

We have, however, been looking at the problem for a long time, and I am at present actively engaged in talking to a company within easy walking distance of the stadium which might be able to offer a parking facility on match days. I will give you further information as soon as possible, although that might not be until next season. At least you can be assured that we do listen to our customers, and want to do everything possible to make it easy to come to Kenilworth Road for football.

Finally today, all of us send best wishes to Paul Smith, our official club entrant in tomorrow's London marathon. As a result of articles that have appeared in previous editions of the matchday magazine his sponsorship forms have been boosted by supporters, and from within the club. The players have all pledged donations, and many of us will be watching TV coverage hoping to see the Luton Town kit well to the fore.






#### IOHN REAMES (Chairman/Manager)

#### BARRY RICHARDSON (Goalkeeper)

Began his career as a trainee at Sunderland but tailed to break through into first team football and moved on to Scarborough. Later at Northampton Town and Preston North End before signing for the Imps. A big favourite with the fans, he has made over 100 appearances for City.

#### JOHN VAUGHAN (Goalkeeper)

Veteran keeper who has appeared in the Football League for nine different clubs. Began as an apprentice at West Ham and later at Fulham, Cambridge, Charlton and Preston. Also had loan spells at Bristol Rovers, Wrexham, Bristol City and Colchester. He has competed with Richardson for the number one shirt this season.

#### JASON BARNETT (Defender)

Got his break into first team football after moving from Wolves to Lincoln making his Football League debut for the Imps in October 1995. He is a long throw specialist who is normally used as a right back but can also play in midfield. Troubled by injuries in the early part of the season but won his place back in mid December.

#### **STUART BIMSON** (Defender)

Cultured left back who was at Southport and Macclesfield before Bury signed him in February 1995. He made 36 league appearances for the Shakers before his move to Sincil Bank. Suffered through injuries and being out of favour until making the number three shirt his own since coming into the team in October.

#### **KEVIN AUSTIN** (Defender)

Highly rated central defender whose form has attracted the attention of a number of top clubs. Extremely quick and a real rock at the heart of the Lincoln defence. He was voted Player of the Year by the Lincoln supporters in 1997/98. Scored his first goal for the club in the October victory over Manchester City after more than 100 appearances for the Imps.

#### **STEVE HOMES** (Defender)

Central defender who is now in his third spell with the Imps. Started as a trainee in the late 1980s but was released without making the first team. He later played for non-league Guisborough Town for four years before Preston gave him a second chance. He was later loaned to Lincoln and eventually signed on a permanent basis in March 1996.

#### GRANT BROWN (Defender)

Lincoln's longest serving player who is now in his tenth season at Sincil Bank. A strong central defender who has made over 300 appearances for the Imps. He started as a trainee at Leicester but after a handful of first team matches he was brought on loan to Lincoln by Colin Murphy and later signed on a permanent basis.

#### **DEAN WALLING** (Defender)

Vastly experienced central defender who cost a then club record fee of £75,000 from Carlisle. Powerful in the air and still has the goalscoring instincts that enabled him to play as a striker earlier in his career. Won international honours with St. Kitta and Nevis in April 1998 but missed the end of last season through injury. Currently fighting his way back to fitness after a hernia operation.

#### IAN WILKINS (Defender)

A central defender who is a product of the Sincil Bank youth scheme. He made his league debut as a trainee last season and was rewarded with a full contract in the summer.

#### CHRIS WILDER (Defender/Midfield)

Right back who can also play in midfield or central defence. Signed March 1999 on loan from Sheffield United until the end of the season. Currently in his second spell at Bramall Lane and has also played for Rotherham, Notts County and Bradford City.

#### PAUL SMITH (Midfield)


Right-sided winger who did well on loan at Lincoln last season before his transfer was completed in December 1997. Originally with his home town team of Hastings before his move to Forest. He failed to make the break through into the first team at the City Ground but has been a regular with the Imps. Scored three goals in 15 starts last season.

#### TERRY FLEMING (Midfield)

A hard working midfield player with plenty of pace and stamina. His form this season has earned him the club captaincy with his all-action style being a key feature of the Imps midfield. Began his career at

Coventry and was later at Northampton and Preston before his move to Lincoln.

#### JOHN FINNIGAN (Midfield)

A skillful central midfield player who is also an excellent ball winner. He spent six seasons at Nottingham Forest captaining the reserve team in his last two campaigns before arriving at Lincoln on loan in March 1998. Impressed in the run in to promotion at the end of last season and his transfer was made permanent in the summer.

#### PAUL MILLER (Midfield)

Played at Wimbledon and Bristol Rovers before his move to Lincoln. He started his career as a striker but has mainly been used in a midfield role by Lincoln. He missed much of last season through injury and only forced his way back into the first team squad in December 1998.

#### **DAVID PHILLIPS** (Midfield)

Experienced midfield player signed on a free transfer from Huddersfield Town in March 1999. He began his career at Plymouth and was later at Manchester City and Coventry winning an FA Cup winners medal with the Sky Blues in 1987. He moved on to Norwich and Nottingham Forest before his move to Huddersfield. He has 62 caps for Wales the last of which was against Italy in 1996.

#### **LEE PHILPOTT** (Midfield)

Left-sided winger signed in the summer after he was out of contract at Blackpool. He missed the early part of the season through injury and after regaining his fitness suffered a hamstring injury. Began as a trainee at Peterborough and was later at Peterborough and Cambridge before his move to Blackpool in March 1996.

#### RICHARD PEACOCK (Midfield)

Midfielder pursued by Lincoln for two years before his signature was finally secured in January as part of an exchange deal which saw Jason Perry and Jon Whitney move to Boothferry Park. He made his debut for the Imps coming on as a second half substitute in the 1-0 home win over Northampton.

#### PETER GAIN (Midfield)

Tall left-sided midfield man signed on extended loan until the end of the season. He has yet to make a first

team appearance for Spurs but made his Nationwide League debut for the Imps as a late substitute in the 1-1 draw with Burnley at Sincil Bank in January.

#### **CRAIG STONES** (Midfield)

Teenager who made his debut as a 16 year old back in April 1997. A product of Lincoln's youth policy who was a regular member of the first team squad last season.

#### **NICKY REESON** (Midfield)

Teenager in his first season as a pro after coming through the ranks at Lincoln. He has yet to make his debut on the Nationwide League.

#### LEE THORPE (Striker)

Started as a trainee at Blackpool but made just two first team starts for the Tangerines before he was released in the summer of 1997. Signed for Lincoln after a successful trial and finished as leading scorer last season with 14 goals. He prefers a central striking role but is also very effective on the right side of the attack.

#### GAVIN GORDON (Striker)

Strong and powerful youngster who was on Manchester City's books as a schoolboy before Hull signed him as a trainee. Given his first team chance by the Tigers as a 16 year old and hasn't looked back.

#### **TONY BATTERSBY** (Striker)

A lively striker who joined the Imps in August after a brief spell on Ioan. He began at Sheffield United and was later at Notts County before his move to Bury, He has scored regularly since his arrival at Sincil Bank.

#### **NEALE FENN** (Striker)

Striker signed on extended loan from Spurs until the end of the season. He came through the ranks at White Hart Lane and has been capped by the Republic of Ireland at youth and Under 21 levels. He had made eight Premiership appearances for Spurs up to the start of this season and has also been on loan at Leyton Orient, Norwich and Swindon. Made his debut for Lincoln in their Autowindscreens Shield win over Mansfield in January.





OVER the years confectionery firms have been prolific issuers of cards, especially with products like sweet cigarettes, or candy sticks as they now have to be called.

One of the leading firms to produce football cards was Barratt & Co, and we have already featured an example from one of their many sets that were issued most years from 1950 to 1974.

Soon after that, the firm merged with George Bassett & Co of Sheffield, and it was not long before annual football cards were being manufactured again - Bassett's began these issues with Football 1978/79, and produced a similar set each year until 1992, with each packet of their Football Candy Sticks containing a soccer card.

The problem for collectors of these sets is that from 1982 onwards the season was dropped from the title of these sets, with each series simply bearing the legend "Football Candy Sticks." This makes it difficult to

distinguish which particular series any card belongs to.

Like most of the card manufacturers, Bassett's mainly concentrated on players from the top division, so Luton supporters had to wait until 1983 before any of their favourites appeared, when David Moss and Ricky Hill were featured.

After that, however, there was at least one Hatter in every series, with some players featuring more than once. Indeed, Mick Harford was chosen four times in consecutive sets! Other Luton players to be pictured included Brian Stein, Brian Horton, Steve Foster, Mal Donaghy, Kingsley Black, Danny Wilson and John Dreyer.

It was on Easter Monday, 1976, when Ricky Hill burst onto the Kenilworth Road scene. Going on

as substitute in the home fixture with Bristol Rovers, he set up one goal with almost his first touch, and then scored a magnificent one himself. He was carefully nurtured by manager Harry Haslam for the next couple of years before becoming a permanent member of the side - and a target for the bigger clubs.

By the time Ricky Hill had made another appearance on these Bassett cards, in the 1986/87 series, the number of cards in each set had been reduced from 50 to 48. Hill was No. 22 of this series, and was considered to be one of the best midfield players around at the time.

Already capped by England, he had become one of the most popular players ever to wear a Luton shirt. As well as being supremely gifted on the field, he was always charming and polite


off it, the perfect ambassador for the club.

In all he made 507 appearances for the Town, which puts him second only to Bob Morton in the all-time appearance lists.

After leaving Kenilworth Road in 1989, Ricky had short spells in France and at Leicester City, before spending some time coaching in the United States. He is now on the coaching staff at Sheffield Wednesday, where the manger is another of our former midfield favourites, Danny Wilson

Availability and prices for these Bassett football sets tends to vary these days, and while some sets are still to be had for under a tenner, this particular 1986/87 series is now catalogued at £20.



#### 17th April 1976. Oxford 1 Luton Town 3

Although the Town had hoped to bounce back into the old Division One at the first attempt, following relegation in 1975, a poor away record since Christmas had put paid to their chances. Amazingly, five away games were lost, all by 0-3, in the space of two months.

Easter had never been a time for rich pickings on the points front but buoyed by a 2-2 draw at Chelsea on Good Friday the Town travelled to struggling Oxford hoping for their first away win since February.

The Town started like trains and only the linesman's flag, the woodwork and Oxford goalkeeper Roy Burton kept the home side in it until full-back Steve Buckley netted with a spectacular 25 yard effort.

Oxford levelled just before half-time, against the run of play, but the goal failed to inspire them and further efforts from Lil Fuccillo and Jim Husband in the second period made it a bit of a stroll. Unsurprisingly, Oxford were relegated at the end of the campaign while we finished five points off the promotion places.

#### 17th April 1982 Luton Town 3 Newcastle 2

After a tough 2-0 home win over fellow promotion hopefuls Norwich the players now fully believed that the championship was there for the taking.

Next visitors Newcastle had other ideas though, and took the lead through David Mills after slack marking let him in, and when John Trewick increased United's lead from the spot on the hour it looked like it was about to be one of those days. The Hatters

were made of strong stuff, however, and although missing the injured Ricky Hill and David Moss they fought back, aided in no small part by the Magpies time wasting tactics.


Brian Stein reduced the arrears with a fine solo goal and then Newcastle's Mick Martin contrived to concede two penalties to turn the game on its head. With Moss injured there was no recognised penalty taker in the side and the job was given to Stein who kept his nerve and earned the Town three unlikely points.

#### 17th April 1993 Sunderland 2 Luton Town 2

The Hatters were struggling at the wrong end of Division One and relegation two seasons running looked a distinct possibility. A mid-week home victory over strongly fancied West Ham gave the players heart, and a little breathing space, and the trip to fellow strugglers Sunderland put more pressure on the home side.

Sunderland decided to use strong arm tactics to attempt to unsettle the Town and when Don Goodman netted with a curling drive after 31 minutes the writing was on the wall. David Preece floated in a wind assisted free kick just after the interval to equalise as the Town attempted to football their way through, but when Goodman put the home side ahead with only four minutes left Sunderland's dubious tactics seemed to have won the day.

The Hatters refused to give up and when Paul Telfer's near post header hit the back of the net in injury time justice was seen to be done although the Rôker faithful did not see it that way!



# a blast from the past courtesy of Roger Wash

Today, Lincoln City make their first visit to Kenilworth Road since 1968 although league meetings against the Imps go back to our earliest days at the back end of the last century.

Following our successful attempt to gain entry to Football League Division Two in 1897 we came across founder members Lincoln just before Christmas and were beaten 2-4 in the snow at Sincil Bank. The Town were 0-4 down at half-time but managed to fight back to make a game of it and force the locals to scream for the final whistle.

The return game was played a week later and revenge was duly extracted with a massive 9-3 victory at a foggy Dunstable Road. This time the Town were 6-0 up at the interval and coasted through the second period.

Both games went to the home side in the following campaign but in 1899/1900, the Town's last in the Football League for twenty years, we suffered two defeats.

The match report for the game at Lincoln sums up the problems facing the Town at the time and makes it more easy to understand why we took the decision to depart from what was then a northern based league. For the game at Lincoln in March 1900 'Draper had been called upon by the authorities to take a spell of soldiering and J Brown and Holdstock were unable to leave their work at Luton'. No wonder we lost!

For the return at Luton the local newspaper had called upon the citizens of Luton to turn up in force or risk losing their football team for ever. The call to arms was not answered and another defeat was met with the comment 'The whole display was a pitiable proof of the decline of Luton football'.

Apart from a meeting in the F.A.Cup in 1931 it was to be almost fifty years before the sides clashed again for league points, again in the old Division Two. The Imps had won promotion at the end of 1947/48 but found the higher level difficult to get used to and suffered relegation within twelve months. The two games that season were crackers though, with a 4-4 draw at Sincil Bank followed by a crushing 6-0 victory at

Luton. In the latter game Jim Mulvaney, after some eye catching performances in the reserves, was given his first chance at centre-forward in the first team and bagged two goals while Jack Taylor was on target on his league debut.

Lincoln returned to Division Two a far stronger side three years later and we enjoyed six games against them, leading up to our promotion to Division One, without losing. Kenilworth Road favourite Jesse Pye proved to be a thorn in the side of the Imps netting five times over the period while his pupil Gordon Turner was not far behind with four.

The Town were relegated from the top flight in 1960 and met up briefly in the 1960/61 campaign at the end of which Lincoln fell to Division Three. Both games were played over Christmas that season and on Boxing Day at Kenilworth Road both sides missed a penalty as the Town ran out 3-0 winners with Jim Fleming netting his first two goals in English football. Bert Linnecor saw his spot kick saved by Iim Standen in spectacular fashion while at the other end Bob Graves stopped an unusually soft effort from Turner. At Sincil Bank the following day, the Town seemed to be heading for their first away win of the season when Alec Ashworth tapped the ball into the net after it had rebounded off a post. Lincoln, however, gained a deserved equaliser in the second period when Russell Green, a defender deputising up front, headed powerfully past Standen.

The final meetings between the sides all took place in Division Four after our relegation to the basement in 1965. In the game at Sincil Bank in November 1965 an early goal from Tony Read was followed up by an effort from Ray Whittaker which somehow squeezed in at the near post. In full control at the interval the Town contrived to throw the game away and a brace from Roy Chapman levelled the score and it was only miraculous goalkeeping from Colin Tinsley that prevented the Imps from going on to win. Having said that it was only the crossbar that stopped Whittaker from snatching an undeserved winner in the final minute.

The Town made a bold bid for promotion back to Division Three at the first attempt that season, riding on the back of a very strong home record and the goals of John O'Rourke. As the campaign was drawing to a close, however, Lincoln managed to keep out the Town, who were minus the injured O'Rourke, in a dull 0-0 draw at Kenilworth Road on a dry, bumpy pitch. The dropped point proved crucial as the Hatters missed out by one at the season's end.

The 1-8 defeat at Sincil Bank in 1966/67 has been featured in a recent programme and I am sure that Luton supporters will not wish me to dwell on that game! The return that campaign finished on a much higher note as the Town finally saw off the fear of having to apply for re-election by beating the Imps 2-1 in a nervous game. I seem to remember that the penalty driven home by Whittaker four minutes from time was greeted as if the Town had won the Cup!

Before the current campaign the final pair of matches took place in the Town's promotion season of 1967/68. When the Town lined up at Sincil Bank in November 1967 they fielded an infinitely better side than the one that was humiliated in the previous campaign-and it showed!

A dubious penalty was converted by Whittaker

early on and although the Imps levelled through Alan Pilgrim, Keith Allen restored the Town's lead on the stroke of half-time. In the second half a shot from Graham French seemed to be creeping wide but somehow found its way inside the post. Lincoln pulled a goal back through Norman Corner with twelve minutes left but the Hatters comfortably held on to their lead for their third away win in a row.

On the Saturday before the return game, in February 1968, the Town had gone to the top of the table for the first time. Anxious to retain their pole position the Hatters set about Lincoln with a first half display of football that would have graced Division Two.

Goals from Whittaker and Bruce Rioch, in the first ten minutes, were followed by a series of narrow misses before Jim Grummett surprisingly narrowed the deficit. The Town stormed back and a penalty from Whittaker and a strike from Allen gave them a commanding interval lead.

Unfortunately the second half was not a patch on the first as the Town turned their minds towards the next match, to be played two days later against Darlington. Lewis Thom netted for the Imps with two minutes left to give the final scoreline a slightly unrealistic look but the Town were always in control.



AN EAGLE-eyed referee, banished from the Premiership, spotted half a dozen yellow card offences and could hardly miss the reckless tackle that led to Gavin McGowan being sent off in the last minute. But he unaccountably failed to see the foul that might have given us a winning 2-0 lead at Boundary Park.

The home contingent in the Press box were smarting at seeing the Town take an early lead, and aghast when they saw a clear foul to concede a penalty. But the groans turned to chuckles when Paul Danson saw nothing wrong as Tony Thorpe's nimble feet tricked Andrew Holt into a clumsy trip.

Another goal for us then would have condemned Oldham to their 11th home defeat of the season, and at that stage, with 50 minutes gone, they could not have complained about being shoved nearer to relegation danger.

Instead they revived, and after the Town had been the better side gritty defiance by Oldham swung the game marginally their way. But the Town's point was well-earned, and on another day could easily have been three.

Phil Gray shot us into a fifth minute lead and even after Paul McLaren had to be subbed through injury five minutes later, the Town looked very

comfortable. Thorpe and Gray combined to send Stuart Douglas in for a 46th-minute chance which Gary Kelly managed to block, but the penalty escape seemed to do wonders for Oldham's mental approach. Fighting for survival, they hit back with real spirit, and missed a couple of chances before our defence gave away a messy goal to Shaun Garnett on 61 minutes. We regrouped after that, defended well enough, and twice went close to snatching the winner, with a header by Mitchell Thomas and a chip by Gray both clipping the top of the bar.





A FLUKE at one end a bad miss at the other dashed our hopes at Sixfields as battling Northampton, fighting for their Second Division lives, grabbed a victory they scarcely deserved on the run of play.

Gusting wind, a bumpy pitch, and tension that crackled through the home side and their supporters made it a day when they cared little for the performance, much more for the result.

Much of the football was short on flair but long on "up and at them" determination, with the Town's best efforts delayed until the latter stages, when they were unlucky not to force an equaliser.

A total of eight players who would have been in the 14 were unavailable through injuries, suspension to Marvin Johnson, and Irish duties with the youth world cup in Nigeria.

Tresor Kandol, with 22 goals in youth and reserve team football, was given the first League start of his career, but got little change out of the experienced lan Sampson.

Landry Zahana-Oni replaced TK for the last 27 minutes, and he was nearly a trump card. He added a new element, prepared to run at defenders with the ball on the left wing, and at pace too. "He was an unknown quantity - we weren't prepared for him," said Cobblers boss Ian Atkins.

Of the two managers, Atkins, under fire from supporters as Northampton got dragged into the bottom four, had more cause for celebration than Lawrence.

The first half produced little to enthuse either set of supporters except for the goal that turned out to be the winner. Perhaps it was typical of the game: Carlo Corazzin, wide on Northampton's right wing, and mid-way in the Town's half, aimed a cross towards the far post. James Hunt tried to reach it, but the ball was hit with too little height, and not a lot of power, but in the event Hunt unwittingly sold a dummy to Kelvin Davis, and the ball bounced across the goalkeeper, hit the inside of the far post, and rolled into the net.

"The first half was sparring, a bit of a non-event," said Lennie Lawrence. "And we conceded the worst goal I can remember for a long, long time. It was nothing more than a speculative cross, a nothing ball and for it to finish up in our net is bitterly disappointing, and to lose to it is difficult to accept."

The Town's second half performance was much better, and long before the end Northampton were holding on for dear life. They got away with it because Zahana-Oni missed the day's best chance. Andrew Fotiadis released him for a one-on-one with the goalkeeper. But instead of burying the chance, Zahana-Oni chose to put his shot to the goalkeeper's right, with keeper Billy Turley already committed to going that way.

And the Cobblers escaped again when Stuart Douglas headed for goal, and beat the goalkeeper, only to see the ball hit Lee Howey and rebound to safety.

Said Lawrence: "Northampton battled away, got a lot of people behind the ball, and got in plenty of blocks. They hardly had a shot at goal in the entire game. We had plenty of possession, but couldn't translate it into goals, or even real chances. In some ways, effort and commitment, we deserved to get something. But games are won and lost in the penalty areas, and that was where we did not have enough quality.




