

Three more points will secure our safety and the players know my feelings . . . let's get it over and done with as quickly as possible and start preparing for better things.

It was a good move in that direction when we managed to sign Paul Bolland on a permanent basis because although he is good enough already to be in our team, I believe he could develop into a very good player.

He is still only 19 but I regard him as the best young tackling midfielder I have seen for a long time. Not only that, I would also suggest that he is as good as Shaun Derry and Steve Finnan were at the same age.

Paul was unlucky with injuries during his loan spell with us but I saw enough to convince me that we should try to sign him and all credit to the chairman for making that possible.

He could have said that it was bad business to purchase a player at this time to the year, when we are entering a period when there's no revenue coming in, and I would have found it hard to argue with that.

But the chairman knew that had we allowed Paul to go back to Bradford, we would probably have lost him to another club - and it was a good investment to complete the deal.

No doubt there will be more new players to follow during the summer and the fact that we played Colchester last Friday evening gave us an opportunity to view potential targets at the weekend.

But there won't be anything like the number of changes we made this season - and that has to be a good thing.

Ideally, I would like to strengthen one or two key positions but the priority at the moment is to continue gathering points at the rate we have done since that big night at Luton * so that we can launch next season's programme full of confidence.





On The Record

We welcome the supporters, players and officials from Luton Town to Meadow Lane and hope that they have a pleasant, if brief, stay in Nottingham.

It was at Luton's Kenilworth Road ground only eight weeks ago that our then dismal and worrying position took a turn for the better. Our team that evening included new signings Peter Beadle and Kevin Rapley, the latter scoring the only goal of the game in a win that sparked a super run of form and results.

Luton are of course one of several clubs that find themselves in serious difficulty of another kind. All associated with the club must be extremely concerned to read reports such as were carried in some newspapers last week. One cited the Football League as saying that Luton might not be permitted to compete next season unless certain financial guarantees are in place. The position is far from clear and only those at the heart of the club will know the precise circumstances. We wish them and their supporters well. They should take heart from the likes of Bournemouth and Northampton, both having survived and prospered despite facing extinction in recent years.

There has been considerable speculation about the prospect of all Nationwide Football League Clubs moving to a system of Squad Numbering and names on shirts next season. This is almost certain to happen in the First Division and whilst a large number of Second Division Clubs are against the proposal I find it strange that a majority of Third Division clubs are in favour. On the face of it, the attraction of seeing your own favourite team follow the Premiership with names on player's shirts is attractive to most supporters. There is of course the added cost when purchasing a replica shirt (about £10) but the real pitfalls and consequences (as inevitably) fall to the club. I am advised that kit suppliers will want something in the region of £2,000-£2,500 more to produce the club kit and we could never recoup such a sum from the small profit margins from heat-printing names on shirts. Few clubs outside the Premiership have sufficient shirt sales to warrant such a scheme. The real problem for the clubs in the Second and Third Divisions is with Squad Numbering. This season Notts have used, I think, 38 players. Disadvantages include 'picking your own team' from a list of all registered players printed in the programme. I prefer to see defenders wearing numbers 2-5 and strikers 9 and 10 for example, not 29 and 37!

As you may have guessed, I am against the proposal; but my opposition is based entirely on economic grounds. The Football League have based their support for the initiative on commercial considerations, believing that the scheme will raise the profile of the League as a whole. They might be right on that score, but I am sure at a cost to most clubs outside of the First Division.

A decision is to be taken at the League's Annual General Meeting on June 12th. We wait with bated breath!!!





G is for . . . GOATER

Shaun Goater made just one appearance in a 'six-day career at Meadow Lane but he covered a few miles in the process!

The Bermuda international was playing for

Rotherham Reserves when Mick Walker spotted his potential and within 24 hours of arriving in November 1993, he turned out for us at Charlton.

He created an early goal for Tony Agana but the dream start



was soon halted because after Gary Lund missed a good chance and Paul Devlin struck a post, Charlton hit back to win 5-1.

Goater then joined the squad travelling to Brescia for an Anglo-Italian Cup tie but he had to be withdrawn at the last minute, when problems developed over a work permit.

It emerged that the work permit at that time only allowed him to play for Rotherham so he returned to Millmoor immediately after we arrived back in England.

G is for ... GOALSCORING

It's been a long time since we had a goal-scoring feat which caused us to change our record books and it's actually debatable whether we will ever need to do it again.

For the record, our major goal-grabbing achievements are...

Tommy Keetley's 39 goals in 34 matches in 1930-31 in Division Three South is our highest number of goals in a season.

Les Bradd set the highest League total in

aggregate when he reached 125 goals in 1977 and our fastest League goal was timed at six seconds by Barrie Jones at Torquay in 1962.

Ian Scanlon scored our fastest hat-trick in 165 seconds against Sheffield Wednesday in 1974 and Keetley's haul of ten hat tricks - including three in successive away games in 1931 is a club record.

G is for . . . GATE RECEIPTS

It was one of the great days in our more recent history in February 1991 when victory over Manchester City took us through to the sixth round of the F.A. Cup - and that was a lucrative occasion as well.

The all-ticket match was in doubt until an hour before kick off because of heavy snow but 18,979 saw Gary Lund cap a thrilling tie by scoring the only goal of the game a minute from time.

They paid £124,539 for the privilege of watching that game - which remains a club record to this day.

G is for . . . GRAY

Big things were expected of Billy Gray when he returned to Nottingham in March 1967 to become our new manager.

A member of Forest's 1959 Cup-winning side, he had tasted success in management with Millwall and then Brentford. But he was unable to lift us from the lower reaches of the Fourth Division.

What he did do, however, was to sign two players who were to have a massive influence at Meadow Lane over a long period of time... Don Masson and Les Bradd.

Talking Points

A Fine Mess



The F.A. have finally thought about tackling the epidemic of spoiled brats (i.e. players) squealing at their elders (i.e. match officials) every time a decision goes against them. Two ideas are currently circulating to eradicate this blight from our game once and for all.

The first involves the referee booking a dissenter immediately, then moving the free-kick ten yards towards that players goal. If the player dissents again, a second yellow card is shown and he exits the field to reflect on the fact that next time he might keep his big mouth shut and get on with the game. The ball is moved forward ten yards once more. In my view, this rule is long overdue. A very successful experiment in Jersey has wiped out dissent from the games there, plus speeded up the play. The only complaints have come from managers and players who think that referees have been too lenient.



Coupled with the first measure, I think that this will banish forever the sight of a grown man squawking at someone who has just ruled that the potentially leg-breaking tackle they have executed was illegal, and not before time.

This sort of childish behaviour spirals down quickly into the sort of playground squabble which we recently witnessed between Robbie Fowler and Graeme Le Saux. Whilst I would like to rid this sort of behaviour from our game, I would miss the sort of blunder from the commentators which this arguing can provoke. For instance, Barry Venison actually said "I think Le Saux should get the same ban as Fowler because he came from behind to give Fowler one, and that's not acceptable on a football pitch," Bearing in mind the circumstances of Fowler and Le Saux's bust-up, I think this is one of the best 'cock-ups' (phnurr, phnurr) in commentating history!!!

Finally, here are a few of the things I think should incur an instant yellow card, and please let me know your own suggestions: Wearing your football shirt collar up in the style of Eric Cantona; wearing any red football strip; waving a pretend card at the ref to try and get another player booked (much loved by Italians and Argentinians); wearing any colour football boot other than black; rushing up to a floored player to accuse him of diving; diving to get a free-kick; and I include one for any fan found using a mobile phone in a football ground - a definite ejection and instant \$20 fine!!

Thanks for your E-mail Craig. I can assure you the 'powers that be' at Notts are always interested in what our customers have to say - whether on e-mail or by conventional post. Incidentally, we have a heavy postbag every day, as opposed to a very limited input by e-mail.

The suggestions, complaints and opinions of our supporters help us form policies. However, you should be aware that financial constraints often - nay almost always - preclude our going along with requests for reduced prices. If you don't know or understand that our product on the field of play is directly related to revenue then I am pleased to be able to confirm this point. Contrary to your own view we believe that the offer for Dad's for example to bring kids free of charge is both appropriate and a reasonable gesture. It is always difficult trying to strike a balance between attracting spectators and meeting ever escalating costs. Regrettably, important as it is, the profit from the sale of food, beverages and programmes etc. is negligible compared to ticket sales. I would ask you to trust that we do our very best to mitigate prices against the risk of jeopardising the future of the club.

Thanks for your kind comments on the present kit; we have a great deal of faith in AVEC and their design team who are experts in the field. We feel sure the new strips will be as popular as the last lot. Your input is much appreciated, the cynicism less so! We are all on the same side, you know!


FRED HICKTON

Walsall Slip Up





Welcome to LUTON TOWN

Luton Town, having had an indifferent season on the field of play, have avoided being drawn into a relegation battle and although not technically clear, are likely to finish mid table. Off the field, their season has been a much troubled one. After years of planning to move to a new stadium - the much vaunted Kohler Dome, named after chairman David Kohler - permission has been denied following an appeal to the Government. It is also true that sections of the Luton supporters were against a move from Kenilworth Road although it is difficult to understand why. Access is poor, there is little if any room for expansion and outside investment for commercial enterprise to mitigate costs extremely unlikely whilst at that site. Despite, or indeed because of his ambitious plans for Luton, Kohler became the target for a hate campaign which recently included threats against his family and whilst still chairman his shares in the club are for sale. Increasing financial pressure over the past two seasons have forced the sale of their better players and the Hatters may find themselves on the verge of extinction unless they can resolve the existing problems. Luton are one of a number of clubs whose future is far from clear. Who said 'It's only a game'?

MITCHELL THOMAS

Luton born, Mitchell Thomas was first on schoolboy forms and then an apprentice with his local club until Tottenham paid the Hatters £250,000 for him in the summer of 1986. He had five years with Spurs during which time he made something approaching 200 appearances before moving on to West Ham for £525,000. After only two seasons in which he played a handful of games, he returned to his home town club on a free transfer. A left sided defender, he passes the ball well and can cause problems for opposing defences when he gets forward. Although now entering the veteran stage of his career, his 6' 2" and long legs make him a formidable opponent. He has been a tower of strength at the back and his tenacity and aggression make his a favourite with Hatters fans. He played for England at Boys, Youth and Under-21 level and has clocked up well over 500 first class appearances of which over 300 have been for Luton. Appointed player coach at the beginning of the current season, and he is apparently keen to play on as long as he can.

LENNIE LAWRENCE

Born in Brighton, Lennie never played League football, his playing career restricted to spells with Croydon, Carshalton and Sutton United. His managerial career began with coaching

> appointments at Plymouth and then Lincoln City where he was recruited by his friend Colin Murphy. He moved to Charlton Athletic as reserve team coach before being made manager at the Valley. He had in fact spent nine years with Charlton during which time he was instrumental in their retaining First Division status two seasons running. When the call came for him to take the manager's position at Middlesbrough he took the opportunity to move on and in his second season with them they were promoted to the Premiership. Relegated after one season, Lennie was replaced by Bryan Robson. He was soon back in business with Bradford City where he lasted just 18 months before moving to Luton. Arriving too late to stave off relegation, the following season provided Luton supporters with their best for some years. Rarely out of the promotion frame, they made the Play-Offs but failed

to beat Crewe in the semi finals. A familiar story, they struggled badly last season having done so well in the previous campaign, Lawrence forced to sell his leading scorer Tony Thorpe in order to balance the books. Indeed they avoided relegation to the Third Division courtesy of a late revival only. This season, if possible, has been even worse for the chirpy cockney boss. More departures, including club captain and leading scorer Steve Davis departed for Burnley and in recent weeks turmoil at Board Level

has left the manager isolated in his task to keep the

SQUAD MEMBERS

NATHAN "TANNY" ABBEY

A young goalkeeper who had a surprise first taste of the big time last season: happily playing for the reserves, he was given his first XI debut when both Luton's senior 'keepers were unavailable. Abbey played well in a 1-1 draw with Colchester in the Coca-Cola Cup, built up more experience on loan to Woking in the Vauxhall Conference and is now confirmed understudy to Luton's England under-21 international Kelvin

JIMMY COX

First joined Luton on associate schoolboy forms, and made a big impact in the youth team as an old-fashioned winger, able to take on men and go past them with the ball. He was in the Luton Town squad which did the youth double in the 1997/98 season, winning the South East Counties League Championship and the Southern Junior Floodlit Cup. He made the breakthrough into the first team squad earlier this season with his senior debut in a victory over Ipswich in the Worthington Cup second round.

KELVIN DAVIS

After seeing off two Americans, finally became first choice goalkeeper last season. A product of the Hatters' youth development programme, he started his league career on loan to Torquay early in the 1994/95 season, but despite having few chances at Kenilworth Road because of the form of Juergen Sommer he won England youth and under-21 caps. Davis eventually ousted Sommer, who is now back in the States, but went through a rocky spell in a struggling Luton team and lost his place to lan Feuer, a giant American who cost £600,000 from West Ham. Feuer lost his place through injury last season, and this time Davis proved too good to drop again, and Feuer returned to the USA.

GARY DOHERTY

Big and brave, Doherty is a centre-half who can also operate as a centre-forward. He played in central defence for the Luton team which reached the F.A. Youth Cup semi-finals and won the South East Counties League Championship last season. He became a temporary striker to help an injury crisis, and did well enough to make the switch permanent. And he is making an impact on a bigger stage too: after being capped at youth level he has already been on the subs' bench for the Republic of Ireland. Luton record to the start of the season: 11 appearances, no goals.

MARVIN JOHNSON

A versatile defender, normally a centre-half but capable of filling in on the flanks or in midfield, Johnson is celebrating a full decade as a first team regular at Luton, his only club. Injuries have been a problem, but he has always bounced back, and is a former winner of the Players' Player of the Year award at Kenilworth Road after becoming a regular in central defence. Became skipper earlier this season Luton record to the start of this season: 306

appearances, eight goals. **SEAN DYCHE**

A very experienced centre-half signed on loan from Bristol City in January as Luton were hit by a crop of injuries, and the loss of Steve Davis, who returned to Burnley for pressing personal reasons. Dyche began his career as a trainee with Nottingham Forest, but he best known for his time at Chesterfield. He skippered the unfancied Spireites to the F.A. Cup semifinals in 1997, and after 200 matches for Chesterfield he joined Division One side Bristol City in the summer of 1998 for £275,000

ANDREW FOTIADIS

Another local discovery, Fotiadis chose to stay at school to gain GCSE A-levels before being a full-time soccer professional. He won England School caps at under-15 and under-18 level, and developed a style to delight Luton fans and worry opposing defences, as an old-fashioned centre-forward, with good physique, power and concentrated determination to score goals. Luton record to the start of this season: 38 appearances, four goals.

STUART FRASER

Stylish defender and skipper of the Luton youth team which ran away with the South East Counties League Championship last season. Reckoned by the Luton coaching staff to be an outstanding prospect, he was given his league debut against Carlisle, in a 3-2 win, on the final day of last season. Luton record to the start of this season: One appearance.

LIAM GEORGE

Full of pace and nimble footwork, George made a big impression in the Luton youth team's attack before graduating to the reserves last season and proving that

he could cope with the higher grade as well - 18 full appearances in the Avon Combination, in a mid-table team, yielded a dozen goals. A regular member of the Republic of Ireland squad that progressed to the European youth championships final, the striker made his league debut against Bristol City in September 1997, and started this campaign hoping for more chances to show he can score goals at every level. But no sooner had he got established in the side than

he broke a leg, to face a six-month lay-off. Luton record to the start of this season: Four appearances, no goals.

PHIL GRAY

Greeted like a prodigal son when he signed for Luton for the second time in September 1997, the Northern Ireland striker soon discovered that football can be cruel. A succession of injuries struck, culminating in surgery to cure a back problem, leaving Gray determined to make up for lost time when this season kicked off. He was in Spurs reserves when David Pleat, ex-boss at White Hart Lane, and then in his second spell as Luton manager, splashed out £275,000 for him in August 1991. Two years later he moved on to Premiership football with Sunderland, for £800,000 and after three years at Roker went to Nancy in France, and then Fortuna Sittard in Holland. He needed little encouragement to return to Kenilworth Road in exchange for £400,000, and having rediscovered his goal touch this

season was recalled to the Northern Ireland squad in November. Luton record to the start of this season: 19 appearances, two

SQUAD MEMBERS

JULIAN JAMES

One of the most loyal clubman ever to sign for Luton, from schools football, the right back has had more than his share of ups and downs in football. He was 18 when he made his full debut, in a League Cup tie at Leeds, played brilliantly, but got sent off five minutes from time. He went on loan to Preston to gain léague experience and won England under-21 honours. A regular in Luton's sides throughout this decade, he was given a well-deserved

testimonial, but then suffered tragedy, breaking a right leg against Bristol Rovers in April 1998. He faces an uphill battle to return before the end of this season. Luton record to the start of this season: 339 appearances, 14 goals.

STUART DOUGLAS

A real hotshot in youth and reserve team football, Douglas was still a 17-year-old trainee when he made his league debut for Luton against Oldham in 1995. He scored and won the sponsors' man of the match award. The

pacey striker looked set to be a regular in Luton's league side last season, but was one of the unlucky victims of the injury plague which swept through Kenilworth Road. Luton record to the start of this season: 25 appearances, three goals.

GAVIN McGOWAN

A right back fighting for a Premiership place against very stiff competition at Arsenal, McGowan signed for Luton for the third time in June 1998. The first time was a loan deal in March 1997, but that ended after only two impressive appearances. A calf muscle injury needed surgery, and after getting over that he joined Luton on loan again, this time for three months, at the start of the 1997/98 season. Lennie Lawrence rated him, but could not afford to make an offer, and was delighted to conclude a quick deal a year later when Arsenal offered the defender a free transfer. Luton record to the start of this season: Ten appearances, no goals.

RAY McKINNON

A move to Luton at the start of this season gave the former Scottish under-21 international midfielder his second chance at making the grade in English soccer, after an unhappy experience with Nottingham Forest. He joined Dundee United as a YTS boy and in 1992 Nottingham Forest paid £750,000 for him. But Brian Clough resigned and Frank Clark was determined to build his own squad. McKinnon made only eight appearances for Forest in 20 months before being transferred to Aberdeen. He had two years there, then returned to Dundee United. After two years, and vastly experienced, he took advantage of the Bosman ruling to try his luck in England again, and Luton beat several other clubs to secure his signature.

MICHAEL McKINDOE

Made his debut for Luton's senior side earlier this season when injuries hit three players above him in the pecking order for the wide left midfield slot. He joined Luton as a YTS boy after leaving school, and was part of their youth team which won the South East Counties League championship and the Southern Junior Floodlit Cup in the 1997/98 season. He made his first team debut in the Worthington Cup first round victory over Oxford United in August.

PAUL McLAREN

The midfielder was still a schoolboy when Luton realised that he had enough talent and strength to play regularly in their youth team. A YTS offer was a formality, and he was offered pro terms while still only 17. Forceful and always ready to back up attacks, he was one of the reasons why Luton were ready to let Welsh international Ceri Hughes

move to Wimbledon in the summer of 1997. McLaren slotted into the Hughes role so well that he played in all but three of Luton's league games in 1997/98. Luton record to the start of this season: 94 appearances, one goal.

ANDRE SCARLETT

It was a Roy of the Rovers story when the 18-year-old made his league debut for Luton in October, Because of injuries the winger was on the subs' bench against Oldham, and got his chance with 20 minutes to go, with the score at 0-0. His trickery tempted an Oldham player into a rash tackle which earned a red card, and Luton went on to win 2-0, with Scarlett netting the clincher.

PAUL SHOWLER

If ever a player deserved a run clear from injuries, it is Showler, who is with manager Lennie Lawrence for the second time in his career. He can play in attack, but is more often used as a left-sided midfielder pushing forward. Having learned his soccer trade with Altrincham, Showler was given his league chance by Barnet, after they were promoted from the Conference, and then moved on to Bradford. Lawrence was his manager there, and paid £50,000 in the summer of 1996 to enable Showler to follow his boss to Luton. He played in 33 games in his first season with Luton, but was then hit by a series of injuries, and managed only one brief appearance as a sub last season. Luton record to the start of this season: 34 appearances, six goals.

MATTHEW SPRING

A competitive midfielder, Spring was a driving force in the Luton side which reached the F.A. Youth Cup semi-finals in 1997, and it was no surprise when he was called up for a league debut when still only 17 as a sub against Bristol City in September 1997. His full debut followed a month later, in a home victory against Plymouth and boss Lennie Lawrence called Spring's display "the best debut I have seen in a long time." Luton record to the start of this season: 13 appearances, no goals.

ALAN WHITE

Lennie Lawrence went back to Middlesbrough, one of his old clubs when an injury crisis robbed him of three of his back four in September 1997. The Luton boss, as ever, had little money to spend, but centrehalf White was a prospect he knew well: Lawrence had signed him as a 17-year-old at Ayresome Park. White was unable to force his way into Middlesbrough's Premiership squad after the advent of Bryan Robson and big-money signings, and grabbed the chance to rejoin Lawrence and sample league football. And the £40,000 fee has looked a bigger bargain with every match. Luton record to the start of this season: 33 appearances, one goal.

L'ANDRY ZAHANA-ONI

Signed by Lennie Lawrence in January, from Bromley, of the Ryman Premier League, Zahana-Oni had attracted the interest of several other league clubs with his abilities as an old-fashioned left winger. A French national, he had spent six years with Le Havre before crossing the Channel to make the grade in British football. He spent eight months at Stirling Albion before joining Bromley, and Luton paid £25,000, with more to follow depending on the players progress.







Roger Cleary is suitably touched by the warm welcome back to Meadow Lane that he has received and he says: "I'm very happy to be back."

No one ever doubted his contribution to last season's Championship triumph - not only through 'healing hands' but also his influence in


"There is still some way to go but I think the message is gradually getting through to football clubs that looking after players is a very important side of the game.

"I've always believed that prevention is better than cure and we introduced a number of things last season, like warm-ups and warm downs, which were very helpful in that respect. I could see what a difference it made by doing things right - and that was a factor in winning promotion.



Paul Bolland needed no persuading to turn his back on the possibility of helping Bradford City to clinch promotion - and a taste of life in the Premiership.

But don't mistake that for a lack of ambition because the Bradford-born midfielder is determined to be successful in the game, and Sam Allardyce believes he has every chance of doing so.

The manager was delighted when we managed to complete a £75,000 deal last Friday which will keep Bolland at Meadow Lane until the summer of 2002.

And the player himself was relieved as well as delighted when he was invited to put pen to paper, shortly before the team coach set off for Colchester.


He explained: "It didn't help my cause when I damaged my back against Wrexham because I knew there were only a few days left before my loan expired.

"The deadline for signing me was Friday and when it got to Thursday and I'd heard nothing, I assumed that I would be going back to Bradford to play in the Reserves again.

"When I spoke to the 'Gaffer' about it, he said he was keen to sign me but it was all down to whether a fee could be agreed with Bradford."

The deal was eventually done with minutes to spare and Bolland, who has had more than his share of frustrations over the past three months because of injuries, cup ties and postponements, was genuinely delighted.

He added: "When I first came here, I saw it purely as a loan - an opportunity to get some first-team games under my belt and gather experience.




"They are a great set of lads who have made me very welcome and although we have a lot of laughs in the dressing room, we all know when it's time to be serious."

According to the manager, Bolland is the best young tackling midfield player he has seen in a long time. That's quite a compliment for a player who won't be twenty until December and Allardyce also believes that he's every bit as good as Shaun Derry and Steve Finnan were at his age.

> What neither of them realised, though, was that Bolland can be equally effective in defensive roles - and the way he responded to that challenge certainly helped when the time came to make a decision about his future.

He played as an emergency right-back for the first time in his life at Lincoln, then switched to the centre of defence against Chesterfield when Mark Warren went off injured.
